Vincent was the first off the plane and the wind whipped at her long, blonde hair. "How does it feel to be a celebrity now?" she was asked as screaming classmates crushed around her. "Wonderful, just wonderful," she yelled above the whine of the airplane's engines. She paused to accept a bouquet of flowers from Mike Packham, chairman of the Twin Falls Jaycee Junior Miss Pageant last fall. Then she walked to the gate where her mother

and father welcomed her with open arms. The classmates remained close behind. Miss Vincent, a talented pianist, in addition to being an athlete, won the Junior Miss title in Moscow last Saturday night, with 25 prizes from throughout the state in competition. Avalanche Crushes Hostel, Kills 42

VAL D'ISERE, France (UPI) — Tons of snow rolled off 10,000-foot Dome Mountain in an avalanche today and crushed a three-story youth hostel and a hotel at breakfast time in this alpine ski resort. The impact of the onslaught crushed some cars and carried others away like rowboats on a tidal wave. Some of the victims were trapped in the parking area, unable to flee the avalanche. An estimated 200 youths, all under 25, and the French Union of Fresh Air Centers, and an equal number of skiers were believed in the Edelweiss Hotel when the wave of silent white death descended upon them.

Wendell Family Still Hopes For News Of Man Who Disappeared 18 Months Ago

WENDELL — It was un-
usually wet in the Wendell
area on Aug. 16, 1968.
Fred Miller, who had spent
most of his 66 years as a farm
laborer in the Wendell-Gooding
area quit work early. He pack-
ed his irrigation equipment, in-
cluding shovels and canvas
dundies into his Nash Rambler
and headed for Hagerman.
Mr. Miller, described as a
"real family man," was not un-
accustomed to having a few
beers after work, but usually in
Wendell or Gooding—never
in Hagerman.
On this wet blustery day,
however, Mr. Miller went to
Hagerman. Accounts of his
whereabouts for several hours
after 3 p.m. when he left work
at the Frank Graves ranch at
Wendell, are sketchy at best—
and after midnight that day—
a Friday, completely inexistent.
Mr. Miller simply disap-
peared without a trace. In
1968, still works at a rest home
in Wendell. She still pays the
premiums on several of her life
insurance policies held in
her husband's name.
Jack Clough of Statewide In-
vestigative Service, said his
firm was called into the case
late last year by members of
the family. A liberal reward
has been offered by the family
for information leading to the
whereabouts of Mr. Miller or
his car.
Since then, Statewide has
checked about 30 cars answer-
ing the description of the 1968
Nash Rambler, four-door. Mr.
Miller was driving. The firm
has received many calls, mostly
anonymous, from people inter-
ested in the reward, but thus
far, no tangible evidence has
been uncovered by the State-
wide investigators.
With the assistance of mem-
bers of the family, Mr. Clough
has learned that Mr. Miller
stopped at a bar in Hagerman
where he had had "several
drinks" by 8 p.m. He was drink-

without some part of it show-
ing up," Mr. Clough said.
"We do know the car has
not been reregistered—in Ida-
ho, at least," He said.
At the time it disappeared the
vehicle carried license 2G-1488.
The serial number of the ve-
hicle is 5158632.
Mr. Clough said besides the
30 cars he or members of his
firm have checked, countless
calls have been received about
cars matching the description
of the missing Nash. However,
none carry the 2G license plate
or the serial number.
Many of the tips have been
received in response to a class-
ified advertisement run in the
Times-News. "We get calls at
home—on Sunday— at all
hours—and each time we
thank, 'This is it.'"
Each call has been followed
up—but only to a dead end.
Gooding County Sheriff Earl
Brown, who took office after
Mr. Miller's disappearance, said
his office has followed up leads
in both Montana and Colorado,
but to no avail.
At the time he disappeared,
Mr. Miller was carrying a small
amount of cash, no credit cards
and a small check which never
has been cashed.
He is described as being 5
feet, 9 inches tall, weighing 170
pounds, with blue eyes and
light, wavy hair. Mr. Miller
also wore glasses at times.
Meanwhile, the files remain
open on the disappearance and
Mr. Miller's three daughters
and two sons, and his wife hope
for some information which will
lead to finding him. They hope
— and each time we
thank, 'This is it.'"

