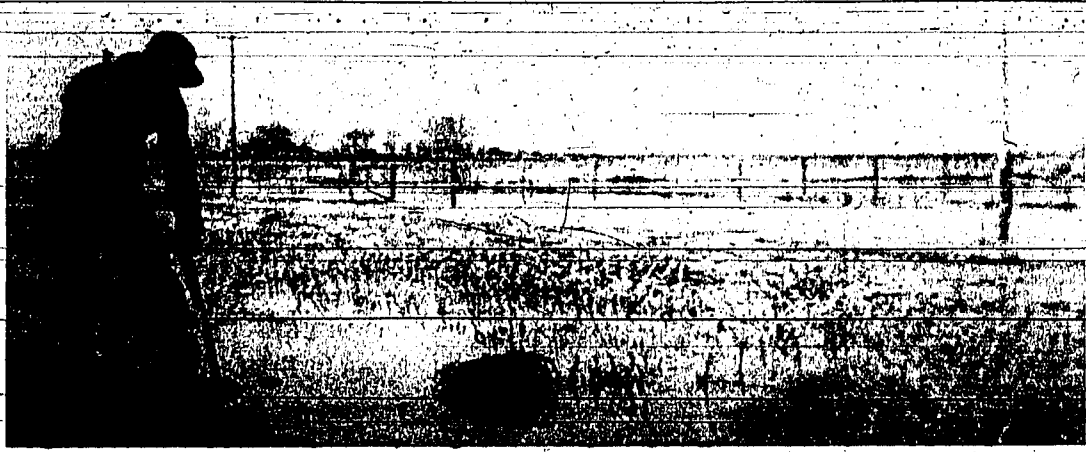

Arco Airport Effort Gets Board's Okay

BOISE (UPI) — The State Board of Examiners approved Tuesday a cooperative effort between the State Department of Aeronautics, Arco, and Butte County for an airport improvement plan.

At an otherwise routine meeting, Gov. Don Samuelson and Secretary of State Pete Carrus approved a request from Aeronautics Director Chet Moulton to aid in the "first establishment" of a resident administration building at the air facility.

Moulton said the project, which would cost between \$3,000 and \$5,000, would cover a master plan and the building. The board also approved requests to allow several state employees to teach part-time at state institutions and a request from the state insurance fund for an additional \$822 to complete an analysis of the underwriting section of the department.

Increases Told

BOISE (UPI) — Albertson's Inc., a 213-store western-states supermarket chain headquartered in Boise, announced Tuesday increases in both sales and earnings for the quarter ended Dec. 27, 1969. J. L. Scott, president, said sales for the 13-week quarter totaled \$112,956,638, an increase of six per cent over last year's earnings.

Power Outage

Power in portions of Twin Falls was interrupted for 13 minutes Tuesday when blasting at the Child Development Center construction site on Falls Avenue caused conductors to arc.

The outage at the Twin Falls station began at 12:40 p.m. and power was restored at 1:02 p.m. About 2,500 customers were affected. The outage also caused traffic signals in the downtown area to quit functioning causing some minor traffic jams.

Palermo Is Faced With Rat Invasion

ROME (UPI) — The Sicilian capital of Palermo faced the danger of a rat invasion Tuesday because of a garbage collectors' strike. In dozens of other Italian cities, a strike by bus and streetcar workers forced millions of workers and students to go to work a little earlier.

Garbage piled up so high in some streets traffic had to be diverted, and fears that a rat invasion may take place were voiced by a Palermo health official.

"Rat rats here are as big as cats," he said. "They eat better than most pets. Cats are terrified of them and unless we act quickly, the rats will take over the city. Maybe we will need the magic flute to get rid of them. We cannot spend a state dollar to get 80 million lire (\$128,000) in a deratization campaign."

During the last rat invasion two years ago in Palermo, public parks and some stores were closed, while exterminators spread poison in a partly successful battle. Palermo, often called the dirtiest city in Sicily, spends more than nine billion lire (\$144 million) per year on street cleaning and garbage collecting. The garbage collectors said they were striking because the city had not paid them a promised bonus of 11,000 lire (\$17.60).

Segregation To Be Fought In North

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Assistant Attorney General Jerry Leonard said Tuesday the Justice Department intends to combat school segregation in the North as well as the South. Leonard, head of the Justice Department's Civil Rights Division, said the department would bring legal pressures on any school whose teaching staff or student body is so out of balance racially that it is considered to be either a "white school" or a "Negro school." He said this includes schools where there is only token integration. "We are attempting to apply a national enforcement program in the school desegregation area as in all areas of our responsibilities," Leonard wrote in a letter to Rep. Fletcher Thompson, R-Ga. Thompson wrote Leonard

urging that legal enforcement pressure be applied against specially identifiable schools in the North as well as in the South.

