Cease-Fire Brings End To Lebanon Fighting

Charges Filed On Hijacker

ROME (UPI)—Rome's assistant prosecutor said today he has filed five charges against hijacker Raffaele Minichiello in Italy's legal tug-of-war with the United States over who will try the young hijacker.

Massing Carli's legal maneuvers after a two-hour meeting with the 20-year-old, Naples-born man Sunday stiffened Italy's stand against turning him over to the United States.

Carli said he would interrogate Minichiello again this afternoon, a meeting that could produce even more charges against the Marine who staged history's longest air hijacking. He is wanted in the United States on charges of kidnapping and air piracy. Maximum penalty on conviction of the piracy charge is death.

Carli said the charges against him in Italy are kidnapping, private violence, bringing weapons of war into Italy, possessing them illegally and carrying them illegally.

American Embassy officials said they were in "very, very close" touch with the Italian government on the matter but refused to comment further on their attempts to get Rome's permission to ship him home for trial.

Minichiello was captured Saturday, 24 hours after he began an air piracy adventure that began in California, flew to Denver to New York City, Bangor, Maine, to Shannon, Ireland, and finally to Rome.

"I haven't done anything," protested the Marine during the interrogation session in his top-security cell in Rome's Queen of Heaven Prison. Authorities there have taken away his shoelaces and belt to prevent a suicide attempt.

Prison sources described Minichiello in good spirits and said he was to undergo psychiatric tests during the week. He was allowed no visitors, not even his father, 80, who drove up from Naples.

"I hope they will give him all the care necessary to make him right in the head again," said Luigi Minichiello. He had burst into tears when they told him he could not see his son.

Mediators Work On New Peace

A cease-fire today brought an end to the fighting in Lebanon between army units and Arab guerrillas, and peace negotiators in Cairo said they were confident of reaching a permanent settlement. Israel bombed three guerrilla bases in Jordan in an implied warning to the Arab world.

Only one incident marred the cease-fire: An explosion at 12:30 a.m., one half hour after the cease-fire went into effect, blew up the pipeline of the American-owned Trans-Arabian Pipeline Co. in Lebanon. Repairs were already underway.

Israel, which is having increasing difficulties with guerrilla raids from neighboring Arab countries, bombed one guerrilla base in the Beisan Valley just below the Sea of Galilee, and two others in the Arava Desert sector south of the Dead Sea.

Success of the guerrilla raids apparently has emboldened Arabs living in Israeli occupied areas to cooperate with the raiders and Israel was reported planning to tighten its control over these areas. Israel has blown up a number of Arab houses as a punishment for suspected collaborators. The caretaker cabinet met over the weekend to consider this new crisis.

A military spokesman in Amman said six Israeli planes were involved and that they used rockets, napalm and machinegun fire. He reported no casualties.

Israel has not bombed guerrilla bases in Lebanon in weeks but fear of such reprisals apparently led the Lebanese government to crack down on the guerrillas two weeks ago.

Clashes with the guerrillas brought Lebanon to the brink of civil war and threatened intervention by Iraq and Syria.

The Cairo peace talks were between Gen. Emile Bustani, the commander of the Lebanese army which fought the guerrillas, and guerrilla leader Yassir Arafat, who seeks to bring Lebanon totally into the war against Israel.

The settlement apparently centered around a previous agreement which was never implemented. That called for "coordination" of guerrilla attacks with the Lebanese government, that is prior notice of raids against Israel.

The Israelis said a soldier was wounded Sunday in the Jordan Valley by an exploded mine, apparently set by Arab guerrillas.

Source said the restriction of movement would be imposed on Arabs because individual punishment has failed to curtail Arab cooperation with guerrilla operations in occupied territory.

Burley Slaying Probed

BURLEY — Burley city police are investigating a shooting incident in a downtown bar early Sunday in which a 28-year-old Heyburn man was killed.

Leo Hood was shot in the East Side Bar on Main Street East, Burley, and officers were called at 12:40 a.m. He was taken to Cassia Memorial Hospital where he died about 2 a.m.

Bruce Young, Cassia County coroner, was called to the hospital. An autopsy was performed Sunday by Dr. Robert Mayer, Twin Falls. The autopsy report shows Mr. Hood was fatally injured from one shot which entered the lower left side of his chest, piercing several vital organs. The report also shows that the bullet was from a small caliber weapon.

City police still are investigating the incident and several people have been questioned, but no arrests have been made.

Union Sets Talks With GE Officials

NEW YORK (UPI)—The 22,000-member United Electrical Workers Union (UE) planned to talk with General Electric Co. officials today on reopening negotiations later this week to end the nationwide strike in its second week.

Since expiration of GE's national contract with 13 unions, nearly 147,000 employees at plants in 33 states have been off the job. The unions called a walkout midnight Oct. 26 when negotiations failed to agree on a new contract.

The UE, the second-largest GE union, last met with company officials Wednesday but no progress was reported. The unions have demanded wage increases of 30 cents an hour over a 30-month period, plus additional money for highly-skilled workers and a cost-of-living clause.

The company offered a 20-cent pay increase for the first year of a three-year contract, with 5 to 25 cents additional for the skilled and a union option to reopen wage negotiations in the second and third year.

Interest Rising In T.F. Race, Vote May Be Heavy

Election of three new Twin Falls City Council members Tuesday has sparked some last minute election interest. City Clerk Constance Leiser said, with 528 persons registering prior to the Saturday night closing of books.

She said a total of 69 already have cast absentee ballots in the election.

With new registration and the elimination of 25 persons known to have died or moved from the

city, there are a total of 5,184 names on the city's registration books.

Mrs. Leiser said there could be a heavy turnout at the polls Tuesday with interest increasing.

Polls will open in 10, rather than the previous five, precincts, and voting will continue from noon until 8 p.m.

Seeking the three vacancies are a four-man Citizens Committee ticket, John Christoffer

sen, Earl Faulkner, Tom Nelson and Winston Jones, and three independent candidates W. G. (Bill) Crippen, Lloyd Cox and Paul Ostyn.

The election will result in a new mayor for Twin Falls, to be selected when the three new councilmen take office Jan. 1. Mayor Eugene Smith is one of the three whose terms expire. He and the two other council members, John Angertbauer and Robert Warberg, are not seeking reelection.

Suit Expected

CHICAGO (UPI)—California attorney Charles R. Garry was expected to file a suit Tuesday asking that Black Panther Bobby Seale, "a kind, lovable human being," not be shackled and gagged.

Seale has insisted that Garry, of San Francisco, is his attorney in the trial of eight men charged with conspiring to incite riots at the 1968 Democratic National Convention. The trial resumes today. Seale demanded he be allowed to cross-examine witnesses, since Garry is recuperating from a gall bladder operation.

