Ex-Convict Enters Surprise Plea Of Guilty In Murder Of Wife, Bridesmaid On Christmas Eve, Gets 75-100 Years

MARION, Ill. (UPI)—An ex-convict charged with three slayings entered a surprise plea of guilty Monday to the Christmas Eve stranglings of his wife and her bridesmaid and was sentenced to 75 to 100 years in prison.

The sentence was imposed by Associate Circuit Judge John Clayton as the defendant, Kenneth Paul Rogers told the judge.

Then Rogers was taken to Murphysboro for a court appearance in the strangulation slaying last month of Lisa

Levering, 14, a Carbondale High School freshman. Circuit Judge E. E. Wright ordered the ruggedly handsome artist and former convict held without bond on the Levering murder charge.

Rogers had been imprisoned on a series of sex convictions until his parole earlier this year.

Rogers was sentenced to two concurrent terms of 75 to 100 years on his pleas of guilty to the murders of his wife, Wilma,

22, and Barbara Case, 24, of suburban Carbondale. Miss Case had been bridesmaid at Mrs. Rogers' wedding Sept. 27 in Murphysboro.

Their bodies were found in separate bedrooms of the Rogers' rented trailer home at Cartersville. Both had been strangled with appliance cords. Miss Case was nude and had been sexually assaulted, authorities said.

Rogers was apprehended near Mason, Tex., after Miss Case's

car was found abandoned and without gas Christmas day at a roadside park near Ripley, Tenn.

Authorities said Rogers, assistant manager of a Carbondale bookstore, had slashed his left wrist, tried to hang himself in a church and attempted asphyxiation during his flight.

Prominent Catholic Priest, 53, Tells Of Plan To Marry

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—The Rt. Rev. Monsignor James M. Murray, 53, a Catholic priest for 28 years and son of the 1954 national Catholic mother of the year, is leaving the priesthood to marry.

In a statement from his pulpit at St. John's Church, Father Murray said his decision came only after long soul-searching. He did not identify his bride-to-be, but said she is a spinster whom he had known for more than 14 years. She lives in

San Francisco. "It is extremely difficult to make a choice between eminent good things, between two cherished values: The sacrament of matrimony with the one I dearly love and the priestly ministry which I also dearly love and in which I have served honorably and faithfully for over 28 years," Father Murray told his parishioners Sunday.

His mother, Mrs. John J. Murray of San Francisco, was named California mother of the year in 1953, a year before her national honor was bestowed.

Father Murray described his bride-to-be as "a mature wom-

an, close to my own age, exquisite of face and form, and beautiful in spirit, whom I have known as a friend, with her family, for over 14 years."

"She is a Roman Catholic Christian of Irish-German parentage, never married, trained in Catholic schools, now a business woman, a department head in a large public utility," he said.

Release Of Rudolf Hess Is Demanded

MUNICH, Germany (UPI)—Three prominent American criminal lawyers Monday demanded the immediate release of Adolf Hitler's one-time deputy, Rudolf Hess.

A statement signed by attorneys F. Lee Bailey, Melvin M. Belli and Morgan P. Ames, said the sentencing to life imprisonment of Rudolf Hess according to all facts known to us was inconceivable and presumably a justice error.

The three attorneys were among a group of U.S. lawyers who attended a three-day seminar, organized by the American Military Trial Lawyers Association in Munich last weekend.

The 75-year-old Hess, who is serving his life term in West Berlin's Spandau Prison, was taken to the British Military Hospital Nov. 24 for treatment of a stomach ulcer.

On Christmas Eve, Hess had his first reunion with his wife Lisa and son, Wolf-Guediger, in 28 years in the military hospital.

Alioto Case Brings On Investigation

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Former Washington Attorney General John J. O'Connell committed "a possible law violation" in accepting a \$500,000 fee from San Francisco Mayor Joseph Alioto, a Washington state official said Monday.

Don Brazier, chief deputy attorney general, and two other lawyers went through 10 filing cases of Alioto's records in a mammoth, six-year antitrust case he prosecuted before he was elected mayor.

Alioto said last week he paid O'Connell \$531,000 and George Faler, the attorney general's assistant, \$272,000 for their work on the case outside their capacities as public officials.

Alioto received a \$2.3 million fee—15 per cent of the \$16 million won in the case.

