Filth Crackdown

Utah Governor Warns Speakers

SALT LAKE CITY (UPI)—Utah Gov. Calvin L. Rampton told the state commission for higher education Monday that guest speakers at Utah's colleges and universities will face arrest if they violate statutes forbidding obscenity and "espousing or advocating sabotage."

In a letter to commissioner G. Homer Durham, Rampton said: "I am requesting that your board inform all institutions of higher learning within the state that not withstanding the method by which speakers may be selected by the administration or by the student government, such speakers, once within the jurisdiction of Utah, must comply with the laws of the state or face arrest."

The governor said the policy concerning selection of guest speakers "should be left entirely to the board of higher education, and to individual institutions as the board may direct."

He added, however, that he was intervening because the state constitution requires "the governor shall see that the laws are faithfully executed."

The chief executive quoted two sections of the state criminal code which forbid "obscenity and lewdness" and makes it unlawful for any person to advocate sabotage, the destruction of property, an act of violence, or any other unlawful actions.

He added in the letter that the code "may well have been violated by recent speakers."

Rampton did not refer specifically to any recent speakers, but it's assumed the letter was prompted in part by Jerry Rubin, who spoke Feb. 8 at the University of Utah.

The Yippie leader spoke for nearly two hours on a wide variety of subjects and at one point told the 1,300 students, "inciting to riot, that's my occupation."

In the letter to Durham, the governor said "arrests, if made, should be effected by campus

security forces. However, the services of local or state police may be utilized if necessary." Rampton suggested that speakers "whose past performance may indicate a tendency to disregard standards of conduct" be informed of Utah's criminal code before they arrive in the state.

Moscow Gets Men To Egypt

NEW YORK (UPI)—The Soviet Union is moving "large numbers" of ground-to-air missiles into Egypt along with Russian crews to man them, ABC news reported Monday night.

At the same time, ABC state department correspondent John Scali said the Nixon administration has all but decided to reject Israel's request for more American fighters and bombers.

The network's Rome correspondent Barrie Dunsmore, said in contradiction to a report from an Asian news service that the United States and the Soviet Union have agreed to an arms embargo in the Mideast, "large numbers of Russian SA3 ground-to-air missiles have been coming into Egypt for the past five days."

He said 10 Russian ships, loaded in Yugoslavia, docked in Alexandria last week carrying missiles and Russian technical personnel.

"It was significant that this is a defense system," Dunsmore said. "There was no evidence of any long range missiles or long range fighter bombers such as the MIG23 in the shipments."

"Egypt's air defenses are said to have been nearly 85 per cent destroyed by low level Israeli air attacks in recent months. It's just this kind of attack that the SA3 is designed to combat."

Scali, reporting from Washington on the same news show, said the decision to turn down Israel's request for more planes is "99 per cent agreed on within the government."

But he added the Nixon administration "will assure Israel that American planes will be made available if the military balance changes to threaten Israel's existence."

Bank Could Lose Post

BOISE (UPI)—Idaho's Endowment Fund Investment Board may dump First Security Bank as one of its three trustees, usually reliable sources reported Monday.

At the prodding of State Finance Commissioner John D. Silva, the sources said, the board voted unanimously at a recent meeting to dismiss First Security if the facts as it knew them were correct.

Silva notified First Security of the action and set a deadline which, the sources said, Attorney General Robert M. Robson got continued until the board meets again this Friday at 10 a.m.

At that time, First Security and the board are supposed to discuss their differences of opinion — differences which supposedly concern investment of convertible bonds.

Board sources said First Security went directly to Standard & Poor's — one of four money managers for the investment board — and warned against investing endowment funds in convertible bonds.

The bank, these sources said, considers such an investment unconstitutional.

Idaho's Supreme Court recently ruled on the question and the board's interpretation of that ruling is that such investment is proper as long as the conversion clause is not exercised.

To strengthen that position the legislature recently passed a law permitting such investment and prohibiting exercise of the conversion clause.

Board members were reportedly upset for two reasons: that First Security allegedly went directly to Standard & Poor's instead of through the board and that the board disagrees with the contention of unconstitutionality.

