## Postal Rate Jump Victim Of Politics

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Congress greeted President Nixon's long moribund postal reform plan with new enthusiasm today, quietly shelving an election-year increase in stamp prices.

"We discussed it, and in depth," Sen. Jennings Randolph, D-W.Va., said of the Senate Post Office Committee's deliberations on proposed postal rate hikes. "We decided just to sort of let the matter lay. The major thrust is on postal reform."

"Through the bill, we've attempted to move the Congress out of the rate-making process," Sen. Hiram L. Fong, R-Hawaii, said of the committee's refusal to include rate increases in its bill coupling postal reform with an 8 per cent pay raise.

The bill was approved Tuesday. "It will lead to the kind of superlative postal service which the American people need and deserve," said Sen. Gale W. McGee, D-Wyo., the committee chairman.

The House Post Office Committee has approved a differing postal reform plan, with the 8 per cent raise retroactive to April 18. No rate increases are included.

A House subcommittee has held hearings on Nixon's request that the \$496 million pay increase be financed by raising the price of a first class (letter) stamp from 6 to 8 cents, with second class (magazines and newspapers) postage increased 46 per cent and third class (advertising) boosted 33 per cent. But committee members have indicated little support for the proposal.

Randolph was asked whether election-year politics may have played a role in the Senate committee's decision to defer rate increases. "That may be an element," he replied.

McGee said he hoped the bill would pass this summer. It would pass the newly named U.S. Post Service under an 11-member board of governors. Nine of them would be picked by the President and confirmed by the Senate, and these nine governors would choose the 10th and 11th, a postmaster general and deputy postmaster general.

## Nixon, 40 Leaders To Confer

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The White House said today President Nixon would have an informal, give-and-take discussion on Cambodia and the nation's troubled economic situation with 40 business leaders at a dinner tonight.

Press Secretary Ronald L. Ziegler said the President would not announce any decisions to the businessmen and said "too much drama" was being focused on the meeting, which was announced Tuesday amid reports of continuing economic tribulations.

"The purpose is for the President to express things he has on his mind and to listen to what they have to say," Ziegler said. "The President meets with various groups frequently."

Ziegler said two top Presidential economic advisers would attend, Treasury Secretary David M. Kennedy and Chairman Paul W. McCracken, of the Council of Economic Advisers, as well as Dr. Arthur F. Burns, chairman of the Federal Reserve Board.

## Rise

NEW YORK (UPI)—The New York Times will increase its newsstand price and advertising rates to cover the cost of its new contract with the paper's printers and other anticipated employee contracts, the publisher announced Tuesday night.

The Times said the newsstand price of the daily newspaper will be raised from 10 to 15 cents effective June 1 but that the price of the Sunday edition would remain the same in the metropolitan area.

The advertising rate increases, which become effective Aug. 1 in most categories, will average 14 cents a line, the Times said.

## Voters In Oregon Reject Age Drop

PORTLAND, Ore. (UPI)—Oregon voters, reacting to recent campus unrest, soundly rejected Tuesday a proposal to lower the voting age to 19.

Gov. Tom McCall said "radical" elements were at least in part to blame for its defeat. "The radicals knew they couldn't radicalize the students as easily if they have the right to vote," he said.

Oregon is the first of 11 states to ballot this year on the below 21-year vote proposal. Only four—Georgia (18); Kentucky (18); Hawaii (19), and Alaska (20)—now allow those under 21 to vote.

The vote 19 proposal trailed by a 63 to 37 per cent margin. With returns in from 1,083 of the state's 2,484 precincts it was behind 151,923 to 90,985.

McCall, who easily won re-election to a second term in the Republican balloting, and nearly all other candidates backed the lowered voting age proposition. "But McCall said earlier a 'backlash' could defeat it."

McCall's opponent for the governorship in November will be Democratic State Treasurer Robert Straub, who got more votes than seven opponents combined. McCall beat Straub in 1966.

In Eugene, voters approved a proposal to make that city's controversial cross a war memorial. The 54-foot concrete cross, erected in 1964 in a public park overlooking the city, recently was ordered removed by the Oregon Supreme Court as a religious symbol. The U.S. Supreme Court refused to hear an appeal of the decision.

Approval of the war memorial measure will likely lead to more court action.

All four incumbent congressional members voted re-nomination. Only two had opposition. Rep. Al Ullman, D-Ore., who was unopposed, will face Republican Everett Thoren of Elgin in November. Rep. Wendell Wyatt, R-Ore., also unopposed, will be challenged by State Sen. Vernon Cook of Gresham.

Rep. Edith Green, D-Ore., defeated three challengers to win re-nomination. Former State Rep. Robert Dugdale of Portland won the GOP nomination to oppose her.

Rep. John Dellenbach, R-Ore., easily won re-nomination while William Granillo of North

Bend held a slim lead over James Weaver of Eugene for the Democratic nomination. Oregon has no U.S. Senate contest this year.

## Pocatello School Levy Up

POCATELLO (UPI)—Voters in Pocatello approved a mill levy in an election Tuesday night by a margin of 2,685 to 1,630 a 62.5 per cent majority.

This means the School District W25 will levy 10 mills over the legal limit of 30 mills for maintenance and operation funds.

District officials said that passage means that a person who owns a \$29,999 home will tax an additional \$19.20 each year to maintain the present programs in the district and provide for a five per cent salary increase for employees.

District Business Manager James Brenvold said the vote indicated that Pocatello residents were willing to sacrifice for quality education and pledged he would seek more educational funding at the state level than rely so heavily on local.

