## Dahomey Chief Ousted

### Army Seizes Power

COTONOU, Dahomey (UPI) — Rebellious army troops today kidnaped President Emile Zinsou and announced they were seizing power in the fifth coup since the poverty-ridden West African nation won independence from France nine years ago.

Unconfirmed reports said the 51-year-old president was wounded in an exchange of gunfire between his bodyguards and the insurgent soldiers, but the government-operated radio station in Lome, capital of neighboring Togo, said he was unhurt and held captive.

The insurgents, reported led by Lt. Col. Maurice Kouandete, 37, the army chief of staff, first seized the radio station at 8 a.m. and then stormed into the presidential palace, a rambling, modernistic building on the Atlantic sea front.

Witnesses said Zinsou appeared to have been wounded and that there was a wild exchange of gunfire in the palace before the president was carried to a car and driven off in the direction of the airfield. Unofficial reports said he was taken to the small north Dahomean garrison town of Natitingou.

Lome Radio said the insurgents occupied the palace which houses various government services and allowed officials to enter but not to leave the premises. It said the foreign, justice and public works ministers were held prisoners inside the palace.

The broadcast said that when Zinsou arrived with his bodyguards a military car blocked his limousine. A brief exchange of gunfire took place and the president was driven away.

### Israelis Bomb Egyptians Across Suez

By United Press International For the 10th day in the past 11, Israeli warplanes bombed and strafed Egyptian military positions on the west bank of the Suez Canal today, Tel Aviv announced.

The Israeli command said all planes returned safely from the 11:30 a.m. raid against targets on the southern end of the canal, where Israeli bombers have hit almost daily since Nov. 30.

Egypt said its interceptors blocked a similar raid attempt Tuesday and shot down one Israeli plane, a U.S.-built F4 Phantom, in a dogfight over the 102-mile waterway. Israel reported no aerial battle.

Even as the latest air raid was announced, Israeli and Jordanian artillerymen slugged it out across their frontier for the second successive day. Tel Aviv said one of its men was wounded.

## 2 Snowmobiles Go Through Ice

GLENN'S FERRY—A 41-year-old Mountain Home military man is believed drowned in Little Camas reservoir northeast of Mountain Home today after his snowmobile went through the ice Tuesday evening. A woman in the party was rescued. Officers were working today to locate the body of Walter Holgate. Mrs. Maxine Rossow, Mountain Home, whose snow machine also went through the ice, was rescued. The two couples were on an outing to the popular snowmobile area some 30 miles northwest of Mountain Home. Sheriff's officers said neither Bud Rossow nor Mrs. Holgate was involved in the accident and they were able to get Mrs. Rossow out of the icy water. Mr. Holgate's machine, however, was further out in the reservoir when it went through the ice and they could not reach him.

## Nixon Talk Stirs Riot In New York

NEW YORK (UPI)—President Nixon praised the "competitive spirit" of American youth at the National Football Foundation's Awards dinner Tuesday night while outside protesters battled police and smashed Fifth Avenue shop windows.

Police said 48 persons were arrested, including some who had been injured in the melee. Seven policemen and one inspector were injured. At the black tie dinner in the Waldorf Astoria Hotel, 1,400 guests honored Nixon with the football foundation's Gold Medal Award. They also inducted nine persons, including presidential adviser Bud Wilkinson, into the football Hall of Fame.

## U.S. Gunners Lob Shells Into Cambodia

SAIGON (UPI)—U.S. artillerymen fired 300 eight-inch shells into Cambodia to stop a guerrilla mortar and rocket attack from there, officials said in a delayed report today. The barrage Sunday was the heaviest Allied troops have fired into the neighboring nation and marked the third time in five days that U.S. planes or guns had hit across the border. American headquarters has said such strikes are carried out under the "inherent right" to fire back if fired upon. The sources said the U.S. artillerymen fired back after their camp 34 miles west-northwest of Saigon came under mortar and rocket fire from Cambodia four miles to the west. U.S. losses were light in the salvo. Allied intelligence has reported a significant Viet Cong and North Vietnamese buildup all along South Vietnam's border with Cambodia.

## Storms Ground Flying 'Santa'

NORWOOD, Mass. (UPI)—Bad weather grounded New England's flying Santa Monday. Edward Rowe Snow, author and local historian who annually makes flying trips to remote lighthouses and Coast Guard stations along the New England Coast, said he would begin his two-day tour Tuesday, weather permitting. Snow plans to drop packages to the men and their families who man the lonely outposts. He was unable to take off Monday as planned from the Norwood Airport because of rain and snow.

## Viet Solons To Probe 'Massacre'

SAIGON (UPI)—A South Vietnamese Senate investigating committee agreed Tuesday that a massacre "probably did take place" in My Lai, but planned to conduct a more detailed probe. The Senate Defense Committee, headed by Sen. Tran Van Don, issued a statement on the results of a Dec. 1-3 fact-finding trip to Quang Ngai Province.

## Firemen Ask 6 Per Cent Pay Increase

The Twin Falls city firemen have submitted a wage increase request to Jean Millar, city manager, asking a six per cent hike in their present salary. Mr. Millar said he has received no formal request from the representatives of the other city departments, but some of them have spoken to him individually. The firemen presented several papers noting wage comparisons with other Idaho communities. They also showed the increase in the cost of living in requesting the six per cent increase. Mr. Millar said the main concern of the other city employees has been improved retirement and longevity benefits. He said they have, thus far, put no special emphasis on pay increases. Last year the city employees received a 12 per cent wage hike. Mr. Millar said he has begun working on the long-range budget, but will not be able to make any definite figures until the actual 1969 expenditures are known. This will not be until the middle of January. He has received tentative budget proposals from all department heads.

## Judge Is Picked For Annexation Hearings

First Judicial District Judge James Towles, Wallace, has been named to hear the annexation suits against the City of Twin Falls, Supreme Court Justice Clay V. Spear advised Wednesday. Harold Lancaster, clerk of the District Court here, said the hearings on action brought by local citizens to prevent the annexation of their property by the city of Twin Falls, will be held beginning at 10 a.m. Friday in the chambers of District Judge James M. Cunningham. District judges in Twin Falls disqualified themselves to hear the matter because they are property owners of Twin Falls. Mr. Lancaster said because Thursday is law and motion day in districts throughout the state it was difficult for the Supreme Court to obtain a judge who could come to Twin Falls to conduct the hearings.

## Close To Home

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The crime wave has caught another member of President Nixon's staff. Ronald L. Ziegler, Nixon's press secretary, told police Monday thieves broke into his Alexandria, Va., home and stole two television sets. Earlier this year, Nixon's secretary, Rose Mary Woods, was the victim of a burglary at her Washington apartment.

## U.S., Soviets To End First Part Of Talks

HELSINKI (UPI)—The United States and the Soviet Union today held what is expected to be one of their last preparatory meetings on curbing the arms race before adjourning to await full-scale negotiations next year. The session, at the Soviet Embassy, was the eighth since the preliminary strategic arms limitation talks (SALT) began Nov. 17. The meeting lasted one hour and five minutes and was the shortest yet. It was decided to have experts meet at the working level throughout today and Thursday to prepare the final communiqué and negotiate the date and place of concrete negotiations. Finnish officials are anxious to have the SALT talks remain in Helsinki next year, believing this would boost the Finnish policy of "active neutrality." U.S. diplomats feel they have too little working space at the American Embassy in Helsinki and would prefer a move to Vienna. The Soviets are said to prefer Helsinki but would agree to a change if the United States insists.

