S. Vietnamese Kill 96 Reds In U Minh Forest

SAIGON (UPI)—South Vietnamese soldiers who replaced U.S. troops in the Mekong Delta reported today they killed 96 guerrillas in the first invasion of the U Minh Forest, a Communist stronghold, in 14 months.

The offensive into the forest—known as the "Forest of Darkness"—began Oct. 17, the heaviest fighting reported since the current battle had begun Sept. 17. Six government troops were killed and 16 wounded. Troops of the South Vietnamese 7th Division swarmed into the 40-mile-long jungle on their nation's southeast coast Sunday and U.S. helicopters replaced soldiers of the U.S. 9th Infantry Division who were sent home in August under the terms of a ceasefire.

Other significant developments—

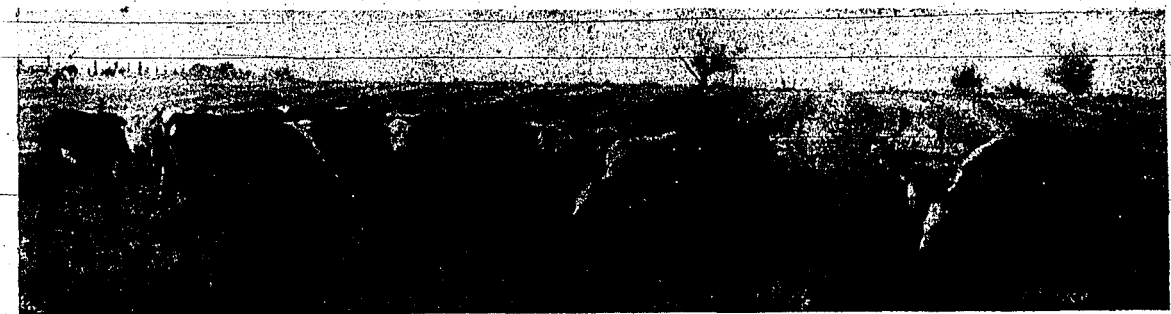
The United States shipped 10 North Vietnamese seamen home aboard a junk today. They sailed northward from coastal Cua Viet below the Demilitarized Zone. The return of the 10, captured in a typhoon

offshore in July, was aimed at bringing the release of more U.S. prisoners from North Vietnam.

A total of 785 Marine airmen began withdrawing from the war zone today and headed for Okinawa as part of President Nixon's pullout of 35,000 more men.

U.S. headquarters reported the forest 142 miles southeast of Saigon recently replaced soldiers of the U.S. 9th Infantry Division who were sent home in August under the terms of a ceasefire.

Even more GIs were leaving the war zone today—the lead elements of 785 U.S. Marine airmen slated for withdrawal by Wednesday for Okinawa. They will take 68 helicopters and planes with them.

Florida Aide Tries To Pry Loose Mafia

MIAMI (UPI)—Florida Atty. Gen. Earl Faircloth, in an attempt to pry loose Mafia "tentacles deep in our society," makes an all-out legal effort today to close 15 Miami resorts, motels and two other businesses he contends are manipulated by organized crime.

Faircloth said he would file a total of 21 suits in circuit court under a new state law designed to shut down mobster-dominated business through civil rather than criminal courts.

The lawsuits, the first of their kind in the United States, seek to remove the corporations' charters and issue injunctions against any further business operations of the persons concerned.

In addition to the more than \$40 million worth of motels involved in the litigation, the targets include the Bonfire Restaurant in North Bay

Village and a North Dade County sports information service.

Faircloth, a candidate for 1970 Democratic gubernatorial nomination, would not confirm reports that reputed underworld boss Meyer Lansky was the prime object of the crackdown.

"Of course, Mr. Lansky has been widely heralded as the financial wizard of organized crime," Faircloth said. "He is the genius at infiltrating legitimate business. If the chips fall that way, I hope they will."

The lawsuits are partly based on information collected during a legislative probe of organized crime in South Florida headed by state Sen. Robert Shriver.

Shriver, who helped draft the 1969 law cited by Faircloth, said Lansky had been subpoenaed several times to appear before the committee but "each time he left the state."