## Astronaut To Take New Job

SPACE CENTER, Houston (UPI)—For the second time in slightly more than a week, one of America's Apollo astronauts has decided to quit the space-flight corps because he felt the future was brighter elsewhere.

The latest resignation was announced Tuesday by Apollo 7 veteran Donn F. Eisele, who said "It is time for me to move on." Last week the first man to set foot on the moon, Apollo 11 commander Neil A. Armstrong, announced the same decision.

Eisele, 39, said he would leave in mid-June. He said he will go to the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) Langley Research Center at Hampton, Va., as a consultant on manned spaceflight studies.

## Blacks In Florida Rampage

MELBOURNE, Fla. (UPI)—A group of Negroes, frustrated by their failure to get into a City Council meeting, stoned cars and stores Tuesday night. Three white persons were injured.

The blacks, their number swelling to around 1,000, largely confined their rampage to the Negro district. A 150-man police force, sealed off a 40-square block area.

The violence subsided around 2:30 today when a meeting was set up for Wednesday evening between black spokesmen and Mayor Adger Smith and the City Council.

Most of the officers were withdrawn, but Police Chief Robert Cotron kept a riot squad and shotgun patrols in the area.

About 30 blacks went to City Hall Tuesday night to present their grievances to a City Council meeting.

## Surplus Hippo In Dutch

SEATTLE, Wash. (UPI)—What do you do with a surplus hippopotamus?

Gertrude II currently is residing at Seattle's Woodland Park Zoo, but only temporarily because the zoo already has Gertrude I, and two hippos would be one too many, according to Director Frank Vincenzi.

Gertrude II—all 1,200 pounds of her—was auctioned recently by Portland, a charitable organization, which had purchased her from an anonymous Seattle couple.

Allen E. Smith Jr., a Seattle executive, was the successful bidder and he put her on his ranch near Lake Wenatchee, where he runs horses, cattle and other animals.

But winters in the Cascade Mountains are too cold for hippos, and, besides, the other animals don't like her.

Smith finally decided to give Gertrude away. Vincenzi agreed to take her in, but only temporarily.

No doubt, the reason Smith is finding it difficult to get someone to take Gertrude off his hands is the fact that she eats like a well-lit waterhouse: a bale of alfalfa, a crate of lettuce and a bushel of carrots a day.

In fact, one zoo keeper suggested to Vincenzi that Gertrude be kept on as a permanent garbage disposal unit.

## Ills Of U.S. Are Discussed

PARIS (UPI)—A 32-nation economic organization suggested today the United States consider adopting wage and price guidelines in the effort to cure its economic ills.

The Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD), whose membership includes the United States, said in a study of U.S. economic trends that the U.S. economy should make a "moderate recovery" in the second half of this year if monetary conditions ease at forecast.

The report said certain selective measures might enhance progress toward price stability and increased employment. These measures, it said, include government action to "exclude influence over wages and prices by what have come to be called income policies."

The report said efforts to control prices in the United States "will be made more difficult by a heavy schedule of collective bargaining that will drive wages up."

## Wholesale Prices Rise As Inflation Hangs On

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Wholesale prices rose again this month as the nation remained in the grip of an inflation in some ways worse than the price-spiral that accompanied the Korean War.

The Labor Department reported Tuesday the wholesale price index for May rose 0.2 per cent, resuming its climb after having been unchanged in April.

There was both good and bad news for the food shopper. Meat and fish declined while vegetables, fruit, milk and live poultry increased. Processed foods and feeds declined 0.7 per cent overall and farm products dipped 0.1 per cent.

Wholesale prices increases often show up as higher retail prices during the next month. When the wholesale price index remained unchanged last month after 17 straight months of increases, Nixon administration economists cited it as evidence that inflation was being brought under control.

The wholesale price index this month was 116.8 of the 1957-59 average. This means it cost \$116.80 to buy the same wholesale commodities that could have been obtained

for \$100 in April or \$100 a little more than a decade ago. The index was 3.5 per cent higher than it was a year ago.

Wholesale prices rose 10.7 per cent during the 37 months of the Korean War. During the most recent 37 months of the Vietnam War, wholesale prices have advanced 10.9 per cent.

## Viet Troops Pour Over Border Area

SAIGON (UPI)—An estimated 10,000 more South Vietnamese troops have entered Cambodia for a new combat operation near the province capital of Takeo, military spokesmen said today.

The first day of the new drive turned up a guerrilla ammunition dump and arms shop.

Headquarters said the campaign started Tuesday, the same day the government reported it had concluded two operations in Cambodia and pulled out the 16,000 men involved. There are now approximately 50,000 Allied troops in Cambodia, 10,000 of them Americans.

South Vietnam's new sweep inside Cambodia kicked off six miles southeast of Takeo, about 40 miles south of Phnom Penh. The region has been a hot spot of Viet Cong and North Vietnamese activity for the past month.

Military spokesmen said the South Vietnamese task force of 5000 infantry, marines and rangers seized a five-ton ammunition cache and overran an arms shop while killing 16 guerrillas and losing one dead and two wounded.

American soldiers searching further north inside Cambodia turned up what was described as one of the biggest arms treasuries in the 27-day Cambodian campaign. Spokesmen said it contained 14 flame-throwers, more than 50,000 rifle grenades, a telephone switchboard and scores of other weapons.

U.S. 26th Infantry Division troops in the same area, about 80 miles north-northwest of Saigon, reported killing seven Viet Cong in a fight Tuesday that cost them one man wounded.

Field reports from Vietnam's northern quarter reflected an increasing in fighting there with U.S. troops battling nine guerrillas also in three days.

At Hawksville, Ga., several large trees and some cars were damaged. No injuries were reported.