Brazier said he had no reason to believe Alioto was guilty of any wrongdoing, "but there appears to have been a possible law violation by our predecessor in office."

Alioto represented 15 public utility districts in a series of price-fixing suits against major electrical manufacturers. O'Connell coordinated the case.

The mayor's fee originally was limited to \$1 million, but O'Connell lifted the ceiling.

Alioto said he was led to believe all the parties involved were informed O'Connell had removed the limitation and that the two Washington State officials were participating as private attorneys.

"There is no evidence so far that any of the public utilities districts had any knowledge that they were doing business with O'Connell in any other capacity than as attorney general," Brazier said.

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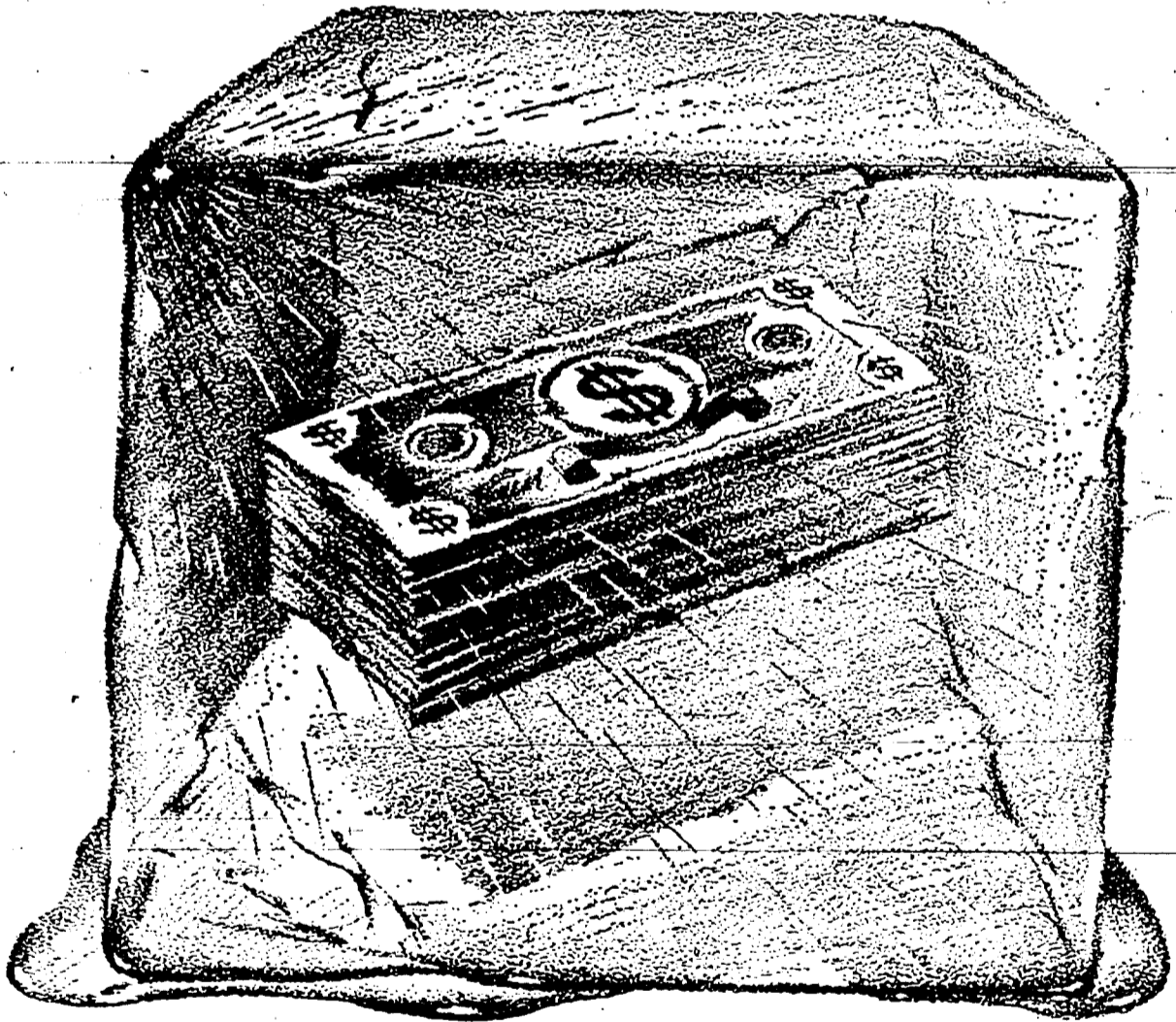

And those virtuous ones deserve more credit than the holdouts of the previous generation because today's teenagers are faced with so many more temptations than their parents were."

