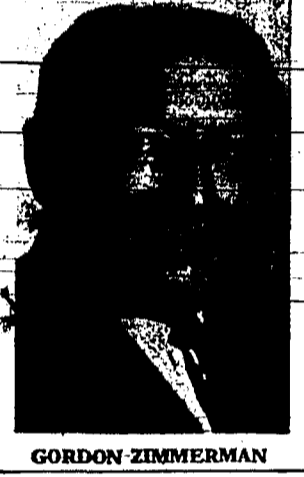

Federal, State Officials To Attend Resource Parley

C., as well as Idaho's Governor and in many state and regional leaders will be program participants during the third annual Governor's Conference on Natural Resources which gets underway in Twin Falls with registration this afternoon and continues through a Tuesday luncheon session. Many phases of Idaho resource pattern will come up for discussion during the sessions, expected to attract several hundred interested individuals. All meetings will be at the Holiday Inn. Among highlights will be an address by Harrison Loesch, (Additional Pictures On Pg. 11) Washington, D. C., assistant secretary for public lands, United States Department of the Interior. He will speak at the banquet Monday evening at 7 p.m. Featured at the luncheon session Monday at noon will be Gordon K. Zimmerman, executive secretary, National Association of Soil Conservation Districts, Washington, D. C. Tuesday's luncheon speaker will be Governor Don Samuelson. Mr. Loesch will speak on "Use and Conservation of Our Natural Resources For All People." Mr. Zimmerman's subject will be "Society's Needs For Proper Use and Planning of Our Natural Resources." Governor Samuelson will speak on "The State's Role in Resource Management."

Tear Gas Halts Rioting During Mass Peace Rally

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Extremists of the peace movement waged a wild, paint-throwing demonstration at the Justice Department Saturday and were driven off by police using a tear and pepper gas. The violence which saw at least two American flags torn down at government buildings erupted after an estimated crowd of 250,000 conducted a peaceful mammoth peace march and rally in the nation's capital. After police swung into retaliatory action at the paint-spattered Justice Department, the demonstrators retreated down the Constitution Avenue Mall. Enroute, they took down the U.S. flag at the nearby Internal Revenue Service building. Another had been taken down at the Justice Department earlier. As some of the throng headed into the downtown shopping area a crowd of Pennsylvania Avenue, fires flared in several trash baskets and windows were heard breaking. Gas fumes filled up as high as the fifth floor of the Justice Department where Attorney General John N. Mitchell watched the wild confrontation from his office suite.

Apollo 12 Takes Aim On Tiny Moon Landing Site

SPACE CENTER, Houston (UPI)—Apollo 12's space pilots, giving up a key guarantee against being stranded in space, took precise aim Saturday on a landing spot on the moon no larger than a football field. The key maneuver took place about 31 hours into the flight of Charles "Pete" Conrad, 39, Alan L. Bean, 37, and Richard F. Gordon, 40, all Navy commanders. Their mission has gone like clockwork since the first harrowing minutes of the launch when their spacecraft lost its electrical power supply while climbing through a rainstorm. Engineers believe the power loss was caused by a buildup of static electricity of the climbing rocket. There was initial fear the power loss may have damaged some of Apollo 12's delicate electrical systems. But after a thorough check of the Yankee Clipper command ship and the Intrepid lunar lander, the astronauts reported their spacecrafts were "tidy" and in working order.

Arabs Hit Israelis In Golan Heights

By United Press International parently fired from near the Syrian village of Maarib, hit Israel's Nahal Golan settlement in the occupied Golan Heights, wounding four soldiers in the paramilitary frontier establishment. The mortar fire touched off an artillery duel that lasted one hour and forty minutes, the spokesman said. Israeli soldiers returned the fire until the Arab mortars fell silent. Two of the four wounded Israelis were reported in serious condition. Israeli sources said the attack was the first daylight shelling of the settlement, although it has been a frequent target of Arab guerrilla artillery at night. In Ramallah, on the occupied west bank of the Jordan River, an Arab guerrilla threw a hand grenade at an Israeli army truck in the main square, wounding one Israeli soldier and 17 Arabs in the square, an Israeli spokesman said. He said the truck was full of soldiers.

Nixon Praised

NEW YORK (UPI)—With thousands of New York City's antiwar citizens marching in Washington, supporters of President Nixon's policies held stage center in demonstrations in the city Saturday. The New York County American Legion rode what it called "Unity Trains" on the IRT subway, handing out leaflets supporting the Nixon administration's Vietnam policies. A group called the "peace With Honor Committee" held a rally in Manhattan, a motorcade in Brooklyn and a "loyalty" parade in the Bronx. On Long Island, the Rockville Centre American Legion post picketed the homes of Reps. Allard Lowenstein and Lester Wolf, both D-N.Y., and Nassau County Executive Eugene Nickerson — all advocates of a speedy withdrawal of all American troops from Vietnam.

Viets To Try 43 On Charge Of Treason

SAIGON (UPI)—The government announced Saturday that 43 persons, including a former adviser to President Nguyen Van Thieu, will be tried Nov. 28 on treason charges carrying the death penalty in what could be one of South Vietnam's biggest spy cases. The most prominent defendant is Huynh Van Trong, former special assistant to Thieu for political affairs. He was arrested more than three months ago and accused of "working with the Communists." The government announcement said Trong and the others would be tried by a military court on charges of "high treason and rebellion." No specifications were disclosed. The maximum penalty for treason is death; that for rebellion or "activities detrimental to national security" is five years in prison.

Marine Gunners Kill 39 Reds As Planes Bombard Jungles

SAIGON (UPI)—U.S. Marine artillery crews Saturday reported killing 39 Communist troops on the move along South Vietnam's northern coast. American and South Vietnamese pilots blasted jungles around the Bu Prang-Duc Lap Green Beret complex where sporadic fighting erupted. Elsewhere, battle communiques reported scattered action late Friday and Saturday in which 300 North Vietnamese and Viet Cong were killed. U.S. losses were listed as eight killed and 51 wounded. U.S. headquarters said North Vietnamese and Viet Cong gunners shelled 28 targets during the 24-hour period ended at 8 a.m. Saturday, killing two Americans and wounding 23. Field reports said paratroopers killed 32 Communist soldiers, four to five miles north and northwest of An Hoa and 17 more seven miles southeast of the city. UPI correspondent Nat Gibson, reporting from the Bu Prang-Duc Lap area 115 miles northeast of Saigon near the Cambodian border, said South Vietnamese Air Force pilots flew nearly 20 bomb runs Saturday in support of ground troops engaged in sporadic combat with North Vietnamese regulars. U. S. Air Force B52 Stratofortresses flew two missions before dawn Saturday three and four miles east of Bu Prang, dropping at least 180 tons of bombs on suspected North-Vietnamese troop concentrations.

Trooper Fails In Attempt To Steal 'Copter

CHU LAI, Vietnam (UPI)—A U.S. paratrooper tried to hijack an Army helicopter and force it to fly to Saigon but one of the copter pilots shot and wounded the gunman, a military spokesman said Saturday. The Army said the incident occurred at Camp Evans, base camp of the 101st Airborne Division, about 365 miles north-northwest of Saigon. The soldier, a private first class whose identity was withheld, commanded the UH-1H helicopter at gunpoint, ordering the two crewmen to fly him to Saigon. He was interned in the 51st evacuation hospital here, where he was reported in fair condition. The Army said it was not known why the paratrooper wanted to go to Saigon.

Senator Church Eases Stand On War Opposition

POCATELLO (UPI) — Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, told nearly 1,000 persons Friday in Frazier Hall at Idaho State University that he is "much less vehemently opposed to President Nixon's Vietnam policy" than he was opposed to that of his predecessor. He said that President Nixon added only two of three courses available in his Nov. 4 speech to get the United States out of Vietnam—negotiating just peace and "Vietnamization" of the war.

Students March Pullman, Wash. (UPI)—A day of peace demonstrations on the Washington State University campus concluded Friday afternoon with a "march against death" by more than 1,000 students from the campus to the downtown area.

BPA Hosts Seminar On Dispatching

BURLEY — The Bonneville Power Administration hosted a power operations and dispatching seminar Friday at Ponderosa Inn for all BPA utility customers in Cassia and Minidoka Counties, Idaho Power Co., and Bureau of Reclamation. Conducting the seminar was Dale Brooks, Idaho Falls, Bonneville Power Administration area Operations and Maintenance Supervisor. Purpose of the seminar was to exchange ideas and discuss the operations of power systems in the area to give the best possible service to the customer. Topic of discussion were communications by radio, microwave, carrier, bell, terminology and identifications; reporting, internal and external, (trouble shooting); record keeping purpose, information, event, timing, targets, reset, voltage and other items. Procedures of dispatching and operating, emergency outage and scheduled switching; system reliability, standards of design for operation and maintenance, alarm reporting telephone, supervisory control, indication mutual aid and inventory. Following lunch the seminar resumed until about 3 p.m. when the event was concluded. A guided tour of the newly dedicated Unity Sub-station was held for all who wished to take the tour.

Marchers Hitchhike, Walk, Charter Buses To Participate

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A boy and girl from East Lansing, Mich., hitchhiked in from Chicago, along with a girl from Salt Lake City. It took them 24 hours. A young lady with a small apartment on Capitol Hill put them up for the night and fed them, along with a youth who had been strolling the streets with a bedroll under his arm. It was, thus, and by bus, train, car, truck and camper that they converged on Washington, to do their thing against the Vietnam War. With temperatures in the 20s, some of the more than 250,000 antiwar demonstrators eked out what rest they could in sleeping bags on the grassy mall near the Capitol. Others slept in churches, private homes in the city and the suburbs, hotels, motels, cars, minibuses—even in theaters kept open all night. Some had money and dined in restaurants taxed to and beyond capacity. Others brought their own food. Many got by on sandwiches handed out by supporters. Quite a few just went hungry. All in all, and with help from sympathetic local residents, the New Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam (New Mobe) did a remarkable job in taking care of its own. It hoped to keep the cost under \$125,000, covered in large part through sales of posters, buttons and such. The traffic situation was little short of monstrous, both in the city and the arteries leading to it. With a big downtown section barred to all vehicles but buses during the morning, many motorists were hard put to find parking, and had long walks to the scene of the action. In one particular traffic jam near a downtown roadblock, a medium-sized station wagon from Iowa was seen to disgorge an even dozen youths in their cold-weather clothes.

California March Draws 45,000

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Estimated 45,000 demonstrators marched peacefully Saturday to a rally in Golden Gate Park in the November Moratorium's main western protest to the Vietnam War. Led by two dozen "Veterans Against the War," the first 10,000 marchers, mostly white and apparently middle class, stepped out from a waterfront staging area shortly after dawn. Supporters hoped for a quarter of a million persons to hear speakers headed by the Rev. Ralph Abernathy and entertainment emceed by comedian, Carl Reiner.

Sen. Jordan Will Oppose Haynsworth

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Len Jordan, R-Idaho, has announced his opposition to the Supreme Court nomination of Judge Clement Haynsworth to the United States Supreme Court. He was the first Rocky Mountain area Republican so far to come out against the nomination. Jordan said, "I have concluded that he (Haynsworth) does not in my judgment meet the high standards the American people have a right to expect of a justice of the United States Supreme Court."

Solons Praise Marchers For Patriotism

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Three senators praised Vietnam War protesters at a mass rally around the Washington Monument Saturday as patriots leading America from hatred and war to compassion and peace. The senators, Eugene J. McCarthy, D-Minn., George S. McGovern, D-S.D., and Charles E. Goodell, R-N.Y., put strong emphasis on the idealistic hopes of the demonstrators.

Crewman Earns \$20,540

SPACE CENTER, Houston (UPI)—Richard F. Gordon, No. 2 man on the Apollo 12 moon flight, is the highest paid, earning \$20,540.16 annually in Navy pay and allowances. Charles "Pete" Conrad earns \$20,024.16 and Alan L. Bean \$19,599.36. All three men have the same rank, Navy commander. The difference is longevity. Gordon, 40, has been in the Navy 23 years. Conrad, 39, the flight commander, has served 21 years and Bean, 37, has 19 years. Gordon receives \$1,251.20 a month base pay, Conrad \$1,218.30 and Bean \$1,182.90. All receive \$245 a month flight pay. They also receive an allowance of \$157.50 a month for housing and \$47.88 a month for food.

# Ask End To 'Hate Habit'

"Break the hate habit. Love your neighbor."

You'll be seeing and hearing that message a great deal this month. It's a classic example of what happens when a Madison Avenue advertising firm undertakes to sell religion.

The firm is J. Walter Thompson, and the "hate habit" slogan is the theme of a nationwide advertising campaign which it prepared, without charge, for the annual observance of Religion in American Life Month.

The Advertising Council is arranging for the message to be carried as a public service—which means for free—in newspaper ads, television and radio spots, subway and bus car cards, and large outdoor posters in bright, psychedelic colors.

Some traditionalists may take offense at the breezy style of the ads. But who knows? Maybe this is the way faith has to be packaged to compete for public attention in this era of the hard sell. It is all, perhaps, a matter of taste.

Even one whose taste buds recoil from it must admit there's a lot of punch to the Biblical message as translated by J. Walter Thompson.

One ad carries the attention-grabbing headline:

"You'd think by now God would say 'Phooey!'"

The body type explains that God's disgust is merited by "all the hate, the indifference to war, the fanatical selfishness we see around us."

"But God doesn't go around saying things like 'Phooey,'" the ad reassures us. "He goes around saying things like 'Love your neighbor as you love yourself.'"

"Have you tried it lately?"

"Another ad shocks you into attention by proclaiming in large type:

"You have 24 hours to live."

"Today, that is," says the smaller type below. "So what are you doing with your time? Are you helping another human being toward the dignity you want for yourself? Are you doing anything to overcome the hate in this world—with love? Break the hate habit: love your neighbor."

A radio spot reminds us that "we're God's hand here on this earth... so God's work is our work."

"Next time you shake your head over violence... or war, or poverty or even a storm in your own soul—remember, God put you here to change things. One person can do a lot you know. And it all starts when you show God's love in the world."

Maybe you've heard more eloquent sermons. But did you ever hear a shorter one?

# Hansen Calls For Reform Of Nation's Postal Setup

BLISS — Congressman Orval Hansen declared today that "the need for a major reform of the nation's postal system is urgent."

Hansen commended the Postmaster General for his efforts to deny the use of the mails to the peddlers of smut and obscenity. "In this fight, we must use every legal weapon available to us," he added.

## 'Angry Parent' Speaks About Drug Problem In Twin Falls

Editor, Times-News:  
During the past few months coffee break conversations seem to invariably touch on the topic of drugs and their usage among youngsters. Inevitably the question rises: "What is being done about it?"

Just as inevitably comes an angry note: "The police department does absolutely nothing."  
At this state, I feel I should withdraw from the conversation in as much as drugs have become as controversial as politics or religion.

I can't, I love three children in school, have three community and have now acquainted myself enough with the drug situation to bristle my hair and pitch right in.

The question that should pop up is, "What are we, parents, doing about it?"  
Are we helping our local law enforcement?  
How many of us have actually taken the problem seriously enough to take a few minutes away from our fishing, hunting or card parties to visit with our police department and learn something about drugs?

What do we know about them? Do we even realize that our children, ranging from 10 to 15 years of age, know more about drugs than we do? That they can, yes, make a telephone call and obtain anything from marijuana to morphine or cocaine within hours.

Several weeks ago I wouldn't believe it. I was just as smug as most and refused to even think that drugs could enter the circle of my family. I had also heard at that time that reporting any drug problems to our local police department would not do any good.

For some reason, however, I started looking into it and what I found scares me. To give a comparison, have you ever let your lawn grow long enough when your mower could no longer cut it without choking up and stalling?  
My lawn has reached that stage and as I glanced at the neighborhood I have found most lawns to look the same. No pun intended, we are in grass up to our waists.

I called a neighbor, a friend whose children associate with ours. I warned him of the fact that his high school youngster used drugs. I doubt very much if our paper would print the words chosen by this "concerned father," other than those used to threaten to sue for slander.

Another friend talked me into going to Tim Qualls after assuring me that the detective division would welcome any information and actively follow up on the matter.

After having explored the drug abuse in Twin Falls entirely on my own, and not getting anything accomplished, I agreed to visit with Mr. Qualls.

Within the following week, I saw him and the entire detective division literally spend 18 to 18 hours a day following up different leads which resulted in arrests.

I learned about drugs, its different types and how to recognize them. I was told about the laws concerning this matter and I must admit they seemed absolutely ridiculous.

We made these laws, we chose to call a felony the act of buying, selling or using drugs. We harass the police department into making arrests. They work around the clock keeping scores of suspects under watch in a patient and mostly frustrating cat and mouse game. They finally make that arrest. Then we slap the culprit's hand, put him on parole for a short time and that's the end of that!