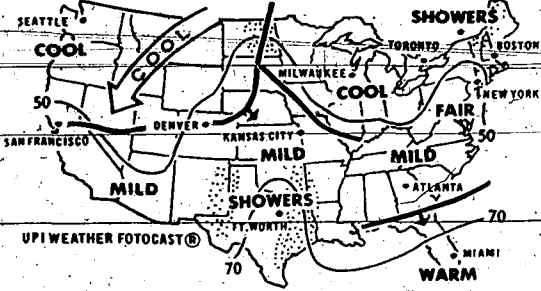

### Story On Big Horn Sheep Hit

BOISE (UPI) — The director of the Idaho Fish and Game Department protested Tuesday to a Life Magazine article, "Showdown on the Salmon River Range," he said presented a distorted view of Idaho's big horn sheep herds.

In a telegram to the editor of Life, John F. Woodworth said the article in the May 22 issue also distorted the relationship of the Idaho Fish and Game Department to the U. S. Bureau of Land Management and the Idaho cattle industry.

The telegram also charged the magazine with resorting to "sensationalism, exploiting the ignorance of a young biologist and his dedication to the future of the big horn." The article concerned Jim Morgan, Challis, a biologist originally sent into the area by the Fish and Game Department to study the sheep herds in an effort to determine why numbers of the sheep are dwindling.

Woodworth said his department to the U. S. Bureau of Land Management.

Woodworth said his department and the BLM agreed long-term overuse of the range by livestock and deer was the underlying cause of the big horn's plight, but added "these ranges did not deteriorate overnight and they will not be restored overnight."

The director cited cooperative efforts between his department, the BLM and local ranchers which were being made, including longer hunting seasons, range development, and an agreement by ranchers to transfer cattle to other ranges less critical to the big horn.

"Such efforts have been agreed to and are in progress, but they were ignored in your story," Woodworth said. "Your article could have been extremely valuable in calling attention to the plight of the big horn and encouraging efforts which are underway."

Woodworth said he intended to set wildlife and land management agencies and ranchers against each other, he said.

Woodworth said the Fish and Game Department rejected the impression another "range war" was imminent between the department, the BLM and the ranchers, adding the article was a "disservice to the agencies, Idaho's cutlmen, the environmental movement and the big horn sheep."

The Power Of The Presidency

WASHINGTON (NEA) — Since the onset of the events in Cambodia and at Kent State, the power of the presidency to overawe — if not to overwhelm — has been freshly and dramatically demonstrated to those of us who try to cover the main scene.

Talking recently at Santa Fe, N. M., with the bare handful of governors — arrived there only to learn that their semiannual Republican conference had been canceled, we found considerable disagreement with President Nixon's policies and attitudes as they affect the war, youthful unrest and related matters.

When we next saw these governors, their spokesmen (and their Democratic counterparts) had just emerged from an hours-long meeting at the White House and several key aides. The transformation in the governors' behavior was notable. Though they did concede that disagreement — and even disagreement — had surfaced in the meeting, their tone as they spoke to newsmen was respectful and deferential in the extreme. An outsider unaccustomed to the ways of politics would have judged they considered themselves greatly fortunate to have been invited into the august White House setting to be told how things are in the nation and the world.

Cambodia and Kent. Newsmen who regularly attend or observe presidential press conferences have known for a long time how badly flawed this mechanism is as a means of extracting from the President information they think the public should have. We really do not need guidance on this score from dilettante writers who dig in and out for a constant sneering look at the process.

The truth is, the conference format and setting give the President ample and immediate opportunity to set the tone of any such interrogation, to dominate it all, the way to ignore tough questions by giving "answers" that are not answers at all, to escape hard pursuit amid the predictable barrage of disjointed, unrelated questioning. Here again, an overwringing effect is created by the dazzling aura that engulfs the presidency. Questioners who want to be tough often find themselves serving up exceedingly deferential queries. Nixon, an old hand at this business, knocks those fat ones out of the ball park. Today that it has ingenious weapons to employ against any kind of counterforce, whether emanating from the press, from Congress, from the campuses or elsewhere.

Vote Power

Of all that has been said in the aftermath of the Kent State University tragedy, one of the most poignant statements was that of an anguished coed.

These four deaths wouldn't have happened, she said, if the government had listened to the students when they gathered by the hundred thousand in Washington last October for the Peace Moratorium. The students tried to work within the system, to express dissent peacefully, but nobody listened to them.

Ever since campus unrest began at Berkeley back in 1964, the older generation has been telling the younger that if it wants to reform society it must work within the system set up by society. And more and more the young have been replying that society resists orderly change, that the system is stacked against reform. Therefore, more violent action is necessary.

The fault is not that of youth. Somewhere along the line, while the children were raising a generation of obedient parents, someone failed to make clear to them the nature of "the system."

The simple fact is that while everyone in this country has the right to state and publish and dramatize his opinions, nobody is obligated to listen to him. In a democracy it is through the ballot box that the people implement change, not through the megaphone.

Oh, yeah? It is asked. What about the 1968 election? Did not the people vote overwhelmingly for Lyndon Johnson because he promised not to widen the war in Vietnam and overwhelmingly against Barry Goldwater because he talked as if he might? And did not Johnson turn around and do exactly what he promised not to do?

What about the 1968 election? The people elected Richard Nixon because he said he had a plan to win the war and because they believed a fresh administration might have a better chance to get the country out of the entanglement. But now we are in Cambodia by Nixon's order and, a year and a half after his election, still have over 400,000 men in Vietnam.

This is democracy?

