

# U.S. Air, Artillery Support Viet While Cambodia Conflict Spreads

## Advisors Join Troops For Major War Effort

SAIGON (UPI)—Three tank-led columns of 7,500 South Vietnamese troops pushed up to 15 miles into Cambodia today with U.S. air, artillery and advisory support. Two American advisors were reported wounded, the first U.S. casualties in the widening Cambodian conflict.

South Vietnamese losses were put at 32 killed and 112 wounded, 55 of the wounded suffered when U.S. helicopter gunships opened up on a Ranger unit by mistake. The American command said it would not identify the two wounded U.S. advisers.

mand reported 160 barracks and houses and 350 bunkers destroyed so far in the two-day drive. Two hundred tons of rice and 136 weapons were captured.

## Senate Reaction Is Generally Critical

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, Wednesday followed the generally critical reaction in the Senate to the President's decision to support South Vietnamese military operations in Cambodia.

Church and Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield, D-Mont., said at a news conference they first learned of the decision from news stories in spite of a closed-door meeting with Secretary of State William Rogers and the Senate Foreign Relations Committee Monday.

Church said that "pressure will soon develop for establishing a full-scale American military mission in Cambodia which will carry with it a whole new set of American obligations to defend that country."

## Nixon To Report Tonight

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Nixon, in a television report to the nation tonight, faces the task of quieting widespread fears that the sudden Allied military thrust into Cambodia may widen the war in Southeast Asia.

Church said that "pressure will soon develop for establishing a full-scale American military mission in Cambodia which will carry with it a whole new set of American obligations to defend that country."

Mansfield called the Cambodian imbroglio "a new ball game."

Earlier Wednesday, after learning that South Vietnamese forces had crossed the frontier into Cambodia to fight Viet Cong forces, Church offered an amendment to the Military Sales Act, prohibiting arms sales to Cambodia and American advisory assistance to Cambodian forces.

The amendment was co-sponsored by Sen. John Sherman Cooper, R-Ky., when it appeared the South Vietnamese move had U.S. support.

The amendment, which would not come to a vote within the

Administration officials, preparing the way for Nixon's address, were already hammering hard on this theme and attempting to minimize the risks involved in the operation. They sought to give the impression the South Vietnamese thrust with U.S. "combat support" was a simple strike operation and did not represent the opening of a new phase in the war with wider political and military ramifications.

These officials acknowledged, however, the Allied drive might well be followed by more such thrusts in an effort to destroy the military capability of North Vietnamese and Viet Cong forces in east Cambodia.

The White House said Wednesday that the sudden Allied military operation was not a response to Cambodia's plea for large-scale American aid against the Communist troops. However, officials acknowledged any successes achieved against the North Vietnamese and Viet Cong forces would have the effect of lessening the threat they posed to the Cambodian government of Premier Lon Nol, which ousted Prince Norodom Sihanouk as chief of state.

## Panther Roundup Nets Nine

BAITMORE (UPI)—At least nine suspected Black Panthers were arrested today in a roundup of active members of the militant group here in the wake of the killing of a patrolman.

Police sources said nearly 20 Panthers were sought in more than a dozen locations, including Panther headquarters and a school where the group conducts a breakfast program. Two suspects were arrested at the headquarters but none of the Panthers showed up at the school this morning.

Patrolman Donald Sager was shot to death from ambush while sitting in a patrol car last Friday. A police companion was seriously wounded.

The slaying followed distribution of pamphlets in a Baltimore ghetto that urged its black residents to kill police. The pamphlets showed how to make various weapons, and one depicted the killing of a police officer in a police car.

Police Commissioner Donald Pomeroy asked the City Council Wednesday to pass a law banning the distribution of such leaflets.

Among those arrested today were four blacks riding a car that carried an arsenal of rifles and shotguns in the trunk according to police.

Most of the arrests took place in east central Baltimore—the ghetto area that was the scene of rioting in 1968.

He will speak at the Saturday night banquet and Cong. Lowenstein at the Friday night banquet. Opening address will be Friday morning by Steve Boyd, president of the associated students at the University of Washington. Dave Poe is conference coordinator and Martin Hansel is Region 8 chairman.

## Accused

PARIS (UPI)—North Vietnam accused the United States today of supplying material to Cambodia's new regime to help massacre Vietnamese and Chinese residents—the first mention of Chinese deaths in Cambodia.

Nguyen Minh Vy, North Vietnamese representative to the Vietnam peace talks, accused the United States of extending the war to all of Indochina by providing support for South Vietnamese troops operating inside Cambodia.