Inflation Hangover Foreseen

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Nixon's top economic strategists foresee strikes and rising unemployment next year as a painful hangover from years of an inflationary binge.

Administration officials and leaders of big business swapped predictions of the future during the semiannual meeting of the Business Council in Hot Springs, Va., last weekend. The autumn scene was bright at the mountain resort but the economic weather forecast was for storms and cold days.

Labor Secretary George P. Shultz predicted a spate of strikes. He said business is caught in a profit squeeze and labor needs big wage increases to catch up with the cost of living. Those are the conditions that usually lead to industrial warfare.

Administration economists said business activity is slowing down as Nixon's anti-inflation policy finally begins to take hold. But consumer prices, which usually follow changing conditions only after a delay, will continue to rise for a while, they said.

It could be a bleak few months, the President's advisers admit, but they say the government cannot let up now without touching off a new round of inflation.

Hearing Opens

WILKES-BARRE, Pa. (UPI)—The first formal hearing into the death of Mary J. Kopechne opened today. Dist. Atty. Edmund S. Dinis of Massachusetts is expected to call at least five witnesses, including the scuba diver who recovered her body.

The 20-year-old Washington, D. C., secretary died July 18 when the automobile of Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, in which she was riding, plunged off a bridge into a tidal pool at Chappaquiddick Island, Mass.

Four Missing Hunters Are Found Safe

Four people were reported lost over the weekend while hunting in the South Hills, where the deer season opened Saturday morning. All were found safe, however, hours after they were reported missing.

Twin Falls County Sheriff's officers said Norman Peterson reported at 2 a.m. Saturday that he was unable to locate Dennis Albers and a four-year-old companion where he had left them.

Mr. Peterson rode on a trail-cycle to get help after the panel vehicle the three were in became stuck in the mud. Mr. Peterson located the pair about 5 a.m. Saturday.

At about 11:30 p.m. Saturday W. J. Nicholson, 49, Twin Falls, was reported missing by his father. Deputies located Monday morning the man had been located.

Saturday afternoon Richard Williams reported to officers his companion, Barrel Balle, had been missing since 1:30 p.m. He was found by Mr. Williams about 5:30 p.m. All those involved were from Twin Falls.

Otherwise, officers reported it was a quiet weekend in the South Hills, with a good percentage of hunters bagging their deer and no hunters being injured.

First Offense Penalty For Drugs May Be Cut

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Nixon administration proposed today to reduce to a misdemeanor the first-offense penalty for simple possession of any illicit drug.

A spokesman for the Justice Department's Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs said that included marijuana as well as hard drugs such as heroin and cocaine.

Possession of marijuana, the most widely used of the illicit drugs in the nation, now is a felony under the law, just as it is for heroin or cocaine. Under the proposal, a person convicted of marijuana possession no longer would automatically be sent to jail. A second offense would carry a felony penalty.

Not only would the first-time penalty be reduced for marijuana possession, it no longer would be in the same drug class as the hard drugs. It would be classified as a hallucinogenic, instead.

However, the proposed new laws would crack down on professional drug sellers, calling for prison sentences of up to 40 years for a second conviction.

John E. Ingersoll, director of the Justice Department's Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs, outlined the Nixon plan to the Senate subcommittee on juvenile delinquency.

Ingersoll presented a set of three alternatives to the senators and asked them to select the plan they liked. The plans vary, mainly in the severity of sentences for professional drug traffickers.

All alternatives make possession with intent to sell a felony and possession for one's own use, regardless of the drug involved, a misdemeanor.

Ingersoll said in testimony prepared for the subcommittee.

The new laws would be in the form of amendments to Nixon's crime bill, which has already been sent to Congress.

Possession of any drug on the first offense would bring a maximum punishment of one year in jail and/or \$5,000 fine. The judge would have the option whether to send the offender to jail.

This position put an end to the often-criticized provision of current federal law which demands that a marijuana offender be jailed 5 to 20 years, and perhaps fined \$25,000.

The changes being discussed would apply only to federal law, not to state and local laws under which most drug arrests occur. In 1968 there were 162,177 state and local narcotics arrests compared with only 4,000 arrests under federal laws.