At the time of the meeting, some two weeks ago, nobody from the bank was present to put forth First Security's case. However, the bank later sent a seven-page letter from its attorneys to members and President Ralph Comstock Jr. met with Silva.

Silva was not available for comment Monday about the dispute. He was reported in the East on state business.

Attorneys for the firm referred newsmen to Comstock who was reported on his way out of town and unavailable for

comment. Other banks officials were sought for comment but none was immediately forthcoming.

When the investment board was set up by the 1967 Legislature, First Security, the Bank of Idaho and the Idaho Bank and Trust were chosen as its three trustees.

Dogfights Over Suez Continue

Egyptian and Israeli jet fighters battled Monday in wide-ranging dogfights over the Suez Canal sector with both sides claiming one "kill."

Israeli commandos struck for the second day deep inside Syria and clashes were reported on the other Middle East fronts.

As usual, Egyptian and Israeli military spokesmen gave different versions of the air battles.

A spokesman in Tel Aviv said Israeli jets shot down one Soviet-built MIG21 and hit another when Egyptian interceptors rose to attack a reconnaissance flight across the canal following Israeli air raids along the central sector. He said no Egyptian planes challenged the raiding planes, which struck as deep as 16 miles west of the canal, during the strikes early in the day or later in the afternoon.

The claim brought to 93 the total of Arab warplanes Israel has said it has shot down since the 1967 war—76 Egyptian and 17 Syrian.

The Cairo spokesman said Egyptian MIG jet interceptors "smashed" into three waves of 12 Israeli planes and shot one down in a series of individual dogfights ranging over one hundred miles in clear skies. It was the 144th Israeli plane Egypt has claimed it has downed since the 1967 war.

To the north, Israeli commandos followed up their first strike into Syria since the six day war almost three years ago Sunday night with a second foray before dawn Monday. A spokesman said the commandos destroyed a culvert spanning a new military supply road and some Syrian Army pillboxes.

City Council Covers Wide Area At Session

The Twin Falls City Council, meeting in special session Monday night at City Hall, mentioned the "unthinkable" but passed 7-0 a lease agreement with Air West for space at the City-County Airport, Joslin Field, terminal building.

Air West is to pay \$174 a month for 587 square feet of space. This includes office facilities and baggage and storage room.

The "Unthinkable" brought up by Councilman Tom Nelson dealt with the sale of the airline to Howard Hughes. It was mentioned the sale might not go through and some councilmen questioned making the lease agreement. In the end, however, councilmen voted to make the lease for a year. The lease agreement has to be approved by Twin Falls County commissioners and Air West officials.

Councilmen were told Air West is current in its payments on the terminal facilities but is behind in its landing fees, but the landing fees are to be brought up to date this summer. In other action, the Council also approved a resolution raising the landing fees at the airport to about one and a half times what they have been in the past.

The fees call for seven cents per 1,000 pounds for the first three million pounds and 10 cents a pound for the second three million pounds. Councilmen said the hike is because of runway extension, to be finished this spring, and because of the larger planes to use the landing strip once the

runway has been extended. The Council also adopted, 7-0, its 1970 budget of more than \$3.4 million. A public hearing on the budget will be held at 7:30 p.m. at City Hall on March 30.

This year's budget includes work on the Dierke's Lake property and additional work in the downtown area because of urban renewal.

Adoption of the budget was routine with few questions asked. About 30 people, half of them school students, attended the meeting.

The Council also discussed the recent memorandum decision by First District Court Judge James Towles which give the city about 80 per cent of what it wanted in annexation of the Orchalara subdivision, an area on the northwest edge of the city.

It was reported the city's attorney in the matter, Peter Snow of Burley, is not satisfied with the decision and may file an objection.

City Manager Jean Milar said, "The city can do nothing until the defense, or the city, files its findings of fact and conclusions of law with the judge, along with a judgment and decree. If this is signed, the city can then take the property. If it isn't, it might go on to the Supreme Court."

He said the city might object even if the decree is signed, and then the matter might go to the Supreme Court.