## Warning Is Given On Meat

BOISE (UPI)—Dr. Wilson S. Horne, a state director of the Wholesale Meat Act, warned retail grocery and meat shops today to refrain from accepting uninspected meat for cutting and wrapping.

"We have been successful in keeping home-killed domestic meat animals out of the state inspected meat packing plants but we now find that retailers are accepting these uninspected carcasses of cutting and wrapping, contrary to the law," Horne said.

He said that while his division is not charged with responsibility of policing retail outlets the practice of cutting and wrapping home-killed meat is a service that could result in reclassification of such retail operations as "wholesalers or jobbers," which would bring the store under the jurisdiction of the Meat Inspection Division of the State Agriculture Department.

Agriculture Commissioner Stanley I. Trenthall said that uninspected meat, in a retail or wholesale establishment is unlawful.

"There is no way that uninspected meat can be distinguished from inspected meat once it is cut up," Trenthall said.

"In order to protect the consumer against the possibility of purchasing meat that has not been inspected it is necessary to prevent retailers from handling such meat on their premises."

## Action In Sweden Is Criticized By Rivers

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Rep. L. Mendel Rivers, D-S.C., irked by demonstrations in Sweden against U.S. Ambassador Jerome H. Holland, said Wednesday that President Nixon should call home the new U.S. envoy and consider reducing the American embassy in Stockholm to an consulate.

"It burns me up," Rivers said of the heckling. Holland received at the hands of antiwar demonstrators, "I'd teach these bizzards how the horse ate the cabbage, as we say back home."

Holland has been heckled repeatedly by anti-American demonstrators since his arrival in Stockholm last February. The latest incident occurred Monday when demonstrators hurled eggs and verbal abuse at the ambassador during the opening of the new U.S. cultural center in Stockholm.

Rivers also made clear Sweden angered him for swedes besides the disrespect

that he said was shown "this great American."

"They have deceived our servicemen from their posts of duty and caused them to be traitors to their country," he said, referring to American servicemen who have deserted and been granted sanctuary in Sweden.

## Judge Doubts Part Of Kennedy Story

BOSTON (UPI)—A judge, casting doubt on parts of Sen. Edward M. Kennedy's testimony, found probable cause he operated a car negligently—possibly even recklessly—thus apparently contributing to the death of Mary Jo Kopechne, according to secret inquest documents made public Wednesday.

Edgartown District Judge James A. Boyle, noting "incon-sistencies and contradictions" in the inquest testimony said he felt the senator and the young blonde secretary were not heading back to the ferry to Edgartown—as Kennedy said they were—when the car plunged off a bridge on Chappaquiddick Island last summer after a party.

Judge Boyle's 12-page report on the inquest over which he presided and the 763 pages of testimony given at the inquest by Kennedy and 28 other witnesses were released by Suffolk Superior Court. The four-day inquest ended Jan. 9.

A new grand jury convenes in Edgartown May 11, but observers said it was doubtful its members would get involved in the Kennedy-Kopechne case.

Kennedy, in his testimony at the inquest, and in two previous public statements on the accident, said he and Miss Kopechne, 28, were headed back to Edgartown from Chappaquiddick Island when he took a wrong turn and went off a bridge.

From Washington, the surviving son of the Kennedy clan said he rejected Boyle's findings and found them "not justified."

"For myself," the 38-year-old senator said, "I plan no further statement on this tragic matter. We must all live with the loss of Mary Jo and the pain that this has inflicted upon us."

Although Boyle's report appeared to be a strong indictment of Kennedy, it is unlikely any legal action will come out of it. A grand jury probe of the case ended April 7 after hearing only four witnesses and returning no indictments.

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## New Haven May Day Rally On

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (UPI)—The vanguard of an expected 50,000 demonstrators began arriving in this tense city today for a giant May Day rally initially called to demand a fair trial for Black Panther leader Bobby G. Seale and eight other Panthers charged with murder.

But growing fears that the demonstration may become violent led the Yale Strike Steering Committee to hold a news conference to stress that the weekend demonstration was not initiated or planned by the Yale community.

At the same time the Yale Student Faculty Monitoring Committee said the possibility of disorder seems "significantly greater" than at previous demonstrations.

"Reports of the existence of white vigilante groups and white radical extremists are too persistent to be ignored," the committee said.

