25 Known Dead After Mexican Jetliner Crashes In Lake Bed

The 7,000 residents of Mullins were ordered off the streets Sunday after windows were smashed and a warehouse destroyed by fire.

MEXICO CITY (UPI) — A Mexican Airlines jetliner with 118 persons aboard, mostly Americans, crashed into a swampy lake bed Sunday night and split into three pieces on an approach to International Airport here.

Another Mexican Boeing 727 crashed June 4 north of Monterey, killing all 79 aboard, including Mexican tennis star Rafael Sanja.

The fall section snapped off and landed about 100 yards from the fuselage. The fuselage was sheared off just behind the cockpit. The wings were broken.

Abrams May Appear At Green Beret Trial

By NAT GIBSON — SAIGON (UPI) — A New York attorney said today "there's no question" that Gen. Creighton Abrams would be subpoenaed to testify at the Green Beret murder trial. He said the court should open to the public the testimony of Abrams, commander of U.S. forces in Vietnam, "which would be very important," said Henry E. Rothblatt, who represents three of the eight special forces men involved in the case.

"There's no question about it," Rothblatt said, when asked whether Abrams would be called on to testify. Rothblatt said he suspected Abrams had been subpoenaed by the defense during the investigation. "I have no doubts about the outcome," Rothblatt said. "It will be an acquittal."

Rothblatt said he doubted one of his clients, CWO Edward M. Boyle of New York City, would testify against the other Green Berets. There had been reports he would testify for the prosecution.

Boyle and SPC Alvin L. Gering, twin brothers, were ordered court-martialed but have been released from the Army Post, 17 miles northeast of Saigon.

A military defense counsel, Capt. John S. Berry of San Diego, Calif., said he also represents Maj. David E. Crew of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, and Capt. Leonard J. Brumby of Duncan, Okla.

Food Prices Hike Cost Of Living

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A continued rise in food prices contributed to an increase of four-tenths of one per cent in the cost of living of Americans during August, the Labor Department reported today.

An increase of six-tenths of one per cent in food prices, including restaurant meals, was headed by a jump of 60 per cent in egg prices. Over all grocery prices were up five-tenths of one per cent.

The cost of consumer services was up six-tenths of one per cent. This was due to a major factor for the increase in living costs reported in mortgage insurance, property taxes, residential gas and electricity rates and home repair services.

U. S. Troop Withdrawal Is Slammed

PARIS (UPI) — North Vietnam Sunday denounced the withdrawal of more U.S. troops from South Vietnam as a propaganda maneuver and repeated its demand that all must be withdrawn as the basis for a peace agreement.

The statement issued by the North Vietnamese delegation to the Vietnam peace talks was signed by the Hanoi government and was its first major declaration outside the framework of the peace talks since the death of President Ho Chi Minh and put up with all the early months of the war.

The uncompromising statement showed no change had been made in the North Vietnamese bargaining position since Ho's death.

Draft of Boys, 19, Queried

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Nixon's proposal to institute a draft of 19-year-olds Jan. 1 raised questions among Defense Department manpower experts Saturday, whom it will discourage voluntary enlistments.

The armed services get nearly 800,000 volunteers a year, which form the base on which to determine the size of needed draft calls. About 60 per cent of these are "draft-oriented," the experts say, leaving about 300,000 true volunteers.

If the threat of being drafted is restricted to only 12 months, as Nixon plans, Pentagon officials say they might lose some "draft-oriented" enlistees who figure their induction is inevitable and enter the service at a time of their own choosing.

Nixon announced Friday that whether Congress acts on his draft lottery plan or not this year, he intends to create a pool of 19-year-olds as prime candidates for induction, selecting the oldest among their ranks month-by-month. Men would be exempt free on their 20th birthdays.

Under the present system, in which older men are taken first, draft vulnerability extends from age 18 to the 26th birthday.

Manpower authorities are considering these factors:

Loss of the long period of vulnerability, along with expected improvement in chances of escaping military service, almost surely will cut heavily into the number of volunteers above the age of 19.

On the other hand, under the new plan, many 19-year-olds will learn in advance with virtual certainty they are to be drafted, and volunteering at that age should sharply increase.

The experts say they cannot predict the effect on the volunteer rate with much certainty because of a lack of precedents by which to make comparisons.

