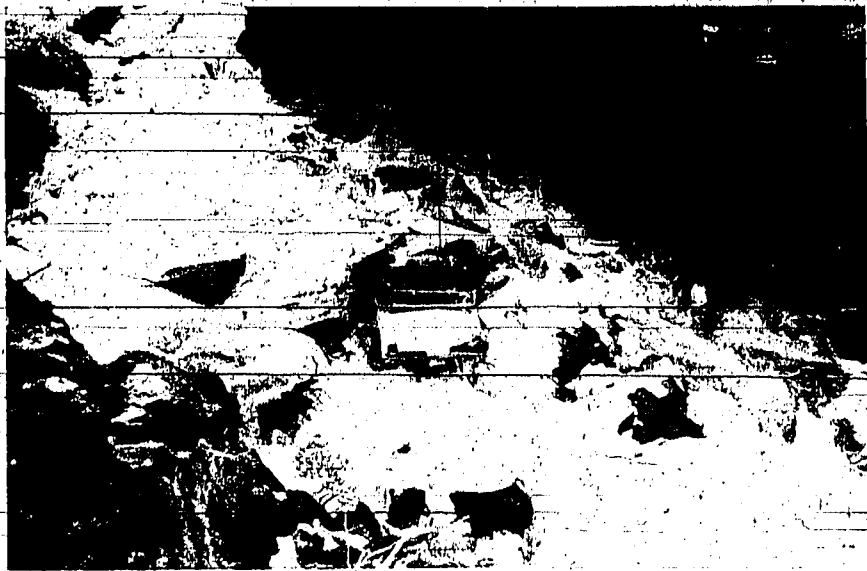

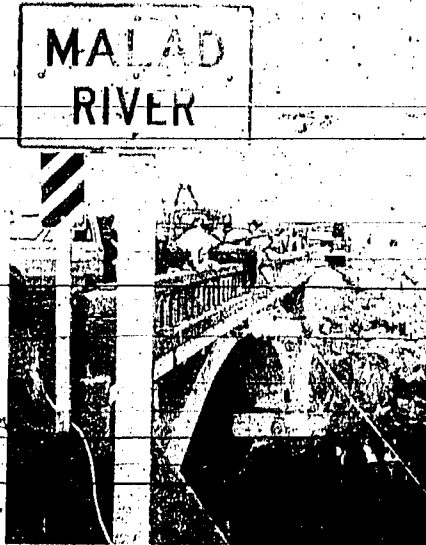

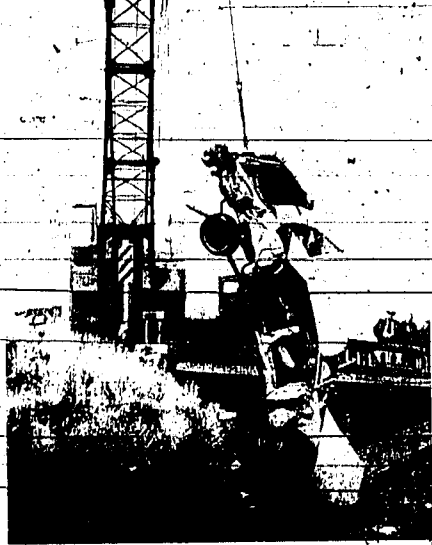

WASHINGTON — Hubert Humphrey will definitely make his long-awaited announcement for the Senate later this month. While the exact timing is still undecided, the former Vice President has bowed to the insistent urging of political intimates that he wait no longer to formally declare his candidacy for the seat being relinquished by Sen. Eugene McCarthy.

The virtually inevitable result would be another round of the throat-cutting factionalism that has plagued the DFL since 1966. Humphrey's leaders hold it is necessary for him to announce his Senate candidacy in the next few weeks, on the ground that it will strengthen the position of his forces at the crucial precinct caucuses held throughout Minnesota on Feb. 24.