## Entomologist Will Discuss Controversy On Pesticides

The current controversy over use of pesticides in the United States—and the possible effect on the lives of humans if the use is stopped or continued—will be discussed by Dr. Douglas Sutherland as he is guest speaker at the regular Kiwanis Club meeting Thursday noon at the Fort Club. Dr. Sutherland, who is extension entomologist for the Twin Falls Branch Station, University of Idaho, located at the Snake River Research Center at Kimberly, has recently been involved in an in-depth extension program in New Hampshire. The special study dealt exclusively with pesticides and insect control. During his talk in Twin Falls he will discuss the "overall situation" including what safeguards there are in dealing with pesticides, what are the advantages of pesticides and the problems and will pesticides be replaced. ## Healthy, Happy Astronauts Released Ahead Of Schedule

SPACE CENTER, Houston (UPI)—The Apollo 12 astronauts, in excellent health and showing no signs of lunar germs, end their 17-day quarantine this afternoon 18 hours earlier than scheduled. When they leave the \$15 million Lunar Receiving Laboratory at 3 p.m. EST today, it will be the first time since before their journey to the moon started Nov. 14 they have seen their families without the barriers imposed to prevent the spread of any germs they may have picked up during their trip. Physicians gave Charles "Pete" Conrad, Richard Gordon and Alan L. Bean such a clean bill of health the quarantine release time was advanced by 18 hours. To be released with the moon explorers were 25 others who have lived in isolation—four technicians and seven scientists locked up 10 days ago after they were accidentally exposed to moon material, and 14 support personnel who kept the quarantine area operating. In Washington, space agency officials were expected to approve a March 12 launch date and a target called Fra Mauro in the foothills of the lunar highlands for Apollo 13, the third moon landing. The three Apollo 12 pilots requested the space agency have government limousines standing by to take them home for their first real family reunions. All three have visited frequently with their families in the isolation laboratory since they got to Houston—and Conrad has performed babysitting chores in the visiting room while his wife Jane did Christmas shopping but always through a germproof glass barrier. During their last day in confinement, the astronauts told guidance and navigation experts "everything worked the way it was supposed to" aboard their moonship. A spokesman in the quarantine area, Douglas Ward, said the astronauts were not surprised to learn of their early release because a similar step was taken during Apollo 11. But he said they were delighted by it, smiling at the news and saying "that's great."

## Mine Workers Elect Boyle To Head Union

WASHINGTON (UPI)—W.A. "Tony" Boyle, the fiery little Montanan who heads the 193,000 member United Mine Workers of America, easily won a second five-year presidential term today despite the bitter opposition for the union's leadership in 43 years. Unofficial election returns compiled by the UMW showed Boyle with 72,858 votes to 40,702 for his opponent, Joseph A. "Jock" Yablonski, a member of Boyle's executive board. Boyle personally announced his apparent victory to newsmen at union headquarters at 2 a.m. EST with 65 per cent of the votes counted nationwide. However, a spokesman for Yablonski said the dissident candidate was not conceding defeat and added "legal action is contemplated" on the alleged use of union money and personnel in the Boyle campaign. Yablonski, from his home in Clarksville, Pa., today charged "there's been all kinds of hanky-panky played" in the election and insisted his forces were "moving forward to see that the miners get justice." He said he would not decide until later in the day on his next move. Boyle pulled to an early lead and never lost it during the long night of counting paper ballots at the local level. The reports were telephoned to each of the 25 district headquarters, which then relayed returns to Boyle's office. Most observers felt Boyle would win, although betting was close. The final vote will be certified to the membership Jan. 1.

## Not His Day

ISLE OF SHEPPEY, England (UPI)—For runaway prisoner Ivan Lewis, it just wasn't his day. He hopped a train he thought would take him to London and freedom. It took him back to the Isle of Sheppey, where he had escaped from Eastchurch Prison. The 21-year-old prisoner gave up in despair.

## Bargaining Rapped By Potato Grower Aide

BURLEY — "Collective bargaining would be a nightmare for agriculture," Don Johnson, past president of the Potato Growers of California, told delegates attending the seventh annual state meeting of the Potato Growers of Idaho, which concluded a two-day meeting at the Ponderosa Inn. After describing efforts being made in California to organize grape pickers in California, he expressed concern with a bill in the Senate which would bring all agricultural labor under jurisdiction of the National Labor Relations Board. He urged growers to support legislation allowing them to continue to run "their own operation without harassment." National legislation to provide for nationwide research and education in the use of potatoes will again be introduced in Congress next January, Doyle Burns, Denver, executive director of the National Potato Council, told the group this morning. Reporting on a meeting of the National council which he just attended in New York City, Mr. Burns said the voluntary promotion program has been successful. This includes recipes, cooking ideas and photographs used to advertise potatoes in general. "It would have cost at least \$1 million if we would have had to purchase this advertising space," he said, adding about \$20,000 was spent on the project. He noted a 30-minute film giving the modern image of potatoes for the homemaker is available through home demonstration agents. A look at potato raising in Maine was given the Idaho growers following Mr. Burns' report by Dan Turner, Jr., Easton, Maine, vice president of the Maine Potato Council. He said mechanical harvesters are just beginning to be used in his state and most of the planting is still done with standard two-row planters. About 25 per cent of the acreage, operated by the larger growers, was planted with four-row planters this season. He said irrigation is beginning to be used as one means of increasing yields, for even though 21.7 inches is the average rainfall in Maine, it comes at the wrong time. Mr. Turner said about 5 per cent of the potato acreage in Maine is contracted to processing plants and he predicted that the figure will increase. The council also concluded this afternoon with the showing of a Ford film, "Show of Future Agriculture in 3,000 A.D."

## Weather Synopsis

"Rain or snow has persisted across much of the nation during the night. Some thunder showers occurred along the Northern California coast early this morning as rain spread inland along the north and central Pacific Coast.

Some locally heavy snow is forecast for the mountains of Northern and Central California and Eastern Nevada today.

The next surface frontal system was ready to move inland on the Washington-Oregon coast this morning. Cloudiness and precipitation with this disturbance will move across Eastern Oregon and Southwest Idaho today and into Southeast Idaho by Thursday.

Some temporary improvement in weather conditions will occur Thursday night and early Friday, but a new disturbance from the Pacific will increase cloudiness with precipitation on Friday.

Temperatures will continue in the 30s during the day. Nighttime lows will range from the teens in colder higher valleys to the 20s at lower elevations.

Areas of night and morning valley fog will continue from Eastern Oregon across Southern Idaho.

The extended outlook calls for normal in Southeastern Idaho, and about five degrees below seasonal normals in Southwest Idaho and Eastern Oregon.

Normal high and low temperatures and precipitation averages for the five-day period include Boise, 40-25 and 20 inch, and Pocatello, 37-16 and 15 inch.

Periods of precipitation will be anticipated over the next five days, with totals in excess of .25 inch in Southwestern Idaho, ranging to .15 inch in the southeast.

