## Solon Rakes 'Whitewash'; Says 700 Civilians Died

WASHINGTON (UPI) — As many as 700 Vietnamese civilians may have been slaughtered in the alleged massacre at Song My, according to Sen. Stephen Young, D-Ohio. Young mentioned the figure Wednesday after Army Secretary Stanley R. Resor appeared before Young and other members of the Senate Armed Services Committee to express "shock and dismay" at the incident. "No one can question that there was an atrocious slaughter of 200 to 700 civilians" in an incident which was "whitewashed" by military brass in Vietnam, Young said. He gave no source for his figures, and what specifies Resor told the Senate committee and a similar House committee on that subject were not made public. Resor's appearance on Capitol Hill, complete with color slides of the alleged atrocity, brought expressions of shock from several lawmakers. Rep. Leslie Arends, R-Ill., said the testimony gave him a "queasy stomach" and he had to leave the hearing. Sen. Daniel K. Inouye, D-Hawaii, said it made him "sick." Inouye said one slide showed "a young woman standing up begging, her children standing around her, knowing that she would be killed an instant later." Later in the day an official White House statement, made on behalf of President Nixon, said "an incident such as that alleged in this case is a direct violation not only of U.S. military policy but is also abhorrent to the conscience of all the American people." It also promised strict prosecution for anyone found in violation of military law. Resor told the members of Congress that word of the incident, which allegedly occurred March 16, 1968, never reached Washington because Army officers in Vietnam attributed reports of excessive civilian death to Communist propaganda. In other developments in the case: —Lt. Col. Reed W. Kennedy, an Army military judge at Ft. Benning, Ga., ordered all witnesses in the case to remain silent and not to "discuss with or disclose to anyone, any information or evidence he may have concerning this alleged offense." —Organizers of a "Freedom Rally" held last Veterans Day on the grounds of the Washington Monument urged that all U.S. soldiers should not be condemned for what happened at Song My.

## Law Firm Sues T.F. County To Get Fee

## Costly Stamp

NEW YORK (UPI) — A Wilkes-Barre, Pa., dealer paid \$31,000 Wednesday for a 1918 U. S. air mail stamp which shows a biplane flying upside down. It was a world record price for an airmail stamp. Irwin Weinberg bought the 24-cent stamp at an auction of United States stamps at the Robert A. Selgel Galleries. He paid \$29,000 last week at the Mercury Stamp Co. for a copy of the same stamp.

## Israeli Jets Hit Egyptians

By United Press International Israeli warplanes today carried out their second successive day of heavy raids into neighboring Arab nations, this time hitting Egyptian military positions along the west bank of the Suez Canal. The Israeli military command in Tel Aviv said the jets hit unspecified military targets in the central and southern sections of the 102-mile waterway and returned safely. These raids followed four hours of aerial attacks against artillery positions in Jordan Wednesday, the heaviest Israeli air raid into that Arab nation this year. Egyptian commandos have increased their attacks across the canal in recent weeks and the aerial bombardment was seen as an attempt to deter further such forays. In Cairo, two Egyptian officers and one soldier killed in a cross-canal raid last Saturday got heroes' burials today, with Gen. Mohamed Fawzi, the war minister, leading the mourners. "From Moscow, the Soviet news agency Tass reported that the Soviet Union and five of its Eastern European bloc allies have pledged all their support for the Arabs in the struggle with Israel. The six were identified as the Soviet Union, Bulgaria, Hungary, East Germany, Poland and Czechoslovakia.

## 3 Blazes Blamed On Arson

Twin Falls County Sheriff's officers were investigating three fires Thursday morning in Twin Falls County which kept officers, firemen and volunteers busy for several hours. The fires, all northwest of Castleford, started about 1:30 a.m., deputies said, and arson is the suspected cause of all. Burned were a haystack, a straw stack and a vacant house. Officers said there was no reason other than arson why the house or the two stacks should have caught fire. "There's no question but what they were set," Deputy Ed Lammers said early Thursday after leaving the scene of the fires. Several tons of straw owned by Joe Porcuck, a house owned by Paul Kennedy and about 50 tons of hay owned by Lewis Goodwin, were burned. Deputy Lammers said about a dozen volunteers broke the hay stack apart and were able to haul about half of it away from the burning end of the stack. The three blazes brought the total of fires set this month by an arsonist to 10. Ground stands at the fair-ground burned the early part of this month, beginning full-scale arson investigation by officers. A few days later two vacant houses and four hay stacks were set afire. Sheriff's officers have had several suspects in the cases, but thus far no arrests have been made. Deputy Lammers said Thursday morning it is difficult to preserve any evidence which may have been left by the arsonist, since fire trucks, firemen and volunteers usually destroy any tracks which may have been left.

## Rogers Says U.S. To Shun Asian War

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Nixon will not allow the United States to become involved in another Vietnam-type war on the Asian mainland, according to Secretary of State William P. Rogers. "We have learned one lesson, and that is we are not going to fight any major wars in the mainland of Asia again and we are not going to send American troops there, and we certainly aren't going to do it unless we have the American public and the Congress behind us," Rogers said. "But in any event we have no such plan. We don't intend to," he said. Rogers made his comments Wednesday night in a television interview broadcast on the National Education Television (NET) network. Rogers said Nixon's attempts to pull the United States out of the Vietnam conflict is working "better than I would have anticipated" and he said "We are quite convinced that the South Vietnamese are going to be able to take over the combat responsibilities."

## Local Human Rights Group Is Formed

Appointment of a nine-member Twin Falls County Human Rights Committee and plans for an initial organizational meeting were announced Wednesday by the Twin Falls County Commissioners. Appointed to serve on the voluntary committee are Edd Bosard, Don Frank, Bonnie Jones, Annie Padillo, Fred Plankey, Fernando Rodriguez and Willard Swartley, all Twin Falls; Louise Webster, Filer, and H. Robert Stradley, Kimberly. The committee will work with the governor-appointed Idaho Human Rights Commission and county officials in hearing any discrimination complaints against minority group members of the local area. The first meeting will be Dec. 4 at 7 p.m. in the County Judicial Building. The committee will also make recommendations on settlement of such complaints and act as a negotiating group to solve the problem on a local basis if necessary.

## War Claims 130 Yanks In One Week

By WALTER WHITEHEAD SAIGON (UPI) — U.S. headquarters said today 130 Americans were killed in Vietnam last week, a 10-week high, to push the number of GIs slain in action this year past the 9,000 mark. The same upsurge in fighting that boosted U.S. losses resulted in the heaviest weekly casualties for South Vietnamese troops in 15 months — 567 killed and 1,421 wounded. Military spokesmen put Viet Cong and North Vietnamese losses at 3,021 dead, their heaviest in three months.

## Ex-J.P. Faces Trial On Misuse Of Funds

Former Buhl Justice of the Peace Karl R. (Jack) Lewis has been ordered bound over to Fifth District Court to face four felony counts of misuse of public funds. Judge Harry Turner issued the order Wednesday after studying preliminary hearing transcripts for several weeks. He said testimony on 266 pages and 26 exhibits had to be studied before his decision was reached. Judge Turner, however, dismissed another felony charge against Mr. Lewis. That charge was issuing an insufficient funds check May 5 in the amount of \$586.50. "Testimony by bank officials indicated that Mr. Lewis did have credit at the bank," Judge Turner said. The check had allegedly been issued to cover the April Justice Court report in Buhl, but there was not enough money in the bank account to meet payment of the check. The complaint alleging misuse of public funds was signed by Twin Falls County Commission Chairman Heber Loughmiller, on vote of the three-man commission. The complaint was signed last June. An audit of Mr. Lewis' court records was then ordered. Judge Turner, in presiding at Mr. Lewis' preliminary hearing in July, was acting as Justice of the Peace. He acts in that capacity when other county justices cannot sit on a certain case. The four-count complaint of misuse of public funds charges that Mr. Lewis, while a Justice of the Peace in Buhl, misused a total of \$2,256.50 of public funds between Aug. 3, 1967 and last May 20. "The decision in Mr. Lewis' case had been delayed until now because the preliminary hearing testimony had to be typed then studied by Judge Turner. Final briefs were presented and arguments heard in the matter last Oct. 29. Mr. Lewis remains at liberty on \$1,000 bond.