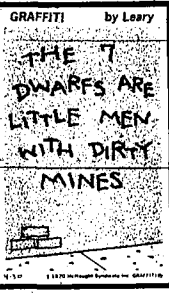
## Jim Flynn Is Local Winner

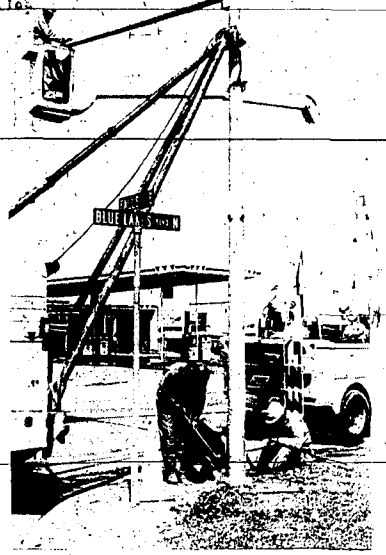

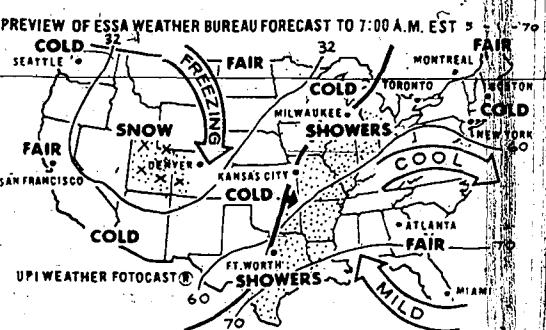

# Stalling POW Compensation

WASHINGTON The Senate's protracted bickering over appointees to the Supreme Court is proving costly to U. S. prisoners of war in the Vietnam conflict.

A House-passed bill to pay these POW \$2.50 in additional compensation for each day of captivity has been stymied for nearly a year in the Senate Judiciary Committee due to its vehement preoccupation with appointees to the Supreme Court.

It is virtually certain that if the measure could get before the full Senate it would be as speedily and overwhelmingly approved as it was by the House.

That chamber unanimously passed the legislation by a voice vote May 28, 1969. It had previously been unanimously recommended by the House Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee.

Ever since then, the bill has been stalled in the Senate Judiciary Committee because of its complete absorption with the controversies over President Nixon's selections to the Supreme Court.

The committee's staff has made a report strongly urging approval of the POW measure. But the committee has never gotten around to doing anything about it, and the legislation has been gathering dust for months on the so-called "unfinished business" calendar.

A check of the 17 committee members (10 Republicans, 7 Democrats) disclosed no opposition to the bill. Also, practically no interest in it.

Several committee members even know it is pending in the Judiciary Committee. They expressed surprise when informed of that, and unprodding promised "to look into the matter."

Foremost among committee members unconcerned about the POW bill are Senators Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., Birch Bayh, D-Ind., and Joseph Tydings, D-Md.

All are militant liberals, stridently vocal opponents of the Vietnam war, and leaders of the drives that blocked the confirmation of Judges Haynsworth and Carswell to the Supreme Court.

Bayh also is an avowed aspirant for President. The ambitious Indian already is busily handshaking and campaigning for the 1972 nomination. He frankly admits he would accept either place on the Democratic ticket, but naturally would prefer to be the standard-bearer.

Kennedy too was an eager presidential candidate until last year's Chappaquiddick incident. For a while after that still-stuttering affair, he seemed to relinquish White House hopes. But lately Kennedy has shown signs of having revived these ambitions and again working at them. He has greatly expanded his speaking schedule, and the range of topics on which he is politicking.

The \$2.50 a day in additional compensation for POW is based on \$1 for inadequate food, and \$1.50 for inhumane treatment.

This extra pay for victims of the Vietnam war is the same as that for POW in World War II and the Korean conflict.

Rep. William Scherle, Iowa, who played a leading role in putting the legislation through the House, is urging the public to bombard members of the Senate Judiciary Committee with vigorous protests over the protracted failure to act on the bill.

It is Scherle's belief that if there is enough public outcry against the delay the committee will report the measure to the Senate where its speedy enactment is certain.

"The American People have strongly evinced their concern over the treatment of our prisoners of war by the Communists," said Scherle. "I am absolutely sure that once the public is apprised of what is happening on this extremely desirable bill in the Senate Judiciary Committee, it will force the committee to stop its unconscionable stalling and act. That's long overdue."

"That is why I am urging everyone to write these senators to let them know they want action on this bill without further delay. If enough people will take the time and trouble to write, the results will be fast and effective. So by all means, sit down and write immediately."

