Public officials are often reluctant to discuss their thoughts in public, but they have no right to follow any other course when discussing the public's business. The "sensitive naof these discussions makes it all the more necessary that the

facts be revelaed and not whispered behind closed doors. Initial information indicates there

is reason to investigate nuclear contamination, but not necessarily any real reason for conern. Undoubtedly the decision to mumble about the situation in private rather than to discuss it aloud in public is an indication, not of nuclear danger, but of typical governmental queasiness when coping with any controversial

But the secrecy of the task force can't help but lead to gross specula-The what - horrible - thingare-they-hiding suspicion will find the soil of secrecy more fertile than the sterile ground of candor.

Carver is an experienced public servant who should have learned by now that a failure to level with the people on matters this sensitive is asking for trouble.

Perhaps he was merely delegated by the task force to carry out a policy of secrecy which he knows to be foolish. If so, however, it would be out of character for a man whose most engaging governmental talent to date has been his constructive bluntness. Either he has acquiesced in this instance to an ill-advised group decision, or he has yet to fully appreciate the risk in letting rumors feed on ignorance.

In either case, he and the task force, by this decision to exclude the public from the public's business, may be about to learn anew the pitfalls of secrecy. - B.H.