Senate Finance Unit Becomes Court Of Appeals On Tax Bill

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Senate Finance Committee has become a court of appeals on the tough tax reform bill which emerged this summer from the House of Representatives.

The Senate committee is halfway through its task of rewriting that bill and the cries of pain which came from the board rooms of the nation's businesses, banks and financial institutions are now turning into sighs of partial relief and even jubilation.

The committee is softening the bill's impact—watering down some provisions, throwing others out to the last dollar.

Under the skillful dominance of its chairman, Rep. Wilbur Mills, D-Ark., the House Ways and Means committee proposed a tax reform bill which went much farther than most people had expected in corrections of partial relief and even jubilation.

Sen. Russell B. Long, D-La., chairman of the Senate Finance Committee which now received the bill, expressed himself on this point the other day.

"The House went stronger than they would have done had they not known there was a U.S. Senate on the other side of the capital to correct the damage," he said.

Inevitably, Long's committee became a court of appeals and every senator became the focal point of skillful opposition to specific portions of the bill.

In hearings that stretched from mid-September through the first week of this month, the committee heard from several hundred witnesses, all of whom said, essentially: "I am enthusiastically for tax reform. It is long overdue. But gentlemen—"

Soviets Say Space Mission Is Beginning Of Exploration

MOSCOW (UPI)—Soviet space experts said today last week's Soyuz space mission marked the beginning of the "comprehensive exploration of outer space" that will give future cosmonauts greater responsibilities in flight.

The statement hinted at a significant change in Russian attitude toward manned flights. In the past, the Soviets have insisted it was better to launch "automatic" space stations to explore rather than risk human lives.

"The results of the group flight of the Soyuz spacecraft will make it possible to simplify considerably certain aspects of systems and place greater responsibilities upon cosmonauts," said the chief Soyuz designer—traditionally not identified by name—in a Tass statement.

"The flight of the seven men aboard Soyuz 2, 7 and 8 will be the beginning of the comprehensive exploration of outer space," said the chairman of the state commission for spacecraft launchings, also not identified.

The official said last week's experiments gave his experts "important scientific and technical information and a wealth of experimental material which will be of considerable help in solving the tasks before manned flights."

The seven Soyuz cosmonauts remained at the Balkan Space Center, trading recollections of their flight and undergoing tests and briefings. They were expected to be brought to Moscow this week's new diet drinks would be included in the flight, including the award of medals and promotions.

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M. (UPI)—The "Cosmo" table, the ruling body of the militant Allianza organization, Sunday voted unanimously to petition President Nixon to allow establishment of an independent nation consisting of New Mexico, Colorado and parts of Texas, Arizona and California.

The organization's leadership, which claims millions of acres of land in the Southwest under provisions of the Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo, called the area for the proposed independent nation, "the minimal fair area" which the Indo-Hispano people of the American Southwest are entitled to.

Nobel Peace Prize Goes To Labor Group

OSLO (UPI)—The International Labor Organization (ILO) won the 1969 Nobel Peace Prize today.

As usual the Nobel Committee had no doubts as for its decision and made it clear there will be no comments. The short announcement said only that the prize was going to the organization which celebrates its 50th anniversary this year.

The peace prize is worth \$75,000 this year.

A representative of the ILO will receive the prize from Mrs. Anso Liones, Swedish member of Parliament and chairman of the Nobel Committee, at a Dec. 10 ceremony at the University of Oslo.

Dec. 10 is the anniversary of the Swedish inventor Alfred Nobel, who invented dynamite and left a foundation for awards.

Manufacturers Plan Sugar Substitutes

American manufacturers are busy unveiling plans for new saccharin base and other sugar substitutes to replace cyclamates in foods and beverages.

Some of the nations announced plans to ban the use of cyclamate in low calorie items.

Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW) Robert Finch said today that the cyclamates in Washington Saturday. Since then, Denmark and Sweden have placed similar bans on the sugar substitutes.

The restrictions in the Scandinavian countries cited the HEW action had come about through joint meetings of health authorities and manufacturers.

The Finnish Food Commission in Helsinki called a meeting to discuss similar action today, and Great Britain has asked for more HEW data on cyclamates.

