## Samuelson May Change Views On White Clouds

HAILEY — Governor Don Samuelson said in Halley Tuesday he would withdraw his support of mining operations in the White Clouds area if it is proven through study that more money will be brought into the state in the long run should the area be used for recreation. The comment was in response to a question submitted by Richard Meyer, a designer-planner from Ketchum. In the same line of questioning, the governor agreed that he would "go along with the recommendations made by the Forest Service at the completion of an ecology study presently under way at the area."

## 1970 Census Underway And Valley Residents Counted

The 1970 census started today and for the next month men and women will be going door to door selling America and not household items. The census, according to officials, lets government know where America has been, where it is now and where it will be in the future, barring anything unforeseen. The census '70 short form has been sent to all homes in Magic Valley and people are now asked to fill out those forms and hold on to them until the census taker calls. At every fifth household the census taker will ask detailed questions and fill out a long form. All questions will be confidential.

## Training Fund Given To CSI

A grant of \$90,000 for training the jobless and under-employed in Idaho was announced Tuesday by the office of Sen. Len B. Jordan, R-Idaho. The Michigan Development and Training Act funds are being made available to IDDES. The funds will be administered through the College of Business Administration and the Idaho Department of Employment.

CASABLANCA, Morocco (UPI) — A Royal Air Maroc jetliner bound for Paris with 76 passengers and a crew of six crashed today during its approach for a brief stop at Casablanca. First reports listed 92 persons dead and 29 survivors, many of them badly burned in the flaming wreckage of the twin-jet Caravelle.

## Death Toll In Turkey Increases

GEDIZ, Turkey (UPI) — Rescue workers fought a desperate battle today to save off a rising death toll from post-earthquake casualties. New tremors shudder through flooded and snowbound Western Turkey for the fourth successive day and isolated villagers sent urgent radio appeals for clothing, food and shelter. The latest official casualty toll puts the number of deaths at 926 and injured at 606. An official said injuries were fewer because "this earthquake killed you if you were at home and left you alone if you were outside."

## 6 Minidoka Youths Get Prison Terms

RUPERT — Six Minidoka county youths, one of them a girl, have been sentenced to terms in the Idaho state prison for drug conviction. Judge Sherman Bellwood dealt harshly with the matter and said Wednesday morning that after "extensive study and soul searching" he feels probation or commitment to the Youth Training Center at St. Anthony "would not be appropriate." "In various ways I have been given the impression that some of your friends and acquaintances outside of probation measures for drug violations and those same people have strong feelings that probation will be granted in these cases," the judge said.

## Report Hijackers Starving Hostages

SEOUL (UPI) — South Korean and Japanese authorities took a tough attitude today toward a band of radical Japanese students who hijacked a Japanese airliner and demanded it be flown to North Korea. The equally tough hijackers were reported starving their 100 hostages. The Boeing 727 jet has remained at Seoul's Kimpo Airport since it landed at 3:16 p.m. Tuesday (1:16 a.m. EST) in a contest of wills between the sword-waving hijackers who have threatened to blow up the plane and officials intent on freeing the passengers and crew.

## Medina Is Charged With All Killings At My Lai

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Capt. Ernest L. Medina was accused today by the Army of responsibility for all of the alleged murders of Vietnamese civilians at My Lai on March 16, 1968. Medina, commander of the Army company that swept into the village, previously was accused of concealing evidence of the alleged massacre. Four individual charges of murder placed against him at that time, plus one of maiming, still stand. The original charge was brought March 17.

