The meeting with newsmen was unusual because it came after only the second day of a detailed two-week debriefing instead of at its end. 

Silent Sermons

Taking up the cause long championed by the late Sen. Everett Dirksen of Illinois, Senate Republican leader Hugh Scott of Pennsylvania has proposed a constitutional amendment which would not be the senate of the control of the cause of the would permit voluntary, non-denominational prayers in schools and other public buildings. Scott will undoubtedly discover, as did Dirksen, a solid core of

scott win industreaty accover, as did Dirksen, a solid core of support among many Americans who believe that a large part of what's wrong with youth and present-day American society is due to the absence of prayers and Bible reading in the schools. In this respect, two surveys reported in the current "Psychology Today" magazine-seem-particularly pertinent.

In one, the largest survey ever undertaken to examine the politican beliefs of any body of clergymen, 1,580 California-ministers from nine "Protestant denominations were queried by three University of California sociologists. sociologists.

ciologists. "When we analyzed the results,". write the researchers, "we began to see why Christian congregations have been so unshaken by years of sermonizing. It turns out that have been so unshaken by years of sermonizing. It turns out that whether or not people listen, there is not much to hear. Most sermons rarely touch on controversial moral and ethical issues. More than a third of the clergy said that never in their entire ministries had they taken a pullit stand on a political issue. They found that the more

political issue.

They found that the more
"traditionalist" a minister was—
that is, the more he believed in
certain basic doctrines such as the divinity of Jesus, life beyond death and the literal existence of the devil — the less interested he was in worldly problems and the more he emphasized the negative "thou shalt nots" of Christianity and

shalf nots" of Christianity and ignored the positive "thou shalts."
Compared to the joys of the world to come, for the "traditionalist" the problems of war, race and poverty were not worth talking about.
"These findings appear dismal," conclude the authors "for these

conclude the authors, "for those who hope to awaken the churches who hope to awaken the churches to the urgent problems of modern society. So far as we can tell, Sunday mornings will remain the same with America's silent majority sitting in the churches listening to silent sermons."

A second survey, of members of a Protestan church in a southern city, found two types of churchgoers: A tiny minority of "devotionalists," for whom religion was a central fact in their daily lives and an end in itself; and

religion was a central fact in their daily lives and an end in itself; and a large majority of 'instrumentalists,' for whom religion was a means to an end — important for its social benefits, as an occasional solace and as an ultimate ticket to heaven — and for whom the form of religion took precedence over substance.

Significantly, the more "instrumentalist" a person was rated, the less compassionate and tolerant he was found to be toward

tolerant he was found to be toward his fellowmen. It would be interesting to see the results of a nationwide "in-depth" survey on the question of prayer and Bible reading in the schools.

Would it find that those Americans falling in the "traditionalist" or "instrumentalist" categories are the ones who are most in favor-of overriding the Supreme Court's ruling on the issue?

Could it be that what is really needed in America is not prayer in the schools but more sincere prayer in the churches?

MR. SPECTATOR School Vandalism

With nothing better to do on a rainy Sunday afternoon, two boys, 12 and 14, forced open a door to a new elementary school in a large eastern city. By the time they were annechended, they had done eastern city. By the time they were apprehended, they had done \$100,000 worth of damage, ransacking desks, smashing aquariums, demolishing dozens of expensive-touching aids, including a closed-circuit tolevision camera. In some large cities, the cost of school vandalism runs into the millions every year and is growing. But the plaque strikes small cities as well, and all neighborhoods, rich or poor, black or white.

More than half of all school fires are the direct consequence of

More than half of all school fires are the direct consequence of vandalism and, according to the FBI, of 100,000 recent arrests of vandals, 77 per cent were juveniles under 18, most of them 12- and 13-year-olds. Cleveland, Ohlo, which reported 8,731 vandalism incidents in 1988-89 costing \$680,776 has lost one school a year to arsonists for the past three years.

Nationwide, the U. S. Office of Education estimates that damage.

Nationwide, the U. S. Ortice of Education estimates that damage by vandals to public schools may run as high as \$100 million annually—every dollar of which is a dollar which cannot be spent on improving education.

Citing these figures, the American Insurance Association, representing the property-casualty insurance industry, has called for a broad-based attack on the problem—'la carefully organized and concerted drive, a broad assault on this costly mischief and tremendus economic waste."

association stresses a program of improved security, neighborhood co-operation and

neighborhood co-operation and vigorous prosecution of offenders in a booklet, "School Vandalism." Among its recommendations for minimizing vandalism are obtaining community and student assistance, using policemen and watchmen more effectively and reducing the possibility of glass breakage by such means as installing bars and screens or building schools with no windows facing the outside world. The booklet also describes a wide range of available detection systems and protective devices.





But if he can get it into mass. production, at a price around \$10,000 and fully approved by the Federal Aviation Agency, he figures he'll have the last laugh.

The tail assembly is attached to its stern; the wings, which are hooked onto the tail assembly, are unfolded, and the craft is ready for take-off. The propeller is on the tail.

propeller is on the tail assembly.

The four wheels are fully retractable. They are extended for take-off and landing, partly retractable for road travel for stability reasons, and are fully retracted in flight.

Taylor's current operating model is the seventh he has constructed. It has a range of 500 miles, weighs 1,500 pounds empty and has a gross weight of 2,100 pounds. It's 143-horse-power engine gets 15 miles per gullon on the road and uses eight gallons of gesoline an hour in the air.







All processors are using various and unique underhanded methods to fragment bargaining efforts including contacts by field men that warn the grower "If he waits to long his acreage may be gone."

Idaho Frozen Foods of Twin Falls has improved the contract that they originally offered because of P.G.I. efforts, but the contract contains language dangerous to grower interest and is still short of desired economic levels.

All growers, members and non-members alike, should fully understand that P.G.I. is simply the vehicle for bargaining. The possure comes from the grass roots. We can win by being reasonable in our demands, and utilizing the self-discipline necessary to any bargaining effort.

Analzation of our position at this phase of negotiations would show that processors know they cannot go around P.G.I, and get the acreage they desire. Their strategy now is to delay and hope for enough grower pressure to accept last years terms. Let's show them that producers can be firm and reasonable at the same time. Don't sign any contracts.