Finch's Saturday statement noted cyclamates may serve as a catalyst for cancer growth in test animals. He stressed no immediate danger existed but ordered all food and drink containing the chemical off store shelves by Jan. 1, 1970.

In New York, one manufacturer of a diet beverage said his firm's new diet drinks would be labeled: "Sugar added—no cyclamates."

Donald Kendall, president of PepsiCo, Inc., said in view of "unsettling news reports," his company felt it could not "in good conscience" offer its customers any products about which even the remotest doubt exists.

While Coca-Cola Co., Seven-Up, Royal Crown and other manufacturers have planned

saccharin to take away the bitter taste.

Foodways Inc. announced Sunday it had received Food and Drug Administration approval for a new artificial sweetener. The New York firm said its new "weight watchers sugar substitute" was "free of both cyclamates and bitter aftertaste."

On the financial side, Abbott Laboratories, America's largest cyclamate manufacturer, said its shareholders will probably lose seven cents a share on the ban.

Legislative Committee Will Seek Creation Of Resource Panel To Manage State Land

BOISE (UPI) — A legislative committee decided Saturday to work for creation of a Department of Natural Resources to manage state lands now under the control of the State Land Board.

At the same time, the Committee on State Lands tried to decide what to do with the state endowment lands which, over the years, have been transferred to the state parks system and are bringing no income to the school endowment fund.

The problem the legislators saw was that, under state law, the state land must be put up for auction sale to the highest bidder. Even if the legislature appropriated money to the state parks system to buy park lands from the State Land Board, there was no guarantee the parks would end up belonging to the state.

Only one committee member voted against the motion to recommend that the next session of the legislature present a constitutional amendment which would transfer the State Land Board of its responsibility with the Department of Natural Resources.

Sen. David Bivens, R-Payette, said after listening to comments at the hearings on the proposed revised constitution he felt a constitutional amendment was the wrong way to go.

Rep. George F. Brocke, D-Kendrick, asked what the state could do to prevent "some joker from California" from bidding on the land.

Forgiving Republicans See Acheson As 'Statesman' After 19 Years Of Exile

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Dean Acheson should be astonished. He is now called a "70-year-old statesman" by the same Republican party that viewed him 19 years ago as a scoundrel unfit for the job he then held as secretary of state under President Harry S. Truman.

Acheson was given the statesman label in last week's issue of "Monday," a weekly publication which goes out from the Republican National Headquarters full of favorable comments about the Nixon administration.

at Truman himself, Acheson was a favorite GOP target. They blamed him for policies putting China in the Communist world and inviting the war in Korea. And they had benefited in the 1950 elections from the assault led by Sen. Joseph McCarthy of Wisconsin, who regarded the State Department as a shelter for Communists in government.

House Republicans adopted a resolution asserting that Congress and the American people had lost confidence in Acheson

and that he could not regain it. They said they insisted that he be replaced and that there be a "thorough housecleaning" in the State Department.

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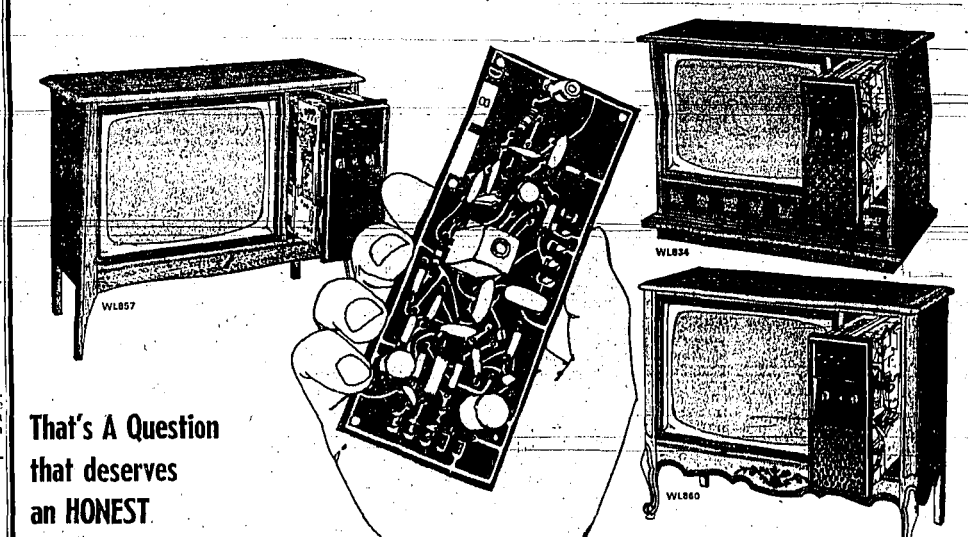

