Wire Barricade Rises In Belfast To Curb Violence

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (UPI)—A sullen and silent crowd of Protestants and Roman Catholics watched today as an ugly monument to sectarian bitterness slowly rose in the heart of Belfast under the supervision of British army engineers.

Both Protestant and Catholic clergy men admitted they viewed the construction of a barbed wire peace line dividing the two communities, a barrier described by some as the "Belfast Wall."

Dirksen Is Returned For Burial

PEKIN, Ill. (UPI)—The body of Sen. Everett M. Dirksen, aboard the presidential jetliner, left the nation's capital today for burial in the prairie earth near his home, which sent him to Congress 35 years ago.

Dirksen's widow, Luella, other family members, Sen. Charles H. Percy, R-Ill., and members of Dirksen's staff accompanied the casket aboard Air Force One.

Vice President Spiro T. Agnew and more than 100 senators and congressmen came on three other jets to pay their last tributes to the colorful lawmaker who had been Senate minority leader for nearly 30 years.

Schools and government officials were closed for the day. Virtually all of the businesses in Pekin planned to shut their doors from noon until 3 p.m. EDT.

Red Ground Attack Marks End Of Three-Day Truce

SAIGON (UPI)—A strong Communist ground attack against an American base marked the end of the three-day cease-fire in honor of Ho Chi Minh, U.S. military spokesmen said today.

American forces, which had tacitly observed the Viet Cong truce, took to the offensive against the enemy base.

The offensive, which ended Sunday, today dropped 300 tons of bombs on Communist positions, communiques said.

Fire Districts Supported

Retention of fire protective districts in Idaho, as the most feasible way of coping with forest fires, received backing here Wednesday from Lt. Gov. Jack Murphy.

Lt. Gov. Murphy, speaking to the Twin Falls Rotary Club, said that unless the state is willing to spend considerably more money and effort in the fire fighting field than at present, it would be best to talk of abolishing the districts.

His comments came during an explanation of state efforts to come to an agreement with the federal government on what the state is doing for federal participation in fighting forest fires in 1969 and 1970.

The federal government has billed the state for a total of some \$5 million for this. Lt. Gov. Murphy says the state currently owes only a minor portion of this, according to contracts under which it operates.

He outlined efforts of a state negotiating team to come to some agreement with the federal agencies on the matter and recounted some of the difficulties the team has encountered.

Many of the difficulties arise, he said, due to the necessity of dealing with the federal agencies — the OEP (Office of Emergency Planning), Forest Service, Bureau of Land Management and GAO (General Accounting Office).

Plans For T. F. Airport Given Approval

Approval of plans for extension of the main runway at the Twin Falls City County Airport and also installation of high intensity landing lights was given today by officials of the Federal Aviation Administration.

The affirmative nod from government officials in Los Angeles, and Salt Lake City means that the east-west runway, now more than a mile long, will be lengthened more than 2,000 feet to permit use of the field by medium jet planes. Air West officials have pinpointed Oct. 26 for first jet operation into Twin Falls providing the runway is completed.

Atomic waste is being dumped at the National Reactor Testing Station, east of Arco, above the Snake River Plains aquifer, and the owner of the world's largest trout farm feels it may endanger his industry and the entire farming community of southern Idaho.

Hailey To Build Sewage System

HAILEY — The city of Hailey has sold \$300,000 worth of bonds to provide funds for installing a sewage system and improving the water system.

The bill of the Farmers Home Administration to provide the money at five per cent interest was accepted, Mayor George Allen reported. The city will have to pay back the money through charges made to users of the system. City voters approved the \$300,000 revenue bond issue last March 4.

Some half mile of pipe was installed last year for \$22,000. In addition to the money raised through the revenue bonds, the city has received a federal grant of \$27,000 which also will be used for the water and sewage system.

The city has never had a sewage system, and septic tanks and cesspools and practice of dumping some raw sewage into the river, all have been labeled health hazards, city officials note.

The present water system has been termed inadequate because of old wooden mains. Dr. A. E. Richards, local dentist, asked the council to have fluorine added to the water. At present only chlorine is added.