Under the measure, no POW would receive the additional compensation if he "voluntarily, knowingly and/or without duress gave aid or collaborated with, or in any other manner served the Communist forces."

## Carswell

If G. Harrold Carswell should succeed in his announced bid to represent Florida in the United States Senate, it would be an enormous personal satisfaction to him and a wry joke at that exclusive body which refused to permit him to serve on the Supreme Court.

Of course, he has a long way to go. He must win the Republican nomination, although one opponent dropped out of the race and said he would support Carswell. He has the backing of the Florida governor and conceivably could ride a groundswell of dissatisfaction with the Senate's refusal to confirm either of two Southern nominees to the high court.

Carswell is seeking the seat to be vacated by the retirement of 76-year-old Democrat, Senator Spessard Holland. Several Democrats are running, so if he wins the Republican nomination, he must still defeat the Democratic nominee before he can join the Senate, where he would not need confirmation by the men who belittled him as mediocre.

Instead, he would be addressed

with the old-fashioned, formal courtesy Senators accord to each other unflinchingly in such terms as "my learned and esteemed friend, the Senator from Florida," etc.

The thought of it must cause Senator Birch Bayh (D-Ind.), who led the fight against Carswell's appointment to the court, to ponder the whims of fate and to wish he had never visited Florida as a free-loading guest at the pleasure domes of Miami. Think what Bayh could have done with that in opposing a Supreme Court nominee who had used such facilities, with the possibilities of "conflict of interest," not to mention "lack of sensitivity."

Carswell supporters have a ready-made slogan: "He may not have been good enough for the Supreme Court but he's plenty good enough for the Senate."

Stranger things have happened and if the time comes when we address the judge as "Senator Carswell," we'll enjoy doing it and trust that in the elevated atmosphere of that august body, he will flourish to become one of its ornaments.

## Falls Flat

Not since Walt Disney's cartoon feature "The Three Little Pigs" came out in the early 1930s has lowly Suidae domestica looked so good.

Police in Long Beach, Calif., are said to be proudly wearing gold tie pins in the shape of pigs. Off duty, many of them are wearing T-shirts and sweaters emblazoned with a porcine portrait and the declaration that "Pigs Are Beautiful." Police in other parts of the country are beginning to order the pins.

It is, of course, a reaction to the hard time college students have been giving law enforcement officers around the country. College students are the highly educated beneficiaries of 6,000 years of recorded human culture who believe that names make the man and that you can throw filth without getting your hands dirty.

(Interestingly enough, the old Second Edition of the Merriam-

Webster International dictionary lists "pig" as an obsolete slang term for policeman. The Third Edition, copyrighted in 1966, dropped the definition. It is to be hoped that the term is once again obsolete by the time the Fourth Edition comes out in another generation.)

Without question, the hapless pig has been given a bad press over the ages. His name is synonymous with everything brutal and slovenly. Millions of people consider his flesh unclean and taboo. In "Animal Farm," George Orwell delivered the unkindest cut of all by casting pigs as dictators over the other animals.

All of this is entirely unwarranted. Pigs have never made war on anybody, have never put anybody in concentration camps, have never even called anybody names. As for their being dirty, why would humans look if they were forced to live in pigsties?

## The Viet Punch

WASHINGTON (NEA) — Ironically, Hanoi's military victories in Laos and Cambodia helped make possible President Nixon's decision to remove 150,000 troops from Vietnam in the next 12 months.

For one, the North Vietnamese attacks directed inward against Cambodia have enabled allied units to covertly raid gigantic North Vietnamese and Viet Cong supply bases in that kingdom seriously crippling their ability to mount sustained major attacks in South Vietnam's Delta for some time to come. The rapid North Vietnamese advance in northern Laos has left Hanoi with long, exposed supply lines, vulnerable to repeated attack by Mao guerrillas and Lao-American air strikes.

Using a technique learned in South Vietnam, as Hanoi's troops advanced westward in Laos, American planes and other transport were jam-packed with every native citizen who could be pulled out of the war to become North Vietnamese territory.

This was equivalent of scorched earth. Without sufficient local people in the area they occupy, the Hanoi men are short of porters, young men to conscript into their labor battalions, farmers to cultivate crops and households to tax.

This makes it necessary for the North Vietnamese to bring in more of their supplies from North Vietnam. It ties up a greater share of their troops in occupation and housekeeping. It drains their mobility for the war in the south.