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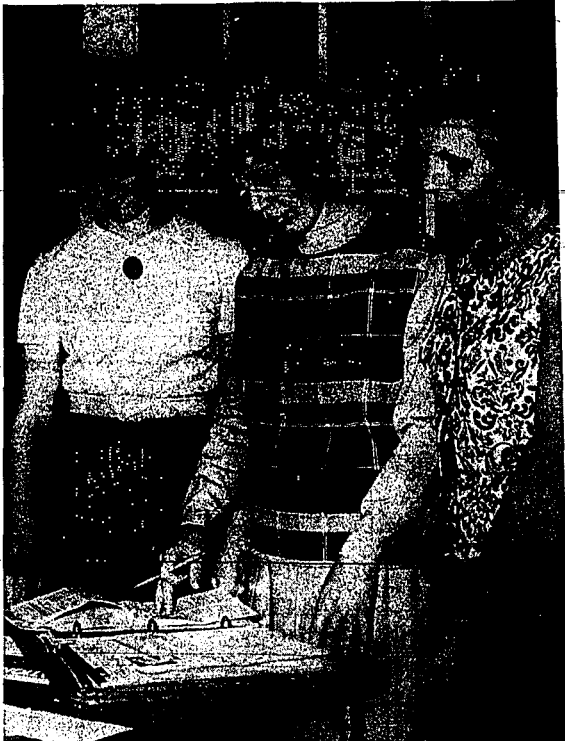

53 Condors Are Sighted In Survey

BAKERSFIELD, Calif. (UPI)—Official bird watchers sighted a record number of giant condors, North America's largest land bird, during the fifth annual survey of the nearly extinct species.

Despite the record 53 sightings, biologists agreed the count does not indicate any significant change in the dwindling condor population.

Last year, bird watchers counted 52 condors, compared with 48 in 1967 and 51 the year before.

Frank Hubbard of the state Department of Fish and Game said the count probably does not represent the total condor population in the rugged mountains rimming the southern San Joaquin Valley—last sanctuary for the giant bird.

Hubbard said the largest number of birds was found in Southern Kern County. There were other sightings in Ventura, Santa Barbara and Los Angeles Counties.

At the time of the 1849 gold rush, thousands of condors roamed the skies from the Columbia River in Washington to Baja California, but encroaching civilization has nearly killed off the species.

Hubbard said the annual survey is conducted to help in developing programs for preservation of the condors.

Goldwater Asks Ceremony To Counter Anti-War Rallies

LONG BEACH, Calif. (UPI)—Sen. Barry M. Goldwater, R-Ariz., called Saturday for special Veterans Day observances Nov. 11 to counter antiwar demonstrations and demand support of "our fighting men in Vietnam."

Goldwater did not call for demonstrations such as those held by war protesters last Wednesday. But he urged the public to "make sure that on this important, historic and patriotic date the men in Vietnam know how the majority of responsible Americans feel."

"I should like our fighting men in Vietnam to understand that they have every single reason to be proud of what they are doing and to understand that the vast majority of 200 million people support them and are proud of them and wish good fortune," Goldwater said.

3 Sisters Die Awful Death In Canal

RIVERSIDE, Calif. (UPI)—Three young sisters and their dates died in a "horrible death" by slow drowning this weekend when their auto flipped upside down into a shallow canal, trapping the doors closed as the water leaked in.

The two-door hardtop sedan, found Saturday morning, was wedged so tightly in the bevel-shaped concrete ditch that the doors could not be opened. It was in 47 inches of water.

"They must have died a horrible death," said Sgt. Fred Taylor of the Riverside Police Department. "None of them was hurt badly in the fall into the canal."