The city wanted all the property in question, and Judge Towles ruled the city is to leave out the southwest part of the subdivision, or a little more

than 40 acres. The Council also approved an ordinance for the sale of bonds on the downtown Local Improvement District. It was reported a total of \$47,812 has been prepaid on the total project of \$255,000. The bonds will be sold to the four banks in Twin Falls for an interest rate of about five per cent.

The Council awarded bids on 401.85 shares of water stock in the Salmon River Canal Co. for the 1970 season. The Council awarded the bids to LeRoy Fleepor, \$6.50 a share for 50 shares; A. J. Nelson, \$7.26 a share for 150 shares; W. J. Nicholson, \$6.75 a share for 100 shares; Leonard Peterson, \$6.70 a share for 50 shares, and Victor Nelson, \$6.25 a share for 50 to 200 shares.

No bids were received for 500 shares of water stock in the Twin Falls Canal Co. for the 1970 and the Council agreed to negotiate for the sale of the stock.

Placed on first reading was an ordinance creating a Youth Advisory Commission for the city. The commission, to be made up of nine members, many of them from the High School and the College of Southern Idaho, is to make recommendations on youth recreation in the city and to promote youth activity in community activities and government. The commission is to operate without expenses.

The Council agreed to tour the old water plant facilities south of the city prior to making a decision on what to do with the old building and property.

Supreme Court In Session

The Idaho Supreme Court, sitting in Twin Falls for the second time in six months, met almost on schedule Monday in the Twin Falls judicial annex.

The court will sit in Twin Falls through Friday. Justices are Joseph J. McFadden, chief justice, and Clay Spear, Henry McQuade, Charles Donaldson and Alan Shepard.

The first case to be heard, scheduled for 9 a.m., got under way at about 10:40 a.m. and was Janet Chugg, plaintiff-respondent against Raymond Chugg, defendant-appellant. It was a divorce action in which Mr. Chugg is contending he should have been awarded the divorce, instead of his former wife.

Following the first case the case of Charlotte Verlene Doggett, plaintiff-appellant against Boiler Engineering and Supply Co. Inc., defendant-respondent, was heard. This case involves the death of Cloyd Doggett of Burley in 1966 and his wife sought to be substituted as plaintiff in the action. She lost in the District Court and appealed to the Supreme Court.

Finally, the court heard the case of the Little Wood Villa, Community Lateral Association against Clifton Dixon, involving the diversion of water in the Blaine County area.

Today, the cases of flooding in Marsh Creek in Cassia County in 1964; the Monte Gee rape conviction appeal out of Cassia County and an estate matter involving George Kelley Jr. against Perry Wheyland, were heard.

Burning Of Spuds Still On

SHELLEY, Idaho (UPI)—Grimly determined to force up prices paid farmers for potatoes, the National Farmers Organization turned out in wet, cold and windy weather Monday to burn five million more pounds of spuds.

From as far as 120 miles away they came to the Lloyd Stolworthy Farm 1 1/2 miles from Shelley to dump their potatoes. The half-mile of dirt road from the highway to the sloping depression where the potatoes were taken was clogged with cars, pickups and large trucks.

Fourth such action to date in Idaho since February, the potato bakers brought to 10 million pounds the estimated number of potatoes burned so far in the state.

Irishmen Put On That Green

DUBLIN (UPI)—The sons and daughters of Ireland today celebrated St. Patrick's Day with church services, street pageants and the "wetting" of the shamrock.

Across the border in Northern Ireland, where public demonstrations were banned, Irishmen glared at one another across British guns that kept feuding Protestants and Roman Catholics apart.

Thousands gathered in Dublin for the giant industrial parade that highlights the official St. Patrick's Day celebration. Streets of Eire towns and hamlets were bedecked with bunting.

Serious Crime Rate Rose 11 Per Cent During 1969

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Serious crime in the United States rose 11 per cent in 1969, but the increase was the lowest in four years, the FBI said Monday. The rate of increase fell sharply in big cities, the suburbs and the densely populated Northeast.

The preliminary edition of the FBI's Uniform Crime Report said the 1969 increase was the lowest since 1965, when the crime index rose 6 per cent over 1964. The increase in 1968 was 17 per cent.

FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover said 1969 increases were lower in every category of violent crime except forcible rape, which was up 16 per cent. Robbery climbed 13 per cent, aggravated assault 9 per cent and murder 7 per cent.

These increases compared with the 1968 index which showed forcible rape and murder both up by 14 per cent, robbery 29 per cent, and aggravated assault 12 per cent.

Cities of 250,000 population and over reported a 9 per cent increase in crime last year. The suburban increase was 13 per cent and the rural rate was up 11 per cent. The previous year's increase was 18 per cent for big cities and the suburbs and 12 per cent for rural areas.

In 1969, the North-Central states recorded a 15 per cent increase, the Western states 12 per cent, the South 11 per cent and the Northeast 7 per cent.

NEW YORK (UPI) — The wife of an American engineer in an important post in Europe sat on the dais in an engineering society meeting and proclaimed loudly how much she disliked Europe.

Within 60 days, her husband was demoted to a job in Kansas City.

The teenage son of an American executive called his father "a dope" in front of several German business men. The resulting silence was almost deafening. In order to save dad's job and face, the son had to be sent off to an expensive Swiss school at once.

Such incidents point up the observed fact that "wife failure" and "children failure" cause more trouble to American companies abroad than executive failure.

A couple that is happy in the domestic environment may be unhappy and even drift apart in a foreign environment. This, of course, would ruin the man's job performance.

The seat in the heavily-Republican district was vacated last month by the death of Rep. Glenard P. Lipscomb, R-Calif. Registration in the district

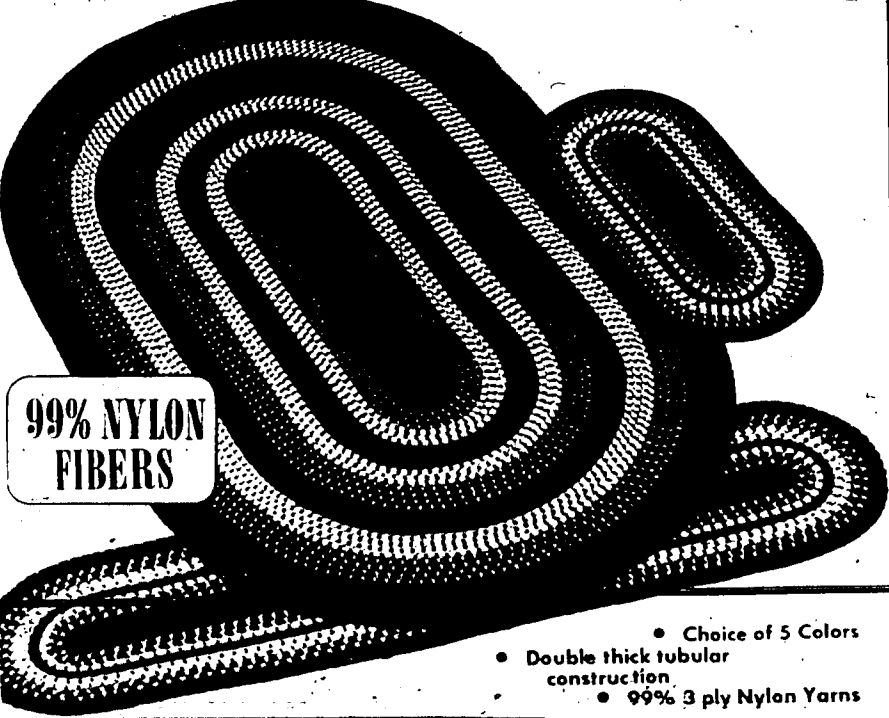
favors the Republicans 129,414 to 90,989.

