**Sees Leary As 'Evil'**

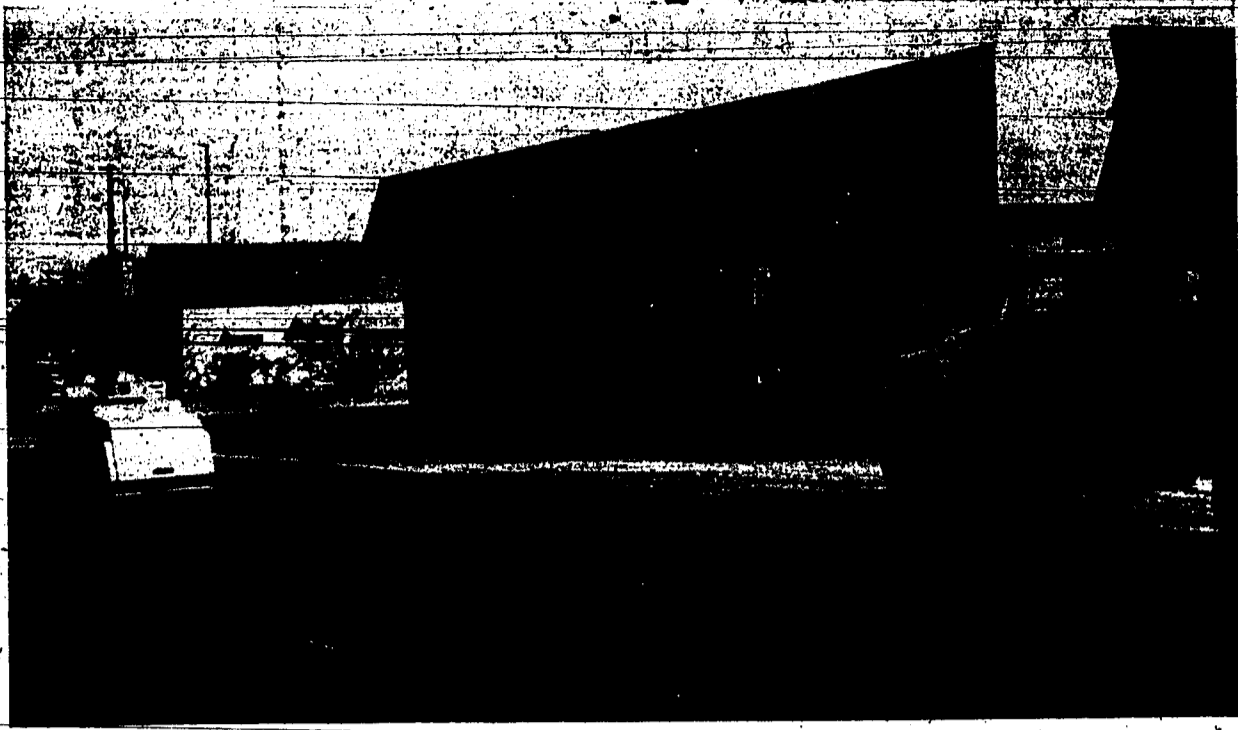
WASHINGTON (UPI) — Entertainer Art Linkletter, whose daughter committed suicide after taking LSD, Wednesday called former Harvard lecturer Timothy Leary a "poisonous, evil man" for promoting mind-expanding drugs.

Linkletter told the Governors Conference on Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs that Leary, speaking to capacity crowds at universities, has been telling students that taking drugs "is a way to turn on, turn out and drop out."

With President Nixon and Vice President Spiro T. Agnew sitting on the same platform, the television entertainer choked with emotion when he told the audience of governors and their families about his 20-year-old daughter Diane's suicide last October.

At the time of the incident, Linkletter called it "murder" by purveyors of drugs.

He said that he decided to speak out in his "grief and outrage" to accentuate the dangers of drug taking. Linkletter said his daughter had the "handicap of carrying a famous name" and that "such kids are prejudged." Children of prominent people often go out of their way to prove "they are part of the gang," he said.

**Church Council Develops 'Peace Now' In Vietnam**

DETROIT (UPI) — A church-led drive for "peace now!" in Vietnam took shape Wednesday at the general assembly of the National Council of Churches (NCC).

The assembly, attended by 3,000 leaders of 33 Protestant and Orthodox denominations, devoted Wednesday's plenary session entirely to a discussion of what one speaker called "this demoralizing, dehumanizing, immoral, interminable war."

Meanwhile leaders of several denominations set up a private meeting across the Detroit River in Windsor, Ontario, with representatives of draft-age American youths who have fled to Canada to avoid induction.

Informed sources said the purpose of the meeting was to explore ways in which funds of churches in the United States could be used to help support the expatriate draft resisters.

The assembly will express itself formally on Vietnam in a resolution that will be brought up for virtually certain adoption at Thursday's closing session. Already approved by the 200-member general board which acts as a steering committee for the assembly, the resolution declares that the risks involved

in a rapid U.S. withdrawal from Vietnam are less dangerous than the "loss of confidence abroad and dissension at home" resulting from continued U.S. involvement.

Also awaiting assembly action and virtually certain approval is a "message to the churches" which attempts, in the fashion of the Book of Revelation, to express what God seems to be saying to His people in America at this hour of history.

**Governor Asks Utilization Of Forest Areas**

SPOKANE (UPI) — Idaho's Gov. Don Samuelson outlined four steps today which he said would "attain the goal of full utilization of forest lands."

Speaking before the Western Forestry and Conservation Association at the Rldpath Hotel, Samuelson called for:

— Extensive road construction to permit more intensive timber management.

— Immediate regeneration of cutover areas with the proper species of new growth.

— And more attention to thinning efforts on young stands of trees where overstocking exists.

Samuelson told the group it was true he had been unhappy with the U.S. Forest Service over some of its management of natural resources. He said he was given "specific and undeniable evidence that mismanagement, or lack of cooperation, was severely handicapping the timber resources of Idaho and other Intermountain and Western states."

The governor said his criticisms were not leveled in a "destructive manner" but "the situation did need to be brought into focus because the potential for vast improvement was there and there were no signs that full potential was the target."

Samuelson said the annual timber loss rate in Idaho was over a million and a quarter board feet.

"The state and nation simply cannot afford to stand by and watch such invaluable resources continue to vanish," the governor said. "I am advised that the annual loss of timber nationally would furnish enough board feet of lumber to build two and a half million low-cost homes each year."

### Changes In Gun Act Spelled Out By Officials Of IRS

It no longer is necessary for dealers to keep records of certain ammunition sales, the Internal Revenue Service said today.