Cancer Weapon Reported

NEW YORK (UPI) — BAR is a new weapon against malignant brain tumors. The Japanese scientist who has been trying it out for several years described its effectiveness Sunday at the opening session of the World Congresses of Neurological Sciences.

Dr. Keiji Sano and his associates at the University of Tokyo have used it 75 times. In patients with highly malignant tumors they have a one-year survival rate of 38 per cent and a rate of 83 per cent in patients with less malignant tumors. The two-year survival rate is 48 and 67 per cent, respectively.

"Most of these survivors could lead until the last month or are still leading a normal useful life," Sano said. "While I do not think that this is the definitive treatment, I can still say that the BAR therapy is quite effective at present."

The B in BAR stands for Bromouridine or BUdR. The A is for Antimetabolite and the R is for radiation.

BUdR is an analogue of a substance malignant brain cells must have to replicate their nucleic acid. But unlike the parent substance it sensitizes the malignant cell to the killing effects of radiation.

The antimetabolite is one of the drugs which interferes with cellular metabolism. In BAR it nudges the malignant cell into taking up BUdR in preference to making its own parent substance. Normal brain cells are not affected because normally brain cells are not replicating themselves.

But BUdR is rapidly neutralized by the liver. For that reason BAR requires a continuous infusion of BUdR and antimetabolite into the patient's blood circulation for 7 to 14 days before the radiation is applied in 30 daily doses.

Side effects were minimal in the desperately ill patients, Sano told. The nervous system, scientists from around the world. One was the loss of fingernails, and occasionally toe nails, several months after the treatment was completed. New nails grow within 4 to 6 months, he said.

The definitive treatment of malignant brain tumor is its complete removal by surgery. But that often is not possible and their treatment with chemicals or radiation remains a chemotherapy "has not yet produced satisfactory results," Sano reminded the other neurosurgeons and radiation oncologists usually isn't effective against the tumors he treated with BAR.

Dislike Grows Of British Market Entry

Electronic Device May 'Frisk' Riders

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (UPI) — Two Texas A&M University researchers said Saturday that they have developed an electronic system sensitive enough to detect any metal object that might be used as a weapon to hijack an airliner.

The researchers, project director Frank M. Ivey and Dr. Lloyd E. Fife, are testing the instrument's effectiveness in detecting non-metal weapons, such as plastic bombs. They declined to comment on the tests.

Fife, chief electronics expert at A&M's Activation analysis research Laboratory, said the electronic equipment for the detector can be bought from retail electronics dealer for about \$1,800 a unit.

The device operates on regular electric current and there is no need for a technician to operate it. Ivey said it is more advanced than similar devices he has heard about and provides instant response. Some other similar devices take up to five seconds for response.

The Ivey-Fife detector system operates on a magnetic impulse but eliminates problems caused by the earth's magnetic field. Six magnetic probes, three on each side of a frame a passenger would pass through en route to his plane, are used in the Ivey-Fife system to detect the magnetic field caused by a weapon.

The probes read into a magnetometer, which determines the direction and magnitude of the magnetic field.

Fife said any object which has a high enough magnetic field sets off an alarm and light warning system. The detection system ignores common metal objects on clothing, such as buckles and zippers.

A pair of Helmholtz coils above and below the probes cancel out the earth's magnetic field and the only magnetic field detected is the one caused by a large metal object on a passenger, Fife said.

Nixon Notes Concern Over Campus Unrest, Asks Peace

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Nixon, echoing his "bring us together" theme of the 1968 campaign, urged a group of student, political leaders and university officials Saturday that he shared their deep concern over continued campus unrest.

"We're concerned when we see on the campuses of this country the frustration, boiling up into violence and we want to find the answers with you," he said during a warm White House reception.

The President said he had no instant solutions to the problems of campus unrest.

But he urged the students not to be discouraged by the tumult and confusion, saying that over the years he had found that "usually the men who talked the loudest had the least to say."

"It's like a poker game," Nixon said. "You can be sure that whoever is talking the loudest is bluffing and those who talk softly, but firmly have the cards."

Idaho State Journal When it comes to questions of how students at Idaho State University should live, how they should conduct themselves, and how much academic freedom they should have, parents favor more control than faculty or students. So concludes a survey made last spring, results of which were printed this week in The Bengal, the ISU student newspaper. The results explain a good deal of the controversy at colleges and universities today, and why people like Gov. Don Samuelson dwell on campus issues.