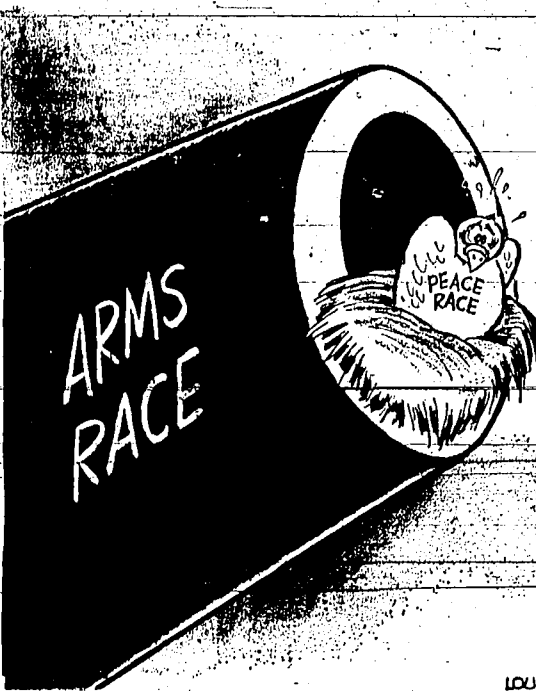

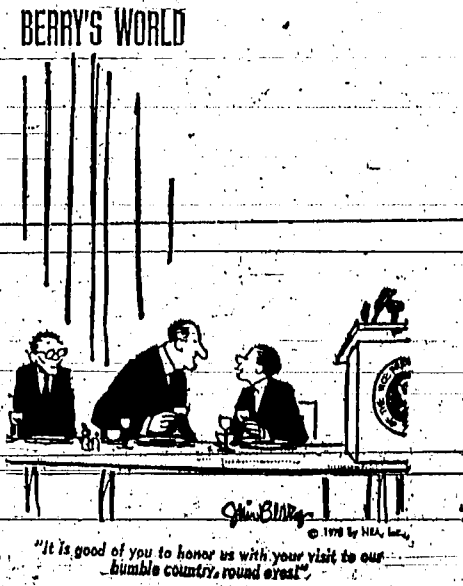

### All-White Private Schools Face Loss Of Tax Exemption

JACKSON, Miss. (UPI)—All-white private schools which were exempt from the massive desegregation of Mississippi's public schools faced a major obstacle today in a federal effort denying them tax exemptions.

A leader in the private school movement conceded the order by a three-judge federal court in Washington Tuesday "won't help" such schools.

The judges also prohibited federal tax deductions for private donations to such schools until officials determine, under court-approved procedures, that the schools are an alternative to white students seeking to avoid desegregated public schools.

The temporary orders, effective in a pending ruling in May on a 1969 lawsuit filed on behalf of five Negro families, came only nine days after 30 public school districts began implementing the "total integration" mandate of the Supreme Court.

Bond was not permitted to testify, among other things about a speech he gave at Grant Park during the convention.

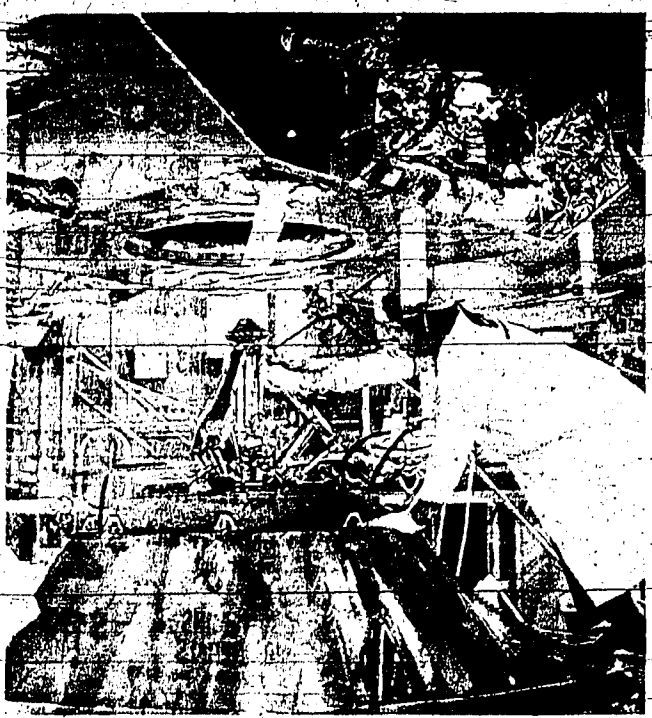
Bond also testified that he met with Dellinger and others on April 9, 1968, in Atlanta after King's funeral.

### Birth Control Pills Deemed 'Extremely Hazardous'

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A gynecologist told Congress today widespread use of birth control pills "has given rise to health hazards not previously known to medicine."

Dr. M. James Whitelaw of O'Connor Hospital, San Jose, Calif., said oral contraceptives could leave a woman infertile "many months, or even several years," after she stops taking them.

"Nine million American women are consuming these compounds almost as automatically as chickens eating corn," he said.

But he said no woman should be allowed to take oral contraceptives until she has proven her "hazards of long-term use of these systemic hormones" are "increasingly ominous," Davis said.

