Pakistanis Mull Fate In Ballot

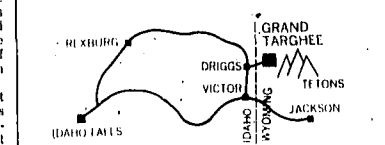
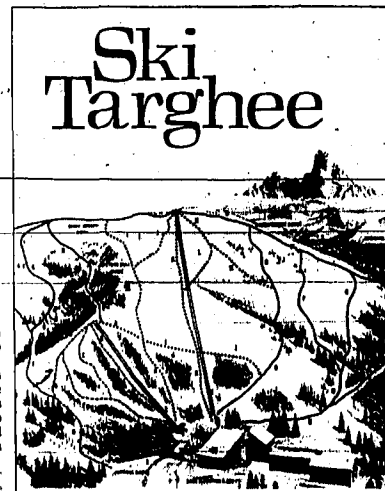
DACCA, East Pakistan (UPI)—With elections scheduled by President General A. M. Yahya Khan for next October, Pakistanis are already asking: "Will East Pakistan secede from Pakistan?"

Separated by 1,000 miles of Indian territory from the west wing, East Pakistan has 56 percent of the nation's 126-million population and is determined to achieve full-fledged autonomy.

The deadly confrontation between the two wings of powers has a touch of resemblance to the situation which incited Biafra to break away from Nigeria.

The parallel has a twist, for it is the industrial and textile Punjab of West Pakistan, with just control over the army and emergency, who forms the most capable administrators of the world's largest Moslem nation.

The Bengali-speaking East Pakistanis feel the West has achieved economic self-sufficiency at their cost, and that it is a West Pakistan which is now waiting for an excuse to say "khuda hafiz" (goodbye).

Local photo fans will have an opportunity to inspect some of the world's leading color slide work in a special exhibit and program Sunday at 8 p.m. in the Idaho Power Co. auditorium.

These were selected from the 12th Idaho International Photographic Exhibit held in Boise April 10 and were judged as the best from some 2,411 slides submitted from throughout the United States as well as from France, England, Mexico, Canada, Luxembourg, Austria, Guatemala, and two Iron Curtain countries.

In addition to a display of beautiful photo work, the show offers amateur photographers and professionals an opportunity to compare results. Those selected by experts as the best in various fields.

Fund For Fires Is Sought

BOISE (UPI) — Idaho's State Board of Examiners gave the Land Department permission today to transfer \$40,000 from its forest protection fund into its emergency fund.

Commissioner Gordon Trombley wrote the board that his department faces the 1970 fire season "with very doubtful financing both from the standpoint of emergency fire funds and operating costs in the prevention and pre-suppression activities."

He said the 1969 fire season, which was not abnormally expensive, cost the department \$138,493 of its biennial appropriation of \$170,000, leaving \$31,507. He asked that the balance be augmented with the transfer from the forest balance in the forest protection fund.

Of the \$40,000, Trombley plans to spend \$32,496 on salaries and wages and \$7,504 on other current expense.

In other action, the board: — Turned down requests for retroactive pay increases by three departments, following a policy established earlier in that regard.

— Rejected a claim of \$25 by Senate Secretary Art Wilson for delivering bills to the secretary of state March 28 on grounds no funds were appropriated for that purpose.

Gave the Department of Law Enforcement authority to destroy 14 H & R Rising machine guns which are surplus and not serviceable and, because of federal firearms regulations, cannot be sold.

LDS Members Asked To Help

SALT LAKE CITY (UPI) — Members of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints entering military service were told Sunday to make the most of the experience to help others.

During the first of the pre-service orientation sessions for young Mormons, President Harold B. Lee, first counselor in the First Presidency, said in a taped message, "The armed services provide great opportunity and challenge for you to be a positive influence on your associates."

The theme of service was stressed in another taped message by Elder Boyd K. Packer of the Council of the Twelve. Packer counseled the men "to use your time wholly. Never again will you have so much free time on your hands."

Irish Vote Marks Turning Point In National History

BELFAST (UPI)—The Rev. Ian Paisley's election triumph sent a chill through Roman Catholic hearts, but it also marked an historic turning point in Northern Ireland politics.

When the Protestant militant leader won the Bannside by-election last Thursday and his running mate, the Rev. William Beattie, captured the South Antrim seat, their victories set the seal on a quiet grass-roots revolution within the ruling Unionist party against the government's policies of reform.