"They were probably disoriented in the dark with the car upside down and the water coming in. I think they may have tried to swim down toward the top of the car."

Five bodies were found in the car. The sixth, that of John Rumble, 19, of Canton, Ohio, believed the driver, was found 100 feet downstream where his body had drifted through the windshield.

Funeral services will be held Saturday in Wheatland, Wyo., for the three sisters—Rose Ann, 20; Mary Margaret, 19; and Cathy, 17. The girls' parents live on a ranch near Wheatland and have been staying with their daughters in nearby Rubidoux each winter.

The two other men were Richard Somanore, 19, Renton, Wash., and Donald Stolarick, 29, Chicago.

The men were all airman stationed at nearby March Air Force Base.

Bishops End Work On Suggestions

VATICAN CITY (UPI)—The World Synod of Bishops, engaged in an elaborate language game, today completed work on final recommendations to be considered by the pope.

The 148 delegates to the synod met for the third time in the small discussion groups after a one-day recess. The full synod is expected to meet in Rome next week.

Among the topics under discussion was whether the pope should consult bishops before making crucial decisions on such issues as birth control and whether the curia should let national bishops conferences decide their own stands on priestly celibacy and similar subjects.

Synod sources said some liberal bishops want these matters decided within each country, depending on the particular conditions of the country concerned, rather than have Rome lay down a uniform rule for the whole Roman Catholic Church.

According to the report, many officials, including U.S. Ambassador to Saigon Ellsworth Bunker, believe the South Vietnamese army can control a large area of the country and this had led to State Department interest in a "de facto reparation" concept.

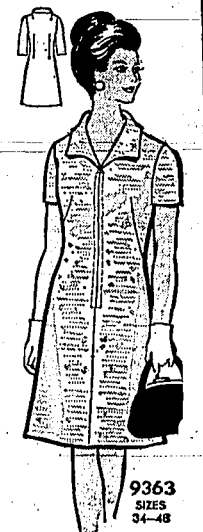

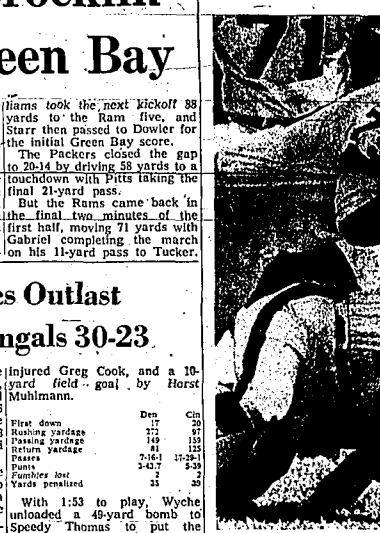

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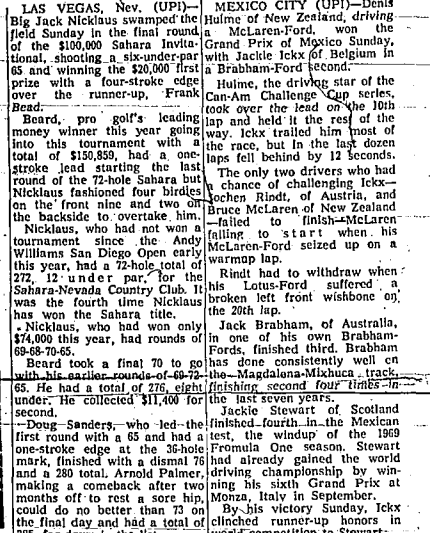
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Denis Hulme Cops Mexican Grand Prix

DALLAS (UPI)—Craig Morton threw five first-half touchdowns passes, two of them before the Philadelphia Eagles even touched the ball, and the Dallas Cowboys rolled to their fifth National Football League victory Sunday 49-14.

Morton, a doubtful starter because of a sore shoulder, tied club records with 10 consecutive completions and the five TDs as he hit Lance Rentzel for scoring tosses of 8, 16 and 15 yards. Bobby Hayes with 67-yard bomb and tight end Pettis Norman with a 35-yarder. Tackle Bob Lilly got the other

Dallas first half touchdown when he scooped up a Norm Sneed fumble and raced nine yards with L. Dan Reeves getting the final one with 1:56 left in the game from one yard out.

