## Samuelson May Change Views On White Clouds

HAILEY — Governor Don Samuelson said in Hailey Tuesday he would withdraw his support of mining operations in the White Clouds area if it is proven through study that more money will be brought into the state in the long run should the area be opened for recreation.

The comment was in response to a question submitted by Richard Meyer, a designer-planner from Kelchum. In the same line of questioning, the governor agreed that he would go along with the recommendations made by the Forest Service at the completion of an ecology study presently under way in the area.

He told Don Bennett, Ketchum, that if the survey indicated recreation should be given priority over mining operations there, he would go along with the decision. In defense of the proposal, to "open" the White Clouds area to mining, the governor said: "Of the .53 million acres of land in Idaho, some 3 million are used for recreation," since statehood; however, only 40,700 acres have been used for mining. Over 10,000 of those acres have been restored, he added.

The White Clouds topic occupied much of the discussion Tuesday during the governor's "state capital" for a day" meeting. He will have visited each county in the state before his program concludes next month.

The meetings are called with two purposes in mind, the governor said. "To listen to the people's suggestions to improve the inner workings of the state government and to discuss ways to improve the economic condition of Idaho.

## 1970 Census Underway And Valley Residents Counted

The 1970 census started today and for the next month men and women will be going door to door selling America and not household items.

The census, according to officials, lets government know where America has been, where it is now and where it will be in the future, barring anything unforeseen.

The census "short form" has

been sent to all homes in Magic Valley and people are now asked to fill out those forms and hold on to them until the census taker calls. At every fifth household the census taker will ask detailed questions and fill out a long form. All questions will be confidential.

A total of 40 men and women will be working in Magic Valley during the next month; making 10 to 15 stops a day in order to count all the people in the county.

Special arrangements have been made to count people in jails, hospitals, colleges and places other than the home.

The first census was taken in 1790 and, according to the Department of Commerce, the first census was in the state of Massachusetts. There were 44,377 dwellings in that state way back then.

The 1960 count showed 1,890,308 in the state, 1,854,363 occupied. In the first census some odd

names came up. According to the department, the names of all family heads were recorded and posted in a prominent place in the community. The practice of posting names has long disappeared but in 1790 names like Joseph, Scolda, Simmers, Truelove, Sparks, Serum Coffin, Safah Simpers, Hannah Cheese, Mercy Pepper and Wanton Bump showed up.

And there were some Boston Fogg, Booz Stills, Over Jordans and William Sorrows'. There were such families as the Pockerpines, the Dripes, the Fryovers, the Hungerpealers and the Slappys.

In all of 1790 a total of 27,337 different family names were recorded. Smith was popular then, with 5,932 families reported.

The latest official casualty tolls put the number of deaths at 925 and injured at 808. An official said injuries were fewer because "this earthquake killed you if you were at home and left you alone if you were outside."

Official estimates said the final death count could hit 2,000.

At least 11 villages have been cut off by road and have had no telephone or radio service Saturday night.

Reports from the village of Kembel said an 18-month-old girl who survived the quake froze to death in her mother's arms.

In the township of Gediz, epicenter of the quake, two food trucks were besieged by hungry survivors. The Turkish radio said 5,400 houses were badly damaged.

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

## Don't Fear Partial Secrecy

### Next Christmas

Walking into church Easter Sunday we were greeted by a friend with the comment: "Well, look who is here. I'll probably see you again at Christmas."

And he was probably right. But why?

It is no longer a universal thought that the Sabbath is a day of rest, of some soul searching and of religious meditation. Somewhere along the line we have changed the basic concept that did much to make our nation great.

We live in a world of chaos. We are more concerned with today than we are for tomorrow. Going to church has become fashionable on certain days and so we go to church on those days. We are caught up in a mainstream of life which doesn't have much time left for things like religion. We are building a monument to anguish.

We live in a country where even laws suppress religious activities. We live in a country where little accepted things, like the reading of a Bible verse at the start of a school day in public schools, is no longer permitted. The motto on our money — In God We Trust — doesn't seem

to carry much weight and there have been concerted drives to have it removed entirely.

In this everyday world in which we live the lessons of the Bible are being ignored. The Bible is still, we are told, the best seller. But is it being read?

We are people more concerned with how we look than how we think. We are more concerned with what we have in the bank than what we have in our heart.

Our very being is much like the line in the religious song which goes: "The night is dark and I am far from home."

So it might be that Easter could be a time other than the observance of the Resurrection of Jesus Christ. It might well be used to signal the start of a new period in living, in believing, in accomplishing, in a return to the basic concepts which our forefathers had.

On Easter Sunday the pastor we listened to said that Easter gives the promise of "new lives for old ones."

It could well be just that.

Or will we see you next Christmas?

### Sound Off

In light of the continuing turmoil on campuses and the obvious boredom of a segment of the student population, more educators are beginning to ask whether the concept of a college education for everyone is a good idea.

Lincoln Gordon, president of Johns Hopkins University, has called for "the abolition of compulsory studenthood," blaming economic and social pressures for putting a large number of students in college who would rather not be there.