## Slaying Of 'Panthers' Is Investigated

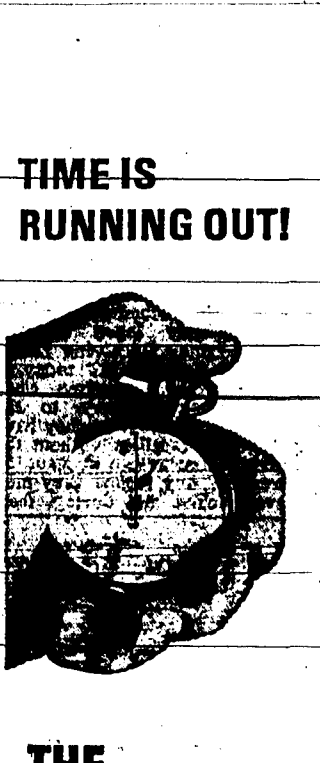

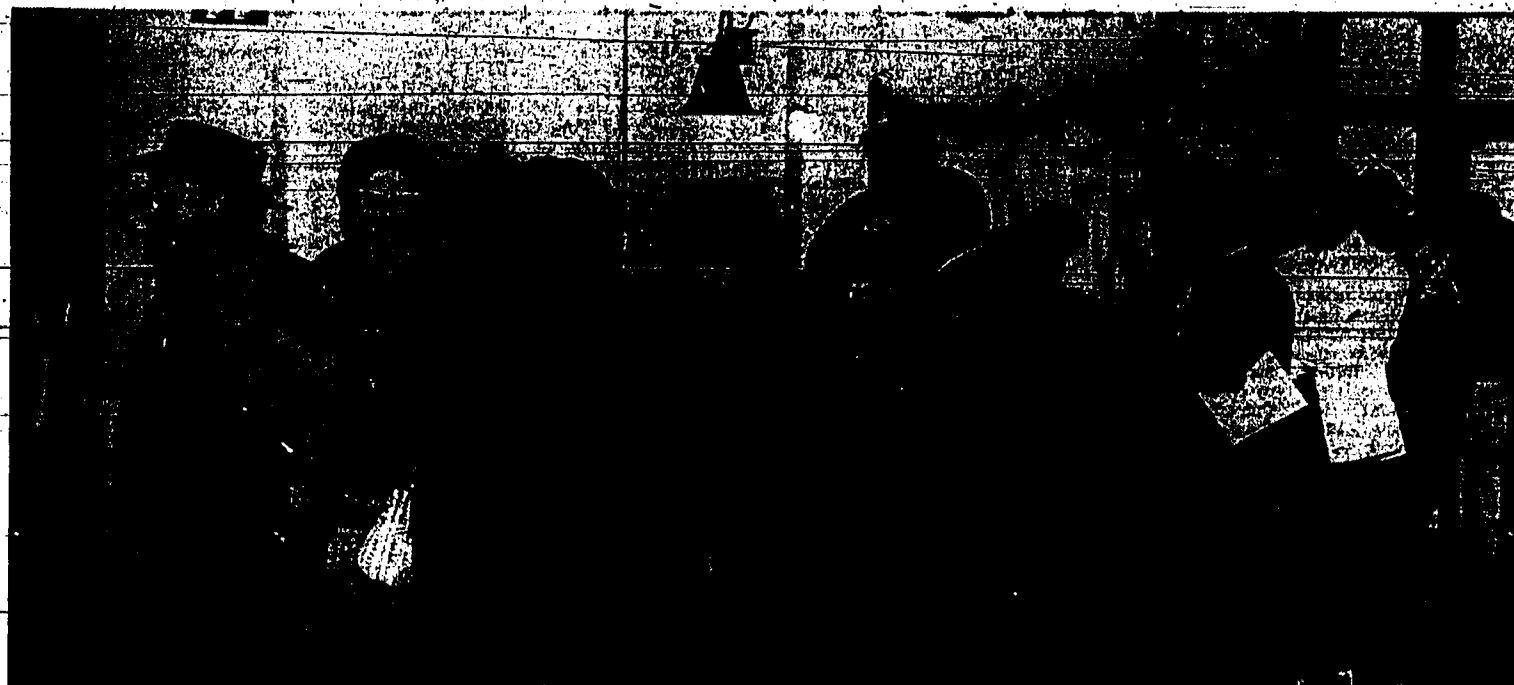
More than 36 courses have been requested so far.

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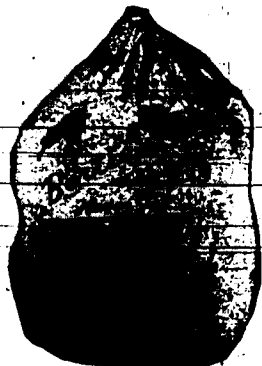

A call from Saigon to Chicago, for instance, may result in long-distance charges from California to Chicago. There is no charge for the MARS portion of the call from Saigon to California.

Member Of Congress In High Court?

WASHINGTON — Those high-level disclaimers notwithstanding, a member of Congress may be named to fill the Supreme Court vacancy, after all. Under serious consideration is an ingenious plan that conceivably would clear the way for that despite the constitutional prohibition against appointing a member of Congress to a job for which he voted an increase in salary. Earlier this year Congress raised the pay of associate justices of the Supreme Court from \$39,500 to \$60,000. As a consequence, members of the current Congress (91st) are barred from being named to the tribunal. But high-placed constitutional lawyers have come up with what they contend is a perfectly legal and proper way to overcome this obstacle.

Sen. Everett Dirksen, Rep. Richard Poff, R-Va., 46, bomber pilot in World War II, was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross. A graduate of the Virginia Law School, he has been in Congress since 1952, and is second-ranking Republican on the House Judiciary Committee. He is widely regarded among colleagues as an outstanding constitutional authority. All three are "strict constructionists" in the full sense of President Nixon's concept of that term. Each would unquestionably give the Supreme Court the "balance" the President maintains it urgently needs.

ATHENS (UPI)—An Olympic Airways DC8B plane was at least six miles off course and flying well below the prescribed altitude when it crashed Monday night east of Athens, civil aviation experts said Tuesday.

Eighty-nine Greeks and a West German died in the crash, the worst in Greek aviation history.

Black-robed Greek Orthodox monks from the village of Keratea conducted last rites Tuesday on the fire-blackened crash site on a 1,400-foot Mt. Paneion.

But mourning relatives were held back by police and army troops so they could not disturb

the scene until investigators were able to examine it thoroughly.

The four-engine, propeller-driven plane was on a flight from Crete and was making a landing approach to Athens Airport when it crashed and burst into flames.

Civil aviation experts, who declined to be named, said the plane was not supposed to fly over Mt. Paneion but to cross a point six miles east of there. They said it also should have been at an altitude of 3,000 feet at that distance from the airport.

A spokesman for Olympic Airways, owned by multiple airlines, said Tuesday the plane crashed because of a rainstorm and a sudden down-

draft.

## Liquified Gas Plant In Alaska Offers International Benefits

NEW YORK (UPI) — An electric fan spins in a Tokyo apartment. New York opens up for a French factory hand and an Alaskan laborer. A Salt Lake City family looks at a fatter paycheck and decides it can buy a new television set.

All are connected by a huge new natural gas liquefaction plant near Kenai, Alaska, pretty much overlooked in all the excitement about the big oil strike in the state's north slope. Unlike the oil strike, which still has unresolved problems, this development is a going concern.

Hundreds of millions of dollars have been invested on three continents. A special tanker already has delivered 440,000 barrels of liquid natural gas (LNG) to utility companies in Tokyo, the first time LNG has been exported commercially from the western hemisphere.

The plant, built near Kenai, Alaska, came into being because the Tokyo Electric Power Company, Inc. and Tokyo Gas Co., Ltd. needed clean natural gas for its generator plant. Alaskan gas was ideal because it is clean burning and would not aggravate Tokyo's pollution problem.

Leased jointly by Phillips Petroleum and Marathon Oil Companies, the \$50 million Kenai plant daily supplies 140 million cubic feet of LNG for delivery by tanker to storage facilities at Negeshi, near Yokohama, on Tokyo Bay. Docking, storage and processing facilities at Negeshi alone cost \$100 million.