The reply is that a president's room for unilateral action as commander in chief is also part of the system, an imperfect system. In 1964, Congress backed up that power by giving the president a virtual blank check in Vietnam. In 1970, with the hindsight of six years, some senators wish they could give the President nothing more than 30-day renewable notes.

The reaching of a consensus among the American people for withdrawal from Vietnam (but not a consensus on the speed of the withdrawal) has been a long, painful, costly process and students should not discount the role they played in that process. But the democratic system is not built for speed or sudden turnings.

If demonstrations or rioting by a small minority had intimidated the President into ordering an immediate withdrawal from Vietnam, the damage done to the system might in the long run have outweighed the short-run benefit of ending our part in the war.

No nation can long function when its decision-making begins to take place in the streets.

There are encouraging indications that youth may be getting fed up with violent, noisy dissent and being ready to really give the system the old college try, to borrow a phrase from a more innocent time.

Hundreds of college students — clean, neat and polite — have descended on Washington in recent days to buttonhole congressmen and officials — to talk with them, not at them. Thousands of students plan to take time out from school this fall to work for the election of congressional candidates they support.

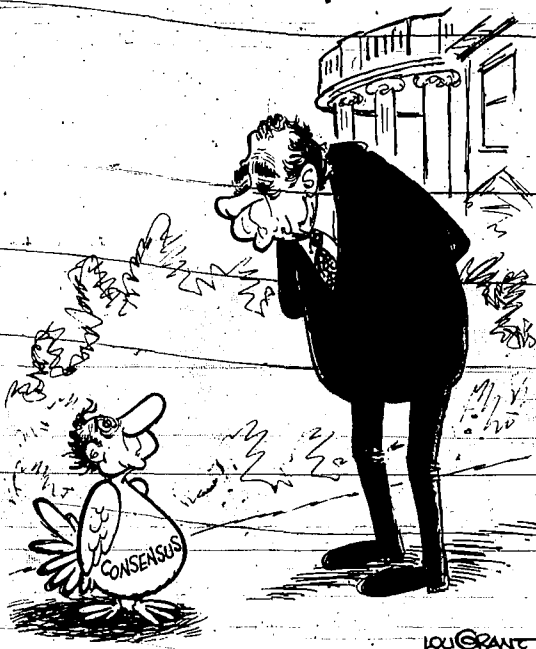
But these young people should be reminded again that "the system" makes no guarantees to anyone.

Of all the thousands of people who run for elective offices of one kind or another every year in the United States, exactly half of them, could say:

"I tried to work within the system, but nobody listened to me. The voters rejected me."

They could say it but they don't. They come back and try again.

Tired Morning

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Is there a reason for people waking up tired in the morning? And the longer they sleep, the more exhausted they feel. My friends and I used to think it was a matter of age, we being over 70. But on a TV program, several contestants aged 25 to 45 were asked about it, and their hidden, written answers were "tired." — Mrs. D. B.

A reason for waking up tired? Lots of them, ranging from purely physical to purely psychological, plus mixed.

It's a common problem; there's no common denominator in the reasons. So here are some:

Some people just need more sleep than others.

Among the over-60s, I know a lot who get up early and feel good. Habit has a lot to do with it.

A restless night — with aches, bathroom trotting, disturbing noises, a spouse who snores — can leave one feeling tired.

Night time sedation (sleeping pills) can have a sort of "hangover" effect. Too much to drink can do the same.

General physical condition is important. Usually nutrition is a factor. Low thyroid activity can cause morning fatigue. So can anemia. Also some smoldering, chronic infection.

Poor ventilation or too warm a room can be bothersome. Subtle carbon monoxide poisoning, usually from a defective heating system, can be decidedly important — and not always easy to recognize.

Psychological factors are frequent. One is just the matter of one's sleep patterns. If you have become an habitual sleeper-in, it takes some time to get into the habit of earlier rising.

Other mental aspects are boredom, anxiety, worry. If you go to bed worrying, it can be reflected in morning fatigue. If you dread the problems of the day, you "wake up tired."

Or even if there's nothing in the day ahead that disturbs you, just having no incentive to get up can make you feel tired from the moment of waking.

Age can have a bearing. Some folk, usually quite old ones, can get to a point at which they need a great deal of sleep.

In the 60s, don't automatically jump to the conclusion that it's "just age." People vary, of course, but in the 60s there are many who actually find that they require less sleep than they did some years earlier.

These spry ones, I've noticed, generally are the ones who remain, very interested in things, whether work or hobbies.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: A clipping in the paper says researchers have discovered that Vitamin A acid is effective in preventing acne and blackheads. Our family physician has no information on this. — R. L.

It is still under test and not available for general use. Investigative results sound favorable; one report said about one patient in three was helped.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: What is the difference between estrogen and hormones, if any? — Mrs. C. H. N.

Estrogen is simply one of a variety of hormones in the body. It is commonly known as "female hormones," as it is present in relatively large quantities in women.

Old-Fashioned

Commencement time puts me on a campus somewhere else two or three times every week.

It's a wonderful refreshing to encounter segments of our student population still facing the future with confidence and pride and great expectations.

I find more than a few who are not sitting around asking themselves "Who am I?" "Are my parents real?" "Is God dead?" "Which dope is not dope?"

And I thought I'd sensed a renaissance of some old-fashioned philosophies and values among today's young sophisticates; now I've seen three surveys which say the same thing: There is "an old-fashioned youth movement."

The figures for 1969 are now in and added up. An audit of retail grocery store sales includes this at-tempt to improve item:

"Purchases of home-canning jars last year were the greatest in 11 years."