## Plea For End To Air Strike Being Ignored

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Air traffic controllers greeted a boycott issued Tuesday by thousands of angry telephone calls rejecting the idea, a controller, official said today. "There are no indications the controllers will end their week-long sit-down," said Robert Sturgill, spokesman for the 7,000-member Professional Air Traffic Controllers Organization (PATCO). Sturgill did not rule out the possibility the controllers may change their mind. "We will have to wait and see what happens today," he said. "There appeared to be little improvement so far as the air traveler was concerned. Hundreds of flights remained canceled because of government traffic quotas set up after the walk-out started and flights from New York's three major airports were up to two and one-half hours late leaving. Today the Federal Aviation Administration reported no appreciable change in the number of air controllers still absent at its important control center in LaGuardia, N.Y. The agency said 30 of the 71 men scheduled for duty on the first shift today called in sick, not substantially different from the 41 of 80 absent the day before. The week-to-week plea came Tuesday from lawyer F. Lee Bailey, executive director of report would be PATCO. Bailey, facing a contempt of court hearing Tuesday on charges of encouraging the controllers' job boycott, issued a carefully worded statement urging a mass strike action to stop Bailey from the government claim the sick-out is an illegal strike. He contends the controllers here are legitimately sick from fatigue.

"This elm was planted by the poet's grandfather, General Peter Wadsworth, shortly after the Revolutionary War," said a spokesman for the show. "It was the last of its kind in the area."

Howard, president and general manager of Scripps Howard Newspapers. Oiva Munkki, Finnish ambassador to the United States, made the presentation to Howard in a formal ceremony at the St. Regis Hotel here. Howard received the order of the Lion of Finland, a white cross with a lion symbol attached to a red ribbon, in recognition of his "contribution toward Finnish-American understandings." Munkki said:

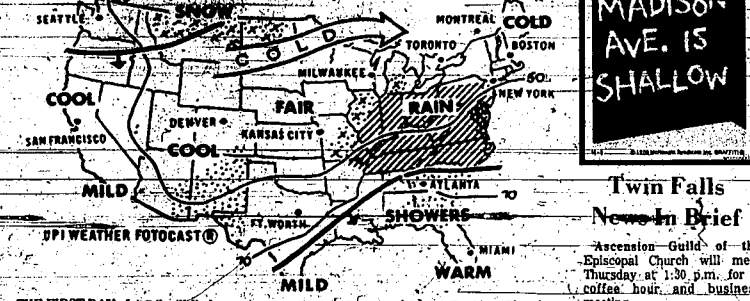
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Daily Weather Report

Barn, So Man Has To Pay Fine

A week ago Twin Falls County Probate Judge Eugene McCoy gave a fine of \$15 for return two cats to their owner within 10 days. Tuesday the man, Dale Bigelow, paid the fine. He pleaded guilty a week ago of taking two cats from Fern Hanchey. One of the cats was pregnant and at the time the judge was asked about the possibility of there being more than two cats to return. The judge said he would cross that bridge when he came to it. Now it seems one of the cats was hit in a road and killed. The pregnant cat is hiding under a barn near Mr. Bigelow's home at 204 Washington St. N. and as Judge McCoy said Tuesday, "Anyone knows it's hard to get hold of a mother cat under a barn while she's delivering kittens. The 10 day period would be long gone, and so would most of the cats, or kittens, I suspect." Next Christmas

Walking into church Easter Sunday we were greeted by a friend with the comment: "Well, look who is here. I'll probably see you again at Christmas."

And he was probably right. But why? It is no longer a universal thought that the Sabbath is a day of rest, of some soul-searching and of religious meditation.

We live in a world of chaos. We are more concerned with today than we are for tomorrow. Going to church has become fashionable on certain days and so we go to church on those days.

We live in a country where even laws suppress religious activities. We live in a country where little accepted things, like the reading of a Bible verse at the start of a school day in public schools, is no longer permitted.

to carry much weight and there have been concerted drives to have it removed entirely. In this everyday world in which we live, the Bible is being ignored.

We are people more concerned with how we look than how we think. We are more concerned with what we have in the bank than what we have in our heart.

Our very being is much like the line in the religious song which goes "The night is dark and I am far from home."

So it might be that Easter could be a time other than the observance of the Resurrection of Jesus Christ. It might well be used to signal the start of a new period in living, in believing, in accomplishing, in a return to the basic concepts which our forefathers had.

On Easter Sunday the pastor we listened to said that Easter gives the promise of "new lives for old ones."

It could well be just that. Or will we see you next Christmas?

Sound Off

In light of the continuing turmoil on campuses and the obvious boredom of a segment of the student population, more educators are beginning to ask whether the concept of a college education for everyone is a good idea.