7-Year-Old Helps Catch Suspect

NEW YORK (UPI)— This is
the story of how three amateur
detectives — a sharp-eyed 7-
year-old, his stubborn mother,
and an automotive expert —
helped police catch a kidnaping
suspect.
The little boy was riding his
bicycle down a quiet street in
a southwestern city one day last
fall when the kidnaper pulled
him into a car and drove off.
The kidnaper left him unat-
tended for a moment about an
hour and a half later and the
child managed to escape with-
out serious injury.
Doctors said it was important
that the little boy forget the
frightening experience as soon
as possible. But the kidnaper
still was at large and police
needed the child's help in track-
ing him down.
Their only hope was to trace
the kidnaper's car.
The boy didn't know the make
but he told police it was a new
four-door car, larger than a Ves-
pa and smaller than his
mother's Mercedes 200. He de-
scribed the inside of the car,
in minute detail — the bucket
seats and black upholstery pat-
terned with small X's, the odd
look of the "hand" under the
window with a "sort of rectan-
gle with a round thing on
it," the air conditioning unit in
front of the passenger seat with
two small green plastic hoses
attached.
At the end of about two
months, police had checked
every lead and given up. But
the little boy had a suggestion.
"Mama," he said to me,
would you like me to draw you
a picture of the car?" The
mother said, "Well, we all felt
very stupid because this is what
a first grader can probably do
better than anything and my
son has always been a good
drawer."
The police took the drawings
and started all over again but
still no one could identify the
car.
Then the mother wrote a let-
ter to the president of Consum-
ers Union in New Rochelle, N.
Y., enclosing her son's drawings
and a sample of the green plas-
tic air conditioning tubing he
had recognized in an auto sup-
ply store.

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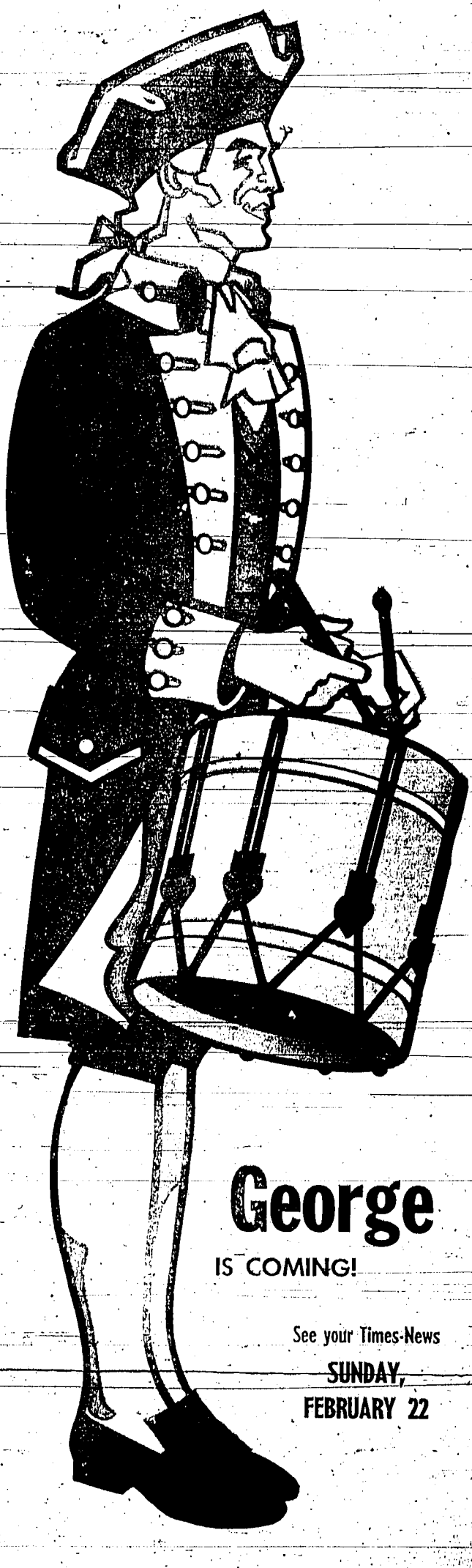