Civil Rights Division To Be Beefed Up

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Justice Department will strengthen its Civil Rights Division by borrowing lawyers from other divisions if necessary to gain compliance with the Supreme Court's order to end "at once" segregated dual school systems in the south.

"We assume that now that the Supreme Court has spoken that local school boards will comply with it," Attorney General John A. Mitchell said Sunday. "If they do not, obviously the Justice Department will be obligated to take action."

Nixon To Ask For Time And Tolerance

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Nixon goes before the nation tonight in a major effort to unite the vast middle ground of American public opinion behind his efforts to end the Vietnam war.

The plea for time and tolerance, coming two weeks after one antiwar demonstration and 10 days before a second one, was expected to be an attempt to face the fears and frustrations of those Americans who want an honorable end to a war which has killed 39,000 American soldiers in six years.

There were no indications the 9:30 p.m. EST address, to be carried nationwide on radio and television, would include a dramatically accelerated troop pullout or other surprising new developments.

Nixon worked on the speech during a "foggy," rain-chilled weekend in the Maryland mountains at Camp David. He remained at the secluded retreat overnight, planning to return to the White House about midday.

Details of the speech were kept secret and no specifics had leaked out. But the central problem facing the President appeared to be how to convince responsible critics he is disengaging from the war as fast as possible, without making the Communists think they can sit back and win the war by default.

In some ways the President put himself in a corner by announcing several weeks ago that he would make the speech. The days in the interim have provided time for a buildup of speculation that some dramatic development, perhaps even a one-sided cease-fire, was forthcoming.

Senate Turns To Voting On Fund Matters

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Senate this week turns to voting on money matters to keep the government running—something it is already months behind time doing.

Although the federal business year began more than four months ago, Congress has enacted only two of the 13 regular money bills needed to finance the federal government. Government spending has been going on at the same rate as the previous fiscal year on the basis of temporary resolutions granting such permission.

President Nixon warned last week budget planning for next year will be difficult unless some action is taken. The Senate this week takes up an appropriations bill covering the activities of the State, Justice and Commerce departments.

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Prefer Blondes

LONDON (UPI)—According to a survey published today, young British gentlemen still put blondes, but 72 per cent of them look at a girl's legs first.

The survey, titled "Young Men and Their Motives," conducted by a London public relations firm, polled 200 bachelors between 18 and 26.

The results: Nearly 75 per cent indicated a decided preference for blondes, with brunettes running a distant second and redheads third.

REVIEW ASKED

BALTIMORE (UPI)—The chairman of the U.S. Senate Armed Services Committee, John Stennis, Sunday called for a review of America's major foreign alliances in a Baltimore speech that was interrupted more than 20 times by obscenities and epithets shouted from the audience.

Stennis said the review should include the NATO alliance, the European Community, the Southeast Asia Treaty Organization, and the Organization for Economic Co-operation and Development.

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Leaders Asked To Cut Appearances

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The National Commission on the Causes and Prevention of Violence has recommended that presidential and other political leaders cut back appearances at mass public meetings in an effort to reduce the danger of assassination.

The commission, in a 580-page report on assassination and political violence in the United States released Sunday, said domestic turbulence is so great that new steps should be taken to ensure the safety of political candidates and civil rights leaders.

One of the steps, the violence panel said, would be to rely increasingly on television to reach mass audiences. It urged enough free time be made available toward the end of presidential election campaigns to change the present system of intensive personal appearances.

Dr. Milton Eisenhower, chairman of the commission, said the value of public appearances may be overrated anyway.

Allies Forced To Leave 3 Outposts

SAIGON (UPI)—South Vietnamese artillery batteries have forced Allied troops to abandon three U.S. outposts along the Cambodian frontier, military spokesmen said today.

It was the first reported use of conventional artillery by the Viet Cong or North Vietnamese in four months. U.S. military sources said some of the salvos came from neighboring Cambodia.

U.S. and South Vietnamese troops pulled out of fire bases Kate, Annie and Susan late Sunday and early Monday, taking or destroying their own gains and fleeing to the Green Beret camp at nearby Bu Prang.

Headquarters said Bu Prang, 110 miles northeast of Saigon and within range of Cambodia, itself was under shelling attack from the 7,000-man North Vietnamese buildup along the border.

Four U.S. helicopters were shot down Sunday by guerrilla ground gunners who used the heavy cover of the jungle to move around almost at will.

California Woman Quizzed About Another Missing Child

BAKERSFIELD, CALIF. (UPI)—A woman charged with abandoning her 5-year-old daughter on the center divider of a freeway has refused to answer questions in connection with the disappearance of her second child, believed missing eight months.

Sheriff's deputies from Los Angeles attempted to question Betty Louise Fouquet, 26, and her common-law husband, Ronald Fouquet, 31, Sunday about the disappearance of Jeffrey Lansdown, 8, the abandoned girl's brother.

Officers dug up the backyard of the Fouquet home in the Bell Gardens section of Los Angeles Saturday night. They found nothing.

The Fouquets were arrested on child abandonment charges after Jody "Smith" was picked up by officers on California 5 between here and Los Angeles. She had been told to hold onto the fence until someone helped and coached to say her name was "Smith," police said.

Billy Joe Lansdown, 24, a ball each.

Lansdown said he had custody of one of the children, Decca, who was born after they parted. Another child, Timothy, 7, was with the Fouquets when they were arrested.

Lansdown said Jeffrey also had been in the custody of his mother and stepfather. A neighbor of the Fouquets in Bell Gardens said she saw the other children but never saw Jeffrey in the eight months she lived next door to them.

The Fouquets also have two children of their own, Rhonda, 5, and Jason, 6 months. The children are being cared for in juvenile homes, pending a hearing in the case Nov. 16.

The Fouquets are being held in jail here in lieu of \$12,500 bail each.

Contests Across Valley Lure Record Vote

Record voter turnout is expected in most Magic Valley cities as several council and mayor positions are up for grabs during Tuesday's elections.

Voting polls throughout the valley will be open from noon until 8 p.m.

A three-way race for mayor at Ketchum may spark a large voter turnout. A total of 814 persons has registered for Tuesday's election as compared to 251 people voting in the 1967 election. Mayor Ted Werry is opposed in his bid for re-election

by Ben Jewell, current councilman, and Kenneth S. Richey, former mayor and councilman. At Halley, 438 have registered as compared to 182 two years ago. Here seven people including one woman, are vying for the two Ketchum city council posts; Mrs. Ardis Allen is incumbent; Vern McClellan, former councilman; Vaughn Murphy, building contractor; Gerald Siddle, businessman; Phil Puchner, consulting engineer; and Jack Simpson.