Lincoln Gordon, president of Johns Hopkins University, has called for "the abolition of compulsory studenthood," blaming economic and social pressures for putting a large number of students in college who would rather not be there.

"Can we honestly observe," he asks, "our vast proliferation of junior and senior colleges and universities — our eight million enrolled youngsters — without very mixed feelings?"

On the one hand these institutions are a national glory; on the other, significant numbers of their students are restless and rebellious, wondering why they are really there.

It is true that many students are forced into college, not by their desire, but by the insistence of many employers upon a college diploma before they will consider an applicant, and by well-meaning

parents who look upon college as a status symbol.

Dr. Gordon does not look upon the academic scene with a jaundiced eye. But he does see the student as the prime product of the education process and the one individual who must commit himself to its disciplines if he is to gain anything from it.

"None can be well served," he said, "unless the student is a voluntary and eager partner in the advancement of learning. This can hardly be expected of the compulsory student."

Colleges should have a flexible admissions policy, he believes, which would accept students who have gone out into the world of work for a while before deciding to go to college.

At that point they will be less inclined to disrupt the learning process for others. One might also note that the compulsory student who spends his years on campus scrounging for grades rather than assimilating knowledge has gained little of what a sheepskin ought to represent.

The Risk Study

After a two-year study of 10,000 workers in the Chicago area, the American Heart Association has concluded that three out of 10 of those studied are high-risk candidates for a heart attack.

Those who possessed two or more of these factors were considered high risk candidates, or had twice the chance of an attack as those possessing no risk factors.

Cigarette smoking, high blood pressure, high cholesterol levels in the blood, overweight, diabetes and the heart's electrical activity were the six factors used in the study.

Because many persons refused to volunteer for the test, the association says the Chicago sampling could not be expanded for large-scale averaging, which could produce either better or worse results.

As the world's population continues to drop in age, extended suffrage to the under-21 age group is becoming more popular. The latest country to take the step is Britain, which gave both the voting franchise and responsibility for financial transactions to 18-year-olds last Jan. 1.

Discussions are underway in Canada and the United States over the 18-year-old vote. Many Latin countries have changed to the lower voting age and others are scheduled to make the change later this year.

What effect adding millions of teenagers to the voting lists will have at the polls is the question politicians would like to have answered.

KILL OR CURE

President Asa S. Knowles of Northeastern University in Boston thinks the student rebellion on the nation's college and university campuses might eventually turn out to have been a healthy thing.

On the other hand, he warns, it could very well destroy these institutions. As they used to say to nervous draftees in the Army, one of two things will happen: You'll either get killed in the war or you'll be in either case, you'll have nothing to worry about.

WASHINGTON (NEA) — The Nixon administration — has no intention of involving the United States in any big way in the maul Laotian war in that country's northern and Mekong river border sectors.

There are things about our present involvement which the President has not disclosed and will not disclose. He has made

this clear to any careful reader of his public utterances on Laos. But anyone who inquires in knowledgeable quarters, as I have done, can gain persuasive assurance that the "secret" things we are doing in Laos are not of a high order of magnitude. In other words, we are not engaged in some massive war

enterprise that is unknown to the U.S. public. Those senators and others who are responsibly voicing concern over Laos are respected here for reasonable vigilance aimed at avoiding the kind of drift that led us into heavy engagement in Vietnam. There are other senators, however, who are viewed in

some key circles as, variously, insidiously ignorant, politically motivated, or irresponsible in their comments on Laos — sometimes to the point of downright dishonesty. Events will make clear who they are.

Obviously the President is not going to alter his policy of partial secrecy to please either the responsible or the irresponsible.

In a quite limited way, we are committed to helping the present Neutralist Laotian government under Prime Minister Souvanna Phouma save important portions of Laos from Communist hands. The Reds already hold roughly two-thirds of Laotian soil.

We will not tell them on the world all we are doing, nor announce for their edification what else we might do in certain eventualities which have not yet arisen.