All in all, the situation in Laos and Cambodia has thus given the United States and our allies new opportunities for major blows on North Vietnamese and Viet Cong supplies.

In this kind of war, it is frequently more important to destroy rice, ammunition and weapons than to kill enemy troops.

Hanoi's supply problem grows more troublesome some time back when the North Vietnamese and many Viet Cong shifted to imported Chinese and Russian weapons. It grew even worse when the heavy evasions of men and women from Viet Cong territory in South Vietnam cut Communist rice production, heavily.

Hanoi's supply line south is tenuous at best. It has been made more difficult by U.S. Gen. Lon Nol's closing of the port of

Sihanoukville to imports of Hanoi's troops.

The amount of fighting the North Vietnamese and Viet Cong can do is directly related to their supply of ammunition, weapons and rice. If these can be cut in half, their attacks will be cut in half. It is as simple as that.

## We Wonder!

WASHINGTON — As Senate Democrats take off after President Nixon's latest Supreme Court nominee, I'm afraid I have an impertinent question for some of the part-time Cotton Mathers of the party.

Where, I wonder, were the Birch Bayhs and the William Proxmires and the Gaylord Nelsons and the Joe Tydings and the Albert Gores back in 1967? That was the year White House aide Clark Mollenhoff, then an investigative reporter, revived the case of a U.S. judge in Wisconsin who had filed no Federal or state income tax returns for eight years prior to his elevation to the Federal bench.

Judge Robert E. Teahan Sr. of Milwaukee had been handed the job by President Truman in 1949, despite wide publicity given his tax delinquency. The explanation was that Teahan was extremely active in Democratic politics in Wisconsin and thus deserved a judgeship. Why the Senate still saw fit to confirm him is irrelevant to the context of this essay. Besides, those were wild days.

But all those pure-hearted Democratic knights who turned thumbs down on Judge Clement Haynsworth and G. Harrold Carswell were in the Senate in 1968 when Mollenhoff revived the Teahan story. So far as the record reveals, none of them uttered so much as a clucking sound. Not Birch Bayh, who was the "hero" of the Carswell defeat. Not William Proxmire or Gaylord Nelson, senators from Teahan's home state of Wisconsin. Not Tennessee's Albert Gore or New York's half-Republican Jack Javits.

The Teahan case also was ignored (studied?) by Teddy Kennedy, J. William Fulbright, Gene McCarthy, George McGovern, Ed Muskie and the rest of the Democrats who found Haynsworth and Carswell unacceptable.

Perhaps their silence was

influenced by a 1966 Wall Street Journal story, which reported that Teahan "likes to keep his hand in politics" even while on the bench. A judge who continues to serve his party probably is a special case. And, of course, Reps. Clement J. Zablocki and Andrew J. Blumenthal of Wisconsin had warned in 1949 that "failure to appoint Teahan would greatly damage the Democratic party" in the state.

At any rate, the situation in 1968 involving a judge who hadn't paid his income taxes for eight years prior to his appointment to the bench was that the cat had got at the tongues of today's heroic crusaders against judges who are deemed insensitive or mediocre, or both. Under similar circumstances, you can be sure — at least I can — that Haynsworth and Carswell would have lost their jobs in a time it takes to raise a quorum on the Senate floor.

Unfortunately, the Nixon administration's ineptitude at this late date could make Judge Teahan out a martyr. For Teahan is one of nine individuals whose Federal income tax returns have been studied by Mollenhoff in his role as Nixon's inspector general.

This is pretty untidy stuff, even though President's Truman and Kennedy authorized staffers to do the same thing. I have known Mollenhoff for 20 years and in my book his integrity is unquestioned, but I do not deny a certain cynicism. Even if Mollenhoff's good character, to examine my income tax returns. Mollenhoff and too many other less upstanding snoops use that provision of the law which permits the President to "authorize" certain persons to scrutinize returns.

## Calcium

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Just what is calcium deposit? After reading about football players and their torn ligaments, I was surprised to read of a baseball player being treated for a calcium deposit in his back.

Mine is on the upper back. All I was told was that to get relief I could get a "shot." Of what? Cortisone? Is that the only treatment? What causes them, and are there any do's or don'ts in regard to food, weight or exercise? — Mrs. E. S.

Neither baseball players nor football players nor housewives have any monopoly on calcium deposits. In fact, probably just about everybody has some, but they don't always do any mischief.

What are they? Well, if you broke a leg, the fracture would "knit" and that would mean that you system laid down new bone and calcium to seal the fracture. These healed fractures show up clearly in X rays.