It appears, then, that ISU students and their parents are agreed as to why the institution exists. The principal differences are of how students should conduct themselves while enrolled. The American university, originally founded for the education of clergymen, early took upon itself the responsibility of moral, as well as intellectual, development of the student. Parents took exception to that when they saw their sons and daughters who had been carefully watched at college at home.

WASHINGTON (NEA)— Patriotically, although Reserve Officers' Training Corps units are at Harvard University and Dartmouth College in 1970, and although its continuation is being debated at a number of other prominent universities, the ROTC at present have applied for Army units, 123 for Navy and 116 for Air Force. An increasing number of schools, however, is expected to make ROTC voluntary, continuing a recent trend.

While there are noted exceptions, ROTC units at college campuses are better fitted to a trade school, high school or intermediate school than at a college. The ROTC comes from thoughtful students who favor training on campus as well as from opponents. Often the problem is not the subject itself, but the "ABC" fashion in which military subjects are taught and the low degree of thought and background required to master the subject matter.

The history of the Stanford anti-ROTC movement has been interesting. Early last February, faculty representatives voted 25 to eight to end academic credit, starting in 1970. But later that same month, by a margin of three to two, Stanford students voted for a referendum proposition which read: "We believe ROTC has a legitimate place on campus and deserves support and credit from the University for all those parts of the program that are of genuine academic interest."

Finch Denies Medicare May Be Offered To All Americans

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Secretary Robert H. Finch of Health, Education and Welfare denied Sunday the administration was considering expanding Medicare to include all Americans, regardless of age.

He did say, however, that some form of plan was being considered to provide health insurance to everyone.

"We favor a mix of group plans, with more emphasis on the preventive side. It is not an extension of Medicare because we don't have Medicare and Medicaid under control at this point."

There had been reports the administration was considering a blanket extension of Medicare beyond the current limit to persons over 65 years old.

Finch also said in an interview (Issues and Answers — ABC) that President Nixon's decision Friday to cut back the draft calls through the rest of this year had nothing to do with attempting to diffuse campus disruptions this year.

The President's decision, he said, "was not directed toward student unrest as such. It was geared to larger issues, like Vietnam."

He said students had enough other complaints for there to be any hope that solving the draft complaint would solve only the problem of student unrest.

Asked whether there would

be a high level of student violence this fall, Finch answered, "A qualified no."

His judgment, he said, was based on indications university administrators are more sophisticated in dealing with disruptions, there has been a switch of emphasis from calling for a deescalation in Vietnam to the deescalation in Vietnam considerably, and the militant factions have become divided.

But Finch cautioned Congress against passing legislation that would force a federal presence on campus. "The last thing we want is a 'federal presence' on these campuses."

He added, however, that more campus disruptions could force repressive reaction.

Health Aide Asks Control Of Population

NEW YORK (UPI) — The nation's leading health official said Sunday population control and family planning deserved "first priority" in the Nixon administration's health programs.

Dr. Roger O. Egeberg, assistant secretary for health and scientific affairs in the Department of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW), said his main goal of improving the nation's system for delivering health care to the people could not be accomplished if the population continued its rapid rise.

"Our programs are on quick track if we do something about population," Egeberg told a news-conference at the New York Hilton after addressing the World Congress of Neurological Sciences.

Egeberg said the Nixon administration intends to appoint a deputy assistant secretary for population and hopes to establish population institutes in both HEW and the National Institutes of Health.

Egeberg said he hoped that by 1975, 5 million people who want contraceptive information and devices would be helped by the government.

'Operation Intercept' Backs Up Traffic At Mexico Border

SAN YSIDRO, Calif. (UPI)—Americans coming back across the border from Mexico had all mixed feelings of irritation and impatience Sunday as "Operation Intercept" forced them to wait hours while customs inspectors searched their cars for marijuana and drugs.

There were also differences of opinion as to whether the surveillance would be effective in cutting off the flow of contraband.

By late afternoon, cars were backed up two miles on the streets of Tijuana waiting to cross through check points. The wait was more than two hours.

William Behr, a San Diego building firm executive who said he had been crossing the border regularly for 12 years, said he thought it was physically impossible to stop the flow of narcotics.

"They can keep on searching forever," he said. "They will have to stop some time and when they do, it will start up again."

Behr said a pilot friend had told him that smugglers were flying marijuana and drugs across the border and dropping them by parachute without even landing.

Behr said that tactic would continue.