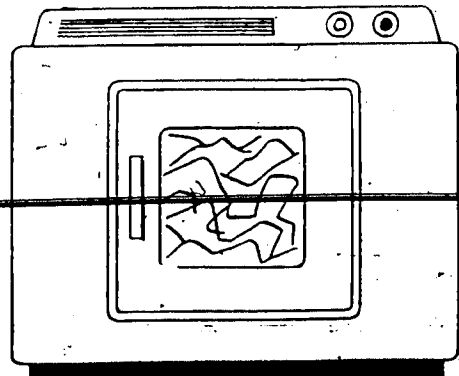

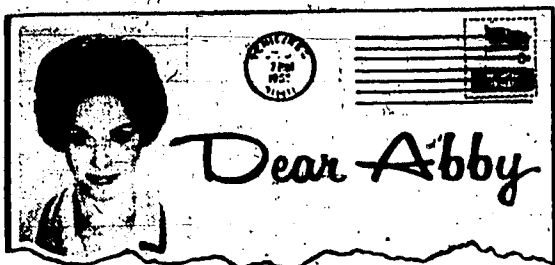

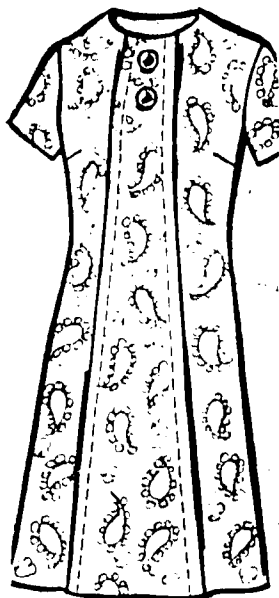
All the signs were there for me to read, but when you're in love you think your love can conquer all. It can't.

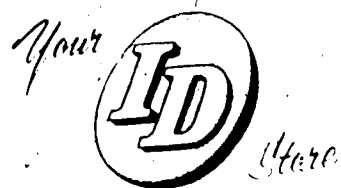

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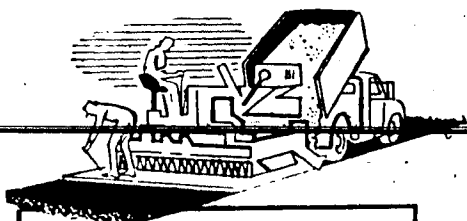

When Cat Is Away Mice Play

The anti-Viet Cong and anti-North Vietnamese demonstrations in Cambodia suggest that when the cat is away the mice will play.

The cat being Prince Norodom Sihanouk, the Cambodian chief of state who has spent the last two-and-a-half months on the French Riviera taking an obesity cure, and currently is on his way home via Moscow and Peking.

The mice are Lt. Gen. Lon Nol, Cambodia's premier and defense minister, and Prince Sirik Matak, first deputy premier.

Sihanouk's ban on Western correspondents in his capital of Phnom Penh, except as tourists, and the overwhelming nature of his own personality as Cambodian leader, makes difficult any real identification of lesser lights.

Prince Sirik Matak is described as the second most powerful man in Cambodia. Lon Nol has served as head of the Cambodian army and as a deputy premier under previous Cambodian governments of which there have been a dozen or so since 1961.

He has been a frequent target of Cambodian leftists who from time to time have demanded his resignation or ouster.