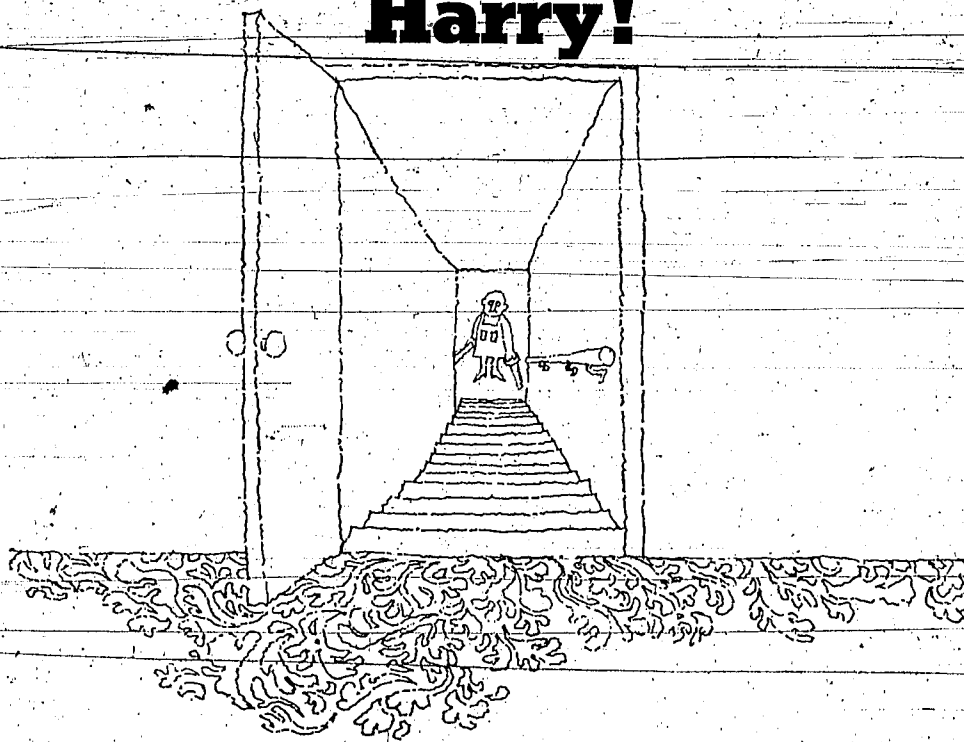

State of Alaska Nets \$900 Million In Oil-Lease Sale

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (UPI)—The state of Alaska sold oil rights in a huge region of the Arctic Wednesday in a dramatic financial battle which established two records—more than \$900 million in total sales and a high bid of \$28.23 an acre.

The first price of \$300,220,370 surpassed a previous high for sale of oil rights which netted about \$700 million in California.

A two-company combine, including the Getty Oil Co. owned by billionaire J. Paul Getty and Amerada Hess Corp., topped the average mark by paying \$72,777,133 for the 57½ of the 179 parcels sold in the daylong sale.

The highest price ever paid before for oil rights was \$27,420 an acre for a plot of Louisiana tidelands.

Every major oil company in the United States was represented in the 1,087 bids submitted for oil rights to 430,000 acres of Alaska's fabulous North Slope. State officials said most of them were successful bidders on at least one parcel.

"This is Alaska's greatest day," Gov. Keith Miller told 700 persons jammed into Sidney J. Audrieth Hall for the opening of bids. Earlier he

Evans Aide Reprimanded For Collision

SUBIC BAY, Philippines (UPI)—The deck officer of the U.S. destroyer Frank E. Evans today received only an official reprimand and a delay in promotion for his role in the collision of his ship with the Australian carrier Melbourne.

Lt. (j.g.) Ronald C. Ramsey, 24, of Long Beach, Calif., and Ramon, Ariz., could have been jailed for two years on the negligence and dereliction of duty charges, to which he pleaded guilty earlier in the day.

Ramsey was the senior officer on the Evans' bridge during the pre-dawn collision June 3 in the South China Sea in 74 American sailors were killed.

In addition to receiving a reprimand, Ramsey lost 1,900 promotional points, meaning he was set back behind 1,600 other officers on the Navy promotional list.

A Navy spokesman said this might delay Ramsey's next promotion by two years.

