

Rogers Confers With Tito On Mideast Crisis

ADDIS ABA (UPI)—Secretary of State William P. Rogers flew into Addis Ababa today for talks on Africa with Emperor Haile Selassie and a hastily arranged meeting with President Tito of Yugoslavia on the Middle East crisis.

In a prepared statement on his arrival, Rogers pledged the United States to contribute "more effectively" to the economic development of Africa and to help put an end to systems of government based on racial discrimination on the African continent.

Prince Charles Becomes 'Solon'

LONDON (UPI)—Prince Charles, clad in scarlet robes trimmed with ermine, took his seat in the House of Lords today, prepared to "shatter royal tradition and speak out on national and world issues."

The 21-year-old heir to the British throne circled the packed chamber and then stood in the center to swear allegiance to the queen and her heirs. He then sat down briefly in a gold and velvet chair embossed with the three feathers of the Prince of Wales.

Arabs Hurl Bombs At Son Of Dayan

MUNICH, Germany (UPI)—The son of Israeli Defense Minister Moshe Dayan spent the night under police guard and left for London today following an attempt by Arab guerrillas to kill him with grenades at the Munich airport.

The grenade explosions killed one passenger and injured 11 others at Rhein Airport Tuesday. Two of three Arabs seized as suspects were wounded in the grenade bursts.

Children Leave Area As Avalanches Continue

VAL D'ISERE, France (UPI)—Three new avalanches tumbled down the mountains around this now isolated Alpine town today and the mayor ordered all children evacuated for fear of another killer slide.

The blizzard that triggered Tuesday's avalanche—39 persons were killed and 60 injured—raged unabated during the night, dumping three more feet of snow and blocking access roads to Val D'Isere.

Three new avalanches tumbled onto Route 202 between this ski resort and Bourg St. Maurice, 15 miles away. They blocked further the efforts of rescuers to dig their way through, but no one was hurt.

Carol Channing Believes 'Caring' Is All-Important

It has often struck me that the saddest people in this world are the indifferent ones, those people who do not care. You've seen them yourself. They're not just the drifters; they're the salesman who is curt, the ac-

trix who throws away a performance, the student who turns in a hastily prepared assignment.

Why is it that the salesman doesn't understand that it is he, not the customer, who loses by a lost sale?

I think that the people who do care are the happy people. Caring — having concern for and deep feelings about — has a way of enlarging your existence. It makes you apply yourself, and the more time you devote to caring about people and principles, the less room there is for gloom.

The passion of my life is acting. It's been that way ever since grade school when I was elected class secretary.

Every Friday morning I used to stand up with notes in hand and give the class one of my "characterizations," a respectful imitation of a teacher or pupil or someone we all knew.

As soon as the students recognized the latest impersonation, they'd whoop with laughter, and their applause would send me soaring into a kind of vaudeville heaven of my own.

It was theater and theater only that I cared about through all the years of drama and singing lessons — through the hard times when few casting directors would hire me.

If you care enough, as I certainly did, you can endure all kinds of setbacks.

When I left the cast of "Hello, Dolly!" to make a movie three years ago, I had played Dolly 1,272 times without missing a performance.

But caring for Dolly and caring for the audience didn't mean that I always felt like going on stage. Yet the deep-down caring within me always won out.

There are nights when you go on stage and you know the audience is cold, and for a moment you feel the people out there are defying you to entertain them. These are the times I use a little trick.

"I care about your having a good time tonight," I say to myself as I face the audience. "I know you're tired from working this dinner and you've paid a high price for your seats."

As I put myself in their place and feel for them, as individually as possible, the first thing you know, the laughter comes bounding forth from the audience to stage like anodes and cathodes, and down over the orchestra pit comes a bridge of love that you could walk over!

You can always tell a caring person. Julia Andrews is one. I'm thinking now of just one thing she did when we were making a movie called "The Roughly Modern Millie."