## Nixon's Dentist Checks Teeth For Holiday Dinner

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Nixon took no chances on perhaps missing his Thanksgiving dinner today. He made an early morning trip to the dentist to have his teeth checked. The White House said Nixon visited the Washington office of his dentist, Dr. William Chase, for a final check of his bridgework before he and Mrs. Nixon joined 232 elderly persons for a traditional Thanksgiving feast in the State Dining Room.

## Boycott Planned Of GE Products

NEW YORK (UPI) — More than 145,000 General Electric Co. workers, on strike since Oct. 27, were expected to begin a boycott of GE products Friday. Negotiators for both sides failed to make any progress toward a new contract during Wednesday talks. John Shambo, chief negotiator for the International Union of Electrical Workers (IUE), said after the meeting that GE failed to bargain in good faith by rejecting the union's offer to settle the 11-week strike by submitting all the outstanding issues to arbitration. The next negotiation session was planned for Monday.

## Geologists Study Rocks From Moon

SPACE CENTER, Houston (UPI) — An excited group of geologists today examined several large, dust-covered crystalline rocks found in the first box of Apollo 12's moon samples opened in the lunar laboratory. The rocks were coated with a sticky, gray dust. But first reports indicated they were similar in appearance to the dark chunks of ancient lava flows brought back by Apollo 11's astronauts four months ago. The aluminum moon rock case was opened in a vacuum chamber in the lunar receiving laboratory Wednesday night. Scientists were surprised by the size of the rock chunks among the 33 to 35 pounds of moon samples. They were gathered a week ago on the arid, cratered Ocean of Storms by Charles "Pete" Conrad and Alan L. Bean while Richard F. Gordon orbited the moon above them. The pilots are due back at the space center Saturday with some "grapefruit sized" rocks they stowed in plastic sacks. A second suitcase-size rock box will be opened Friday. It is expected to contain more rocks, each wrapped in individual plastic bags. The box opened Wednesday night had two large sacks of samples, including a large amount of soil and a few rocks.

## Arab Tosses Bomb At Airline Office

ATHENS (UPI) — An Arab terrorist tossed a hand grenade into the offices of Israel's national airline during working hours today, injuring at least 14 persons including two children who were seriously hurt. Police arrested a Jordanian running from the scene and said he admitted hurling the grenade. The suspect was identified as Elias Dergarabedian, 23, of a Jordanian commando organization called Djibhet Nedal Chani. The Press Ministry said Dergarabedian came to Athens on Monday on a special mission to attack the offices of El Al Airlines. Shalom Saadom, Athens manager of El Al, said the grenade was thrown into the El Al offices as passengers were checking in for Flight 255 from Tel Aviv to New York.

## General Motors To Halt Lines

DETROIT (UPI) — General Motors Corp. is sales lagging seven per cent behind last year's pace for the first two months of the 1970 model year. The company announced Wednesday it is laying off 44,000 workers for one day Friday. The world's largest manufacturing company said 13 of its 21 U.S. assembly plants will be closed for the day.

## War Veteran Says Orders Were Given To Destroy Tiny Village, Kill All Villagers

JACKSON, Miss. (UPI) — A 22-year-old Vietnam veteran was sent into Song My with orders to destroy it. "We had orders to destroy everything in the village... to take as few prisoners as possible. Simpson was an Army Spec. 4 at the time, assigned to Company C, 1st Battalion, 11th Infantry Brigade. He participated in the raid on South Vietnam village which resulted in court-martial charges against Lt. William L. Calley Jr. for the alleged mass killing of 109 persons. "The young Negro said he killed 10 South Vietnamese including a woman and a 2-year-old boy she was carrying in her arms. "She was running toward a hut," he said. "She was running with a VC (Viet Cong) and he was carrying a weapon. He got inside the hut. I ordered them to stop. She kept running. I shot her as she was running into the door." He said he did not know she had the child in her arms when he opened fire. "When I turned her over, there was a baby — a little boy, about 2 years old — I guess under her." He said his bullets apparently went through the woman's body and hit the child. How did he know she was carrying a child? "The same as I feel when he discovered the baby — would feel... pretty bad." Simpson estimated "between 300 or 400" persons were killed during the raid. "In a way I feel guilty," he said, "and in a way I don't. I had my life out there risking it. You have to look at that. I feel guilty about those women and children and old people — but feeling guilty does not help the situation."

## Mike Collins May Get Post As Official

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Air Force Col. Michael Collins, who piloted the Apollo 11 command module on man's first visit to the moon, may soon be sitting behind a desk at the State Department. Official sources said the 39-year-old astronaut will be named Assistant Secretary of State for Public Affairs within the next two days. Collins, who has expressed a desire to leave the space program, has reportedly been under consideration for the post for several weeks. Secretary of State William P. Rogers was reported to have been impressed with Collins' grasp of international affairs and his ability to say what he thinks.

## 100 Soldiers Stage Fast In Protest

PLEIKU, Vietnam (UPI) — About 100 U.S. soldiers who man a field hospital in Pleiku fasted Thanksgiving Day in protest against the war. One of their patients, said the act "encouraged the Viet Cong. All but a few of the protesters signed a letter to President Nixon that said: "Sir: So long as American soldiers continue to fight and die in a senseless war that cannot be won, we the undersigned have very little to be thankful for." The antiwar protest by the men at the 71st Evacuation Hospital went without incident as a steady stream of battle casualties arrived by helicopter to keep the 300-bed facility busy. Col. Joseph Bellas of Sharon, Pa., the hospital's commander, said none of the men would be punished. "I think I understand how they feel," he said. One of the hospital patients, Capt. Larry Bates, 25, of Carshad, N.M., took issue with the fast, saying "These guys just don't understand they are encouraging the enemy. Every time something like this happens, I'm going to lose more men."

## Idaho Solons Praise Action On Graze Fee

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Idaho's congressional delegation praised Secretary of Interior Walter Hickel's action Tuesday to bar any increases in grazing fees on public lands during the 1970 season.

The plan, announced last January, was to increase the grazing fees by more than 400 per cent over a ten-year period.

The announcement sparked a congressional hearing of the Senate interior public lands subcommittee, of which Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, is chairman and on which Sen. Len Jordan, R-Idaho, serves as a member.

Following the hearing, the Senate Interior Committee approved a resolution sponsored by Church calling upon the secretary of interior to conduct a comprehensive review of the scheduled increases to determine if the hikes conformed with existing law.

Hickel said the Public Land Law Review Commission, of which Jordan is a member, is studying the matter of grazing fees and will make its recommendations next year.

Hickel said he felt it appropriate "to delay implementation of the next increment until the views of the commission have been known and evaluated. At that time, my department will take such further action as it may determine to be proper."

To be sure, its use has drawn heated criticism. In the heat, the question of censorship has been raised. Far from the philosophy attributed to Voltaire — "I disagree with what you say but I will fight to the death for your right to say it" — there is evident a willingness, if not eagerness, to gag the other side.

When President Nixon said he had a timetable for withdrawal from Vietnam but would not announce it because, obviously, it would remove "any incentive for the enemy to negotiate," Senator Ted Kennedy cast doubt that a withdrawal plan existed and criticized Nixon for keeping it secret.

This was too much for the Washington Daily News. In a front-page editorial, the News said: "Apparently it's all right to keep inequities secret, but not to withhold strategic information from an implacable foe."

The peace demonstrators have earned the plaudits of the North Vietnamese Communists by their upbraiding of the government and their cries for immediate surrender in Vietnam.

Vice President Agnew denounced the demonstrators — and drew a round of castigation. And when he faulted television analysts for belittling the President's peace efforts, wow! From press, television and Democrats rose protest: "Censorship? Never!" Only censor the Vice President?

When Black Panther Dave Hillard shouted to the San Francisco peace rally, "We will kill anybody who stands in the way of our freedom!", it was too much for some in his audience who cried "No! No more violence!"

There are critics who would happily gag the Vice President but no one has suggested gagging the dis-

ciple of violence, Hillard. And when Judge Hoffman literally gagged Bobby Seale to keep order in his court, the Left bawled its outrage.

Every right is accompanied by a commensurate responsibility; if the right is to be maintained, Freedom of speech, for instance, does not carry the right to incite to riot.

Freedom of the press and broadcast media means responsibility to tell the truth insofar as humanly possible. As with all human endeavors, there are occasional exceptions, and the informed citizen can readily recognize them.