Before the sentencing, Ramsey received a testimonial from the executive officer of the Evans, Lt. Cmdr. George L. McMichael, 34, of Fountain Valley, Calif.

"Asked by the defense whether he still wanted to serve with Ramsey, McMichael said: "Yes, I would be pleased to have him. Mr. Ramsey served with me or under my command."

Testifying on his own behalf, Ramsey said for the first time that his father retired from the Navy as a master chief with 30 years' service and now lives with his mother in Phoenix.

Ramsey said his present wife and 2-year-old daughter were in Long Beach.

Ramsey admitted falling to inform the Evans' skipper, Cmdr. Albert S. McComber, of the ordered change of station which led to the collision and of falling away from him.

McComber, 40, of Vallejo, Calif., will be tried on charges of dereliction of duty and negligence after the proceedings against Ramsey are completed. A third Evans officer, Lt. (j.g.) James A. Hopson, 28, of Kansas City, Kan., received a reprimand for his part in the incident.

Survey Points Up Pressing Need Of School Facilities

There is an immediate and pressing need for new school facilities throughout Idaho, and an eight-state report on educational facilities, which was released today, says the situation will probably worsen between now and 1980.

In many Idaho communities, school housing space is reaching the "critical" state and it is becoming necessary in many areas to assign pupils to limited school sessions.

"These situations have arisen either because the citizens have not seen fit to provide necessary funds for the needed facilities or because they are rejected, legally or otherwise, in the amount of funds available for capital outlay."

"It is the critical classroom shortage is to be met between now and 1980, adequate school facilities must be constructed at the lowest possible cost without sacrificing health, safety or educational adequacy," the report on designing Idaho's future education reads.

The report sets up certain criteria for school sites.

These are:

- Sites should be centrally located in reference to the children who are to attend the school.
- Sites should be large enough to accommodate necessary facilities and to provide ample space for outdoor instruction and recreation.
- The sites should be reasonably well removed from objectionable features.

— Sites should be readily accessible to children and the general public.

— The sites should be located in safe areas, free from hazards and located so that water, sewers and other utilities can be provided at a reasonable cost.

— They should be selected with due regard to their proximity to public recreational, educational and cultural facilities and should be purchased before the need becomes critical.

The report says it is generally agreed that school facilities should be a source of pride to the people of the community.

"Simplicity of design should be obtained by avoiding the use of complicated construction methods."

The report said, "clearly, if the Idaho school system is to benefit from the advances in educational technology now evolving, design solutions in school architecture will be required."

On the buildings, it is brought out that the state should share in the construction of new ones and modifications to existing ones.

"It is reasonable that the total taxing power and tax resources of the state should be placed behind public school construction."

The report claims that the Idaho school finance picture is a "complex mangle" and that the state's 17 school districts should be reorganized.

"The legislative and judicial intent that all property in the state be assessed at the same

proportion of full cash value should be enforced and restrictions on local school trustees and citizens that interfere with the provision of quality educational programs should be removed or reduced."

The report states that Idaho's distribution formula is not altered to a proportional equalizing approach.

In the section of the report on school finance, it is recommended that Idaho's aid-distribution program should make provision for adult education in the public schools.

The report also calls for a uniform statewide system of record-keeping and a uniform system of bus routing.

"The state should seriously consider a state plan for the voluntary purchase of school bus supplies and school buses."

The following suggestions are also made:

- That all elementary school districts be eliminated.
- That the floor concept be eliminated from the distribution formula.
- That the current distribution formula be shifted in stages to the proportional equalizing approach so that resulting shifts in the tax impact be graduated.
- And that a full-time consultant in transportation services be established in the department of education at the earliest possible time.

The recommendations are deserving of immediate action and the legislature is urged to give them consideration and to take the necessary steps for implementation."

Bricks Fly As Atomic Blast Rumbles In Colorado Soil

GRAND VALLEY, Colo. (UPI)—Darrell Seamans, 85, sat with his 82-year-old wife near the shattered mirror and torn lampshade in his mountain cabin.

The giant nuclear explosion also had torn bricks from the chimney of the cabin.

"We don't like it," Seamans said, shaking his head. "It doesn't do us a damn bit of good. But we're not going to make a big fuss about the damage."