Paisley's victory has been described as a vote for bigotry and intolerance, as a vote to bring street politics into the Northern Ireland Parliament, as a step back into centuries past.

Brought To Surface — It was all these things and more. But it brought to the surface what had been fomenting in the hearts and minds of the rank and file members of the Unionist party for many months.

In effect, it meant the once all-powerful monolithic structure of the Unionist party was fragmenting, with Paisley capturing the traditional "hard line" sectarian working class Protestant vote.

For nearly half a century the Unionist party had dominated the political scene, undisputed master of the six northeastern counties which form the part of the United Kingdom known as Ulster.

The Roman Catholic minority, roughly one-third of the population, existed as a depressed section of the community, part of it but not accepted by it.

A sense of power and privilege was transmitted to the rank and file of the Unionist party. The Protestant working man looked upon himself as superior to his Catholic neighbor even though all he shared was a common poverty.

The civil rights campaign which exploded on the streets in October of 1968 changed many things. For the first time in centuries Catholics demanded and received social and political reforms.

Unease and uncertainty gripped the working class Protestant. He saw cherished traditions disappear. He felt his position of privilege being threatened. He grew restive and distrustful of the government and the Unionist party, feeling there had been a "sell out" to the Catholic minority.

He looked for a voice that would champion his cause, that would hold on to the past, that would assure him of his superiority. In the Rev. Ian Paisley he found such a voice.

CSI Teams To Race In Boise River Contest

Four or five teams from College of Southern Idaho organizations will participate Saturday in the annual Raft Races sponsored by Boise State College in Boise.

Jack Sims, student activities director, said the CSI teams will be competing against ones from colleges and universities throughout Idaho and surrounding states. The races will begin at 1 p.m. at Barber Bridge on the Boise River.

'Fair' News Sought

NEW YORK (UPI)—The traditional journalistic canon that all news should be treated fairly and objectively is necessary now more than ever before, Dr. S.I. Hayakawa said today.

Hayakawa, president of San Francisco State College, addressed the annual convention of the American Newspaper Publishers Association (ANPA). "Please keep up the objectivity," he said. "Honest to goodness, the country does need you."

He cited the case of college underground newspapers which never use the word policeman but only refer to the police as "pigs." In the case of these papers, the young editors and their readers "don't feel the need to be objective anymore," Hayakawa said.

Hayakawa said that sometimes he noted such nonobjective tendencies in the regular press. He said he felt there may be a need for a greater balance on newspaper staffs.

"There's something very pernicious about a liberal arts education," he said, adding that it tended to develop an "elitist mind" which tended to have contempt for middle class values and for people such as truck drivers and investment bankers.

"I implore you to look into your hiring practice unguessed."

Children Released By Reds

HELMSTEDT, Germany (UPI)—East German news agency said the five children aboard a light plane forced down by MIG fighters in Communist territory Sunday. The pilot and father of one of the children were held.

ADN, the East German news agency said the two men would be kept "until violation of East German airspace is clarified." The agency said the pilot, Helmut Siemens, ignored several radio orders to land and later told East German officials he lost his way.

The pilot of the Cessna 170 had taken the children on a high altitude flight to try to cure their whooping cough. Many German doctors recommend such flights for the affliction.

Aerocar Offers Answer

LONGVIEW, Wash. (UPI)—You hear a roar in the sky and look up—then do a double-take. Could that be an automobile flying around up there?

It sure is. It's M.B. "Molt" Taylor's Aerocar. He has spent the last 22 years developing it, suffering the snickers of the unbelievers.

But if he can get it into mass production, at a price around \$10,000 and fully approved by the Federal Aviation Agency, he figures he'll have the last laugh.

"It is obvious that today's airports just can't handle the demands being placed upon them by commercial as well as private aviation interests," he said. "And it is just as obvious that the country's highway system, despite the freeways, also is becoming obsolete. 'I think I have the solution to both problems.'"

His solution, of course, is his Aerocar which he now custom-makes in his Longview shop at a cost of about \$30,000 apiece.

"If I could get it into mass production," the 57-year-old inventor explained, "I believe a whole new concept of transportation would open up: The public would become involved and it would follow that the government would begin seeing things in a different light."

The trouble is that mass production of anything requires capital, a lot of capital, and according to Taylor, "There just aren't that many millionaires around anymore."

"On the ground, the Aerocar resembles a glint grasshopper with its wings folded. It cruises at 70 miles an hour on the freeway and 120 mph in the air. The wings and tail fold up to form a trailer. The automobile, squat and streamlined, is equipped with all the accessories of a sports car.