Meanwhile, the Dallas defense was just as spectacular, limiting the Eagles to just 23 yards rushing and 132 yards passing in the first half. Half of the aerial yards came on a 65-yard Sneed-to-Harold Jackson pass for Philadelphia's only yardage until Bill Bradley ran a back 55 yards.

Morton, edged on by a near-capacity crowd of 71,509, came back briefly in the second half and tried to break the five-touchdown streak shared by Don Meredith and Eddie LeBaron. But he saw two long bombs to Hayes graze the receiver's finger tips and he retired in favor of Roger Staubach.

Morton, who has yet to suffer an interception, completed 13 of 19 for 247 yards and three touchdowns before he was ejected for a four-game total of 50 of 71 for 869 yards and 10 touchdowns—a 70.4 completion percentage.

Dallas' first two touchdowns came before any eagle ever laid a hand on the ball.

The Cowboys drove 80 yards, not counting 20 yards in penalties, and with Morton driving five out of six passes for 79 yards, for their first touchdown.

It was 21-0 less than a minute later when George Andrie shook Sneed from the ball on third down and Lilly picked it up and ambled untouched into the end zone for the third touchdown of his pro career.

From there on, it was just a question of how much with Morton repeatedly finding his receivers we open amongst a demoralized Eagles' secondary.

The play that opened the scoring for the Chiefs originated at their Seven. Livingston fired a strike to Otis Taylor who was behind defensive tackle Tom Beter at the 32. Taylor, however, couldn't outrun Beter. When Beter caught him at the Miami 14, Robert Holmes cleared behind Taylor and took a lateral. Holmes scored easily.

The Chiefs scored again in the second quarter after Jim Kearney intercepted a Griese pass and returned it to the Chiefs' 33. Livingston completed 19 and 22-yard passes in the drive and Mike Garrett scored on a squirming, twisting run from the nine.

Jan Stenerud kicked a 44-yard field goal just before halftime.

Stenerud got his chance after Livingston was roughed up by tackle John Richardson. The resulting 65-yard return moved the ball to Miami's 37.

Karl Kromer's field goal came mid-way through the third quarter after Miami stalled at the Chiefs' 30. His kick covered 37 yards.

Miami moved within striking distance on an 11-play, 73-yard drive in the last quarter. Griese hit four of five passes in the thrust and Morris bolted over from the one on a sweep.

Livingston, a second year pro from Southern Methodist, passed for 298 yards, but 242 came in the first half. Griese hit 21 of 45 for 153 yards.

The 23-year-old Knudson shot a final-round 72 to finish the tournament with a 13-under-par 279 and two strokes ahead of Australians Peter Thomson and Bob Stanley who led for the first two rounds but fell away to finish with a 72.

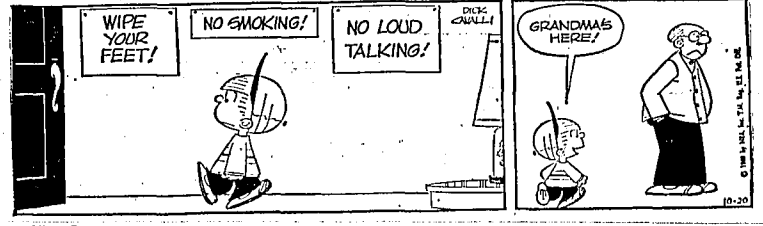
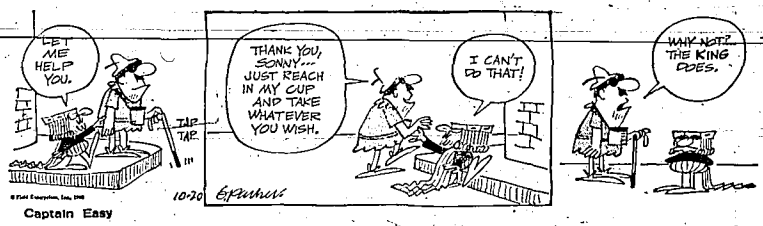

Agnew Takes Stab At Protesters

NEW ORLEANS (UPI)—Vice President Spiro T. Agnew, delivering the harshest administration denunciation of last week's Vietnam Moratorium, Sunday night said the demonstrations were carried out by "a spirit of national masochism and encouraged by an effete corps of impudent snobs."

