Linkletter told the Governors on Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs that Leary, speaking to capacity crowds at universities, has been telling students that taking drugs "is a way to turn on, turn out and drop out."

With President Nixon and With President Nixon and Vice President Spiro T. Agnew sitting on the same platform, the television entertainer choked with emotion when he told the audience of governors and their families about his 20-year-old daughter Diane's suicide last October. cide last October.

At the time of the incident, Linkletter called it "murder" by purveyors of drugs.

He said that he decided to speak out in his "grief and outrage" to accentuate the dangers of drug taking. Linkletter said his daughter had the ter said his daughter had the "handicap of carrying a famous name" and that "such kids are prejudged." Children of prominent people often go out of their way to prove "they are part of the gang," he said.

Dodd And Justice

recommendation by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) that the government seek a criminal indictment against Sen. Thomas J. Dodd of Connecticut for tax evasion is entering its ninth month of dormancy in the Justice, Department — a cocked political pistol pointed at the Senator's heart.

Revenue agents actually com-pleted their investigation of Dodd's finances more than a year ago, but bureaueratic delays kept their final recommendations from going to the Justice Department until March—well after the transition from the Johnson to the Nixon admin-istration. Since then, the case has been neither dropped nor prosecuted nor investigated.

The Justice Department has refused to say one word about its intentions or its motives regarding Dodd. But even without such vital information, it is possible to piece together developments comprising a frightening picture of Justice in Washing-

ton.
The IRS began investigating Dodd immediately after his censure by the Senate on June 23, 1967. When auditors determined he had failed to pay taxes on some \$100,000 of income (mainly from "testimonial" banquets), the IRS decided that more than a civil suit was involved and called in its criminal intelli-

called in its criminal intelli-gence section.

By November, 1968, revenue agents working out of Hartford, Conn. has assembled a case against Dodd including state-ments by Dodd-dinner ticket-holders who said they felt they were contributing to the Sena-tor's 1964 political campaign— a purpose denied by Dodd him-self. Coupled with damaging statements about the Senator's motives by Dodd's erstwhile aides, this was enough for the IRS to recommend criminal IRS to recommend criminal

prosecution.

Justice Department lawyers were less enthusiastic about the strength of the case. Nevertheless, they were poised to render a quick decision in the closing days of the lame duck Johnson administration - either to prosecute or to drop the case. To do otherwise, the government law-yers believed, would transform the Senate into a body of "99

WASHINGTON - An urgent Senators and one frightened recommendation by the Internal man" (to quote one Johnson man" (to quote one Johnson administration attorney). But when Richard M. Nixon

was elected Nov. 5, the Dodd case was suddenly becalmed in-side the IRS bureaucracy. The old Washington tradition is that career bureaucrats, seeking to ingratiate themselves within a new administration; slow down paperwork so that politically sensitive cases can be decided after the Jan. 20 inauguration.

Consequently, the Dodd case, expected at the Johnson Justice Department in December, did not reach the Nixon Justice De-Since then, only silence. No prosecution has been sought, but the case definitely has not

been dropped. Although the Justice Department's tax division sometimes investigates further to strengthen a weak IRS case, it has neither assigned agents nor empaneled a grand jury. The result has been nearly nine months of inactivity.

A possible explanation is Jus-

tice Department embarrassment over Dodd's claim that two Federal judges — District Judge M.
Joseph Blumenfeld of Hartford
and Appeals Judge Irvffig R.
Kaufman of New York City
had advised him of the legality of his fund-raising techniques. Although Blumenfeld confirmed he gave such advice before his elevation to the bench, Kauf-man denied it under interrogation by revenue agents. The prospect of a Federal appeals judge testifying in a tax evasion

case is not a pretty one.

Nevertheless, IRS officials who worked on the case believe any legal advice to Dodd is ir-relevant. In the absence of rational explanation, then, ugly speculation is inevitable that the suspended animation of Dodd's—proposed—indictment serves the Administration's political purposes — as in the Haynsworth vote.

Not even Dodd's own staff knew in advance how he would vote. Both the White House and enemies of Haynsworth felt as-sured they would have Dodd's sured they, would have Dodd's vote if necessary. In fact, after sitting out the first roll call, Dodd ended up voting against Haynsworth after his defeat was certain, Such behaviour, even if perfectly innocent, arouses suspicion when viewed against the backdrop of the Justice Department's cocked pistol.