In concluding the article in Family Circle, Abby's advice for the parents of today is simply: "Start early! A child must learn that no means No! It doesn't mean maybe, and maybe does not mean yes."

"And remember, no matter what you tell your children they will do as you do. Example is not the only teacher, but it's by far the best."

which will be telecast on closed circuit television in North America and the United Kingdom.

Ellis, the World Boxing Association champion, and Frazier, recognized as a title holder in several states, and a number of foreign countries, will risk their titles on the February date announced Monday by Harry Markson, Madison Square Garden's director of boxing.

"We thought we had the fight made twice," said Markson. "But both times it fell through. There were times when we were about to give up, but last week, Teddy Brenner (Garden matchmaker) and I flew down to Miami and, fortunately, Angelo Dundee, Ellis' manager, agreed that this is the fight everyone wanted to see."

Dundee called the bout "a fight that had to be. We haven't been ducking anybody. I did agree to the fight on the condition that there be no rematch. I think rematch clauses are bad for boxing. If the fight's worth it, there'll be a return. If not, forget it."

Durdee said his fighter, who has not seen action since beating Floyd Patterson by a disputed decision 14 months ago, would be in "the best physical condition an athlete could be in" for the fight with Frazier, the power puncher from Philadelphia.

Both fighters naturally predicted victory.

"I ain't braggin'," said Ellis. "But I know I'm gonna whip him. I'm gonna beat him."

"There'll be no draw," said Frazier. "Somebody's got to go and it won't be me."

Ellis defeated Jerry Quarry on April 27, 1968, for the WBA version of the title after Cassius Clay was stripped of his championship when he refused induction into the armed services. Frazier, at 25 two years younger than Ellis, won his title on March 4, 1968, with an 11th-round knockout of Buster Mathis.

Ellis has defended his title only once, beating Patterson, while Frazier has put his title on the line four times. Frazier, unbeaten in 24 fights with 21 knockouts, knocked out Manuel Ramos in two rounds and decided Oscar Bonavena before knocking out Dave Zygiewicz in one round and stopping Quarry in seven rounds.

Ellis has won 27 fights, 12 by knockout, and has lost five. He was to have met Frazier last year but pulled out with an injury. His scheduled defense last week against Gregorio Porrala in Argentina was canceled when South American promoters were unable to meet financial obligations.

Both Frazier and Ellis will train in Florida until early February, when they shift headquarters to New York. Frazier will train at the Concord Hotel in Kiamesha Lake, N.Y., and Ellis will prep at the Garden's Felt Forum.

CARELESS PLAYERS DON'T WIN HONORS

In the match between the Dallas Aces and the Walsh teams, both South players reached four spades and had no trouble making the contract.

Bobby Goldman, who was South for the Aces, jumped to four spades to announce a good spade suit and minimum hand. On the system used by him and Billy Sisenberg, the two-club response, followed by the return to two spades, committed the partnership to game. Bobby's jump to four spades gave a complete picture of the hand.

A careless player might take a quick look at dummy and play out his ace and king of spades. Should the queen drop, he would be able to try for a couple of overtricks but the actual trump, heart and club situation would probably lead to our careless friend winding up one trick short of his contract.

We say—probably, because a

clairvoyant declarer could recover from this bad start.

Careless players don't get into a match to determine the North American International Team and Bobby didn't fall into this trap.

He ruffed the second diamond and led out one high trump. Then he played a heart back to his jack. West was in with the queen and could find no better lead than a club. Bobby won in dummy and was now ready to play his second high trump. The king of hearts and a ruff of the fourth heart came next and eventually West made his queen of trumps.

Of course, the hand was a standoff. Dick Walsh made the same four spades in the other room.