No not quite the end, we say "The police department isn't doing anything about it."  
We provide drug pushers with so many civil rights and so many legal loop holes that we entirely forget our collective society rights. We have made our police department a kick ball, bounced between attorneys in every court of law.

I've found out that our "dumb cops" are no longer simply "flatfeet." To carry out their job they have to become the

## Mining In White Clouds Is Supported In Local Letter

Editor, Times-News:

In regard to Melvin W. Quale's forum letter of Nov. 2, in which he takes issue with my letter of the previous week concerning the White Cloud dispute. There is no misrepresentation of facts in my letter unless I should possibly have been too conservative in my statements!  
Now about the \$1 billion molybdenum deposit (and estimated as being possibly as much as \$11 billion by Rep. James McClure in his clarified statement in the Times-News of July 27), the income from which will mostly remain in Idaho. There are three general ways of mining metals. First, the square set, where a hole is vacated of metal and replaced by

much or useless, soft, second, cave style mining, which like the square set, is done underground, and third, and by far the least expensive, open pit mining where the least skilled help is used, and which the American Smelting and Refining Company doubtless will use.

In my letter I stated that a deposit of \$1 billion when mined would be sufficient to keep one thousand men busy for 75 years. Mr. Quale states that the miners would then get about \$12,400 a year, leaving nothing for machinery, tools, taxes, or profit.  
To the contrary, most miners in this type operation average about \$6,500 a year; wages for one thousand men would amount to \$6,500,000 a year. The income to the mine would be about \$13,333,333 annually, leaving \$6,833,333 a year for mining operations, taxes, etc. Not only would the mine be taxed but the miners would be paying millions collectively in federal and state withholdings. What a great economic loss if this molybdenum deposit is not mined! Certainly Rep. McClure questioned whether the White Clouds area should be "locked up".

ASARCO is not about to willfully dump bentonite or any other aqueous solution, for it is like pouring money down the drain, as Sen. Frank Church mentioned in his September Roundup Letter.  
Furthermore, ASARCO has reiterated that it will make the mined-over property a place of aesthetic beauty. Once the metal has been evacuated there could be a magnificent lake formation, to which the open pit mining lends itself.

Let us look at a few other "hot" mineral deposits recorded in history. Idaho City has produced more gold than all Alaska; the great cobalt Blackbird mine near Farney is the richest deposit in the U.S., and the old Leesburg gold mine helped change the course of the Civil War. The White Cloud mine could add to Idaho's tradition in this respect.

In addition to the economic loss imposed on Idaho if the White Clouds area goes under a National Park system, we may look forward to restrictions such as these: No prospecting except under the relentless scrutiny of a forest service official; no hunting; no trail cycling.  
But unfortunately if the mining laws are broken down here it will set a precedent over the entire nation — and the greatest blow will be to the free enterprise system itself.

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
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### Young People's Concert Set For Jan. 24 In T.F.

### Work Plan Enrolls 35 T. F. Women

Some 35 area women have been placed under the Work Incentive Program (WIN) which is being administered under the State Department of Employment.

Richard Robertson and Mrs. Connie Pratt, who are coordinators for the program locally, said most of the women are going to school either at the College of Southern Idaho or at the business college. Some are taking training for the Kellwood plant operation and others are taking advanced courses in fields such as cosmetology.

The purpose of the program is to place or train women in jobs who are receiving payments under aid to families with dependent children. They receive a \$30 incentive payment per month, in addition to their regular welfare check. Those who are enrolled in school are reimbursed for books, tuition and other fees. The women are also paid for babysitting costs while they are at school or in training.

Mr. Robertson said the women can be on the program for up to two years, and at the end of this time they should have reached their goals and have suitable employment.

The program was administered last year by the State Department of Public Assistance. But the name of the program was changed and it has been put under the jurisdiction of the employment offices under provisions of the Social Security Act Amendments of 1968.

The funds are 80 per cent federal and 20 per cent local. A total of \$672,500 was given to Idaho for 480 women to participate in the program. There are 65 openings available locally and the local officials work in cooperation with the Department of Public Assistance.

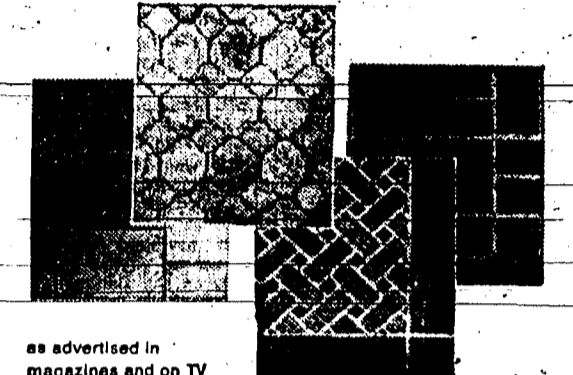

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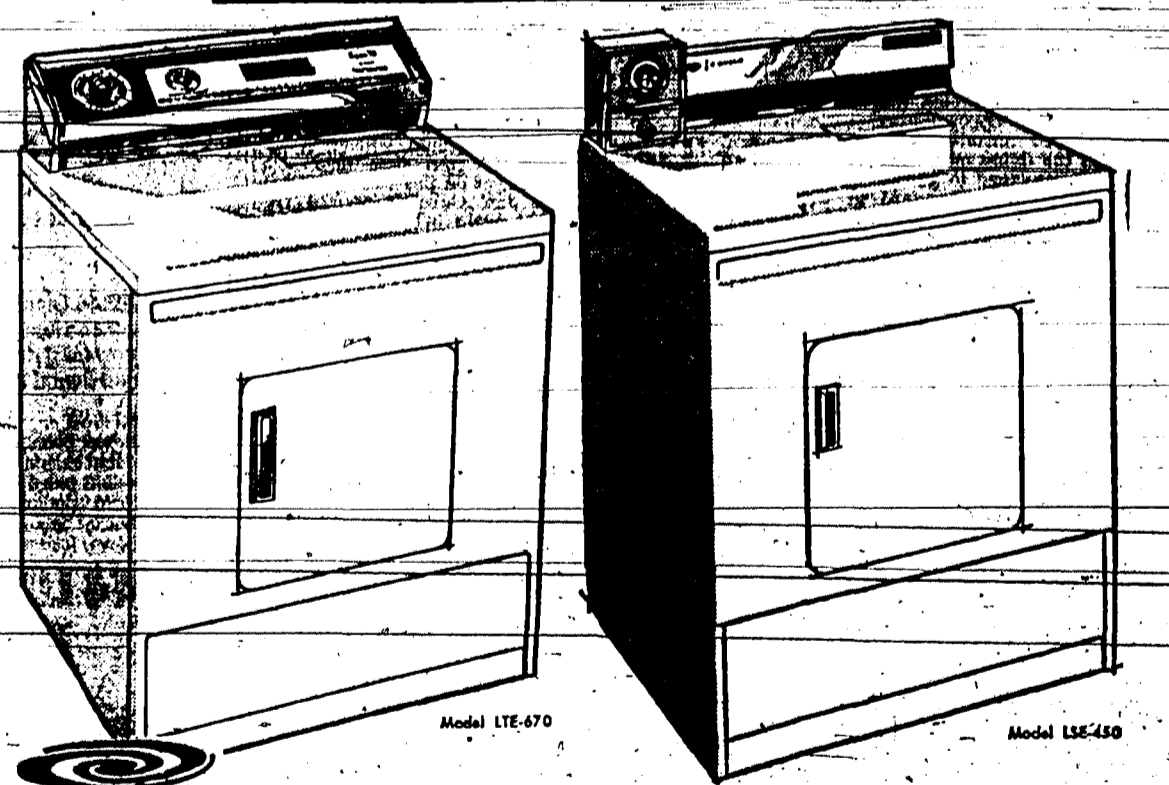

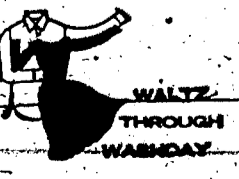
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# Boise State Defeats Idaho State 35-27

BOISE (UPI) — The Boise State Broncos nipped the sometimes lifeless and always harassed Bengals of Idaho State University 35-27 Saturday to capture the mythical Gem State football title.

The Broncos, now 8-1 for the season, slapped down ISU's touted pass receiver Ed "The Fica" Bell, twice shaking him so hard he had to be taken from play and then let their first-wheeling sophomore quarterback Eric Guthrie and a tenacious defense take over.

But it was freshman Henry Jenkins of BSC, a 155-pound back from Paso Robles, Calif., that brought the crowd of 11,600 to their feet as he rambled 91 yards to a touchdown in the third stanza.

Jenkins broke away from a host of tacklers around the 10 yard line and then romped down the sidelines, shaking off

## Penn State Crushes Maryland

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa. (UPI)—Penn State's Charlie Pittman scored three times in the opening 10 minutes Saturday as the Nittany Lions buried Maryland under a seven-touchdown avalanche 48-0 for their 19th straight victory.

Pittman's three touchdowns gave him 26 for his Penn State career and shattered the total touchdown record for the school of 25 set by Lennie Moore of Baltimore Colts and All-Pro fame.

The Lions scored the first three times they had the ball and, as usual, their defense played a major role in running up the quick early lead.

The defensive eleven chalked up one touchdown on tackle Mike Reid's 26-yard run with an interception of a pass batted in the air. It also set up two of the other five first half scores on a blocked punt and another interception.

Pittman's markers came on short bursts of four, three and two yards while Don Abbey went over from the one yard line as the Lions rolled to a 35-0 first half lead.

After Penn State scored twice again in the first five minutes of the third period, the Lions reserves took over and played the remainder of the game.

Maryland threatened twice in the first half and again in the final minute of the contest. But Penn State's defense killed the Terps first two opportunities and a 13-yard penalty shut them off in the dying moments.

The Terps managed to get as far as the Penn State five yard line once. But Maryland's fullback, Tom Miller, lost two yards on the fourth down to end that threat.

The success of Penn State's running game and its stout defense kept the Lions' passing at a minimum. Quarterback Chuck Burkman threw only three passes while he was in and completed two of them for 56 yards. The Lions scored all their touchdowns on the ground, logging the eighth straight game in the season in which they had not completed a touchdown pass.

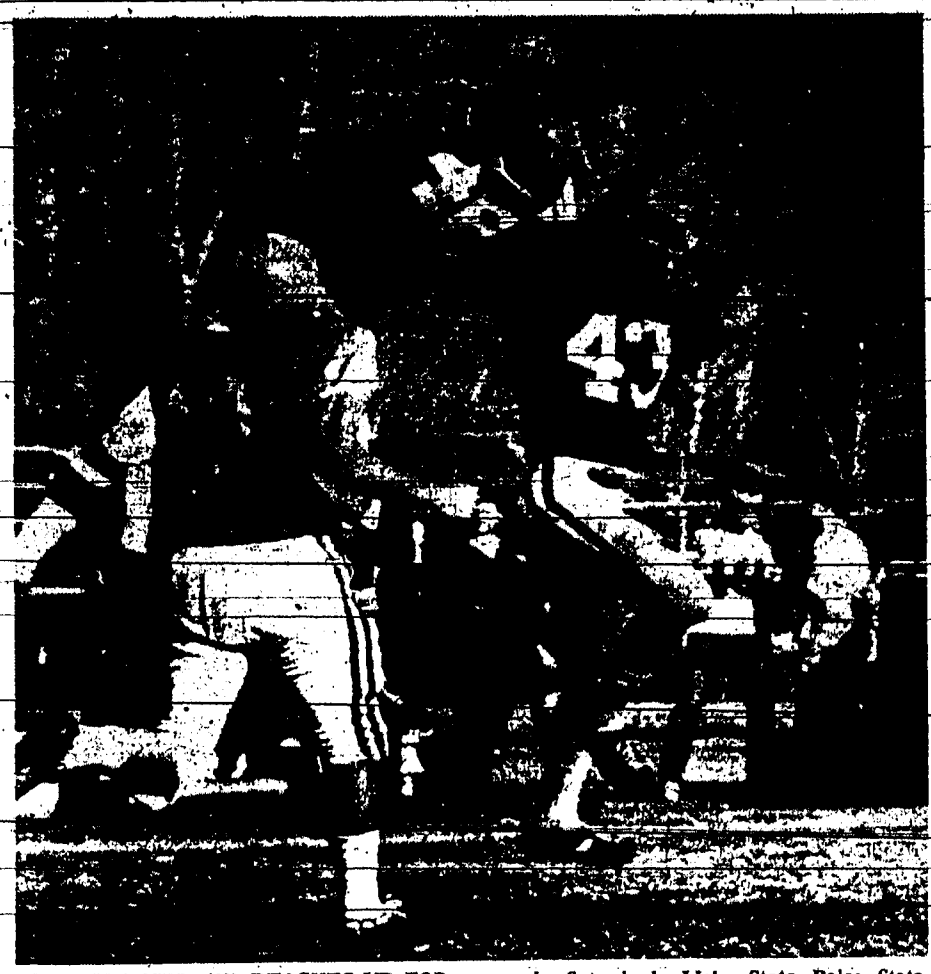

LOGAN, Utah (UPI) — Rangy Marc Lyons, working comfortably behind a solid defensive wall, fired two second-half touchdown passes to spark Brigham Young to a 21-3 win over Utah State Saturday.

The 6-2, 195-pound senior, struck for touchdowns of 23 and 56 yards to outclass the Aggies in Romney Stadium.

He hit split end Bill Miller on the 23-yard pass to give the Cougars a 14-3 lead and followed it up with the long strike to Dan Bowers that left USU reeling.

Bowers made a jumping catch on the USU 40 and rambled down the left sideline for the touchdown and the winning margin of 21-3.

The Aggies, completing their home schedule without a victory for the first time since 1949, got on the scoreboard only on Jeff Garcia's 37-yard field goal early in the second quarter.

They put together a long drive late in the same period but failed to punch it across on four attempts from the BYU six. Their failure to score nullified a spectacular 22-yard run on a pass reception by Paul Reuter to the six.

The Cougars got their first touchdown shortly after Garcia's field goal on a big break when a BYU punt was touched by USU's Sam Cooper and the ball rolled into the end zone where Ken Serck fell on it.

BYU, boosting its overall record for the season to six victories against three defeats, got a strong defensive performance from its front line, particularly end Jeff Slipp, who threw Aggie quarterback Dave Holman for frequent losses.

Most of the spectators were confused by the ruffling which gave the Cougars their first touchdown. It apparently happened this way: The Cougars' Rich Adams punted on a 4-10 situation on the Aggie 45 and the ball apparently glanced off the hands of Cooper and rolled freely into the end zone where it was downed for a touchdown to the amazement of the USU players.

BYU attempted three field goals but missed them all. Joe Liljenquist missed one and Scott Lounsbury failed on the other two.

## Michigan Overpowers Iowa 51-6

IOWA CITY, Iowa (UPI)—Billy Taylor, setting a blistering first half pace, scored two touchdowns and gained 225 yards Saturday to lead Michigan to a 51-6 rout of Iowa and three Big Ten records.

The victory, Michigan's fifth in six conference games, keeps the Wolverines in contention for a Rose Bowl bid with Purdue, who lost to Ohio State.

The Wolverines, who scored nearly every time they had the ball, rolled up 524 yards rushing, 673 yards total offense and 34 first downs, all Big Ten records.

Taylor set the Wolverine pace with two first half touchdowns on runs of 33 and 71 yards. The Michigan sophomore gained 225 yards rushing in 21 carries with 185 yards coming in the first two periods before leaving the game in the third quarter.

Jim Betts took over at the Michigan quarterback spot from starter Don Myghead in the second half and scored two touchdowns, both on six yard sprints.

Iowa finally scored with 22 seconds left in the game on a 14 yard pass from Larry Lawrence to Denny Green. A two point conversion attempt failed.

The Wolverines completely dominated the first half, building up a 31-0 lead and forcing Iowa to punt five times. The Hawkeyes penetrated Michigan's 50 yard line only twice before halftime.

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## Arizona Dims Utah's Title And Bowl Hopes With 17-16 Victory

TUCSON, Ariz. (UPI) — John Black Jr. intercepted a Utah pass with 1:56 left to play to preserve a 17-16 victory for Arizona over Utah before 23,400 homecoming fans Saturday afternoon.

The victory was Arizona's third of the year against six losses and possibly ruined Utah's bid for a Western Athletic Conference championship, depending upon the outcome of Arizona State's two remaining games.

Sun Bowl scouts attended the game and Utah's loss may have muddled the Sun Bowl picture for the Redskins.