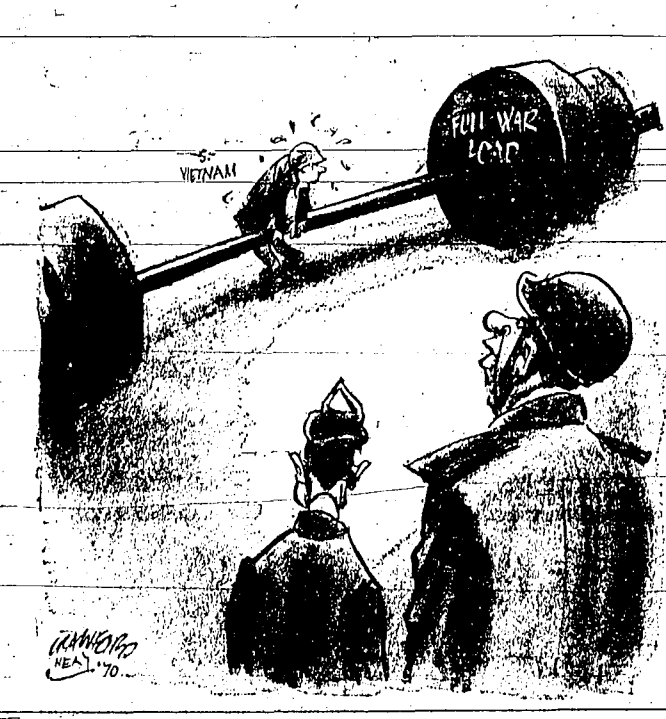

Consequently, they asked Pastore to support one modest proposal—a bill requiring television stations to sell time at a discount as low as 20 per cent of the top commercial rate to candidates for Congress, both House and Senate, during the last five weeks before an election.

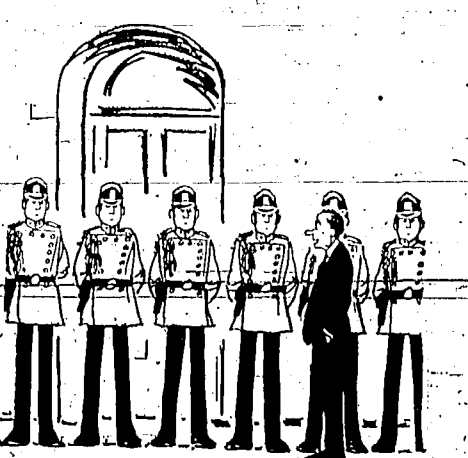

The Tonsils

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Our pediatrician suggested that our daughter, almost 8, have tonsils and adenoids removed because of frequent throat and ear infections. People who have had this operation years ago tell me they still have severe ear and throat infections. What then is the purpose of removing tonsils?

Besides this, the chronic infection can lead to recurrent episodes of tonsillitis or ear infection. It can be a tragedy not to remove diseased tonsils that are causing ear infections which can mean eventual loss of hearing.

Apollo 13 Crew Faces Long Quarantine Because Of Nature Of Next Moon Trip

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (UPI)—The long quarantine for Apollo 13's returning moon explorers is being extended to 21 days because of the nature of the lunar underground, the Space Agency's chief medical officer said Monday.

Maj. Gen. James W. Humphreys said the isolation may be kept despite a recommendation by an interagency government committee that sets isolation requirements that it be dropped.

The isolation period was imposed originally for Apollo 11 and Apollo 12 to protect earth life from possible harmful space organisms. None was

found.

Humphreys said there are scientists in and out of the space agency who feel more than two places on the moon should be checked for life before the quarantine is eliminated.

They feel this is particularly true of Apollo 13, he said, because astronauts James A. Lovell and Fred W. Haise will attempt to drill 10 feet below the lunar surface. Scientists think if life does exist in the moon's harsh environment, it would have to be underground.

"We may very well have a quarantine period for Apollo 13 just as we did for Apollo 11 and Apollo 12," Humphreys told newsmen at an international aerospace medicine symposium.

Thieves Get \$480,000 In London

LONDON (UPI)—Masked men armed with shotguns burst through the side door of a bank in north-east London Monday and made off with more than \$480,000 in cash.

Seven or eight raiders, wearing stocking masks, entered a branch of Barclay's Bank on High Road, London, and seconds after security express guards had delivered 60 sealed bags of money.

Three of the bandits wore white crash helmets, goggles and black leather jackets. Two brandished shotguns at the staff and customers, ordering them to lie down on the floor.

The rest of the gang snatched the money and ran out.

As they fled one of them squirted ammonia at three guards. Rushing from the bank they knocked down an elderly woman, who was later taken to the hospital with bruises.

One bandit fired a shotgun at a guard, but security express said it believed a blank cartridge was used.