Calcium is vital to the healing process.

These knitted fractures, or healed wounds, do not necessarily cause any trouble afterward, in spite of the fact that you have a "calcium deposit" at the site.

But when, as sometimes happens, the calcium is located at some strategic spot, you may have some pain. A "heel spur" is an example; it's a lumpy bit of calcium which has gathered in the heel tendon and it can (sometimes) hurt to step on it.

A fracture or an open wound need not be involved. When you mention a calcium deposit in the back, it could be the result of an injury but not a fracture. It could also be an area in which scar tissue has formed as a consequence of an infection.

As I say, probably just about everybody beyond infancy has healed places of one sort or another, but it doesn't matter, unless the accumulation of calcium is sufficient to cause pressure—in the heel or in the back or wherever.

Diet has no effect. Weight might, depending on where the deposit is. Exercise won't remove a calcium deposit, and in general will have no effect, except for one thing: if a deposit is causing lameness in a joint, enough movement to prevent the joint from stiffening is in order.

The "shot" mentioned to you? Probably cortisone or some derivative. I'll let you in on an open secret. After all these years, we still don't understand very thoroughly just what cortisone does, but as a practical matter, it very often gives relief in cases like this.

Sometimes, after that period of medical relief, the tissues work themselves into a tolerable condition with no more pain. And then again, they don't.

In some instances calcium deposits can be removed by surgery, but that depends on the location, and on whether the deposit is annoying enough to warrant such measures.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Is anything medically wrong when a person craves salt, not only on food, I have awakened at night craving salt. — B. A.

It can indicate something wrong—an adrenal gland condition is one possibility. This craving should be reported to your doctor so he can start tests.

## A Pioneer Passes

In the rush of the world's events you sometimes fail to notice or to really have it "sink in" that some of the people who made it possible for us to be here, to live here, are coming to the end of the trail of their life and are being buried in the ground they helped prepare for all of us.

Such a person was Lulu Calhoun Hartwell Lough. Only recently she died.

She was a true Idaho pioneer, having been born at Summer Camp near Three Creek in October of 1886. Her childhood was spent playing with the brothers and sisters in the canyons and deserts of Southern Idaho. In her childhood her family took advantage of the opportunity to hire Indian squaws to aid in the housework.

These Indian squaws taught Lulu to eat Jole, camas and a red ant which had a flavor similar to dill pickles. In later years Lulu would entertain her guests with the Indian lore she learned from these early companions.

A daughter of the west, she learned to ride a horse almost before she could walk.

She married her first husband, Frank, at the family home in Blue

Gulch on Sept. 5, 1905. People came from far and near — mostly far — to attend the wedding and transportation was by horse and wagon. The preacher was brought from Buhl, leaving early in the morning, so he could reach the ceremony in time.

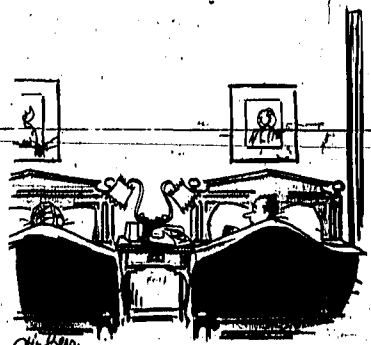
The honeymoon? At Alturas Lake in the Sawtooth country. Back to their new home at Rosoworth they gave a dance for friends and it lasted all night — to the tune of fiddlers.

Later, she and her husband moved to near-Buhl where they built the big rock house in which she lived the rest of her life. When Frank died, she and son Ciel continued to live in the big house. Years later she met and married Howard Lough. He survives as does Ciel and a sister, Selma, in addition to others.

But the point is that Lulu is buried in this part of Idaho where she lived all her life.

# Blacks Are Trained As Architects

Robert Harrison grew up on Eighth Avenue in Harlem. His academic achievement in public school was not outstanding. About his artistic talent as a child, he says, "I scribbled a lot."

Now, Robert, who is 19, is doing his drawing as a draftsman in the office of a New York architectural firm and hopes to enroll next September at the University of Michigan as a student in architecture.

Harrison is one of a small group of black and Puerto Rican youths enrolled in a one-year work and study program operated by the Architects' Renewal Committee in Harlem (ARCH) with support by the New York chapter of the American Institute of Architects (AIA). The purpose is to prepare the young men for college training in architecture with the expectation that, as professionals, they will return to their communities to put their skill to work.