It is no short-term arrangement. Phillips and Marathon have agreed to supply another 50-billion cubic feet of LNG, cooled to -259F, in very special tankers costing \$25 million

apiece. The contract runs for 15 years.

The project is another example of nation's growing dependence on each other as production becomes more and more internationalized.

Aside from plant and facility construction in Alaska and Tokyo, Swedish and French companies came onto the scene. Kockums Mekaniska Verkstads shipyard at Malmo, Sweden, built the tanker "Polar Alaska" which completed its maiden run to Japan last month. It required special steel impervious to embrittlement at low temperatures and strong enough to stand up under heavy ice conditions.

Gas Transport Company of France designed special cargo tanks which have little or no expansion or contraction and are virtually leak proof.

American cities in the "lower 48" also pitched in. Large pipe spools were fabricated at a shop in Salt Lake City.

Cold boxes, heart of the Kenai plant, were constructed at Long Beach, Calif.

Giant gas turbines and centrifugal compressors were assembled at vendor shops spreading from Mount Vernon, Ohio, to Schenectady.

The world, indeed, has become a small place. And business ventures such as the Kenai plant are making it smaller and smaller each day.

### Warsaw Pact Nations Appear To Approve Individual Dickering With West Germany

It could be that the first week of December 1969 will turn out to be the most important for Europe since the end of World War II.  
The seven Warsaw Pact nations meeting at the summit in Moscow appeared to give a green light to individual members of the Communist bloc to negotiate agreements with West Germany without some of the crippling conditions which have prevented them in the past.  
At another summit meeting at the Hague, leaders of the six European Common Market nations agreed to open negotiations next summer with Britain for British entry into the market

along with Denmark, Norway and Ireland.  
Such an agreement would extend the market to 250 million people and reshape the face of Europe.  
Lest these events cast too rosy a hue, it must be recognized they so far are only declarations of intent. In either case, one side or the other could raise the price and make success impossible.  
It is noteworthy that West Germany is a key to both.  
If a new era is to develop in relations between West Germany and the Communist bloc, many and the Communist bloc countries both will have to recognize realities.  
For West Germany it will mean recognition of Poland's Oder-Neisse border and the permanent loss of the former German territories beyond.  
For the Communist bloc as a whole it must mean recognition of what already is a fact—that whether they like the Germans or not, West German businessmen and wealthy German tourists are swarming over Eastern Europe with an economic impact that already is being deeply felt.  
At the Hague, it was West German Chancellor Willy Brandt who led the way in bringing pressure on France to finally agree to negotiations with Britain.  
French President Georges Pompidou made continuation of expensive price supports for French agriculture a part of his price but it was nonetheless a turnabout from two past vetoes on Britain cast by former President Charles de Gaulle.  
The bargaining will be tough and perhaps too expensive still for Britain.  
As for the United States in all this, its attitude can only be one of cautious approval even though it could prove costly. A case in point is the famous one of the frozen chickens. The U.S. product virtually was shut off from the European market by a protective tariff wall.  
Huge European surpluses in wheat, for example, could mean a further loss to U.S. agriculture should Britain gain entry into the Common Market. The U.S.

### Protestors Who Condemn 'Atrocities' Fail To Consider Pressures Of Men In Combat

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The reported My Lai massacre in South Vietnam and similar incidents or allegations—an uncooperative Viet Cong prisoner being thrown out of an American helicopter, the Green Beret case—inevitably wash up on the White House steps.  
Most atrocity shockers in current public domain involved incidents which allegedly took place well before President Nixon entered the White House. Given time and sufficient exposure, however, the more vocal antiwar activists will do their best to saddle Nixon with the blame.  
To some Americans, it may be something of a contradiction in the fact that no one marches, pickets or demonstrates against the home governments about atrocities committed by troops of Hanoi, Cairo, Moscow or Peking.  
But, it may need pointing out from time to time that Communist or Communist-oriented governments do not tolerate public demonstrations of any kind against those in power.  
It is more than a safe assumption that Hanoi does not tell or illustrate for home, and any other consumption, atrocities committed by the North Vietnamese army of the Viet Cong.  
One reality of war is that while weapons may become increasingly sophisticated, human nature remains basically unchanged, particularly in men engaged in mortal combat.  
A grenade lands in a bunched-up rifle platoon. A soldier throws himself on the grenade, absorbs the blast and dies.  
After World War II and the Korean War, U.S. government psychologists and psychiatrists studied a number of such cases, trying to determine whether the man involved was a selfless hero, primarily concerned for others, or simply committing suicide. Or was he unhelped emotionally by the terror of battle?  
There have been similar studies of atrocities. If the government has come to any general conclusions, particularly in the more recent cases, they have been kept quiet.  
Regardless of the flag under which a soldier may fight, he would be less than human if he failed to experience wild emotions after seeing close buddies shot, maimed, tortured and in some cases, seeing their cruelly dismembered bodies left behind by the enemy.  
By any standards, war is an atrocity in itself. Non-combatant civilians in combat areas have been in dire jeopardy since time's dawn. Which is the more reprehensible atrocity—suffocating or cremating with napalm a civilian in a combat area or a soldier? Both sides did it in the Pacific during World War II.  
The current uproar over atrocities in South Vietnam serves again to prove Gen. William T. Sherman's point: "War is hell."

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### 'Uncle Sam' Bandit Bags Cans Of Milk At Point Of Sword

