Dear Dr. Thosteson: Surely there must be someone besides me who's interested in what you know about pemphigus vulgaris.

Robson Asks To Enforce Trade Laws

BOISE (UPI) — If the second session of the 40th Idaho Legislature should approve a proposed consumer protective law, Attorney General Robert Robson would like to see his office in charge of enforcement.

Robson said the suit brought against bank credit cards was the first step toward creating a Department of Consumer Protection.

Executive Secretary Al Minton of Idaho's Department of Commerce and Development, whose agency is now legally responsible for enforcing the Fair Trade Act and the Unfair Sales Act, suggested that since the attorney general's office is a prosecuting agency, a better location for enforcement responsibility would be the Department of Law Enforcement.

Minton said, however, that his department would not be the right place.

"I just feel that any enforcement responsibilities, as far as my department is concerned, should be in the Department of Law Enforcement or with the attorney general," Minton said. "We don't have investigators and we don't have attorneys in our office and this is what it takes."

Judge Denies Habeas Writ For Turner

BOISE (UPI) — U. S. District Judge Fred M. Taylor refused to overrule the decision of six Idaho state judges in the matter of bail and denied embezzlement suspect Oliver B. Turner a writ of habeas corpus.

Turner is accused of 19 counts of obtaining more than \$300,000 under false pretenses from the state while employed as senior road auditor for the highway department. He claimed his bail was excessive and therefore denied him his constitutional right to bail.

He also contended Friday that he needs to be free to help his attorneys prepare his defense against criminal charges against him as well as a number of civil suits which have been filed against him.

When originally arrested last April 25, Turner's bail was set at \$95,000. It was later lowered to \$50,000.

Claiming this still was too high in light of his circumstances, Turner appealed to the Idaho Supreme Court and the lower court was upheld.

Judge Taylor said, "It just doesn't seem to this court that I should interfere with the state process and exercise my judgment and authority over and above the state courts when there isn't any clear constitutional violation."

The Liverpool Post, under the headlines "Royal Romance Hint," said the prince was flying by private plane with the dark-haired Lady Leonora, who was one of the guests at the party, to the spacious Westminister estate near Cheshire.

Leonora well, has been to Windsor and Ascot with her, and has spent two previous weekends at the duke and duchess' country estate, according to London's two afternoon newspapers.

The Duke and Duchess of Westminister are one of the richest landowners in Britain.

SPOKANE, Wash. (UPI) — The Washington Education Association (WEA) and two Spokane Valley residents have filed suit in Federal District Court challenging the constitutionality of two state election laws.

Similar test cases have been filed in West Virginia and in Pocatello, Idaho.

The laws in question are those requiring that 40 per cent of the voters in the last general election must cast ballots to validate a bond election and that 60 per cent of those voting must favor it for passage.

Lewiston May Annex Orchards Against Residents' Wishes

LEWISTON (UPI) — Indications are this city could become the largest in the northern part of the state Dec. 10.

That is the latest word in the city's struggle to annex Lewiston Orchards southeast of here.

William Stellimon, city attorney, said that under the Idaho municipal code the city council can suspend rules and read the annexation ordinance three times in one meeting on a Monday, publish the legal notice on Tuesday and make the annexation effective on Wednesday.

The first council meeting scheduled after a Dec. 7 zoning commission meeting required before annexation is Dec. 8.

The State Supreme Court ruled Thursday that a city can

annex property "with or without the consent of the habitants and even against their wishes."

And the majority of the residents of the Orchards don't wish to become Lewiston residents.

Howard Jepson, president of the Orchards development project, said his group would go ahead with plans to propose a bill to the state legislature in January to modify the section of the municipal code to give residents of an area affected by annexation the right to vote on the matter.

Jepson claimed annexation is of no value to the Orchards because the city would provide no services to the largely residential area with a population of about 10,000, and was only interested in monetary gain in

Haynsworth Controversy May End Soon

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The nearly three months of controversy on the Supreme Court nomination of Clement F. Haynsworth may climax this week in a vote still too close to call.

Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield hoped to reach agreement today for a vote on the nomination either Tuesday or Wednesday. Debate on the nomination went into its third day with uncommitted Southern senators, to reveal how he will vote.

Others scheduled to make speeches in behalf of Haynsworth were Sens. Howard Baker, R-Tenn., and Robert C. Byrd, D-W.Va., according to Sen. Ernest F. Hollings, D-S.C., chief Senate sponsor of Haynsworth.

Hollings, along with Sen. Peter H. Dominick, R-Colo., were slated to speak Tuesday. In the debate so far, there has been little give-and-take, just set speeches, largely predictable.

Senate GOP Leader Hugh Scott remains steadfastly uncommitted, but he said Sunday he has made up his mind "subject to change in the event of some unexpected development."

The latest UPI survey indicated that if the vote were taken today 38 senators would vote for Haynsworth and 46 against him. The 16 senators still uncommitted, including Spang, hold the margin of victory or defeat for the judge. A recent Washington Post poll showed 40 opposed, 37 in favor and 23 uncommitted.

Snow Spreads Across Large Part Of U. S.

Snow spread across the Northern and Central Rockies and the adjoining Great Plains today.

Rain fell ahead of low pressure systems and associated frontal systems from Minnesota and Colorado and changed to snow as colder air moved in. Two to three inches of snow was reported early today across parts of Montana, Wyoming, Colorado and Utah.

Travelers' warnings were in effect for blowing and drifting snow in Kansas, Nebraska, Wyoming and Colorado, and a heavy snow warning was in effect for Northwestern New Mexico.

Light rain fell from Texas to Wisconsin and Southern Minnesota, and also along the Pacific Northwest Coast. Other light rain developed in the Southwest.

Cold weather continued in the East as a cold Arctic high pressure affected the Middle Atlantic Coast. Clear skies covered the Eastern half of the nation and also occurred in scattered parts of the West.

Temperatures at 2 a.m. EST ranged from 8 at Havre, Mont., to 75 at Brownsville, Tex.

Snow or cold rain Sunday spread across the intermountain stretches of the West to the adjoining high plains in the East, about 15 inches of new snow fell in Southern Erie County in Western New York State.

Probe Opens

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Senate Permanent Investigations Committee plans to open an investigation Tuesday into an alleged billion-dollar black market in U. S. and Vietnamese currency in South Vietnam.

Sen. Abraham Ribicoff, D-Conn., committee chairman, said the illicit business runs over \$1 billion per year and "it seriously harms the American effort in South Vietnam, severely damages the Vietnamese economy and hinders the struggle against inflation, and reduces the effect of the American aid program."

Reports Investigated On American Unit Executing 700 Vietnamese Civilians

QUANG NGAI, Vietnam (UPI) — U.S. Army officials are investigating reports from residents of a small refugee village that an American patrol executed up to 700 civilians almost two years ago.

The residents told investigators the 100-man American unit stormed into their village in March, 1968 — one month after the Communist Tet offensive — and ordered the people of Truong An hamlet to line up outside their homes.

Man Quits Long Battle With Navy

PORT CHICAGO, Calif. (UPI) — The last man in this condemned town began moving out of his home Sunday, content that he had "exposed" federal courts, the U.S. Navy and a few other bureaucratic people as land-grabbers."

Allied military sources quoted the residents of the hamlet as saying the civilians, almost all of whom were unarmed women and children, were killed with automatic weapons fire by impromptu firing squads. Their homes were burned.

Creation Of New Office Suggested

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Senate refugee subcommittee today recommended President Nixon create an office of refugee and humanitarian affairs to be headed by an assistant secretary of state.

The Army has announced it is holding Lt. William Calley, 26, of Miami, Fla., at Ft. Benning, Ga., in connection with the slaying of 109 civilians on March 11, 1968. Calley at the time was a platoon leader with C Company, 20th Infantry, 11th Light Infantry Brigade of the Americal Division.
