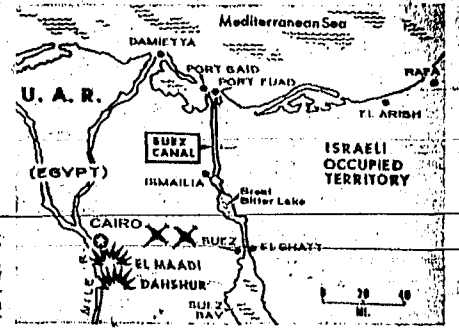

### Jury Hearing Traffic Death Damage Suit

BURLEY — Witnesses were testifying Wednesday in district court in a \$50,000 damage suit being brought by the father of an 8-year-old girl killed in a traffic accident here three weeks ago against two youthful drivers. The suit, brought by Ralph Crane against Mark Banner, 15, and Brock Loveland, 20, over the death of Connie Crane, is being heard in district court here before District Judge Theodore Ward, Twin Falls.

### Plane Crash Kills Nine In Lake Erie

CLEVELAND (UPI) — A Tag Airlines plane bound from Cleveland to Detroit crashed in Lake Erie 20 miles northwest of here today with nine persons aboard. The Coast Guard said the plane apparently was on a low approach when it crashed. A spokesman for the Coast Guard said communication with the plane was lost shortly after it left Burke lakefront airport here for Detroit.

The child, Christine Davidson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Davidson, was reportedly accidentally shot about 2:30 p.m. Tuesday as she walked into the path of a gun being aimed by her uncle, Dale Hardy, 19. Officers said Mr. Hardy was aiming the gun at the front porch of the Davidson home when the child walked onto the porch and the gun accidentally discharged.

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### Gooding Rancher Is One Of Five Area Men To Be Honored At Livestock Hall Of Fame

GOODING — Five Magic Valley men soon will be honored for their contribution to the livestock industry by being admitted to the Magic Valley Livestock Hall of Fame. One of these five livestockmen is Clarence (Bud) Wells, Gooding, Mr. Wells, or Bud, as he is known, started in the livestock venture with a registered herd of Duroc hogs. His interest then expanded to Holstein cattle. His registered herd of Holstein cattle is the highest in the state of Idaho for three years consecutively. He operated a dairy for 10 years.

### Delay Anticipated In Carswell Vote

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Prospects for quick committee approval of G. Harold Carswell today when opponents of his nomination to the Supreme Court apparently won a delay in the confirmation hearings. Carswell was recalled by the Senate Judiciary Committee for a second round of questioning today. He got permission to present papers about a brief membership he took out in a segregated country club in his hometown, Tallahassee, Fla., in 1956. He resigned from the club a few months later, receiving \$75 of a \$100 fee paid.

### Wholesale Prices Jump In January

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Wholesale prices jumped 0.7 per cent in January, led by a 2 per cent increase in the price of processed foods and feeds, the government said today. The January advance was the largest monthly increase in the wholesale price index since 0.8 per cent rise in May, 1969. Industrial commodities advanced only 0.3 per cent, but farm products and processed foods and feeds rose overall at 1.4 per cent rate in the month. Manufactured goods increased 0.7 per cent.

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### Capital Hears Gunfire

By United Press International — Israeli planes bombed military targets within six miles of the heart of Cairo today in their heaviest raid since the 1967 war. Egyptian anti-aircraft batteries in Cairo went into action for the first time since the war but no Egyptian planes rose to challenge the Israelis. Other Israeli planes struck Jordanian outposts in the southern part of the Golan Heights, five miles north of the Jordanian-Israeli cease-fire line. Their mission was to silence artillery batteries that had fired on Israeli troops for three hours.

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### Tax Exemption Is Sought On Foods

BOISE (UPI) — Bills were introduced in the Idaho Senate today that would exempt all food items, except in restaurants, from the state sales tax, and to lighten the state's derelict mining laws under the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act. The sales tax exemption measure was tossed into the hopper by veteran Sen. Art Murphy, D-Mullan, who said, "It's a fair bill and one badly needed by the people of the state."