Postal Reforms

Congress is more likely to increase postal rates than it is to permit any fundamental reforms in the service. President Johnson approved the proposal for turning the postal system over to a non-profit, government-owned corporation. President Nixon recommended it, and the last three Postmasters General seconded it.

The odds are against any improvement, so long as Congress and the postal unions are able to maintain the status quo, despite the facts that service is unsatisfactory and that private enterprise has demonstrated more than once that it can do the job better and without government subsidies. With the department running a billion dollars a year deficit, President Nixon is confronted with the immediate necessity of tackling the problem as part of the overall effort to find ways and means of achieving a balanced budget. Congress has made the task extremely difficult by reducing tax revenues and increasing expenses, notably for higher Social Security benefits and pressures for more money to improve the environment, to feed the hungry and to increase health and education expenditures, will grow. Therefore, an increase in postal rates looks to be the only way to reduce the postal deficit. If you think more fundamental action should be taken, write your Congressmen — allowing, of course, two weeks for your letter to reach Washington.

Selfish?

Some little time ago in young woman wrote that she and her fiancé agreed that they didn't want children, and she wouldn't marry him until he had a vasectomy — an operation designed to make him sterile. Among other things, I said that to my mind she was an opinionated and selfish young woman. (I still think so.) But I have had quite a barrage of letters, virtually all of them misinterpreting what I wrote. This is a typical one: Dear Dr. Thosteson: By denying the girl respect for her judgment, you are helping to perpetuate the myth that all people are capable of and should have children. A person should not be made to feel badly because he is not particularly fond of children and does not wish to have any of his own. By failing to this new low if your column, you have shown that you are opinionated. If you continue to use your column to answer straight questions, you will lose two more readers, my husband and myself. —Mrs. W.F.H.

foreseeing the possibility that the patient may later have a change of heart, chances are very much better — although even then they may be no better than 50-50. Returning to the young lady in question, I do not see that she has the right to demand that her husband-to-be have the sterilization while she herself does not. She can change her mind later, if she has a change of heart. Her husband-to-be also may persuade her that she does want a baby. No, she doesn't take the risk. She makes him take all the risk. That's why I call her selfish. Besides that, there are other reliable methods of contraception. "The pill," or a diaphragm, to name the surest. I think people are entitled to know that sterilization operations cannot be reversed with certainty if you want to have such an operation yourself, think one through. But I don't think you have the right to force it upon someone else. Dear Dr. Thosteson: If you have catarrhs, can you still have glaucoma? —B.S. Yes, sir. The two can exist together. Note to E.M.S.: "A trace of albumin in the urine" may indicate infection in the bladder, or elsewhere in the urinary system. It deserves investigation. Sometimes it is of no significance. Don't take chances with "kidney trouble." It may be only minor, but it can be dangerous. Read Dr. Thosteson's booklet, "Your Kidneys — Facts You Need to Know About Them." 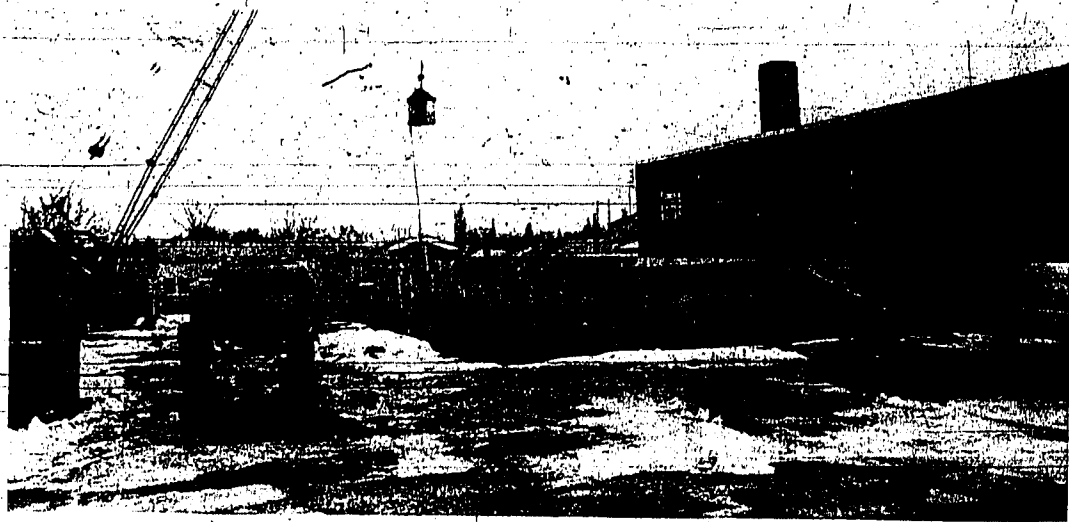

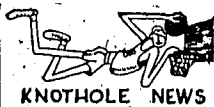

Chicago Trial Will Be Held On Sundays

CHICAGO (UPI) — U.S. District Court Judge Julius J. Hoffman Monday ordered that the trial of the "Chicago Seven" go on a seven-day-a-week schedule.