The tail assembly is attached to its stern; the wings, which are hooked onto the tail assembly, are unfolded, and the craft is ready for take-off. The propeller is on the tail assembly.

The four wheels are fully retractable. They are extended for take-off and landing, partly retractable for road travel for stability reasons, and are fully retracted in flight.

Taylor's current operating model is the seventh he has constructed. It has a range of 500 miles, weighs 1,500 pounds empty and has a gross weight of 2,100 pounds. It's 143-horsepower engine gets 15 miles per gallon on the road and uses eight gallons of gasoline an hour in the air.

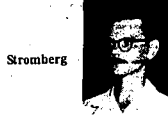

Union May Halt Press At 'Times'

NEW YORK (UPI)—The printers' union planned to put firmers—pressure—on—their demands for a new contract today, increasing the possibility of a shutdown by The New York Times.

Bertram A. Powers, president of Typographical Union No. 6, said Monday the union members would lengthen their "chapel" meetings in the Times' composing room where the printers have been concentrating their pressure tactics.

The printers' union is one of 10 seeking new contracts with The Times, Daily News, New York Post and Long Island Press in negotiations punctuated by interruptions and strike threats.

Negotiations resumed after a three-day lull Monday, and chief mediator Theodore W. Kheel said the posture of bargaining grew more critical each day.

Jets Miss Collision In Britain

LONDON (UPI)—Two jet airliners with 224 persons aboard almost collided in flight over London April 7, spokesmen for the two airlines involved said today.

One plane was a Trans World Airlines Boeing 707 jet arriving from New York with 139 passengers and eight crewmen aboard. The other was a British Overseas Airways Corp. VC10 taking off from Heathrow for Tel Aviv, Tehran and New Delhi, with 47 passengers and 10 crewmen.

A TWA spokesman said its pilot, Capt. William Piper, spotted a BOAC plane and "took avoiding action." Asked about reports he had dived to avoid a collision the spokesman said the pilot "made a course correction."

A BOAC spokesman said the VC10 pilot, Capt. W.C. Robertson, had made a report but "we cannot make any further comment."

UAW Asks Control Of Pollution

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J. (UPI)—The United Auto Workers today called for an environmental bill of rights for Americans and said they will make pollution control an issue in their contract talks this year with the nation's auto makers.

"Industry must be forced to accept responsibility for cleaning up pollution and wastes its processes and products have created," the union said in a resolution adopted at its convention.

"An environmental bill of rights must be enacted that will guarantee every person the inalienable right to a decent environment," the resolution said.

The more than 3,000 delegates representing some 1.8 million members of the union acknowledged that the automobile is one of the worst polluters and said "a right to a clean air must be imposed upon the auto industry to develop an engine that will not pollute the air."

On the second day of the UAW convention, delegates were warned by Sen. Gaylord Nelson, D-Wisc., that in a few years they may have to clean their water for re-use several times a day and wear sun masks to go outside in metropolitan areas.

Raindrops Keep Falling On My Head: Mel Tormé (Capitol \$ 4.99)
Although Mel Tormé is normally one of the best singers in the business, he overstepped his talents in this new album. An excellent balladeer from the old school of singing, Tormé deftly handles the slower tunes in this album, but almost all the up tempo tunes are atrocious. "Take A Letter Maria" and "Sunshine Superman" and "Into Something" are three tunes which he stumbles over. Several others are marginally acceptable.

He handles songs like "Traoes" and "Requiem: 820 Lullaby" and "You've Made Me So Very Happy" with his traditional perfection.

Other normally up tempo tunes like "Spinning Wheel" and the title tune are keyed down a couple of notches and are well sung.

A rather weird album, displaying the talents of an obscure guitarist who must fancy himself as some sort of gypsy aficionado of the guitar.

Defense Budget Should Bear Brunt Of Reduction

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Rep. Roman C. Pucinski, D-Ill., Tuesday proposed that the defense budget—not education—bear the cost of the "impact" of military installations on nearby schools.

This was the original purpose of the program of aid to "federally impacted areas" that has since been extended to cover all kinds of federal establishments and even U. S. forest lands.

Pucinski said it has become more and more apparent to him that where the impact is traceable to military activity it should be paid out of the defense budget instead of the budget for aid to schools.

Pucinski made the proposal during a hearing before his House education and labor subcommittee on an administration bill which would remove a newly added form of impact aid—public housing, which Pucinski authored in the big school aid authorization bill recently signed into law.