### U.S. Pays \$1 Million Monthly To Vietnamese In Taxation

By MICHAEL L. POSNER — The Defense Department and other agencies to South Vietnamese landlords who included their taxes in the United States is paying \$1 million a month taxes to the U.S. government auditors.

The General Accounting Office (GAO) said in a report it is "inappropriate" for the government to spend "billions of dollars annually" for defense of Vietnam and elsewhere, and then pay foreign taxes. In a sample audit covering 24 months, the GAO found \$23 million in property taxes was figured.

The Vietnam review, the auditors said during this 24-month period, defense agencies paid \$55.6 million in rent, license, and income taxes included in the rent ranged up to 82 per cent of the total taxes. The indirect tax was between \$28 million and \$34 million, the auditors said.



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### Two Men Play Cards To Survive 15-Day Ordeal In Wilds

By ROBERT P. LAURENCE JACKSON, CALIF. (UPI)—Robert Starr, 17, hadn't eaten in two weeks. His only drinking water had been sucked from fresh-fallen snow and captured in bags tied to trees.

Starr's first words after his rescue Monday were an offer to pay hospital attendants \$50 for a chocolate milk shake and a barbecued beef sandwich. He got neither.

Starr and Gene Ebbell, 33, were found near the wreckage of their small plane which crashed 15 days ago in the

Sierra Nevada "Mother Lode" gold country. They were in fair condition today, suffering from malnutrition, frostbite and exposure. Their companion died in the plane he piloted.

"We had no food whatsoever—nothing," said Ebbell, a Fresno insurance salesman and physical fitness buff.

"We drank snow and collected water by tying bags to trees and letting the water run down. We heard aircraft all the time, but they couldn't see us. I just laid still and tried to keep warm."

"We talked about food, we talked about different things, we played cards," Starr, also of Fresno, was spotted first Monday by a rescue helicopter pilot.

The pilot, George Wurzburg of Reno, Nev., decided to fly over the densely forested, rugged area because somebody had seen a wisp of smoke in the snow-blanketed region the evening before. Wurzburg figured the crash victims may have been trying to start a signal fire.

They weren't, however, and the origin of the smoke remains a mystery.

"I saw this young boy leaning against a dead tree waving his arms," the helicopter pilot recalled. "I landed and he did everything but kiss me right on the lips."

The crash victim was identified as Donald Shaver, 35, of Fresno.