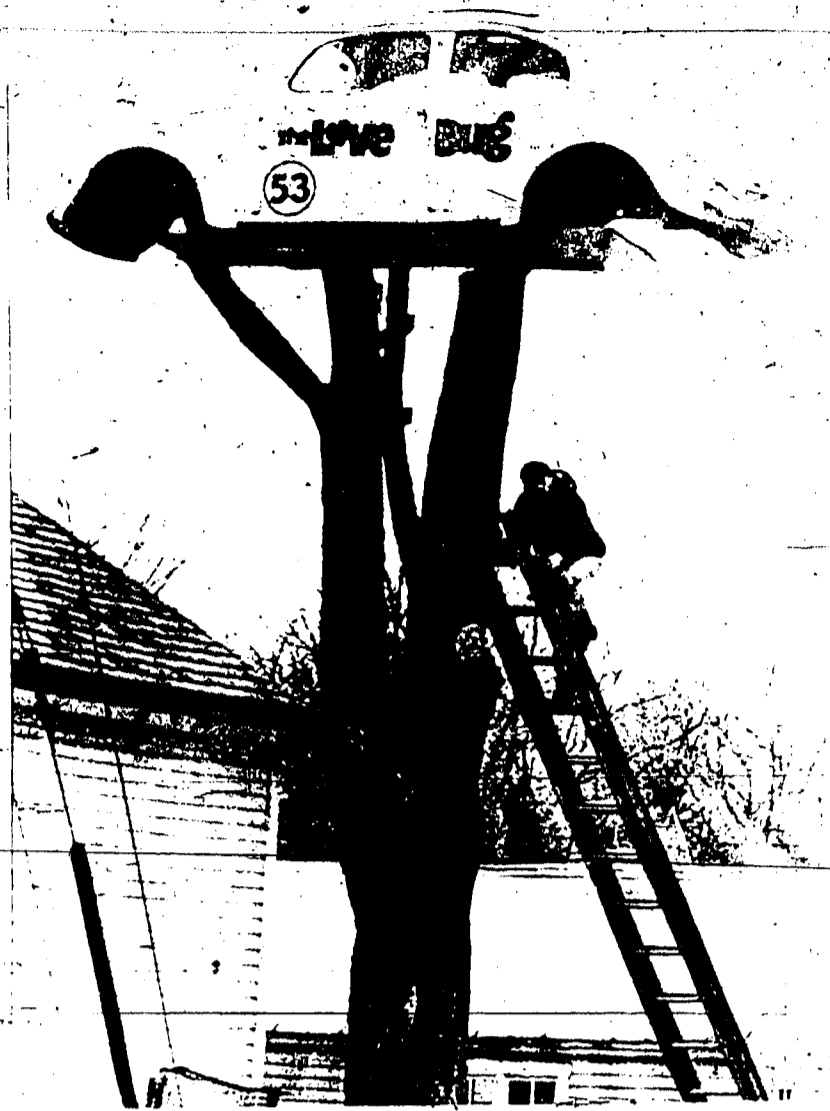
It is perhaps a coincidence that he took his present office within days of the arrival of U.S. Charge d'Affaires Lloyd M. Rives to renew diplomatic relations between the two countries after a four-year break.

In Sihanouk's absence he would be the man in charge and it seems less than a coincidence that Cambodian police were conspicuously absent during the anti-Viet Cong and anti-North Vietnam demonstrations and the sacking of the two embassies.

Nonetheless, although absent, Sihanouk remains the man to be reckoned with in the future course of Cambodian affairs.

To his people he is a God-like figure, a comparison he has done nothing to discredit.

He gets the credit among them for maintaining Cambodia's neutrality while being surrounded on three sides by devastating wars.

Boys Down On The Farm Have Never Perused A Mail Catalog

CHICAGO (UPI) — The boys down on the farm have never perused a mail order house catalog like the book Montgomery Ward and Co. mailed out to the swinging set this week.

It's a saucily sexy come-on from the 98-year-old, once-staid merchandising firm.

Seven lithesome models on one page look like a convention of Playboy magazine's center-fold cuties. They're posing seductively in bikini panties with only long, flowing tresses

hiding prominent parts of their anatomy.

Two models on another page are attired only in costume jewelry, make-believe pearls and deep tans.

One curvaceous model wears bra and panties designed "for girls who don't like to wear underthings." The underthings, it says, "fit like skin, feel like nothing." And that's the way they look.

The magazine-type catalog, Wards calls it a "magalog" — is for "the younger generation

and for those who think young." It is being distributed to young people in the Chicago metropolitan area and on college campuses in the Midwest.

Its sections are named to catch the fancy of the young: "Black is beautiful," "playing house," "looking fine" and "tripping."

James Lutz, merchandising executive vice president, says the 75-page catalog is Wards' first serious attempt at capturing the growing and affluent younger generation of 18 to 34 year olds.

Nixon Would Hesitate Giving Laos Troops

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Undersecretary of State Elliot B. Richardson told senators today that the Nixon administration would at least get a congressional consensus before it ever sent ground troops into Laos — which it says it has no intention of doing.

Richardson testified before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee which is considered a proposal to repeal the Tonkin Gulf resolution cited by President Lyndon B. Johnson as authority for the big increase in U.S. involvement in Vietnam.

Richardson, questioned about the U.S. role now in Laos, stressed that the United States has "no plan" to send combat troops there. "But I can't foreclose the options the President might assume under difference circumstances," he said.