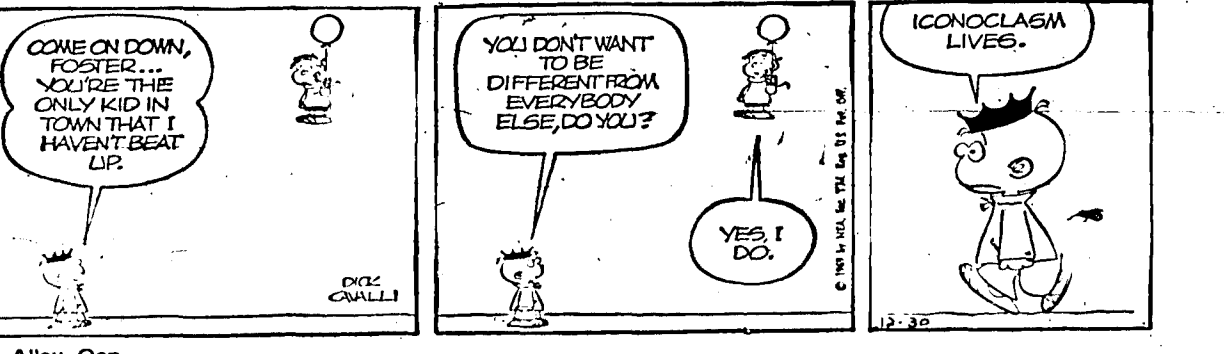

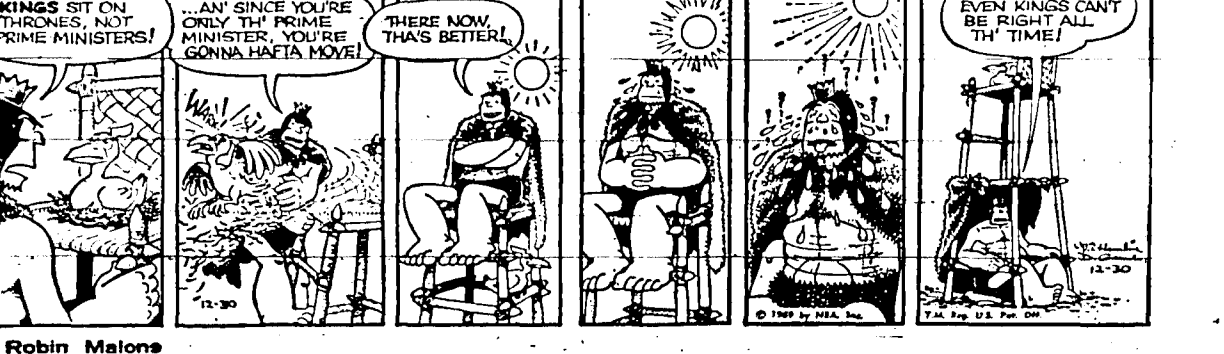

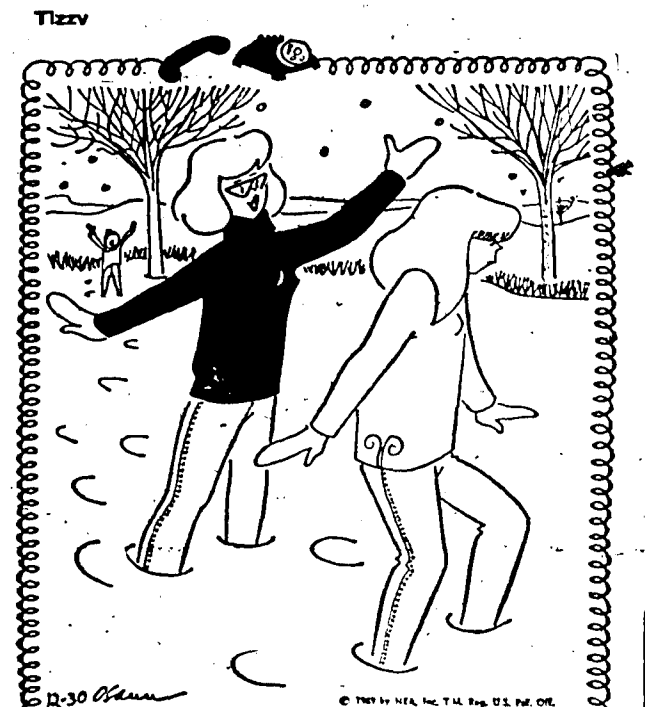