At Star Valley, 40 have registered, 135 Paul residents have

registered, 19 more than the 1967 election; 334 have registered at Heyburn, compared to 313 two years ago, and 32 have registered at Accalia.

A light turnout is expected in Fairfield's election as there is no contest this time for the four-year term of city councilmen. Seeking these two posts are Wesley Fields and William F. Stewart.

In Cassia County, about 2,300 Burley residents are expected to vote Tuesday for three councilmen. Eight candidates are seeking the three posts. They include

Jim Benson, Y. Y. Driskell and Sylvan Burgi, incumbents, and Marvin Lewis, Jim Roper, Bill McGill, Ted Smith and Charles Krumm.

In the mayor race, Joe Peters is opposed in his bid for reelection by Mack Crouch and Garis Robertson.

High pressure which has dominated the Northern Intermountain Region during the past few days is being weakened somewhat today as a weak Pacific weather disturbance moves eastward across Western Canada. A trailing front from this disturbance will move across Southern Idaho today and tonight but no precipitation is expected. The main effect of the front will be some increase in cloudiness at times today and lower temperatures on Tuesday. Otherwise generally fair weather will continue throughout Southern Idaho and East-Central Oregon through Tuesday but there may again be an increase in cloudiness on Wednesday. High temperatures today will be mostly in the 50s and the 60s lowering on Tuesday to the upper 40s to the low 80s. Low readings tonight will range from the 20s and the low 30s in Southern Idaho to mostly in the 50s in the Lower Malheur and Southwestern Idaho valleys. 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Tax Reform Would Trim Withholding

WASHINGTON (UPI) — If the Senate goes along with the work of its Finance Committee, the amount of taxes withheld from your paycheck will fall in January, but again next June, fall again on Jan. 1, 1971 and fall a fourth time on Jan. 1, 1972.

And if you are poor, or single or if you take the standard deduction rather than itemize your expenses in filling out your tax returns, you can expect additional tax cuts.

Together these cuts add up to the second largest tax cut in American history, overshadowed only by the \$11 billion tax cut approved by Congress in 1964 to boost a sagging economy.

They are carried in the Tax Reform Bill, which the Finance Committee, after two months work, approved Friday and sent to the Senate floor for action.

Ultimate approval is considered a certainty, perhaps before the year is out, although that is far less certain.

In approving the bill, granting tax cuts of \$1.5 billion and raising taxes for the well-to-do and for corporations by \$8.49 billion, the committee watered down both the tax reforms and the tax cuts the House had approved. It voted to delay \$1 billion worth of the tax cuts until 1972 rather than put them into effect in 1971.

Nonetheless, if the bill becomes law, the 10 per cent income tax surtax will drop to 5 per cent on Jan. 1 and expire on June 30, accounting for two increases in takehome pay next year.

People at or near the poverty level of \$3,500 a year will start sharing in a \$625 million tax cut which will rise to a \$2.145 billion cut on Jan. 1, 1971 and a \$2.452 billion cut on Jan. 1, 1972. Five million poor families will be removed from the tax rolls and 7 million will get a special tax cut.

Taxpayers who use the standard deduction for expenses will be able to deduct 13 per cent of their taxable income to a \$1,400 maximum in 1970; 14 per cent with a \$1,700 maximum in 1971; and 15 per cent with a \$2,000 maximum in 1972 and subsequent years. The standard deduction is now 10 per cent with a \$1,000 maximum.

Every taxpayer's income taxes will fall at least 5 per cent, with three-quarters of the cut coming in 1971 and the remaining quarter in 1972. For some middle-income taxpayers — a family of four with an income of \$5,000, for example — the cut amounts to 31 per cent.

Unmarried people — single, widowed or divorced — who now sometimes pay taxes as much as 40.9 per cent higher than those paid by married couples with the same amount of income, will share in a \$445 million tax cut under which no single taxpayer's taxes will be more than 20 per cent higher than those paid by married people. For single people with dependents, the differential will be no more than 10 per cent.

Instructors In Driving Take Course

BOISE (UPI) A group of 20 Idaho highway school driver education training instructors will become certified instructors of the National Safety Council's defensive drivers training course after a two-day school Nov. 3-4.

The school signals the start of an Idaho driver rehabilitation program. Once trained, the instructors will be the nucleus of a drivers rehabilitation program that will be available initially on an eight-region basis in Idaho.

Both the training and the rehabilitation program have been made possible by an \$18,300 grant through the Idaho Traffic Safety Commission and the National Highway Safety Bureau.

Drivers referred to driver rehabilitation schools will generally represent either substandard driving competency or failure to drive responsibly, or both. For drivers who have accumulated six or more violation points on their driving records, the school will allow for deletion of three violation points.

Local regional headquarters will be in Coeur d'Alene, Moscow, Leslton, Boise, Twin Falls.

'Witch' Loses Lawsuit When Magic Fails

PUEBLO, Colo. (UPI) — Self-proclaimed witch Josephine Madrid lost a civil suit Friday because her magic did not work in attempts to cure a 10-year-old girl with congenital brain damage.

Mrs. Maria Sprouse, who filed the suit, said she paid her daughter, Denni, the treatments which began in May on her daughter's Deni. The treatments included voodoo charms, tiny felt amulets, candles and a mysterious sealed envelope.

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36 States Report Rain Monday

Thirty-six states reported rain today, as high tides damaged homes and fishing piers along the Carolina Coast and torrential rains caused lowland flooding on the Atlantic Coast. The Rockies and Plains got more snow, up to 10 inches. The heaviest rain occurred in the Middle Atlantic States and in Southern New England, caused by a storm in the Atlantic, as a wet weather scene continued in much of the nation.

Drizzle fell across the Midwest and turned into snow toward the Central Rockies, which received record snow last month. New Mexico mountain areas reported 10 inches of new snow Sunday. Fresh snow fell in Texas, Colorado and Wyoming, packing passes.

The snow hampered the search for a plane missing in Colorado and was blamed for traffic deaths in Colorado and New Mexico.

In the East Atlantic City, N.J., received three-quarters of an inch of rain in a six-hour span ending early today.

Kicked up by the Atlantic storm, high tides damaged piers and some homes along the coastline of the Carolinas. In the Atlantic, the Coast Guard conducted a search for a 120-foot tugboat which was reported to be taking on water. The Marjorie McAllister, en route from New York City to Jacksonville, Fla., with a crew of six radioed it was near Cape Lookout, N.C., early today, but search craft were unable to locate it.