It can be said with some authority, nevertheless, that we would not necessarily take alarm if the North Vietnamese regulars in Laos move beyond the most westerly forward line the Communists have generally stopped at in the sea-saw battling over the last several years. The Reds might even overrun

a few crucial government strong points without convincing the Laotian leadership (and us) that they are bent on seizing the entire country. By the same token, a "final crisis" would not necessarily be precipitated if the Reds chose to occupy their long abandoned seats in the tripartite government (rightist-neutralist-Communist) established by the 1962 Geneva accords.

Every indication is that if they choose this course, they would also demand some neutralist seats on the ground that they since have taken some neutralist territory.

Confidence exists in qualified quarters here that Souvanna Phouma and his government in such circumstances will have the political strength to resist a full Red takeover by this alternate means.

Our government's goal, as stated privately and publicly, is to help keep vital portions of "government" Laos continuously free, both for its own sake and as a buffer against Red inroads into big Thailand. We keep hoping that Hanoi does not want all of Laos (it could be a huge headache) but also sees its presently held Laotian soil as a buffer protecting North Vietnam.

A Costly Error

WASHINGTON (NEA) — In 1959, a South Vietnamese diplomat in Phnom Penh, Cambodia, gathered up some weapons he had stored in his room, disguised himself in the clothes of a peasant and went out into the streets for an appointment with men who were plotting a coup against Prince Sihanouk.

The diplomat was caught. He had disguised himself carefully. But he had ventured forth to his clandestine meeting driving the official car of the South Vietnamese embassy.

From that day to this, Sihanouk has not trusted Saigon. For the plotter was the personal representative and close associate of President Ngo Dinh Diem, then head of the government of South Vietnam. This mistrust has been most unfortunate for South Vietnam and for the United States.

Perhaps Sihanouk would have been as suspicious of South Vietnam in any event. For the Cambodians have never felt secure in their kingdom, Thailand to the west, ruled Cambodia as a province for many years, most recently by one of Sihanouk's own uncles (a Thai). Since Cambodia's independence, Sihanouk has "unimproved" a series of "plots" that prove to his satisfaction that his relatives were out to displace him.

As this reporter knows from first-hand knowledge, they weren't. But Sihanouk would not be convinced.

Despite this record of mistrust, an acquaintance of this reporter who was in the South Vietnamese diplomatic room in Phnom Penh shortly before the arrest, is convinced that it had not been for unfortunate acts of this man, South Vietnam's relations with Cambodia, this past decade would have been much closer.

Without this war and the North Vietnamese and Viet Cong troops — in many instances have had no place to hide, when heavily pressed by American and South Vietnamese troops.

This is not to say the tiny Cambodian army could have held off the North Vietnamese. But willing cooperation is one thing, forced cooperation another.

Cambodia could have agreed to a selective inspection of goods brought in through Sihanoukville and the Mekong River, which would have forced a heavier load on the dreary Ho Chi Minh trails and on the rail and truck lines from Hanoi to Ho Chi Minh's invading troops in the south.

Ho's men could have taken over the whole country. But they would have found that an intolerable occupation burden while igniting a war in Vietnam.

In short, a priceless opportunity was lost in 1959. To no end.

Birth Control

WASHINGTON — "Eureka," cried Prof. Applebaum in his laboratory the other day. "I have found the answer to the population explosion!"

The professor was working at his blackboard on a very complicated mathematical formula. "I have developed a new birth-control pill!" he exclaimed. "No, it's better than that. I have discovered that in two years no one will want children any more."

"But why, Professor?" "Because they're becoming such a pain in the neck. Look at this equation. Y represents children, Z represents parents. Put Y over Z and it equals X."

"What does X stand for?" "The parents' pain-in-the-neck-throwoid."

Applebaum scribbled furiously on the blackboard. "In 1968 one out of every four couples said of their children: 'Who deaded them!' The first three months of 1970 have shown one out of every two couples asking the question: 'If my calculations are correct and the behavior patterns of the children remain constant, the question may be phrased: 'How many children will I have in the United States?'"

"You can conceivably see people actually giving up their children?" I asked Applebaum. "I'm certain of it," he said. "Look at it from a practical point of view. Why do people have children?"