Mrs. Clara Stephens, a housewife from Santa Ana, Calif., said the search was definitely needed and that as a taxpayer she was willing to see her money spent that way.

"I am sure it will prove fruitful," she said.

Robert Jordan, a Los Angeles sheriff's officer and another

who had to wait, said "the crooks are making it hard for all of us decent people—it's worse than Los Angeles traffic."

William Braddock Fournier, a construction worker from Los Angeles, said that even though people are being inconvenienced the "whole operation should be beneficial."

"But something should be done about routing traffic to get cars through faster," he said.

Parents Are Charged In Son's Death

LORAIN, Ohio (UPI)—Lonnie Dellinger, the four-year-old boy whose body was unearthed from a shallow grave Friday, starved to death, an autopsy by assistant Loraine County coroner Dr. Charles Chesser showed.

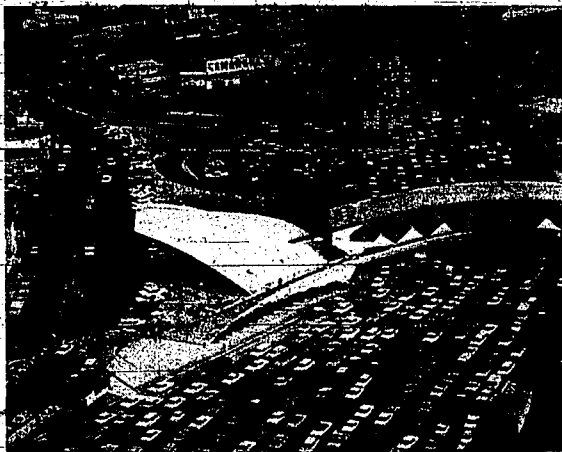
The parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Dellinger, both 23, were already serving a six-month jail sentence after pleading guilty to charges of filing a false police report and concealing a body. They were also fined \$1,000 each.

Dellinger first told police his son had disappeared while waiting in the family car outside a market Wednesday, but an extensive search failed to bring any clues to the boy's whereabouts.

Friday, however, the father broke down during a lie detector test and admitted burying the boy in a vacant lot. The parents then changed their story and said Lonnie was discovered dead in his bed Wednesday.

Lonnie weighed only 20 pounds when his body was found.

The parents pleaded innocent to charges of child neglect during their arraignment Saturday in Loraine Municipal Court and a hearing has been set for Tuesday at 10 a.m.

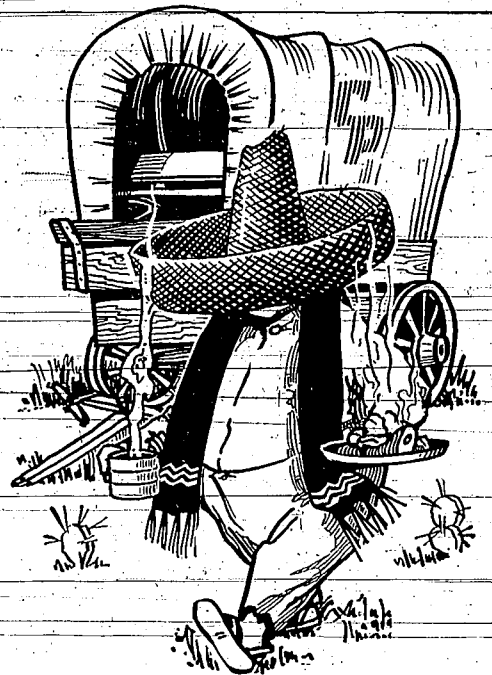
Pope Says World Afflicted By Quests For Power

Puerto Rico Store Razed By Arsonists

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico (UPI)—Fire razed a Woolworth store in a downtown shopping area early Saturday and incendiary bombs were found and disarmed in three other American-owned stores.

The incidents coincided with the celebration of an armed uprising against the Spanish regime in the town of Laredo in 1868 which is considered one of the main holidays of Puerto Rico, factions advocating independence from the United States.

Damages at the Woolworth store were estimated by the fire department to be in excess of \$1 million. The fire broke out at 11:30 p.m. Friday and firemen battled the blaze all night.

Manager Kenneth Hernandez said the store had no sprinkler system.

Incendiary devices were also discovered in a Lerner shop near the Woolworth store and in a Kresge store in another part of the city.