Severe erosion was caused by the storm as it sent 10-foot tides crashing ashore at Folly Beach, S.C. Authorities reported the island off Charleston, S.C., sustained extensive minor damage. At Carolina Beach, N.C., about 150 feet of a fisherman's steel pier was washed away.

The center of the Atlantic Coast storm with its gale-force winds headed out to sea early today, missing the metropolitan New York area, where flash flood warnings had been issued by the U.S. Weather Bureau.

But Griffith conceded President Nixon in "no uncertain terms" has indicated he will not withdraw the nomination or accede to such a request from Haynsworth.

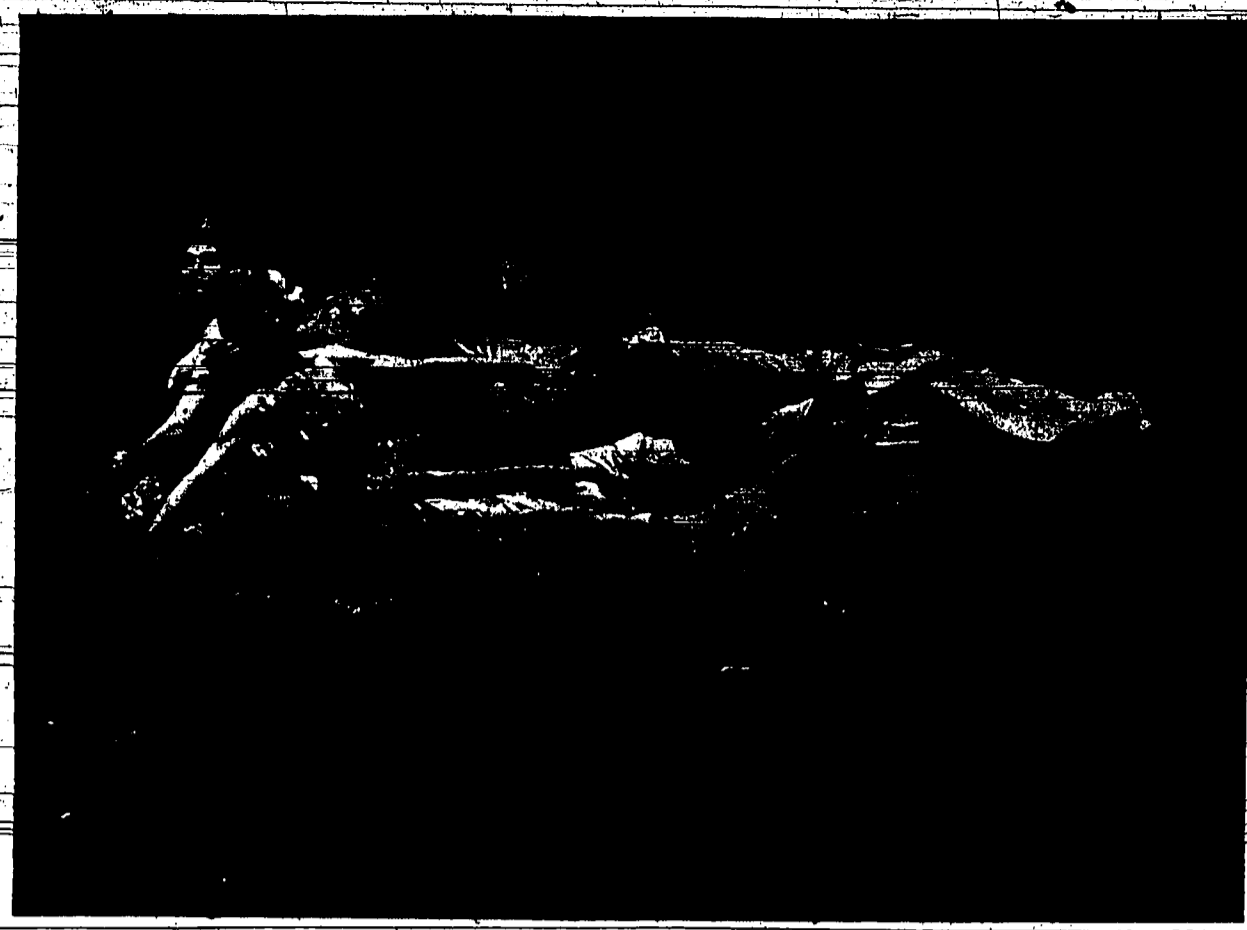

Electronic 'Chili Gauge' Helps Judges

Select Winner Of Texas Hot-Food Contest

TERLINGUA, Tex. (UPI)—C. V. Wood, an Arizona promoter who bought the London bridge, Saturday won the world's chili-cooking championship peppers down from Wick Fowler, a huge Texan who has held the title of sorts for the past two years.

Wood was a dark horse but even so came equipped with a huge electronic instrument with two electrodes on it. He called it an "electronic chili gauge" and said it would prevent skulduggery among the judges, who could not take refuge this year in a plea of paralyzed taste buds.

When the electrodes were plunged into Fowler's chili, the machine flashed moderately. The chili of Joe De Frates of Springfield, Ill., who insists that the word should be spelled "chilli," also got a modest electronic response.

But when the machine touched Wood's chili, it was like the Fourth of July. Five of six

judges voted for Wood on the strength of the electronic test and quick tastes.

H. Allen Smith, the humorist, voted for De Frates, but after the other five voted for Wood, he changed his vote and made it unanimous.

Twelve hundred persons attended the cookoff in the ghost town of Terlingua. The nearest "live" town is Alpine, Tex., about 70 miles away. Thirty planes brought guests from as far away as California and Florida.

Woodruff "Wino Woody" De Silva of Los Angeles was supposed to be Fowler's stiffest competition. But De Silva failed to get started with the other contestants and was ruled out of the competition.

Nevertheless, De Silva was given a chili pot along with the runners-up in recognition of his claim that he won the West Coast title once at a cookoff in Cucamonga, Calif.

Wood, who gave his address as Lake Havasu, was given a

trophy. Fowler was first runner-up.

The judges proclaimed Mrs. Hattie Stillwell of Alpine, a justice of the peace with nine grandchildren and three great-grandchildren, as "chili queen" and all kissed her.

Actually, there were eight or nine entrants but the machine considered only Wood, Fowler and De Frates as serious contestants. There were no prizes, even though Wood provided the machine that gave him the championship.

Before the contest started on gasoline stoves and butane gas burners, David Witts, the Dallas lawyer who owns Terlingua, said it was going to be "an honest confrontation" or he would know the reason why.

A man from Fredericksburg, Tex., made up a batch of Armadillo chili and served it on the half-shell. A few persons were believed to have sampled it.