Hubert Humphrey, the former vice president, sounding less the elder statesman and more the Democratic partisan, professed to see in Agnew's comments a premeditated intimidation which could lead to "repression." In other words, Agnew should keep mum when castigating or when he feels the Administration has been treated unfairly.

Free speech must be as free for one as for the other or it isn't free at all.

The responsibility of those who cover the news to be accurate and fair is generally recognized, if not universally observed. At its worst, the record of the media for fairness is better than that of most politicians, who, in truth, would like to control the news media and the free flow of information, no matter how much they may profess to hate censorship.

Regardless of the heat of debate, and regardless of how lopsided and unfair some of the news media may seem to be, the solid citizen realizes full well that he still has free access to all sources of information. He has the privilege of turning off a biased television commentator. He has the opportunity of selecting from many newspapers, magazines and columnists his own choice of information and opinion. And he is intelligent enough to tell one from the other.

In a country like Russia, where there is no choice of news media with different views, there is really no freedom, and dissent is ruthlessly crushed, and censorship is constant.

It should be remembered that this free choice of information and opinion is what we are defending.

Walter Reuther Has A Point

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Given the persistent politeness which is the occupational disease of Capitol Hill, I must say that the ineffectual Walter Reuther has a point when he warns that if the working stiff doesn't watch out the tax reform bill will emerge from Congress as a legislative gold brick.

Reuther, who lately seems to have suffered from the sheer fact of being Walter Reuther, talks some old-fashioned Reuther common sense when he warns there may be precious little reform in the bill when the loophole interests finish their lobbying. While nobody was looking, those whose fat pocket-books are threatened have been putting pressure on Congress to repair the status quo.

What has happened is that the working stiff has been relaxing in the conclusion that their work was done. The tax revolt earlier this year forced Congress to tackle the problem of tax reform, and the House finally passed a bill that took some good first steps. But taxpayers have stopped writing to their legislators, while the privileged lobbyists brought their big guns to bear on members of the Senate Finance Committee.

Under the conservative chairmanship of Sen. Russell Long, the oil-rich Louisiana Democrat, the committee consequently and ditheringly emasculated the House-passed bill.

To get down to chapter and verse, the House bill would recoup only \$2 billion out of an estimated \$50 billion lost yearly in Federal revenues through existing loopholes. Yet, as Reuther's Alliance for Action noted, the Senate committee, swooning to the plaintive appeals of special interests, has reduced even that modest amount.

The tax rebels wouldn't recognize the bill they thought was in the bag. Only \$1 billion would be salvaged from the \$10 billion in taxes lost every year through the capital gains loophole.

The Senate Finance Committee version would rescue less than a quarter of the \$13 billion lost each through the oil depletion allowance loophole. It leaves untouched the loophole through which tax-free interest on state and local bonds costs the Treasury \$1.8 billion annually.

In short, the status quo is doing pretty well under Russell Long's protection. As it now stands, the "reform" bill will merely reaffirm that income from wealth should be rewarded and income from work penalized.

considerable muscle. Reuther set the ALA up as a rival labor federation after he broke with the AFL-CIO and its some 4,000,000 workers represent among others the two largest unions in the country, the International Brotherhood of Teamsters and Reuther's own United Automobile Workers.

In other matters, I expect the ALA is just as glibly of special-interest bigness as the AFL-CIO or the U.S. Chamber of Commerce. But Reuther's boys are doing a public service here. They are pointing out that on

tax reform the grass-roots victory is still to be won, and will be lost unless the faceless taxpayers still themselves and launch another letter-writing campaign against the present bill. Congress acted this year because it was scared; it is time to instill another dollop of fear-of-the-public in its well-larded carcass.

"Unless they change the tax bill, we're going to change the composition of Congress," says Reuther. Every tax-paying, bill-paying, kid-minding stiff should buy that one.

Runny Nose

Dear Dr. Thosteson: My problem is a runny nose. I don't seem to have a cold, but it keeps running just the same, and in winter I look like Rudolph the red-nosed reindeer. A friend advised me to snuff salt water up my nose but it doesn't seem to help. I have had this about two years. —B.E.N.

A number of dissimilar ailments can cause a constantly running nose, among them allergic polyps, sinus disease, some foreign body in the nose, crooked nasal septum, smog, and so on.

Frankly, there is no wise course for you to take except to have your nose examined.

I would not continue snuffing salt water. That's an old home remedy that may do more harm than good.

If the solution is too strong, it can cause irritation and make the runny nose worse. It rarely helps — it certainly didn't help you. Finally, it may spread infection, which is the most important reason for not continuing it.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: I have heard that exercise before one has completed a reducing diet is bad because it builds muscle on top of the fat. If this is so, why would fat under the muscle be harder to lose than fat above muscle? —A. J.

That evidently is a theory dreamed up by somebody who didn't know the facts, because the basic premise is not so. Fat layers are outside the muscles.

# Survivor Says He Will Fly Despite Crash

Miller showed some resentment toward flight service officials at Reno, Nev., who did not warn him that his charted course to Grass Valley, Calif., would be dangerous. He said he found himself fighting down-drafts that sucked the Cessna 172 down from a height of 11,500 feet to the mountain below.

"We dropped 6,000 feet in a minute or so," he said. "The altimeter was just going round and round."

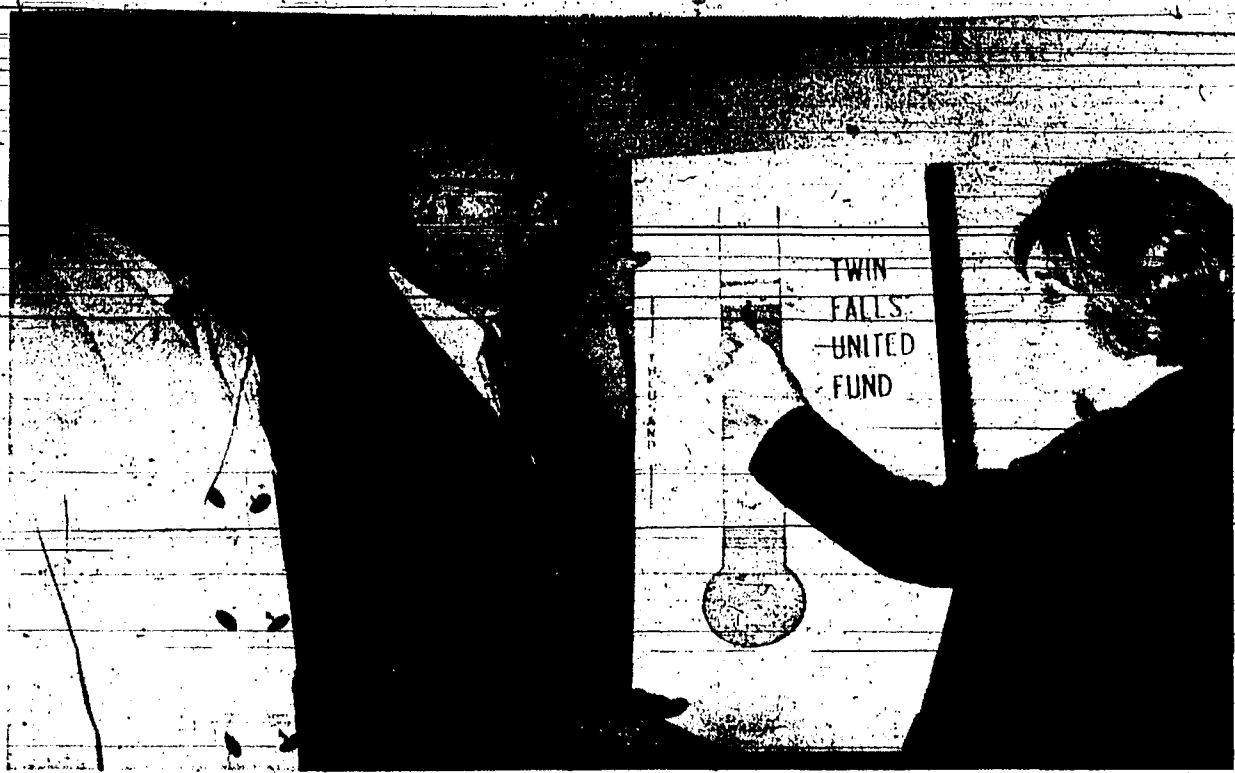

# Hungarian Communist Chief's Society

## May Be Too Liberal For Some Hardliners

Reports reaching Vienna from Budapest say Hungarian Communist chief Janos Kadar once considered a Soviet Puppet, has built a society too liberal for some hardliners, who fear Hungary's economic and cultural reforms are moving too far ahead of Russia's. On one side are the liberals who recently warned the Czechoslovak hardliners against too much repression. On the other

side are conservatives, who, according to reports, are urging the return to Hungary of Matyas Rakosi, the former dictator whose methods brought on the 1956 uprising. He has been living in Russia, since then.