My goodness, with all the prepackaged, fresh-frozen canned and even precooked foods presently available, who in the world would want to sweat through a session of home-canning any more?

The Kerr Glass people who make most of those home-canning jars had reported increased sales in three or four previous years but nothing to compare to this sudden spectacular increase in 1969.

They set out to find out who's canning and — guess who? — youngsters.

While the campus noise-makers have been making news, the same generation has been home-canning and home-canning more than any time in 11 years.

It's not grandma in the kitchen "putting up" vegetables and jams and performing the house with pickled, Kerr's survey shows only 9.2 percent have been home-canning for 37 to 40 years. Where 20.1 per cent started within the last four years.

Why? Surveyors expected the answer would be "to save money" but 8 percent of the home-canners said they did it for "enjoyment."

That's not all. More young homemakers are taking to growing their own food.

Union Fork and Hoe Co. reports sales of garden tools upending and the switch is from ornamental gardens to fruit and vegetable gardens.

Further, Ohio State University research reveals increasing interest in sewing. What are these young folks coming to!

Home economic student enrollment this year includes 5 million in secondary schools,

100,000 at college level, plus 65,000 home ec. majors.

4-H membership is at all-time high, 3.9 million members: a gain of 20 percent in one year!

And only about a third of the 4.1 million live on farms; 83.8 percent live in towns and cities.

These are nonfarm young people learning do-it-yourself crafts.

The lost generation has been found — of all places — in the kitchen!

He's Isolated

WASHINGTON — In the past few weeks it has been revealed that President Nixon and more isolated from his Cabinet.

Interior Secretary Walter Hickel said he had only seen the President twice in 15 months.

Other Cabinet officers claim Hickel was fortunate to see the President that many times.

It can now be revealed that it is no accident that the President is unavailable to his Cabinet officers. There are definite safeguards set up by White House staff members to make sure the President does not come into contact with anyone in his Administration.

This is how it works. At every White House gate in the guardhouse there are photographs of every member of the Cabinet. This is so the White House police can identify them immediately.

Whenever a member of the President's Cabinet shows up at any of the gates, the police have orders to alert someone on the White House staff that there is a Cabinet officer at the gate.

A White House summer intern is then dispatched to the gate to ask the Cabinet officer what his business is. The intern assures the officer he will transmit any input to the President.

If the Cabinet officer still insists on seeing the President, he is escorted into the White House and asked to wait in the Secret Service men's locker room.

A third assistant to a White House aide is then sent to the locker room to see if he can persuade the Cabinet officer to leave the White House without causing trouble. He tries to assure the Cabinet officer that Mr. Nixon is always happy to hear what anyone in his Administration has to say, and suggests that the best way for a Cabinet officer to communicate with the President is through his congressman.

If this fails, the Cabinet officer is then taken to the waiting room of the stenographic pool, where a secretary of one of the White House aides is sent to talk to him.

Occasionally a Cabinet officer will still insist on seeing someone in higher authority and then he will be taken to the Navy mess in the White House to talk to one of the minor White House aides, while the aide is having lunch.

If this aide cannot persuade the Cabinet officer to leave, he is then escorted upstairs to Press Secretary Ron Ziegler's assistant.

By this time, the President's three chief aides, John Erlichman, Bob Halderman and Henry Kissinger, have received word that there is a Cabinet officer in the building.

So they go on "Red Alert," and they push their desks in the hall outside the President's office in covered-wagon fashion to block the Cabinet officer from breaking in on the President.

## "Magnet School" Plan May End Segregation

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (UPI)—If approved by the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW), a "magnet school" plan to integrate Louisville's all-Negro Central High School could become a national model for many school systems.

The plan is designed to end Central's 88-year existence as a school with a Negro-only student body, a segregation thorn in the side of Kentucky's largest city.

Under the plan, recommended by the local chapter of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) and endorsed by the city school administration, the quality of education would be raised to such a degree that white students would be enticed to the school.

Rights Survey Planned  
A civil rights team composed

of eight members of HEW will visit the school this month to survey the situation and offer its opinion.

"I like the idea of making the school attractive to whites," said City School Supt. Newman Walker. "But, it is questionable whether HEW would accept the magnet school plan as a means to draw an integrated student body."

Central, founded in 1882 as the Louisville Colored High School, has been under pressure by HEW to integrate its enrollment of 1,800 students. The principal is a Negro, but one of the two assistant principals is white. Fourteen of the school's 79 faculty members are whites.

Solutions Unsatisfactory  
The school board and the NAACP are against zoning and pairing, which HEW might consider as a solution to the problem. The board already has rejected the alternatives of closing the school and of busing students.

The damaged barge sank but there were no injuries, the Coast Guard said.

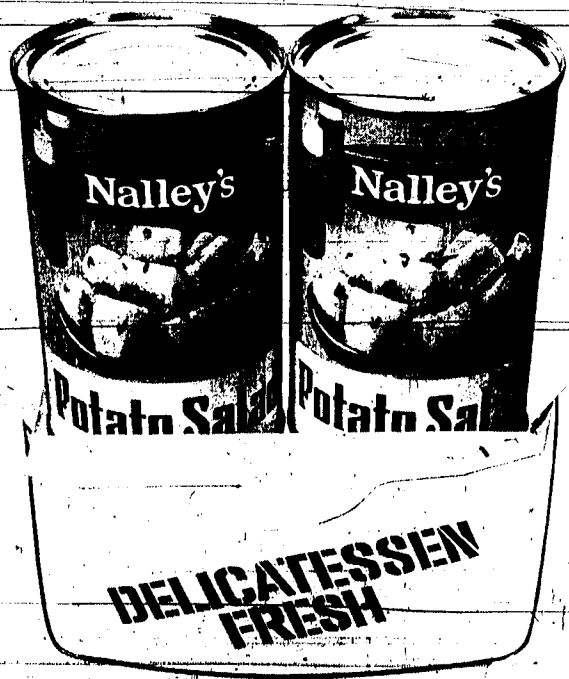

# Haste And Pressure In ISU Salary Increases

BOISE (UPI) — The director of administrative services said Tuesday hindsight might indicate there was an "element of haste and pressure" in the handling of salary increase requests from Idaho State University.