Hoffman granted a defense motion to hold Sunday sessions after refusing defense pleas that he lift his ruling of Friday that trial also be held on Saturdays. Hoffman's only reservation was that jurors would be allowed to attend religious ceremonies before sessions would begin on Saturdays and Sundays.

Hoffman made the order in an attempt to speed up the trial of seven men charged with conspiring to incite riots during the 1968 Democratic National Convention. The trial is now in its 16th week and defense attorney Leonard L. Weinglass indicated Friday it would last another month under a five-day-a-week schedule for sessions.

Bean Tally Of Traffic Inspires Engineer

To Design Fast-Expanding Tokyo Subways

TOKYO (UPI) — Forty-five years ago a railroad man named Tokuji Hayakawa conducted a one-man traffic survey. Hayakawa stood on a Tokyo street corner with two bags of beans. When a pedestrian passed he put a white bean in his left pocket. When an automobile went by he put a black bean in his right pocket. His left pocket got full mighty fast.

When Hayakawa had finished counting his beans he told the city fathers that what Tokyo needed was a subway. A lot of people said it was a silly idea. It wasn't, of course, so in 1927 the turnstiles in the city's first subway began collecting yen.

Tokyo now ranks fifth among the cities of the world in subway mileage. Subway tracks today extend for 73 miles in the world's largest city.

Two and a half million people ride Tokyo's subways each day. People who have ridden subways in New York, London, Chicago, Paris, Berlin and Moscow say Tokyo's subways are as efficient as any in the world. They are also incredibly crowded.

During morning and afternoon rush hours trains operate at two-minute intervals. The cars are clean, well-lighted and well-ventilated but a riding during rush hours can be a harrowing experience.

Unlike other great cities of the world, Tokyo got a late start with its subway system. Most of the tracks were laid

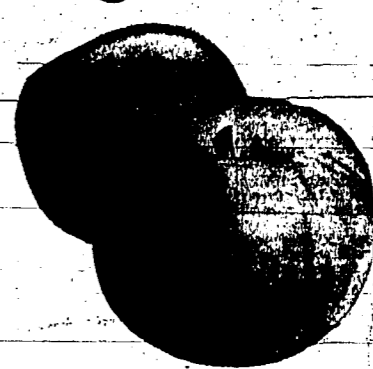

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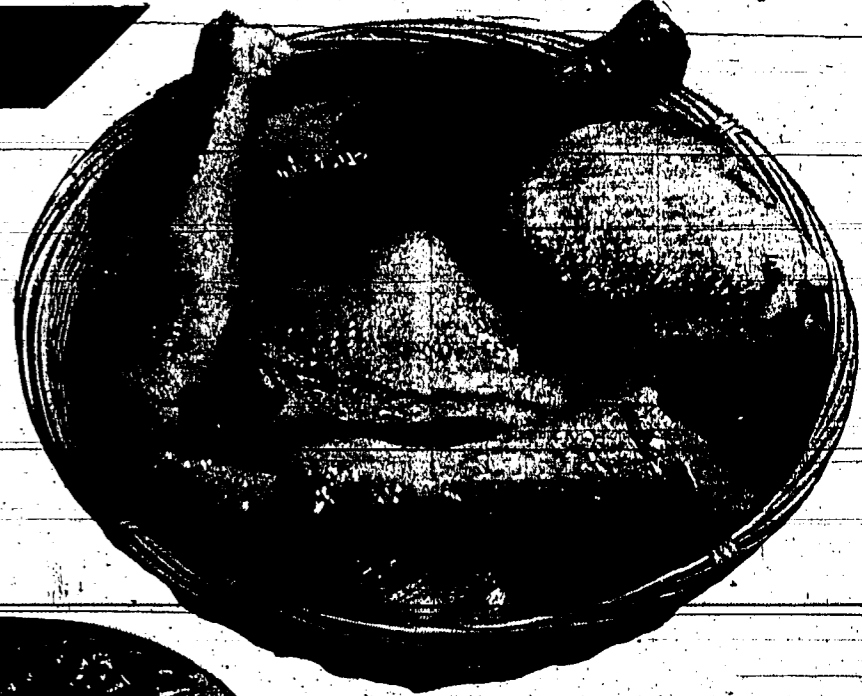

Israeli Foreign Minister Believes U.S. 'Outmaneuvered' By Russia On Mideast

JERUSALEM (UPI)—Israeli Foreign Minister Abba Eban said today he believes the United States has been outmaneuvered by the Soviet Union in recent talks on the Middle East but that it is not too late for the United States to recover.