One day the picture's shooting schedule concentrated on me alone. The movie has this terrible thing called a close-up, and that day the close-up was to be of my face talking to a curl

on the back of Julie Andrews' head. You sit there in the dreadful heat of the lights with the crew hovering over you, and suddenly they are demanding an Academy Award performance from your nostrils. It is not easy.

But it was made easier for me by Julie Andrews. A stand-in was on the set to supply the curl I was to talk to while Julie had the day off — one of the few days off she has had since making "Mary Poppins."

To everybody's surprise that morning, I walked Julie. She came in and sat down beside me and held my hand during those close-ups. She gave me her know-how. She understood that I could relate my character of Muzelle better if I were playing to her Millie rather than to a stand-in.

Julie cared about me, yes, and I think she cared that much about the success of her picture. She wanted to make it as good as possible in every respect.

Some people say that the ability to care, to feel for, to be concerned with — is a gift. It's something you're born with, they say, like a sense of humor — you either have it or you don't.

I don't believe that. I believe we are born loving and char-

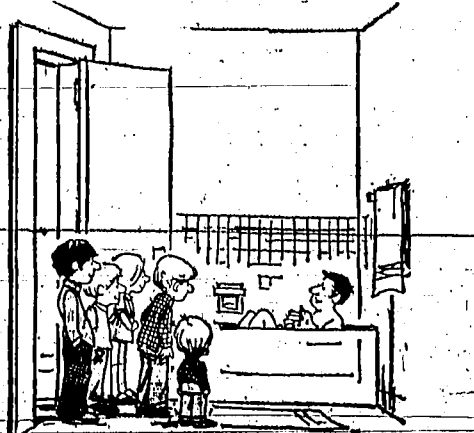

Supreme Court Sets Broad Outlines For School Fees

The Twin Falls school trustees and officials have received guidelines for the charges of student fees from the State Department of Education.

The Supreme Court has said, in essence, all fees charged for text-books are unconstitutional, but the court did not spell out specifically which charges are allowable as they relate to other fees which may be charged by individual districts.

Each local board of trustees will therefore need to make decisions within the broad outlines provided in the Paulson vs. Mindoka County District No. 331 case. J. T. Anderson, school district business manager, said officials from this district will be meeting with those of surrounding districts in an effort to interpret the guidelines and correlate their decisions.

The guides are set by the trustees as they determine those student charges which are applicable in light of the recent Supreme Court decision, the letter read.

School districts are advised to consider that required courses are those for which credit is given. No fees may be charged for a required course.

A reasonable fee, representing an average cost for duplication and issuance of transcripts, may be charged after issuance of the first transcript.

School districts may not charge a fee for "general usage items" as well as textbooks which are indistinguishable from other fixed educational expenses. Fees cannot be charged for library usage, typewriter rental, use of science laboratory, or other such items used in a required course of study when credit is offered.

Extracurricular courses are defined as outside the regular academic courses or curriculum of a school. Fees may be charged students who voluntarily participate in these activities. Such fees may include charges for activity tickets, student council fees, newspapers, annuals or class fees.

Only voluntary fees may be collected for the balance of the 1969-70 school year, even though the charges were made prior to the Supreme Court decision.

The student may be required to furnish paper and pencils

and other items which are consumed on an individual basis, if the quality and quantity of such items are not prescribed.

Charges can be made for extraordinary wear and tear, damage or breakage or loss of school books and materials.

For reasons of personal health and safety, each student may be required to furnish his own clothing for physical education courses.

Students may be required to provide their own musical instruments when band is offered as a voluntary activity for which no credit is given.

If a student, by choice, goes beyond the requirements of a course, he may be charged for additional materials.

Radioactive Traces Found Near Denver

DENVER (UPI) — Soil samples taken within several miles of the Dow Chemical Co. operations at Rocky Flats have shown traces of radioactive contamination, apparently from plutonium released during a \$15 million fire at the plant last year.

The information was made public Tuesday during a meeting of members of the Colorado Committee for Environmental Information (CCEI) and the U. S. Atomic Energy Commission (AEC).