At least, they looked sick. On the other hand, they may have gotten some bad ice.

Deny Race Alters Vote

CLEVELAND (UPI)—Carl B. Stokes, first Negro elected mayor of a major American city, and his Republican white opponent, Ralph J. Perk, insist race will not be an issue in Tuesday's mayoralty election.

But 90 per cent of this lake city's electorate was expected to vote on racial lines, with strong indications a bigger voter turnout may be recorded than in 1967 when Stokes was elected.

Some polls indicated Negro voters favored Stokes up to 99 per cent. Other polls showed Perk can count on a large number of defections among white Democrats disillusioned with Stokes after his two years in office.

Perk, the Cuyahoga County auditor and a strong vote getter in Republican districts after 20 years in office, has made strong appeals to white Democrats to join the GOP camp. He has campaigned on the issue of law and order.

Negro voters are proud of the dapper 42-year-old Stokes and point him out as a symbol of black achievement. They are pledged with the improvements achieved in their areas under his administration.

Perk, 55, is of Czech descent. This gives him an emotional kinship with Clevelanders of Eastern European background who make up 40 per cent of the city's population.

Negroes account for about 34 per cent of the city's 315,288 registered voters. To win, Stokes must receive between 15 and 20 per cent of the white vote, as he did in his primary victory and in the 1967 general election.

Stokes has campaigned on his record. He said he has gotten Cleveland moving forward again by building low income housing, fighting air and water pollution and modernizing the Police Department.

Hijacked Pilot Slams FBI Action

NEW YORK (UPI)—The four original crew members of TWA Flight 85 returned to the United States Sunday with some sympathetic words for accused hijacker Raffaele Minichiello and criticism of the FBI for jeopardizing the crew's safety.

Capt. Donald J. Cook Jr., pilot of the flight originally scheduled from Baltimore to San Francisco Friday, told reporters upon arriving at

Reynolds Airport. "I'm certain they (FBI agents) didn't do it intentionally but they just crowded us a bit too far."

Cook, 31, who was born in New York City, was backed by the three other crew members in his charge against the FBI. However, he said he did not recall accusing the agents of acting like "idiots," a remark attributed to him in Rome, where Minichiello terminated the 7,000-mile flight and was captured.

The pilot described the half-hour New York stopover in the Denver-New York-Bangor, Maine-Shannon, Ireland-Rome hijack flight as presenting "needless" danger. Cook said when the plane stopped to

return "a man in coveralls was standing alongside the aircraft. At this time Minichiello was under one of the wings. I called out the window and asked him to move the refueling equipment in. He said something like 'We'll move the equipment when we're good and ready'."

At this time Minichiello was reported "starting to panic" inside the plane and fired a shot into the galley roof to ward off a possible FBI attempt to capture him.

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McCarthy May Run For U. S. Senate

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy, D-Minn., left open Sunday the possibility he will run for the Senate from New York.

There have been reports in recent weeks that McCarthy, who already has said he won't seek reelection in his Minnesota seat, might challenge Sen. Charles E. Goodell, R-N.Y., next year.

Asked about the rumors in a television interview (Issues and Answers—ABC), McCarthy denied ever saying he wouldn't be a candidate from any other state.

McCarthy said his remark in turning down a reelection bid was that he "wouldn't be a candidate from Minnesota, that I wasn't a candidate from any other state."

But he added, "The likelihood of my running in New York is very slight." He also said, "I pretty well made a decision when I said I wouldn't run from Minnesota that I didn't want to go back to the Senate."

McCarthy also suggested he would join a third party. "If it developed in the context of serious issues," but said he had no desire to head one.

On Vietnam, McCarthy said that if he were to give the speech President Nixon is going to give on nationwide television Monday night he would announce that he is going to negotiate a coalition government in South Vietnam.

He said he also would go beyond that to propose "some kind of meeting of nations to deal with the long-range problems of North Vietnam and South Vietnam."

McCarthy, an unsuccessful candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination last year, said he also would

"Great Escape" Attempt At State Prison Is Nothing More Than Topic Of Conversation As Convicts Fill In Massive Tunnel

BOISE, Idaho (UPI)—The 40-foot long tunnel at the Idaho State Prison was nothing more than a topic for conversation Sunday — and convicts were busy pouring dirt, cement and rocks into it.

What had started out as a "great escape" attempt that apparently took weeks of work with a lot of skill involved, fizzled when prison officials who had been looking for weeks finally found the escape route.

Prison officials said "seven or eight" convicts were being held in segregation in connection with the attempted break but charges had not been filed against any of them.

It was estimated that as many as 15 convicts had some thing to do with the tunnel. "They sure worked at it—too

bad it wasn't something more constructive and along the lines of rehabilitation," a prison spokesman said Sunday.

The break had apparently been scheduled for Sunday night. But word leaked out and the tunnel was located late Friday.

"It was a heck of a trick or great trick to play on them (the prisoners)," the prison spokesman said.

It was estimated the tunnel took at least three months to complete. It reached outside of the walls of the Gem State structure and Associate Supt. of Corrections Glen Jeffes said "they could have gone at any time."

Prison officials Sunday said the "filling in" procedure would probably be completed by Monday.

Convicts who dug the tunnel managed to tap into a power line to get power for an electric drill and lighting. They apparently worked only about three hours a day, mostly in the evening.

When the prison staff heard Friday that the "big break" was about ready to come off the entire prison population of 269 prisoners was locked up.

But Saturday night, a trustee, Albert Greenawald, 43, walked away from the institution anyway.

The tunnel started in the basement of the prison kitchen and its entrance was hidden behind a filing cabinet. When discovered during the weekend, prison officials found power tools, shovels, potato sacks and other evidence of the escape attempt.

Jeffes described the tunnel as to shore up ceiling joints and "an engineering feat." He said it went down as deep as 20 feet.

