Survey In South Hills Shows Snow Pack Above Average, Water Outlook Optimistic

The water supply outlook picture continues to be bright for Salmon Tract area farmers, as the Feb. 1 snow survey report shows the snow depth in most areas in the south hills above normal.

Glenn Nelson, chairman of the Twin Falls Soil Conservation District supervisors, said the Pole Creek measurements were made by snowmobs. Members of this survey crew were Lyle (Fritz) Fuller, Marvin Taylor, Tom Kunkel, Jim Laning and Harry Rayl, Soil Conservation District representatives, and Ron Dickmore, range technician for the Humboldt National Forest.

Magic Mountain — 37 inches of snow with 17.1 inches of water as compared to 43.6 inches of snow last year and 12.3 inches of water. The 23-year average here is 11.7 inches of water content of the snowpack.
Hummingsbird Springs — 53 inches of snow and 17 inches of water as compared to 84 inches of snow and 23 inches of water last year. The 15-year average here is 12.3 inches of water.
Pole Creek — There is 60.1 inches of snow and 16.7 inches of water here this year as compared to 48.7 inches of snow and 13.8 inches of water a year ago. The 15-year average here is 10.8 inches of water.
Goat Creek — 46 inches of snow and 13.5 inches of water

as compared to 39 inches of snow and 10.3 inches of water last year. The 15-year water content average is 8.7 inches.
Bear Creek Meadows — 48 inches of snow and 15.2 inches of water as compared to 68 inches of snow and 10.4 inches of water a year ago. The 15-year water content average is 11.7 inches.
Cedar Creek — The snow here measures 27 inches with 8 inches of water, as compared to 35 inches of snow and 10.4 inches of water a year ago. The 15-year average is 11 inches of water.
76 Creek — The snowpack on this course measures 37 inches of snow and 11.9 inches of water. This course was not measured last year.
Red Point — 25 inches of snow and 8 inches of water as compared to 17 inches of snow and 8 inches of water a year ago. The nine-year water content average is 5.6 inches.
Wilson Creek — 28 inches of snow and 9 inches of water as compared to 42 inches of snow and 12.4 inches of water a year ago. The nine-year average here is 7.8 inches of water.

Church's name, he said, has been linked to the proposed legislation by Paul Narkin, who Church said claims to be an international attorney with residences in Idaho, Honolulu and New York.

Church said Narkin has stated in at least two interviews with newsmen in the Pacific Northwest that Church is working with him in drafting legislation. This, Church emphasized, is not true.

Church said at the same time he urged directly to Narkin on the matter, asking him to "please refrain from using my name in connection with any proposals to compensate the survivors of the alleged massacre at My Lai," since these letters were written Jan. 19, Narkin has continued to state that Church was working with him on the legislation.

Vote Reform To Be Offered In Sections

BOISE (UPI) — The controversial non-controversial portions of a proposed reform bill will be introduced separately in this legislative session, a legislative subcommittee on election laws decided Wednesday.

Sections dealing with party organization, regarded as the most controversial portions of the reform package, were removed from a bill that is being prepared for introduction soon.

The remaining portion is a so-called "Technical Amendments" bill which the subcommittee feels is necessary to streamline the existing election code.

Together, the two portions are the same as the 65-page package introduced and printed in the 1969 legislature, which were not considered in floor debate.

Former State Sen. James Donnarri, D-Weiser, testified the removed sections of the bill will allow his party to comply with a mandate of the 1968 Democratic National Convention that required elimination of automatic delegates to state and national conventions.

The subcommittee is made up of members of the House State Affairs Committee and several state senators concerned with election law change.

The portions are scheduled to be introduced by the House committee. Rep. Harold Snow, R-Moscow, subcommittee chairman, explained to representatives of both major political parties present in the session proposed in the 1970 change will not take effect until 1971.

Pay Raises For Employes Draw Fire

BOISE (UPI) — The Legislative Council's Budget and Fiscal Committee told the House and Senate Wednesday its directive to the State Personnel Commission was "disregarded" and that salary increases were granted for certain state employees.

The committee co-chairmen Sen. Richard High, R-Twin Falls, and Rep. Jenkin Palmer, R-Malden, said that salary increases had been granted to nearly 5,000 employees and that 3,150 are still awaiting wage adjustments.

A letter was read that they had written to the former director of the Personnel Commission, William H. Peterson, asking that "overall salary levels should not be increased during this recession."

Mining Aide Defends Plan For 'Clouds'

BOISE (UPI) — A mining engineer for American Smelting & Refining Co. Tuesday defended his company's plans for a molybdenum mine in the White Clouds area.

Sam Fall, Salt Lake City, told the Boise Federal Business Administration that molybdenum is classified as a strategic metal and its domestic use is expected to double in the next 15 years.