A more independent foreign policy may be in sight for Poland, Polish leader Wladyslaw Gomulka already has offered to negotiate recognition of the Oder-Neisse line with the new West German government of Chancellor Willy Brandt and is

saying they hope the Strategic Arms Limitation Talks (SALT) being carried on by the United States and Russia come to a successful conclusion. French defense officials take the opposite view. They say the talks do not diminish the threat of nuclear war, that they would strengthen the bloc system and thereby enhance the threat of war in western Europe. They plan no reduction in production of French nuclear arms and are planning more nuclear tests in the Pacific next year.

British lawmakers will put heavy pressure on Prime Minister Harold Wilson in coming weeks to take up both the Vietnam and Biafran wars with President Nixon when they meet in Washington Jan. 27-28.

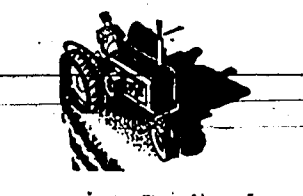

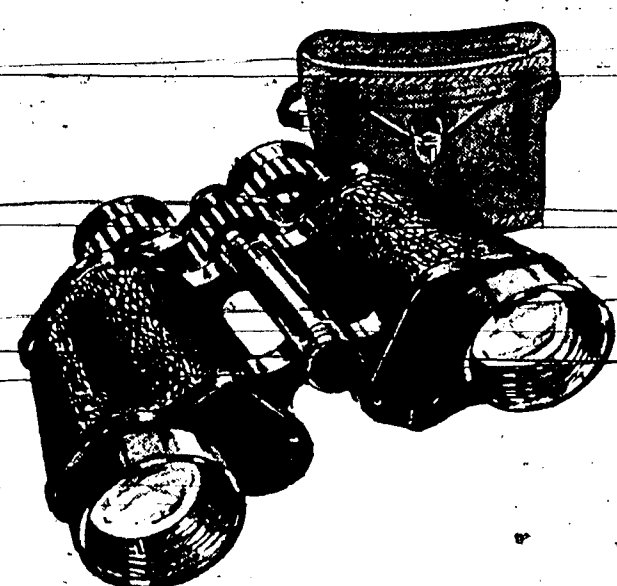

# United States Is In Midst Of "Second Home Boom" As Communities Spring Up

NEW YORK (UPI)—Not so long ago there were just two kinds of second homes: big country estates for the very rich, and hideaway cabins for the not-so-rich. And there weren't very many of either kind around.

Times have changed. We're in the midst of a second home boom. There are whole communities of leisure homes in all parts of the country. There are beach homes, mountain homes; homes used for summer sport, for winter sport and for both. Most could serve easily for full-time living; many are designed for just that with retirement in

mind. The price range is wide, ranging from a few thousand dollars on up. Most families who can afford a second car and annual vacations, probably could afford a second home instead.

The why of it? Increased leisure and affluence, of course. But other reasons, too.

The Weyerhaeuser Co., a leading manufacturer of building materials, did some research on the subject and came up with some basic reasons for the boom.

Second homes provide both pleasure and economic investment opportunity. Leisure

property is just about the only investment a family can make in the entertainment area and still stand to gain an economic return.

A good many people, Weyerhaeuser found, have come to realize that money spent on a two-or three-week vacation is just about equal to the down payment on a leisure home. And with the general upward trend in property prices, there's a good chance the down payment eventually will be a growing investment instead of just one more expenditure.

In talking to those who sell second homes, the company's researchers found that one of the best times of the year for

sales was the end of the summer vacation season. If it seems a good many families just returned from long, tiring, expensive trips, wish they'd stayed a lot closer to home.

It was found some values tend to become apparent only after a second-home owner has had his property a season or two. One is the ability to stretch a three-or four-day holiday weekend into a real vacation period. With vacation property just a few hours from home, it isn't a major project to get away.

Highways, which have made vacation areas more accessible, also have made the second home more desirable, the study

found. Time and time again it was pointed out that crowded highways are a strong incentive to head for the woods.

Some of the factors, are more subtle.

One is the psychological value of a change of mood and scenery. Apparently, vacations are more satisfying when they occur in a place set aside for relaxation and fun. The change in family routine, plus the relaxed atmosphere, seems to contribute to more enjoyable leisure.

Then, there is status appeal. But not the same kind associated with the rambling country estate of yesteryear. The theory is that in a highly

urbanized and densely populated society one of the most precious commodities is privacy and solitude.

Whatever the reasons, Weyerhaeuser is convinced of the popularity of leisure homes. So convinced, in fact, it currently is offering a \$20,000 vacation home as first prize in a nationwide promotional sweepstakes program.

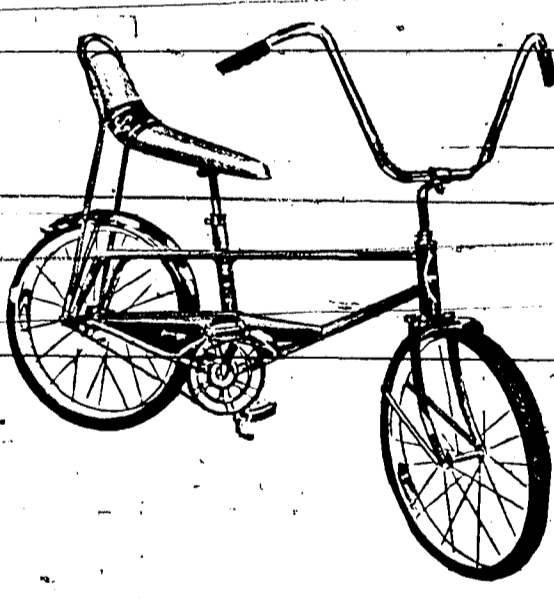

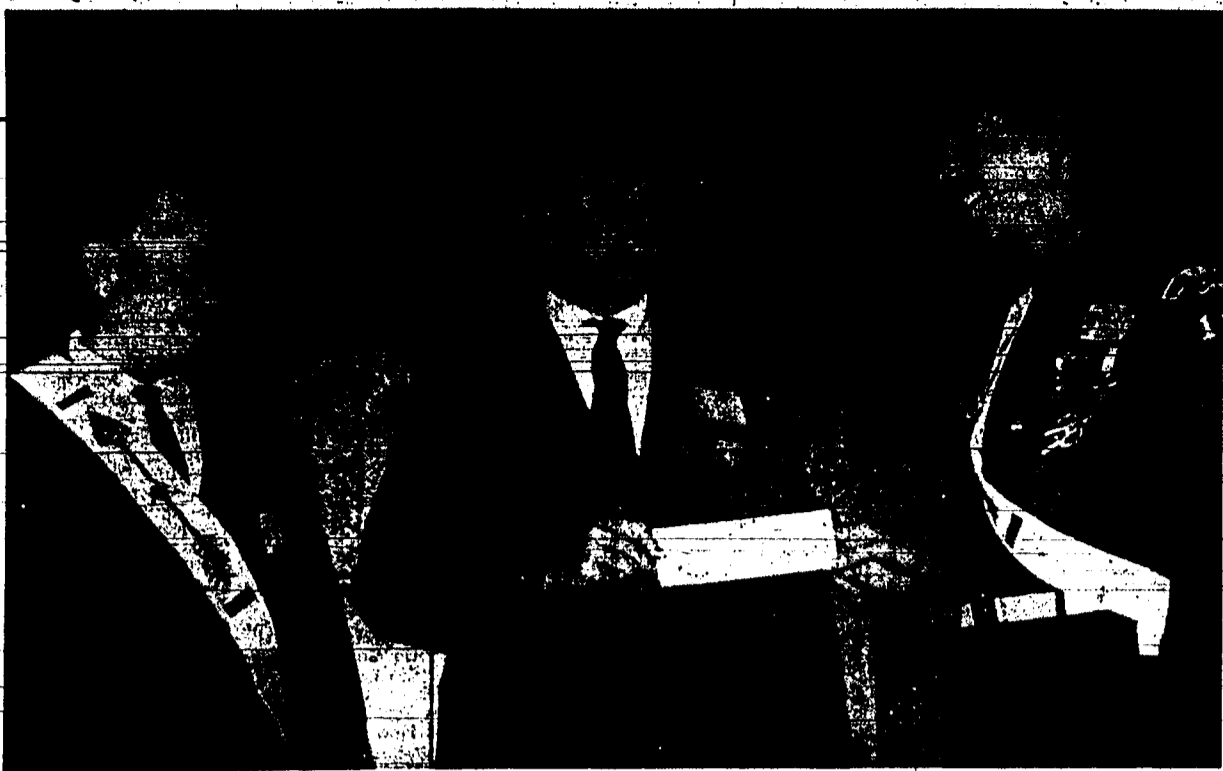

The other injured were treated for minor injuries and released. An explosion at the same plant two weeks ago injured six persons.