Potato Growers of Idaho, Inc., have not approved any processor pre-season contracts. Members of P.G.I. are advised that signing of any contract that has not been approved makes them subject to the penalty contained in their signed agreement with P.G.I.

We fully realize that delay in settlement of 1970 contracts will work hardships on some. However, the economic well-being of the majority of growers has to be our primary concern.

It is extremely apparent that the processors only basis for delaying settlement is their desire for fatter profits at grower expense. They have not negotiated in good faith, nor do they intend to until all growers let them know without doubt that they intend to hold for a price increase to at least cover our increased costs of production.

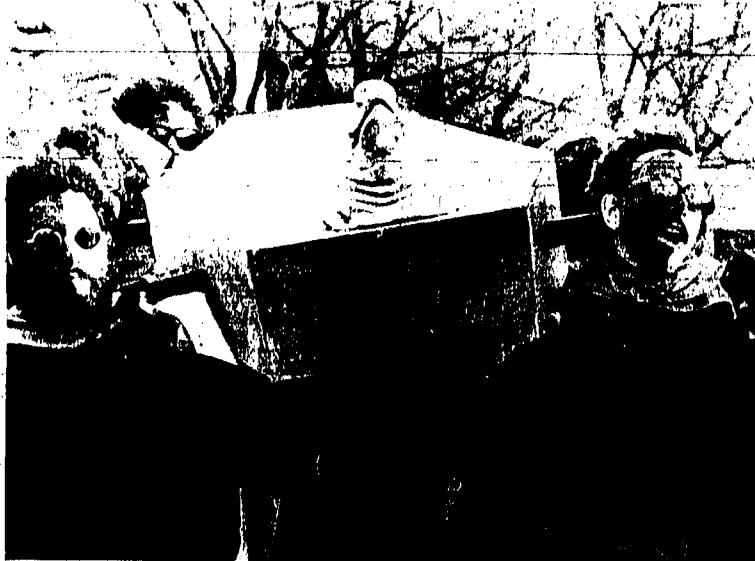
The latest offer of J. R. Simplot Co. calls for a price increase of 10¢ on U.S. #1's and 5¢ additional on processor 2's; however, other proposed changes such as a ridiculous starting point on #1 incentive clause of 56% and 25% on ten ounce reduces the gain to less than 1% over last year's contract.

Ore Ida Foods has offered absolutely nothing in the way of a price increase, and they are taking applications for contracts in an effort to demoralize our bargaining efforts.

All processors are using various and unique underhanded methods to fragment bargaining efforts including contacts by field men that warn the grower "if he waits to long his acreage may be gone."

Idaho Frozen Foods of Twin Falls has improved the contract that they originally offered because of P.G.I. efforts, but the contract contains language dangerous to grower interest and is still short of desired economic levels.

All growers, members and non-members alike, should fully understand that P.G.I. is simply the vehicle for bargaining. The pressure comes from the grass roots. We can win by being reasonable in our demands, and utilizing the self-discipline necessary to any bargaining effort.

Senate Girds For Renewal Of Battle Over Issue Of Desegregation Busing

By WILLIAM B. MEAD
WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Senate is preparing for an early renewal of battles over school aid and busing less than two months after a tardy and once vetoed version of last year's legislation finally limped through Congress. Impacted aid is again an issue, the possibility has been raised of another veto by President Nixon, and Southern lawmakers have sprung to their familiar battle lines for an onslaught on federal school desegregation policies. Last year's appropriations bill for the Labor Department and the Health, Education and Welfare Department passed March 4, nine months late, after one Nixon veto and days

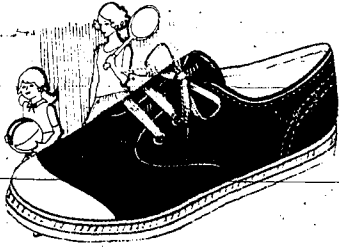
of wrangling over Southern-sponsored busing and freedom-of-choice amendments. This year, Sen. Warren E. Magnuson, D-Wash., has buckled his Senate appropriations subcommittee down to work early, taking lengthy testimony from educators, administration spokesmen and others on a House-passed \$4.1 billion appropriations bill. It covers the U.S. Office of Education only, a new approach. But the House, again inserted an amendment to bar busing of students to achieve racial balance in schools, and another to permit freedom of choice in selecting a school to attend. These are sure to cause stormy debate both in the Senate committee and on the floor.