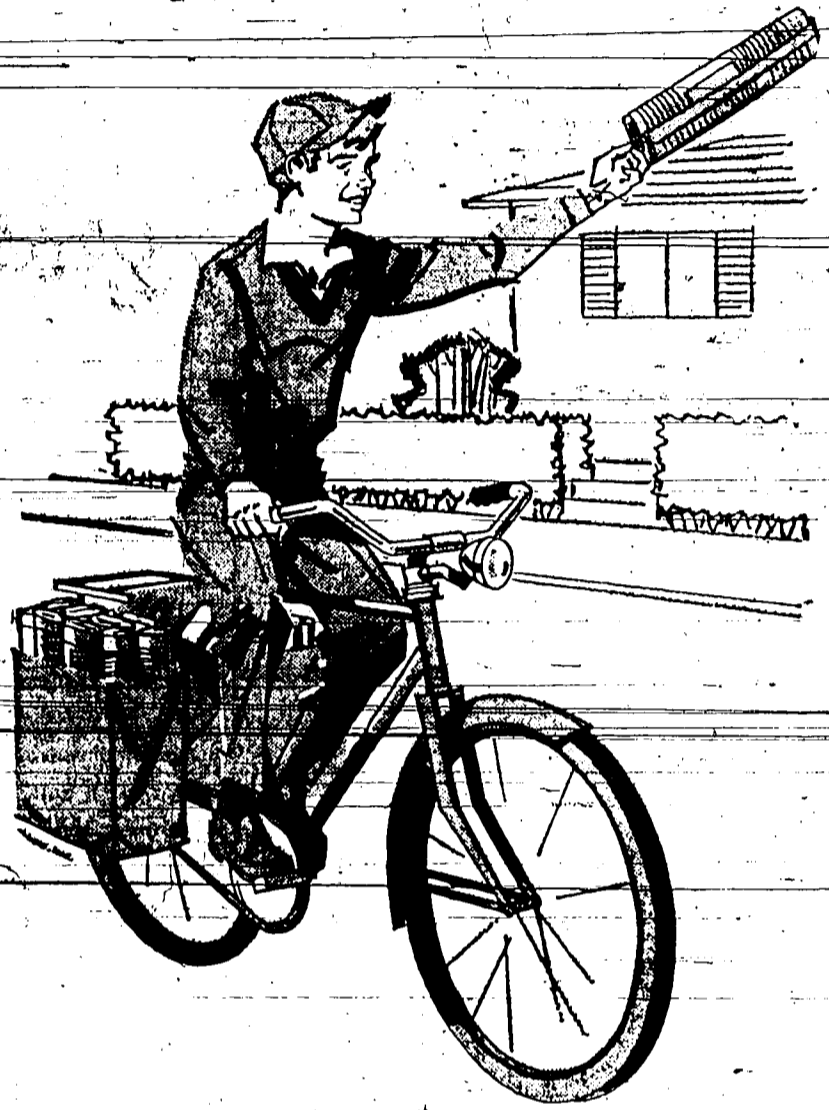

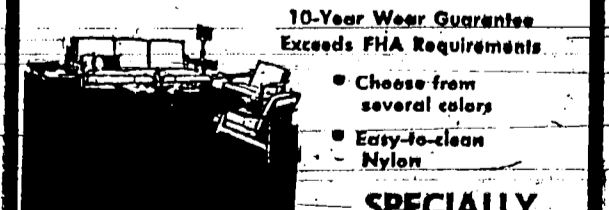

It put Cincinnati in position for Cook's second scoring toss to Myers, a second-year man from Northeastern Oklahoma State.

Phillips accounted for 120 yards in 15 carries, the highest ground gaining total by any Cincinnati back this year.

He also smashed across for a touchdown from two yards out after Bobby Hunt had picked off a Lamonica pass and returned it to the Oakland four. The Bengals struck their first touchdown in the opening period on two-yard plunge by Paul Robinson, climaxing a 70-yard march. They added 17 points in the second quarter on Cook's two touchdown passes and a 16-yard field goal by Horst Muhlmann.

Lamonica finally got the Raiders rolling in the fourth quarter when he uncorked a nine-yard pass to Fred Biletnikoff for a touchdown and a 43-yard scoring pass to Warren Wells.

Jets Tip Dolphins 34-31 On Field Goal With 2:41 Left

NEW YORK (UPI)—The New York Jets, rallying from an 11-point half-time deficit, turned a blocked punt by defensive tackle John Elliott into a 36-yard field goal by Jim Turner with 2:41 left to play Sunday and defeated the Miami Dolphins, 34-31.

The Jets, who trailed 24-16 entering the final quarter, fought back behind two touchdown passes by Joe Namath to tie the score at 31-31 with just over seven minutes remaining.

Four minutes later the Jets got a big break as Elliott crashed through Miami's offensive line to block a punt by Larry Seiple that was recovered by Randy Beverly on the Miami 31.

After three running plays gained three yards, Turner booted his second field goal of the game to squeak out a victory for the Jets.

Maynard's two touchdowns passes enabled him to break the American Football League record for most touchdowns. Maynard now has 83 career touchdowns, breaking the record of 81 which he had previously shared with Art Powell. The Jets' flanker also became the first player in AFL history to accumulate more than 10,000 yards in pass receptions.

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Patriots Stun Houston Oilers In 24-0 Shutout

BOSTON (UPI)—Mike Tallaferra pitched a pair of defensive back Barry Johnson and Ron Sellers Sunday as the Boston Patriots broke a record Boston touchdown and nine-game losing streak in a 24-0 upset over the Houston Oilers.

Sellers, Boston's top draft choice, caught scoring passes of 25 and 43 yards as the Patriots rang up their first victory of the season and overcame the Oilers, who had been favored by eight points, before 19,000.

The Patriots were posting their first homefield shutout in their ten-year history as they choked off a big Houston bid for a touchdown by stopping the Oilers at the Boston 2 with 2:27 remaining. The upset loss was the fourth in eight games for Houston, which remained in second place in the American Football League's Eastern Division.

Cappelletti touched off the upset with his field goal, 2:30 into the second quarter, after a 24-yard pass interference penalty against the Oilers set the scoring stage.

Tallaferra's 25-yard touchdown connection with Sellers capped a 63-yard Boston drive with 6:24 left in the half and Johnson's fumble recovery scoring run came just 1:58 later.

Johnson picked up the loose ball and easily followed the sideline on his scoring play after Boston's Don Webb, John Bramlett and Larry Eisenhauer ganged up to force Houston's Hoyte Granger to lose the ball.

The Patriots took a strict-air route for their third-quarter score as Tallaferra hit on four of four passing tries to account for most of the 75-yard drive with Sellers breaking past the Houston secondary on his 43-yard, going way scoring catch.

The Hawks were up by just two points at the half, but Beard came into the game to pump in 15 points. Hezzard added another 13 in the last two periods and Atlanta won going straight. The victory was the third straight for Atlanta and kept the second-place Hawks just a half game back of Los Angeles in the Western Division race.

Oswald: "Today is the age of specialization. If you want to be the best at anything, you have to specialize and learn all you can about the subject."

Jim: "This means that if you want to be a top bridge expert you have to put as many lazy bids to work as you can and must use some bids that are completely artificial."