High Elevation Airports Remain Bound In Snow

Idaho pilots who live in the lower elevations of Idaho are warned that airports above 4000 feet are still snow-covered and it will be many weeks before snow, slush, and mud disappear to make non-improved fields usable.

Chet Moulton, state aeronautics director, said most of the aircraft and pilots reside in areas where the grass gets green, and the tulips show, long before mountain areas are dry. The desire to get out and check a mountain cabin, see the country, or try for a steelhead, always leaves an airplane on its back in snow or mud. The damage or injury losses could be alleviated by proper advance preparation and flight planning.

Sheriff Paul Corder said the boys, ages 10 and 12, have admitted breaking several windows, windshields, and damaging other property at the farm home of Louis Bulcher, Route 1, Kimberly.

He said upon mutual agreement of the parties involved, the boys were released to their parents.

Nice Trip

Another Idaho air tour will fly to Mazatlan, Mexico, for the first week of March.

This will be the 16th aerial flight scheduled for Idahoans in their visits to Mexico and Central America.

Reservations have been set for 100 persons, according to Chet Moulton, state aeronautics director, whose agency sponsors these mid-winter flights as a media of navigational training as well as recreational pleasure.

The group will rendezvous at either Phoenix or Nogales on March 1, fly to Mazatlan the following day, and remain five days for relaxation, sight-seeing, and deep sea fishing. Re-entry into the U.S. is scheduled for March 7.

The bearded trumpeter, his lip swollen and his speech affected, told newsmen, "The scary thing is that this could mean the whole ball game, my career."

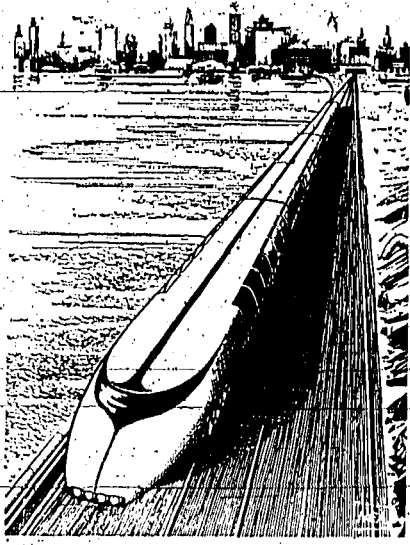



18-Year-Old To Defend Title In Annual Pancake Derby Against Kansas Housewives

OLNEY, England (UPI)—Sylvia Winstanley, the defending champion, will be at the starting line with skilled in hand again Tuesday for the 21st annual running of the Pancake Derby against the housewives of Liberal, Kan.

Miss Winstanley, 18 and single, said her goal this year is to win only to win also to improve on her 1969 winning time of one minute, 4.2 seconds. Olney leads, 11-9, in the

series that began in 1950 on a challenge from the housewives of Liberal. Winning times in each town are compared by transatlantic telephone call after the Liberal half of the race, which begins six hours after the race has been completed here.

The race in Olney is along the cobblestone main street, beginning in front of the Bull Inn and ending at the gates of St. Peter and Paul Church.

Collins said he would not be dismayed if Liberal wins the race this year, and cuts Olney's edge in the races to 11-10. The closer margin would heighten enthusiasm, he said.

"We'd have some real contests after that," Collins said.

Episcopals To Give \$30,000 To Black Unit

ANATHEM, Calif. (UPI)—The Episcopal Diocese of Los Angeles approved donating \$30,000 to a black economic development group during a weekend convention and elected three Negroes to key positions.

After a four-hour debate, the diocese voted, 412-341, to give the money to the National Committee of Black Churchmen.

Those opposing the gift, to be composed of voluntary donations, said the committee supported a group which followed the black manifesto, a statement which condemns America as a racist society of dollars in reparations.

The \$30,000 sum is part of a \$200,000 sum pledged to Negroes at a National Episcopal meeting in South Bend, Ind.

Suharto Is Called "Father" But Not Out Of Affection

Back when former Indonesian President Sukarno was riding high the people used to call him "Bung" Karno, meaning brother.

Occasionally, they call his successor, President Suharto, Pak Harto, Father Suharto, out of affection, for Suharto does not have the flamboyant leadership qualities of Sukarno, but rather out of respect.

It was Suharto, then an army general, who quickly and coolly smashed an attempted Communist coup on the night of Sept. 30, 1965, in which the leftist-leaning Sukarno played at least a passive role.

