Egyptian Positions Are Hit

By United Press International Israeli war planes today struck Egyptian military positions along the Gulf of Suez and in the southern section of the Suez Canal itself in retaliation against Egyptian aggression along the canal, a military spokesman reported in Tel Aviv.

The raids coincided with a mass parachute drop by Israeli troops over the Sea of Galilee as a reminder to the Arabs of Israel's ability to strike anywhere at any time. The maneuver also was called to bolster the morale of villagers in the area attacked frequently by Arab commandos and Syrian forces in the Golan Heights.

The Israeli military spokesman did not pinpoint the targets attacked in today's air raids.

Air Force Association Plans Symposium On Outlook For Non-College-Bound Youth

"The Other 80 Per Cent" will be discussed Dec. 5 during a day-long symposium in Twin Falls sponsored by the Idaho Air Force Association.

According to Dr. Terry Smith, coordinator for the College of Southern Idaho, host institution, several well-known educational experts will appear.

Dr. Robert F. Mager, president of Robert F. Mager Associates, Los Altos Hills, Calif., already has accepted an invitation to speak at the event. Other symposium leaders have not yet been selected, Dr. Smith said, but will include representatives of the department of Health, Education and Welfare, the Department of Labor, representatives of major industries and educational leaders.

The "Other 80 Per Cent" are those non-college bound high school graduates. Training and other opportunities available to this large segment of the nation's young will be reviewed during the state-wide meeting, which will be at the CSI Fine Arts Center.

The State's first such symposium held last year at Boise, emphasized vocational education.

Jointly sponsoring the meeting with the Air Force Association are the Aerospace Education Foundation and leading Idaho educators. Besides the education authorities from throughout the nation who will appear, local industrialists, labor leaders and government and military leaders will take part in the program.

Other local leaders assisting in arrangements for the second annual symposium will be Dr. James L. Taylor, CSI president, coordinator; Harry LeMoine, president of the state Air Force Association, and Rudy Ashenbrenner, Air Force Association member.

Finch Opposes Tax-Reform Bill

WASHINGTON (UPI)—HEW Secretary Robert H. Finch, apparently at odds with administration tax policy, said in a letter released Saturday that a proposed tax reform bill could lead to the ultimate destruction of private foundations.

Finch's letter to Treasury Secretary David M. Kennedy and an answering note from Kennedy were released by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare because, according to a spokesman, Finch "doesn't want to see a vital national resource penalized."

Sales Tax Does Not Compensate For Inventory Tax Loss, Clerk Asserts

SHOSHONE—Lincoln county's share of the state sales tax does not compensate for the loss of revenue resulting from the phaseout of the inventory tax on merchandise and livestock, Mrs. Luella L. Kinsey, county clerk, reports.

The county's share of the sales tax funds' during 1968 was \$3,327.16, and while figures on the inventory tax were not available, Mrs. Kinsey noted that amount from this source is being phased out over a four-year period, with this being the third year.

County income also has decreased from utility revenue, the county official said. In 1967, \$4,171.215 was brought in from this source, but with the revaluation of utilities from 40 per cent to 20 per cent, to equalize them with real property assessment which is being raised to 20 per cent, in 1968 the amount had dropped to \$3,962,270, while this year revenue from utility taxes is \$3,811,269.

The county levy is \$2.56, divided as follows: \$1.13 for current expenses; 1 cent, postal control; 1 cent, memorials; 20 cents, indigent; 10 cents, county weed control; 88 cents, county school; 10 cents, health; 10 cents, junior college, and 15 cents, county valuation.

Special state levies are 30 cents for state brand inspection and livestock disease control, 5 cents, honey advertising, p e r

colony, and 3 cents for bee inspection.

School levies include \$3.60 for Class B School district No. 312; \$3.95 for class B school district No. 318; \$4.10 for Class B School District No. 314; \$4.15 for Class B district No. 314-12; \$3 for Class A School district No. 231 and \$4.97 for Class A, school district No. 261-J.