Newly enacted legislation eliminates the need for dealers to keep record on sales of shotgun ammunition, ammunition suitable only for use in rifles, and component parts of these types of ammunition. Purchases of ammunition interchangeable between rifles and handguns, such as .22 caliber rimfire ammunition, continue to be subject to the recordkeeping requirements. Previously, the Gun Control Act of 1968, required records for all ammunition sales.

IRS officials stressed, however, that no other aspect of the act, which is administered by the Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms Division of the IRS, was changed by the legislation.

Persons engaged in selling ammunition still are required to be licensed under the act.

Anyone under 21 years of age cannot purchase handgun ammunition. However, individuals at least 18 can buy rifle and shotgun ammunition. Dealers must still require purchasers to identify themselves if there is doubt about their age.

Felons, persons under indictment for a felony, fugitives from justice, unlawful users of drugs, mental incompetents, and persons under 18 continue to be prohibited from purchasing ammunition of any type.

The change in the law affects only shotgun and rifle ammunition, and their component parts. Dealers are still required to keep records on the sales of other ammunition. Specifying the type and quantity of ammunition and identifying the buyer, IRS said.

Saturday the service counter lobby at the main post office will be closed all day. The Lynwood station located at 562 Blue Lakes Blvd. N. will be open for sale of postage supplies and parcel mailings from 9 a.m. to noon.

Saturday, Dec. 13, service counters at the main office will be open all day, 8:30 a.m. until 5:30 p.m. and the Lynwood station will be open 9 a.m. till 5 p.m.

Saturday, Dec. 20, will be too late for mailings expected to be transported any distance and delivered by Christmas, but a clerk will be at the service counter at the main office at least until noon to handle calls for parcels. The Lynwood station will be open for the sale of postage supplies and parcel mailings until noon, longer if necessary.

### Montana Needs More Boxcars

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Chairman Virginia Mae Brown of the Interstate Commerce Commission was told Wednesday Montana urgently needs 2,071 railroad boxcars to transport the state's grain harvest to market.

The plea came in a letter from Sen. Lee Metcalf, D-Mont., who said Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield of Montana had made a similar request earlier.

Metcalf said Rep. John Melcher, D-Mont., had been "working for a month or more" with the commission in an effort to find a solution to the boxcar shortage.

### Police Aide Notes Regret At Violence

CHICAGO (UPI)—Deputy Police Supt. James Rochford says that because of the clashes between police and demonstrators at the 1968 Democratic National Convention he may have failed his duties as an officer.

"Sixty civilians were injured. I regret that," Rochford said Tuesday in discussing the clash between police and antiwar demonstrators at Michigan Avenue and Balbo Drive Aug. 28, 1968. "One-hundred and ninety police officers were injured. I regret that.

"I feel, perhaps, because of what happened, I failed."

Rochford underwent cross and re-direct examination Tuesday at the trial of the "Chicago Seven" with the defense trying to get him to recount police activities that may have led to some of the violence.

Under re-direct examination, Rochford told U.S. Attorney Thomas A. Foran police allowed protesters to march from Grant Park to Lincoln Park but not from Grant Park to the International Amphitheatre, where the convention was held.

Defense attorney Leonard I. Weinglass asked Rochford if he could think of any errors he made in connection with the demonstrations.

"No, they don't jump out at me," Rochford replied.

Defense attorney William Kunstler asked Rochford why police swept demonstrators out of Lincoln Park on the nights of Aug. 26 and 27 but let them stay in Grant Park Aug. 28.

Rochford said police had reports of "public indecency, nudity, and love-ins in Lincoln Park."

Kunstler asked, "Is it not a fact that you ordered your men to take off their badges and massacre people in the darkness of Lincoln Park where there were no television cameras or people in the Hilton to watch?"

Rochford, angry, replied, "That's an absolute, barefaced lie."

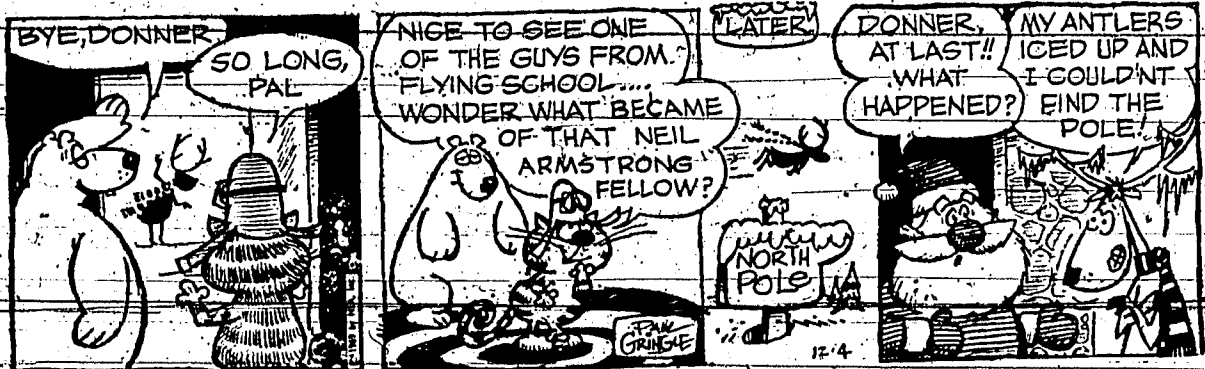

### Former Soviet President, Red Army Marshal Dies At 88

MOSCOW (UPI)—Kliment Y. Voroshilov, a contemporary of V. I. Lenin, the Soviet founder, worked and fought his way from the coal mines of the Ukraine through Czarist prisons and exile in Siberia to high-ranking positions in the military and government.

An official announcement carried by the Soviet Tass news agency said the cause of death was "general arteriosclerosis."

It said Voroshilov would be buried in Red Square near the Kremlin wall.

His 66-year career was marked by a series of ups and downs. At times he was a hero and other times he was the object of ridicule by his fellow Kremlin leaders.

### Sen. Dodd Suggests GIs Were Using Marijuana At Song My

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Sen. Thomas Dodd suggested Wednesday that American soldiers who allegedly massacred Vietnamese civilians at Song My may have been under the effect of highly potent Asian marijuana.

As the soldiers' commander was called to testify before a special Pentagon board, Dodd told the Senate he had information "from an outstanding expert that the marijuana toxic psychosis may have played a part in the events at My Lai (Song My) on March 16, 1968."

### Surplus Of Wheat Said Unnecessary

BOISE (UPI)—The chairman of the Idaho Wheat Commission told the Idaho State Wheat Growers Association convention Tuesday there would be no surplus of wheat in the United States if domestic consumption returned to the 1947 level.