It was this role, during a night which saw the assassination of most of Indonesia's top generals, that eventually led to Sukarno's downfall. Suharto became acting president in March, 1967, and full president in March, 1968, with a term expiring in 1973.

In the hectic days just before and after Sukarno's fall Indonesian students found their political voice and became allies of the army and Suharto. They remain his allies today because Suharto retains the aura of the man who rescued the nation from the moral and economic bankruptcy of the Sukarno days. But, although stability has come to Indonesia, its inflation is down to 10 per cent per year from a peak of 800, and the government is at least toying with the idea of some form of democracy, the students feel it is not enough.

Particularly they protest continuing rampant corruption in government, and, specifically,

they demand repeal of a government order raising the price of gasoline by 50 per cent and doubling the price of kerosene, the main source of lighting and fuel in the rural areas.

And so, despite a ban on demonstrations, the students took to the streets again, with the support of Jakarta's independent newspapers.

A special target for the students and the newspapers is the top man of the state oil monopoly company, Pertamina. He is Lt. Gen. Ibnu Sutowo who is accused of building a personal empire.

South American Festival Held

RIO DE JANEIRO (UPI)—Carnival in Rio went into high gear Monday after a mammoth 12-hour march of 10 huge teams of samba-dancers, singers, and floats through the streets of the city.

Military authorities said the festival in its third day of dance, song and merriment, was one of the most orderly in years. Hospital cases, they said, were down 15 per cent from last year.

Accidents appeared to be taking their usual toll of the 2 million revelers. Nearly 5,000 persons have been hospitalized so far.