"I got tired of you!" "Exactly. How many parents do you know who are getting pleasure from their children?" I thought for a long time. "I might guess 10 minutes a day," Applebaum said. "I would assume, with 100 million

any, in the past, people had children not only for the pleasure it gave them, but also for security in their old age. They counted on their children to take care of them in their autumn years. But all this has changed. What is the first thing children want to do now?"

"Leave home."

"Correct. Every child insists he or she wants to be free, and the earlier (the better). So whereas in previous generations parents felt they had produced obedient loved ones, they feel now they are nothing more than breeders of shaggy, hostile, screaming animals straining to get out of their cages."

"But that's terrible," I said. Applebaum showed me a graph. "A recent survey showed that 57 per cent of all adults over 30 years of age said they would rather have a good time than have children."

"How does the younger generation feel about this?" "They're for birth control as well. They know how miserable they are and they can only assume their offspring will be worse."

"The Professor you see a definite decline in the world population?"

"There is no question that the events of the last few years have turned the tide. The scurriler, hairier and dirtier children become, the less reason there seems for anyone to have any."

"What will take their place?"

"Huge piles. As the birth rate declines, there will be an increase in the adoption of pets. Not only are pets easier to handle, but they're less chance of their killing you, what a square you really are."

Chalk Eater

Dear Dr. Thosteson: I have a strange habit of eating white chalk, the kind used on blackboards. At school, is there any harm in eating it? I am 14, J.D.B.

No harm in eating it, but the fact that you want to eat it may have some significance. May or may not.

This trait of eating odd substances is called "pica" (pronounced PEE-ick). Some people eat clay, especially in the South; many eat laundry starch. Quite a few have a habit of eating ice cubes, or frost from refrigerators, or lettuce, or other things.

Among the various materials that the body may be lacking, iron and calcium are quite common. The fact that you like chalk might indicate the latter, because chalk contains a lot of calcium, although I doubt that your digestive apparatus could absorb much if any calcium from the chalk. How much mild do you drink? And how about vegetables and fruit? All of them contain calcium, and if you increase your milk-fruit-vegetable intake, you might find that you lose the craving for chalk. It's worth a try.

My recommendation, therefore, is that you have a health checkup, including a simple blood test which will show readily enough whether you are anemic (lack iron in your blood).

I have included the experience of a reader of this column, a woman who acquired a tremendous taste for lettuce, and would eat a whole head of it a day, or more. She finally went to her doctor and found that she was anemic. This was soon corrected and she stopped wanting such large amounts of lettuce.

It so happens that lettuce contains a good bit of iron, so her taste buds were leading her

In the right direction. However, she still wasn't getting enough iron.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Is it harmful to keep the eyes open when swimming under water, and doing so for a number of years? —G.M.

Can't answer categorically, but can, I think, answer well enough to your purpose.

The eyes are soothed and lubricated by tears, which are 98 per cent water plus traces of minerals, sugar and proteins. Swimming with eyes open washes this protective fluid away. You may or may not notice a mild irritation in a pool, but the chlorine in the water, if it makes the eyes and nose water, there is an excess flow of tears to combat the irritation. If you have been swimming for years and have no sign of conjunctivitis or other irritation of the eyes, then the answer is: no, it is not harmful to you.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: How would one go about stopping the use of a pep pill that I have been using for 14 years? —Mrs. T.L. After that long, the habit is pretty much ingrained, so you'll have to use some will power to quit. However, the pills are not addictive, and there seldom are severe withdrawal symptoms as there are with narcotics. The way to go about stopping is to stop gradually.

Don't take chances with "kidney trouble." It may be only minor, but it can be dangerous. Read Dr. Thosteson's booklet, "Your Kidneys—Facts You Need to Know—About Them."

# T. F. Student Attending Presidential Classroom \$65,000 Program Set To Train 30 Teachers

A Twin Falls High School senior, Chad Allen Schwartz, is one of 300 selected seniors from high schools throughout the nation currently attending a Presidential Classroom for Young Americans in Washington, D.C.