Edward Sawyer, the first permanent director of the department, told an Idaho Press Club luncheon he had not discussed the requests with ISU before he sent a memo to Gov. Don Samuelson outlining the requests.

However, he said, he planned to meet with William Bartz, ISU's financial vice president, Wednesday to discuss the matter.

"The memo, which also was turned over to the legislative council's fiscal-budget committee, outlined some 334 documents received from ISU for salary changes. Dr. William E. Davis, ISU president, termed "ridiculous" the memo's statement that 37 individuals were scheduled to receive salary increases of 33 per cent effective July 1.

"On the face of the documents there's nothing irregular," Sawyer said, adding he began signing the papers May 4. He said he had not had time to check the requests closely but added each was for "reappointment and salary change."

He said he asked the memo be given to the Fiscal-Budget Committee because "during our sessions with the legislature last year there were many indications to us from legislators that some of the salaries in certain areas in our state governmental structure were too high.

"They did make it clear they expected us to scrutinize any requests of this nature that appeared to be out of the norm and to try to hold the line."

Sawyer said he received one lengthy document from the university of Idaho, but said he had not received any salary increase requests from Boise State College.

Of the ISU requests, he said, some 250 were for five per cent or more increase, five or six included a slight monthly reduction, some asked for a two or three per cent increase, and the largest was a 35 per cent increase.

He said he had not checked to see if in some instances the requests were for changes in payments of salaries — from a 12 month basis to a nine month basis — but added "it certainly

could be any one of a number of things. But I ask you to bear in mind I received almost 90 of these things and expected a similar number from other institutions, and there was an element of haste and pressure here."

He said he had submitted to the state board of education a listing of all names, job title and current and requested salaries. "If I'm told to go ahead and process them I will," he added.

# 5 Quakes Generate Sea Waves

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Five earthquakes generated sea waves lashed Pacific, Atlantic and Caribbean coasts in 1969, and one of them killed more than 600 persons.

No lives were claimed by the other four, the Environmental Science Services Administration (ESSA) reported Tuesday. Seismic sea waves, or tsunamis, have often proved more deadly than the quakes which produced them. An earthquake on Feb. 23, 1969, in the Celebes Islands of Indonesia results in about 20 deaths.

About the tsunami it sent pouring on the west coast of Celebes was reported to have killed more than 600 persons and demolished four villages. ESSA said the number of Pacific tsunamis—three in 1969—was below average and half that of 1968.

In addition to the Celebes wave, two other tsunamis in the Pacific were caused by quakes in the Kurile Islands and off the coast of Kamchatka Peninsula, Siberia, on Aug. 11 and Nov. 22.

Neither of these waves caused any serious reported damage although they were detected at tide stations thousands of miles away.

The one Atlantic tsunami was generated by an undersea earthquake west of Portugal. The quake killed four persons and injured 74, but the wave took no toll.

The Caribbean seismic sea wave was caused by a quake in the West Indies, Leeward Islands. It, too, took no lives.

# Scouts To Be Boise Guides

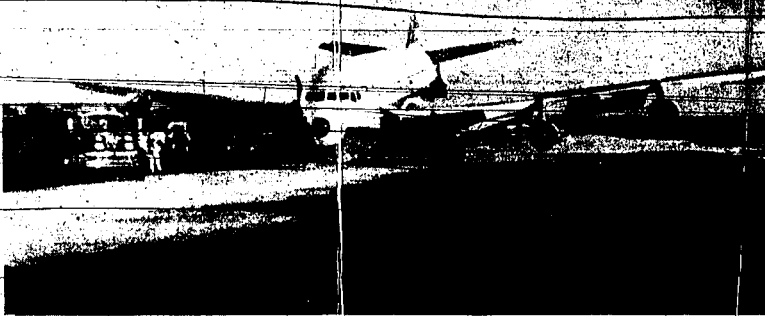

# Samuelson Forms New Development Council

BOISE (UPI) — Gov. Don Samuelson has announced creation of an Idaho Rural Development Council to coordinate state and federal activities in rural planning and development.

The council, made up of representatives of federal and state agencies, will analyze rural problems, make recommendations to the Idaho statewide comprehensive plan covering rural problems, encourage organization, help assist county rural development councils with planning of programs to increase employment opportunities, and

improve income levels and opportunities for quality life in rural Idaho. Samuelson appointed the council after secretary of agriculture Clifford M. Hardin noted in a policy statement "rural development is the responsibility of local government, groups and leaders to be supported by the services of professional personnel of the U. S. Department of Agriculture."

Herb Derrick, director of state planning and community affairs, will act as chairman of the council.

# Kent Coed Academy Color Girl Blacks To Receive Cash Fund

ANNAPOLIS, Md. (UPI) — A 19-year old Kent State University coed daughter of a year academy, was named this year's color girl at the U.S. Naval Academy Tuesday.

Sheryl Lacey, the daughter of Rear Admiral Paul L. Lacey Jr., of McLean, Va., was selected by Midshipman Edmund P. Giambastiani Jr., the commander of the 32nd company, the academy's leading company.