After a scoreless first quarter, Utah drew first blood when Bill Hunter bucked four yards to a touchdown. A few moments later, Ron Gardin tallied for Arizona on a seven-yard smash with Hurley adding the extra point for a 7-6 lead.

Utah recaptured the advantage when Mary Bateman kicked a 34-yard field goal with only six seconds left in the first half to give the Utes a 9-7 halftime margin.

Lewis made it 14-9 for Arizona in the third quarter when he rumbled 39 yards off tackle and Hurley converted the extra point.

Back came Utah with fullback Dave Smith carrying an 80-yard march in 14 plays as he scored on a six-yard run and Bateman kicked the extra point to put the Utes in front, 16-14, but Hurley settled it all with his field goal.

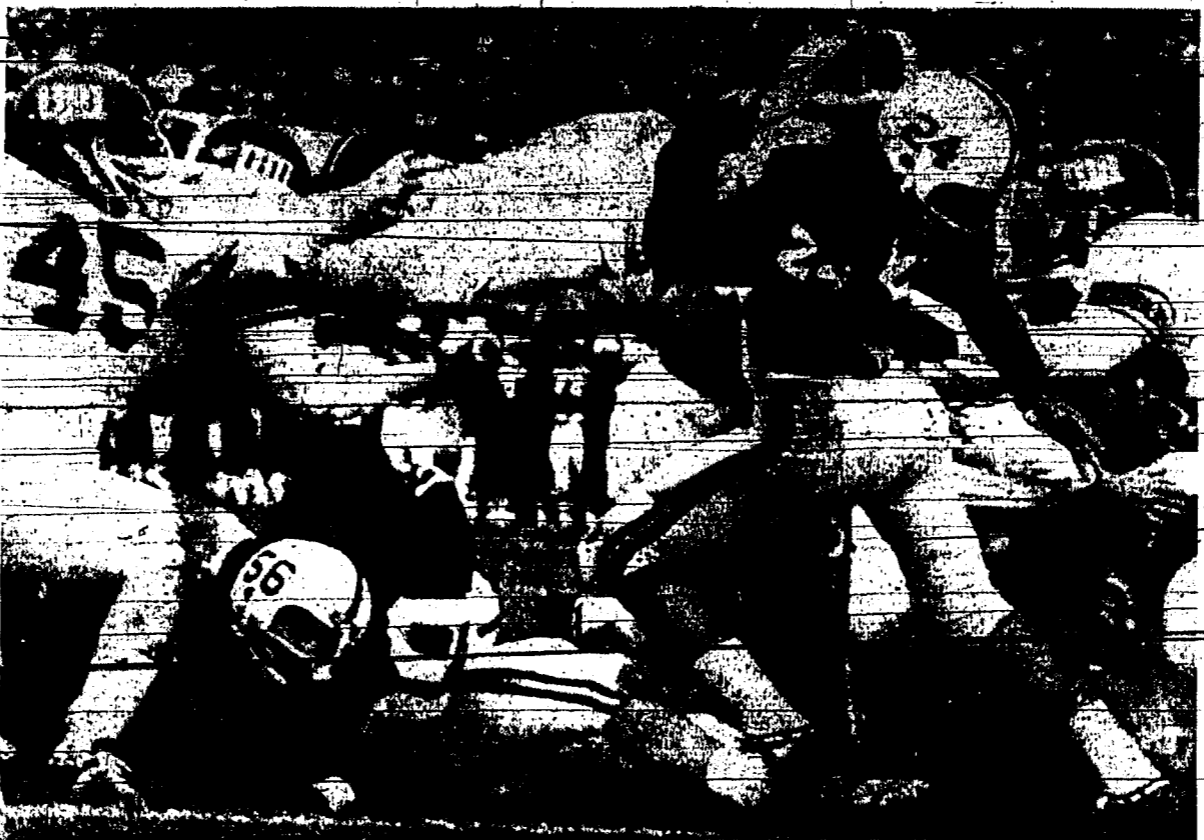

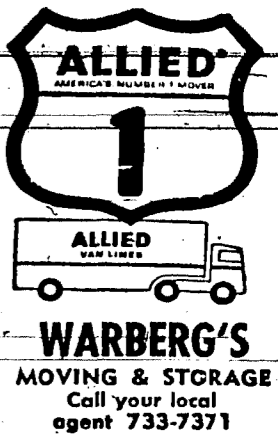

### Senate Opposes Red China Without Consulting Leaders

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Without the knowledge of key members of its Foreign Relations Committee, the Senate, as it has every year since 1953, endorsed a resolution opposing admission of Mainland China to the United Nations.

The resolution was buried in the state-justice appropriations bill the Senate passed 72 to 0 last week. It was not mentioned in the report, was not debated on the floor, and no vote was taken in committee. Its text in full:

"It is the sense of the Congress that the Communist Chinese government should not be admitted to membership in the United Nations as a representative in China."

Sen. J. William Fulbright, D-Ark., committee chairman, and Sen. George D. Aiken, R-Vt., ranking GOP member, said they did not realize the Senate had adopted the resolution.

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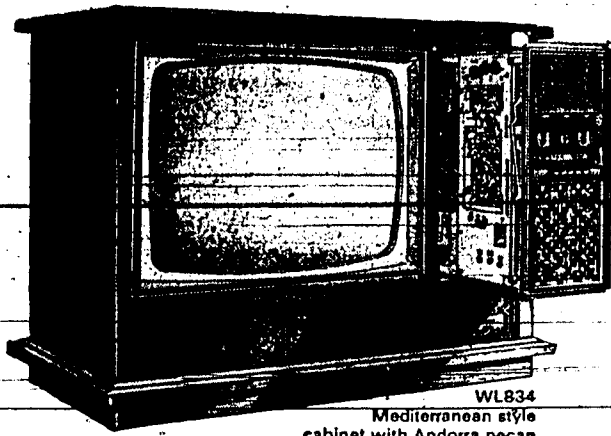

MAZATLAN, MEXICO—It's one stop short of the end of the line for Air West and it's not the place to go if you dislike the most fabulous ocean fishing in the world, an ideal climate, miles and miles of clean sand beaches, a friendly people, fabulous cuisine and outstanding after-dark entertainment.

This is Mazatlan, an area just coming into its own because of jet air transportation and someday soon destined to become the Riviera of the Pacific.

All Mexican towns have native market places, a Cathedral, narrow but explorable streets, a mixture of modern and ancient transportation and all the other things which prove attractive to most travelers. Mazatlan has all this. But only Mazatlan has a blend of the Sea of Cortez and the wide Pacific which combine to form the world's biggest fish trap.

As a result of this "trap" you can catch sailfish in the summer and marlin in the winter and you get two cracks at them as they circulate in and out of the Sea of Cortez. In spring and part of the winter you catch both types.

Fishing boats average two bill fish per year on a year-around basis. And this doesn't count the scores of other types where 20 to 30 pounds is really considered rather small pickings.

This is a place where the outdoors is king and where the beautiful beaches — stretching as far as the eye can see — and the ocean vie for attention. It's where you can have fun or just do a lot of nothing and where crowds are few because people are really just discovering the place.

Several days in this city of 120,000 or so souls can be revealing. Good hotel rooms run about \$10 for two people or \$8 for a single. All stores offer bargains without realizing they do. Hotel construction is booming and a new airport and terminal — costing up in the millions — is now in use.

Mazatlan is a city of contrasts. The glitter of the tourist is everywhere but here the minimum salary is \$2.40 for an eight-hour day.

Here is the second highest light house in the world, exceeded only by the one atop the rock at Gibraltar.

Here the Air West jets, connecting with the United States, swing wide over the city so passengers can get a real look at the city and the harbor.

Here is the greatest shrimp fishing fleet in the world. More than 300 boats combine to provide more than 90 per cent of the shrimp consumed in the United States.

Here is where the famed Poinsettia plant was first discovered by the American ambassador of the same name.

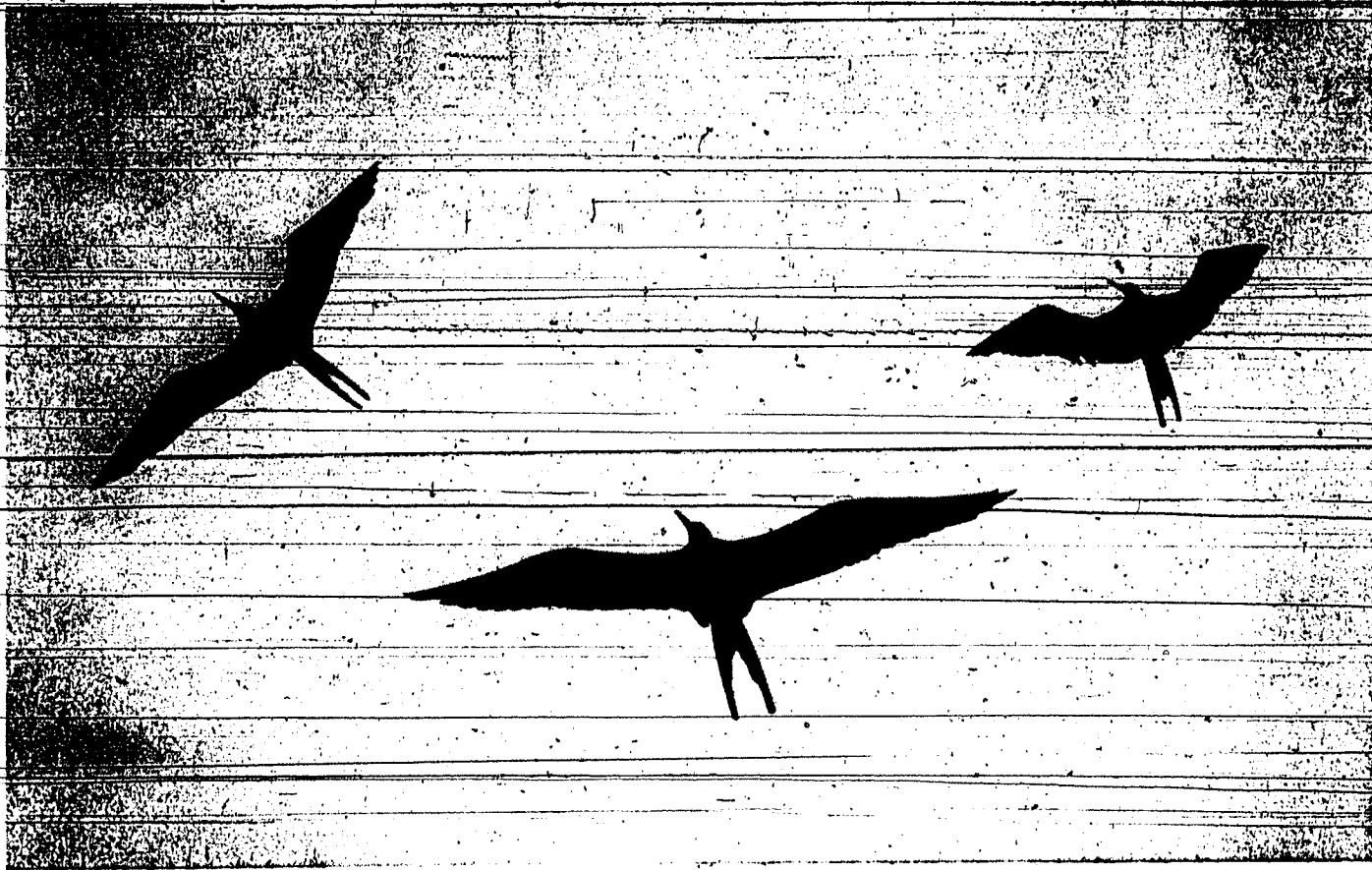

Here is where you eat on the sidewalk in front of Ernie's and Chato's in the downtown area.

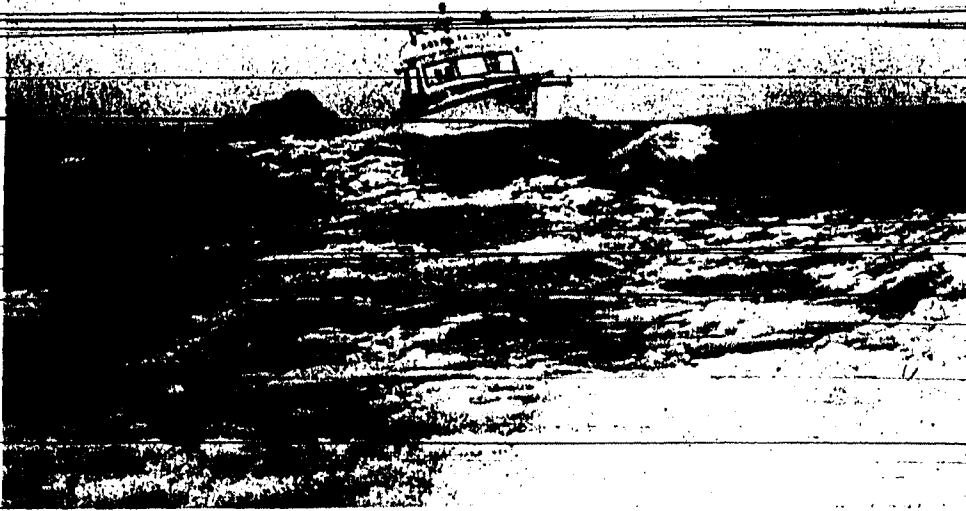

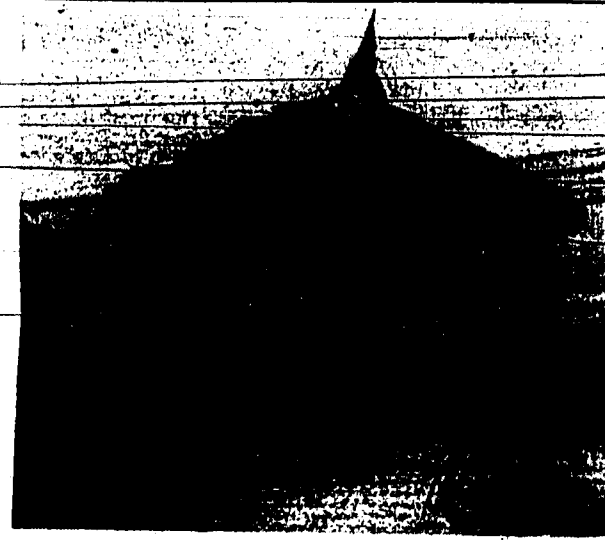

# Idaho's Back Country Offers Some Top Elk And Deer Hunting Through Dec. 7

Most of these counties do not have any elk at all and hunters of this noble species must travel long distances from their homes to find them. Idaho has three separate but adjoining regions that are designated as wilderness or primitive areas. They are roadless public lands where agricultural and industrial development are banned. Much of central Idaho is in this class. Several other large sectors of the state outside the wilderness system have big game conditions similar to the area set aside by the Forest Service.



TRUE WILDERNESS ANIMAL, elk are bagged most often by hunters willing and able to go into the wild, empty back country. Going after elk in this way gives the best chances of bagging one of North America's finest trophies, and enjoying some of the world's most magnificent wilderness grandeur. This elk herd is in the Big Wood River drainage near Ketchum.

The three Idaho wilderness and primitive areas combine to make a rugged mountainous region about 150 miles from north to south, and 25 to 65 miles wide. These are the Selway-Bitterroot Wilderness Area, the Salmon River Breaks Primitive Area and the Idaho Primitive Area. The Idaho portion of the Selway-Bitterroot contains 1 1/2 million acres, extending from the Lochsa River south to the upper Selway. The Salmon River Breaks Primitive Area extends on south to the main Salmon River.

The Idaho Primitive Area, running south from the main Salmon River, lies mainly within the drainage of the Middle Fork of the Salmon River, but also includes the Chamberlain Basin and Cold Meadows areas that drain into the main Salmon. Well over a million acres are in this region.

Steep, rocky canyons are numerous in these wilderness areas. Small tributary streams are usually present in each. Sometimes gentle slopes widen the deep canyons where top soil gradually accumulates. Peaks and ridges on either side are of granite. Most of the top soil here is coarse decomposing rock. Wide differences in elevation are found because of the steepness. These vary from 2,150 feet at the lowest point of the Salmon River on the western edge of the wilderness area to 10,700 feet on Mt. McGuire in the Bighorn Crags. Many peaks and ridges are 7,000 to 9,000 feet, making access difficult and travel hard.

Eighteen forest roads approach the boundaries of these wilderness areas from all sides, giving limited access. In addition, 16 back country airplane landing strips and a great many pack trails are available within the areas.

Outfitters and guides are located in designated areas to provide service to hunters, though this is not required for either residents or nonresidents. Jet boats, commercially operated, reach some of the camps on the main Salmon River. These are barred from designated wilderness areas, however, along with all mechanized equipment except aircraft.