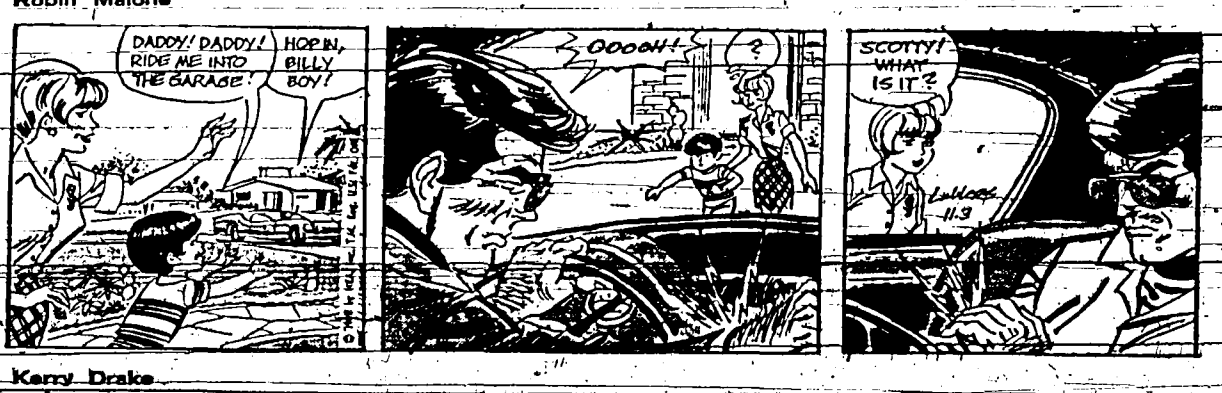
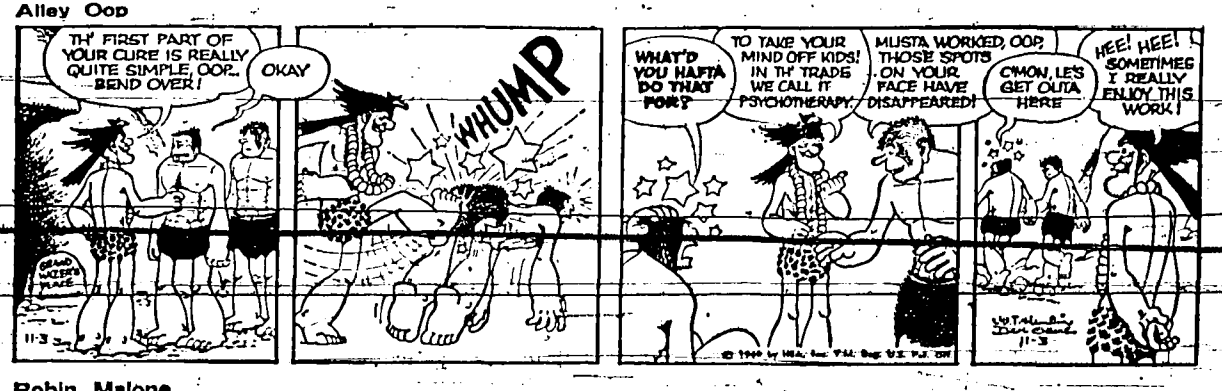
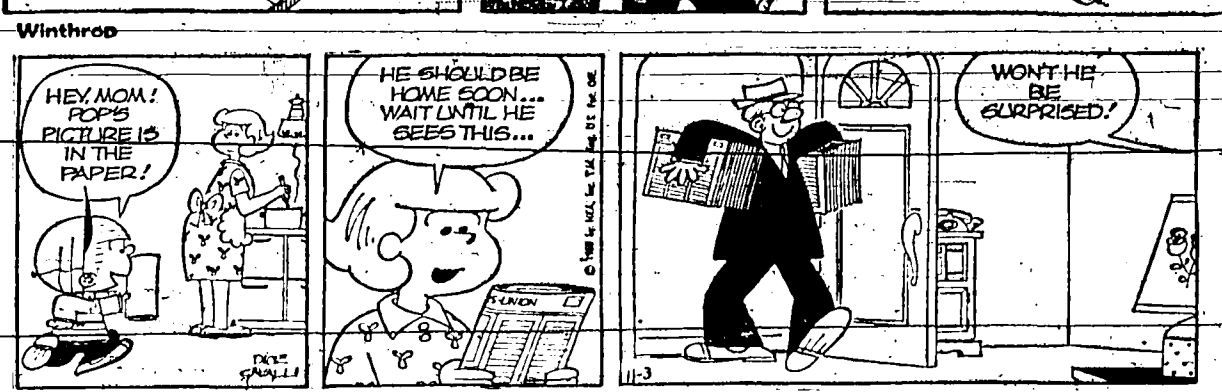
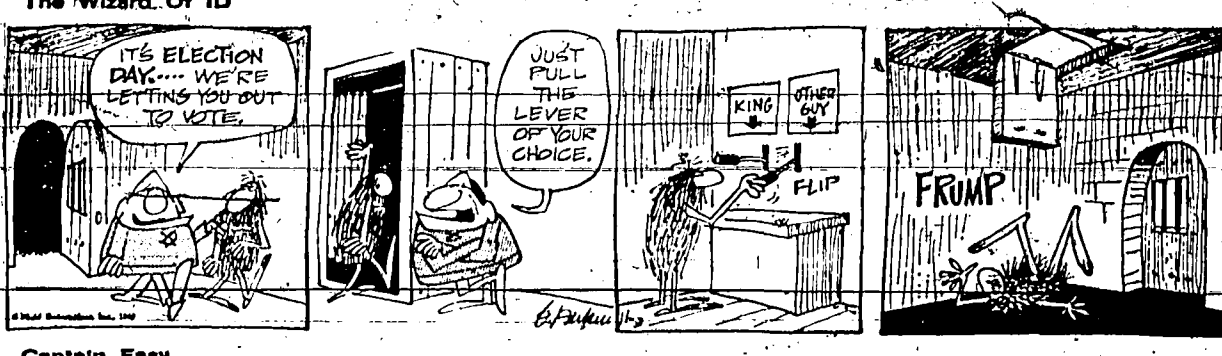
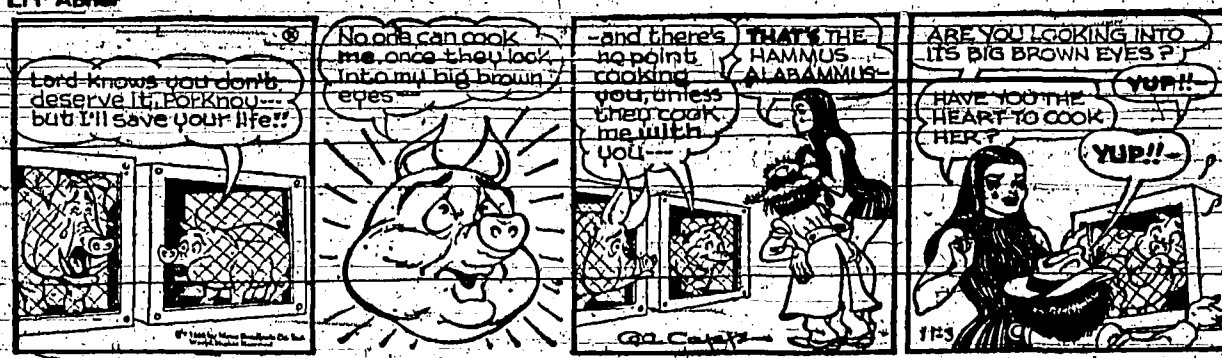
Oswald: "At the same time, you must start by learning your basic bidding. Without a sound, simple, basic structure to work with, you will get nowhere. Take today's hand as an example. The bidding by expert or beginner will be exactly the same. The expert will make the hand. The beginner may not."