Lack Of Sewer System In Shoshone Poses Hazard

SHOSHONE — Most communities the size of Shoshone in the state have a sewer system. Mayor Ellwood R. Werry said today in outlining details on the sewer bond election set for March 17 at the city hall. He said it is the aim of the State Health Department to promote installation of a sewer system—on-in-the-farmington-area—all of which is designed to cut down dangers to health posed by the drilled holes used in this area for sewer disposal. Melvin Alshager, Boise, state public health official, said there are 20,000 drilled holes used in the Snake River plain and this is extremely dangerous to health. The Shoshone city water supply is checked monthly for bacteria content, city officials report, and chlorine is used to keep it within health standards. One problem Shoshone faces which many of the other communities have not to such an extent, is the lava that will be costly to cut through to install the sewer system. The overall cost of the installation, \$380,000 for complete sewer system, is higher than it would be without the lava and rock beds in the city.

Hansen will be at the Lincoln County courthouse in Shoshone, beginning at 9:30 a.m. At noon he will visit with the Republican Central Committee and the Republican Women's Club at Jerome, and at 3:30 will be at the Jerome County courthouse. Friday night he will attend the Idaho Falls Lincoln Day banquet. He will return to Washington, D. C. during the weekend.

All Problems In Heyburn School Aren't Academic

HEYBURN — Education doesn't come easy for some of the grade school students in the Heyburn district. A new five-classroom addition to the primary building was occupied at the first of the year, but students were able to keep warm only because of donated portable heaters during the first few weeks of use. Now these have been returned to their owners, but the overhead heating system is not properly functioning and must be operated manually. Construction Superintendent John Starry, Clawson Construction Co., is spending almost as much time in the classrooms as the students, as each heating unit must be turned on by hand in order to maintain a suitable temperature in the five rooms. There are no restroom facilities—and no running water in the new building as yet, so students are utilizing such facilities in the primary building for the time being. Mr. Starry said construction of the all-purpose room, a 62 by 73-foot building is now under way with foundations poured and wall construction scheduled to begin immediately. Deadline for completion of this has been set for March 15. Mr. Starry said. Weather problems have delayed work on this building during the past several days and dirt was hauled in to fill the foundation area Monday.

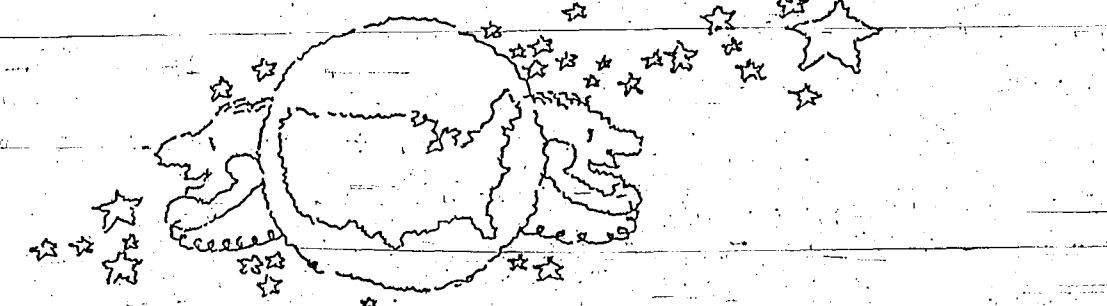

Austria placed three men in the top 10. Switzerland and France had two each, and Germany, Poland and Norway had one each.

Rick Cluff, 24, of Rutland, Vt., finished 21st in 4:27.07 and Hank Kashiwa, 20, of Old Forge, N.Y., was 30th in 4:29.05. Spider Sabich, 24, of Kyburz, Calif., was disqualified for missing a gate. Sabich had crossed the finish line one place from 18th Richmond, Vt., second heat, Chaffee finished in 2:07.02 and Kashiwa 2:09.40. Schranz now has 148 World Cup points, eight more than Underhill Center, Vt.

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
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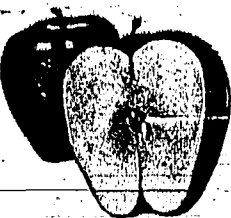

To help him pop that all-important question this spring, wear one of the new Question Mark hair fashions, suggests the Official Hair Fashion Committee of the National Hairdressers and Cosmetologists Association.