Students for participation in the Presidential Classroom program were selected on a basis of recommendations from their school officials with four from each congressional district.

Thirty prospective teachers from Magic Valley, Southern Idaho will receive training for a year under the Education Professions Development Act (EPDA).

EPDA, begun in Idaho last year as a pilot project conducted in Magic Valley's District 4, has been expanded for 1970-71 to two regions, North Idaho and South Idaho. There were 20 trained last year in the program administered out of Twin Falls by Herb Smith, project administrator. Most

teachers, after receiving short periods of professional training, those who have allowed their certificates to lapse, or a person who could complete requirements for a degree in a year. The program is designed to help meet the critical need of teachers in the state. Funds to the State Board of Education are provided federally through the Office of Education.

Mr. Lythgoe, appearing with his stage assistant, "Richy B.," travels through many states, and plans an appearance in Canada in the near future, performing in schools for the National School Assemblies. He also is the district manager for the assembly agency, and handles a wide variety of other professional entertainers.

He features demonstrations of hypnotism for his school acts in this country, but plans a mixture of magic and hypnotism for a scheduled tour of Canada later this spring, as he will be appearing in elementary "up north," where hypnotism is less appealing.

His hypnotism act is presented in three stages, a lecture on the powers and uses of the science, a demonstration with 16 students from the audience, and a question-and-answer period. The students are good audiences for a performer, Mr. Lythgoe says; "you'd be surprised at the intelligent questions they can ask." They usually pay rapt attention and are generally quite courteous to the performers.

Mr. Lythgoe speaks with experience about audiences; he has performed in many nightclub and gambling casino where audiences are less than courteous.

His appearance in Canada will mark the first time that Canadian schoolchildren have seen a professional hypnotist, though such acts have been appearing in American schools for "40 or 50 years," Mr. Lythgoe says.

He also has appeared on television, with Granny and Jethro of the "Beverly Hillsbillies," put on a show for Red Skelton's son Richard, and has enjoyed a continuing friendship with Alvin Klinker, whom he terms the "nicest man in show business."

He once missed appearing with Art Linkletter because of a conflict in schedules, to his great regret.

"They even had Jack Benny ready to introduce me," he recalls. But he had a tour scheduled on Oklahoma, and he felt that he couldn't disappoint the youngsters—even for Art Linkletter.

Mr. Lythgoe is a highly experienced performer, with 23 years of experience of many types, including a stint as the "Merry Millionaire" about "10 or 11 years ago," appearing on KPIX in Twin Falls and other Southern Idaho stations.

He moved to Twin Falls about two years ago for a number of reasons; the area is in the center of his tour area; he likes Magic Valley hunting and fishing, and perhaps most important, he found a house to his liking.

Speaking of magic as performed professionally, Mr. Lythgoe deems "illusion," such as levitation and "magic boxes" as lacking true talent. "Anybody with enough money can buy the equipment and become a magician overnight," he says.

Only "sleight-of-hand—the 'now you see it, now you don't' act—tests the skills of the magician. Timing is crucial, props are few, but essential, and the audience reacts best to a proper performance.

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# South Hills Water Outlook Is Bright

The snow depth and water content of the snow pack in the South Hills are near or above normal in most all areas, according to the April 1 snow survey.

The snow surveys were made by Twin Falls Soil Conservation District personnel and Reeder Flying Service. A helicopter was used to measure all snow courses.

The soil district's annual water forecast meeting, where the snow surveys are presented, will be held at 8 p.m. Monday in the Hollister Grange.

The snow survey shows that Magic Mountain has 64.4 inches of snow and 23.1 inches of water as compared to 49.5 inches of snow and 18.5 inches of water a year ago. The 27-year average here is 18.5 inches of water.

Headline Ridge has 89.4 inches of snow and 25 inches of water as compared to 58.4 inches of snow and 22.2 inches of water a year ago. The 16-year average here is 21 inches of water.

However, since the survey was made, both Magic and Headline have received 2 1/2 feet of new snow.