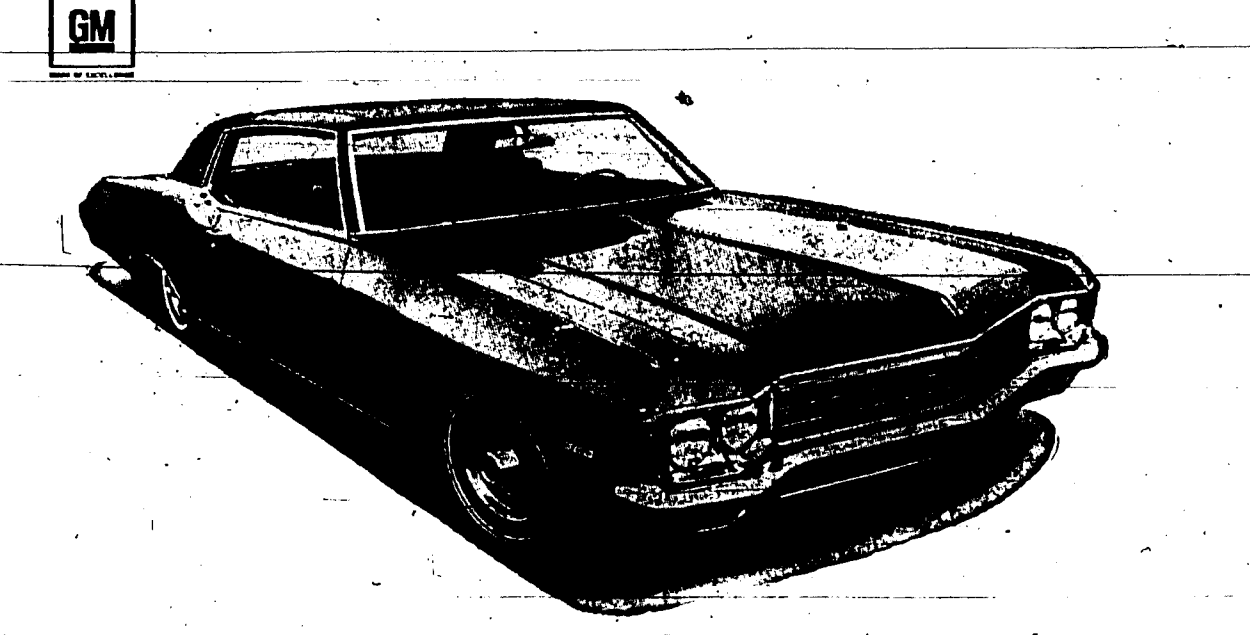

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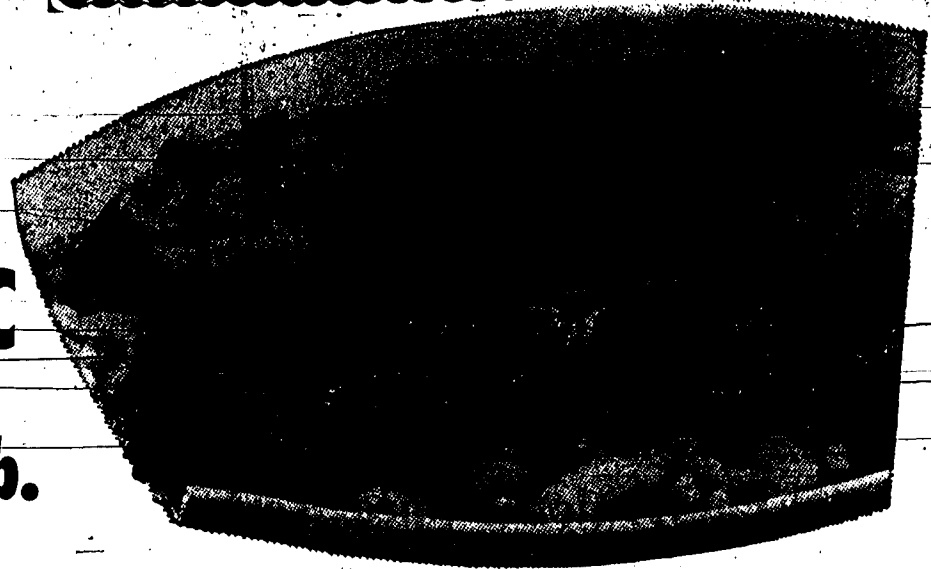

 We also should be extremely grateful to D. C. Rogers of Marion, Ill., who has come forth with an idea for spreading

this type of informational transmission to other fields of governmental endeavor.  
 One day as Rogers was tooling along an interstate route he saw about a half-dozen workmen reclining in the shade of one of the signs. This started him to thinking that the sign should have read: "Your Highway Taxes at Rest."  
 And that started him to thinking thumpy: "Why not have signs or badges made for every city, state and federal employee to wear while on the job so we taxpayers would readily be able to distinguish who was doing what?"  
 Why not indeed?  
 Sociologists tell us that one of the reasons so many taxpayers feel alienated today is because they are unable to figure out what their taxes are doing.  
 Better communication along that line might go a long way

toward ameliorating the average taxpayer's attitude toward the government.  
 Suppose, for example, that some congressional subcommittee is leaving for Paris, France, to investigate the impact of porographic skywriting on the European Common Market.

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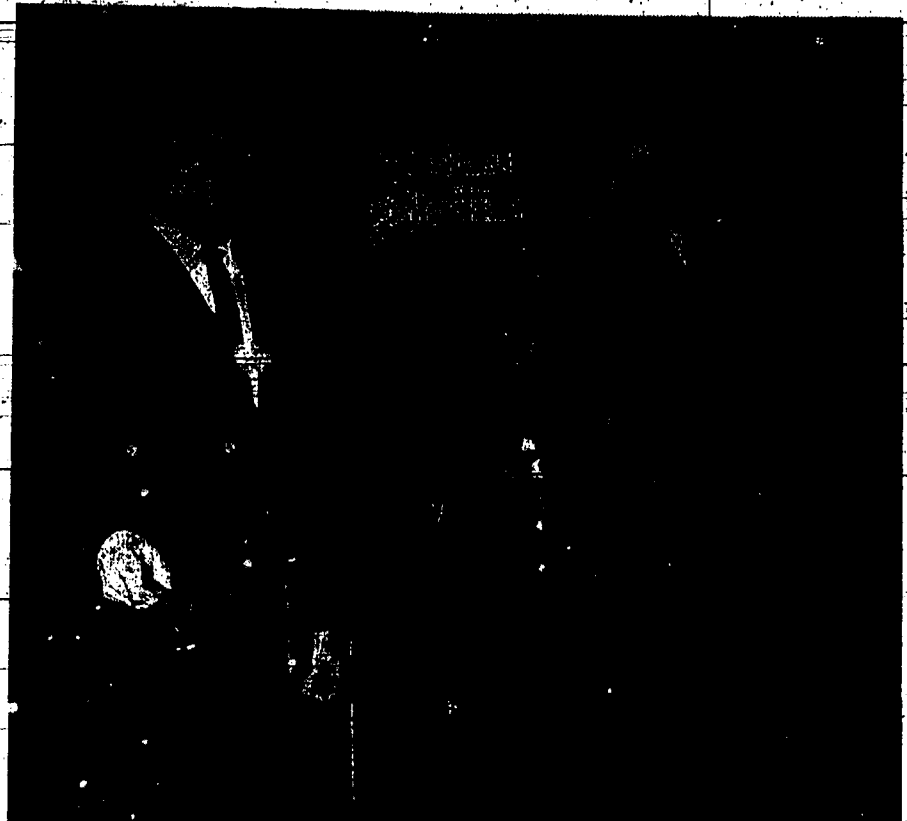

### Yugoslav Reds Bicker With Moscow Over Details Of Ideological Differences

 BELGRADE (UPI) — The newly-mended fabric of Yugoslav-Soviet relations within international communism is already showing signs of wear. Despite apparent reconciliation between the two long-time Communist rivals the lessons of 21 years of Yugoslav independence are not to be forgotten. In newspaper articles, scholarly essays and even a book, Yugoslav party theoreticians have shown beyond doubt that though Belgrade may court Moscow's favor in the name of good socialist family relations it is still as far as ever from approval of Kremlin ideological practices.  
 "Why seek to deny well-known historical facts?" the Yugoslav army newspaper Narodne Armije asked of a recently published official Moscow history of the Soviet Communist Party.  
 The book, according to Narodne Armije and other Yugoslav newspapers, attempts to belittle Yugoslavia's World War II partisan campaign against the Nazis, thus attempting "to deny an independent socialist revolution, its results and scope." Yugoslav anger at

the book has been unconcealed. Yugoslav-Soviet relations showed a marked thaw after a meeting in mid-May between 77-year-old president Tito and Soviet Ambassador Ivan Benediktov. At that time Tito, who broke with Moscow in 1948 to go his own ideological way, reportedly agreed to a Soviet proposal to "strive for more cordial 'fraternally socialist' ties."  
 Press polemics, especially sharp during March and April, subsided. A Tanjug news agency commentary critical of the world Communist summit in Moscow in June drew immediate censure from the Yugoslav party and resulted in the resignation of the agency's editor-in-chief.  
 Zoran Gluscevic, 43-year-old editor of the Belgrade literary fortnightly Knjizevne Novine (Literary News), lost his job and wound up in jail for six months for "slandering" the Soviet Union in an Aug. 31 article condemning the Soviet-led invasion of Czechoslovakia. Two days later Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko arrived in Belgrade for his first visit since 1962. State contacts on cultural and

economic levels showed marked increases almost immediately. A Yugoslav party delegation, first to visit the Soviet Union in two years, left for Moscow. Tito told a news conference Oct. 4 and Gromyko had "arrived at the common conclusion that it is best to forget the past and cooperate on the things which are of common interest to us. Therefore we leave aside the case of Czechoslovakia. It is finished." But at Belgrade University Prof. vezozar Stojanovic "the occupation of Czechoslovakia will ride it extremely difficult for the western Communist parties to fight for the so-called democratic road to socialism."  
 "With the aggression against Czechoslovakia the last socialist mask as fallen from the face of the oligarchic-statistic system," he wrote in his newly-published book, "Between Ideal and Reality."