City levies are \$3.90 for Shoshone; \$3.70 for Richfield and \$3 for Dietrich.

Highway districts are \$1 each for Shoshone and Richfield highway districts; \$1.05 for Dietrich and \$1.06 for Kimama Highway district.

Lincoln county fair levy is 8 cents, with 15 cents for the Richfield Library District, 42 cents for Wood River Fire Protection district, 80 cents for Richfield fire district, 9 cents each for Cimona cemetery and Richfield Cemetery districts.

20-Year Pin Presented To Oakley Man

OAKLEY — Herbert Hardy, Oakley, was recently presented a 20 year service pin from the U.S. Weather Bureau. Making the presentation were Lloyd Graybill, culture coordinator, Kimberly and Norman Wolcott, field representative from the state office of the U.S. Weather Bureau.

Mr. Hardy has taken readings at Oakley every day for the last 20 years for the United States Weather Bureau without pay.

He began his service in August, 1949.

For 19 years he worked as custodian for the Oakley High School and just recently retired from that position.

The Oakley weather station is one of the oldest in the state, starting in 1893. John Adams was the first observer and continued through 1934. Conrad Fairchild served from 1934 to 1940 and David Martindale served from 1940 to 1949 when Mr. Hardy assumed the duties.

At 6 p.m. daily the readings on temperature and precipitation are taken. The data is published and used widely throughout the entire region. Monthly reports are sent to Boise and North Carolina and occasionally, he takes periodic checks on cloud formations and wind velocity.

A network of these cooperative stations is located throughout the United States with 300 in Idaho and 3,000 in the western region, which includes the eight western states.

Idaho has only four weather stations manned with Weather Bureau employees, located in Boise, Lewiston, Pocatello and Kimberly. All other stations are manned by volunteers.

J. R. Simplot Buys Boise Air Service

BOISE (UPI) — A Boise flying service, Idaho Beechcraft, has been acquired by the J. R. Simplot Company.

The announcement was made Saturday by W. Grant Kilbourne, president of the company's Minerals and Chemical division.

Kilbourne said Jack Christopherson, manager of Simplot Aviation in Pocatello, will be in charge of Boise flying operations as well as retaining his Pocatello responsibilities.

The flying service is located on the south side of the Boise Municipal Airport.

Plans for further expansion of the firm's aircraft maintenance program, which will be headed by Jim Walters.

Walters has been employed by a commercial airline company in Boise for the past two years.

House Hopes To Approve Military Bill

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House this week hopes to do in two days what took the Senate eight weeks to accomplish: pass a multibillion dollar military purchasing bill.

Up before the House Wednesday will be a \$21.3 billion version of the Senate-passed \$20 billion military procurement bill. It includes permission for start of the antiballistic missile system, purchase of the CVA cargo plane and other projects which drew eight weeks of attacks from Pentagon critics in the Senate.

But when the measure comes up Wednesday, it will be under ground rules allowing only three hours of general debate. After that will come tightly limited arguments on amendments similar to some of those that were launched, largely without success, in the Senate.

These amendments would bar deployment of the antimissile system, cut off additional purchases of the CVA and prevent construction of additional aircraft carriers. All these amendments were rejected by the Senate and they appear assured of a quick turndown by the House.

The House version of the bill, which is carried over from the Armed Services Committee, carried an extra \$1 billion for Navy shipbuilding. Committee Chairman L. Mendel Rivers pushed the unrequested additional authorization because he believes much of the U.S. fleet is obsolete.

The House bill also would write into law Defense Secretary Melvin R. Laird's promise of a 176,000-man cut in military personnel by next July 1.

14 Are Waiting In Paris To Talk With North Vietnamese On Fate Of Relatives

PARIS (UPI) — North Vietnamese officials gave no indication today whether they would meet with the 14 Americans — 13 women and a man — who have come seeking information on relatives missing or captured in Vietnam.

The latest group of visitors included the wife of a Navy captain who knows her husband is alive in a North Vietnamese prison but wants a list of all American prisoners of war from the Communists.