The 32nd led 35 other companies for the second year in a row in the annual competition for the right to carry the brigade and the nation's colors the next year. The companies are ranked according to scholarship, athletics, leadership and other qualities the Navy feels are essential for military command.

Miss Lacey, who had met Midshipman Giambastiani on a blind date last Thanksgiving but had not dated him since, will present his company with the colors on the day before commencement at the annual dress parade.

She is a sophomore at Kent State, where four students were recently shot to death by National Guardsmen.

# There Is No Work In Alaska

BOISE (UPI) — Idaho's Department of Employment advised Tuesday that anyone planning to go to Alaska in search of work would do well to reconsider those plans.

C. L. Worsley, executive director of the Idaho Department of Employment, said a report from the Alaska Department of Labor emphasized the state had a surplus of workers, particularly in the construction field.

He said reports of an oil strike and high paying employment opportunities for men needed in oil field work had been misleading and had caused an influx of job seekers. Furthermore, he said, hiring for projects will be done through local union halls which practice the state supported policy of referring Alaska residents first to available jobs.

# Blacks To Receive Cash Fund

NEWARK, N.J. (UPI) — The state will pay a total of \$19,000 to 66 black residents of Plainfield whose home were searched for guns following the 1967 riots, it was announced Tuesday.

The American Civil Liberties Union's (ACLU) New Jersey branch announced that this was the settlement reached in a \$1 million lawsuit filed three years ago against former Gov. Richard J. Hughes, who ordered the search, and other top state officials.

The settlement, worked out between the two parties, was entered into Tuesday before U.S. District Court Judge Lawrence A. Whipple. It also provides for an injunction against such searches.

Plainfield exploded just after the bloody Newark riots less than 20 miles away in which 28 persons died. In Plainfield one patrolman was stomped to death by an infuriated mob and

Hughes ordered the search by state police and National Guardsmen to confiscate illegal weapons.

# Corporation Notices Mailed By Cenarrusa

BOISE (UPI) — Secretary of State Pete Cenarrusa said today his office had sent notices to 12,600 Idaho corporations reminding them licenses are to be renewed by July 1, 1970.

Cenarrusa said the renewal, which applies to both profit and non-profit organizations, must be completed by Sept. 1, or the corporations must pay a \$10 penalty. If not renewed by Nov. 30, he said, the corporate license would be forfeited and anyone corporate name for use Cenarrusa said there was no charge for renewal of nonprofit corporate licenses, but fees for renewing licenses of profit corporations varied from \$20 to \$300 depending on the corporate capitalization.

We got her because we wanted company. I can't say that Lucy takes the place of John and Martha who have now established families of their own, but she does offer us moments of comfort. I commune with her the best when she curls up in a sunny spot or when she's snuggling on the sofa while I'm listening to music. She yawns, stretches, and luxuriates to show she's content in every way. Her silent companionship soothes me.

### Inspection Repair Cost Down

A reduction in costs to the public to bring vehicles up to standards to meet Idaho's vehicle inspection requirements has been reported by the Department of Law Enforcement.

Harold Davis, Boise, supervisor of the vehicle inspection section, said the average cost per motorist for repairs decreased from \$8.54 during the first year the inspection requirement was in force to \$5.84 this year.

He said figures furnished by the state's computer system covered three comparable months in the two years when approximately 170,000 vehicles were inspected.

Mr. Davis said total costs of bringing vehicles up to inspection standards during the first three months of the year was \$1.5 million, compared to \$1.2 million for the three months this year.

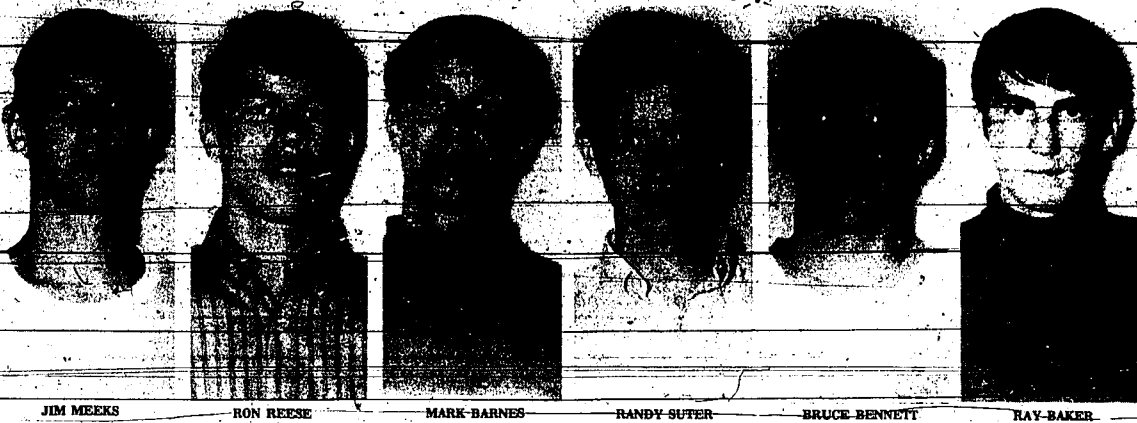

## 5.4 Billion Faces Are Contained In New Type Of Identification Kit

LONDON (UPI)—Just in case you think your face is unique, Jacques Penry not only can match it, he says he can come up with 5,399,000,000 others.

Penry's new system of facial identification, called photo-fit, is an offshoot of identikit, a process of line drawings used by police to illustrate a witness's description of a suspect.

Photo-fit uses actual photographs rather than line drawings of the various facial features. It enables a trained user to build up a realistic

composite face.