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### 'Mace' Hit Member Of Parliament

CHICAGO (UPI)—A woman member of the British parliament told the riot conspiracy trial Tuesday she got Mace in the face from a Chicago policeman when she tried to sing "We Shall Overcome."

Mrs. Anne Patricia Kerr, 45, a Labor party member of parliament, called the judge "my lord," asked for and was refused a Bible when sworn in, and even sang the first bar of the protest song during her testimony about how she was arrested during the 1968 Democratic National Convention.

Mrs. Kerr was asked to take the customary oath in the trial of seven men charged with conspiring to incite riots at the convention.

"If I'm going to swear to something, I'd like a Bible," she told U.S. District Court Judge Julius J. Hoffman.

"I'd like you to have one too," Hoffman said. "But there's none in this courtroom. We don't need to swear on a Bible."

Mrs. Kerr said she ventured from her room at the Hilton on Aug. 28, 1968, and struck up a conversation on the street. Then, she said, police came up to her and told her to "move along there" or something like that. She said she told the policeman, "I'm just talking to these young people" and then "the policemen picked me up and threw me into the police wagon."

Mrs. Kerr said she stood on tiptoe and sang through the paddywagon window. In a clear voice she demonstrated for the courtroom with the first bar of "We Shall Overcome."

"Then the policeman on the outside sprayed my face with Mace. I felt as though my face was on fire," she said.

Earlier Tuesday, a Quaker coed in braids told the jury she heard arresting officers call a Negro girl protester a "black bitch" during a melee in Grant Park.

"It looked like they (police) were trying to hack their way through the crowd," Jane Myerling, a student at Temple University in Philadelphia, told the court. She said "no one was standing up" after the charge by about 100 policemen.

She said she and a black girl were arrested and, as police hauled them to a vehicle, a policeman identified as "Officer Hale" called the black girl the epithet. She said the other policeman said, "We know how to treat you animals."

### Urban Plans May Require Rebuilding

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Congress is ready to order cities to build a new housing unit for every one torn down in urban renewal projects.

"This is the end of urban renewal as a destructive force that destroys the family unit and wipes out the human relationships of the local neighborhood," said freshman Rep. Lowell Weicker, R-Conn., on whose amendment the order is based.

A House-Senate conference committee Tuesday wrote the provision into the compromise \$4.5 billion housing authorization bill. It would require one house or apartment unit to be constructed for each low income home torn down in slum clearance projects.

The proposal for the first time puts construction emphasis on housing in urban renewal projects.

Weicker, a former selectman in Greenwich, Conn., introduced an amendment in the House bill that would have required replacement housing in the same area. The compromise version would give the city discretion to build the new housing unit either in the renewal area or elsewhere in the city.

The one-for-one plan would affect only new projects.

The bill extends the Federal Housing Administration mortgage insurance programs, including a new plan to provide federal insurance for mortgages on mobile homes and mobile home parks. Another provision would bar either labor union restrictions or outmoded building codes from interfering with a new program—operation breakthrough—for constructing mass-produced housing.

### Police Probe Links Between Murders, Mystical 'Church'

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—An investigation is being conducted into possible links between the seven Tate-LaBianca slayings and the Nov. 5 stabbing deaths of two young Church of Scientology members, police said today.

The disclosure came as Charles Manson, the pied piper of a hippie cult accused in the Sharon Tate-LaBianca killings, was returned here Tuesday night for arraignment on seven murder charges. Manson, 35, who will appear in court Thursday, was brought from Independence, Calif., where he was held on auto-theft charge. He wore fringed buckskin clothing and roccasins.

Three other members of "The Manson Family" were to be arraigned today.

Similarities between the three brutal crimes have physical as well as philosophical parallels. Detectives reportedly have been looking into occultism, particularly the pseudo-religious, tribal led by the long-haired, bearded Manson and another group called "The Process."

"The Process," an antiestablishment group formed in

London which has been known to worship Satan, is an offshoot of the Church of Scientology. Investigators have been struck with parallels between its philosophies and the occultism of Manson, who was known to have dabbled in Scientology and then gone on to more eccentric cultism.

The Church of Scientology is a quasi-scientific organization which advocates the belief man is truly a spirit. Its chief goal is to free the "soul of wisdom." The mystical group uses an instrument called an "E-meter," a type of lie detector in its work with its followers.

### Car Owners Fail To Buy License Tags

BOISE (UPI)—Idaho's department of law enforcement said Tuesday that 50 per cent of Idaho vehicle owners have only 15 days left when they may purchase 1970 vehicle license renewal stickers.

Jack F. Farley, Boise, director of the Motor Vehicle Division, said a check with county assessors indicated that none had sold more than 50 per cent of the total issued for 1969, and that no assessors plan to sell 1970-71 stickers on other than regular working days.

Farley emphasized that there would be no extension period for purchase of new stickers after the deadline and that it would be illegal to operate a motor vehicle after the deadline with expired dates.

### Rogers Admits U.S., Russia Lack Peace Pact

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Secretary of State William P. Rogers said Tuesday night the United States and Russia, in eight months of confidential discussions, had failed to agree on a formula for peace in the Mideast.

"Our talks with the Soviets have brought a measure of understanding but very substantial differences remain," Rogers said. "We regret that the Soviets have delayed in responding to new formulations submitted to them on Oct. 28."

The United States produced 3.3 billion barrels of oil in 1968, most in the world.

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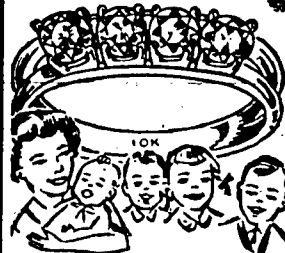


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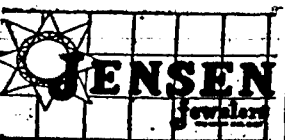


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### 'Ungrateful' Author Boycotts Ceremony

STOCKHOLM (UPI)—Irish publisher, Jerome Lindon, and three Americans, Prof. author Samuel Beckett went into hiding when told he had won the 1959 Nobel Prize for literature. Today he made good his pledge to stay away from the presentation ceremony.

It was four days after the Oct. 23 announcement of his award that Beckett consented to comment on it at all. "I am not grateful," said the 63-year-old playwright-novelist whose best-known work is the 1954 play "Waiting for Godot."

King Gustav VI Adolf was presenting the \$72,500 Nobel prizes for medicine, literature, physics and economics in Stockholm's concert hall at 10:30 a.m. EST. In Oslo, the peace prize went to the International Labor Organization (ILO) for its work in developing nations.

Beckett, who studiously avoids the limelight, lives in Paris but keeps to himself to the extent that only his

close friends know his address. Lindon accepted his prize today. One of the economics winners, Prof. Ragnar Frisch, of Norway also was absent. He broke a leg and had to stay home. Frisch shared the economics prize with Prof. Jan Tinbergen of Holland.

Three Americans, Prof. Max Delbruck of the California Institute of Technology, Dr. Alfred D. Hershey of the Carnegie Institution at Cold Spring Harbor, N.Y., and Prof. Salvador E. Luria of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) shared the medical prize for their research on the virus.