Eban said in an interview that for nearly a year (of Big Four talks) there has not been any positive movement, he said. "Surely the best thing now is to try another direction."

Eban, in an interview indicated the new direction should be to give direct Arab-Israeli negotiations using the good offices of U.N. negotiator Gunnar V. Jarring of Sweden but without any prior conditions beyond his mandate to promote agreement.

Eban said the United States, in Israel's view, gave too much ground in its effort to find agreement with the Soviets on a negotiated peace between Israel and the Arabs. Recent talks involving Britain, France, the United States and the Soviet Union have found the Soviets more rigid than had been expected.

Eban said the Soviets are absolutely tight and kept saying "come along now and come a little nearer" and when the United States came a little nearer the Soviets simply went back.

Eban said the American negotiators ended up with an erosion of some of their own positions without any compensating advantage to the Soviet position.

Eban said he believes control of the Mediterranean Sea is the key to the present Middle East problem. The foreign minister, who was recovering from a head cold, said the basic Soviet aim is to ensure its own predominance in the Mediterranean in order to outflank the European defense system.

'Country Joe' Duels Judge In Musical-Trial Interlude

CHICAGO (UPI)—The riot conspiracy trial of the "Country Joe and the Fish" band witnesses who tried to sing before, but it was a little harder to stop this one.

MacDonald, whose folk-rock singing group is "Country Joe and the Fish," testified that he suggested to defendant Abbie Hoffman that the "Vietnam Rag"—which he tried to demonstrate—should be sung at the "Festival of Life" during the 1968 Democratic national convention.

Hoffman and six other men are charged with conspiring to incite riots at the convention. Country Joe said he decided not to support the Festival of Life because "the vibrations in this town" were "so incredibly vicious" that he felt violence was inevitable during the convention.

A witness of a totally different sort—former Assistant U.S. Attorney General Roger Wilkins, who was director of the Justice Department's Community Relations Service—also testified for the defense Tuesday.

Defense attorney Leonard I. Weinglass told Judge Hoffman that a memo from Wilkins to Ramsey Clark, then U.S. Attorney General, would show that violence was possible during the convention and "would be a national disaster and disgrace."

Judge Hoffman did not allow the memo to be admitted into evidence after the prosecution objected it contained "thought processes" that amounted to hearsay.

Testimony Is Sought On Debate Bill

BOISE (UPI)—The Senate's Fish and Game Committee held further study Tuesday a bill that would raise out-of-state big game hunting licenses from \$100 to either \$140 or \$150.

Last week the House Resources and Conservation Committee recommended an increase to \$150, while the Department of Fish and Game has proposed a \$125 increase for non-resident hunters.

Committee Chairman Warren H. Brown, R-McCall, said it was important to increase the amount of this session since the department "possibly will consider raising resident license fees in two years" and will want to again hike out-of-state licenses at that time.

The committee also left for further study "providing to take the lid off" fees paid to state fish and game commissioners. At the present time commission members receive \$25 per day while conducting official business, but are limited to \$1,000 per year.

Solon Seeks Reciprocity With Utah

BOISE (UPI)—Sen. John Evans, D-Midvale, said Tuesday it has come to his attention that the state of Utah does not have reciprocity for auto inspection for out-of-state students' vehicles.

The Democratic minority leader said, "It appears that an Idaho student going to school at Brigham Young University in Provo has been ordered to secure a Utah auto inspection although he recently purchased an Idaho inspection sticker."

Evans said this was another ridiculous example of states not cooperating.

"I would hope Governor Rampton and the Utah State Tax Commission will take into consideration my request that full reciprocity be given to Idaho students who attend college in Utah."

He said he had sent the necessary requests to both Gov. Calvin Rampton and Gov. Don Samuelson in Utah, asking that the reciprocity agreements be approved.

Education Department Seeks Funds For Small Districts

BOISE (UPI)—The State Department of Education Tuesday recommended changes in the "education foundation" program formula to provide more funds for small districts.