Gwynn Rice, Hill City, discussed the 1969 activities of the commission during the second day of the convention. He said wheat growers had been on the defensive and needed to take some positive action. He advocated an aggressive promotion program of advertising to boost domestic consumption of wheat products and said the Idaho Wheat Commission was one of the first groups to seek positive action on wheat problems.

### Jesse Unruh To Campaign In California

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Assembly Leader Jesse Unruh, depicting himself as a poor boy from Texas and Gov. Ronald Reagan as a puppet of millionaires, announced today his candidacy for governor.

Dodd said he had asked the White House and the Defense Department to cooperate with investigators from his Senate juvenile delinquency subcommittee to determine the relationship between the alleged massacre and drugs, if any. ### Leader Of Nomadic Cult Is Apprehended 'Hiding In Tiny Cupboard,' Officer Says

INDEPENDENCE, Calif. (UPI)—Charles Manson, the hypnotic leader of a nomadic cult suspected in the slayings of Sharon Tate and 11 other persons, was found "hiding in a tiny cupboard" when authorities raided his commune in Death Valley in October. The California Highway Patrolman who led a posse in the raid testified Wednesday at Manson's court hearing on a relatively minor auto theft charge that the long-haired cult leader was captured covering in the cupboard.

James Purcell, the only patrolman usually on the 3,000-square-mile beat, said the bearded Manson was "hiding in a tiny cupboard beneath the sink. It was perhaps three feet high, 18 to 20 inches wide and 12 to 18 inches deep. It took him a time to unwind."

Manson, who held a mysterious sway over his followers, was the only one of the nine persons arrested in the raid who hid when the posse descended on the three-room house which was the base camp for the nomadic commune. Before the end of the six-hour preliminary hearing, the district attorney's office here said Manson would be released to Los Angeles authorities if a murder warrant was issued. The court ruled there was sufficient evidence of receiving stolen property to bring Manson to trial. Bail was set at \$25,000.

YOUTH DEMANDS FEEN-AGE VOTE

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—A Santa Clara County teenager filed a suit Wednesday in U.S. District Court that would allow California residents between 13 and 20 to vote.

JACKSON, Wyo. (UPI)—A Jackson area rancher has charged that sonic boom shocks could be blamed for triggering extensive mass avalanches in Jackson Hole during 1969.

But when the film was shown for the jury, Roger Cubbage, a U.S. Justice Department lawyer assisting the prosecution, turned up the volume.

Dr. Donald G. MacLeod, owner of the Granite Creek Ranch, said avalanches destroyed at least 3,000 acres of timber in Granite Creek Canyon alone during 1969.

The courtroom was filled with a thundering roar of demonstrators chanting "— LBJ" and other obscenities.

MacLeod said there had been an enormous loss of forest cover due to snow avalanches in a number of areas in Jackson Hole.

Defense attorney William Kunstler called the change in volume level a "trick" and a "fraud."

## Smylie Commends 'Amazing' Young People For Maturity

SPOKANE (UPI) — Three-time Idaho Governor Robert Smylie said the time "may well come" to accord to the students in our high schools and colleges the kind of respect to which their increased maturity entitles them.

Smylie made the comment at the concluding banquet of the Washington Association of School Directors Association.

"These amazing young people have a great deal to say to us if we will just be still and listen for awhile," Smylie said. "None of us here would argue that we have done very well with this world of ours. There are valid complaints against our performance on every hand."

"For that reason, it should not be too much at least to hear the youngsters out and to measure the validity of their criticisms of what we have not done," Smylie said. "The very act of giving them a hearing may do much to quell the obvious danger with which they face problems which they will be required to solve but which they did little to create."

Turning to youth and the education process, Smylie said "more than a few" youngsters are honestly concerned about the quality and the usefulness of the education that we hand them in our public schools.

"Of course, it is necessary in a mass education system to devote over much time to the mediocre," he said. "Nevertheless, the economic usefulness of

much of the high school curricula of today can be questioned. We are overtrained on collegiate preparation, and undertrained on the simple mechanics of making a living which will be the main concern of most graduates."

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# Terrible Desolation, Heat Described In Story About Goler Wash In Death Valley — A Place Where Hippies Lived And Allegedly Plotted Murder

**GOLER WASH, (UPI)**—Tumbleweeds skittered Wednesday across a desolate abandoned ranch where police say a mystic band of hippie marauders camped and plotted to pillage and kill.

There's no one at home now in the shabby stone and cement ranch house at the Barker Ranch, and no one is sleeping in the numerous caves and mine shafts hidden in the hills. Most of the 26 residents of the commune known as Charles

Miller Manson's "family" are in jail. Some of them are suspected of having invaded the Benedict Canyon Home of Actress Sharon Tate and killing her and four others.

"There's no one up there now that we know of," Lt. Howard Hurlbut of the California Highway Patrol said.

Hurlbut helped round up residents of the ranch on auto theft charges. Eight stolen vehicles were found hidden under camouflage tarps on the ranch.

"Some of the women were nude and some were wearing bikini underpants," Hurlbut said. "They were hunting knives on sheaths, and I want to tell you, some of them were vicious-looking women."

Hurlbut said the group had set up lookout posts on the hill-sides, and were equipped with walkie-talkies.

They had been living on Barker Ranch, located at about 4,000 foot level in a sage brush covered area. There are running springs on the ranch in a wooded area surrounded by fig and pomegranate trees.

Trucks lead to a deserted mountain cabin where officers found a stripped late model rental car.

Miners told officers a group of scavenging hippies lived in the valley and on Sept. 29 the first party of raiders went to the camp. They questioned a group of seven nude and semi-nude women found hiding in the

brush, but no arrests were made.

When officers returned later in the day with information on the stolen vehicles, there was no one visible at the ranch.

Twelve women and three men were arrested at the commune on Oct. 10 and six women and five men, including Manson, on Oct. 11.

Hurlbut said Barker Ranch is owned by a Mrs. Barker, whose whereabouts is not known.

"They might have had permission to be there, or they might have been squatters," he said.

Few people live in the arid, inhospitable desert where pioneers perished. Tourists and rockhounds visit Death Valley, but do not linger in the blazing heat, which reaches 140 degrees Fahrenheit.

## Divorce

**SANTA MONICA, (UPI)**—The wife of Groucho Marx was granted a divorce and a \$1 million property settlement Wednesday after she testified the comedian told her she "couldn't cook."

"He said he was thinking of trading me in for a new cook — and a new wife," said Mrs. Edey Marie Marx, 38, a former model.

Marx, 78, was not in court, but his attorney withdrew a cross complaint charging cruelty.

The settlement included \$210,000 in alimony over the next seven years, \$337,000 from Marx's television contract with NBC and half the proceeds from the sale of their \$350,000 home.

The couple was married Jan. 17, 1954, in Sun Valley, and separated last Jan. 6.