Another device was located in a supermarket belonging to the Pueblo Supermarket chain in Ponce, P.R.—a locally-owned supermarket chain that is controlled by resident mainlanders.

40-Kiloton Goal Met In Atom Test

LAS VEGAS, NEV. (UPI)—The Atomic Energy Commission announced that the controversial Project Rulison underground nuclear test near Grand Valley, Colo., achieved its design yield of 40 kilotons.

The AEC announcement said preliminary ground motion analysis showed the yield of the device was an equivalent to 40,000 tons of TNT.

The Rulison test was conducted Sept. 10. The AEC said preliminary examination of ground motion information recorded on seismographs indicated the shock wave intensities conformed generally to the patterns predicted prior to the detonation.

As of Sept. 19, complaints of damage to property as a result of the underground nuclear detonation totaled 172. The AEC said of that number, 23 formal claims for payment were filed with the Rulison claims office in Grand Valley.

Auto Industry Spurs Speed, Tries To Achieve Safety

—DETROIT (UPI)—The U.S. auto industry seems to be going in two directions at once—in its 1970 cars—speed and safety.

They're building more safety than ever before into the cars, and they're preaching safety. But this year they've also hit the pinnacle in boosting engine power with an accompanying wild performance image.

Chrysler Corp. tops everyone with its re-styled Plymouth Barracuda and Dodge Challenger offering engine options up to the 425 semi-head engine that turns out 425 horsepower in the street version. These are compact and intermediate cars. Both cars have speedometers that run up to 150 miles an hour.

Ford Motor Company's top Image models, the Mustang and the Torino, also intermediate and compact cars, offer engine options up to 428 cubic inches in high-performance versions.

General Motors, which officially frowns on participation in racing, boosted horsepower in its Image lines. The new Monte Carlo line in the Chevrolet division has a 350 horsepower engine in the intermediate Chevy 350-horsepower and the Nova 300-horsepower.

Pontiac also offers 330 horsepower in its little Tempest and 360 in the GTO.

Even American Motors, which used to be mild, is going wild. American boosted the horsepower of all its V-8 engines and offers 325 horsepower performance engines on its Rebel, Javelin and AMX models.

And for 1970, there's an almost explosive proliferation of shaker hoods and air scoops giving these cars the image of go with a capital G.

Chrysler-Plymouth division manager Glenn E. White called his lineup "the rapid transit system" and frankly acknowledged, as have other industry leaders, that they have their sights trained on the performance-minded youth group under 35 years of age.

At the same preview, Chrysler's chief engineer for automotive safety, Roy Heuser, defended the company's preoccupation with performance—at least for the record. And he made such a promotion movie which showed drivers and passengers in the new Chrysler products fastening both seat belts and shoulder harnesses. Power of suggestion he called it, and said people would follow it.

There also could be power of suggestion in 150 mile-an-hour speedometers, 425 horsepower engines and those image-making scoops and shaker hoods.

Colonel In 'Copter Lifts Mired Soldier

CAN GIUOC, Vietnam (UPI)—A St. Louis GI mired in chest-high Mekong-Delta mud recently was removed from the sticky situation by a colonel who used more pull than usual, the Army reported.

Pfc. Louis Mitchell, a radio-telephone operator from the 9th Infantry Division, recently became stuck in the mud while crossing a stream about 10 miles south of Saigon and all efforts to extricate him failed.

"It was just stuck there taking harassment from the other guys," Mitchell said.

Lt. Col. Gerald Carlson of Alexandria, Va., commander of the 6th Battalion, 31st Infantry, received word of the situation in his command helicopter hovering nearby.

The colonel looped a rope halter around Mitchell and the chopper slowly eased the GI out of the delta mud.

"That was fun," Mitchell said later.

Consumer prices were disclosed to have increased at an annual rate of almost 5 per cent in August. Although the rise was less than that of July, it was discouraging to those concerned about inflation.

Central bank chief McCracken, chairman of the President's Council of Economic Advisers, said business activity appeared to be slowing down in the third quarter. While this is encouraging to inflation fighters, McCracken said it also could portend a profit squeeze for industry.

Just before 1:30 p.m. the UPI marketwide indicator was up 0.21 per cent, about where it had been all day. The 1,628 issues traded included 650 advances and 528 declines.

The Dow Jones average of 30 issues closed at 329.73, it was off nearly 3 early in the day.