Game managers long have recognized the potential for more elk hunting in the remote portions of the Selway and of the Middle Fork of the Salmon, but the problem of getting hunters into such areas to crop the animal herd increment remains unsolved.

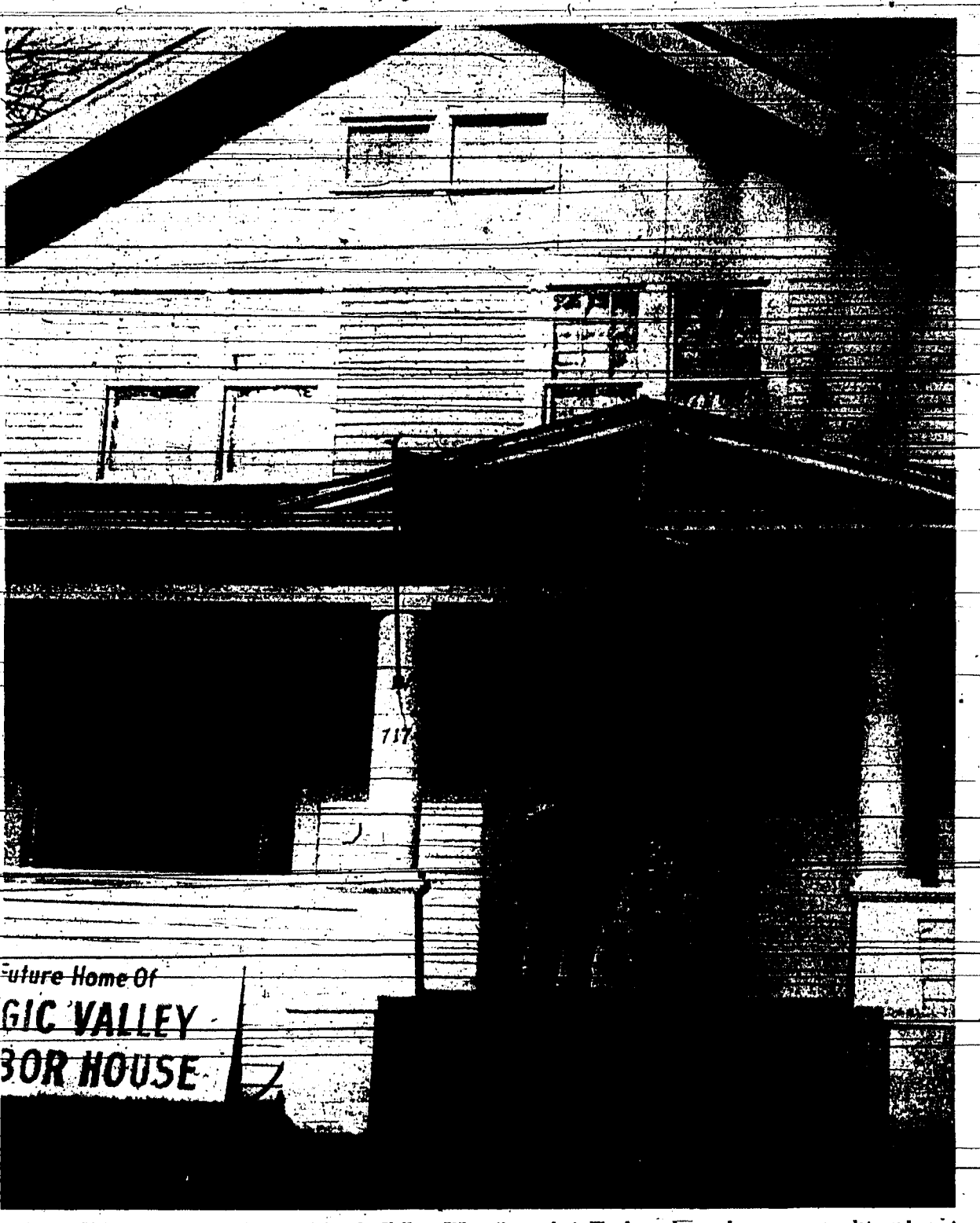
Figures showing reported elk kills in a dozen back country units give some idea of the quality hunting to be found. For example, hunter success there is nearly twice as good as it is in the rest of the state. But the number of hunters per square mile is so thin the actual elk harvest is small by comparison.

In an effort to get enough deer and elk cropping to prevent range damage in deep primitive areas canyons such as the Middle Fork, multiple deer seasons are established as hunter incentives in addition to long open seasons. Every animal removed for the food locker is all go to the good.

Idaho residents generally make up anywhere from 75 percent to 90 percent of hunting pressure in most units. Few of them hire outfitters and guides.

Most nonresident hunters hire guides because it improves their chances for success. Most hunters appear unwilling or unable to go where they cannot drive a vehicle of some kind. Most of them do not plan to take enough time, especially for elk.

The elk is a true wilderness animal. The greatest trophies, and the most spectacular hunts, usually are to be had by men and women who are willing and able to go into the wild, empty back country. This is of the stuff that dreams are made. Going after elk in this way gives the best chances of bagging one of North America's finest trophies and enjoying some of the world's most magnificent wilderness grandeur.

I possible to find this coin in circulation — but since the recent surge in coin-collecting, there are not many Buffalo Nickels in circulation any more. Head-Cent is not scarce. San Francisco produced some 35 million of this issue, and current prices on the coin range from a few cents to forty-five cents in very fine condition. Uncirculated, the coin would bring a couple of dollars.

From D. R. P. Twin Falls, Idaho: What is a "three-legged Buffalo nickel? I have heard about this for years and understand they are worth a good deal of money, but I do not know what they look like. Is this a real coin? What is its value?

Answer: The coin you refer to was minted in 1937 at the Denver Mint. This is another of the controversial coins, since it is not definitely known whether it was made especially as an error or the result of a filled die. The coin appears with one of the front legs missing from the Buffalo on the reverse side of the coin, and is quite difficult to obtain in uncirculated condition. There is a rumor that one particular person controlled a great many of these for a number of years and made a good living from them, but this has not been confirmed. When it first started to sell, the coin could be purchased for a few dollars, since it was considered a mint error, and the collectors of this kind of thing were not many. Of recent years, dealers have seemingly convinced a great number of people that mint errors are worth a lot of money.

Therefore prices have climbed rapidly on these "mistake" coins. The coin brings from about \$15.00 up to about \$30.00 from good to extremely fine grades — and can be bought quite readily from dealers. Up

condition, unless it is brand new (uncirculated), in which case the price is around \$20.00. One real rarity of this series is the 1873-S, struck without arrows at the date. Although the mint confirms some 5,000 of these coins were made, none is known today in any collection, and consequently would bring whatever price was asked for it. A figure in the neighborhood of \$25,000 would be a good guess for this coin — and it possibly would bring more. Most of the Seated Liberty Half-Dollars can be obtained quite readily from dealers.

## It's Been A Long Time Coming But Twin Falls Has Reached An Important Goal

Several years of research, hard work and much community support have resulted in a success story for Harbor House of Magic Valley.

The home, a large two story building at 717 Shoshone St. N., is now a community asset and is already providing much needed shelter for temporarily homeless children.

Its official public showing is scheduled for today from noon to 4 p.m. after which it will resume a normal routine operation.

Several years ago a group of members of the Presbyterian Church were made aware of the lack of such a facility in Twin Falls. There was no place for children of a mildly delinquent nature, or those abandoned or left homeless through some emergency.

By 1966 this group had grown in size and interest and the members were ready to meet with County Commissioners to see if funds could be made available to finance such a facility. Realizing the need, county officials granted \$13,500 for the first year to help launch the project. Obstacles were great and the committee was unable to obtain a home for their use. As a result, they volunteered the transfer of their \$13,500 budget to the day center for retarded children hoping this worthwhile program could be established and expanded to include a Harbor House facility.

As this project developed it became evident it would be a long time before a Harbor House program could be added.

As a result the committee for Harbor House again went to the county and was granted \$8,500 for part of 1969 in the hope they could have the facility in initial stages within a few months.

Locating a suitable house still presented problems and several were inspected, priced and found inadequate or too expensive.

Finally the old Clark home was offered at a reasonable rental and a lease was signed. At first the old building, dirty and vacant, seemed to present an impossible problem.

Members of the Harbor House board rolled up their sleeves and went to work. They called on many civic organizations, youth groups and individuals who offered countless hours of time and donated everything from paint for the walls to wall paintings, furniture and bedding.

In October of this year the house parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. W. Schiffer, Filer, moved into the partly completed building and lived with the smell of paint, carpet crews, electricians and volunteer workers going in and out at all hours for weeks.

By the end of the month the facility was ready to receive its first young residents.

At present there are facilities to house up to 10 youngsters at one time, which board members feel will be adequate for several years.

Richard Reed, currently chairman of the Harbor House Board of directors, said the facility is a vital part of the community's program to juvenile inmates.

Children housed in the home will be placed there under approval of the probate court and will include those who come to the attention of any agencies or authorities in the area. Included will be those neglected or abandoned by their parents or those of a delinquent nature who are awaiting action by Probate Court.

"While some of the youngsters in the home will be delinquent," Mr. Reed said, "those of aggressive nature will be housed elsewhere."

Children will be segregated according to sex and age. There is a nursery for the very small youngsters, two bedrooms upstairs for older children, two lounge-type rooms where they may study, watch television or just relax.

Mr. Reed, former Probate Judge, noted the home will operate under the direction of the Twin Falls County Probate Court and the judge will determine the admission and release of the children.

Actual policies and procedures of the home's operation will be determined by the board of directors. House parents are responsible for the supervision, care and control of the youngsters in the home.

There will still be private homes in the community used for long-term foster home care for some youngsters who cannot be returned to their own homes. Those in Harbor House will be staying usually a matter of a few days or weeks at the most.

More than 150 persons, individuals and organizations have assisted with the achievement of a Harbor House of Magic Valley. Many will continue to donate food items, entertainment, clothing and money to the project.

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# Magic Valley Stallion Makes His Second Atlantic Ocean Crossing

Ten years ago a small roan Welsh pony was imported to Magic Valley from his native Wales to help re-establish many of the original characteristics of his breed for Welsh breeding stables of this country.

It was the feeling of at least one Welsh breeder, Mrs. Addison (Bonnie) Parker that the best way to return some of these lost characteristics was to go to England and select stallions and mares with the best Welsh type characteristics she could find.

Treharne Reuben, she felt answered all of her requirements, and he, along with some 35 other Welsh also selected from outstanding breeders in England, were imported for a number of interested breeders.

Now at 13 horse-years-old, Reuben has pretty well accomplished what he was chosen to do. And so, with more than a little reluctance, his owner yielded to the insistence of English breeders and decided it was time for him to return to England.

This week Reuben climbed aboard a special horse van and headed for New York. At Kennedy Airport he was scheduled to board a jet for his return trip to England.

His proud owners say he is leaving some outstanding young mares and stallions in Welsh herds in this country who will carry on the improvement of the breed.

The reason for his transatlantic flight can probably be traced to the only colt he sired before leaving England.

This stallion, Treharne Tomboy, last year became the only pony ever to win the Supreme In-Hand Championship honor, the famed Fredericks Trophy in the horse show of the Year in England. Again in 1969 the Welsh pony won the same honor and Welsh breeders began urging Mrs. Parker to let them return the sire of the outstanding pony to England to expand this breeding program.

His off-spring in this country have also won grand championship awards in competition in many states as has Reuben himself. Their awards have been under saddle as well as at halter.

Although his owners have not kept records, the little roan stallion, standing approximately 12 hands high and judged in Section A competition, is one of the few, probably the only Welsh pony to be exported from this country to Wales and possibly the only stallion with championship offspring on both sides of the Atlantic.

An unusual and much-sought-after characteristic of Reuben, says Mrs. Parker, has been his ability to produce off-spring equal to or better than himself.

Even with only a relatively good mare and at times with a poor mare his colts and fillies have shown fine qualities and outstanding conformation.

During his 10 years in Twin Falls and Jerome counties, he has also been loaned to breeders in other states for several seasons and his descendants are now winning championships in competition in several parts of the country.

Reuben will make his future home with Mrs. E. Reynolds, Sussex, England, who lives near the small town where he was foaled.

Mrs. Parker, long active in the Welsh Pony Society of America, is now a director and area representative on the national board for the western states.

She is continuing her Welsh breeding program on a somewhat smaller scale and will retain many of Reuben's leading off-spring as a foundation.

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## Sen. Church Doubts Need Of Continuing Vietnam Support

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## Early Day Mine Proves Richer In History Than Valuable Ore

HAILEY—One of the richest and most famous mines of the early days in Broadford is no longer living up to expectations of modern day "prospectors."

In the annual report, just issued by the Silver Star-Queens Mines, Inc., officers state their diamond drilling program has apparently located the famed Minnie Moore vein beyond the fault, but as yet no ore has been located.

It is mineralized where intersected by the drilling which has been suspended and an evaluation of the results is now being made.

During 1968 production from the Silver Star-Queens Mine at Broadford was approximately 24,000 tons of ore, averaging 7.3 ounces of silver, six per cent lead and three per cent zinc. The mine produced 180,000 ounces of silver during the year and averaged 92 tons of ore per day which is well below the average of recent years.

The annual report shows the decline in output in 1968 was due to the fact ore above the 700-foot level of the mine is being depleted. An accelerated exploration program last year discovered some excellent ore below the 700-foot level which continued down to about 900 feet where a fault was encountered.

No ore was found below the fault.

"The past year has been one of high hopes and disappointments with regard to mining operations at our Bellevue Mine," the report states. "Even as recently as last year Federal Resources was seriously considering sinking a new shaft at the mine to allow for easier and faster handling of the excellent ore being taken on the 800 and 900 foot levels."

"It is very unfortunate and very surprising to both Silver Star and Federal Resources," the report continued, "that it has been so difficult to find and develop additional ore reserves at the mine's deeper levels."

While the final chapter has not been written at Bellevue, mine officials say, they are no longer hopeful the joint venture with Federal Resources will offer a source of income in the future.

The report, with the same outlook as the early day prospector, indicates another drilling program will begin soon to explore the Gray Cooper, Telegraph and Singlettery veins in the area between the production zones of the Minnie Moore vein and the Queen Vein system.

It is hoped by businessmen of the local area and men who have worked in the mine the past several years that such drilling programs will result in more rich ore. There were about 200 persons on the mine payroll during peak production.

The Minnie, since she was first located Sept. 22, 1880, has been an "onery cuss," said one early day miner.

"She produced lead and silver ore of greater value than any other mine in the district until 1889, with gross smelter returns of \$2,316,600.12 then it all ended suddenly," the miner recalls.

The late George A. McLeod, in his history of Alturas and Blaine Counties told of the Minnie Moore mine history.

"During the period from 1902 to 1906, mining operations below the old 900 foot level yielded about \$1,100,000 net smelter returns. A small stope on the Singlettery vein above the 1,000 foot level yielded \$31,000 net smelter returns," the McLeod account states.

Walter Campbell, project manager for Federal Resources now operating the Queens Mine said there is now a crew of about 55 men working, the minimum number necessary to keep the mine open.

## Scribe Advises Effort To Curb Breathing In Order To Reduce Air-Pollution Damage

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Reports submitted to the American Public Health Association last week provide new evidence that air pollution causes respiratory ailments and other maladies that sometimes prove fatal.

Maybe there are still some skeptics around, but I personally am now convinced beyond all doubt that breathing is hazardous to your health.

If such statistics were available, they probably would show that the rate of respiratory ailments among heavy breathers is 100 per cent greater than it is among nonbreathers.

Okay, then, why not quit breathing? Well, dear boy, that is easier said than done. For most people, it is almost as hard to quit breathing as it is to quit smoking.

Breathing has become such a habit with most of us that abstaining probably would do more harm than good. People who quit breathing often become nervous and irritable, and may have other adverse reactions.

In other words, the side effects of not breathing may do more damage than the pollutants we inhale. So it is

doubtful you will be able to refrain from breathing.

If you exercise a little will power, however, you can cut down on your breathing. And it stands to reason that a light breather runs less risk than someone who is a chain breather.

regular intervals with the aim of working up to the point where you are only breathing after meals. Anyone who does that will be a long way toward having the problem licked.

These exercises are designed to strengthen the muscles of your nose so that you can keep one nostril closed, thus decreasing the amount of air that reaches the lungs.

# Hope Is Something Jerome Women Have Plenty Of

JEROME — When the ordinary housewife becomes aware of the needs of others and sets out to use her time, talent, and the closets and drawers full of the things she has saved for years, it is remarkable what they can accomplish.