## NATO Powers Give Okay On Use Of Nuclear Weapons

**BRUSSELS, (UPI)**—The believed-the-Moscow conference North Atlantic (NATO) alliance was designed not only to throw Wednesday gave the go-ahead the West off balance but also for use of tactical nuclear weapons in a warning barrage Brussels meeting.

NATO sources disclosed that under the blueprint adopted by the defense ministers, the West could in certain circumstances use tactical nuclear weapons as a final warning to the Soviets that if they continued an attack, the full weight of American strategic nuclear deterrent would be flung back at them.

Under this plan, the sources said, if Allied ground forces failed to halt a major attack by Soviet conventional forces, the West as a last resort would fire a limited salvo of nuclear weapons against military targets in Eastern Europe.

## Nixon Quips About Offering Moon, Then Delivering Same

**WASHINGTON, (UPI)**—"For years, politicians have promised the moon," President Nixon quipped. "I'm the first one to be able to deliver it."

The President then presented each governor attending a White House conference on drugs a plaque bearing a tiny flag of his state that was carried to the moon by the Apollo 11 astronauts, plus small chunks of the lunar surface brought back by the spacemen.

Each plaque bore the inscription "Presented to the people of the state of \_\_\_\_\_ and underneath it said, 'Richard Nixon, President of the United States of America.'"

The plaques also carried the explanation: "This flag of your state was carried to the moon and back by Apollo and this fragment of the moon's surface

was brought to earth by the crew of the first manned lunar landing.

The tiny chips of the moon surface, picked up by Neil Armstrong and Edwin E. Aldrin Jr. in July from the Sea of Tranquility, were mounted on the walnut and plastic plaques at the Manned Spacecraft Center outside Houston. The samples were extremely small. Most of them weighed about 50 milligrams.

## Off Again, On Again — Then Off

**WASHINGTON, (UPI)**—The off-again-on-again Senate Foreign Relations Committee hearings on Vietnam are off again.

Chairman J. William Fulbright's latest proposal for hearings on "what's happening to this country as a result of the war" was rejected by other committee members headed by the ranking Republican on the committee, Sen. George D. Aiken of Vermont.

It was the second time Aiken had used his prestige to stop Foreign Relations Committee hearings on the war.

The committee—at Aiken's urging—last month twice postponed hearings on administration policies in Vietnam. Those hearings were put off till next year.

"I said no," Aiken said of the latest Fulbright plan. "I couldn't see it. We have too many investigations already."

"I don't mind if Bill wants to find out what's wrong with the world," Aiken added, but he said he could see little point in it.

## Ship Drifts Unmanned In Pacific

**SAN DIEGO, Calif. (UPI)**—The 355-foot oceanographic research vessel Flip has been drifting unmanned in the Pacific Ocean most of this week. Scripps Institution of Oceanography officials revealed Wednesday.

The vessel, which is in a vertical position, was being watched and was to be reboarded when rough seas subsided.

A spokesman said the vessel was working in 60-foot high waves about 360 miles north of Oahu Monday when it experienced a washover and partial flooding of the engine room.

As power was restored, but the vessel remained watertight.

The six crew members and four scientists aboard were evacuated Tuesday to the navy ship Sands, which also was working in the area. The men aboard Flip had no operating power, heat or cooking facilities.

Flip has been operated by the Scripps marine physical laboratory since 1962. The vessel is towed horizontally, then shifted to a vertical position by flooding tanks for scientific operations.

## Moratorium At Lake Tahoe To Aid Construction

**SACRAMENTO, (UPI)**—Two conservationists in the California legislature expressed support Wednesday for a law temporarily banning new construction at Lake Tahoe unless developers agree to a self-imposed moratorium.

Assemblyman Edwin Z'berg, D-Sacramento, said he is prepared to introduce a bill declaring a moratorium if the California half of the bistate California-Nevada Tahoe Regional Planning Agency indicates a new law is needed.

**FLOOD VICTIMS**  
**BANGKOK, (UPI)**—Floods have forced more than 2,000 persons from their homes in Thailand's four southernmost provinces and rain is still falling in the area, an official report said Wednesday.

## Escapee Nabbed

**CARSON CITY, Nev. (UPI)**—Charles Banks, 23, who escaped from the Nevada State Prison while on a work detail Aug. 3, 1968, has been arrested by the FBI in Spokane, Wash., Warden Carl Hocker said today.

Hocker said Banks was the sole remaining escapee at large from the prison and was the only inmate to escape successfully in 1968.

At the time of his escape Banks was serving a five-year term for burglary out of Clark County and had been in prison for about 10 months.

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**Law Upheld**

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (UPI) — The Florida Supreme Court unanimously upheld the constitutionality Wednesday of state laws prohibiting the use or possession of marijuana.

"Since marijuana, in addition to harming the individual, is a threat to society as a whole, we have no difficulty in upholding its prohibition by the state," said the decision written by Justice Joe Boyd.

"An individual might restrict his possession of marijuana to the privacy of his home, but the effects of the drug are not so restricted."

The decision came in an appeal by Anthony B. Borras, a former Florida State University student sentenced to eight months in jail for possession of marijuana. His attorneys argued the state law against marijuana possession restricts a citizen "in the privacy of his own home."

**Hilliard Is Arrested In California**

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Black Panther Leader David Hilliard was arrested by federal agents Wednesday in connection with a moratorium day speech in which he said "we'll kill Mr. Nixon."

Hilliard was seized by secret service agents in San Francisco. With the title of chief of staff, Hilliard had been the top national leader of the militant black panther party still free. The party has headquarters in Berkeley, Calif. Chairman Bobby Seale is in jail awaiting trial on several charges.

During the moratorium day rally at Golden Gate Park Nov. 15, the panther leader was among speakers who addressed a crowd of 100,000 persons.

"We'll kill Mr. Nixon. We'll kill anybody that stands in the way of our freedom," Hilliard said at the rally.

Other speakers at the event included former Sen. Wayne Morse, of Oregon, and Rev. Ralph Abernathy, of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference.

Some persons in the crowd booed Hilliard when he referred to Nixon. Others called out "Peace, Peace."

The panther leader then said, "That kind of peace allows the kind of genocide perpetrated against the Jewish people."

Hilliard, 27, was an activist on the San Francisco State College campus during student turmoil there.

He has an arrest record dating from 1962. The charges ranged from traffic violations to assault with intent to commit murder. On Feb. 25, 1968, he was charged in Berkeley with conspiracy and carrying a loaded gun.

**San Francisco Judge Hears Arguments In Alioto Matter**

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — A federal judge began hearing arguments Wednesday as to whether Look magazine authors Richard Carlson and L. A. Scola should be held in contempt for failing to answer questions about their story linking Mayor Joseph L. Alioto with the Mafia.