A minor fire broke out in the building torn by the blast but was quickly extinguished, officials said. The explosion could be heard and felt within a 15-mile radius, witnesses said.

Daughtery said the explosion occurred in an area where propellant for 81-millimeter mortars is loaded.

### Killers Seen

DETROIT (UPI) — A 70-year-old widow died Monday night several hours after four boys slugged and robbed her of a nickel while several motorists watched.

The victim was identified as Mrs. Florence Knotts who lived alone in a \$75-a-month apartment. Her only income was a monthly Social Security check.

Mrs. Knotts was beaten and robbed about noon Monday while drivers of half a dozen automobiles watched.

Another witness, Patrolman Allen Hughes, acted. He stopped his patrol car and captured a 13-year-old suspect in an alley. Later, a 14-year-old boy was arrested. Police are searching for the other two youths.

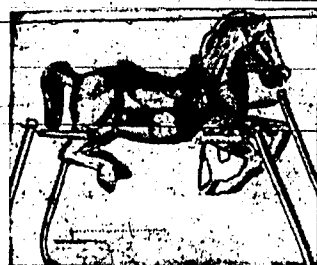



## Defendants Assail Judge For Ruling In Conspiracy Trial

CHICAGO (UPI)—The judge in the Chicago riot conspiracy trial Wednesday refused to call a convict from prison to testify for the defense.

One defendant called the decision "fascism" and another asked the judge, "Why don't you gag us all?"

The dispute erupted after defense attorney Leonard Weinglass asked U.S. District Court Judge Julius L. Hoffman to issue a writ of habeas corpus to bring John Sinclair from Marquette Prison in Marquette, Mich.

Weinglass said Sinclair, who was in charge of arranging rock bands to entertain demonstrators at the 1968 Democratic Convention, could testify to the "peaceful purposes" of the Youth International Party before and during the convention week.

Hoffman said there were many other persons who could testify on the matter and denied the writ.

Defense attorney William Kunstler told the judge the defendants were "stunned by this denial" and charged

## New Theory May Provide 'Clean' Bomb

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (UPI)—A German-born physicist announced Tuesday that he had developed a theory which might enable scientists to harness the hydrogen bomb for peaceful purposes.

It could represent a major breakthrough in taming thermonuclear power.

Presently an atomic device is required to trigger a hydrogen bomb in order to produce the 100 million Centigrade degrees of heat necessary to ignite the thermonuclear material.

Dr. Eriedwardt Winterberg, professor of physics at the University of Nevada at Las Vegas, believes that a giant spark produced by an electron beam could provide the necessary heat source.

The controlled technique would enable scientists to build thermonuclear "microbombs" without the fission (atomic) process. Such a device would be practically free of radioactive waste materials, said Winterberg.

An electron beam machine suitable to test Winterberg's theory has not been constructed. But an instrument which may be adaptable for experimental purposes currently is being constructed at the laboratories of Physics International, a private research organization in San Leandro, Calif.

Winterberg said he had consulted with Dr. Edward Teller, "father of the hydrogen bomb," and received strong support of the theory. He said he would meet with Dr. Werner Von Braun soon to discuss the theory's application to advanced propulsion systems and interplanetary space travel.

Controlled use of thermonuclear energy could enable man to light whole cities, provide inexpensive transportation systems and create an endless source of energy for the future, Winterberg said.

He said the power of Hoover Dam may be compacted into a nuclear pill the size of an aspirin and rocket engines could be produced which were 1,000 times more powerful than present chemical rockets.

Junior volunteers of the hospital also helped. A fund raising drive, organized and instigated by Sister Mary Agnes, O.B. Supervisor at St. Benedict's Hospital, made the purchase possible.

Tickets were sold by the employees, FHA girls and Junior Volunteers and the St. Benedict's Hospital Guild sponsored a "Hamburger Fry" held in the snack bar of the hospital.

This will be the second isolette for the O.B. ward; however, the old one is obsolete and not dependable as it was. It can still be used and hopefully, can be repaired to restore its efficiency.

Sister Agnes said the new isolette will be a welcome and needed addition for the hospital.

### Burley Student At ISU Awarded Top Art Scholarship For Two School Terms

POCATELLO—The mass production of functional ceramics is an impelling force freeing the potter to express himself in any way he feels, an Idaho State University ceramics scholarship student believes.

George A. Smith, a junior student from Burley, is the first recipient of a new, two-semester art tuition scholarship awarded by the ISU Department of Art this year as a result of money raised by a student-faculty ceramics sale on campus last spring.

"Each member of the faculty submitted three names and he was the only one chosen unanimously by all faculty members," said John Burton, ceramics instructor.

"He is one of the most involved students and one of the few really trying to find something all his own. He is really looking for something besides the everyday thing. This is extremely hard to do in an area like ceramics, because functional things themselves dictate design and make it doubly difficult to do something with your own personality stamped on it. Some of his work is the finest I've seen here at ISU."

Mr. Smith earned \$300 last year by sale of his work and was awarded the unusual honor of being given a one-man show in the Student Union Gallery. He was invited to teach ceramics to students in the university's summer "Upward Bound"

program and selected as an advisor to students interested in art during ISU's fall Freshman Orientation Week. This semester, Mr. Smith was appointed part-time ceramics laboratory assistant through the college work-study funds.

"He is the only student we have who could handle that kind of responsibility," Mr. Burton said. "It includes responsibility for the clay and the glaze materials; keeping a materials inventory and participating in all firings of the kiln. The department probably has more students participating in ceramics than in any other area."

Ceramics is "thinking with your hands," Mr. Smith said in an interview. "Clay is one of the most versatile materials. You are only limited by your imagination and I can't imagine running out of things to do with it."

"Because of our mass society, everything is produced alike. There is no need to strive for production perfection. It has all been done. I don't feel I have to do anything similar to that. A lot of people who look at my pots say, 'what are they?' I would like them to see what I see, but it doesn't really bother me. Why does a plate have to be round and scooped out? You have to break away from traditional ideas."

"I take the functional idea and apply it in a sculptural manner. Ceramics doesn't mean

## Computer's Memory Banks Help Link Students, Firms

NEW YORK (UPI)—The common meeting ground for a college senior looking for a particular job and a prospective employer who has it may be in the memory bank of a computer.

Thousands of campus recruiters from industry and government fall out across the nation each spring to interview and be interviewed by graduating college seniors and graduate students. Their goal is to find the man or woman with the "right" qualifications.

Simple as it sounds, the process often is frustrating and wasteful, both for recruiter and student. Until recently, recruiters had no way of zeroing in on the "right" students. Students wasted time running from one interview to another in search of a company with the kind of jobs they wanted. Such inefficiency was anachronistic in the age of the computer.

Recently, firms using computers to match employers with qualified students have been formed to make recruiting more efficient.

One is Re-Con Systems, an aggressive, acquisition minded company which in the past two years has grown from a four-man outfit into a corporation with annual sales of half a million dollars. The National Student Marketing Corp. also is active in the field through a subsidiary, Computa Job, which serves about 70 corporations.

Through a questionnaire, distributed by campus representatives or placement offices, Re-Con asks students on 500 campuses for such information as their interests, specialization, course of study, and preferred place and type of employment sought. It distributes a similar questionnaire to 100 or so clients to learn their needs. Answers from the questionnaires are fed into a computer. For a fee the client is provided a list of students matching its requirements.