At least, we're advised by this hair fashion authority of the beauty profession, you can rest assured that the new question mark look is so romantic that it will turn a young man's fancy, or any man's fancy, to Spring thoughts.

However, the name of the new style has nothing to do with any eternally feminine riddle. The name really has been derived from the silhouette that outlines the back of the head in a profile view of the styles.

Beginning at the top of the crown, down to a nape that has been elongated with wavy tendrils, the question mark delineates the head like a graceful scroll that gives an elegantly balanced small head look.

The new styles were previewed before several thousand hairdressers from all states meeting in Hartford, Conn., in advance of their public presentation. They will be shown at local fashion shows throughout the country, Feb. 8 through 14, during the 20th annual observance of National Beauty Salon Week.

All of the styles shown at the professional preview had a look of almost super softness and a natural flow of waves and curls that continue the happy trend of close harmony between clothing and hair fashions.

The waves were not definite, more of a hint of wave moving freely and fluidly, while the light and uncontained curls assumed all sizes and shapes, either open, closed, looped, or bouncy, and they quiggled, spiraled, dangled or seemed to fall in all directions.

From either the front or the back, the new styles had the slender shape of an elongated oval. Crown height was built up with many tossed, carefree tumbling curls, the amount varying from model to model. Generally, greater height was used with evening wear. Hair pieces of tossed curls were used

frequently for crown embellishment in both day and evening styles.

Hair around the face was arranged in soft waves as frequently as it was dressed into varying combinations of tendrils or loose curls. Most effective and newest was the use of smoothly waved a-r-a-a contrasted by touches of delicate curls. Both open and closed foreheads were included, in answer to individual preference and need.

Hair coloring for spring adds soft reflections of light to your hair, as well as an inner glow that gives depth and a natural look of richness. Blonde shades of the most delicately pearly dove and fawn tones will vie with tawny and buttercup, as will dusky and misty browns. Golden reds will shimmer for attention, and all will be a combination of several tones blended together for a total effect.

In make-up, the natural look has really come into its own, but it's a soft look. Face powders are soft, balanced by redder lips that glow with irresistible shimmer. The softer eye calls for a softer and well-shaped brow line. This soft eye is a wide opened look for any question in 1970.

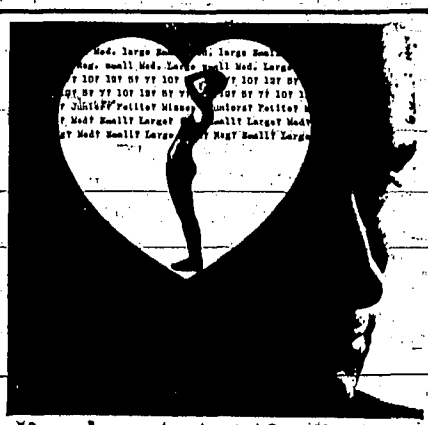

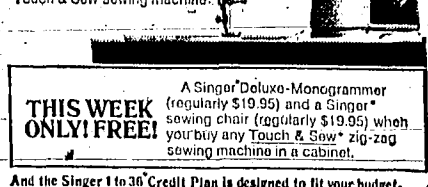

ABSOLUTE GUESS RARE IN BRIDGE

The number of contributions to bridge made by Waldemar von Zedlitz of New York is so large that we couldn't start to list them in just one article. The American Contract Bridge League thinks enough about them to have awarded him a special plaque last summer. We know him as one of the all-time great players.

Anyone who wants to improve his bridge should practice one of his precepts for his own play, which is, "There is practically never such a thing as an absolute guess," and "Any time you have a two-way finesse for a queen and go wrong, charge yourself with a mistake."

Today's South drew trumps with three leads. Then he decided that West's trump lead indicated that he held honors in both red suits. Therefore, he

played his ace of diamonds, continued with the 10 and finessed. East took his queen and led a heart, whereupon the defense wound up with three more tricks and 50 points above the line.