LAHR GETS AWARD NEW YORK (UPI)—John Lahr, drama critic for the Evergreen Review and the Village Voice, Tuesday was named winner of the \$4,500 George Jean Nathan Award for dramatic criticism. Lahr has just published a biography of his father, Bert Lahr, entitled "Notes on a Cowardly Lion." 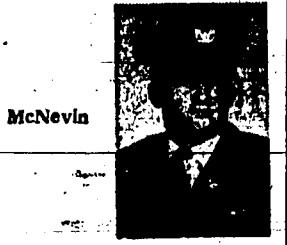

## Senate Committee Votes To Trim Narcotics Penalties

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Senate Judiciary Committee voted Monday to sharply reduce penalties for the possession and sale of marijuana and other illicit drugs, a prime Nixon administration goal.

The committee approved a bill that also called on the administration to conduct a two-year study by experts of the scientific and social aspects of marijuana smoking.

Under the measure, a person convicted the first time of possessing marijuana, heroin or any other outlawed drug could be jailed no more than one year. The judge could suspend the sentence, grant probation or even cancel the conviction so, for example, a youth picked up at a "pot" party would not have a criminal record.

A second offense would carry a maximum penalty of two years and a fine of up to \$10,000, but again the judge could suspend the sentence or grant probation.

Under present law, a first conviction for marijuana or narcotics possession carries a 2-to-10 year prison sentence and a fine of up to \$20,000. The judge is allowed to suspend the sentence or grant probation. For a second conviction, however, present law imposes a mandatory 5-to-20 year jail term and a \$20,000 fine.

The bill also would permit suspension of sentence or probation for a person convicted of selling drugs. Under present law, a convicted "pusher" is subject to a mandatory five to 20 years.

# Nixon Guest At Football Banquet

NEW YORK (UPI)—Pres. Nixon received the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame's gold medal award Tuesday night and defended his presentation of a plaque to the University of Texas, designating the Longhorns as the No. 1 college football team in the country.

The President made his presentation last Saturday following Texas' 15-14 victory over Arkansas, setting up an immediate outcry from followers of Penn State University, who felt the Nittany Lions are the best in the country.

"The only friends I may have are in Texas," Nixon joked, "and I didn't carry Texas." The President said referring to his election last year.

Nixon said he felt Texas was deserving of the selection "not because of the second touchdown it scored but because of the way it went for the two point conversion after its first touchdown."

"This reflected a quality of American youth, to come back and not play it safe," the President added.

Nixon also said his selection of Texas as No. 1 should not lead to any predictions about the upcoming bowl games.

"There should be some sort of super college bowl," Nixon said, "but I'm deep enough in this already."

Regarding his qualifications for the Foundation's gold medal award, Nixon remarked, "This is a small step forward for the foundation and football but a giant leap for a man who never made the team."

Nixon was referring to his collegiate playing days at Whittier College where he was a substitute.

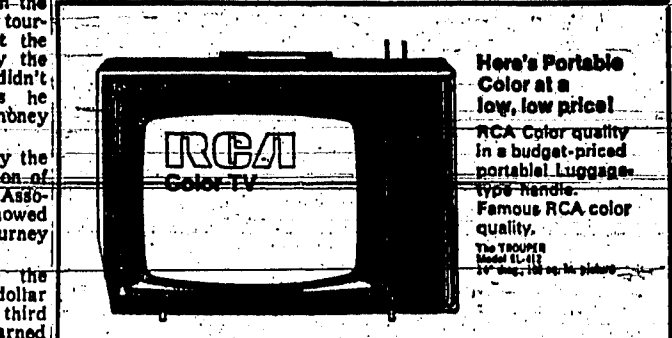
Final figures compiled by the Tournament Players Division of the Professional Golfers' Association of America showed Beard with total tourney income of \$175,223.

Oscar Robertson led all scorers with 31 points, including a field goal which enabled Cincinnati to tie the score at 101-101 with one minute to play.

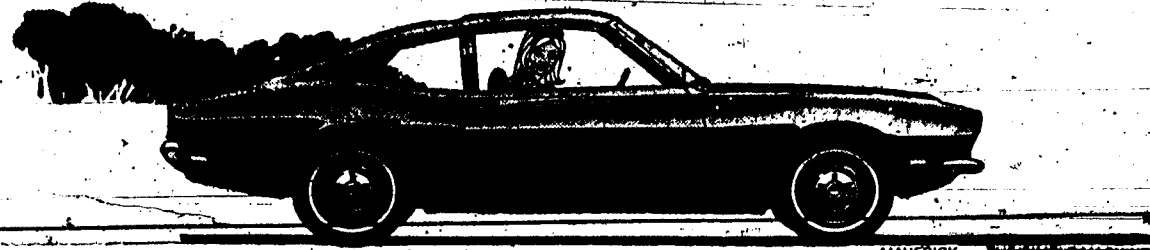

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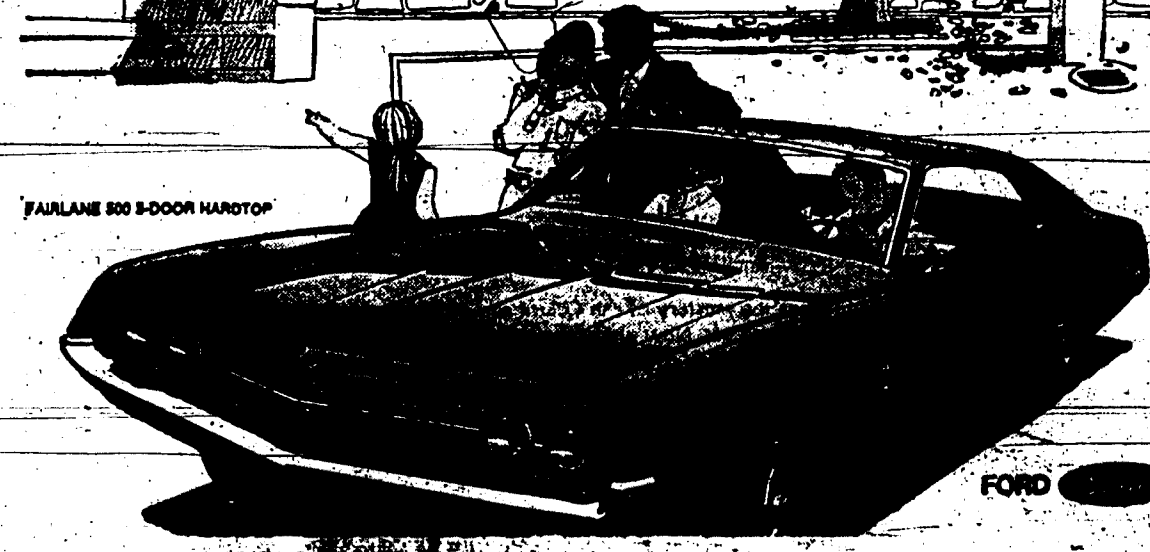

**Senate Votes To Speed Retirement, Allow Early Pension**

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Senate voted Tuesday to let people retire at age 60 and receive two-thirds of the Social Security benefits they would get if they waited until they were 65.

But, in deference to President Nixon's threat of a veto of a tax reform bill that he said was too costly, the Senate tacked onto the plan an amendment putting it into effect only after the President declares that the threat of inflation had ended.

The proposal, adopted 53 to 37, would permit 3.5 million people now in the work force to retire early and still receive two-thirds of the regular Social Security benefits. Even after

reaching age 65 and for the rest of their lives, they would not receive more than two-thirds under the proposal.

