City Council Covers Wide Area At Session

The Twin Falls City Council, runway has been extended. than 40 acres Monday night at City Hall, mentioned the "unthinkable" but passed 7-0 a lease agreement with Air West for space at the City-County Airport, Joslin Field, terminal building.

Air West is to pay \$174 a month for 587 square feet of space. This includes office facilities and baggage and storage room.

Councilmen were told Air West is current in its payments on the terminal facilities but is behind in its landing fees, but the landing fees are to be brought up to date this summer.

In other action, the Council also approved a resolution raising the landing fees at the airport to about one and a half times what they have been in the past.

The fees call for seven cents per 1,000 pounds for the first three million pounds and 10 cents a pound for the second three million pounds. Councilmen said the hike is because of runway extension, to be finished this spring, and because of the larger planes to use the landing strip once the

Utah Governor Warns Speakers

SALT LAKE CITY (UPI)- security forces. However, the Utah Gov. Calvin L. Rampton told the state commission for higher education Monday that guest speakers at Utah's colleges and universities will face arrest if they violate statutes forbidding obscenity and "espousing or advocating sabo-

In a letter to commissioner G. Homer Durham, Rampton said: "I am requesting that your board inform all institutions of higher learning within Gets Men the state that not withstanding the method by which speakers may be selected by the administration or by the student government, such speakers, once within the jurisdiction of Utah, must comply with the laws of the state or face arrest."

The governor said the policy concerning selection of guest speakers "should be left entirely to the board of higher education, and to individual institutions as the board may direct."

He added, however, that he was intervening because the state constitution requires "the governor shall—see that the laws are faithfully executed."

The chief executive quoted two sections of the state criminal code which forbid "obscenity and lewdness" and makes it unlawful for any person to advocate sabotage, the destruction of property, an act of violence, any other unlawful actions.

He added in the letter that the code "may well have been violated by recent speakers." Rampton did not refer specifically to any recent speak-

ers, but it's assumed the letter was prompted in part by Jerry Rubin, who spok Feb. 8 at the University of Utah.

He said no Egyptian planes challenged the raiding planes, which struck as deep as 16 miles west of the canal, during the strikes early in the day or

The teenage son of an American executive called his father 'a dope" in front of several German business men. The resulting silence was almost deafening. In order to save, dad's job and face, the son had to be sent off to an expensive Swiss school at once.

Such incidents point up the observed fact that "wife failure" and "children failure" cause more trouble to American companies abroad than executive failure.

"Wives can crucify their husbands by inability to adapt to foreign surroundings," says George Baan, international director of Handy Associates, an executive search firm.

"Too many wives expect to find glamor in a foreign post and react badly when it fails to materialize," said William H. Clark, head of William H. Clark Associates.

"They can't adapt to inconvenient shopping—no supermarkets-or the language barrier," Clark said, "Wife failure is particularly likely if the foreign post is in a provincial area or one of the underdeveloped countries. Paris or London will be easier to adapt to.

Baan said he has learned from experience that the wife and the children must be studied carefully but "casually" before making a final recommendation for a foreign appointment.

Both Baan and Clark commended the techniques developed by Mobil Oil Corp., International Business Machines Corp and a few other big companies in studying the family relationships of an executive before sending him abroad.

William Alexander Jr., of Mobil's international division, said his firm has developed a four-hour interview with husband and wife to determine if the couple will get along as well with each other and with other people in a foreign environment as they do in the

Alexander said the couple's relationships to each other is potentially more important than their attitudes towards other people in reaching a decision

A couple that is happy in the domestic environment may be unhappy and even drift apart in a foreign environment. This, would suffer of course, would ruin the man's job performance.

In his four-hour interview, Alexander usually has to break some bad news to the wife. Considering the nature of the oil business, she may learn for the first time that her husband will have to make regular trips away from home without her.

In the course of the interview, Alexander looks for certain red flags, the wife's reluctance to go or inability to comprehend the situation.

Equally dangerous, said Alex-

ander, is the domineering wife of a technically competent Caspar Milquetoast. In Paris or Hong Kong, she probably would do all right, but in a provincial foreign post she would rub everybody the wrong way. The husband soon would find out everybody disliked his wife and would worry about it. His work



Global Peril

While officials of the airline industry and government concern themselves with the myriad problems of transportation, safety and even the sonic boom brought by the age of the big passenger jet, British tropical medicine authority says they may have overlooked one of the more important challenges: the spread of exotic disease epidemics to parts of the world where they had been previously unknown.

It already has happened in

Europe to a serious degree, says Prof. Brian Maggraith of the University of Liverpool, Outbreaks of previously unknown diseases have appeared in widely separated spots on the continent.

Expanding jet passenger service has brought the most distant points on earth to within 48 hours travel

time of any other point. With quarantines and sanitation checks as spotty as they are, there is little to prevent the spread of communicable diseases from one area of the world to another.

Nor is the individual physician prepared to cope with unfamiliar symptoms or unexplained epidemics. Even after it has been determined that an illness belongs to one of the exotic families, there is little the physician can do to. prevent the spread of the disease except in his small part of the

The threat of epidemics, some of them potentially lethal, presents a serious challenge to the airlines as they prepare to carry more people farther and faster than ever before. The time to find solutions to the problem is before it, also, reaches epidemic proportions.

Small Farmer

Judging by legislation now under consideration by the House Agriculture Committee, to replace farm legislation which will expire at the end of the year, the small farmer is destined to be nudged further into obscurity.