The snow depth in Shoshone Basin is 7.5 inches with 3.5 inches of water as compared to 10.8 inches of snow and 7.5 inches of water a year ago. The 15-year average is 2.7 inches of water.

Summitland Springs course measures 81.1 inches of snow with 25.8 inches of water as compared to 81.3 inches of snow and 30 inches of water a year ago. The 15-year average here is 21.9 inches of water.

Pole Creek measures 69.6 inches of snow with 21.7 inches of water. This compares to 61.2 inches of snow and 22.9 inches of water a year ago. The 15-year average is 19.5 inches of water.

The snow depth at Goat Creek is 67.4 inches with 19.3 inches of water as compared to 40.1 inches of snow and 22.6 inches of water last year at this time. The 15-year average here is 18 inches of water.

Cedar Creek snow depth is 32.2 inches of water with 10.4 inches of water as compared to 38.5 inches of snow and 12.5 inches of water a year ago. The 14-year average is 9.9 inches of water.

The survey notes that Bear Creek Meadows has a snow depth of 66.3 inches with 20.7 inches of water. This compares with 75.8 inches of snow and 27.3 inches of water a year ago. The 27-year average here is 20.2 inches of water.

Fox Creek measures 36.2 inches of snow and 10.6 inches of water as compared to 43.0 inches of snow and 16.1 inches of water last year. The 32-year average for water on this course is 10.1 inches.

The snow pack at Red Point measures 43.0 inches with 12.8 inches of water as compared to 29.2 inches of snow and 16.3 inches of water. A nine-year average is 9.4 inches of water.

Wilson Creek snow measures 41.3 inches with 17.7 inches of water as compared to 53.0 inches of snow and 21.4 inches of water a year ago. The nine-year average here is 11.9 inches of water.

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## Noisy Revolutionaries Are Just "Play Acting"

WASHINGTON (UPI)—There may be some alienated youth and embittered blacks who are seriously intent on overthrowing the U.S. government.

But most of the noisy proponents of "revolution" who get so much attention from the news media are merely playing.

That is the judgment of Dr. Robert Brustein, dean of the Yale University Drama School and author of a book on "The Theatre of Revolt."

Theatrical Performances Brustein, writing in the New Republic Magazine, acknowledges he has no special credentials as an expert on revolutions. But he is qualified to recognize a theatrical performance when he sees one, and he thinks that is exactly what he is seeing in the fiery speeches and demonstrative demonstrations of new left youth and ultra-militant blacks.

If Brustein's observations are valid, they suggest that the greatest danger in the current climate of confrontation is that thousands of social order may never react, invoking violently expressive measures to deal with a "threat" that really is not very sinister.

Brustein says the news media have displayed an "astounding hospitality" to expressions of radical views, including open calls for revolution.

Although, this has been upsetting to some of the staid citizenry, including high officials of the Nixon administration, it has served a valuable safety-valve purpose, permitting angry minorities to vent frustrations which in a closed society might lead to genuine revolutionary action.

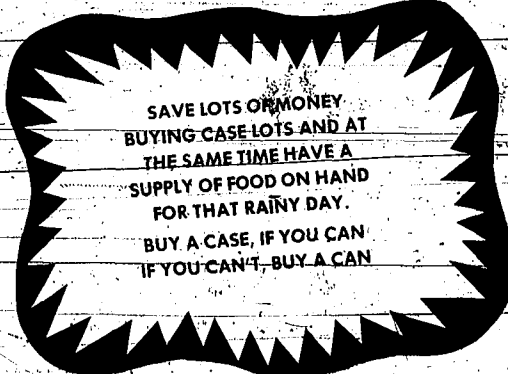
Plenty Wrong Brustein is no timorous conservative whistling his way past the graveyard. He sees plenty wrong with American society, and wishes that impatient young idealists were coming forward with genuinely innovative programs for reform.

Instead, he says, what they have to offer is violent but empty talk and "demonstrations" that actually are theatrical events staged for the TV cameras.

He suggests it is time for the public and the news media to "turn away from these playactors" and give other, less histrionic, young people a chance to express, in their quieter ways, the "genuine warmth and decency" that this generation still retains.