The changes, Harold Farley, Assistant State Superintendent of Public Instruction said, would also establish "base" for each student in average daily attendance.

Farley said the new base would ultimately eliminate the so-called floor districts. Addition of state funds would not be needed to establish the new base for each student in average daily attendance.

Agent Says Board Fails In Drug Job

BOISE (UPI)—An undercover narcotics agent from Canyon County charged Tuesday the Board of Pharmacy is "inefficient" and not doing a "good job" on narcotics enforcement and urged that the duties be turned over to the Department of Law Enforcement.

The narcotics agent, George Nourse, Caldwell, was called to testify before the committee on the controversial bill to transfer the enforcement of drug penalties by State Affairs chairman Sen. Dean Summer, R-Boise.

Committee action on the bill, which stirred up controversy and failed to pass the last session, was expected either Wednesday or Thursday.

Legislature Ponders Bill On Time Zone

BOISE (UPI) — A measure putting all of Idaho on year-round standard time — with the provision the state be placed in a single time zone — was voted for introduction by the House Judiciary and Rules Committee on Monday. The measure was brought before the committee by Rep. William Crookham, R-Caldwell, who has been conducting opinion polls on Daylight Saving Time in Idaho. The proposal asks the secretary of transportation and defense to exempt Idaho from provisions of the Uniform Time Act, the national Daylight Savings Time law, but only if north Idaho is brought under Mountain Time. At the present time the northern part of the state is on Pacific Time. Crookham said the provision is necessary to "protect" north Idaho. He said otherwise the northern counties would be thrown out of cycle with both Montana and eastern Washington. The effect of Crookham's bill would be to put Idaho with the Pacific Coast states in the spring and on the same time as the Intermountain area in the fall and winter.

Trunk-Mounted 'Road Pilot' Offers New Safety To Ice-Fearing Winter Drivers

By RUDY CERKOVIC PITTSBURGH (UPI) — Ever since the motor age began, automobile drivers have been fearful of fallen skids on ice and snow-covered roads and have wished a corrective device could be developed. The Leo Myles Corp. has come up with an answer — an anti-skid stabilizer, or road pilot, that can be installed in the trunk of a vehicle. It is two feet long, six inches wide, four inches high and weighs 65 pounds. A branch of the American Courier Corp., located in West View, a Pittsburgh suburb, tested the device on a variety of icy surfaces. American Courier installed the stabilizers on 50 cars last April and it says results show greater tire mileage and reduced costs of maintaining brake linings. Safety also is an important feature. Neusch regional equipment supervisor for American Courier kept tabs on the stabilizers. "We have 27 per cent greater tire mileage and our brake lining costs have been cut 12 per cent since we installed the stabilizers," Neusch said. The topography of western Pennsylvania presents hazards to drivers. It is a hilly region with winding roads and sharp turns. "If your drivers say cars equipped with stabilizers hold to the road better on bends and turns," Neusch said, "this is particularly true on ranch type wagons which have a lot of sway. A vehicle equipped with a stabilizer passes into a straight road on an icy road — no more limiting police to just the retirement program the city adopts. Crapo said permitting officers to join one or the other would make the home-developed program actually unsound."

American Courier uses many types of vehicles for its deliveries which include transfer of checks to more than 8,000 banks in the United States and Canada. "It takes anywhere up to a half-hour to install the stabilizer — depending on the type of vehicle used," Neusch said. "Our fleet includes station wagons and the larger type vans." Charles George, president of the Myles firm, developed and patented the stabilizer. "The market for road pilot is vast," George said. "With the increased interest in large transportation companies and the general public in safety — and the national concern over the alarming rise in vehicular accidents — the road pilot becomes a significant, clearly effective safety aid. Our test results should be most interesting to operators of other large automobile and truck fleets."

British Act In Defense Of Cooking

LONDON (UPI) — One of Europe's favorite games is knocking British food but the British Travel Association has decided to fight back. It says the proof of the pudding, so to speak, is how many people come to eat it and last year set a record for tourists. "What our industry needs is a defense of the local cuisine was an attack not, this time, from a foreign source, but from within. A new restaurant guide claimed that more than a dozen British cities do not have a single noteworthy restaurant. The book is the "1970 Guide to U.K. Hotels and Eating Places," assembled by Egon Ronay and a corps of investigators. "Skill is almost nonexistent. Foreign waiters are ignorant, undisciplined and ignorant of simple courtesies, partly because of their scant knowledge of English," Ronay reported. He said he could not grant a single star to any restaurant in Brighton, Southampton, Nottingham and Birmingham, among others. In some of these places, he alleged, breakfast coffee was a form of dish water. Ronay said there were, however, many good restaurants and a large number making valiant efforts to improve themselves. "We had 25 per cent more tourists last year than the year before and we expect to top 5 million tourists this year," Richards said. "The product can't be that bad for many of them are people who keep coming back. In addition we have very few complaints. People who do a lot of traveling abroad have a high regard for it." He said tastes in food and comfort were individual and what might not appeal to Ronay might well appeal to others. "You can't really tell what restaurant and hotel will or will not suit other people. It all depends on taste and money," he said.