Not every student, of course, exactly matches the company's specifications, so the computer assigns a correlation number to each ranging from 1.00 to 0.00 but according to John Sibbald, Re-Con's 33-year-old president, the client is not told how each student scored but merely provides a list of the top 20 or 30 students.

"The computer can't replace the eyeball to eyeball interview. It just means a more productive interview," said Sibbald in a recent interview.

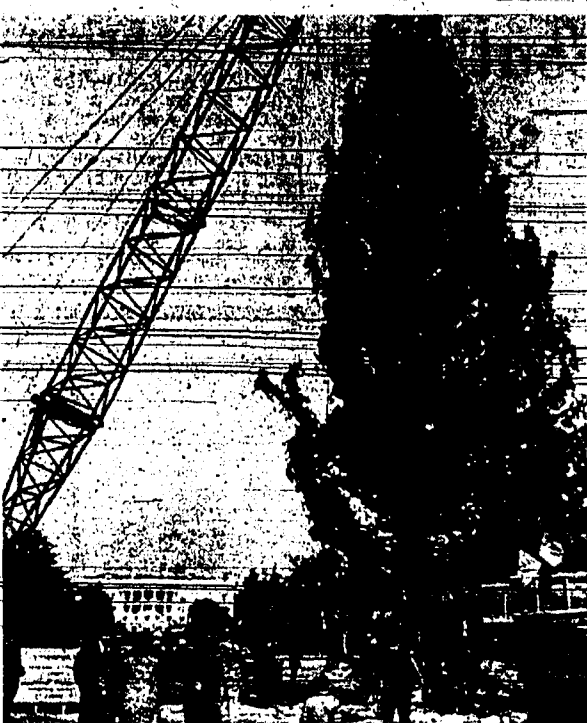
But when the recruiter arrives on campus, he pointed out, the student already knows that the company is interested in him and that he may be interested in that company.

Last spring Re-Con supplied its clients with the names of 47,000 students. They searched 20 schools for buyers and store managers for J. C. Penney, and Penney hired 40 students. This year Penney plans to use Re-Con on 55 campuses.

Re-Con branched out recently by using the computer to help high school students find suitable colleges and even scholarships.

"Hundreds of thousands of dollars in scholarships go begging each year because people just don't know about them," Sibbald said.

Re-Con plans to extend its job matching service to the military. It believes prospective employers can find qualified employees in the pool of junior officers and enlisted men who leave the service each year.

## Unique 'Instant Tax Refund' Service Advances Funds To Qualified Citizens

NEW YORK (UPI)—In a hurry up country where citizens sip instant coffee and eat instant TV dinners while watching instant playback of football action, it was inevitable someone would come up with an "instant tax refund" service.

Benevest, a newly formed subsidiary of Beneficial Finance Co., is scheduled to offer by Jan. 15 such a service in 50 offices around San Francisco and Los Angeles. Plans are to spread offices around the country after that, according to Robert L. Tucker, vice president of Beneficial.

The field is a big one. Government figures indicate that 70 per cent of the 77 million taxpayers will get refunds totaling more than \$10 billion this period. Most refund recipients have to wait four to six weeks for checks, and Americans don't like to wait, especially for money due them. Some will wait longer than the normal period if their returns contain errors, and one out of eight returns has some kind of error, mathematical or otherwise. More of these errors will be caught this period since all 1969 returns will

be mathematically audited. Heretofore there has been a partial auditing.

Aside from the potential business for Beneficial there are ruboff benefits for the company. It already has 1,800 loan offices with credit contacts around the United States, Canada, England and Australia. So there are few personnel or know-how problems involved.

Even more important, Beneficial is placing more emphasis on mutual funds, insurance and estate planning. Through such a service, it will get an invaluable list of potential customers.

For a fee of \$12 or more, depending on the complexity of the return, Benevest says it will prepare a computerized tax return printed on official Internal Revenue Service forms. The computer, on the basis of customer information, will do all the figuring and make decisions on deductions. It will be programmed to simulate the IRS checking system and will have built-in safeguards which automatically question any taxpayer input the computer considers impossible or improbable.

If the taxpayer is entitled to a refund he gets a check from

Benevest the day he signs and returns the tax form. He is expected to make prompt reimbursement when the government check arrives. Tucker says the company figures it can advance taxpayers up to \$50 million, depending on the number of returns processed.

"Naturally, we'll make a thorough evaluation of a client's credit position before advancing him any money," said a Benevest spokesman.

That credit check also will tip the company on possible insurance, mutual fund and estate planning customers. Actually, the company conceived "instant refund" as a loss leader to provide just such contact lists.

"We would have been satisfied to break even if we could get leads on other business in the process," said the Benevest spokesman. "And personnel was no problem. The system actually utilizes some of the time and facilities which now go to waste."

"The more we get into it, the more we are convinced that it will be profitable of itself. You know how Americans like to get things done without waiting."

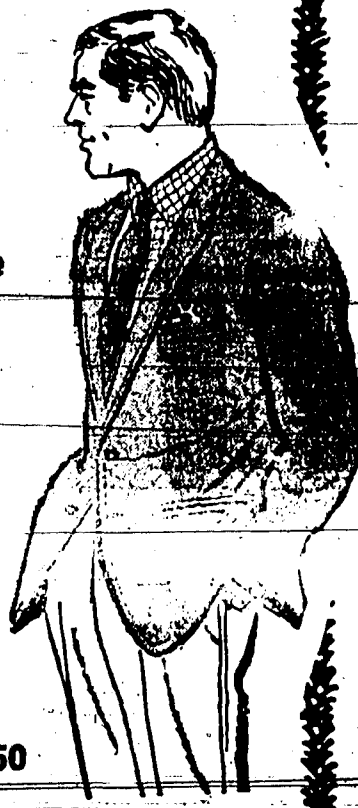

## Wall Street Chatter

NEW YORK (UPI)—There is a growing view in the administration and the Federal Reserve Board that price inflation will not be brought down much below current rates for a long time to come. Shearson, Hammill & Co. says. On the other hand, the firm notes, evidence of an economic slowdown continues to accumulate and it may still be reasonable to expect a moderate easing of restraint before too long, despite proclamations to the contrary.

While a slowing economy will eventually veer credit policy toward a degree of ease, there is no indication yet of such a shift, according to Standard & Poor's. And, while administration and Federal Reserve spokesmen last week indicated that monetary and fiscal restraints may be kept in force longer than expected, "we do not, however, rule out the possibility of some relaxation by the Fed before too long," the firm says.

Argus Research Corp. observes that "while it is obvious that the Federal Reserve cannot maintain the money squeeze as tight as it has been much longer, no one knows when and by how much the monetary authorities will relax their policy." The timing of a shift will have a great deal to do with the shape of the business curve in 1970, the firm says, noting that economists lately are not so eager to publicize their projections this year until they can see more clearly which way things are going.

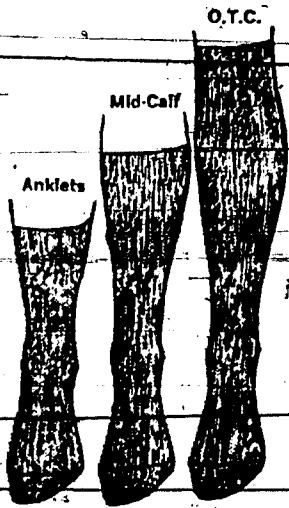

The overall quality of the conference, which has seldom fielded a national contender, isn't expected to be much better than usual.

And the same mediocrity probably will prevail among the area's independents like the University of Houston, West Texas State and Hardin-Simmons.

Howden was a much-recruited all-state prep star at Houston Waltrip High in 1967 and wound up playing his freshman ball at LSU, where he averaged 18 rebounds and 25 points per game. But, he became disenchanted with things at Baton Rouge, returned home and sat out a year while attending South Texas Junior College at Houston.

It appeared he was going to switch his varsity play to Coach Guy Lewis' Houston Cougars, but Southern Methodist became

interested in him again and prevailed upon the conference to vote him eligible for three varsity seasons. He then seemed headed for Dallas and SMU.

But, then his best friend, Jeff Baker, a Longhorn letterman as a sophomore, took over and persuaded his old Waltrip teammate to join him at Texas.

# Knicks Set NBA Record For Wins

ATLANTA (UPI)—The New York Knicks tied a National Basketball Association record for the most consecutive victories Wednesday night, winning their 17th in a row, 138-108 over the Atlanta Hawks.