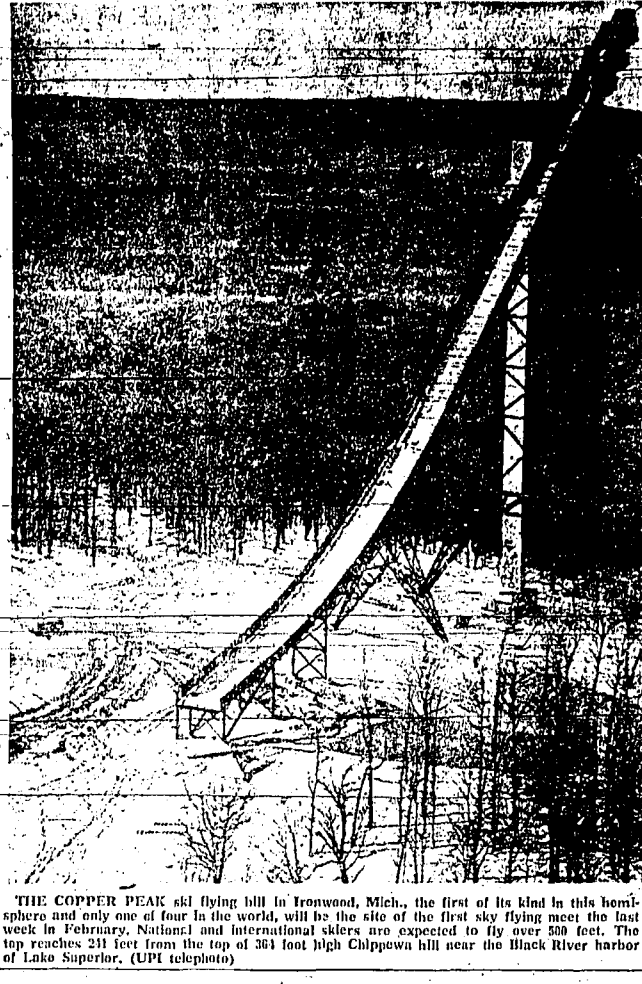

Booby-Trap Debate Rages In Iowa

 EDDYVILLE, Iowa (UPI)—In the summer of 1967, Murvin Katko was shot and seriously injured in the farm home of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Briney. Katko was hit in the ankle and one leg is 2 1/2 inches shorter than the other. He sued the Brineys and won \$30,000 in damages.
 The incident would not have made ripples beyond Eddyville if it had not been for the way in which Katko entered the Brineys' home. He broke in, allegedly to steal.
 Katko, now 30, was injured by a shotgun blast from a booby trap Edward Briney had set up. Katko first was charged with breaking and entering, a felony, but he pleaded guilty to a lesser charge of larceny in the nighttime, a misdemeanor. He was fined \$50 and released.
 Then he sued the Brineys for \$60,000.
 In November, an all-woman Mahaska County District Court jury awarded Katko \$30,000—\$20,000 in compensatory damages and \$10,000 in punitive damages.
 The word "punitive" sticks in the craw of many people in this town of 1,000—especially since the Brineys had to sell 60 acres of a 120-acre farm estate belonging to Ed Briney, 63, the wife of Ed Briney, 63. The property was sold for \$10,000 at a forced auction. On it stands the vacant farm home in which Katko was shot.
 The property was bought by a tax-exempt committee of Briney's neighbors. The committee is holding it in trust until the Iowa Supreme Court rules on the Brineys' appeal. The Brineys are able to farm the 80 acres, along with the 40 other acres and 320 acres owned by Briney and his father.
 Some say Katko—a 6-3/4, 220-pounder who works at his father's gas station—would have deserved it if he had been killed. Others say Briney went too far—indeed, was malicious—in setting up a shotgun booby trap in his home. The issue has reached the Iowa Legislature, where three bills dealing with the matter have been introduced.
 One of the measures, commonly referred to as "the Briney bill" would allow a person to use "any means necessary" to defend his life, family and property, or to go to the aid of another without being placed in legal jeopardy.
 It was sent to the floor of the Iowa House Thursday after a bitter debate over an amendment which would have eliminated the provisions for defense of property. The amendment was defeated 17-16 by the House Law Enforcement Committee.

Some House Democrats Believe McCormack Should Relinquish Speaker's Position

 WASHINGTON (UPI)—At 78, Speaker John W. McCormack is leaner and grayer, and doesn't hear quite so well as he once did.
 And though he is on the job, many of the most important parts of his job, college kids are forever turning up at his office and few, if they are willing to wait an hour or so, are denied a chat.
 But youthful members like Rep. Morris K. Udall, D-Ariz.; Richard Bolling, D-Mo.; and Jerome R. Waldie, D-Calif., say communication with students is not really the problem. They contend McCormack has "lost touch with the House."
 They are among the few who say openly, along with a larger number who talk off the record, that it is past time for McCormack to step aside in favor of some younger House leader.
 March 1, sources say, was to have been a special day in the life of Speaker McCormack. That was the date he had picked, his friends understand, to announce he would not run again for speaker next year. He was getting along in years, he would say, and had held the House Democrats who think he should turn in his gavel.
 The speaker considers keeping up communications with youth one of the most important parts of his job. McCormack called a news conference to say he was shocked to avoid his own innocence of any wrongdoing, and inevitably for a man raised in the rough and tumble of Massachusetts politics—an announcement that he would run next January for another two-year term as House speaker.
 Udall, Bolling, Waldie and others to the contrary, McCormack's men say they've already counted the votes, and have plenty to spare.

Bullfighter Is Nearly Killed

BOGOTA, Colombia (UPI)—Manuel Benitez, Spain's most popular bullfighter, was recuperating satisfactorily Sunday from severe injuries inflicted by a bull that gored him in the jaw and throat.
 Benitez, known as El Cordobes, was hurt Saturday while trying to kill the first of two bulls he was to fight in Plaza Santa Maria.
 The 33-year-old bullfighter, who has reportedly earned \$3 million in 10 years, was being treated at La Clinica de Mari. Authorities said full recovery was expected and that Benitez would be able to fight bulls again.

Celebration Set

LAREDO, Tex. (UPI)—Mexican dignitaries will join their American neighbors again this year in the 73rd annual Laredo celebration of George Washington's birthday. Mexican President Gustavo Diaz Ordaz heads the Mexican delegation for the four-day birthday party beginning Feb. 18. There will be a carnival, pageant and ball, a president's lunch and an international parade after traditional ceremony on the International Bridge between Laredo and Nuevo Laredo, Mexico.