The early retirement plan was sought by the United Mine Workers to benefit miners who are frequently forced from the mines before they reach age 65 because of the disabling illnesses.

The law now lets people retire at age 62 with 80 per cent of full benefits. Wives at 62 receive 75 per cent of full benefits.

The Senate has already approved a provision in its tax reform bill granting a 15 per cent across the board increase

in Social Security benefits effective Jan. 1 and raising the minimum benefits from their current scale of \$55 for a single person and \$82.50 for a couple to \$100 and \$150.

President Nixon told his news conference Monday night this was one of the provisions that would cause him to veto the bill

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
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
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
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

## American Foreign Policy Adopts Tone Of Cautious Approach To World Problems

"It is not enough to talk of detente, unless at the same time we anticipate the need for giving it the genuine political content that would prevent detente from becoming delusion."

—President Nixon on NATO's 20th anniversary, April 10, 1969.

It was thus early in his administration that the President enunciated the cautious line he intended to follow toward the Communist nations as part of his policy of "negotiation, not confrontation."

Since then the warnings against detente becoming delusion have become a part of official administration language.

At a conference of NATO foreign ministers in Brussels in early November, an American spokesman warned against an "illusory detente."

And in Brussels on Dec. 6, Secretary of State William P. Rogers warned against "a false sense of detente."

Caution, in fact, has become the hallmark of this administration as it seeks to disengage in Vietnam, lower its posture in Asia, avoid a direct confrontation with rising nationalism in South America, and cut its losses around the world.

Another favorite phrase within the administration is what is called a "policy of linkages."

This is a policy which seeks to ease world tensions by agreements or understandings on a series of subjects, avoiding the generalities such as contained in the Communist bloc's latest invitation to a European security conference.

The Communist proposal issued from Prague last October suggested two items for the agenda: renunciation of the use of force and increased cultural, economic and technical exchanges.

The U.S. view, as outlined by the secretary of state, is that any such conference should address itself to specifics—Communist willingness to ease tensions arising over Berlin, a favorable Communist response to West Germany's efforts to improve relations with East Germany, and another favorable response to the West's offer to negotiate a mutual and balanced reduction of forces.

Over the reservations of some of the NATO allies, the U.S. view prevailed.

On its face, the Communist proposal seems loaded to Communist advantage.

As Rogers points out, the question of a renunciation of force already is covered by the United Nations Charter. Cultural relations are being handled on a bi-lateral basis. The Communist nations have little to offer in the way of technical know-how and none at all in their non-convertible currencies.

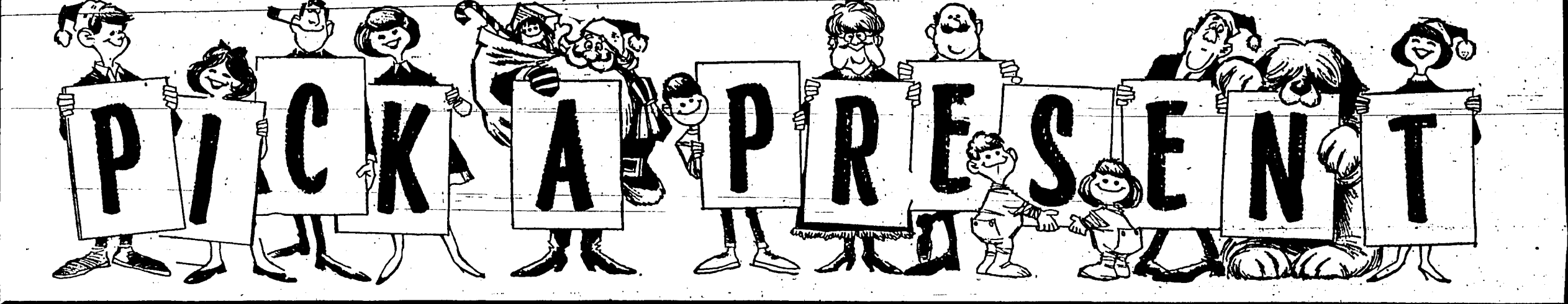

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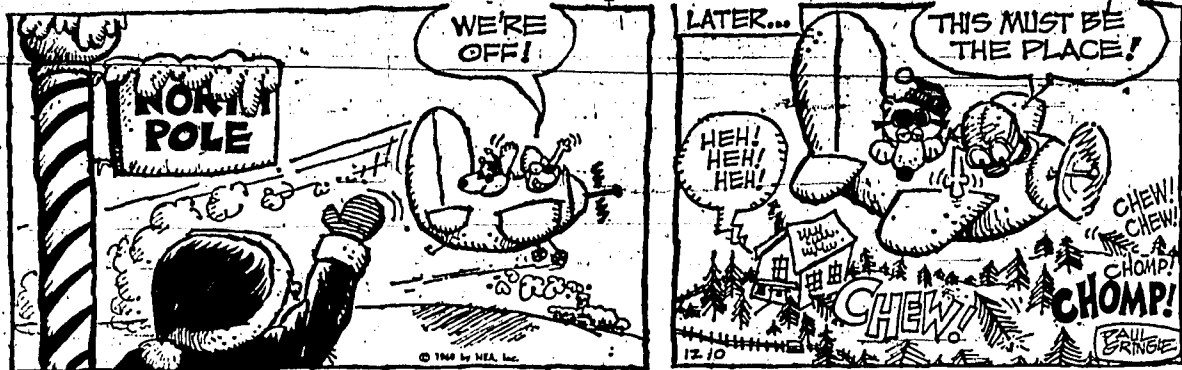

**Nixon Commends Agnew For Criticism, But Defends Press**

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Nixon said Monday night Vice President Spiro T. Agnew did the nation a service when he criticized news media for distorted news presentations. But he added: "Generally, I think the news media has been fair."

"I believe the vice president rendered a public service in talking in a very dignified and courageous way about a problem that many Americans are concerned about," Nixon said during his nationally broadcast news conference.

"And that is the coverage by news media, particularly television news media, of public figures," the President said.

Although endorsing his vice president, Nixon said he thought that generally he had been treated fairly by the news media. "I'll take my chances," he said.

Agnew, in two speeches last month, attacked news media for unfair news presentation—particularly criticizing the networks' "hostility" to Nixon's Nov. 3 Vietnam address in commentators' remarks at the conclusion.

However, it was unlikely that Agnew would find anything to criticize about Monday night's post-news conference television commentator.

Although Nixon's carefully prepared Vietnam speech and an open exchange with reporters are vastly different concepts, there was no criticism of his news-conference replies on the three major commercial

networks—ABC, CBS and NBC. Although the national educational television network followed the speech with a roundtable discussion in which the President was criticized, he was also defended by other members of the panel.

Critics of the administration have accused Agnew of trying to muzzle the press, but Nixon said Monday night:

"On the contrary, he advocated that there should be free expression. He did not oppose bias. On the contrary, he recognized—as I do—that there should be opinion."

"Let me say on that score that I don't want a lot of intellectual enclaves either writing the news or talking about the news. I like the excitement in the news, whether it's on television or whether it's in the columns."

"He did say, and perhaps this point should be well-taken, that television stations might well follow the practice of newspapers in separating news from opinion. When opinion is expressed, label it so. But don't mix the opinion with reporting the news."

Nixon said that he thought Agnew's speeches carried "some useful suggestions" and that if the networks disagreed, they should "be just as dignified and just as reasonable in answering the criticism as he was in making them."

"Generally," said Nixon, "I think the news media has been fair. I have no complaints