Jerome has such a group of housewives and volunteers. Webster says hope is "a feeling that what is wanted will happen," but many people in the Jerome area would define it as help given freely and kindly when things look most dismal. In Jerome hope is spelled with capital letters, H.O.P.E., and signifies "Help Other People Everywhere."

Now beginning its second year of operation, H.O.P.E. has provided a myriad of goods and services to people of the area, as well as such far flung places as Vietnam, Fort Hall, and the Rupert Youth Ranch.

An article in a national farm publication, and a letter from a Jerome boy serving as a VISTA volunteer, served to promote interest among local women in forming some sort of group.

This group could, through cooperative efforts, supply some of the needs that individual women or groups were unable to take care of.

Formed in the summer of 1968, the group's first concern was with the plight of the migrant worker. Several successful drives for clothing and bedding were held, and visits made to the camp near Jerome to determine the needs of the people.

H.O.P.E. members, enrolled children from the labor camp in the first Headstart program held in Jerome, and returned again to the camp to explain the medical and dental care available through this program.

When the weather became hot, "operation swim suit" provided suits for all the children at the camp, and permission was obtained from the city council to allow these children to swim free of charge. Volunteers transported the children to the pool, supervised their activities while there, and provided treats before returning them to their homes.

Before the families left the camp, H.O.P.E. sponsored a farewell party, with local families assigned to bring cake and ice cream to migrant families, and in the process to become acquainted with them, and see the camp first hand.

In the fall, a Jerome professional man donated an empty service station on Main street to be used as H.O.P.E. headquarters. Here are stored emergency food supplies, good used clothing, bedding, dishes, and small household items donated

by area residents. The center is open every afternoon except Sunday. It is staffed by volunteers who sort, mend, and repair clothing. Anyone needing anything is helped and a donation being suggested if people ask what they can do to help.

Some of the volunteers are women who have been helped by H.O.P.E. and return to donate their services to others. Young people in the area have been most helpful, especially the Jerome High School Key Club. These boys have provided music power when boxes are being readied for shipment, or when furniture items are located and transferred to homes where they are needed.

Several families who have lost their possessions due to fire have been helped by H.O.P.E.—with men of the community donating efforts to move furniture and large items collected by H.O.P.E. Food has been provided for many families, as well as fuel oil and medicine. Transportation to the doctor has been provided by volunteers, and on several occasions emergency baby sitting has been provided when a mother needed hospital care.

Several truck loads of clothing have been taken to Fort Hall and warm coats and good used clothing for boys has been taken to the youth ranch. Children's clothing as well as soap, school supplies, and toilet articles were sent to Vietnam last winter. Many of these items were donated by local school children.

Christmas last year found the volunteers at H.O.P.E. collecting dolls and toys to be repaired for distribution.

A doll show was held in December, under the direction of Mrs. Lyons Smith, and a puppet show, under the leadership of Mrs. R. I. Reichard, both involved the cooperation of children and adults in the community and raised a large sum of money which was donated to the state school at Gooding for needed equipment.

Christmas also brought a plea for "Christmas dresses" for needy girls, which was met by community women. Beta Sigma Phi provided cash for the purchase of boy's slacks. A huge pile of boxes was gathered under the tree in the H.O.P.E. building, with the names of boys at the youth ranch on them. Local families took a boy's name, shopped for items his size, provided home made goodies, and other personal items, then delivered them to H.O.P.E. for transportation to the ranch. At this time the organization, with Mrs. Ed Stockton acting as president, was declared a tax exempt organization, so was able to accept donations as a charitable organization. # Trade Welfare Check For Salary Check Says Handicapped Electrical Repairman

Just a year ago Marion LaVern Mahan, 31, 875 Flier Ave., was living on Social Security Administration and Department of Public Assistance payments and supporting his family with no other income.

Now, thanks to encouragement and help from the Vocational Rehabilitation Service, College of Southern Idaho vocational courses and a lot of hard work and determination, he is making his own way.

LaVern had the unusual misfortune to have suffered a paralytic stroke when he was only 20 years of age.

"My doctor said I was the youngest person he had ever treated for stroke," says the now 31 year old man.

It was a long hard road to recovery, and as pointed out by rehabilitation counselor Tom Moreland, the man became very discouraged and many times was tempted to go the way most others would have — become permanently dependent upon welfare agencies.

Instead, LaVern began trying one job and then another. In 1957, a year after the first stroke, he suffered another. Surgery later that year removed a dangerous clot and he began another struggle toward recovery.

Since 1957 he, his wife and their two children had been receiving DPA checks but the amount was limited and it was difficult to meet expenses.

Last year under a change in

the Social Security laws Mr. Mahan was able to augment his income with a small monthly check from this agency.

Mr. Mahan attended two semesters at CSI to become an electrical appliance repair expert and to gain knowledge of air conditioning and refrigeration.

As a result, he is now earning his own living and supporting his family with a repair shop in the rear of the Western Auto store in Buhl. Although he is working partly on a base salary and partly on a commission, Mr. Mahan says so far he has been able to make more than his welfare checks were and is no longer receiving any welfare payments. In the near future the Social Security will also stop if his new job works out well.

"What I need now," he says, "is tools."

With some help from the Rehabilitation Service he hopes to obtain these, at least a few at a time, so he can handle the more complicated repair jobs.

Already, says his boss, Kenneth Jones, he has been able to repair a number of stoves and refrigerators that would have landed in the dump but are now offered for sale as good used appliances.

Mr. Mahan says it is a good field as repair services, especially by trained workers, are in demand. Unlike many modern day professionals, Mr. Mahan will also call at homes to repair large appliances and he

has a small shop in his home where he does some additional repair work on small appliances.

Dale Davis, Social Security Administration and Mr. Moreland say the story of Mr. Mahan's experience and rehabilitation is one of the things that makes their work worthwhile.

"For every LaVern Mahan there are many others who give up or do not have the ability and courage to face their handicaps and after months of work with them they let us down," Mr. Moreland said.

Although both agencies are still standing by with help when needed the two officials say they feel Mr. Mahan can now make it on his own. His wife is currently attending classes at CSI and will also be able to help with the family income.

Mr. Mahan said his entire outlook has changed now that he is able to take home a salary check instead of a welfare check and he would encourage others to take vocational training or whatever other steps are necessary for rehabilitation.

Mr. Moreland said he works continuously with employers to obtain job opportunities for handicapped persons and finds most business owners willing to give handicapped persons a chance.

"Because these people want jobs and know their abilities are limited, they will try much

harder than other workers and usually stay with their jobs for longer periods," Mr. Moreland said.

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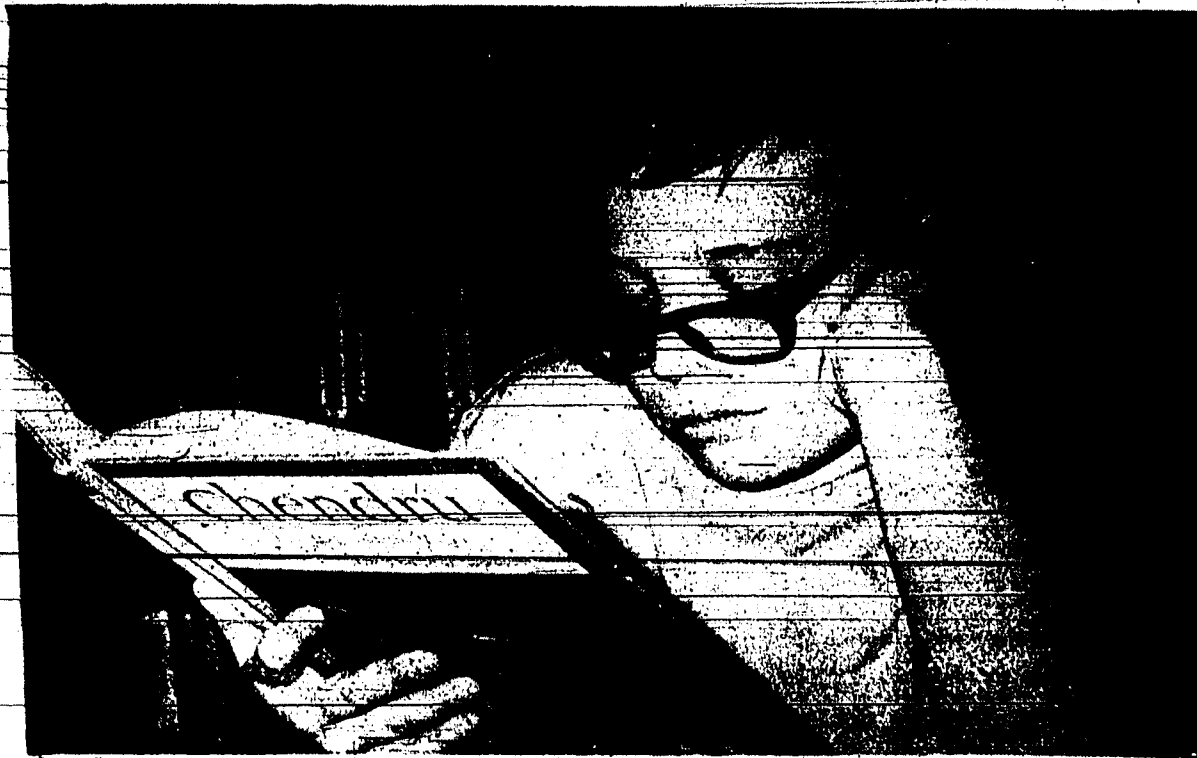

## Children Should Share Toys, Books, But Not Colds

Children should share their toys and books with others — but not during the acute stages of a cold, a public health physician advises.

To help prevent the spread of the common cold, the physician also recommends that cold victims (including young children) be taught to cover nose and mouth when sneezing or coughing, and to use paper tissues for the collection of discharges. The tissues should be deposited in a paper bag, and disposed of by burning or flushing away.

Because of the role of hands in the transfer of infection, hands should be washed carefully before meals, and when hands are soiled with nasal discharges. Many physicians recommend an antibacterial skin cleanser such as PhisoHex for this purpose.

"The transfer of infection by the hands is probably of main importance in children playing intimately together," write the physician authors of an article on "The Method of Spread of Virus Infections."

Children's colds usually last longer than those of adults, and should not be neglected. A painful and potentially dangerous

complication, otitis media, could develop. This is an infection of the middle ear chamber. Mucus clogs the eustachian tubes, which germs can become trapped and cause infection. Mild decongestant nose drops in pediatric strengths.

Mild decongestant nose drops in pediatric strengths such as NeoSynephrine (most often recommended) are used to ease congestion, and to keep nasal and sinus passages open. A physician should be consulted whenever fever is present, or cold symptoms linger.

Although "sharing" of possessions during acute stages of a cold is frowned upon by medical authorities, children apparently insist on sharing — at least their cold virus. According to a booklet entitled, "Cold Facts," every year 100 children under the age of 6 "share" 163 colds, and until they are 18, they will "share" 95 colds each year — and that's a fact!

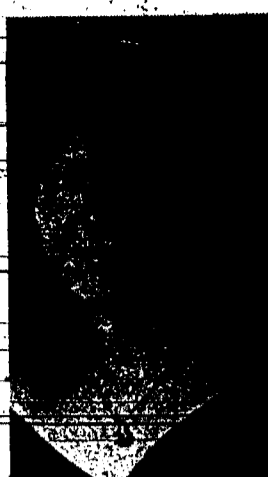

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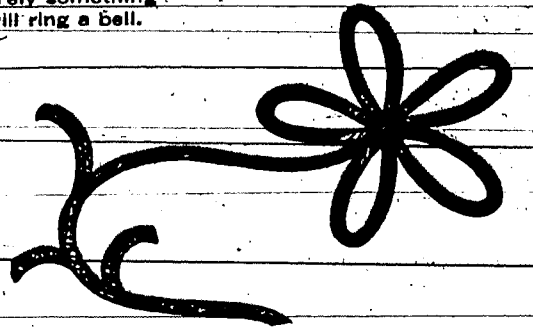

should respond with a weak two-heart overcall or a Jacoby transfer of two diamonds (if playing that convention). However, we really can't charge East. In most games, a response to no-trump is not taken as a stop-bid and the last thing East wants is to encourage his partner to bid again.

The next mistake in the bidding was South's jump to four spades. He had no reason to expect to have a play for it. West could have insured defeat of the contract by shifting to ace and another spade when his king of clubs held but West failed to find this defense, whereupon South should have justified his overbid and romped home.

However, South made the final mistake when he ruffed the third diamond high. He decided that diamonds were going to divide 5-2 and trumps 2-2 or that the nine of trumps would be a singleton. He should really have ruffed low and gambled on a 4-3 diamond break.

# The Path of Scouting Leads to Outer Space

Five out of six of our spacemen were Boy Scouts—notably Neil Armstrong who learned to face emergencies with his boyhood Wolf patrol!

**T**HE SCOUTMASTERS laid out the trail through a strange section of the woods, and several patrols of young Scouts, one at a time, were sent into the woods alone with only their maps and compasses to guide them back to camp.

Only Wolf patrol made it, and they made it with so much time to spare that they went back into the woods again to help find members of the other patrols who had all become hopelessly lost.

This obscure incident occurred in the early 1940s near Upper Sandusky, Ohio, and its significance is that one of the members of the successful patrol was a sharp-eyed, moon-faced 12-year-old boy who was later to find his way over the greatest unknown trail in the history of mankind. His name—Neil Armstrong.

One of the most surprising findings in studying the biographies of America's astronauts is the number of them who are former Scouts. No less than five out of six of them once wore the Scout uniform, learned the principles that were to guide them through life, did the things that were to teach them to stand on their own, and studied the books that would give them the specialized knowledge that was to become so important to them later.

All three of the crew members in both Apollo 12 and 13, and two of the three in Apollo 14, are former Scouts—eight out of nine.

Perhaps it's not so surprising at all. Scouting, with its emphasis on discovery and learning, from books and from nature, with its development of character, and with its teaching of self-reliance and leadership, may indeed be the road to outer space.

Edwin (Buzz) Aldrin, Armstrong's companion on the moon, has said of Scouting, "We were motivated to be better than average. We were not content with average achievement or mediocre accomplishments."

Astronaut William Anders adds, "Scouting puts a boy in an environment where, with some guidance, he has to think and do for himself. He learns to adjust to situations and challenges."

But perhaps the best example of how Scouting has contributed to our space program is a study of Neil Armstrong's life in the movement. The beginnings were natural enough. Neil's father, Stephen Armstrong, was one of the founders and assistant scoutmaster of Troop 25 in Upper Sandusky, where the family was then living, and he encouraged Neil's participation. Actually, little encouragement was necessary. Young Armstrong took to it naturally, and it brought out the best in him.

What his fellow Scouts of those days recall most was Armstrong's competitiveness. It was probably forced on him because he was always thrown in with older boys. There are two versions of how this happened.

Dr. K. K. (Kocho) Solacoff, a member of Wolf patrol and one of Armstrong's best friends, recalls, "His family moved to a new town, and Neil walked into the wrong classroom on his first day of school. He was in it six weeks, getting straight As, before they discovered he was a grade too high. So they left him there."

His father denies it. "Neil was reading fifth-grade books in second grade, so the teachers thought he should be moved up a few grades. I only allowed one."

In either case, Neil did skip a grade and from then on he was always competing against boys at least a year older than he and bigger than he. It sharpened his competitive instincts, especially in the Scouts, when he was going after merit badges, learning to read maps, doing the Morse code, swimming, exploring, surviving in the woods, and, of course, learning all about aviation.

"Neil was far ahead of all of us in aviation," Dr. Solacoff remembers. "World War II was on then, and we were all interested in airplanes, but we'd just buy model kits of existing airplanes. Neil would design his own airplanes, futuristic designs with swept-back wings, tricycle landing gears, and bubble canopies that didn't exist then. He'd carve them out and put them together from raw wood.

"I'm convinced he got the moon assignment because he not only has a fine mind, but he's great with his hands. And he got great working for a merit badge in aviation."

Scouts are also taught to be thrifty. Armstrong was working at part-time jobs from the time he was old enough. His father says his first job was mowing the grass in a cemetery with a hand mower, at 10 cents an hour. He later moved on to handyman jobs in a grocery store, a drugstore, and a hardware store, and he used the money to buy materials for his model airplanes and later for his actual flying lessons.

Another troop member, Bob Gustafson, now a high-school teacher in Springfield, Ohio, says, "I remember once Neil actually talked about buying an airplane, and wrote away to the Government asking about war surplus planes. There were some available, but Neil didn't have enough money to pay the shipping cost."