We might have had some indication of the location of the diamond queen if we were at the table, sitting here on the sidelines, we feel it was just about as close to an absolute guess as you can find in a bridge game.

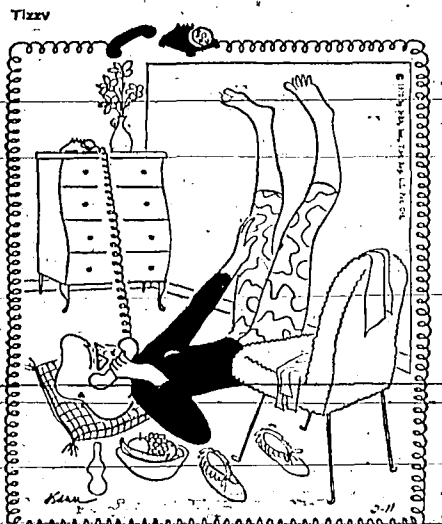
We also feel that it is a guess that should never have been made. South would have made six if he had plucked the queen of diamonds, but his contract was four, not six. He should have taken the third trump in dummy and led the singleton club. If East ducked, South wouldn't lose a club trick; East rose with the ace, South would be able to discard three of dummy's diamonds on good clubs and not need the diamond finesse at all. Finally, if West won the trick with the ace and led a heart, South would be back to guessing the diamond later on.

Rogers Visits Ancient Lands On Looping African Journey

As Secretary of State William P. Rogers makes his looping swing through Africa, he crosses lands rich in ancient history, of dynasties old before the discovery of America and new nations still in the birthpains of independence.

Gov. Brewer Will Oppose Wallace

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (UPI)—Gov. Albert Brewer formally declared himself a candidate for election to a full term today, setting up a confrontation at the polls with former Gov. George Wallace.

Brewer is the first Alabama governor in modern times eligible to succeed himself. He stepped into the office when Gov. Lurleen B. Wallace died 21 months ago to fulfill her unexpired term.

Brewer told a news conference that his record as governor was one of "fulltime, hard work, and I am confident the people of Alabama want to carry on the great progress we've started."

A native of Decatur, Ala., the 41-year-old Brewer will campaign for the May 5 Democratic primary.

Lurleen Wallace ran for governor because her husband could not legally succeed himself. Brewer ran for lieutenant governor at the same time with Wallace's tacit approval. Brewer would have been eligible to run for a term on his own anyway, but the legislature passed a succession that cleared any legal questions.

Other nations on the tour are Tunisia, Ethiopia, Kenya, Zambia, Republic of the Congo, Cameroon, Nigeria and Ghana.

Rogers himself has described his trip as one intended to show a new interest in Africa on the part of the United States.

Its nature can be described as a continuation of the long policy launched by President Nixon in his visits to Europe and Asia and followed up by Vice President Spiro T. Agnew.

Rogers said his purpose would be to ask African leaders how they might cooperate with the United States, "not in terms of attempting to gain influence—but in terms of partnership and friendship."

"This, too, is a continuation of the Nixon policy which has sought in all its diplomatic contacts—Asia, Europe, Latin America, Asia and now Africa—to reduce the U.S. role of world policeman and to work instead toward 'partnership' and toward a negotiation without confrontation."

A major problem with which Rogers must deal is a black African demand for a tougher U.S. policy toward minority white governments controlling huge black majorities in the African provinces of Portugal in Rhodesia and in South Africa.

Another will be the extent of U.S. economic aid to Africa which in fiscal 1970 comes to \$160 million or about 50 cents per person for the continent. Almost all countries on Rogers' schedule need money and technical aid.

Demo Council Asks Refusal Of Carswell

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Democratic Policy Council asked the Senate Tuesday to reject President Nixon's nomination of G. Harold Carswell to the Supreme Court.

The group also came out against Nixon's plan to expand the Safeguard Antiballistic Missile (ABM) system.