It was their 22nd in 23 starts this far in the season. The streak ties the mark set by the old Washington Capitols in 1946,

and tied in 1959 by the Boston Celtics. No NBA team has ever gotten off to the season start the Knicks have.

New York accomplished it with the standard Knickerbocker ingredients—a stout defense and a withering break. The defense held Atlanta to a mere 12 points in the third quarter while New York was racking up

38 to break open a tight game. Willis Reed and Walt Frazier were the biggest contributors for the Knicks. Frazier had 33 points and so did Reed. Joe Caldwell topped the outmanned Hawks with 17 points.

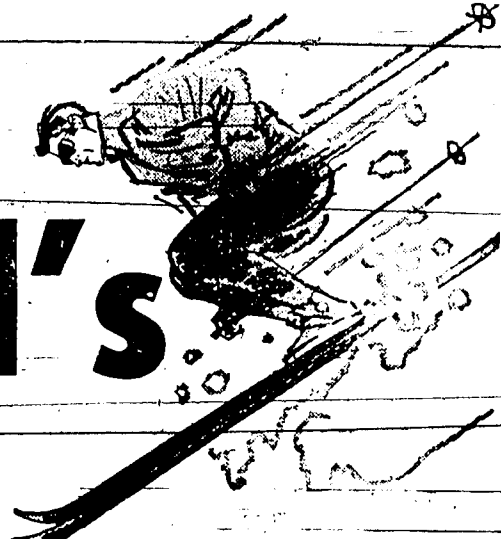

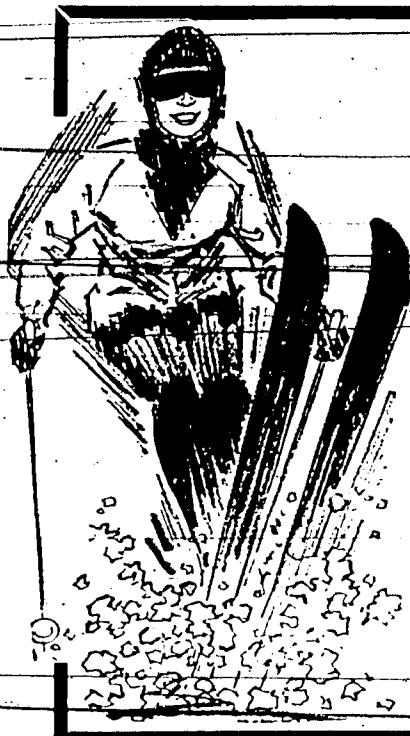



# Official Doubts Chance Of Construction Of Pipeline To Carry Oil From Alaska's Rich North Slope Discovery

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Interior Undersecretary Russell E. Train expressed doubt Wednesday that construction of a pipeline to carry oil from Alaska's North Slope could begin on schedule.

Train, testifying before the House Interior Committee, said delays meant the Trans Alaska Pipeline System (TAPS) probably would not be able to begin work in March, as it originally had planned.

The Interior Department official was testifying for the second time before the committee on the department's plans to grant a right of way over government lands for the pipeline from Prudhoe Bay to the port of Valdez.

Rep. John P. Saylor, R-Pa., and Reps. James B. Haley, D-Fla., questioned Alaska's authority to grant oil leases in lands that have not yet been turned over to the state under terms of Alaska's Statehood act.

Train said he was unable to answer the question at the time but would supply the committee with a response from the department's lawyers.

rich" but that oil lease income was all needed to "run the state government."

Under the Statehood Act, Alaska is allowed to select 103 million acres of public land but so far has selected only 25.6 million acres. Withdrawals of land from the public domain have been halted pending settlement of Indian land claims.

## Some Games Belong In Same Category As Rated Movies

NEW YORK (UPI)—Game makers ought to consider grading their products the way movie makers do.

Some games in this era of sensitivity training you see seem to belong in the same category as movies rated "X"—for extremely mature adults.

There's no trouble with checkers, chess and some of the old standby games. These could go tagged "G"—for general participation. Grandma to pint-sized grandchild play these and it's fun for all. No stunts at anything or anyone, including the participants.

The grading of games would prevent unsuspecting adults from buying extremely mature audience games for children—a situation that can happen with friends and relatives of children making forays into game departments on behalf of Santa in coming weeks.

You wouldn't want even a mature child to do some of the things required in the playing of some games among current offerings.

Sue Haven, Daniel Klein and Philip Ross invented one such game, called "Group Therapy." The Ivy League school graduates had help along the way from Joseph Schlichter, former Navy pilot, ex-dancer,

and now director of the Movement Psychotherapy Center in New York City.

In the playing, the inventors have found, an evening ends up being far more emotionally involving than anyone initially expects, more intense and more intimate. Strictly mature adult fun, it's called.

Some of the things players are asked to do:

—Hold each member of the group in a way which reflects how they feel about him or her.

—Answer the question, "Why would you not like the whole group to be nude, right, now?"

—Why would you,

—Assume the fetal position, close your eyes, and—rocking back and forth—make appropriate sounds.

—Hold someone in your lap. Rock and sing to him or her.

—Ask someone to hold you and rock you. Give yourself to the experience.

Honest. It's a game. It's supposed to help one get in touch, feel free, and experience joy.

"Julie's wearing skirts she wore in the 6th grade," said Mrs. Nixon. She said that Julie,

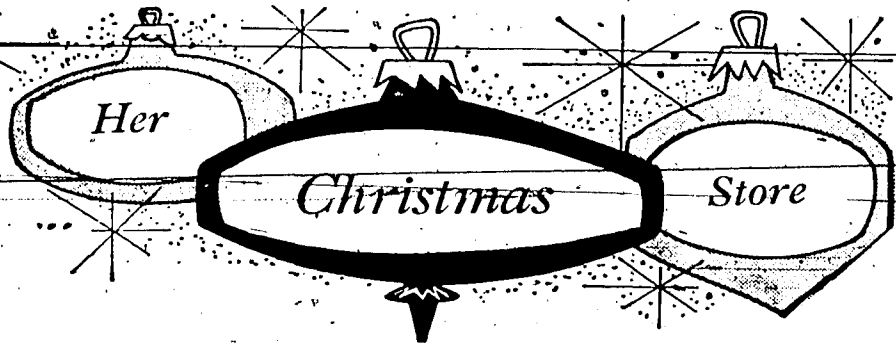
a senior at Smith College, has simply hemmed up her old skirts for the new mini look.

## Critics Praise New Book By Anne Morow Lindbergh

"The roots of life are in wilderness," says Anne Morow Lindbergh, "even as the flowers of civilization rise from cities. We need wilderness as a source of life, but we cannot retreat from civilization."

On the basis of two experiences—a visit to Cape Kennedy where she and her husband, Gen. Charles A. Lindbergh, dined with the astronauts before they took off on the first moon shot, and a trip to the wilderness of Africa, where she observed animals and nature in unspoiled grandeur—Mrs. Lindbergh points out in her new book, "Earth Shine," how in an increasingly technological world, man, nature and science are eternally linked.

"No one, it has been said, will ever look at the moon in the same way again. More significantly can one say that no one will ever look at the earth in the same way. Man had to free himself from earth to perceive both its diminutive place in a solar system and its inestimable value as a life-fostering planet."

Mrs. Lindbergh believes that modern men and women must renew their essential ties with animals and nature. "It can be cultivated in one's own backyard. I have suburban neighbors who, with the remains of supper, coax raccoons to their hands; others who feed the wild geese, others who preserve the marshes. Even in cities one can find a touch of the wild by watching migrating birds in parks."

"Earth Shine" has been hailed by literary critics as Anne Morow Lindbergh's "finest work" (The Pittsburgh Press).

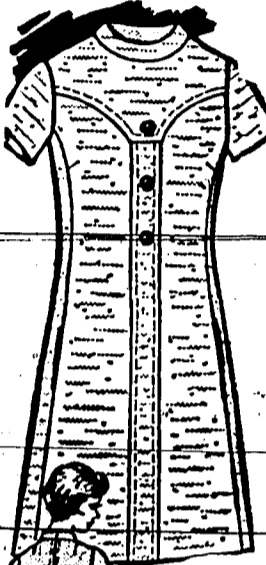

### Wives Share With Mates As Men Adopt Accessories

Women and girls no longer have a monopoly on the family hairdryer, educators were told at the National Home Appliance Conference in New Orleans last month.

the personal care appliance field is attracting male members of the household, or at least those who are old enough to shave.