She is Mrs. Sybil Stockdale of San Diego, Calif., the only person among the 14 who received word following her husband's capture that he was safe but injured after battling out over North Vietnam.

Mrs. Stockdale represented the League of American Prisoners in Southeast Asia. She said she wants to tell the North Vietnamese that not all relatives can afford to make the trip to ask about missing GIs.

"It is a costly trip," she said, "and it imposes a considerable hardship, particularly on those who aren't really well enough to travel."

Officials in the U.S. delegation to the Vietnam talks gave her little chance of getting a full list of U.S. prisoners. The Communists have refused to furnish such a list repeatedly in the talks.

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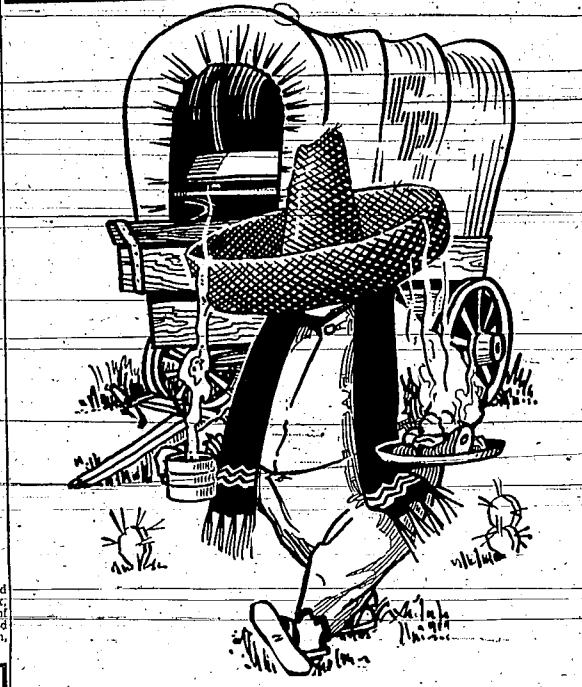
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Operation Intercept Yields 26 Arrests

Students Of U.S. Face Major Boost In College Fees

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Students at the nation's public colleges are facing major increases in tuition and fees as they return to school this fall, partly because state legislatures failed to provide adequate money for education.

Two educational associations said Saturday that major state universities and land grant colleges had raised fees an average 16.5 per cent above those of the 1968-69 school year, and regional state universities had raised their fees 14 per cent.

The two groups are the National Association of State Universities and Land Grant Colleges, which represents 113 major state institutions, and the American Association of State Colleges and Universities, which represents 261 regional institutions.

The total charges to students, including room and board, are an average of 6.6 to 7.5 per cent higher than last year.

Of the total of 465 institutions, only 22 did not raise one or more of their student charges.

Thieu Doubts U.S. Pullout Before 1971

VUNG TAU, South Vietnam (UPI)—Thieu said Saturday most American combat troops can eventually be withdrawn from the war if the United States modernizes his army. But he said complete withdrawal was not possible by the end of 1970.

"I have to make clear that we have no ambition, no pretension to replace all of the U.S. troops in 1970," Thieu told American newsmen at an impromptu news conference.

"The replacement of troops is not a one year problem. It's a very reasonable time to replace the bulk of your infantry if you provide us equipment, enough funds, and material to achieve the strengthening and modernizing of Vietnamese troops at the same rate and the same speed," Thieu said.

Thieu chatted with reporters after delivering a speech to 2,500 village and hamlet officials attending a training course at this coastal resort in which he said South Vietnam will not stop short of victory no matter what happens in Washington.

Asked about the statement, Thieu said: "If someday you (the Americans) should say, 'President Thieu, we will accept a coalition with the Communists, we abandon you, I will say, thank you, we continue to fight.'"

Thieu defined victory as "no Communist domination and no coalition with the Communists."

"I will never try to kill all Communists, or try to invade North Vietnam," Thieu said. "I am promoting national reconciliation with the Communists through free elections."