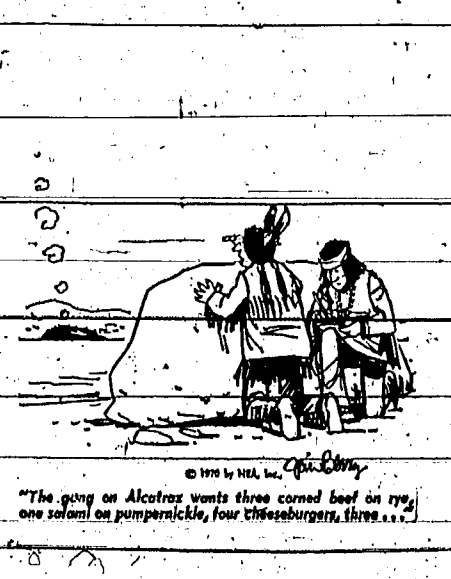

## Survey Conducted Through out Idaho Shows 3 Of 5 Favor Increasing State Police Force To Reduce Traffic Deaths

A poll conducted throughout Idaho last week and released to the Times-News today reveals that three out of five Idahoans interviewed feel additional state police officers would help reduce the state's traffic death toll. A total of 126 male and 184 female drivers in Lewiston, Blackfoot, Twin Falls, Idaho Falls, Coeur d'Alene and Boise were interviewed. The poll was conducted by J and A Research Inc. of Boise. It was held to learn how many Idahoans have had drivers training or education; what people feel is the reason for the death toll; and what people think is the most important measure for improving traffic safety in Idaho. Of those interviewed, 36 per cent had drivers training and the remainder did not. Of those who had drivers training, 62 per cent got it in high school, 15 per cent from a parent, six per cent from a friend, and 17 per cent from other sources or schools. In listing the reasons for the traffic death toll in Idaho, those interviewed answered in order of importance, poor roads, inconsiderate drivers, speed, licenses too easy to get, and drunken driving. Sixty-one per cent of those interviewed said they feel more state police officers would reduce the traffic death toll. Thirty-nine per cent feel increasing the manpower would not help. People stipulated the state police officers should be better trained and qualified. They listed, in order of importance, ways to improve traffic safety in Idaho. The reasons are better highways, improved visibility of highways and street signs, better law enforcement, and improved driver education. The survey was conducted as one to three years, nine per cent; four to six years, seven per cent; seven to 10 years, 10 per cent; 10-15 years, 19 per cent, and 15-20 years, 55 per cent. ### Buhl Named Defendant In Lawsuit

The plaintiffs charge the pool was not closed when the weather was not "proper and safe" and also charge there were no guard rails on the diving board. The plaintiffs said a claim was presented to the city on Sept. 24, 1969, and it was not allowed.

In addition to damages, the plaintiffs asked medical expenses.

### Savings Bond Totals Are Announced

U. S. Savings Bond sales in Idaho for 1969 totaled \$7,108,011, according to James S. Kinney, volunteer district chairman. Locally, sales in the district were \$70,738 for the month of December with a total of \$310,770 for the 12-month period of 1969.

The national sales of E and H bonds, and Freedom Shares were \$377 million, a 1969 peak for any December. Interest earned and added to the value of outstanding E bonds and Freedom Shares was \$171 million.

The cash value of E and H Savings Bonds outstanding as of Dec. 31, was \$21.5 billion, which represents almost 24 per cent of the privately held portion of the public debt. Tens of millions of Americans now own U.S. Savings Bonds.

In District 5, Blaine County's December sales were \$3,878 and total 1969 sales \$41,765 which was 97 per cent of its quota. There were \$1,093 in bonds sold in Camas County and total sales were \$21,182 for 96.3 per cent of its quota. In Cassia County there were \$5,371 sold in bonds for \$90,775 for the year. They attained 108.3 per cent of their quota.

In Gooding County the bond sale for December was \$3,401 and the 1969 total was \$47,570 for 105.7 per cent of the quota. There were \$3,411 sold in bonds in Jerome County and \$60,044 for the year for 87 per cent of the quota. In Lincoln County \$536 worth of bonds were sold in December and \$27,165 for 1969 for 118.1 per cent of the quota. Mindok County's bond sales amounted to \$11,380 in December and \$158,938 for the year and 127.2 per cent of the quota. Twin Falls County sold \$41,578 worth of bonds in December and \$300,302 for the year for 89.4 per cent of its quota.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Senate voted overwhelmingly Tuesday to let narcotics agents barge in on suspected drug "pushers" without warning so they could seize illegal drugs.

The "no knock" provision, approved 70 to 15, would require the officer to first get a special warrant. A judge could grant it only if convinced the narcotics otherwise "will be easily and quickly destroyed or disposed of" while the agent knocked at the door and identified himself.

Sen. Thomas J. Dodd, D-Conn., said pushers usually keep their narcotics near a sink or toilet and flush them down when the agent knocks.

NEW YORK (UPI) — New York City Patrick Dolan, who caused a furor by wearing an American flag button on his uniform lapel, has received a letter from President Nixon congratulating him on his "firm stand to honor our flag."