Speaking at a \$100-a-plate state Republican fund-raising dinner, Agnew said, "If the Moratorium had any use whatever, it served as an emotional purgative for those who feel the need to cleanse themselves of their lack of ability to offer a constructive solution to the problem."

Agnew was to meet today with state officials and representatives of low-lying parishes who are seeking federal funds for hurricane protection. Later today, the vice president and his wife are scheduled to travel to Mississippi.

President Nixon has not commented publicly on the Moratorium, though supporters have been critical of it. At a Sept. 28 news conference, the President said "under no circumstance will I be affected whatever by it."

In his hard-hitting speech Sunday Agnew charged "hard-core dissidents and professional anarchists" were planning a "wilder more violent" demonstration Nov. 15.

Australian Aide Says Mining And Mineral Industry Can Do Much To End Poverty

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—The mining and mineral industry can do more to alleviate poverty and hunger and achieve peace than any other force in the world, an Australian official said today.

Charles W. Court, minister for industrial development and the northwest, Perth, western Australia, spoke at the 1969 convention of the American Mining Congress.

To back up his claim for the vital achievements possible by exploiting natural resources, Court cited his own experience in a development program "in one of the more challenging areas of the world."

"In a few short years my home state has been projected from stagnation to the fastest growing state in Australia," he said.

"We are now experiencing unprecedented expansion in every sector of the economy — farming, mining, manufacture, commerce, finance — with personal buying power growing at a rapid rate."

"This is no boast, but a simple illustration of what can be achieved by a Cinderella

state — or country — that decides to convert its dormant natural resources into something real and lively."

Court pointed out that the problem of containing a world population that will double in 30 years and raising living standards to an acceptable level presents a challenge to the resourcefulness and knowledge of man.

"I feel impelled, therefore, to tell the world — and developing nations in particular, if they really are interested in banishing poverty — what can be achieved through the generation of economic growth," he said.

"The revolution of rising expectations has brought with it an acute awareness of what on the surface appears to be an uneven distribution of wealth among nations.

"But, the creator must have been a great believer in decentralized economic opportunity.

"Why else would the world's mineral wealth and agricultural potential have been spread so far and wide and in such inaccessible places for all to develop if they had the will and the way?"

Given the opportunity, he told the mining congress members, that industry "can do more to alleviate world poverty, hunger and human misery, more to close the widening gap between advanced and undeveloped nations and more to understanding than any other single force in the world."

The Kobyli is the favorite place of the Onassis family when in Nidri, located on Lefkas Island across the bay from Skorpios, where the Onassis wedding took place on a rainy Sunday one year ago.

"Onassis wanted to turn this village into a paradise," said Komintas, an ex-captain. "But we were stupid and opposed his proposals. Now we are becoming wise."

Ambush Set For Four GIs

SEOUL (UPI)—American military spokesmen said Sunday the four U.S. GIs slain Saturday along the western sector of the Korean truce front were killed by North Koreans from preplanned ambush positions.

The four were shot in the head after receiving hand grenades and small arms fire from an ambush position on both sides of the road leading from a U.S. outpost inside the Demilitarized Zone to their unit south of the border with M.D.

The Army identified the victims as S.Sgt. James R. Grainger of Wooster, Ohio; Pfc. Charles E. Taylor Jr. of Reedport, Ore.; Spec 4 Jack L. Morris of Hobbs, Iowa; and Pfc. William E. Grimes of Salinas, Calif.

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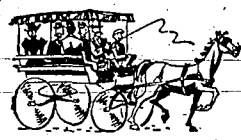

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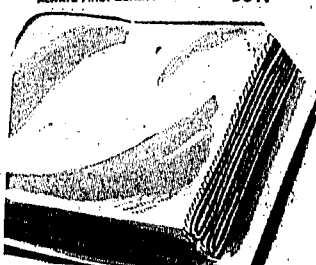

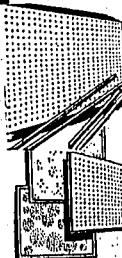