He said the nation faces the dilemma of providing metals and services to meet the needs of a rapidly growing population and also providing suitable living and recreation facilities.

Fall said ASARCO believes it can develop the White Clouds claims in full compliance with sound conservation practices, adding, "no area should be closed to exploration or mining except in case of a compelling national interest."

The molybdenum deposit lies in an area of less than 1,000 acres, he said, and this would be only a fraction of the total area of the proposed Sawtooth Recreation Area with the White Clouds included. He added ASARCO does not oppose inclusion of the White Clouds in the recreation area.

Legislative Hearing On House Bill 304 Attracts Many Seeking Repeal Of Limitation On Civic Tax Levels

BOISE (UPI) — Repeal of the limitation section of House Bill 304 was urged Wednesday at a public hearing before the state legislature as more than 100 persons were on hand for testimony.

The Legislature must decide soon which route to take as far as the section of law placing a limitation on receipts from ad valorem taxes is concerned. The limitation amounts to 4 per cent.

Most of those testifying in favor of the repeal were of the opinion that Senate Bill 1414 could take care of the matter. The bill was passed earlier in the session and sent to the House.

Hoffman Hits Judge With Verbal Abuse

CHICAGO (UPI) — Abbie Hoffman and U.S. District Court Judge Julius J. Hoffman both are Jewish Wednesday, Abbie Hoffman commented on that.

"You're a disgrace to the Jews, you runt," he screamed. "You would have done better with Hitler."

Abbie Hoffman's commentary when he landed him in jail was not the wildest thing to happen in what looked like the wildest court session in the trial of seven men charged with conspiring to incite riots at the 1968 Democratic National Convention.

Judge Hoffman ordered the bail revoked for David Dellinger, at 53 the oldest of the "Chicago Seven," when Dellinger stood up and yelled that a government witness testimony was "an absolute lie."

Defendant Jerry Rubin shouted "you Fascist" at the judge. Marshals moved in to take Dellinger, weeping, from the courtroom, and Abbie Hoffman and other defendants hugged and kissed Dellinger as he went.

Abbie Hoffman rendered his judgment of the judge as a fellow Jew, and suddenly he was in a wild struggle with marshals.

The marshals seized the public relations man for the "Chicago Seven," Robert Lamb, 36, threw him against a bench and took him into custody. Charges of contempt of court or assaulting a marshal were to be filed against him today.

He said, "The real question which we're concerned with today is to what degree is local government responsible and what should be its taxing limitation."

Adams, Coeur d'Alene, said that from a practical point of view the limitations "have not worked because in some instances they have served as an incentive for local units to increase their volume of taxation as a matter of insurance to protect the percentage margin."

Wynne, York, executive secretary of the Idaho Education Association, speaking on behalf of the IEA and the State School Superintendents both, said the organizations "favor repeal."

He said the present limitation was "unduly restrictive and does not keep up with inflation...it's unrealistic."

Three proposals were considered at the hearing and the three are the ones that the House Finance and Taxation Committee and the Senate's local government affairs committee will finally probably end up with.

The proposals to deal with 304 are: Repealing the law as far as the limitation is concerned (SB1414 passed and sent to the House).

Amending the law to exempt new construction from the tax base on which the 4 per cent increase is figured and excluding school buildings from the limitation. (Introduced in House as HB482).

And, repealing the present tax limitation law and substituting a procedure by which taxpayers could vote approval on government units wanting or substituting one by petition. (Introduced in House as HB514).

Bravold said House Bill 482 "still assumes local officials are unable to act with prudence on tax matters."

House Vetoes Standard Filing Fee For Candidates

BOISE (UPI) — The House of Representatives rejected by a vote of 22-46 Wednesday legislation which would have set a standard filing fee for those seeking municipal office.

In doing so, the members apparently heeded the advice of Rep. Patricia McDermott, D-Pocatello, who said it simply was another example of the legislature trying to tell the cities what to do.

"I don't think it's right for the legislature to get involved," Miss McDermott said. Floor sponsored by Rep. William Onweiler, R-Boise, the bill would have required a minimum filing fee of one per cent of the annual salary paid to the holder of the office the candidate is seeking. It also would put as a floor a fee of at least \$10.

Legislator Says State May Lose Medicaid Plan

BOISE (UPI) — Former State Rep. Clarence Hilger, D-Emmett, told a legislative committee Wednesday Idaho may lose its entire Medicaid program unless it licenses nursing home administrators.

Hilger, serving as attorney for a State Organization of Nursing Home Operators, told the House Health and Welfare Committee that "this is must legislation."

State law must conform to recent amendments to the Social Security Act if cooperative federal funds under Medicaid are to continue flowing into Idaho, he said.

The federal government at present supplies nearly 69 per cent of the monies spent in the program, Hilger said.