Max Blecher, attorney for Alioto in his \$12.5 million libel suit against Look, argued that U.S. District Judge Bruce Thompson of Reno must find the authors in contempt or rewrite the entire law of libel.

At the end of Blecher's argument, Thompson recessed his court until today when he will hear from Look Attorney Charles Kenady.

Brisson and Carlson were ordered to be present. Earlier in the day, the judge set Jan. 26 for a hearing on motions for summary judgment whether the case will go to trial on its merits. If it does, April 13 was set as a "provisional" trial date.

The long court day began with Carlson on the stand in a closed session. He and Brisson had testified in closed court Monday and Tuesday.

In the afternoon session, the court was open. Blecher disclosed that the authors had physically cut out the names of most of their informants from a series of looseleaf notebooks containing their notes on the Alioto story.

The authors then refused to answer questions about the missing names, claiming privilege under the first amendment in regard to freedom of the press.

**Protestant Church Women Contend Sex Discrimination Is More Prevalent Than Race Discrimination**

DETROIT (UPI) — Contending sex discrimination is even more prevalent in the church than race discrimination, Protestant women Wednesday vowed to

elect one of their own to the presidency of the National Council of Churches (NCC) even though it means rejecting the first black candidate for the post.

The election will take place Thursday at the closing session of the NCC's triennial General Assembly, and will give the organization either its first woman president or its first

Negro president.

The candidates for a three-year term are Mrs. Cynthia Wedel, 61, of Washington, D.C., a white Episcopalian with a Ph.D. in psychology, and the Rev. Albert B. Cleage Jr., 58, of Detroit, a Negro minister of the United Church of Christ who has developed a new theology based on the premise that Jesus was a black man.

An informal poll by United Press International indicated Mrs. Wedel will win handsily. She is well known to delegates, having served previously as a vice president and an associate general secretary of the NCC. Cleage has never held office in the NCC. Mrs. Wedel was proposed by the official nominating committee. Cleage was nominated from the floor by

the National Committee of Black Churchmen (NCBC). The assembly also must choose between a white man, Dr. R. H. Edwin Espy, 61, and a black man, the Rev. Leon Watts, 34, for general secretary, the top administrative post of the NCC. Espy, the present general secretary, is a Baptist layman. Watts, nominated by a black caucus, is a New York

pastor of the A.M.E. Zion Church, and a director of the Black Economic Development Conference (BEDC). It was the first contested election in the NCC's 18-year history.

Some wondered why the nominating committee had not forestalled the problem by choosing a black woman. They were told privately the commit-

tee tried to do just that—but Mrs. Coretta King declined the post.

Mrs. Wedel had the ardent support of women's caucuses composed of about 100 women delegates to the assembly. The caucus pointed out in a statement that women do most of the work in churches, but are poorly represented in high offices, both local and national.

**Special Aid To Deserters**

**Is Sought**

DETROIT (UPI) — A special committee of the National Council of Churches (NCC) recommended Wednesday that U.S. churches raise "substantial" funds to support 60,000 American military deserters and draft resisters who have taken refuge in Canada.

"Most of them have made the decision to leave their homeland in agony of conscience, with few material possessions," said the committee, headed by the Rev. Dow Kirkpatrick, pastor of the First United Methodist Church of Evanston, Ill. "We must not abandon them in their hour of critical need."

Kirkpatrick told a news conference that about half of the draft-age expatriates have applied for "landed immigrant status" which will enable them to get jobs in Canada, but many have no means of support and are living off charitable handouts from Canadian churches.

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — A family spokesman announced Wednesday that a \$12 million libel and defamation of character suit against the New York Daily News brought by the former Dolly Fritz MacMaster and her husband Newton Cope, had been settled out of court for \$30,000.

Attorney Richard Herndon will receive \$10,759 of the settlement fee, the spokesman said, adding the agreement was reached out of court to avoid notoriety of a trial.

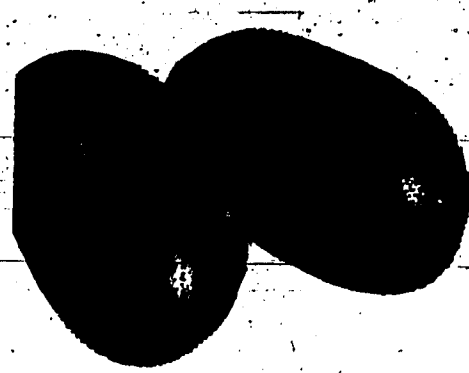

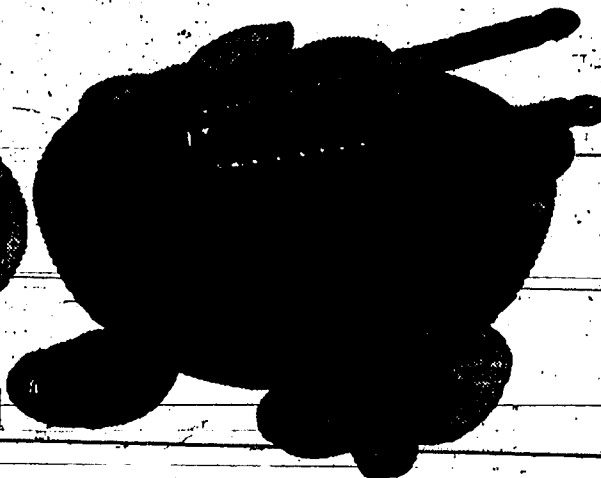

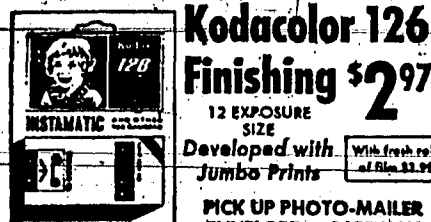

### Knife-Wielding Man Hijacks Philadelphia-Bound Airliner

PHILADELPHIA (UPI) — A Trans World Airlines jet hijacked to Cuba by a knife-wielding Negro on a flight from San Francisco to Philadelphia landed in Philadelphia early Wednesday.

The Boeing 707, TWA's Flight 54, landed at Philadelphia International Airport at 5:30 a.m. after a stop in Miami for customs clearance. It carried 20 passengers and a crew of seven.

A passenger, R. Kallman, 42, of Palo Alto, Calif., said the hijacker left the plane when it landed in Havana. The hijacker was identified only as B. Hamilton.

"The only thing I saw him do on the plane was force the stewardess up the aisle at a good clip," Kallman said. "The captain handled the incident magnificently."

A TWA spokesman said Hamilton put a knife to the throat of hostess Barbara Smithdeal, who sustained small cuts on her hand, to force his way into the cockpit.