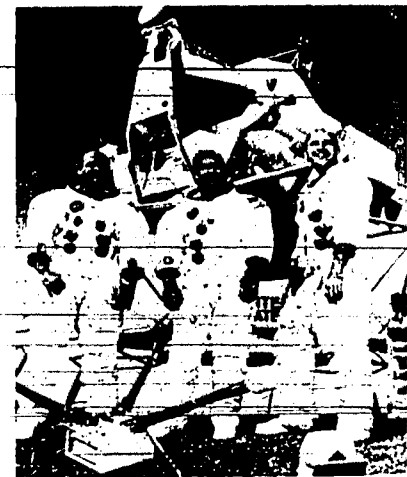
Stan Maxon, his Scoutmaster, relates the time that Armstrong met his first genuine emergency, something he was to meet again in his flying and space careers.

"Four of the Scouts were coming home from camp when a small airplane, apparently simulating emergency landings, came in low over a

field, accidentally hit some hidden power lines, and crashed. The Scouts were the first ones on the scene. Three of them went to the aid of the instructor, who had been in the back seat and was wandering around in a daze.

"Neil rushed to the aircraft where the student pilot, who was in the front seat and had absorbed most of the impact, was still strapped in. He did everything his first-aid course had told him to do, but it was no use. The boy died."

It was the first real view for Neil of the dangers of flying, but obviously the tragedy didn't affect him. Within a year or two he took up fly-

ing lessons himself at the same airport where the crashed plane was based. And the rest is history.

"The Scouts taught Neil to be self-reliant, to have confidence in his own abilities," is the way another member of the old Wolf patrol, John (Bud) Blackford, put it. "They reinforced the character-building he was already getting at home, but they also put him in physical situations where his own abilities were put to the test.

"I think the Scouts can take a lot of credit for Neil Armstrong." And for most other astronauts, too. ♦

Several leading American clergymen—Protestant, Roman Catholic, and Jewish—were asked to answer this thought-provoking question, for *Family Weekly*. Their answers are presented as a prelude to National Bible Week, Nov. 23-30, sponsored by the Laymen's National Bible Committee, the American Bible Society, and the Catholic Biblical Association of America.

Here are the clergymen's views of principal contemporary problems and their recommendations for applying the Bible to them:

**Dr. Norman Vincent Peale**, minister of Marble Collegiate Church, New York, president of the Reformed Church in America, and author of "The Power of Positive Thinking" and other books.

The most pressing problem confronting our country today is the deterioration of character among our people—old and young. Our problems stem basically from moral laxity. We need to restore the old-fashioned emphasis on character in the making of a strong people and a strong nation.

It is difficult to find many people who really believe in something and

have the courage to stand up against all opposition to defend what they believe. Our young people do not hesitate to stand up and fight as an expression of protest, but many of them assume that their cause is such that they do not have to accept the consequences of their deeds.

Then, we have parents who, at the dinner table, discuss ways to defraud the Government. They say it is all right to cheat on your income tax or speed or go hunting out of season—as long as you can get away with it. Then they wonder what is wrong with the younger generation.

I do not know very many people who have the kind of character we need today, who take action for what they believe in. Parents are afraid of their children. Deans are afraid of their students. Nearly everyone is afraid of militants. Businessmen seem reluctant to take positive or negative stands on anything. While they fear the danger of getting out on a limb, they are also too timid to

a place where they could build their homes, rear their children, and worship their Lord.

The most serious and ultimately tragic problem that faces our nation today lies in our departure from those fundamental principles upon which our country was built.

Today man stands on the brink of the 21st century. He has planted footprints on the moon and has stepped out into space. He sees himself as a citizen of the universe, thrilled but frightened. Simultaneously open to him here on earth are the world of power with its promise and threat, the world of technology, both awesome and awful, and the world of man filled with hope and despair.

Adventurers and optimists might see cause for great hope. But other voices speak of fear, insecurity, frustration, and despair.

To them, the Bible speaks a clear and forthright word: "Fear not!" It is a repeated urging in both the Old Testament and the New. The small steps of a man do indeed create giant leaps for mankind.

Sacred Scripture reminds us time and time again that in our greatest conquest and our most dismal failure, we are in the hands of God. "Fear

not!" He said to Peter when He took bold steps across the waves (Matthew 14:25-33). "Fear not!" He said to the women who took brave steps into His tomb (Matthew 28:1-10).

And to us who stand on the edge of so many new worlds, He says again, "Fear not . . . Stand up! Do not be afraid!" (Matthew 17:5-8).

It is strange that we who are living in an age of tumult, hatred, and violence do not turn more frequently and assiduously to the Bible not only for comfort but for guidance.

The very thought of the transformation that would occur in our present society and in the world at large if everyone made a serious effort to put into practice the age-old dream of "brethren living together in unity"

and of each individual "living in peace under his own vine and fig-tree with none to make him afraid" would be translated into blessed reality if we would "do justly, love mercy, and walk humbly before God."

There are innumerable other passages in the Bible which admonish us not to curse the darkness of our generation but to light a candle. The prophet Joel, for example, spoke of the time when "your old men shall dream dreams and your young men shall see visions."

Why are dreams associated with the old and visions with the young? Because it is the nature of the old to gather up the past and rehash it in their dreams, while the young should think the future and behold visions of a more beautiful future.

The hatred and the violence which have erupted in both our cities and on our college campuses may be traced to the tragic fact that many, but by no means a majority, of our youth—white as well as black—have become so frustrated and heartbroken that they have abandoned a belief in the future. They no longer see visions but only dream nightmares.

What our nation needs above all is hope. What the world needs is hope. Therefore, we must continue to strive for a revival of vision in youth, a revival of a belief that it is worthwhile studying, it is worthwhile building and not destroying; that there will be a future and that it is up to all of us to cooperate and work unitedly.

The most serious problem in our nation and the world today is a three-fold one, which involves the confrontation of rich and poor, the ideological questions posed by Marxist ideology, and the problem of racism. Of these, racism is the most difficult. Economic and ideological systems can be changed relatively easily, but we cannot change skin color.

The churches today are realizing that working for economic and social development is one of their major re-

sponsibilities. But the churches cannot meet the problem alone. It seems to me that unless the American people begin to press business, trade unions, university, and Government leadership to treat poverty as a moral issue, our culture and our nation ultimately will collapse in a deep swamp of greed and crime.

Our motives and means as we struggle against poverty must be seen clearly in contrast to the Communist strategy to the same end. I call upon conservative Americans to support these efforts on their own ground of freedom, lest all of us find ourselves in a world increasingly dominated by tyrannical materialism.

The World Council of Churches recently held an international Consultation on Racism in London, the first

event of its kind in church history. The consultation endorsed the principle of reparations, not advocating any particular group as the recipient. Religious institutions were asked to divest themselves of their excessive material wealth and give a significant portion of it, without control, to organizations of the racially oppressed.

The Biblical passages that I find most applicable here are from Paul in the Revised Standard Version: "He made from one every nation of men to live on all the face of the earth, having determined the allotted periods, and the boundaries of their habitation" (Acts 17:26); "There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither slave nor free, there is neither male nor female; for you are all one in Christ Jesus" (Galatians 3:28).

# What You Can Do to Banish Boredom

*It's not only annoying—it can be dangerous; science, though, has some suggestions to help you put more zip into your life*

**E**VERYONE is bored some of the time; many people are bored a good deal of the time; and some people are bored almost all of the time.

Science has been studying the whys and hows of boredom and come to some conclusions that may help you beat the boredom blues. Take this true-false quiz and learn what the experts learned—and how they suggest replacing tedium with zip.

1. You'll never be bored if you can manage to avoid boring people, boring tasks, and boring surroundings.

2. Boredom may be uncomfortable and annoying, but it isn't dangerous.

3. You can't be both bored and relaxed at the same time.

4. Boredom dulls your wits and slows your reflexes as well.

5. People who are bored find other people dull.

6. The more intelligent you are, the less your job is likely to bore you.

7. People who live dangerously are seldom bored.

8. Boredom is far more fatiguing than hard physical labor.

## ANSWERS

1. **False.** Boredom is frequently the self-generated variety which bores from within and has its roots in one's own personality. This type of boredom is seldom banished by a change of scene or new diversions. People who are bored with themselves can travel around the world and be just as bored as when they started. It takes a change of attitude and outlook to cure this kind of boredom.

2. **False.** Studies show boredom to be a chief motivating factor in various

forms of delinquency and social misconduct, among adults as well as juveniles. This includes the adolescent who gets into trouble because, "I was bored stiff. Nothing to do. So I just went looking for excitement." It also includes the bored wife or

husband who commits indiscretions he or she wouldn't otherwise dream of in an attempt to banish boredom.

3. **True.** Studies conducted by psychiatrist David Harold Fink show that physical and emotional tensions go hand in

hand with boredom. And when a person is acutely bored ("I was simply bored to death!"), tensions build up to the point where his mind, muscles, and nerves are tight as a drum. Boredom, the psychiatrist found, can't exist if you are re-

laxed. Remember this the next time you're bored.

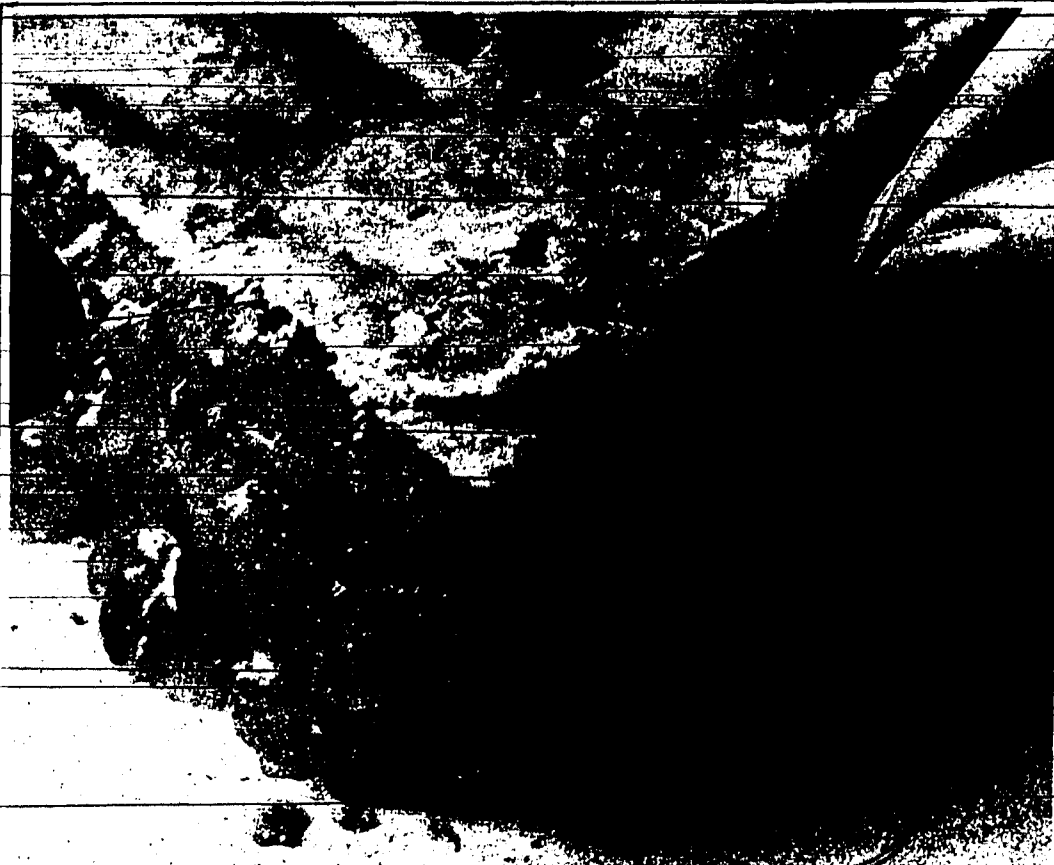
4. **True.** Psychological studies show your ability to think and reason is markedly impaired when you're bored. You'll have greater difficulty solving problems and doing mental work and are much more likely to make mistakes. Slower reflexes and delayed reactions also make you subject to accidents.

5. **False.** As often as not, they find others interesting enough, but usually are bored when they are alone and left to their own resources.

6. **False.** If you've got more brains than your job requires, you're likely to be bored by it. And surveys and studies show that if you don't particularly like your work, you not only will be bored by it, but the odds are you'll never excel at it.

7. **False.** Studies at Columbia University and elsewhere indicate that these people are actually more subject to boredom than the average person. To escape it, they court danger, deliberately place themselves in hazardous situations (such as driving recklessly, engaging in perilous sports such as sky-diving) and find other ways to expose themselves to risks and chance-taking. They are constantly seeking to escape boredom by the kind of thrill-seeking that psychologists have termed "the pursuit of anxiety."

8. **True.** Prof. Daniel O'Connor of Williams College has made an extensive study of boredom. He describes what it feels like to be bored by someone. The symptoms: your attention will not stay fixed; you have a sense of "losing time"; you are usually physically uncomfortable and feel great tension.



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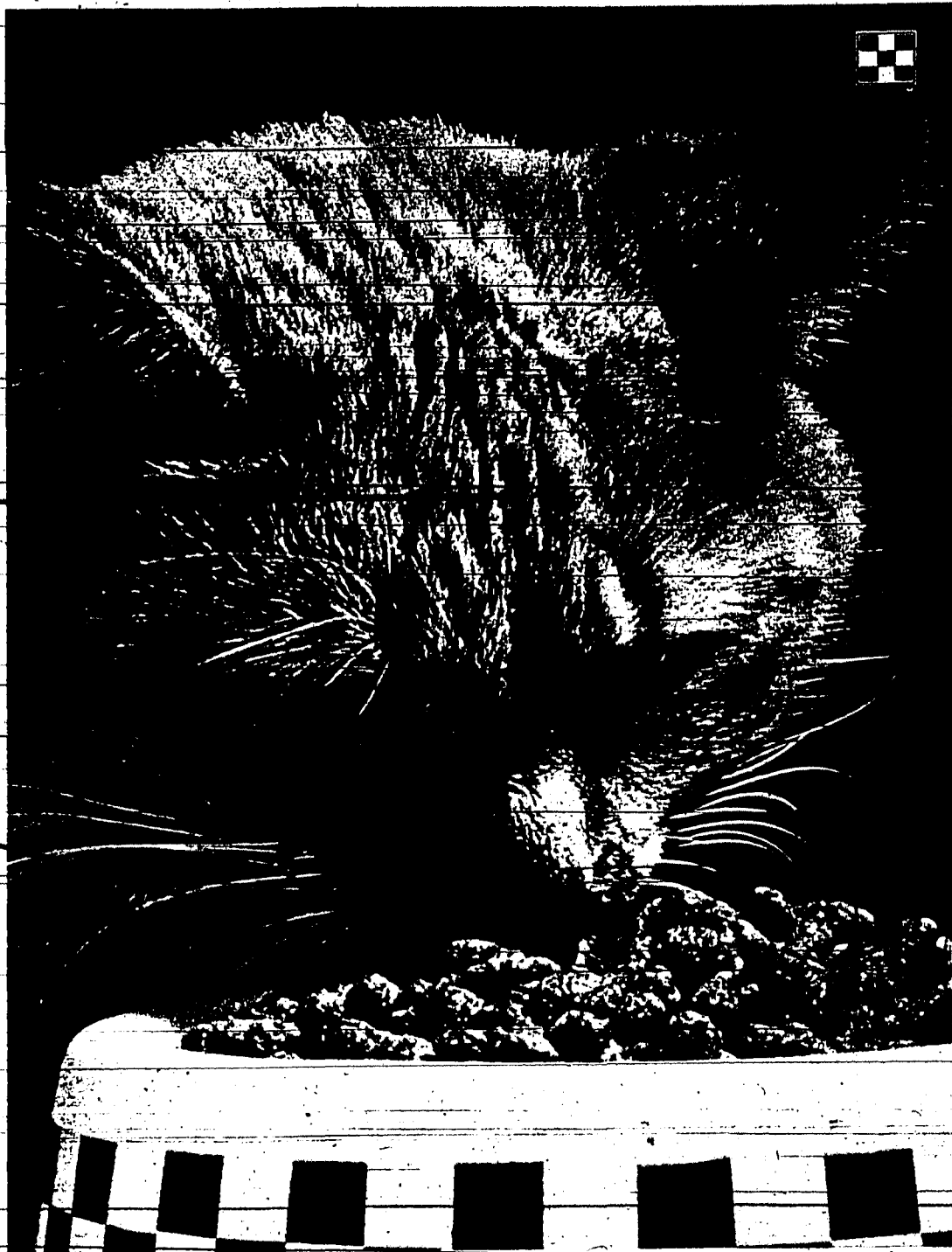
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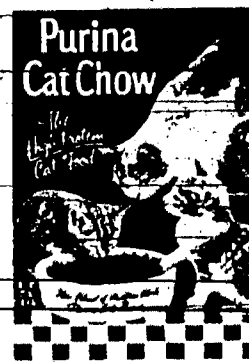
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# What and How to

This is the age when your guidance is most important—not only as to facts but also in the way those facts are presented

“DOCTOR, I don't know what to do! I was cleaning my little girl's closet the other night, and in the back I found books about sex!