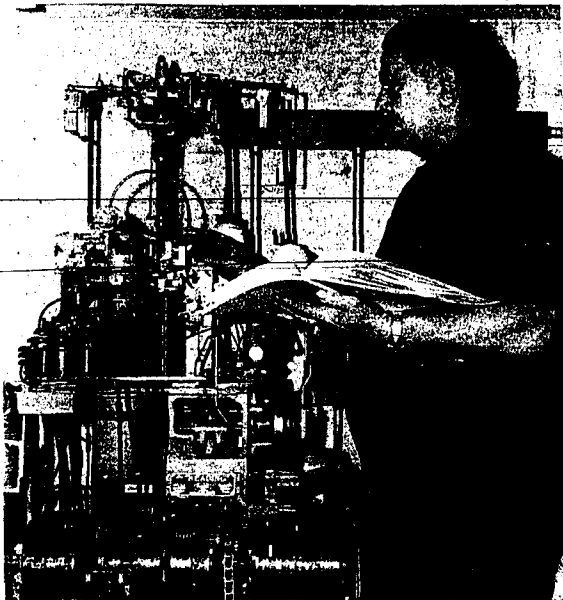
Trainees attend summer classes for 10 weeks, learning technical subjects such as architectural design as well as math, reading, English and black history. Then from September to the following June they work in architect's offices as draftsmen during the day and attend classes at night to fill the gaps in their high school education. Some did not have diplomas when selected for the program.

Keys to the success of the training is in the way the youths are motivated, small class size (10 is maximum) and individual help.

Of 19 trainees selected for the first year of the "Architecture in the Neighborhoods" Program in 1969, 12 obtained employment in architects' offices and six were enrolled this year at the Universities of Michigan and Kansas and are doing well.

Arthur Symes, a black architect who directs ARCH, says he expects as many as a dozen of his trainees to be accepted in college this year.

"We constantly tell the students we are not just trying to take them out of low-paying jobs in the garment district or

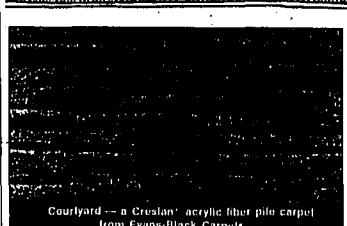
WASHINGTON (UPI) —The Department of Transportation concluded Tuesday that the American auto insurance system "is working very poorly and inadequately."

Department statisticians said in a voluminous report that financial losses resulting from highway casualties reached \$9.1 billion in 1967.

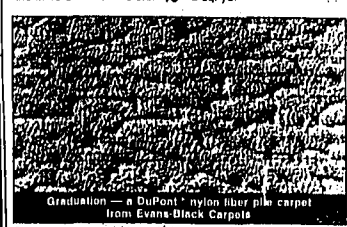

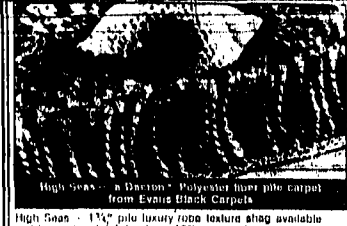

Graduation — a DuPont nylon fiber pile carpet from Evans-Black Carpets

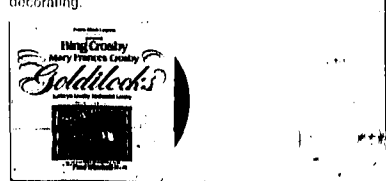

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# Plight Of Farmer Is Topic

BOISE (UPI) — Gov. Don Samuelson said Wednesday the plight of the American farmer will be a main topic of discussion at the forthcoming conference of the National Governor Association.

The meeting is scheduled in August at Lake of the Ozarks, Mo.

During an executive board meeting of the association at Hilton Head, S. C., last week, Samuelson asked NGA President Gov. John Love of Colorado to include the topic on the agenda.

"The American farmer, here in Idaho and everywhere throughout the nation is caught in a price squeeze between high production costs and depressed commodity prices," Samuelson said.

He said he was a "national problem and a matter of grave concern."

At the Hilton Head meeting, Samuelson said, the executive board met with officials of three national organizations representing cities and counties for a lengthy discussion over proposed federal revenue-sharing programs.

The programs would return monies from the federal level to state, city and county governmental units and would ease taxpayer loads at these levels of government.