A Florida Air National Guard F102 jet, which scrambled in the air to escort the flight to Cuba, caught fire and crashed near Jacksonville, Fla. The pilot, Capt. H. L. Dewese, 32, of Jacksonville, ejected from his F102 Starfighter and landed in a swamp. He suffered a sprained ankle.

FBI agents began questioning the crew and passengers who were aboard the Boeing 707 after it landed at Philadelphia. The pilot, Capt. C. Clyde Nixon, 47, of Los Altos Hills, Calif. and other crew members were scheduled to hold a news conference after the interrogation.

The jetliner was near Omaha, Neb., at the time of the hijacking, about 6:30 p.m. EST Tuesday. Nixon radioed the Los Angeles air control tower "I'd like the Miami and Havana weather. I'm headed for Havana."

It was the 30th hijacking of the year in the United States and came 32 days after Raffaele Minichiello of Seattle, Wash., commandeered a Los Angeles to San Francisco TWA flight to Rome in the longest hijacking on record.

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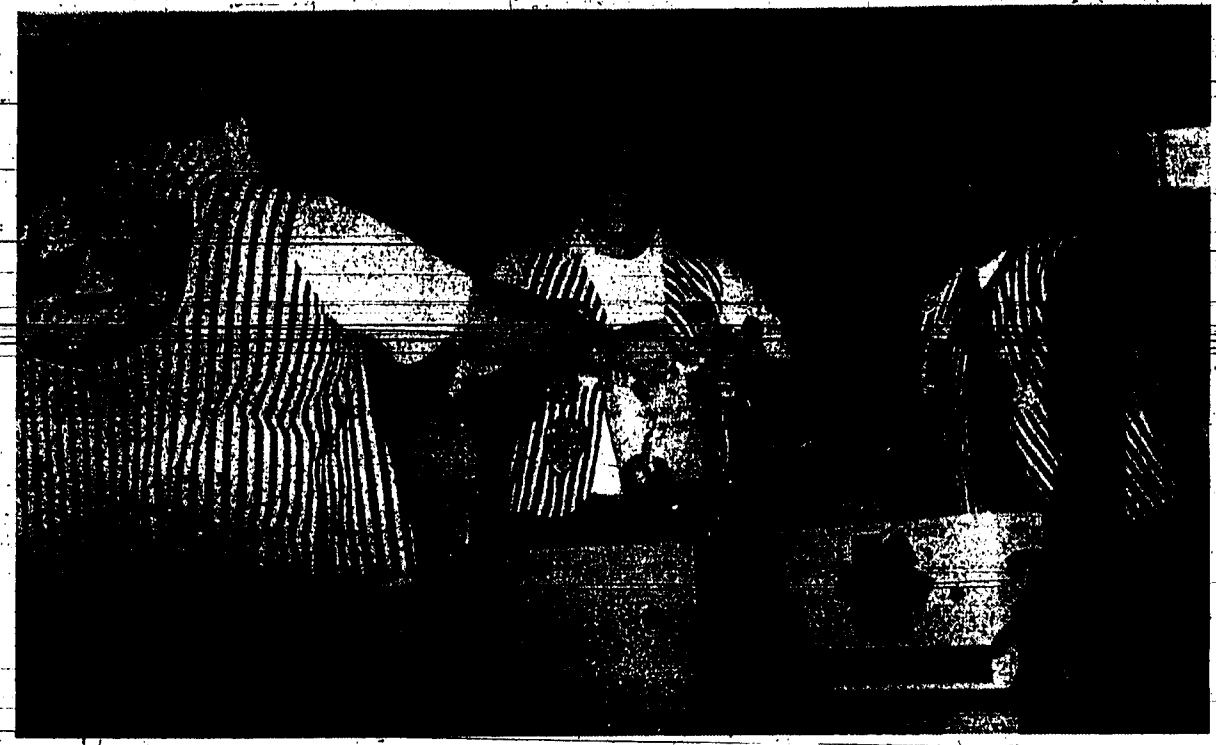

'Rock' Music Gains Place In Education

By FREDERICK H. TREESH. An elderly woman teacher, classically trained in music, formed a rock group at a Washington, D. C., junior high school. She found it was a marvelous way to get inner city youngsters interested in music.

At Prescott, Ariz., a music teacher works with a student rock group in his classroom every morning before the start of school. Sometimes as many as 200 other students turn up at 7:30 a.m. to hear them play.

In Evanston, Ill., the high school band director innovated a rock performance for the halftime show at a football game.

A garage mechanic in Philadelphia serves as a paid consultant to the public schools, teaching rock in some virtually all black schools that otherwise would not have a music teacher.

Rock music is finding a place in America's schools. Some teachers find rock annoying or even threatening, but Dr. Wiley L. Housewright, president of the Music Educators National Conference (MENC), thinks it is a good thing in the school room and should be widely encouraged.

"We (the MENC leadership) believe that young people have created a vital musical expression which cannot be ignored in it to be relevant and if we are to produce a discriminating, musically involved generation for the future," says Housewright, a Florida State University professor.

Twin Falls County Sheriff's officers extinguished the blaze, which was in a loafing shed at the ranch.

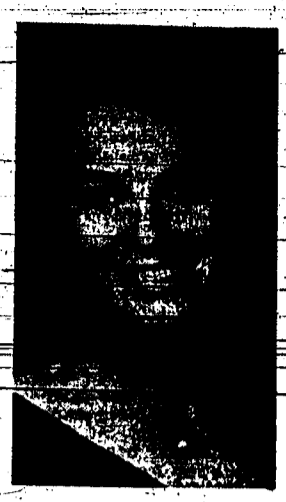
It is believed the fire was started by weeds which continued to smolder after a ditchbank was burned.

"I first thought the answer was more penalties," the President said, "but when you are talking about 13- and 14-year-olds, penalties are not the answer. The answer is more information, more understanding."



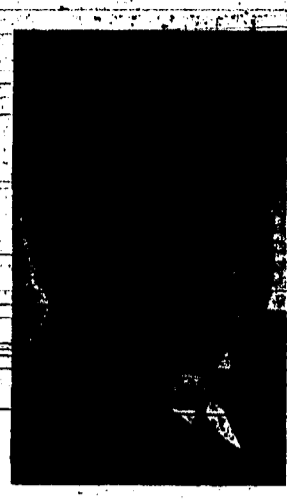

## Mine Official Notes Gains From 'Clouds'

MOSCOW (UPI) — The controversial White Clouds mining issue has again been raised in a talk before the College of Mines at the University of Idaho.