The postmaster of Grand Valley, Carroll E. Byerum, was six miles from the blast site. He saw the concussion knock bricks off the facing of the 50-year-old Courthouse.

Project Rulison had finally been detonated Wednesday after several weather delays.

Explosion of the bomb, 15 feet long and 9 inches in diameter, buried 8,442 feet beneath the shale and sandstone of the Rocky Mountains, interrupted telephone service, knocked rocks and chunks of the mountainside off high ridges and great clouds of dust into the clear Colorado air.

Scientists and the Atomic Energy Commission also hoped the blast freed 3 1/2 billion in natural gas to be tapped for commercial purposes. They won't know for sure, however, until the cavern shaft is opened in six months. It will be that long, officials said, for under-

ground radiation to dissipate.

The blast came off without a hitch despite court fights, protesters and a week-long delay due to the weather.

The initial tremor—registered 5.5 on the Richter Scale at the Colorado School of Mines, 70 miles away from ground zero in Melese, Colo.

Conservationists and a group of Colorado scientists waged an unsuccessful legal fight against Rulison all the way to the U.S. Supreme Court, they claimed. Rulison, the third blast in the AEC's Plowshare series, would contaminate air and water.

Rulison originally was set for last Thursday but adverse wind conditions postponed the daily readjustments.

Samuelson Reiterates

Samuelson (UPI) — Gov. Don Samuelson, appearing here Wednesday, again emphasized his approval of the White Clouds development and told area residents the state still had several million acres to develop for recreation.

'Clouds' Stand

Samuelson is continuing his three-day "take the government to the people" tour through the eastern part of the state.

Samuelson said two years ago the Forest Service started a road "into the same area now being considered, but abandoned the road for lack of funds. When private industry requested approval of the White Clouds development and told area residents the state still had several million acres to develop for recreation."

The governor said the proposed site for development was not in the White Clouds area "proper." He said the area to be mined is 700 feet wide, 1,000 feet long with an ore to a depth of about 500 feet.

The governor said that at none of his open forum hearings has there been any mention of the state's high death rate.

"It seems to me we are concerned over our high accident rate until they are personally involved."

He also said he felt the Idaho State Parks Board had the authority to charge a fee for overnight use of state parks if the fee was needed for park maintenance.

Water In Dam Post Office Admits Delay Is 2 Times That Of '68

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Post Office confirmed Wednesday what many letter writers have long suspected: mail takes longer to travel—between the nation's big cities—than between other points, and someday service is largely a myth.

Also, the average first-class letter generally arrives quicker than an air mail letter, and when the destination is relatively nearby, delivery can be delayed by using an air mail stamp.

Statistics on how long it takes to deliver domestic mail were made public Wednesday in the first such assessment ever undertaken by the Post Office. The current national service index report covers the period from January through March, and October through December, 1968, including the Christmas rush.

During the first quarter, the Post Office found only 5.3 per cent of first class and 0.3 per cent of air-mail letters reached their destinations the same day they were mailed. The figures drop to .32 per cent for first class and .01 for air-mail during the Christmas period.

The service between major cities in both periods was "consistently poorer," requiring an extra two-tenths of a day on the average, that "torture" mail between other cities.

The first-quarter survey found it required an average of 1.5 days to deliver first class mail and 2.1 days for air mail, compared to 1.6 days for first class and 2.2 days for air mail over the Christmas period.

Unsolicited Credit Cards Said Threat To Consumers

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Credit cards which arrive in the mail unsolicited are a menace to consumers and a boon to thieves, Rep. Joseph E. Karth, D-Minn., told the Federal Trade Commission Wednesday.

Karth was a leadoff witness as commission examiners will liberally check on possible restraints on roadside credit card mailings by firms and agencies other than banks.

Karth was among several congressmen lined up to testify such curbs are overdue. He said the post office in 1967 turned down his request for postal restraints on credit card mailings despite evidence that 1.2 million credit cards yearly are lost and 300,000 stolen.

"The mounting evidence suggests that the loss of one's good name and credit rating is too often the result," Karth testified. "Growing mail theft and fraud argues compellingly for curbing this practice."

Karth has introduced legislation to curb card mailings. Karth said he got letters from all over the country recounting abuse, thievery, impaired credit ratings and other complaints.