Q: Please give me your opinion on Borden, Inter-king's Department Stores, C-B. A-Despite discouraging market action this year, both issues have turnaround potential. King's reported all-time high second quarter results, a trend which should be maintained, aided by new store openings and improved margins from the Miracle Mart chain. Specialty stores to be opened in 1970 will feature health and beauty products. Other specialty outlets will concentrate on sporting equipment and toys.

Last year, a realignment of Borden's management resulted in a change in product emphasis, closing of marginal facilities and a step-up in new product development. June quarter 1969 sales set a record for any quarter in the company's history. Some progress in earnings from 1968's depressed \$1.60 a share is in prospect this year. But real improvement may not be seen before 1970.

Q: When I requested a prospectus from a "Fidelity Fund" firm, it was told they were not then accepting new investors but would notify me if they could prospect for a 12 per cent to 14 per cent annual growth rate in the next several years. It is good.

Stern Wheeler Delta King May Ply Sacramento Again

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (UPI) — Forty years ago a disheveled, white stern wheeler named Delta King gave new life to Vanishing Sacramento river traffic between California's capital and San Francisco.

Now, after 10 years of abandonment that saw the hulk, five-deck vessel decay to a faded, peeling hulk, the Delta King may be restored to its former glory by nine "pirates" in gray flannel suits.

The pirates, or salvors as they would rather be called, took possession of the King one dark night a few weeks ago. Under the name of "Riverboat's Com'l, Inc.," the group of executives rented a tugboat and sailed down to the river, 90 miles away via the river and a deep water channel.

There they found the Delta King, its windows shattered, its paddle wheel long gone, only a single hawser held it to an abandoned dock. Cobwebs and debris occupied the dark passageways that once echoed the footsteps and chatter of all-night cruises.

They slashed the hawser and the King made one more cruise back to Sacramento at a cost of a towline.

"It was rotting there for years, and should not be allowed to rot any longer," said Richard Marriot and other city officials broke a bottle of champagne over the King's cracked and peeling bow.

Then, in a gesture typical of the King's present condition, a federal marshal, acting under a court order obtained by Detroit, ordered the mayor of old took possession of the King.



McClure Says Forests To Boost Output

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Rep. James McClure, R-Idaho, says the Forest Service has told him that timber production in Idaho is expected to expand during the next 50 years, but because of improved technology forest industry employment may decline.

McClure said the Forest Service noted that the projected increase in timber cuts depends on an increasing national demand for timber products and competitive prices.

The Forest Service said improvements in technology may force employment down from its 1965 level of 12,355 persons in Idaho to an anticipated 8,657 persons in the year 2020.

Smoke Feud

NEW YORK (UPI)—A major tobacco firm, American Brands (formerly the American Tobacco Company) has withdrawn as a sponsor of the forthcoming Dobble Reynolds television program, after Miss Reynolds quit and rejoined the show in a clash over the inclusion of cigarette commercials.

Miss Reynolds announced she was quitting the program last week after she learned that cigarette commercials would be aired during the show's first episode.

But she later rejoined the production, of which she is co-producer, saying that "naturally I will perform my obligations."

The cigarette firm was not placed, however, and announced its withdrawal. Miss Reynolds reportedly being paid \$25,000 a week for her efforts.

Illustrator Of Bible Vetoed Chance To Study In Paris With Henri Matisse

CHICAGO (UPI)—Thirty years ago a young woman from Chicago turned down a chance to study in Paris under famed artist Henri Matisse. She had already made another commitment.

Instead of art galleries, she would put her work in subway cars, instead of striving with the Paris post-impressionists to capture color, form and light, she would illustrate the Bible.

Today the work of Jo Peterson is probably recognized more quickly by the average man than that of Matisse. Her posters with Bible verses and illustrations are seen on subways, buses and billboards by millions every day in more than 800 cities throughout the world.

The posters are produced by a nonprofit, non-denominational corporation called Best Seller Publicity. Miss Peterson, the

only full-time employee, heads a network of volunteers who operate out of a small downtown Chicago office and her modest home in the West Side neighborhood where she grew up. Funds for operations come from contributions by individuals and churches.

"The work has its own joy," she said, explaining just-completed arrangements to place 3,000 posters in New York subways.

"The crowds of the New York subway will see God's word," she said, "and they will live."

A favorite testimonial comes from a street conductor who said he decided against suicide because he received new hope from the message on one of the car cards.