Speaking before a crowd of about 125, American Smelting and Refining Company exploration supervisor Keith Whiting, Spokane, said, "Our opponents in the White Clouds controversy do not seem to realize that mining, recreation, and tourism can be compatible and that all contribute to the betterment of our way of life."

"The favorite terms of our opponents in the White Clouds issue are 'destruction, desecration and rape.' They don't realize what industry can do for conservation."

With proper planning "in the ecological field," Mr. Whiting said, "we can design a mining plant which will assure the least impact on the natural characteristics of the area."

"To meet this goal, we have initiated a plan which calls for personnel from the areas of wildlife, fisheries, forestry, agronomy, landscape architecture and hydrology to develop recommendations which will work into our plan of operations," Mr. Whiting said.

## Missing Girl Found Dead After 70 Days

SAN MATEO, Calif. (UPI)—Mr. and Mrs. Donald Nason sat on a couch in a quiet room Tuesday night with their 10-year-old daughter, Shirley, a dog named "Snoopy," a teddy bear and a doll gathered about them.  
"We had not prepared ourselves for this," said the father. "We always thought she was being cared for by someone—somebody who wanted a child and kidnaped her."

Then Nason broke into tears. The couple had just been informed that the body of their daughter Susan, 9, who disappeared near their home 70 days before, was found near an abandoned gravel pit nearly 10 miles away. She apparently died from a blow on the head.

Susan came home from school on Sept. 22 and asked her mother, who was working on a new dress for Susan's 10th birthday, if she could return gym shoes to a friend a block and a half away. That was about 4 p.m.

When Susan failed to reach the friend's house, neighbors began searching the many canals in Foster City. The search failed amid reports that other girls in the area had been approached by a stranger in a car.

After Susan's disappearance, parent patrols began watching children as they went to school and home, fearing the kidnaper might strike again.

Nason's employer offered a \$20,000 reward for the safe return of the little girl—but still, there was no sign of her and no clue to her whereabouts.

## FNMA Director Feuds With Nixon Over Attempt To End Tenure Of LBJ Appointee

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Nixon fired Raymond H. Lapin, as president of the Federal National Mortgage Association Tuesday but Lapin called the action "arrogant" and vowed to fight to keep the job.

Lapin, a life-long Democrat appointed to the \$38,500-a-year job by former President Lyndon B. Johnson, told a news conference he was asked to resign but refused.

In a two paragraph letter to Lapin, Nixon said, "You are hereby removed for good cause from the office of president of the Federal National Mortgage Association."

"This action is taken because, in my judgement, the policies and practices pursued by you in Lake, which nestles in the wooded hills that separate San Francisco Bay from the Pacific Ocean.

## Cash Sought

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Savings bond redemptions in November exceeded sales for the 12th straight month, with savers withdrawing a net of \$61 million, the Treasury Department reported Wednesday.

In the year since sales last topped redemptions, a net of \$709 million was withdrawn from bond holdings.

President Nixon this week signed into law a bill authorizing an increase in savings bond interest rates from 4 1/4 per cent to a more competitive 5 per cent. At the old rate, savings bond interest was below the yields offered by banks and savings and loan associations.

The interest increase is retroactive to June 1, but congressional action on the bill came too late to have much effect on the November sales.

## Democrats Recall Bill On 'Poverty'

WASHINGTON (UPI) — House Democrats, in an eleventh hour surprise move, have pulled back from floor consideration a bill to continue the war on poverty for two more years.

Speaker John W. McCormack announced only minutes before the start of the House session that the bill would not come up for debate as scheduled today. He said the action was taken at the request of Chairman Carl D. Perkins, D-Ky., whose House Education and Labor Committee drafted the measure.

"We have no date when the bill will come up," McCormack said, then dismissed further questions on Democratic strategy.

McCormack did say Perkins complained that Democrats had not had the time to study a major substitute measure backed by a majority of Republicans on Perkins' committee and the panel's maverick Democrat, Rep. Edith Green of Oregon.

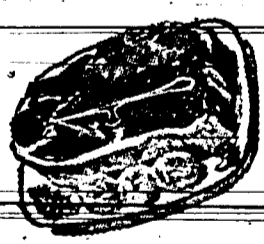

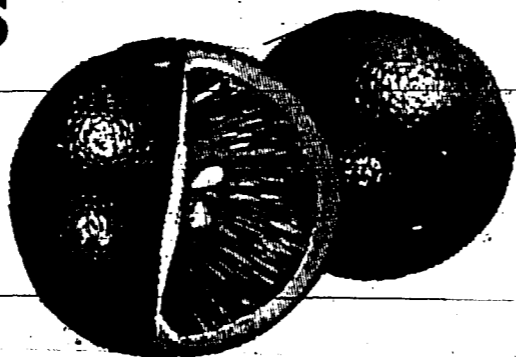

### Williams Claims 'Collusion' Between Officials On Payroll

BOISE (UPI) — State Auditor Joe R. Williams accused the attorney general today of conspiring with the governor to deliberately mislead him in the dispute over payroll preparation.

Williams said he was "shocked and dismayed" by an attorney general's opinion that said the Board of Examiners could overrule his decision on the way the payrolls for state agencies should be prepared.

He said it was based on two cases which the Idaho Supreme Court has "emphatically overruled" on several occasions.

He said the opinion by Deputy Attorney General Daniel Slavin was based primarily on the cases of Pyke v. Steunenberg and Bragaw v. Gooding.

"I have carefully reviewed the opinion and have sought the advice of two independent legal counsel and they advise me that the Idaho Supreme Court has emphatically overruled both of the cases upon which the attorney general's opinion was based," Williams said.

Most recent declaration of the court, he said, was the case of Jewett v. Williams in which the Supreme Court specifically overruled the Pyke v. Steunenberg and Bragaw v. Gooding cases.

"I can only conclude that the attorney general's office in league with the governor's office deliberately attempted to mislead me since it is inconceivable that the attorney general's office is not aware of the recent decision of the Supreme

Court," the auditor said. "It is apparent that the attorney general's office has permitted political considerations to influence the opinion dated Dec. 2, 1969.

"When I prepared and issued the instructions dated November, 1969, for the revised and updated payroll system I was fulfilling my oath of office and carrying out my constitutional duties," he said.

"I do not see how I can continue to carry out those duties if I follow the attorney general's opinion and the Board of Examiners' directive of Dec. 2, 1969."

The board Tuesday ordered all executive department heads to continue preparing their payrolls as they have been — leaving some 20 agencies still under the payroll preparation plan of management services.

Williams, who contends the management services plan is too full of errors, has told all agencies to follow his instructions.

The auditor did not state what his next course of action may be although he has refused to back down from his previous instructions.

Nixon said he got the habit from his grandmother — who lived to be 93.