"Can we honestly observe," he asks, "our vast proliferation of junior and senior colleges and universities — our eight million enrolled youngsters — without very mixed feelings?"

"On the one hand these institutions are a national glory; on the other, significant numbers of their students are restless and rebellious, wondering why they are really there. Instead of joy in learning, this group feels itself captured and purposeless."

It is true that many students are forced into college, not by their desires, but by the insistence of many employers upon a college diploma before they will consider an applicant, and by well-meaning

parents who look upon college as a status symbol.

Dr. Gordon does not look upon the academic scene with a jaundiced eye. But he does see the student as the prime product of the education process and the one individual who must commit himself to its disciplines if he is to gain anything from it.

"None can be well served," he said, "unless the student is a voluntary and eager partner in the advancement of learning. This can hardly be expected of the compulsory student."

Colleges should have a flexible admissions policy, he believes, which would accept students who have gone out into the world of work for a while before deciding to go to college. Many young people, when they have faced the reality of the working world, will develop the desire to further their formal education.

At that point they will be less inclined to disrupt the learning process for others. One might also note that the compulsory student who spends his years on campus scrapping for grades rather than assimilating knowledge has gained little of what a sheepskin ought to represent.

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WASHINGTON (NEA) — The Nixon administration has no intention of involving the United States in any big way in the main Laotian war in that country's northern and Mekong river border sectors.

There are things about our present involvement which the President has not disclosed and will not disclose. He has made

this clear to any careful reader of his public utterances on Laos.

But anyone who inquires in knowledgeable quarters, as I have done, can gain persuasive assurance that the "secret" things we are doing in Laos are not of a high order of magnitude. In other words, we are not engaged in some massive war

enterprise that is unknown to some key circles as, variously, grossly ignorant, politically-motivated, or irresponsible.

Those senators and others who are responsibly voicing concern over Laos are respected here for reasonable vigilance aimed at avoiding the kind of drift that led us into heavy engagement in Vietnam. There are other senators, however, who are viewed in

a few crucial government points without convincing the Laotian leadership (and us) that they are bent on seizing the entire country.

By the same token, a "final crisis" would not necessarily be precipitated if the Reds chose to occupy their long abandoned seats in the tripartite government (rightist-neo-nationalist-Communist) established by the 1963 Geneva accords.

Every indication is that if they choose this course, they would also demand some demands on the ground that they since have taken some neutral territory.

Confidence exists in qualified quarters here that Souvanna Phouma and his government in such circumstances still would have the political strength to resist a full Red takeover by this alternate means.

Our government's goal, as stated privately and publicly, is to keep vital portions of government Laos continuously free, both for its own sake and as a buffer against Red broads into big Thailand.

We keep hoping that Hanoi does not want all of Laos (it could be a huge headache) but sees its presently held Laotian soil as a buffer protecting North Vietnam.

### A Costly Error

WASHINGTON (NEA) — In 1958, a South Vietnamese diplomat in Phnom Penh, Cambodia, gathered up some weapons he had stored in his room, disguised himself in the clothes of a peasant and went out into the streets for an appointment with men who were plotting a coup against Prince Sihanouk.

The diplomat was caught. He had disguised himself carefully.

But he had ventured forth to his clandestine meeting driving the official car of the South Vietnamese embassy.

From that day to this, Sihanouk has not trusted Saigon. For the plotter was the personal representative and close associate of President Ngo Dinh Diem, then head of the government of South Vietnam.

This misfortune has been most unfortunate for South Vietnam and for the United States.

Perhaps Sihanouk would have been as suspicious of South Vietnam in any event. For the Cambodians have never felt secure in their kingdom, Thailand, to the west, ruled Cambodia as a province for many years, most recently by one of Sihanouk's own uncles (a Thai). Since Cambodia's independence, Sihanouk has "uncovered" a series of "plots" that proved to his satisfaction that his Thai relatives were out to dislodge him.

As this reporter knows from first-hand knowledge, they weren't. But Sihanouk would not be convinced.

Despite this record of distrust, an acquaintance of this reporter who was in the South Vietnamese diplomat's room, in Phnom Penh shortly before the arrest, is convinced that if it had not been for unfortunate acts of this man, South Vietnam's relations with Cambodia, this past decade would have been much closer.

That could have changed the course of the war.

Without Cambodia's rice and imports for their troops and

without the safe haven of their Cambodian sanctuary, the Communists would have

had a very rough time indeed in the Delta of South Vietnam,

where 40 per cent of the Vietnamese farmers live.

### Chalk Eater

Dear Dr. Thosteson: I have a strange habit of eating white chalk, the kind used on blackboards at school. Is there any harm in eating it? I am 14. — J.B.

No harm in eating it, but the fact that you want to eat it may have some significance. May not.

This trait of eating odd substances is called "pica" (pronounced PEER-uh). Some people eat clay, especially in the South; many eat laundry starch. Quite a few have a habit of eating ice cubes or frost from refrigerators, or lettuce, or other things.