Three other medical authorities testified of potential hazards, but not nearly so strongly as Davis.

Martin S. Legator, a food and drug administration (FDA) research official, said "an exhaustive study such as carried out with cigarette smokers would be required to indicate a possible relationship between oral contraceptives and cancer."

Legator said a "long latent period" made instant test results impossible. He said it would take "10 or more years, and even... generations in the case of hereditary responses."

The potential long-range consequences which might result if this vast number of women continue to take the pill indefinitely are "simply too frightening to consider."

The entire island of Kauai was temporarily without electricity after raging winds and falling trees knocked down power lines in several places.

At least 20 homes lost roofs on Kauai, 100 miles northwest of Honolulu. A dozen homes or garages in the Kaneohe area flattened "like a pancake," a Civil Defense spokesman said.

"Last time it was the water we were worried about; this time it's the winds," the city spokesman said.

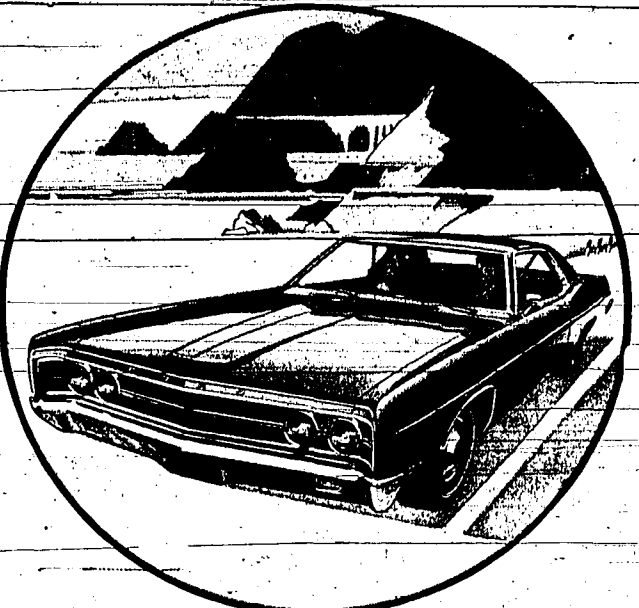

### Some Of Dean Rusk's Friends In Nixon "Family" Feel He Was Treated Shabbily By Some Georgia Officials

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Former Secretary of State Dean Rusk may not know it, but he has some friends quite high in the Nixon administration who feel he was treated shabbily by some Georgia officials in connection with his selection to the University of Georgia faculty.

Rusk, a native Georgian, recently was appointed professor of international law at the University in Athens, Ga., but got something less than a rousing vote of approval. The state board of regents voted to confirm the Rusk appointment by a vote of 9 to 4.

Several Nixon administration officials in a very professional academic backgrounds and they undoubtedly have been looking ahead to what might happen to them should they desire to return to campus life a few years hence. Gov. Lester Maddox predicted he was critical of the Rusk appointment because of Rusk's liberal connections with the Kennedy and Johnson administrations. The toughest opposition in Rusk seemed to come, however, from one of the most experienced rough-and-tumble

political fighters in Georgia, Roy V. Harris of Augusta, longtime leader in the affairs of white citizens councils. Harris is a member of the powerful Board of Regents and can be expected to be unrelenting in his criticism of Rusk. One reason is that Rusk did not prevent his daughter, Margaret Elizabeth, from marrying a black man, Guy Gibson Smith.

Professors brought in government by the Nixon administration expressed little outward concern when Walt W. Rostow, policy adviser to President Lyndon B. Johnson, could not return to his old campus because of his involvement with

Vietnam policy. He had returned to his old home town at the Menasha College Institute of Technology in Racine, Wis., to the University of Texas faculty.

One Nixon official explaining the difference in the Rostow and Rusk cases, says: "While the treatment of Rostow was forgettable, what we see now is a former secretary of state who served his country honorably and today he is being submitted to indignity for something that has absolutely nothing to do with his knowledge and teaching ability."

Rusk's appointment to the Georgia faculty is for only one year. Roy Harris knows this and for one year Rusk will be his personal shooting gallery. After one year of barbs from "gentle Harris," Rusk may "huff" back on some of his angry sessions before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee and Chairman J. William Fulbright as the good old days.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Wayne B. Colburn, 53, U.S. marshal for Southern California and San Diego, Monday was named chief of the U.S. Marshal Service by Attorney General John N. Mitchell. Carl Turner, who quit under fire in an investigation of misuse of funds at Army enlisted men's clubs.