'Railpax' Plan To Save U.S. Railroads Deemed Unlikely

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The White House said Monday that a Comsat-like corporation was only one of several alternatives under administration consideration to save the nation's fast-sliding rail passenger service. Press secretary Ronald L. Ziegler did not outline the other proposals but he said the so-called Railpax plan, which would set up a semi-public corporation to take over rail service was "the least likely." "No final decision has been made," Ziegler said.

GM Reported Discouraging Car Repairs

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A Senate subcommittee reported today that General Motors last month ordered its Chevrolet dealers not to fix warranty-covered defects, except those involving safety, unless the customer spotted them and requested repairs. A GM spokesman in Washington said that was not the intent of a letter to dealers from Chevrolet's general sales manager cited by the subcommittee, and that a clarifying letter was circulated Jan. 16. The first GM letter was made public by Sen. Philip A. Hart, D-Mich., at a hearing by the Senate Commerce Committee's consumer subcommittee on a bill to improve federal regulation of guarantees and warranties. He said a Chevrolet dealer called it to his attention. Subcommittees Chairman Frank E. Moss, D-Utah, commented: "I shudder to think what the result would have been if one dealer had not called it to the attention of a committee of Congress."

2 Burglaries In County Probed

Officers said entry was made by kicking in rear door of the warehouse. The office area of the firm was rifled, officers said.

Credit Women Hear Talk On Screening

BURLEY — Mrs. Fonda Critchfield presented the educational lesson during the luncheon meeting of Credit Women International. Topic of the lesson was "Accepting and Declining Credit Applications."

Mrs. Critchfield reported that while a person is filling out an information sheet it is often possible to rate his credit standing, since those who are willing to give the requested information are usually better credit risks. If a person hesitates to give out the information, the credit manager should check to find out why.

After an account is accepted, the applicant should be fully informed as to company policies regarding repayment, the reason why they were accepted, and the credit limit which is to be placed on the account. Both the husband and wife should be informed when a new account is accepted and the terms of the purchase.

When an account is rejected, the applicant is due an explanation as to why credit is refused, and if he wants specific information he should be referred to the Credit Bureau. The name of the company which has given a bad credit rating should never be disclosed, stated Mrs. Critchfield.

A person dealing in credit should always be courteous and polite, and should explain that while credit sales are rejected, the customers is always welcome to make cash purchases.

Not too long ago it was good sport to walk the ditch banks and collect beer bottles. They brought a penny each and many a youngster financed a Saturday movie with his earnings.

Today, boys and girls make ice cream money by selling soft drink bottles. Now the Adolph Coors Co. is opening the door to area tycoons by offering to buy, at 10 cents a pound, aluminum soft-drink beer containers.

It's a better combat the problem of litter and yet collect a much-needed product. Western Beverage Corp. of Twin Falls, managed by Tommy Walker, will buy these containers each Thursday from 1 to 3 p.m. for containers that can be crushed—they can be crushed easily by stomping on them—and packaged.

letter dated last Dec. 5, written to the Detroit headquarters of the Detroit headquarters letterhead of GM's Chevrolet Motor Division, and addressed to All Chevrolet Dealers. It was signed by Robert D. Lund, Chevrolet's general sales manager.

The two-page letter complained of "an alarming increase in warranty costs" and urged dealers to help GM reduce them. Of six directives to dealers, Lund's first was: "Unless a safety defect is discovered, no warranty work is to be performed unless requested by the customer and approved."

Hart got Lund's letter from a Chevrolet dealer, who said he was "writing anonymously for fear of reprisals."

GM issued a statement saying it "was certainly not the intent of the letter" to keep dealers from performing necessary repairs not requested by a customer.

A GM spokesman called attention to another portion of Lund's letter in which he told dealers, "We are asking, however, to make certain that any warranty expense is being used for its intended purpose, which is to benefit the customer by correcting items caused by a defect in material or workmanship."