Priests Told To Reaffirm Their Vows

VATICAN CITY (UPI)—The Vatican announced Monday it has ordered Roman Catholic priests throughout the world to make an annual, public reaffirmation of their vows of celibacy and obedience, both of which have become divisive issues within the church.
 As the order was made public by the Vatican Congregation for the Clergy, Pope Paul VI reaffirmed uncompromising support for the church's celibacy law that prohibits priests from marrying.
 Despite a worldwide shortage of priests, the Pope said, the church can recruit more and better qualified priests by maintaining the law of celibacy that has dating away with it.
 The Pope has rejected a request by Dutch bishops to permit married men to become priests. That request, plus the desire of some priests to have the right to marry if they so choose, has created controversy around the vow of celibacy.
 The Vatican order from priests to reaffirm publicly their vows was contained in a letter sent to bishops throughout the world last Nov. 4. The letter was issued by Cardinal John J. Wright, former Pittsburgh bishop who now heads the Congregation for the Clergy, and was announced publicly Monday.

BROOKS NEW YORK (UPI)—If you've been house hunting recently, you've probably found out the hard way that there's more to finding a home these days than picking the house that fits your tastes and your budget. Many middle income families have been priced right out of the market as the cost of new and existing houses has climbed steadily. The average new house's price is close to \$30,000 and in some big-city suburban areas it may be pretty difficult to find a house even at the price. In the past year of tight money, housing starts have been cut drastically. Fewer and fewer single family houses are being built. This is driving up the prices on existing houses often to an unrealistic level for the value offered. Even if you do find a house in your price range, there's the obstacle of financing. Mortgage money is not easy to come by—and expensive when you do find it; as high as 10 per cent in some areas of the country. Even where federal or state law limits the interest rate, the "charge" of "points"—a percentage of the loan for various services—has raised the effective rate. And, more often than not these days, substantial down payment is a must, plus good-sized sums for various closing costs. This is particularly hard on young families who have had little opportunity to build up cash reserves or equity in a house. As the government has willed a full-scale effort to combat inflation, interest rates generally have risen to the highest level in modern times. 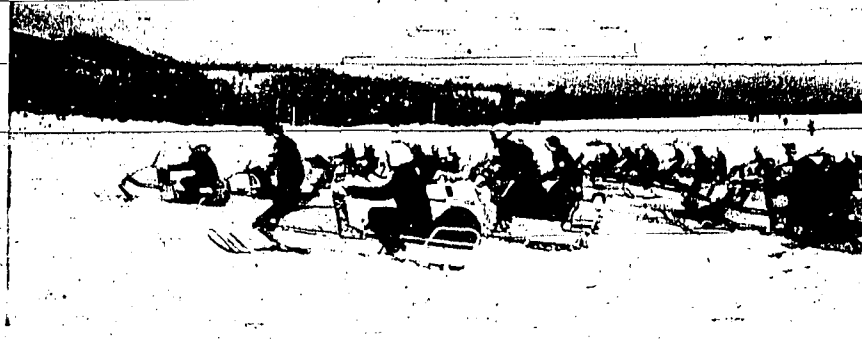
NEARING THE FINISH line in Stanley after racing over 100 miles crosscountry are two members of the Idaho Falls team which won first place. The first snowmobile shown here

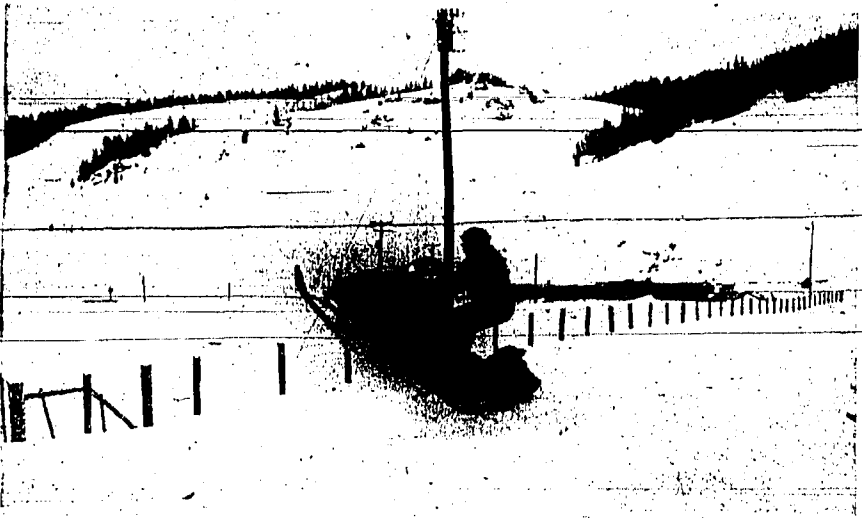
MEMBERS OF THE Idaho Falls team—placing first in Stanley's 100-mile cross-country race are from left, Dr. Rulon