### Agnew Says 'Minority' Curbs Rational Discussion In U.S.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Vice President Spiro T. Agnew said Wednesday that hard-headed political protests by an "outspoken minority" has shut off rational two-way discussion of America's problems.

"That refusal to approach an issue with an open mind, that refusal to entertain a spirit of compromise—that is what is building barriers between the young and the not-so-young, between an outspoken minority and a soft-spoken majority," Agnew said.

"That is the barrier we must begin to dismantle—from both sides."

The vice president said those who oppose his recent criticisms of antiwar demonstrators and news coverage by the press and television are engaged in a "rhetoric of protest" when people do not respond to what is said, but to what other people say you meant.

"There's something very definitely wrong in two sides missing each other's point," Agnew said in his speech to a White House conference of governors. "That is why what should be a meaningful dialogue has become a cacophony of meaningless monologues."

With President Nixon sitting in the front row, Agnew also renewed his attack against those who protest against the administration's policy of gradual withdrawal from Vietnam.

"If America were to cut and run," he said, "we would be cutting the chances for peace and running out on the children in school today who would have to fight a war tomorrow."

"By following the path of appeasement, this generation could accomplish peace in our time, but we say to the next generation—we are just as much concerned with peace in your time. We refuse to accept a solution that says 'peace now—pay later' because it's our children—the younger generation—who would have to pay later the price of surrender now."

Agnew, who shook hands with Nixon after his speech, said the "outspoken minority" was engaged in "politics of protest," and he listed these "Ten Commandments of Protest":

"Thou shalt not allow thy opponent to speak; thou shalt not set forth a program of thine own; thou shalt not trust anybody over 30; thou shalt not honor thy father or thy mother; thou shalt not heed the lessons of history; thou shalt not write anything longer than a slogan; thou shalt not present a negotiable demand; thou shalt not accept any establishment idea; thou shalt not revere any but totalitarian heroes; thou shalt not ask for forgiveness for thy transgressions, rather thou shalt demand amnesty for them."

### Five Candidates Seek Two Posts On Minidoka Board

RUPERT — Five men are seeking the two posts to be filled in the Minidoka Irrigation District election Tuesday.

Candidates for the directorship in Division 1 are George Stromire, Dean Valentine and Chester Preuit. In Division 3, Lloyd Patterson and Ruben Ketterling are opposing each other. Incumbents George Sullivan, Division 1, and Russell Huff, Division 3, are not seeking reelection.

Mr. Stromire has used the services of the irrigation district for the past eight years, with about 100 acres under irrigation. Although he has never served on the board of directors, he said he has become concerned about the rising water rates and so decided to run for election.

A farmer in the irrigation district for the past 51 years, Mr. Valentine also has about 100 acres under irrigation. He gave his reason for running for election to be that others encouraged him to serve. He has never been a director before.

Mr. Preuit is a postal employee in Rupert and also operates a 400 acre farm, 141 acres of which are irrigated. He has benefitted from the services of the irrigation district since 1951 but has never served on the board of directors.

"I am concerned about the rising water costs," he explained, "and feel I can serve as well as anyone else. I would like an opportunity."

In Division 3, Mr. Patterson has irrigated his 630 acres in the irrigation district for about 38 years. He has never served on the board of directors, but decided to run for the director position when incumbent director Huff declined to run.

In the district since 1946, Mr. Ketterling now has 200 acres under irrigation. He joins the other candidates with not having served on the board of directors in the past but said he feels the area needs representation.

"We need a director to keep expenses and prices of water down," he noted.

The election will be held from 1 to 7 p.m. with polling places to be the W. C. Paul residence, the Acequia School, Paul high-way district office, Rural Electric, City of Heyburn and the Irrigation office.

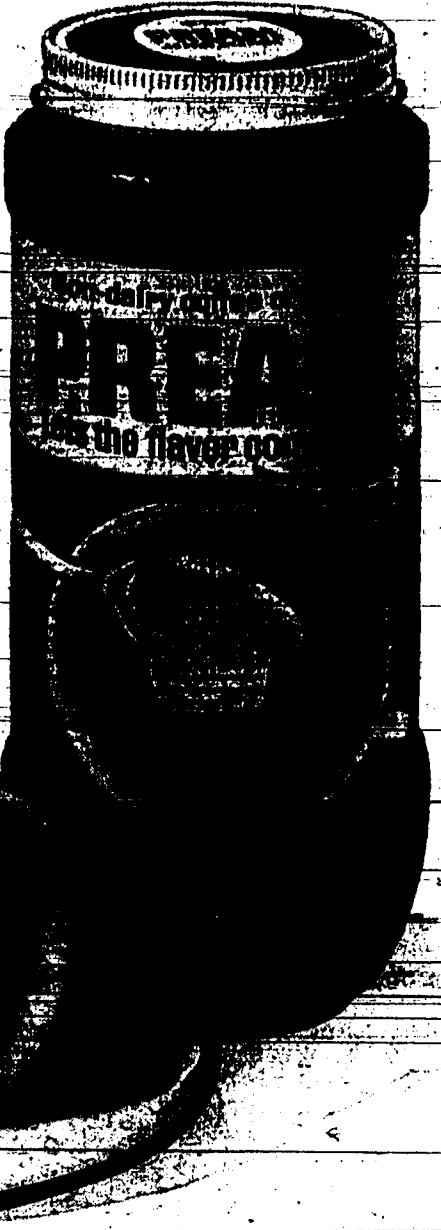

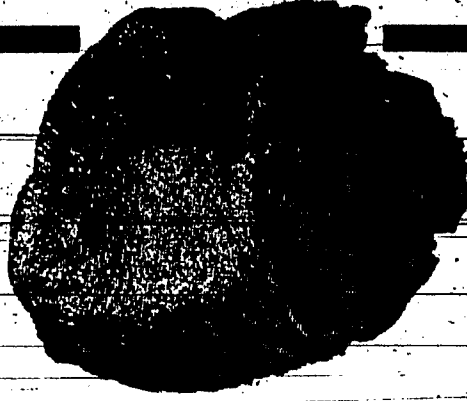

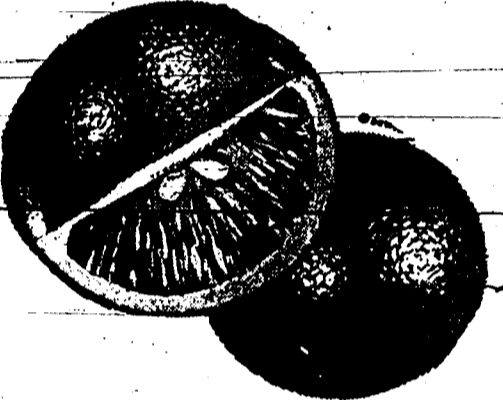