It was noted that a man soon discovers his wife's lighted make-up mirror, at a day-bright setting, provides a shaving mirror far more effective than the conventional bathroom facility.

The current masculine interest in electric grooming aids was revealed in one of more than 40 presentations at the third annual National Home Appliance Conference, sponsored by the Association of Home Appliance Manufacturers.

The annual two-day conferences are structured by AHAM to provide educators, editors and utility and extension service economists with current information as a basis for more meaningful programs of consumer education concerning the purchase, care, use, maintenance and servicing of household appliances.

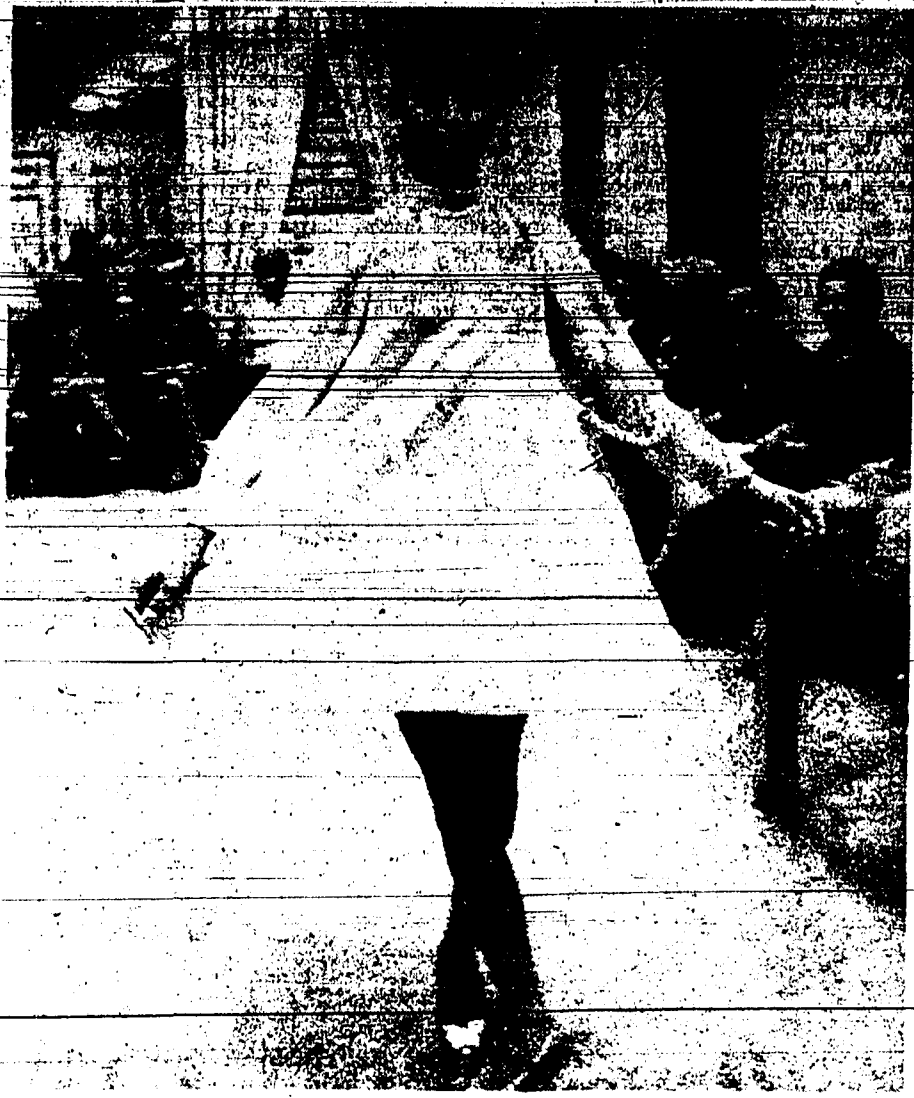

## Air Force Association Plans T.F. Educational Symposium

Albert V. Mayrhofer, Springfield, Va., special assistant to the associate commissioner, U.S. Office of Education, will be keynote speaker at the second annual Idaho Air Force Association educational symposium next month in Twin Falls.

"The Other 80 Per Cent" will be the subject of the one-day symposium Dec. 5. This is the percentage of young people in today's society which educators and other experts agree will not reach college or obtain a baccalaureate degree. What measures can be taken by various departments and industry in preparing these non-college bound youth for job opportunities and employment will be discussed by those attending.

He also will serve on a panel which will summarize conclusions and disclosures made at the meeting. Other panel members will include representatives of industry, vocational education, State Board of Education and the military.

Mr. Mayrhofer has taught in grades eight through 12 in science, industrial arts, English, reading, mathematics and vocational education. He has been a consultant to the Bureau of Secondary Education, California State Department of Education; coordinator of science for San Bernardino County, Calif.; science education editor, *Litton Industries*, and director of industrial technology, San Mateo Union High School District, Calif.

He also has served as a consultant to several school districts, the Atomic Corp., of America, Bio-Atomic Founda-

tion, California State Department of Education, Hearst Corp., Xerox Corp., National Rifle Association, Aero-Space Education Foundation, San Bernardino Mayor's office and the Far West Regional Laboratory among others.

About 200 delegates, including representatives of the state legislature, school districts, employment agencies, industry, colleges, counselors and others interested. Between 50 and 60 delegates already have registered.

The meetings will be at the College of Southern Idaho Fine Arts Center, hosted by CSI. The Air Transportation Symposium and State AFA Convention will follow the educational symposium on Dec. 6.

PASADENA (UPI) — America's Apollo 12 astronauts, Charles Conrad, Richard F. Gordon and Alan L. Bean, will serve as marshals of the 81st Tournament of Roses Parade, it was learned today.

Tournament President Lewis Edward confirmed that there had been "communication" with officials of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration. He said a formal announcement of the parade marshal will be made Dec. 5.

## Sweden Confers With Hanoi, U.S. On Fate Of Prisoners

STOCKHOLM (UPI) — Informed Swedish sources said today the Swedish government has been in touch with both Hanoi and Washington in recent weeks concerning the fate of U.S. prisoners of war in North Vietnam.

The disclosure came as two Air Force wives from Dallas, Texas, Mrs. Bonnie Singleton and Mrs. Paula Hartness, flew here from Paris to ask Sweden for help in determining the fate of their husbands who were shot down over North Vietnam.

Olof Palme, Sweden's new Social Democratic premier, indicated "last month" he was prepared to use Sweden's good offices on behalf of the more than 500 missing Americans believed prisoners of Hanoi.

Sweden is one of the few European nations maintaining diplomatic contacts with Hanoi and the inquiries apparently were conducted through normal

diplomatic channels. Hanoi officials in Paris met the two women Tuesday for the second time in 10 weeks and told them there was no indication when letters would arrive from North Vietnam. They were promised letters when they met the Communists in September, but no letters came and they returned to Paris.

"I also asked them if anyone in Paris or in the United States had a list of all the prisoners and they said 'no,'" Mrs. Singleton, 27, said in Paris. So they turned to Stockholm to see if Palme could use his influence.

Prather ordered the sentencing deferred for one year during which Schmehl was to meet certain conditions, including spending 24 non-working days in the Kootenai County Jail, repaying certain court costs and not violating any laws.

Here is a nice Thanksgiving Day problem. Can South make three no-trump against any defense?

He had no trouble at the table, since West opened a spade and South was able to clear the club suit while he still had a heart entry to dummy.

The hand was given to a group of experts, to analyze what would happen with a queen of hearts lead. Dummy would

for his contract in the diamond suit. He would lead from dummy and play his queen. Then he would go back to dummy with the queen of clubs to lead a second diamond. If East played the king, or played it on the first diamond lead, South would let it hold. If East played low, South would take his ace and bump the king and jack together.

Thus, the hand could be made against any defense, according to the first expert analysis.

Now see if you readers can find a flaw in this reasoning, because there is one. If East discards his king of diamonds on the third heart, there will be no way for South to keep West out of the lead when he plays diamonds and the hand won't make.

There is still a flaw. If South simply wins the second heart in dummy, East gets no chance to jettison the diamond king and so the hand is actually unbeatable if South knows exactly what to do.