He indicated nursing home operators agree that state-level legislation is needed urgently. After his presentation, committee members agreed to hear a regional officer for the program sometime next week.

Women who stoutly maintain that a woman's place is in the home, as Jani Gardner sees it, often are seldom there in person and even more frequently absent in spirit. 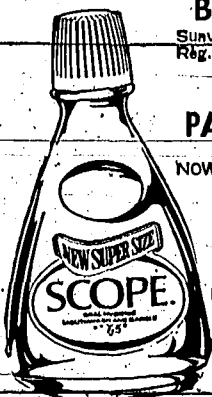

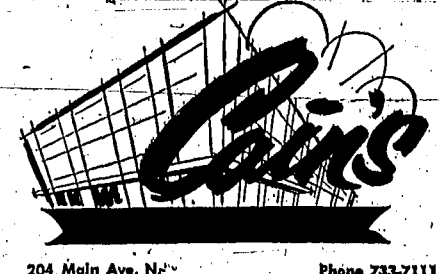

Japan Signs Arms Pact 'Reluctantly'

TOKYO (UPI)—Japan, the only nation in the world ever to be atom-bombed, signed the treaty banning the spread of nuclear weapons Tuesday, but with open reluctance.

The government made clear that final ratification of the treaty by parliament will not come in the foreseeable future. Such approval is necessary before Japan can formally bind itself to the pact.

The nuclear nonproliferation treaty limits the number of nuclear nations to the United States, Soviet Union, Britain, France and Communist China. It will prohibit other nations from manufacturing or possessing nuclear weapons.

In announcing that Japanese ambassadors in Moscow, London and Washington had been instructed to initial the treaty, the government issued a special statement expressing its reservations.

The statement said the treaty "must in no way restrict nuclear weapons states in their research, development, or implementation of the peaceful uses of nuclear energy, or in their international cooperation in these fields, nor must it subject them to discriminatory treatment in an aspect of such activities."

The statement also said Japan reserved the right to pull out of the treaty if it decides that "extraordinary events, related to the subject matter of this treaty, have jeopardized the supreme interests of the country."

News Chief Vows To Help Jury Probe

NEW YORK (UPI)—Arthur Ochs Sulzberger, president of the New York Times, said today his newspaper would cooperate with a federal grand jury that has subpoenaed a Times San Francisco correspondent to appear in a probe of Black Panther Party activities.

But the newspaper executive and other top news media officials expressed concern that this government action and others like it would infringe on the freedom of the press and ultimately work against public interest.

Sulzberger, the Columbia Broadcasting System, Time Inc. and Newsweek have issued statements expressing their concern over the subpoenas of newsmen's notes, films and other information—some of it confidential.

"All citizens, including newspapermen, have a duty to respect proper judicial processes," Sulzberger said in his statement, "but the Times intends to use all its resources to make sure that no judicial action violated the constitutional guarantees of a free press and the rights of newspapermen to carry on their work freely and without coercion."

Sulzberger's statement was in response to a subpoena served to reporter Earl Caldwell, a San Francisco correspondent for the Times, to testify in the investigation of the Panthers.

The demand was similar to those made on CBS television officials last month in connection with the Black Panther investigation and of Time, Life and Newsweek in connection with the investigation of a militant faction of the Students for a Democratic Society in Chicago.

Howard Tankersley, University of Idaho Extension Service, explained a survey to be conducted in Gooding county as a pilot project to determine public attitudes and opinions on proposals of general concern relative to the Wood River four-county area.

He pointed out that a Resources Conservation and Development plan has been submitted to the federal government and, if approved, will provide funds for carrying out a project for economic development within the area.

The basic framework has been established, but the Gooding county survey results will be valuable in determining public attitudes.

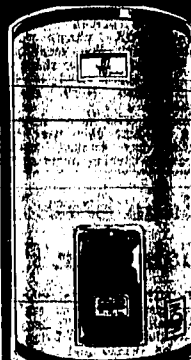

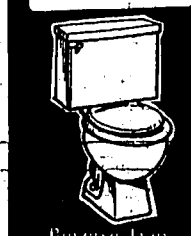

SPENDER CAUGHT, TRUMPS DOWN

With inflation getting worse and worse it is up to bridge players to find ways to economize. We suggest as a starter that they give up the luxury of drawing one too many rounds of trumps.

South was a spendthrift. He let the heart lead come around to his queen and played out his king of trumps. West took his ace and shifted to a low diamond. Dummy's queen was covered by East's king and South's ace.

Now South proceeded to play his queen of trumps and to lead another trump to dummy's jack. This last trump lead overextended his credit and led to bankruptcy in the form of one down.

He led a club to his 10. West won with the queen and led

a second diamond to be ruffed by dummy's last trump. Now there was no way for South to avoid the loss of two more tricks.