Jim: "The beginner will win the first trick and attack either diamonds or clubs. If he goes after the diamond suit, he will knock out the diamond ace and, while West will be able to get his spade suit set up, he won't have an entry for it. If he leads a club, East will win the trick and play a second spade. West will have his spades set up and will get in with the ace of diamonds" to run three spade tricks."

Oswald: "The expert will let West hold that first trick. Then it won't matter which minor suit he starts with. If East gets in, he won't have a spade to lead. If West gets in, his fourth will have been pulled."

Jim: "It really doesn't take much expertise to duck that first spade. We would expect any real bridge player would do so. Particularly enough, the duck player winds up making 10 tricks. The man who grabs the first spade and happens to play diamonds first will wind up making 11."

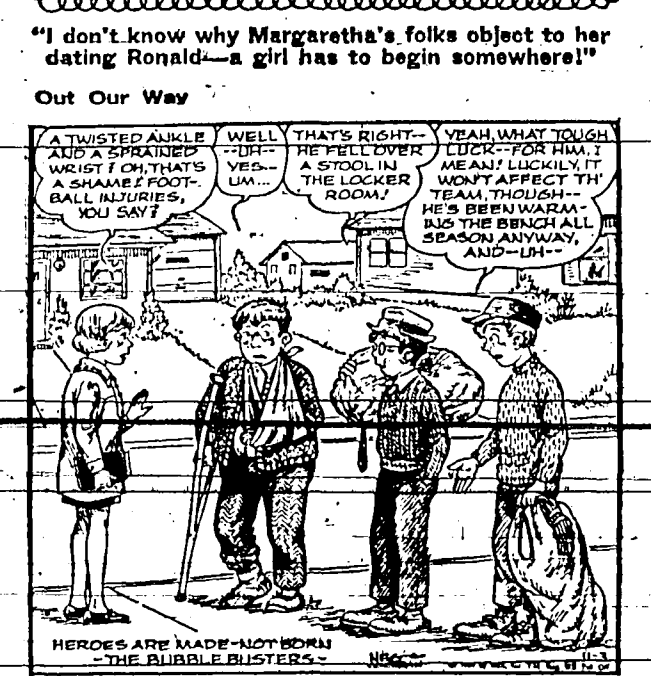

Democrats Need More Governors To Keep Balance In National Political Picture

By RAYMOND LAHR

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Democrats need more governors to restore balance to the national political map, but they need luck just to stay even this year.

Only New Jersey and Virginia elect governors Tuesday, and the Republicans have a chance to replace Democrats in both Virginia has not had a Republican governor since the Reconstruction years and New Jersey has had none for 16 years.

More important tests come next year when 35 governors will be elected. Democrats now hold only 17 of those and the GOP has 24. If there is a political pendulum, it should benefit the Democrats in 1970.

In all 50 states, Republican governors now outnumber the Democrats 30 to 20. The GOP held only 14 governorships 11 years ago.

A distillation of opinions from Republicans in the national party organization indicates a more confidence about their prospects in New Jersey than Virginia. Their candidate is Rep. William T. Cahill, running against former Democratic Gov. Robert B. Meyner to succeed Gov. Richard Hughes, who is ineligible for reelection after two four-year terms.

In Virginia, the GOP candidate is A. Linwood Holtz, the loser four years ago, matched against William C. Battle, ambassador to Australia during the Kennedy administration and son of a former governor. They are competing for the job of Gov. Mills E. Godwin, Jr., who also is ineligible for reelection.

Holtz, a political ally of President Nixon, was nominated without opposition by a Republican convention.

Battle had to survive a primary which eliminated the

candidate of remnants of the old Byrd organization. Then in a runoff, he had to defeat a candidate who, by Virginia standards, is a far-out liberal.

For the record at least, Battle is calling this intra-party competition a healthy thing for the Democrats.

Daley, an employee of the Boise Veterans Administration, left for Washington, D. C., on Sunday, and following a few days briefing will go onto Vietnam.

Daley will be stationed at Cam Ranh Bay.

Suit Filed

BOISE (UPI) — Oliver B. Turner, Boise, has filed a suit against the Idaho Tax Commission in Fourth District Court on the grounds that seizure of his property was unconstitutional.

Turner, a former Highway Department auditor, faces 19 counts of obtaining more than \$300,000 under false pretenses.

Turner filed the action as president of Lake Bowl, Inc., a bowling alley at McCall which he operated until his arrest in April.

Turner's complaint alleged that the property, worth \$120,000, was seized by the commission in April after issuance of a jeopardy assessment and sold by the commission for \$1,500.

International 'Skyjack' Cost TWA Plenty But \$8 Million Airliner Was Unharmed

NEW YORK (UPI) — Trans World Airlines (TWA) said Saturday the 6,900-mile hijacking of its jetliner from California to Rome cost the

airline "tens of thousands of dollars."

A TWA spokesman said expenses included fuel, landing fees, pilot and ground service time, time spent by top management in dealing with the hijacking and the cost of cancelling or rescheduling regular flights the hijacked jet would have made.

The direct cost of flying a

Boeing-707, including crew and fuel, is \$1,000 to \$1,400 an hour, TWA said.

The airline said the cost would be well over the \$20,000 it took to fly fugitive Robert Williams from London to Detroit, in that case Williams was returning to face kidnapping charges and the airline chose to fly him back alone with the crew on a jetliner rather than carry him with other passengers.

The hijacking covered a longer distance and involved more stops and emergency measures such as keeping a telephone line open between Rome and New York offices for about an hour, at an estimated cost of \$200, to wait for word of the plane's landing and whether the crew was safe. However,

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
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