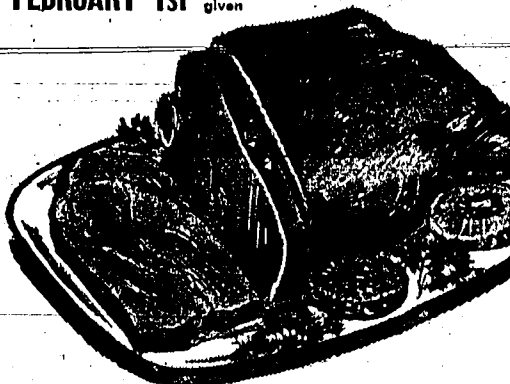

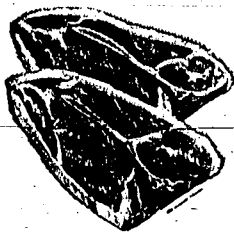

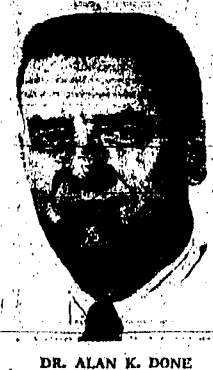

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—A group of Soviet journalists was picketed Monday night by about 85 persons protesting Russian treatment of Jews.

The protesters briefly padlocked the door to the San Francisco Press Club where the Soviets attended a dinner.

A pamphlet headlined "3 million Jews need your help" was handed out by the mostly young demonstrators. It was signed by the Bay Area Council of Soviet Jewry.

Three members of the Russian delegation met with the picketers and told them there was no discrimination against Jews in Russia.

The pamphlet said Jews do not have their own language classes, radio stations and schools as do other "nationalities" recognized by the Soviet government.

Earlier Monday, the Soviets met in Sacramento with Gov. Ronald Reagan.

Reagan told them America's only reason for fighting in South Vietnam is to guarantee that country's right to "determine its own destiny."

"America is dedicated to the idea that each country should determine its own political

## Solon Resigns From Legion In Policy Protest

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Sen. Stephen M. Young, D-Ohio, resigned from the American Legion Monday because he said one post has started raising funds to defend Lt. William L. Calley Jr., on charges he murdered civilians at My Lai.

In a letter to National Commander Milton Patrick, Young said "when an American Legion post such as Post 137 proceeds to make a general solicitation for a \$200,000 fund to pay attorneys for Lt. William L. Calley Jr. in reference to the court martial charges against him, I want out."

The post from which Young resigned was in Cleveland and Young was a charter member of it.

"I disassociate myself entirely from fellows like those who are defending a little rascal who had failed in civilian life but was 'gung ho' in the military," Young said. "I am convinced he is guilty of cold-blooded murder."

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# Scribe Offers Guidelines To 'Redistribute' Pollution

WASHINGTON (UPI)—If a good, mild dose of old-fashioned humility is what the doctor ordered, I refer you to a news release emanating today from Rep. D.E. "Bud" Lukens, a second-term legislator from Ohio.

The subject is the anti-pollution program put forth by President Nixon in his recent State of the Union message. And the opening line of Lukens' comment begins as follows: "I am happy that the President followed my guidelines of..."

Believing as I do that modesty bids me speak, I simply must also myself by pointing out that actually those were my guidelines the President was following. Where Lukens ever got the notion that they were his guidelines is something I cannot fathom.

The record will show that as far back as the 90th Congress I pinpointed the pollution problem as being mainly a result of maldistribution.

I noted that about 90 per cent of the pollution, give or take a few whiffs of carbon monoxide, was concentrated in the urban centers. Which left many areas of the nation, the Mojave Desert for instance, with hardly any pollution worth mentioning.

Therefore, I called for measures to bring about a more equitable distribution of our annual pollution production. And I am happy that the President followed my guidelines.

—Maybe not in so many words. But he did endorse the principle I expounded.

During the past 30 years, he said, shifts in population have resulted in "vast areas of rural America emptying out of people."

"We must create a new rural environment that will not only stem the migration to urban centers but reverse it," he said.

The way I read this, Nixon was advocating a back-to-the-boonocks movement.

Well, pollution is man-made and each person who moves back to the boonocks will be taking part of the city's pollution with him. Therefore, Nixon, in effect, was calling for a redistribution of pollution.

The question that now arises is: How does he persuade city dwellers to repopulate the hinterlands? Perhaps Lukens can provide some more guidelines.