Nixon's contention when he vetoed last year's bill was that Congress wanted to appropriate too much money, particularly for impacted school aid to districts which educate children for federal employees. Since then, Congress has broadened the impacted aid program to also cover districts with federally financed housing projects; Cuban refugees and migrant farm families. John M. Lumley of the National Education Association told Magnuson's subcommittee that the federal share of school financing is declining, although schools need more not less, help from Washington. This school year, Lumley said, public-grade and high schools will need about \$38.4

billion. He said "local sources, mainly property taxes" would provide 52.7 per cent, state governments 40.7 per cent and federal programs 6.6 per cent. Compared with last year, Lumley testified, "state and local governments increased their support for schools by 12.8 per cent and 30.7 per cent respectively, while the federal grants declined by 1 per cent."

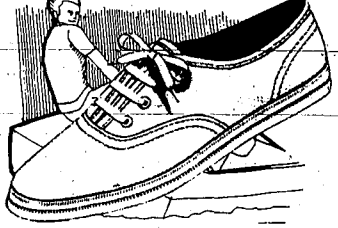

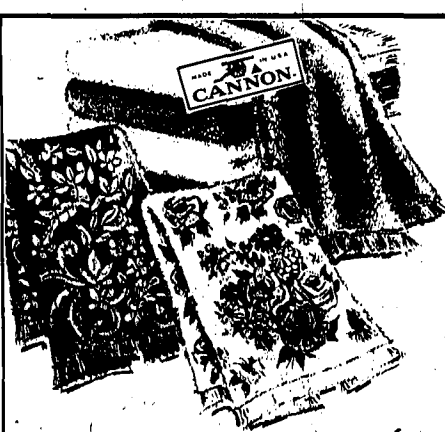

Today's Market And Financial Report

Stocks

NEW YORK (UPI)—Prices fell sharply on the New York Stock Exchange Wednesday. Turnover was moderate. As trading passed the half-way mark, declines piled up more than a 4-1/2 point advantage over winners, and the Dow Jones industrial average of 30 selected blue chips was off more than nine points.

Near 1:15 p.m. the UPI market indicator, measuring all stocks traded, showed a loss of 1.39 per cent on 1,467 issues crossing the exchanges.

96 losers and 215 winners. More than 7,000,000 shares was running about 1 1/2 shares ahead of the previous session's at a comparable price.

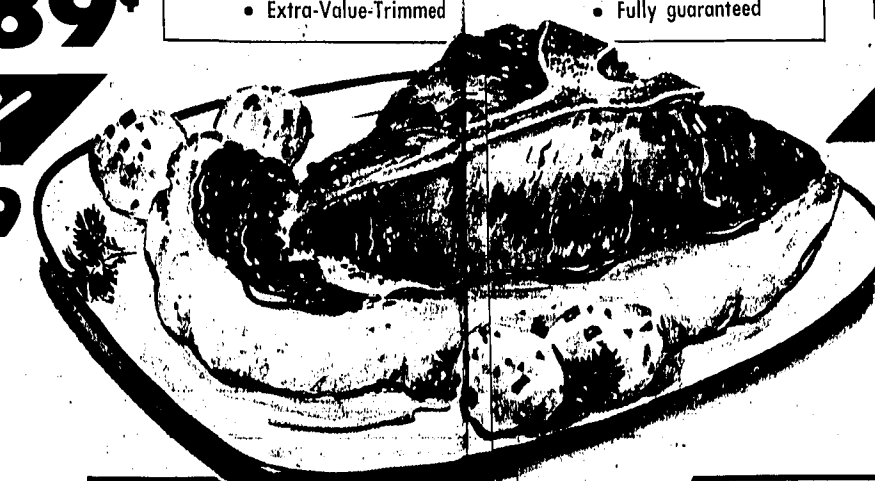

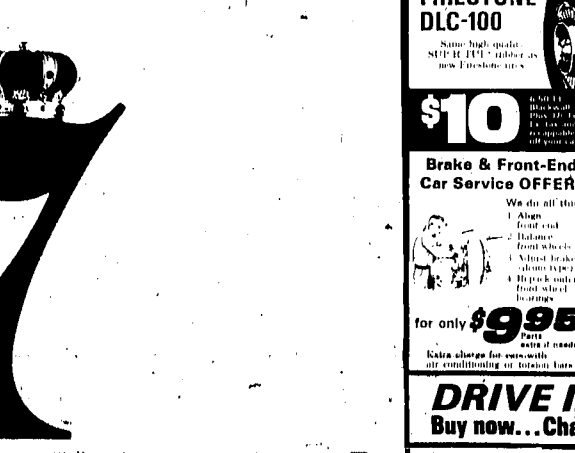

Nursery Can Be A Deadly Place

NEW YORK (UPI)—Safe as in a baby's crib, it's said. But a lot of persons interested in baby welfare are taking another long look at the crib and other nursery items to check just how safe—or how dangerous—they are.