After a meeting Monday, the council also called for a rearrangement of national priorities and withdrawal of all U.S. troops from Vietnam within 18 months.

The council said the President had nominated, in Carswell and Clement F. Haynsworth—who was rejected by the Senate in December—two judges who had "demonstrated no understanding of the nation's full commitment to full racial justice."

Water Content On Galena Is Above 15-Year Average

HAYLEY — Reuben Brand Shor, Soil Conservation Service snow surveyor, reports that the Feb. 11 report shows water content at Galena Summit Horse Creek and Graham Ranch courses greater than the 15-year average.

At the Galena Summit course 77.8 inches of snow measures 16.4 inches of water, whereas the 15-year water content is 15 inches. On the Horse Creek course 70.8 inches of snow measures 15.5 inches of water, against 13 inches of water for the 15-year average. Graham Ranch's 28.7 snow depth has 6.3 inches of water in comparison to a 15-year average of 9 inches of water content.

Bald Mountain's 32.4 inches of snow has 11.6 inches of water content, whereas water content on that course for the 15-year average is 13.6 inches.

In the Little Wood River area the Sweed Peak course has 44.8 inches of snow with 9 inches of water content against 11 inches of water content in the 15-year average. The Garfield course has 25.6 inches of snow with 5.3 inches of water content against 7 inches of water for the 15-year average.

The Muldoon course has 21.7 inches of snow with 4.6 inches of water against the 15-year average of 5.5 inches of water content.

In comparison with the Feb. 1, 1955 measurements all are low in both snow depth and water content. That year Galena Summit's snow depth was 102 inches with 33 inches of water content. Horse Creek measured 94 inches with 29.8 inches water; Graham Ranch, 87 inches with 22 inches water; Mt. Baldy, 84 inches with 21 inches water; Garfield, 68 inches snow with 17 inches wa-

ter and Muldoon, 43 inches snow with 12 inches water.

Alfred Lawrence Johnson, who took measurements on the Copper Basin and Bear Canyon courses, said he had already sent his measurements in to Boise, but that the snow depth at Copper Basin was about 22 inches, making it 2 or 3 inches above normal and the snow depth of about 46 inches at Bear Canyon is average. Mr. Johnson said he will check the snow post on Dollarhide Summit next month.

Traveling in their snowmobiles with Mr. Brandshaw on his trips and assisting him in taking measurements were Mike Zentolonia to Galena Summit, Kent McKee and Nick Christensen, Baldy and Joe Ivie, state primitive area inspector who did some checking for his report, to the Little Wood River courses.

Brothers Are Charged With Kidnap Death

LONDON (UPI)—Scotland Yard Tuesday night charged two brothers with the murder of Mrs. Alex McKay, wife of a newspaper executive who has been missing for more than six weeks.

Police said the men, identified as Arthur Hosen, 33, and Nizamul Hosen, 21, also were charged with attempting to obtain \$2.1 million in ransom for the return of Mrs. McKay.

The two men resided at Rook's Farm near Stocking Pelham where a force of more than 100 police have been searching for the past two days. The village is 35 miles north of London.

There was no immediate word on whether police had found the body of Muriel McKay. Mrs. McKay's husband is acting director of the Sunday newspaper News of the World.

Guaranteed Pay Proposed For All American Families

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Sen. Frank R. Harris, D-Ohio, proposed Tuesday a \$20 billion plan to guarantee every American family an income. It would provide \$3,600 a year to a family of four when fully effective.

Under the Harris plan, cosponsored by seven other Senate Democrats, the federal government would foot the bill for all welfare, relieving states of a cost totaling \$4.4 billion a year.

"This would let states keep more of their own money," Harris told a news conference. "The plan would go into effect over a three-year period, with monthly payments receiving a minimum income of \$2,520 in the fiscal year starting next July 1; \$3,060 the next year, and \$3,600 the following year."

Under President Nixon's welfare reform program, a minimum income of \$1,600 would be guaranteed a family of four. Like Nixon's program, Harris' contains a requirement that able-bodied men and women—except the mothers of young children—would be required to work or take job training.