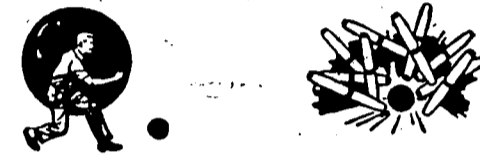
Richardson was told by Chairman J. William Fulbright, D-Ark., that Secretary of State William P. Rogers told the committee two weeks ago that "advance approval" of Congress would be needed for such a contingency.

The No. 2 State Department official said such advance approval might mean only that Congress would be notified and

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Improvements Planned For Annexed Property

As a result of the memorandum decision rendered by First District Judge James Towles, Wallace, for annexation of properties northwest of Twin Falls plans already are underway to provide services and facilities available to other parts of the city.

The memorandum decision does not become final until findings of fact and final order are filed by the city and signed by the judge. As soon as this is completed, Mr. Milar said, the city will take steps to provide services and enforce ordinances such as the dog leash law, animal control and zoning regulations which also apply in other areas of the city.

Council members agreed by resolution some time ago, to modify the animal control regulations by two years to give newly annexed residents time to meet animal regulations of the city. New residents may keep their cows and horses and any animal except pigs, but they must meet certain health and sanitation regulations. A minimum of 12,000 square feet of space is required for the keeping of a horse or cow, for example.

Buhl-Castleford Road Bid Denied

BOISE (UPI) — The State Highway Board Monday denied a request by the Buhl Highway District to put into the state highway system a 10-mile stretch of road between Castleford and Buhl.

Medic Alert Program Slated

The eight local chapters of the Idaho Association of Life Underwriters have adopted the Medic Alert program as their public service project for the year, according to Wayne Barney, Twin Falls, state public relations chairman.

Medic Alert, designed for those with hidden medical problems, has been responsible for the saving of many lives since it was first put into use about a dozen years ago in Turlock, Calif., now headquarters for the foundation.

Linda Collins then 14, cut her finger. At the hospital she was

During the week of April 6, canisters will be set up in all banks in Magic Valley to allow citizens the opportunity of applying for Medic Alert bracelets or necklaces. Can-

teens also will be set up and will remain in drug stores, doctors' and dentists' offices. The canisters will contain application blanks which can be sent to Medic Alert.

Mr. Barney and Harlon Baker, state public service chairman and president elect of the State Life Underwriters Association, are directing the project in Magic Valley.

They said while those wishing to obtain the Medic Alert emblems will be charged for the service, the opportunity to apply and public promotion and education of the project is being done by the association.

They said this is the first time

a big push toward the lifesaving devices has been made in Idaho and it is hoped anyone with hidden medical problems will apply to the foundation.

There are now more than 200,000 United States citizens who wear Medic Alert emblems and there are another 2,500 new enrollments each month.

Among those who are able to make the fullest use of Medic Alert are diabetics, people with various allergies, epileptics or people taking anticoagulants. Instant recognition of these problems often can mean the difference between life and death, the two members of the association said.

Scott said he had received "a very fair offer" from the National Basketball Association but declined to name the team involved. Asked why he signed with the Caps, Scott replied: "For more money."

Scott was the third top collegian to be snared by ABA teams this year. Purdue's Rick Mount has signed with the Indiana Pacers and Davidson's Mike Maloy will play for the Pittsburgh Pipers.

Scott was a member of the gold-medal winning U.S. basketball squad in the 1968 Olympics at Mexico City. He averaged 22.1 points per game during his three year career with the Tar Heels and last Saturday topped the 2,000-point career mark with 26 points in his team's losing effort against Manhattan in the National Invitational Tournament.

He was named to the UPI All-America second team this year and was on the Atlantic Coast Conference honorary team three straight seasons.

"I am looking forward to moving to Washington," Scott said. "It will give me an opportunity to continue my education. I plan to be a lawyer and Washington is about the best place for that."

NBA Sets Up New Divisions

CHICAGO (UPI)—National Basketball Association owners Monday failed to accept plans for a proposed merger with the American Basketball Association and instructed its merger committee to resume negotiations with ABA representatives.