“They were the filthiest I have ever seen. I just don't know where she got them!”

The woman talking to me was in the same panic that so many parents are in when I see them. Their little girl was suddenly not so little any more—in this case, 12 years old. And like so many other parents, this woman was unprepared to deal with sex as it confronts children in our world today.

**What did I say to her?**

I told her first to be honest and not to make a big scene or punish the child (for she had done nothing wrong) but to ask her when they were alone what she really thought of the “filthiest” book of the lot.

Of course, if the mother had been more honest with her daughter while she was growing up, these books would not have been hidden in back of the girl's closet. Yet the important point now was that the youngster had probably memorized almost every page of these books and probably some others as well, so the mother would be fooling herself if she thought she could

somehow undo what her daughter had seen and read.

And basically there was nothing wrong with a 12-year-old reading such books. What was crucial was the attitude that the girl took toward perversions described in them, such as lebianism and sodomy. Did she understand that these were perversions? This was what I advised her mother to find out.

If by chance the girl was not disgusted by most of what she read, then she might do the same herself some day. If, unfortunately, this became the case, it no doubt would be because her parents had concentrated too much on *what* they told her and not enough on *how*.

You must know the answers to your pre-teener's questions on sex, of course, for they will come up with some pretty probing questions. Not long ago at the dinner table, Jimmy, the 10-year-old son of one of my friends, casually turned to his parents and said: “Chuck says his parents still make love three times a week. How often do you?”

Does this seem like an outlandish question? Believe me, today many pre-teens are asking such questions (and more provocative ones, too). Don't feel lucky if yours haven't. Because if they don't ask their parents,

they will probably ask someone else, someone who may influence them wrongly.

In this case, my friend realized immediately that he couldn't ignore the question, but *how* he dealt with it was what mattered. Obviously, if the father had given him a specific answer, he'd be opening Pandora's box.

But the boy's father recognized that the underlying reason his son had asked the question was that his friends, and probably their parents, had equated the frequency of intercourse with still being in love. The boy had swallowed this false idea and wanted to know if his parents were still in love.

My friend's answer? “That's a pretty private thing, Jimmy. I wonder how Chuck happened to find out. Do you know?”

Chuck, it turned out, had overheard his parents bragging about their sexual frequency to some other couples after some heavy drinking at their summer home.

Soon after, Jimmy and his father thoroughly discussed the subject so the boy had a better understanding of sex and his friend's parents.

There are several key *what* areas, of course, in which you must be especially prepared if you are to handle the *how* properly. With the boy preschooler, for example, he will ask a question such as, “What is this?”—singling out his or his father's male organ. And the little girl will ask about her own genital parts.

When answering these questions, I prefer to use the proper names for the anatomical parts of the body. It tells the youngster that there is nothing to be ashamed of in discussing the human body.

Once the child begins school, his questions turn from his body parts to processes. The eight-year-old girl may ask her mother how a baby can possibly come out of a woman, having casually seen her mother's genital parts (which should be permitted).

She sees a baby and wonders how something so large can come out through so small an opening.

The answer is that nature has a special way of preparing the mother so the baby is born without injury to either of them.

In the early school years, the child will discover the sexual act itself. In many cases, children have seen animals, such as their own pets, having intercourse.

Naturally they want to know more about it. Here again, the wise parent answers their questions thoroughly while not opening up new areas. Only give a youngster what he is ready for. You can “prepare a child for life” too much.

Once a child learns to read fairly well, be sure you have available in the family library some of the better books dealing with sex. This serves two purposes. First, it is a way of saying that sex is an open subject. Second, when discussions about sex sometimes become difficult (as they will now and then), you can refer the youngster to a certain book for more information.

No family should be without the Kinsey Report. It is as much a part of American education as *The Federalist Papers* and *Moby Dick*. If you bring your child up on D. H. Lawrence or John Updike, you need not fear that he will be attracted by such books, which many mothers find in the back of their children's closets.

By the same token, don't be afraid of having books with four-letter words in your home library. Henry Miller's *Tropic of Cancer* was banned for years because of just a couple of words. Yet every child past the age of seven has heard these words. There are only several of them. Once you've heard them, that's it. Believe me, it's mainly when you make a big thing about matters that you court trouble.

As a child grows into a genuine pre-teener, however, he will try to put together all the knowledge he has in

terms of his own burgeoning feelings and desires. First of all, he will begin to wonder about his own relationship to himself sexually. Masturbation, in other words.

This subject *shouldn't* be a difficult subject to discuss, yet it almost always is because most adults don't even know what the proper attitude is toward it. Very simply, auto-erotism is not dirty, and there is nothing to be guilty about, either in an adult or child.

On the other hand, masturbation does represent more of a young stage of sexual behavior. The adult who has known a deeper way of relating sexually with another person will no longer be satisfied with masturbation.

It should be remembered, of course, that to mature and become an adult, a youth must go through the masturbatory stage before he or she can partake in a mature emotional sexual relationship with the opposite sex.

Once that relationship begins hesitantly to bud, all kinds of questions

will come from pre-teenagers. In my day, when you were 11 or 12, you didn't date. In the Hungary of six decades ago, where I was brought up, dating didn't begin until 16. Even when I came to the United States during the Depression, youngsters seldom began dating before 14.

Today is different, though. Boy-and-girl parties begin at 10, and dating often starts at 11. The girl is soon asking herself whether she should kiss a boy on the first date. The boy is asking himself whether he should try to go farther than a kiss. Nor is it all as simple as that. Today pot and the pill can even enter the picture!

Once these serious questions start, there are two key factors that I would convey to parents.

First, there are no pat answers. In your library, you should also have some good basic books on psychiatry and psychology. And you, as well as your children, should read them because their first message is that the pre-teen is more an individual than

ever before. His response to others and his private needs are much more individual. What is right for one teenager is not necessarily right for another.

The second is to remember that the final year or two of the pre-teen stage is probably the last real chance you'll have to guide your child.

Once a boy or girl becomes a teenager in today's society, the chances are small that he or she will come to the parents to ask such questions as, "Jeanie Johnson goes in for heavy petting. Do you think that's okay?"

Above all, the age just before the teen years is the time to make sure you bring home to your youngsters what I call the "two sides of sex."

They should be guided to know that sex is beautiful but that it also is very natural. Both of these truths have come to be hollow clichés, which is much of what is wrong in our society. We become so sophisticated so young (sometimes without really being knowledgeable) that we fail to

realize what a wonderful gift sex is. Nor is it only a physical endowment. Sex has no real meaning for people without emotions. When a young person is attracted to another, personality and character always play a large part.

The final truth about sex which we must impart to our pre-teenagers is that, in its highest form, sex is the fusion of mind and body. When this is achieved, we no longer refer to what we feel as merely sex.

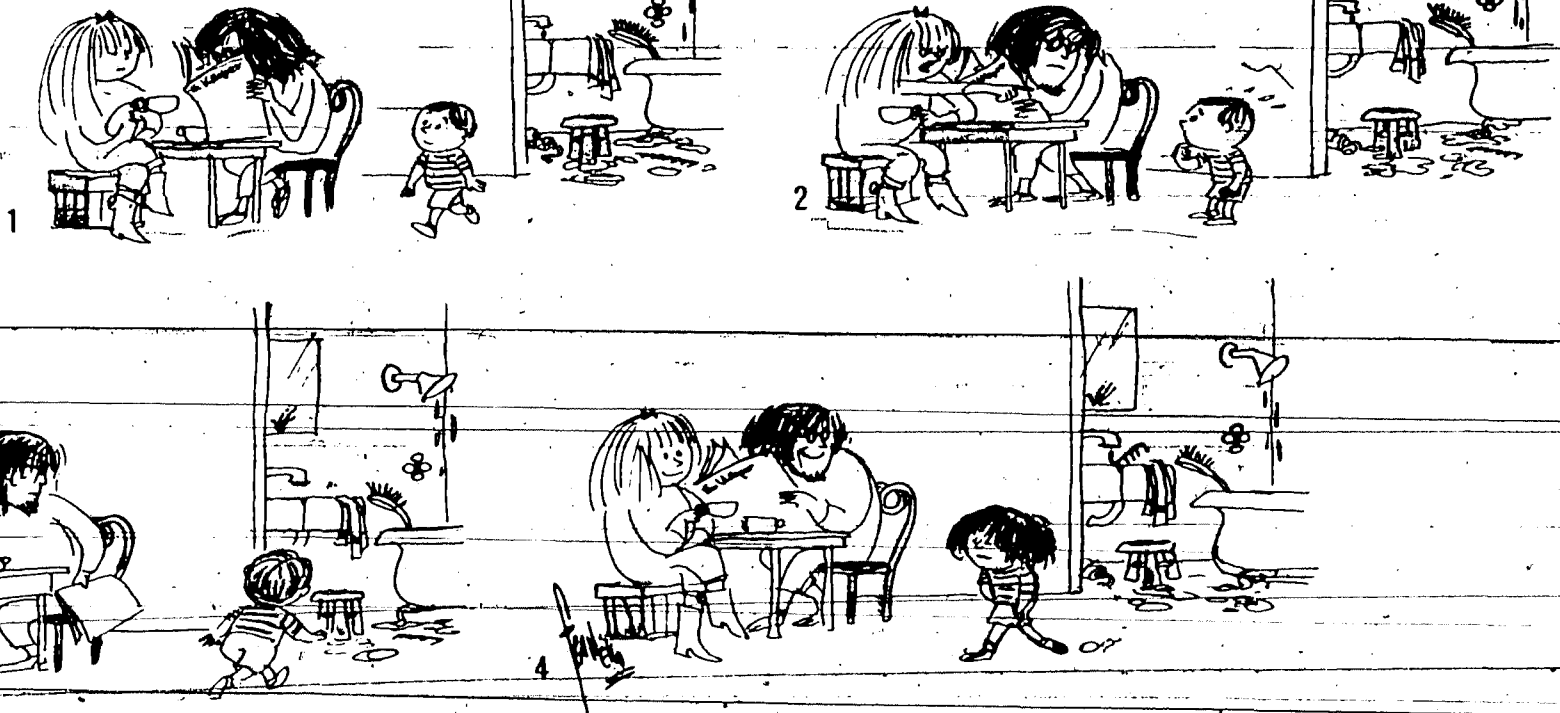

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# America's Great Vacation Surprise—

*Here is a sprawling expanse filled with the coal mines as some travelers believe*

A QUESTION bothered me as I recently prepared to write a book about Appalachia: where, in the region that seemingly epitomizes poverty and abandoned coal mines, would I find a decent place to stay?

Not unexpectedly, I couldn't locate a hotel listed in or near the first remote hamlet in Kentucky that I wanted to visit. So I called Gordon Moore, a friend and lifelong resident of Appalachia, only to have him quip: "You just show up, and we'll have a surprise for you at the local 'lodge'."

The surprise was a pleasant one. The "lodge" turned out to be a new motel-like facility in Jenny Wiley State Park that sat on a scenic, secluded mountain outside Prestonsburg, Ky. My large, bright room cost \$9.50 (\$14 double) and afforded me a spectacular view of lakes, gorges, and forested mountains.

Perhaps the main reason that Appalachia surprises so many vacationists is that few people apparently understand what makes up "Appalachia."

Actually the abandoned coal chutes and dusty mining camps are only a small part of it. The Appalachians are a chain of overlapping mountains that include the Adirondacks, Green, White, Black, Allegheny, Cumberland, Southern, Blue Ridge, and Great Smokies.

Running in width from 35 to 75 miles, the mountains form the 2,050-mile long Appalachian Trail that extends from Mt. Katahdin, Me., to Mt. Oglethorpe, Ga. Not only does Appalachia stretch through parts of Vermont, New Hampshire, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Maryland, North Carolina, Kentucky, Virginia, West Virginia, Tennessee, and Georgia; they also are within an easy drive from much of the East or Midwest.

Few scenic drives, in fact, could be more convenient than through parts of Appalachia. Consider, for example, the Blue Ridge Parkway that begins in Virginia and follows the crest of the southern Appalachians for 355 miles, then winds through valleys for another 114 miles.

The Parkway, designed entirely for sight-seeing, has no commercial traffic or developments. But as you drive through vast national forests, you find innumerable places to park an automobile and either picnic, look over a mountainside, or follow a self-guiding trail (for either 15 miles or hours) through wilderness and fast weathered log cabins, gristmills, split-rail fences, and hogwalls erected by pioneers to keep out wild boar.

Anyone who follows the Blue Ridge Parkway to its end finds himself at the entrance of an instant wonderland: the 800-square mile Great Smoky Mountain National Park that straddles western North Carolina and east Tennessee.

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# Amazing Appalachia

wonders of nature and nation—not just

In driving or walking through the Smokies, you look down from many of the 53 mile-high peaks that frequently offer clear views in all directions.

Views of the lower terrain are even more breathtaking. Naturalists, in identifying at least 3,500 varieties of plant life within the Great Smokies, consider these forests to be the richest and most diverse botanical collection in the U.S. Almost every foot of the ground sparkles (from late March through October) with exotic plants and blooming wild flowers—including some that are six feet high.

Nearly all of this wilderness remains unchanged from the days when Cherokee Indians trekked through them in pursuit of game. Raccoons, fox squirrels, and occasionally ruffed grouse, wild turkeys, boar, deer, and black bear still run around the Smokies' waterfalls and 650 miles of scenic trails.

Even many Cherokees remain—on a 60,000-acre reservation adjoining the North Carolina entrance to the Great Smokies. You can watch the Cherokees demonstrate how they made arrows or dugout canoes, perform in numerous Indian dramas or archery contests, or have them guide you through a meticulous replica of an 18th-century Indian village.

Still, no matter what region of Appalachia that is visited, you can usually find uninhabited forests. As one man told me outside the 5,500-square-mile Adirondack wilderness in New York: "People are talking about running out of living space, but we got a million acres here that ain't even been walked on yet."

While traveling through the Appalachians, vacationists are treated to some of the nation's most significant historical landmarks.

Only a two-hour's drive from the Great Smokies is Cumberland Gap National Park that extends over Kentucky, Tennessee, and Virginia. Here is where American settlers, who had long been confined to the Eastern U.S. by the seemingly unbroken Appalachia wall, found that they could move west. You can peer down upon the huge natural "gap" between the mountains that was discovered in 1750 by Dr. Thomas Walker and five surveyors for the Royal Land Company in Virginia.

Twenty-five years later, Daniel Boone led 30 "axmen" in cutting the Wilderness Road through the mountain pass to a site 208 miles away in Central Kentucky and thereby blazed the historic trail to the West

that was subsequently used by frontiersmen and trappers. Two miles of the "Wilderness Road"—and later Civil War fortifications—are still visible in Cumberland Gap Park.

One of the most advantageous things about the Appalachians is that they probably are closer than many tourists realize. Just study the elongated mountain range on a map of the eastern U.S. and decide what areas you wish to visit. For more detailed information on attractions and facilities, contact either the department of travel and parks in the state or states you wish to visit, or the superintendent of any national park or forest in the area.

A detailed map listing attractions along the Blue Ridge Parkway can be purchased for 15 cents from the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 20402.

Further information on the Appalachian Trail may be obtained from the Appalachian Trail Conference, 1718 N Street, NW, Washington, D.C. 20036.

But even if you plan only a casual drive along an Appalachian parkway, wear or bring shoes and clothing that will enable you to hike.