The proposed farm plan would remove more cropland from production and reduce subsidies to selected crops in a further attempt to bring farm production back to a level of market supply and demand. The problem of surpluses, which this approach is designed to reduce, is aggravated this year by a world glut of wheat and other food grains.

Small family tarms have been the particular victims of federal farm programs. The exodus of rural residents to the metropolitan centers in recent years is un-precedented A further reduction in farm acreage, at a time when the trend is toward larger farms as a means of offsetting the growing

Dear Dr. Thosteson: What is G meant by "atypical cells present" in a female examination? Is this related to a cancerous condition. What is the remedy?

I would rather not have this answered unless my name is omitted. -- Mrs. S. C. G.

I never use the names of. readers who send in questions. Nor do I reveal the names to anyone. Quite often others write and ask, "Will you put me in touch with Mrs. X?" The answer is always no. After 30some years as a physician, I see no reason to change the rule of confidentiality - who a patient is, what ails him, or any other such information is strictly between the patient and the objector. The patient can give out the information if he chooses. but the doctor keeps his mouth

Now about those "atypical cells." That refers to the cells which are taken in a Pap smear and examined interoscopically If the cells are typical, or normal, then everything's fine

"Atypical" means they are not typical," not charac-teristic of cells found in the cervix, yet they are not can-CUTOUS

*Cancer cells, of course, are not typical, either, but the report would say they were malignant, or cancerous. "Atypical" is reserved for cells that are unusual in some respect but

Pierre Rinfret Dr. Rinfret, a Republican and an early supporter of Richard M. Nixon for President, badly upset the White House in 1969 with stinging critiques of the economic policy mailed to his high-paying clients and subsequently mouthed around the business community Consequently, the White House was taking no chances about Rinfret's forthcoming testimony before the Senate Banking Committee Two requests were made of

First, the White House would appreciate it if he did not advocate (as he has in memos to clients, a return to Presidential "jawboning" LBJ-style admonitions against wage and price increases. Indeed, an attack on jawboning from Rinfret would be much appreciated.

Second (and more surprising), the White House would nd if Rinfret endersec credit controls to cope with the present lethal combination of rampaging inflation, tight money, and a critical housing shortage.

The fact that Rinfret in large part complied with these requests is less significant than what they revealed about the Administration's economic thinking.

In the first place, the White House does not agree with many Democrats some and Republicans that severe recession is just around the corner. Rather, it realizes galloping inflation is still the nation's top pocketbook issue and figures to remain so.

That recognition makes the White House sensitive Democratic charges that Mr.

Kansas City, Kansas When I got off the bus in Kansas City in 1958, I had \$1.18 and no job. I had a wife back in Louisiana who needed money to buy milk and food for our two babies, and I owed \$20 for bus

That's enough to scare any man, unless he's got trust in God. And right then that was all I had.

I worked for this tire shop for about seven months. Then the boss came and siad, "There just isn't enough work to go around.

My wife and children were with me now, and I was in bad need of a job. Just then I ran into a fellow I knew who was leaving a company which handled big tires for heavy construction equipment. He took me down to see the boss.

"I'm bringing you a better man than I am," he told him Only thing was, I had never changed big tires before.

It was a new company, and for two weeks I just sat there on a big stack of inner tubes with nothing to do. All the time I worried about not knowing how to do the job and praying to God that somehow I'd have a chance to learn

One night the same guy who had shown me how to change my first tire dropped by at quitting time. He had a big tall tire he was going out to change and asked if I wanted to go with him. I jumped into his truck. The flat was on the right rear of this big road scraper. I watched him change it-and helped

The next day at 2 o'clock my boss sent me to fix one just like it. Identical! Right rear, same kind of machine. If I hadn't seen that tire taken off the day

Potatoes

BOISE (UPI)—A government report said today potato growers in Idaho intent to plant 321,000 acres of potatoes in all areas of Idaho this year which, if carried through, would be a two per cent increase over the 1969 total acreage.

The Idaho Corp and Livestock Reporting Service said the prospective acreage represents interpretation of information received as of March 1 and is based on past relationships between such reports and acreages actually planted.

Potato growers in the 10 southwest counties, according to the report, have not made significant large scale changes for the fourth consecutive year. Hew land development and expanded potato operations are expected to offset land going into crop rotation systems by

Planting intentions in Idaho's other counties indicate an increase of two per cent or 6,000 acres from the 1959 level.

The service said the purpose of the report was to assist growers in making such changes in their acreage plans as may appear desirable.



When Cat Is-Away Mice Play

Foreign News Commentary. By PHIL NEWSOM-UPI Foreign News Analyst

The anti-Viet Cong and anti-North Vietnamese demonstrations in Cambodia suggest that when the cat is away the mice will play.

The cat being Prince Norodom Sihanouk, the Cambodian chief of state who has spent the last -two-and-a-half months on the French Riviera taking an obesity cure, and currently is on his way home via Moscow and Peking.

The mice are Lt. Gen. Lon Nol, Cambodia's premier and defense minister, and Prince, Sirik Matak, first deputy premier.

Sihanouk's ban on Western correspondents in his capital of Phnom Pehn, except as tourists, and the overwhelming nature of his own personality as Cambodian leader, makes difficult any real identification of lesser lights.

Prince Sirik Matak is described as the second most powerful man in Cambodia. Lon Not has served as head of the Cambodian army and as a deputy premier under previous, Cambodian governments of which there have been a dozen or so since 1961

He has been a frequent target of Cambodian leftists who from time, to time have demanded his resignation or ouster.

It is perhaps a coincidence that he took his present office within days of the arrival of U.S. Charge d'Affaires Lloyd M. Rives to renew diplomatic relations between the two countries after a four-year