Commissioner Walter Kennedy would not speculate whether the two leagues were close to a merger. The suit asked for "at least" \$25 million for the state and \$2,550,000 for the city of Seattle and "an unspecified amount for the people." Under antitrust lawsuit cases, awards for damages are triple the amount asked.

The young man with the tousled hair and floppy socks was named the top player in the country by 467 of the 566 sports writers and sportscasters participating in the balloting.

Maravich, the scorer-playmaker whose list of accomplishments include 11 NCAA scoring records and 34 Southeastern Conference offensive marks, was named winner of the second annual James A. Naismith Award Monday.

Announcement of the award, presented by the Atlanta, Ga. Tipoff Club, was made jointly in New York and Atlanta. Lew Alcindor of UCLA was the winner of the first Naismith Award a year ago.

The slender, 6-foot, 5-inch Maravich, college basketball's greatest scorer in history, was an easy winner in the balloting for the Naismith Award conducted by United Press International.

Bob Lanier, the giant center for St. Bonaventure who was considered the best big man in the college ranks this season, was second in the voting with 37 votes while Rick Mount of Purdue was third with 13, followed by Dan Issel of Kentucky with 12 and Austin Carr of Notre Dame with 11.

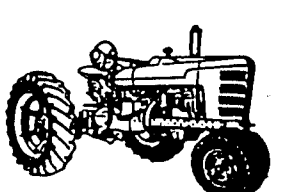

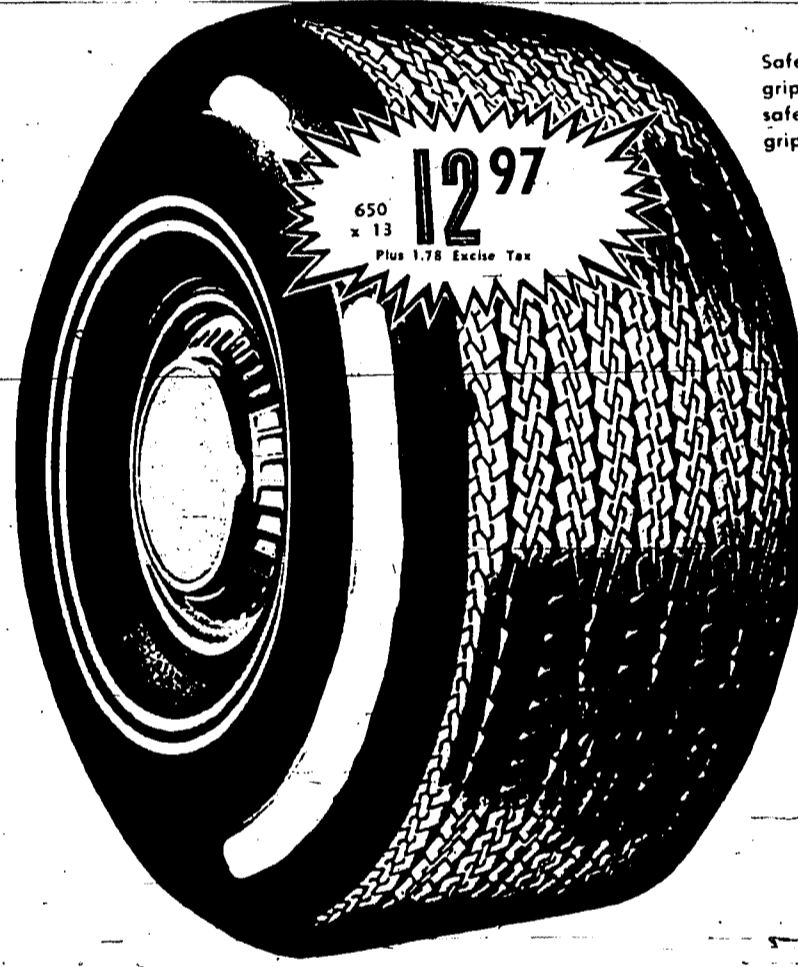

If East had thrown a club, Charley would have set up dummy's fourth club and made the slam that way.