## Hearing Yarmulka

NEW YORK (UPI)—The City Human Rights Commission will hold a hearing May 7 on a complaint by an employee of the New York Stock Exchange that he was not allowed to wear the yarmulka—or skull cap—required of Orthodox Jews. Abraham Jacob Goldstein, a tube man for the exchange since April 1968, said he agreed when hired not to wear the yarmulka on the floor of the exchange but in January was told he could not wear it in the exchange offices either and decided then to press charges.

## Blackmun Scores Quick Confirmation

By ROY MCGHEE WASHINGTON (UPI)—Supreme Court nominee Harry A. Blackmun won over the Senate Judiciary Committee so quickly Wednesday it ended its public hearings after just three and a half hours. In contrast to the drawn-out battles over President Nixon's two previous choices, he could have its approval by nightfall Thursday.

Sen. Marlow W. Cook, R-Ky., was the ninth member of the 17-member committee to assure the Minnesota jurist, now a member of the 8th U.S. Court of Appeals that he would recommend confirmation. After calling an end to the hearing, the committee met in executive session and decided to meet privately again at 10 a.m. Thursday. It was believed it might formally recommend confirmation by the full Senate at that time.

Cook gave his approval after Senate liberals and conservatives, from North and South, lined up behind Blackmun, who claimed a sensitivity for civil rights, labor and "the little people."

With no one speaking out against the nomination, the quick endorsements contrasted sharply with the drawn-out proceedings that kept the executive session and decided to meet privately again at 10 a.m. Thursday. It was believed it might formally recommend confirmation by the full Senate at that time.

## Environmental Group Formed By Utilities

BOISE (UPI) — Idaho Power Company said Wednesday a major electric utility systems of the western United States and Canada have formed an "environmental policy committee."

The group will fix guidelines for siting new generating plants and aesthetic treatment of other facilities they must install to supply future regional energy needs.

Albert Carlsen, president of the Idaho utility, said the Western Systems Coordination Council created the committee because "the adequacy of future power supplies can be adversely affected by unsolved environmental problems that could delay needed projects."

Carlsen said the committee is charged with development of workable procedures directed toward achieving early resolution of environmental questions. "This will aid in timely addition of resources and help maintain reliability and adequacy of electric service to customers," he said.

Environmental representatives and eight non-utility representatives from organizations active in the environmental field, the academic community and government agencies and regulatory commissions. Representatives will be named soon.

"Hi there, George!" I called. McSanguine leaped up, clicked his heels together and said "Howdy." We shook hands. "Are you still lighting the ends of tunnels over in Vietnam?" I asked.

No, he said. "I trained a native to handle that as part of the Vietnamization program. So they sent me back to Washington. Now I'm working at the Treasury Department as a corner turner."

"Every month, as you know, the Bureau of Labor Statistics releases a new consumer price index showing that the cost of

# Aid Of Bar Needed To Revise Probate Codes

BOISE (UPI)—Members of a legislative interim committee formed to revise Idaho's probate codes generally agreed today it must have the help and win the confidence of the Bar Association to accomplish its task.

Sen. Edith Miller Klein, R-Boise, committee chairman, said that unlike the Constitution Revision Commission the committee will not face opposition from the general public.

"I don't think generally the citizens of Idaho object to a new code for probate," she said. "I think they are crying for it."

"The problem will be to engage the support of the Bar Association for it."

Mrs. Klein, a lawyer herself in private life, said that attorneys are used to operating under certain laws and ways of doing things and perhaps may resist change more than others. She and other committee members discussed putting at least three lawyers on a seven-member advisory committee and including in addition the bar's own probate code study committee as well as the Uniform Code Commission to committee meetings.

"Mrs. Klein admitted this would be a lot of lawyers assisting the committee but added "I don't think frankly we can have too many."

"This is a lawyers' problem," she said.

The Bar Association already has asked the committee to allow it to name three members of the advisory committee. In addition, members of the interim committee suggested adding a present or retired University of Idaho law professor, a title and best representative and possibly a member from the Farm Bureau.

Mrs. Klein warned the committee it would face financial problems.

## Brown Trout Plantings Completed

The last 17,600 Brown trout being introduced into Magic Valley waters were planted this week, reports Bob Bell, regional fish biologist for the Idaho Fish and Game Department.

Bell said he and Rex Spackman, superintendent of the Twin Falls hatchery, planted 12,000 in Salmon Falls Reservoir and another 5,600 in Salmon Falls Creek behind the reservoir. These were placed in equal amounts at Lilly grade, Balanced Rock grade and, through back packing, five miles downstream from Balanced Rock. The department placed 30,000 in little Wood Reservoir earlier.