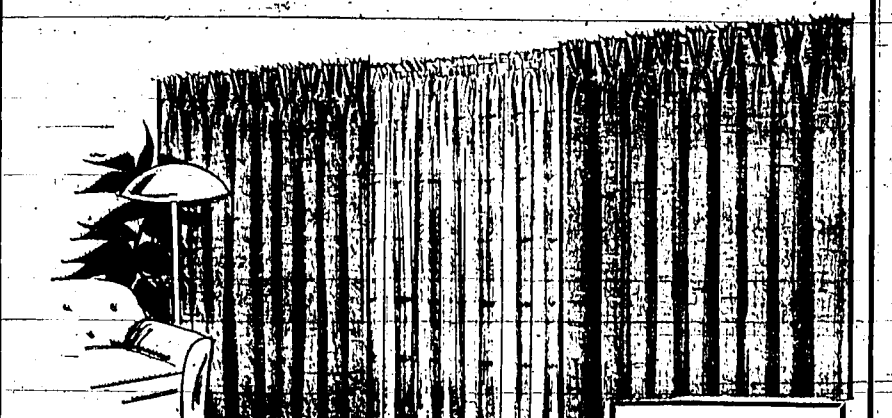

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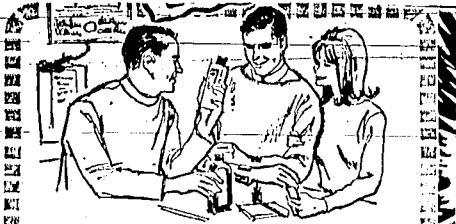

Other improvements included the remodeling of the basement for a facility of a public library and the modernization of the office equipment with the purchase of new adding, addressing and copy machines. A new system of bookkeeping also was initiated.

The city is in good financial condition although it is a net debtor.

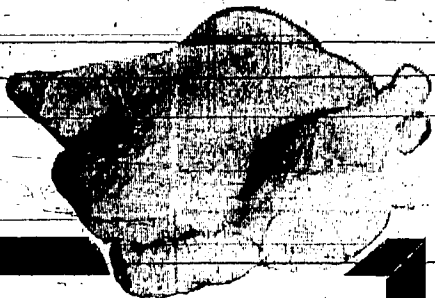

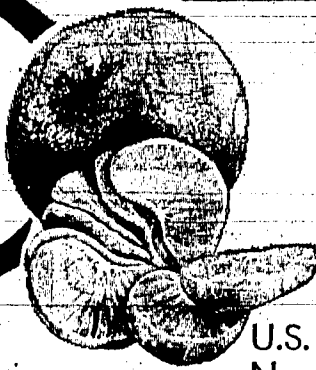

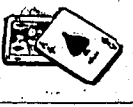

MAKE FULL USE OF YOUR TRUMPS

Today's hand is a cliché for five hearts provided declarer remembers to ruff a diamond in dummy. Let's look at George Gooden's teaching technique. The South hand should be opened one heart. It has 17 high-card points but you should never open no-trump with a singleton. For suit purposes it is worth 10 points because of the two distributional points for a singleton. It is a good hand but too weak to open with two. You open one heart because with two biddable suits of unequal length you should open the longer one.

diamond trick and three or four club tricks depending on whether or not the club suit will break 3-2. Can he get an extra trick in the trump suit? He can ruff some spades in his own hand but this isn't going to give him any extra tricks since he will be ruffing with a normal trump trick. On the other hand, if he can ruff some cards in dummy he will be collecting a sixth trump trick and he can ruff a diamond there provided he does not pull trumps.

Hence South wins the first heart in dummy; plays ace and ruffs his last diamond in dummy the next time he gains the lead.