South could well afford the trump lead at trick two. In fact, this was an essential precaution to guard against the possibility of heart ruffs as the hand might develop. He could also have afforded a second trump lead at trick three in the event that West ducked the first trump but West went right up with his ace in order to attack the diamond suit.

South was well within his budget when he led a second trump after taking his ace of diamonds but at that point it was up to him to go after the club suit while he still retained two trumps in dummy.

We will leave it to you to work out all the variations from that point on. Suffice to say that all of them will restrict the defense to a maximum of three tricks.

Philippine Rebels Have 'Message'

What Philippine President Ferdinand E. Marcos may have been observing in the violent demonstrations outside Malacanang Palace may have been less a threat from an alien philosophy than an attempt to deliver a message.

Marcos himself has described his country as "sitting on top of a social volcano."

Lewis Butcher, board chairman, said replacements would be considered at a later board meeting.

Bill Assures Housing For All Citizens

BOISE (UPI) — The House Committee introduced Wednesday legislation providing for creation of county housing authorities to assure all citizens of safe and sanitary dwellings.
In a statement of purpose, the measure declares that in Idaho there exist "unsanitary or unsafe dwelling accommodations—and that persons of low income are forced to reside" in them.
Such congested, unsanitary and unsafe conditions, the bill says, foster an increase in and spread of disease and crime which constitute a menace to the health, safety and morals and welfare of the state. They also impair economic values, it says.

To cope with this problem, the bill permits county commissioners to create an independent, five-member agency in each county to be known as a housing authority.
Though not an agency of the county its membership would be named by the county commissioners.

This housing authority would have the power to prepare, carry out, acquire, lease and operate housing projects and to provide for construction, reconstruction, improvement, alteration or repair of any housing project.
It also would have the power to conduct examinations and investigations regarding housing conditions and to issue subpoenas requiring attendance of witnesses or the production of documents.

In carrying out its duties, the authority would have the power to issue bonds on its own discretion for any of its corporate purposes.
The committee also introduced bills to:

— Give counties as cities power to adopt their own definition of subdivision.
— Allow inclusion of the installation, construction or reconstruction of off-street parking facilities in urban renewal projects.
— Provide that county officials and their state associations jointly coordinate the administrative programs of the several counties of the state and to make recommendations to the legislature and governor.
— Give municipalities the power to create local improvement districts for parks and recreational areas.
— And to eliminate reference to constables from that section of the code listing county and precinct officers.

Nigeria To Release 32 Prisoners

LAGOS (UPI)—The government announced Tuesday it would release 32 foreign Roman Catholic priests and nuns who were sentenced to six months imprisonment last week for illegally entering Nigeria.

The government statement said that "as an act of clemency" it would deport the missionaries who were flown to Lagos Tuesday after three weeks confinement in Port Harcourt.
"Arrangements are in hand for their deportation from Nigeria by the first available flight to their respective countries," the statement said.
The priests arrived, unshaven and still wearing their white habits. They were met at Ikeja Airport by Archbishop John Agney of Lagos.
Armed police escorted the group to an airport hotel where they were kept under police guard. All newsmen and photographers were barred from the area.

Government sources said the group would leave Nigeria Wednesday on a still-undetermined flight.
Most of the missionaries who work on relief operations in the former secessionist territory of Biafra until it collapsed last month—are from Ireland. Six, including two nuns, are from Britain. One is from the United States.
They were not individually identified.

"This action is a further demonstration of the federal government's magnanimity towards the former secessionist regime and those involved in its activities," the statement said.
Another group of 28 Roman Catholic priests has also been transferred from the Biafra heartland to Port Harcourt. However, a government spokesman refused to confirm the priests were in Port Harcourt or whether they would face trial.

Agencies Are Told To End Pollution

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Nixon today ordered all federal installations to set a national example by moving to eliminate air and water pollution within three years.
The President issued an executive order to activate a \$359 million program under which federal facilities, including military bases, must be in compliance with state antipollution standards by the end of 1972. In states not having such standards, the administration will set its own.
During the fiscal year starting July 1, \$92 million will be available for the program.
Nixon designated Secretary Robert H. Finch of Health, Education and Welfare to administer the campaign against air pollution and Interior Secretary Walter J. Hickel to supervise water cleanup operations.
Nixon, who made improving environmental quality a focal point of his State of the Union address, said in a statement he was issuing the order "because actions speak louder than words."
He said the federal government "in the design, operation and maintenance of its facilities shall provide leadership in the nationwide effort to protect and enhance the quality of our air and water resources."
"Over the past several years, the federal government has become one of the nation's worst polluters," Nixon's statement said. "Clearly the federal government cannot be an effective leader in the battle to save the environment so long as this intolerable situation continues."
The order requires all federal facilities to determine within six months what improvements are needed, to begin antipollution programs underway by Dec. 31, 1972.