Among the various materials that the body may be lacking, iron and calcium are quite common. The fact that you like chalk might indicate the latter, because chalk contains a lot of calcium, although I doubt that your digestive apparatus could absorb much if any calcium from the chalk. How much milk do you drink? And how about vegetables and fruit? All of them contain calcium, and if you increase your milk-fruit-vegetable intake, you might find that you lose the craving for chalk. It's worth a try.

My recommendation, therefore, is that you have a health checkup, including a simple blood test which will show readily enough whether you are anemic (lack iron in your blood).

I have in mind the experience of one reader of this column, a woman who acquired a tremendous taste for lettuce, and would eat a whole head of it a day or more. She finally went to her doctor and found that she was anemic. This was soon corrected and she stopped eating lettuce.

Don't take chances with "idiotry trouble." It may be only minor, but it can be dangerous. Read Dr. Thosteson's booklet, "Your Kidneys—Facts You Need To Know About Them." 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It so happens that lettuce contain a good bit of iron, so her taste buds were leading her to go about stopping the use of a pep pill that I have been using for 14 years? — Mrs. T.L.

After that long, the habit is probably much ingrained, so you'll have to use some will power to quit. However, the pills are not addictive, and there seldom are severe withdrawal symptoms as there are with narcotics. The way to go about stopping is to stop gradually.

## Wyoming Power Plant Is Biggest In History

When Pacific Power and Light Co., and Idaho Power Co., complete construction of their \$600 million Jim Bridger Power Plant 35 miles northeast of Rock Springs, it will be one of the largest investments in Pacific Power's 60 years of history.

The three-unit, 1.5-million-kilowatt plant will be constructed to serve rapidly increasing demand for electric energy in Wyoming, Idaho and the Pacific Northwest, according to spokesman for both companies.

Idaho Power will receive an output of 500,000 kilowatts and Pacific Power an output of one million kilowatts.

The plant was named for the 19th century Rocky Mountain explorer, trapper and trader, "to recognize his association with the opening of the West," company officials said.

"The name Jim Bridger is associated with virtually every stage of early exploration and settlement in this historic part of Wyoming," they said.

The proposed power plant will be located about three miles west of a coal field leased by the two companies from Union Pacific Railroad, the federal government, and the state of Wyoming lands.

The coal field is comprised of 15,000 acres with seams up to 30 feet thick. It will be mined by surface methods and hauled to the plant by rail.

"As mining is completed in area, company officials said, soil banks will be graded in the areas seeded with native grasses and legumes."

The three units will burn a maximum of 750 tons of coal per hour or an equivalent to 150 rail cars each day. The plant is expected to utilize 6.5 million tons of coal annually and about 115 million tons over the estimated life of the plant.

Water for the plant will be supplied from storage in the Fontenelle Reservoir on the Green River. Fifty miles downstream, near the town of Green River, the water will be

## Recall At Lewiston Is Filed

LEWISTON (UPI) — The Lewiston City Council was presented Monday night with petitions to recall all seven members of the city's ruling body.

The petitions, which were certified by the city clerk, each contained 364 valid signatures calling for a recall election of the council members. Only 320 valid signatures were needed to make the petitions legal.

Under Interpretation of the state law by Attorney General Robert Robson, the council now has 40 days in which to schedule the election.

Until Robson's informal opinion last week, the council had felt it could wait until the next scheduled election before holding the recall vote. That election would not come until November 1970.

The petitions were circulated by the Orchards Community Project, a group of persons living in the Lewiston Orchards area annexed into the city last winter. The group feels the area in the south and eastern portion of the city with a population of about 10,000 has no representation on the council.

The project, which fought annexation for over two years, has indicated that if control of the council is gained by its members in the upcoming election, the area can be removed from the city.

using old-fashioned leads, it just would be easier this modern way.

Without that king play, declarer would go out the dummy's diamond suit and would collect at least nine tricks. Against the king play, the best declarer can do is take dummy's ace immediately and lead out the king of diamonds. East must continue the dummy killing campaign by ducking the king also. After this series of plays by East, South will have to struggle along without the rest of the diamond suit. Assuming the defenders play carefully, he will be able to collect more than eight tricks and will wind up one short of his game.

This particular play is usually called the Merrimac coup, although many authorities consider it to be a variation of the Deschappelles coup. In any event, this play consists of the sacrifice of a high honor to kill an entry to dummy.

One of the ultra-modern lead conventions is that the lead of the jack against a no-trump contract is either from ace-queen-jack or the top of the suit. In other words, it can't be from ace-jack-10 or king-deuce-10.

We don't like this convention, because we have noted that the special information given is likely to be of more value to declarer than to partner. Still, it would work pretty well today since East could be sure that he would hold both the king and queen of hearts. Therefore, East's analysis of the hand would be clear-cut and his plan of "How to beat the contract" would depend on an immediate shift to the king of clubs at trick two.

A good East would probably come to the same conclusion if his partner was TIZZY.