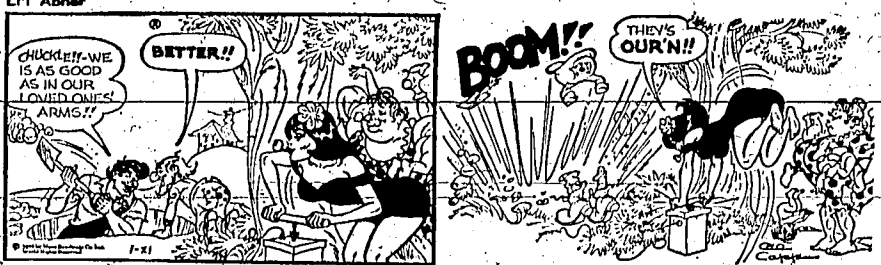

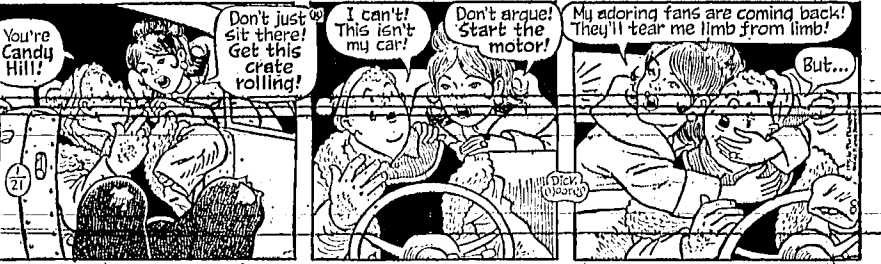

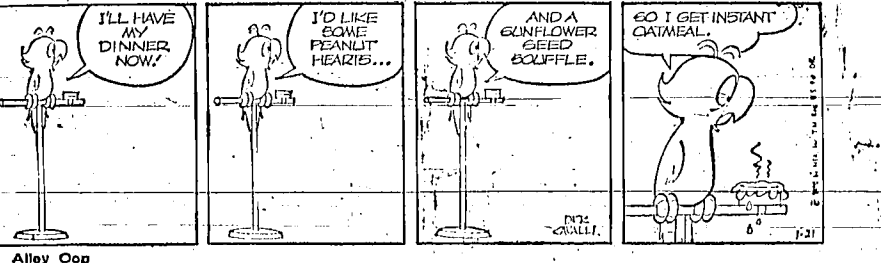

Physical Education Helps Youth Overcome Handicaps

Physical education takes on a special meaning at the Twin Falls special education school. For the past year and a half the local school has had a physical education instructor who is trained to teach retarded children. Mrs. Julie (Roberts) Rice received her education at Idaho State University, Pocatello, where she majored in physical education and took special education courses her senior year. She also taught at a special education school in Pocatello.

Mrs. Nottie-Ratcliffa, principal at the school, said physical education is deemed so important for these children that the afternoon of Monday, Wednesday and Friday are spent entirely for this purpose.

Mrs. Rice says the classes are a sort of morale booster for these children, since they are able to accomplish skills here in a short time. She said they take care in not presenting the children with extremely difficult exercises, but give them tasks which they can master.

She said she feels the classes also help the students with their academic work. Mrs. Rice points out the students get rid of their frustrations, take showers and go back to their rooms refreshed after the athletic activities. She said the students probably have more school frustrations than the average student and being able to actually accomplish something and be praised for it in class does a great deal for them.

The students share Mrs. Rice's enthusiasm for the P.E. classes. As she points out, these children have more of a desire to please the teacher and do well in their classes and therefore are easier to instruct and discipline. They all seem anxious for their class to begin and do their part.

Presently, they have been working on the trampoline, balance beam and cross bars. Many of them have accomplished skills which would put high school athletes to shame, Mrs. Rice said. She also instructs them in tumbling, bas-

ketball, softball, volleyball, touch football and the regular exercises.

Mrs. Rice says that although these students may be slow learners, there is no reason why they cannot develop their physical skills and be able to enjoy and excel in sports.

She looks upon athletic endeavors as individual competition where the student is in competition only with himself, whereas in the academic classes he is competing with the other students.

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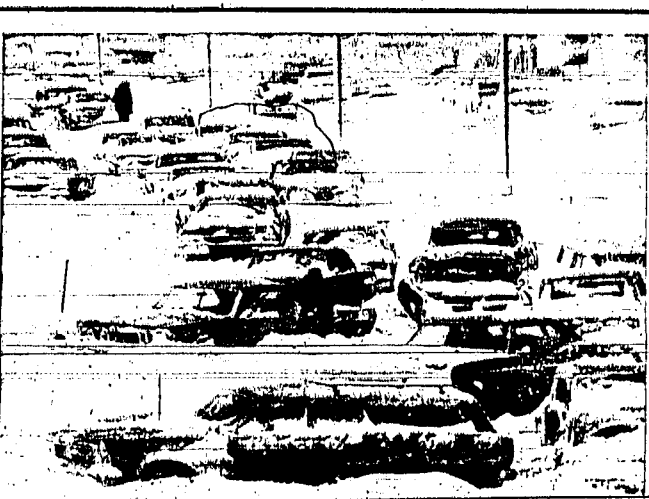
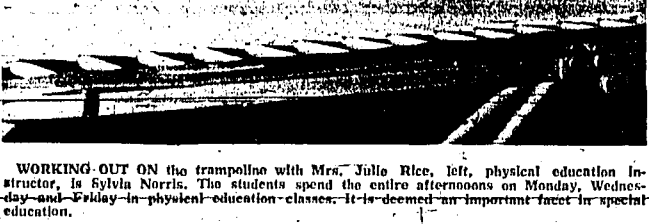