### Government, Industry To Test Ovens

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Government and industry have agreed to test the 100,000 microwave ovens in use across the country to check for possible radiation leakage, according to Surgeon General Jesse L. Steinfeld.

"No injuries have been reported and none are known to exist from the use of microwave ovens," Steinfeld said Monday. But he said previous government surveys in four states showed one-third of 155 ovens tested with radiation levels above the voluntary industry standard. Excessive microwave radiation can cause cataracts and burns.

The government has urged owners of such ovens to have them checked and pending such checks to stay at least an arm's length in front of them while they are being operated, and to turn them off before opening the door.

### Soviets Rewrite History To Shift Blame From Stalin

By DUSKO DODER  
MOSCOW (UPI) — The Soviet Communist party has rewritten history to shift blame from Josef Stalin and his top military commanders for failing to halt the Nazi invasion in 1941.

A history of the party, appearing on the eve of the 25th anniversary of victory in World War II, has been revised to omit or tone down earlier charges that Stalin, Defense Minister Marshal Semyon Tomoshenko, and the chief of staff, Marshal Georgi K. Zhukov, were responsible for great losses the Russians suffered in the initial stages of the war.

The new history of the Soviet party was edited by Kremlin ideologists led by Boris Ponomarev, secretary of the central committee. It appeared for a day in October and was promptly withdrawn to be replaced on the new year by a new version.

An analysis of the two books showed significant discrepancies, although the latter edition makes no mention of any changes of corrections made. It is an account of the initial phase of the war that was published in the October edition and cut from the later version.

"The Red army suffered great losses, particularly its air forces. All this even further turned the balance in favor of the enemy."

"One of the causes for this state of affairs was Stalin's wrong assessment of the military-strategic situation on the eve of the war, (his) miscalculation of the possible attack of Nazi Germany on the U.S.S.R., and in connection with them, deficiencies in preparations for repulsing the first enemy attacks."

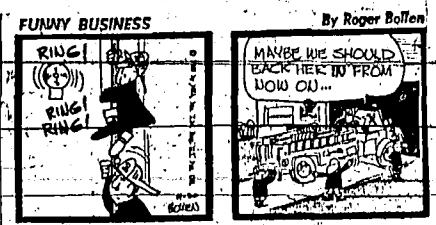

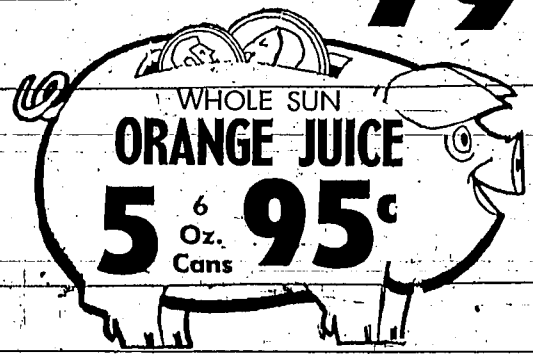

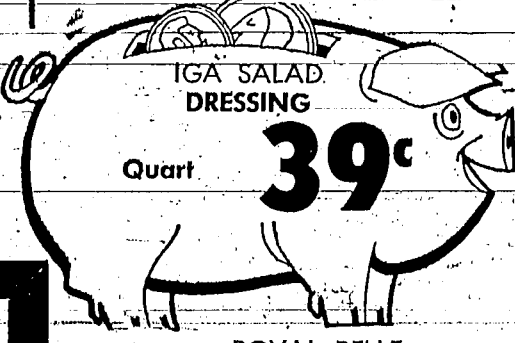

South's one no-trump call was irregular to say the least and North's pass was silly indeed. He should surely have raised the no-trump bid.

West opened the device of diamonds. South looked over dummy and saw that there was a sure four no-trump if the club suit would break nicely for him. He decided to play the hand on the theory that clubs would not break and that only those declarers who reached game wouldn't make it. He called for dummy's nine of diamonds. East took his 10 and returned a heart. West won with the 10 and led the diamond five. South thought that one over carefully and called for dummy's seven. East was on lead again and

played a second heart. West was allowed to win that also. Then West played out his king of diamonds.

South finally took that trick. The defense had four tricks in and the queen of diamonds was set up as a potential fifth. South decided to insure his contract by taking the spade finesse. That lost and West cashed his diamond queen but there was no way for South to lose anything more.

At that time score of plus 90 turned out to be average. It seems that lots of other North-South pairs reached the proper three no-trump contract but the declarers failed to make it with or using the club suit. Those declarers did manage to make eight tricks, but eight tricks when you need nine produces a minus score.