One case history: An eight-month-old girl, smaller than average, cried out in pain at a time she was supposed to be napping in her crib. Hurrying to the room, her mother found her outside the crib hanging by her head and one shoulder, fortunately not seriously hurt. But she wee one had managed to wiggle her legs and force between slats of the crib's side. The manufacturer should have placed the bars closer together.

Strangulation Danger
"If a baby's body can slip through the spindles of a crib, there's danger of strangulation," says the National Safety Council. The head, you see, is non-compressible, so in such instances baby is left hanging.

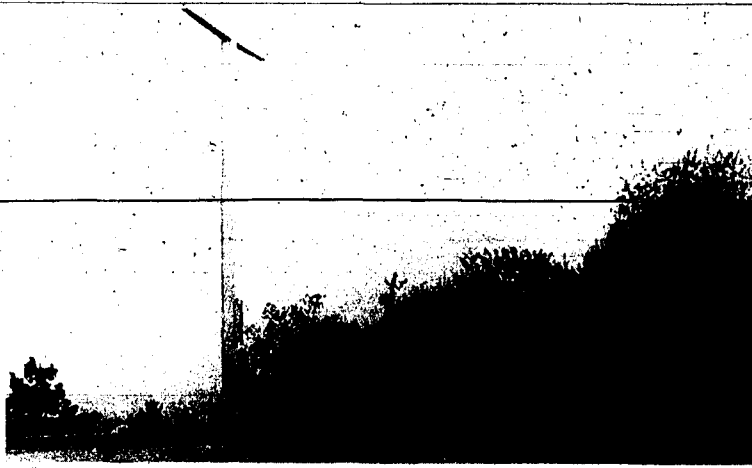
Examination of hundreds of case histories has led to the conclusion that improper design of infant furniture—cribs, playpens, high chairs and dressing tables especially—plays a key role in thousands of serious accidents babies suffer each year. So reports the Safety Council, which finds that cribs play a key role in infant fatalities. And of all crib complaints, the most frequent seems to be the ease with which a child can hook his toes into some type of horizontal member and boost himself over the top. Infants, it seems, just naturally like to climb.

The Safety Council, reporting on the nursery dangers in its current "Family Safety" publication, cited a study by Dr. Harvey Kravitz of the Northwestern University Medical School. With the assistance of a grant from the council, Dr.

Kravitz, working with two pediatricians on the staff of Lutheran General Hospital, Park Ridge, Ill., found that nearly half the infants in his investigation fell from a high place—a crib, a dressing table, or an adult bed—during their first year of life.

Take Close Look
What's being done to make furniture child-safe? The council says the federal government, via the National Commission on Product Safety, is taking a close look at any item on the market that might be harmful. Prosecution could be possible under the Child Protection Act of 1969.

What can a parent do, while the industry works toward safety standards and safer models? The Safety Council suggests, among other measures, always keep one hand on baby—pick him up and take him with you if the phone rings. Never leave baby unattended on a bed, couch or dressing table. Avoid shallow carriages. Use plastic infant seats only in the playpen or on the floor. Don't use an infant seat in a playpen after baby can stand. Lash the crib side to prevent it from falling, if there's any danger of an older child being able to release the rail from outside the crib.

steamboats ... The West Virginia law requiring women to stand five feet away from bars when drinking in public ... The Ohio law specifying that employers of women must provide chairs for them ... The New York law forbidding curious hodge-podge of words that starts out ringingly: "On the first day of the week, commonly known and designated as Sunday, it shall be unlawful for any person to engage in work, labor or business or to employ others to engage in work, labor or business except in household or other work of necessity or charity."

sunbathing in the streets (in New York it is also illegal to walk down any street while reading). But not only Americans are slightly pirkled in the law department. In England, for instance, it is against the law for anyone to beg a stranger for hot water, and no one may whistle in public after 9 p.m. In Colombia no on-duty policeman may speak to women, and in Cuba it is illegal to wear a sport shirt with zipper front. Even the Russians engaged in legal silliness. In the USSR a law says that any train that comes upon a citizen sleeping on the tracks must stop and wait till the citizen wakes.