Many vacationers intend only to see Appalachia from their automobile—and end up hiking past Davy Crockett's boyhood cabin home (in Tennessee) or along the many "lost rivers" (in West Virginia) that disappear into the mountainside. ♦

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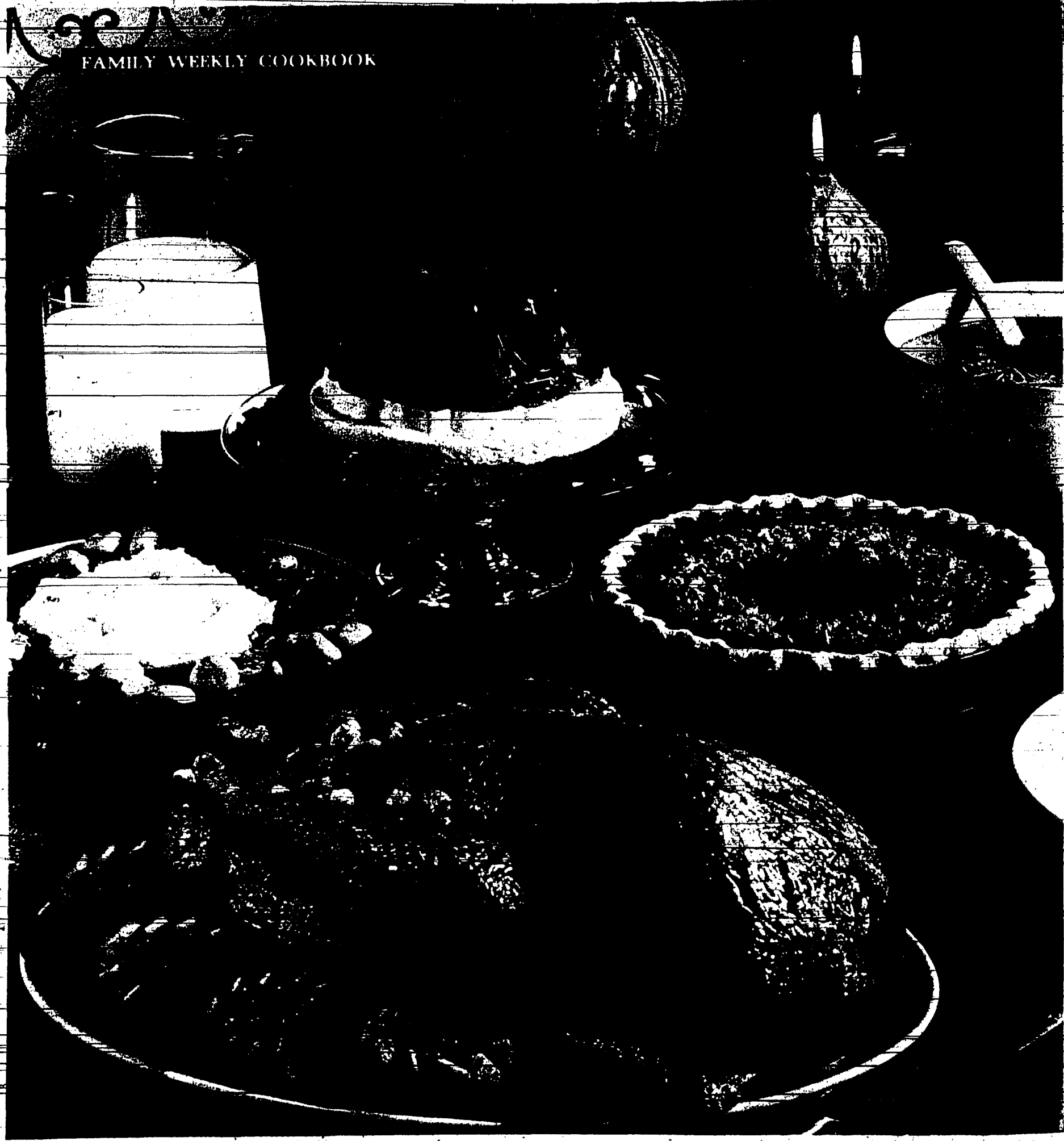

## Hot Madrilene

- 1/2 cup butter
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 2 cans (18 oz. each) tomato juice
- 2 cans (10 1/2 oz. each) beef broth
- 1 bay leaf
- Grated Parmesan cheese
- Parsley (about 1/2 cup snipped)

1. Heat butter in a large saucepan. Add onion, and cook until tender.
2. Blend in tomato juice and beef broth. Add the bay leaf. Heat just

to boiling; reduce heat, and simmer 5 min. Remove bay leaf.

3. Ladle into a soup tureen. Serve with the cheese and parsley.

About 1 1/4 qts. soup

## Butter-Roasted Turkey

Prepare a turkey for stuffing. Rub body and neck cavities with salt. Fill lightly with desired stuffing.

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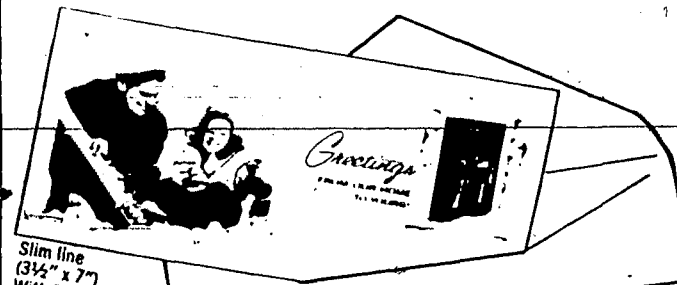

(Extra stuffing may be put into a greased, covered baking dish or wrapped in aluminum foil and baked with turkey the last hour of roasting time.) Fasten neck skin to back with skewer and bring wing tips onto back. Push drumsticks under band of skin at tail, or tie with cord.

Place turkey, breast down, on a foil band\* put crosswise onto a rack in a foil-lined pan. Brush turkey with softened butter. Place in 325°F. oven and roast according to the timetable.

When turkey has roasted for about two-thirds the required time, remove from oven, and turn breast up. Use the foil band to flip turkey first on the side then breast up. Brush breast with softened butter. Insert a roast meat thermometer into the thickest part of the thigh during this final one-third of roasting time.

Crease a large piece of aluminum foil lengthwise to make a tent, and arrange it loosely over bird. Return to oven and continue roasting. The tent keeps turkey moist and prevents overbrowning.

The turkey is done when thermometer registers 180°F.-185°F., or the thickest part of drumstick feels soft when pressed with fingers, and drumstick twirls out of joint easily.

Transfer turkey to serving platter lifting it with the foil band; remove band. Let turkey stand covered with foil tent, for about 30 min. for easier carving; remove tent. Garnish platter with chutney-filled oranges (see photo).

\*To make the band, fold a long piece of heavy-duty aluminum foil lengthwise over and over to make a 3-in. wide band.

## Herbed Corn Bread Stuffing

- 1/2 cup butter
- 1 cup chopped celery
- 1/4 cup chopped onion
- 3 cups herb-seasoned stuffing croutons
- 3 cups corn bread crumbs and pieces
- 1/2 cup seedless raisins
- 1 teaspoon poultry seasoning
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1 can (10 1/2 oz.) condensed beef broth or 1 1/2 cups liquid from cooking giblets

1. Heat butter in a saucepan or skillet. Add celery and onion, and cook until crisp-tender, stirring occasionally.

2. Combine herb-seasoned stuffing croutons, corn bread crumbs and pieces, raisins, and a blend of poultry seasoning and pepper in a large bowl. Toss lightly until mixed.

3. Add the crisp-tender vegetables with butter and toss lightly. Adding gradually, mix in enough broth for desired moistness of the stuffing. *7 cups stuffing*

## Molded Fruit and Cheese Salad

- 1 can (1 lb.) apricot halves, drained
- 1/4 cup apricot syrup
- 1 pkg. (3 oz.) lime-flavored gelatin
- 1 cup boiling water
- 1 cup halved and seeded grapes
- 1/2 cup cold water
- 1 env. unflavored gelatin
- 2 cups cottage cheese
- 1/2 cup crumbled Blue cheese
- 1/2 cup dairy sour cream
- 1/4 cup chopped celery

1. Pour boiling water over flavored gelatin and stir until dissolved; blend in syrup. Chill until partially set; mix in apricots and grapes. Turn into a fancy 7-cup mold, rinsed with cold water; chill just until set.

2. Meanwhile sprinkle unflavored gelatin over cold water in a saucepan. Stir over low heat until gelatin is dissolved. Cool slightly.

3. Beat cottage and Blue cheeses until well blended. Stir in the sour cream and celery, then the dissolved gelatin. Turn into mold over the partially set gelatin layer. Chill until firm, at least 4 hrs. Unmold onto a pedestal plate (see photo). Garnish with salad greens. *8 to 10 servings*

## Golden Whipped Potatoes With Vegetables

Instant-style potatoes, using amount for 8 servings

- 1/4 cup butter
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon onion powder
- 1/2 cup milk, heated
- 1 cup (4 oz.) shredded-Cheddar cheese
- 1/2 cup dairy sour cream
- 2 boil-in-a bag pkgs. (9 oz. each) French-style green beans in butter sauce, cooked as directed on pkg.
- 1 boil-in-a bag pkg. (6 oz.) whole mushrooms in butter sauce, cooked as directed on pkg.
- 1/4 cup chopped onion, cooked in butter until tender

1. Prepare instant-style potatoes as directed on package, adding butter, salt and onion powder to the water in a saucepan. The amount of water will vary with the kind and amount of instant style potatoes used.

2. Bring to boiling. Remove from heat, and add the milk, instant-style potatoes, cheese, and sour cream. Stir until blended, following package directions.

3. Pile potatoes into a serving dish (see photo). Mix beans, mushrooms and onion together, and spoon into dish around the potatoes. *8 servings*

# An Office Made of "Junk"

CARMEN OTTILIO of Totowa, N.J., is in the business of wrecking buildings. But he sees in what he demolishes much intrinsic beauty. Like a housewife who can't throw away a piece of string, Ottilio can't throw away much of what he destroys.

The result is his own building, constructed from salvage over the years. The Ottilio building, however, is a "junk heap" only in name: Ottilio, his own architect, has formed a striking structure that dominates the suburban skyline opposite New York City. Little wonder it is palatial and handsome.

The front doors are the intricately woven iron ones from the Paramount Thea-

ter in New York, built in the era of opulent movie houses; the fountain comes from the Japanese Pavilion at the New York World's Fair, as does the garden, transplanted exactly as it was originally; the spiral staircase was discarded from the mammoth George Washington Bridge.

Exterior stone is from the old Passaic County Jail; marble columns, each 12 tons, from Barnert Memorial Hospital, Paterson, N.J.; electrical circuits are housed in old sea chests which were dredged from the Hudson River.

"Nothing was bought," says Ottilio proudly. "The rug in my office is 28 by 38 feet and so thick it tickles your ankles. It came from one of the stateliest mansions in Tuxedo Park, N.Y. It was a challenge to build this—from what others throw away."

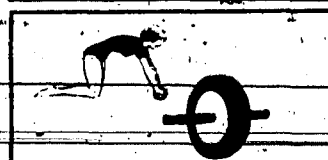
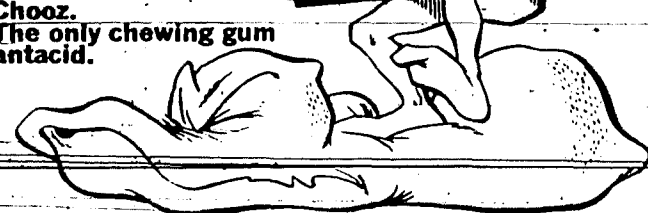

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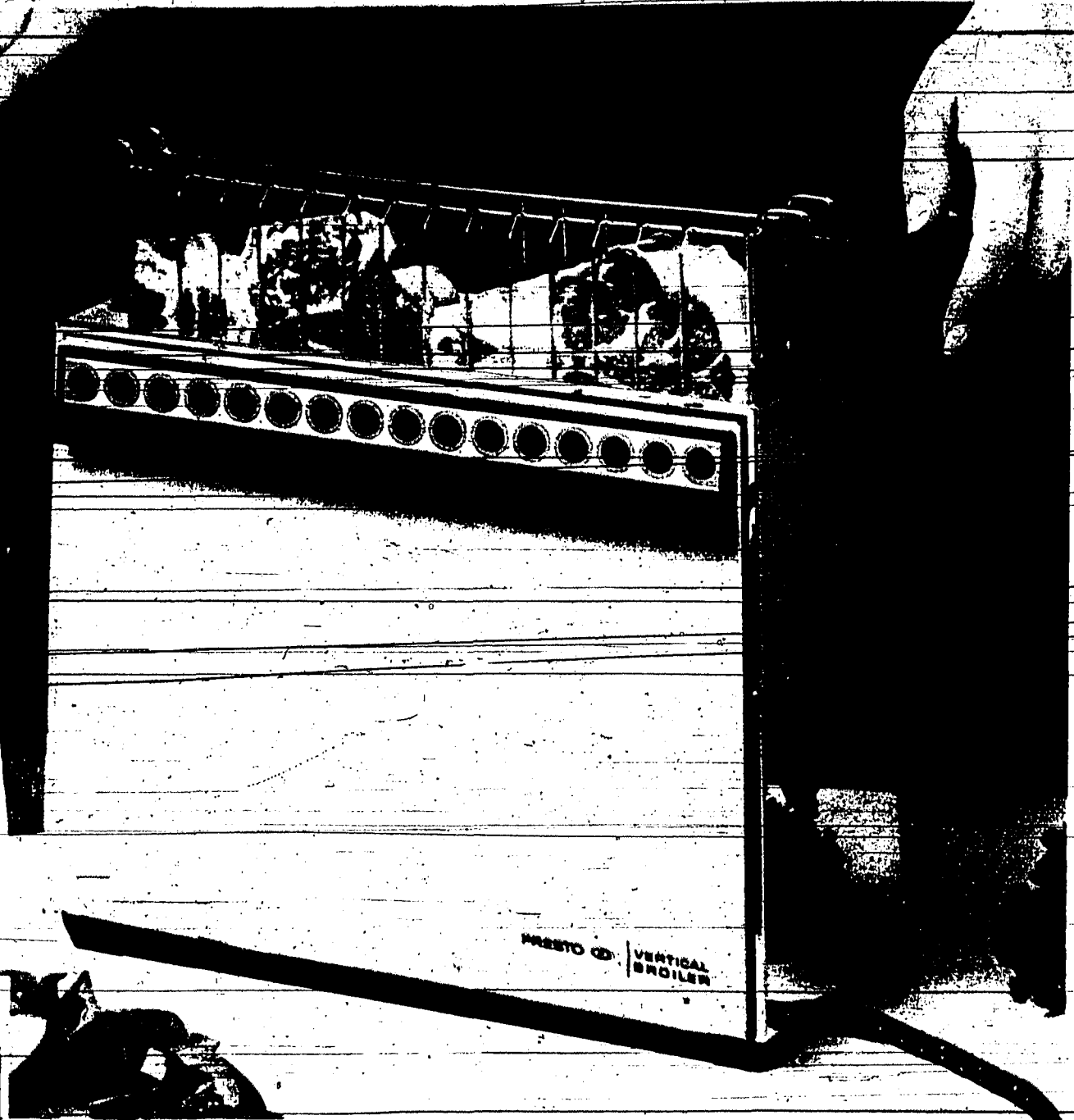

# She Had to Be Tough to Be a Star

"CHILDREN are a lot tougher than you think!" insisted Rita Moreno with the spirit that has become her trademark in a dozen years of playing fiery vixens on the big screen.

"They are also a lot more vulnerable than we think. And only when they are older do we know if it all balances out."

Rita speaks from experience. Her exodus to New York from her birthplace, Humacao, Puerto Rico, when she was three years old, had trauma for her.

"I was terribly shy and introverted, too. I couldn't speak English. So this created a big problem when I had to enter school, but somehow it all worked out."

For the movie, "Popi," in which she costarred with Alan Arkin, Rita returned to the same area of New York where she grew up. "It has changed, of course," Rita admitted. "I am glad I didn't see anyone I knew; it would be too depressing to think they'd still be living there!"

At present, she lives in New York with her husband, Dr. Leonard Gordon who, because of two coronaries, is now semi-retired and works on a medical newspaper. They have a daughter, Fernanda, 3. Rita says, "Her daddy calls her a 'Jewrican'—a perfect combination of a Jew and a Puerto Rican!"

By the time she was 16, Rita was dancing in night clubs in New Jersey, just beyond the reach of the New York authorities. "It was the worst possible environment!" Rita says. "I could only dance in joints because I was under age. I met very rough people!"

She was only 17 when she went to Hollywood. Her film career started with a change of name from Rosa Dolores Alverio to Rita Moreno. At the end of the year, the studio dropped her contract. Television filled the gap until she made "Garden of Evil." But Rita soon realized that she was being type-cast. "I was inevitably the exotic wench or the Mexican heroine," she says.

Rita's sense of humor stood her in good stead during these difficult

But "West Side Story" only proved that Rita was the perfect Latin vixen. Offers poured in. For six years Rita turned them all down. In the meantime, she starred in London in her first non-Latin role. Then she returned to the States and tackled the role of an Italian in "The Rose Tattoo" in a stage revival.

Rita is convinced that therapy, marriage, and motherhood made a new person of her. "Even the cameramen have remarked how much better I look now than I did when I made 'West Side Story' because I am not so tense now. I guess my happiness shows!"

Being tough got Rita Moreno over the rough spots. Now, at 37, she's certain she can relax and enjoy being herself. She foresees enough good roles to keep her career rolling ("Marlowe" with James Garner is her next film).

And if she doesn't find good roles, that's fine because Rita now has a home, a husband, and a baby to love.