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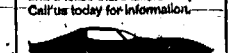

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

The 'Unlucky Expert' looked even more hapless than usual, so we didn't even try to evade him. Let's listen to his tale of woe.

"It was the last rubber and I was actually a trifle ahead. We were both vulnerable and I actually picked up an opening bid. Unfortunately, I was in the fourth seat and all I could do was listen while my opponents contracted for game. My partner led the five of clubs and I topped dummy's king with my ace. I led back the four of trumps."

"So far, so good," was our comment. "What happened next?"

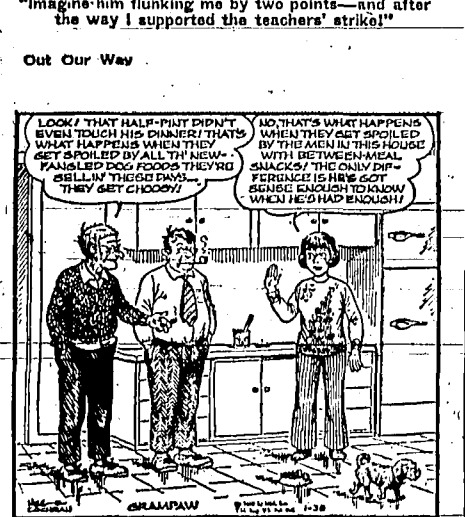
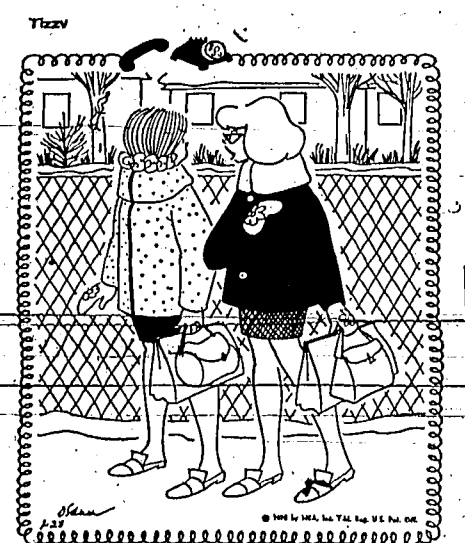
"South held the trick with the 10 and led the 10 of clubs. I won

with the queen and played the ace and nine of trumps. South won, led the king of diamonds, a diamond to the ace and a third diamond, which he ruffed. Now he led the six of spades. My partner played low and, after considerable thought, South played dummy's 10. Then he ruffed another diamond with his last trump, cashed one high spade and made the last two tricks with dummy's ace of spades and a fifth diamond.

"Imagine my partner not having the brains to go up with the jack of spades and block out that extra entry to dummy!"

We can imagine it, all right, and wonder if many people looking at the North and West hands only would have been able to visualize the exact situation and put up that jack of spades. Of course, our friend was unlucky. South's play of the 10 of spades from dummy is a standard play but one that is seldom made. He would have looked so silly if East had produced the spado jack and set him two tricks.



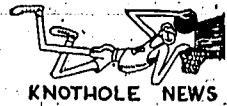

# City Council Of Detroit Suburb Passes Legislation To Involve Parents For Criminal Acts Of Their Children

MADISON HEIGHTS, Mich. (UPI)—The City Council of this middle-class Detroit suburb has passed legislation under which parents may be jailed or fined for the criminal acts of their children.

The council Monday night enacted an ordinance providing that parents of a youngster who commits two or more criminal acts within a 12-month period are subject to a jail sentence of

up to 90 days and or a \$500 fine. The ordinance, which takes effect Feb. 9, specifies that it shall be "unlawful for the parents or other such adult with whom the juvenile may be found residing to fail to exercise parental control which results in the minor committing any criminal act." A juvenile is defined as a child under the age

of 17.

Gornals, a lawyer, said the ordinance is unique in Michigan and perhaps in the nation. He won't know if it will stand up to a court test until a parent is brought into court.

"We don't have a major crime situation here with juveniles," he said. "But we feel it's time to define a parent's responsibility to his children."