# Milwaukee Brewers Born As Referee Gives Nod To Sale

SEATTLE (UPI) — A Federal Bankruptcy Court referee granted owners of the financial-plagued Seattle Pilots permission Tuesday night to sell their one-year-old American League baseball franchise to Milwaukee interests.

Sidney C. Vollin, the bankruptcy court referee to whom the Pilots turned for help out of their financial morass, ruled a \$10.8 million offer for the purchase of the club by the Milwaukee Brewers was in order.

Since the American League had voted approval for transfer of the club from Seattle to Milwaukee at a telephone conference call Monday, the Pilots became the Milwaukee Brewers upon Vollin's consent.

The Brewers had signed a purchase agreement for the Pilots on March 8 and the agreement was to expire at 10 a.m. CST Wednesday.

Thus, Milwaukee, without a big league club since the Braves moved to Atlanta four years ago, rejoined baseball's select group, only this time as a member of the American League.

For Seattle, it marked one of the shortest lived franchises in the history of baseball. You have to go all the way back to the turn of the century to find another city which held a big league franchise for so short a time. The Pilots reportedly lost \$1 million in their one and only season in Seattle and stood to lose another \$1.5 million if they remained there this year.

Vollin's ruling came after a last ditch effort for dismissal of the case from bankruptcy court by William Dwyer, special Washington state assistant attorney general, was turned down.

Vollin listened to testimony day long in a steamy, hot court room before calling a halt at 3:50 p.m. PST. He set the next hearing for 10 a.m. Wednesday, but was reminded that he ran the clock voiding the contract entered into by the Pilots and Brewers. It was, then, that he said he would reach a decision Tuesday night.

Left standing is an anti-trust suit filed by the city of Seattle and the state of Washington seeking \$2 million in damages from the American League for the loss of Seattle baseball fans, among them U.S. Sen. Warren Magnuson and Henry Jackson. The two have said they will move for enactment of a bill which would do away with baseball's immunity from the anti-trust laws, which the sport has enjoyed since a 1922 Supreme Court ruling.

The American League came out of the mess with egg on its face and William Dwyer and Dewey and Max Soriano principal Pilots owners, with a \$1 million profit for holding the franchise just one year.

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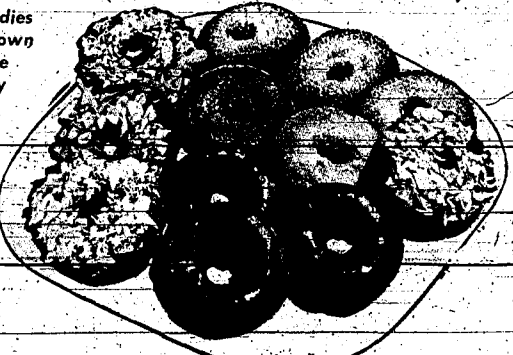
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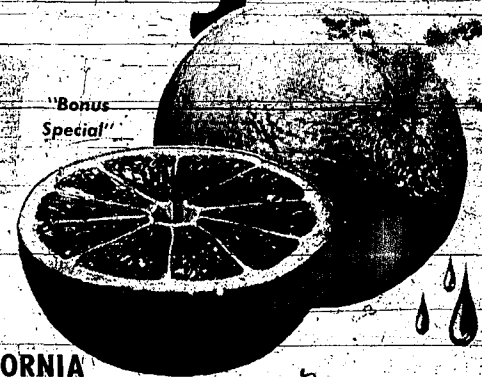

Without that king play, declarer would go about the business of setting up dummy's diamond suit and would collect at least nine tricks. Against the king play, the best declarer can do is take dummy's ace immediately and lead out the king of diamonds. East must continue the dummy's king in a campaign—by ducking the second ace. After this series of plays, East, South will have to struggle along with out the rest of the diamond suit. Assuming the defenders play carefully, he will not be able to collect more than eight tricks and will wind up one short of his game.

This particular play is usually called the Merrimac coup, although many authors consider it to be a variation of the Deschappelles coup. In any event, this play consists of the sacrifice of a high honor to kill an entry to dummy.