"It projects a realistic photo identification—much like a mug shot—and does away with the need for line drawings and artist impressions," Penry said.

The kit, which costs about \$190, incorporates 81 pairs of eyes, 70 noses, 86 mouths, 64 chins and cheek outlines, 169 foreheads and hairlines and countless varieties of mustaches, beards, spectacles and headwear.

"It will give permutations and combinations totalling 5.4 billion faces," Penry said.

## Romney Defends Indochina Policy, But Laments Vietnam Involvement

CHICAGO (UPI)—Cabinet member George Romney defended the Nixon administration's Indochina policy today but declared that U.S. involvement in Vietnam was "a tragic mistake" complicated by failure to follow constitutional procedure of declaring war.

Romney, secretary of the Department of Housing and

Urban Development, told a national church convention that President Nixon had been forced to allow a war policy begun by other administrations.

"We continued to adhere to containment policy when the world has fundamentally changed," Romney said. "We made the mistake of seeing Fed had been trying to get the at a time and under circum-

stances when that did not exist."

Romney said the struggle in Vietnam was mainly of an internal character but that under President Lyndon B. Johnson the war was "Americanized."

Now, Romney said, Nixon had been trying to get the conflict "de-Americanized."

Romney said Congress did not declare the United States was at war in Vietnam and said that this failure to follow constitutional procedure was one reason there has been internal strife in the nation.

# Hearing Slated In T. F.

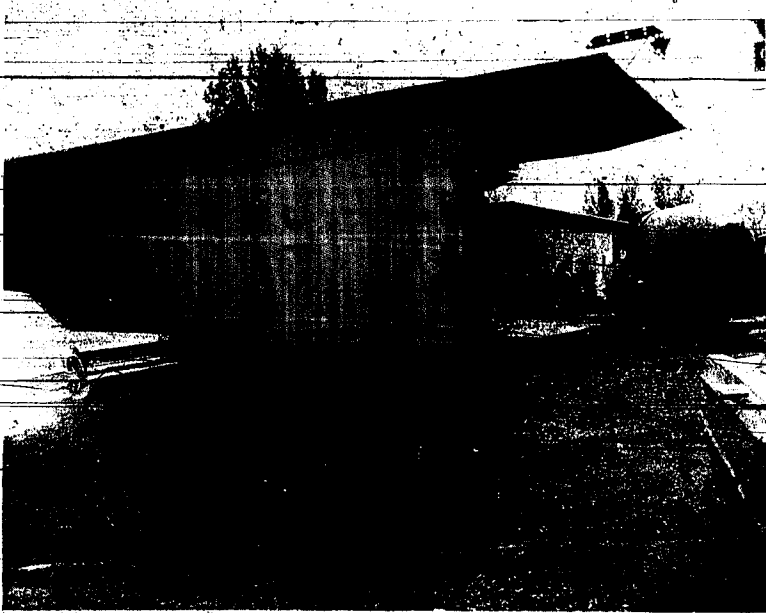
Within about two months the Twin Falls Planning and Zoning Commission should be ready to hold hearings on a proposed new zoning ordinance.

This was reported Tuesday by Dale Riedesel, chairman of the commission. He said for the past several months his organization has been reviewing the present ordinance to liberalize it in some areas and make it more applicable and easier to administer.

Allowable uses in certain zones, he said, are proposed without the present practice of a zone change application each time a piece of property is designated for a new use.

A matter brought before the zoning commission Monday night for informal discussion only, Mr. Riedesel said, would come under the new ordinance in that it provides for unit development including several uses in one area. A proposed housing development on Park-Line Road to include a "neighborhood service center" would be covered in the new ordinance, the chairman said.

In addition, the commission is also preparing a new zoning ordinance based on recommendations of the Down Town Improvement Committee to fit zoning regulations in with the new mall type development. Mr. Riedesel said both proposals will be submitted to the city council for final action following hearings and work by the zoning board.

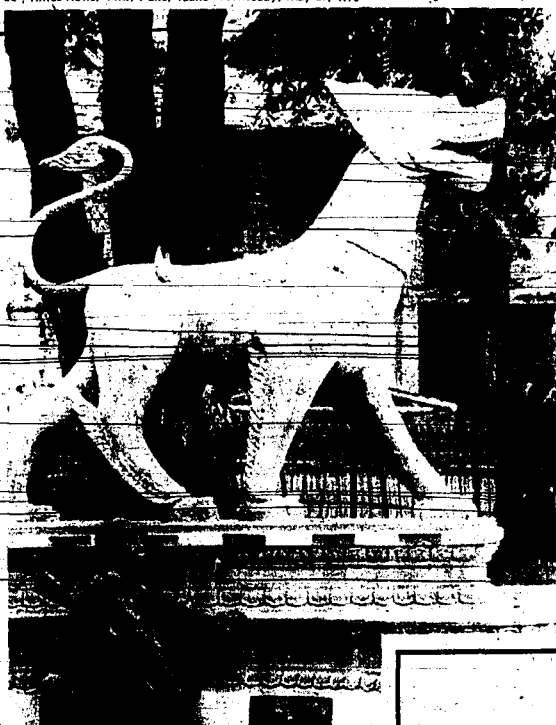

His Southern Strategy Harris, politically and personally, is a study in contrasts. While judged a liberal by most political standards, he comes from a conservative state. He speaks with a Southern farm boy drawl but quotes by memory from a seemingly unlimited reservoir of the writings of Shakespeare, Jefferson, Albert Camus and other literary and political greats. His father, born in Mississippi, worked as a mule skinner, cotton picker, farmer and cutliman. His mother, a native of East Texas, has been a chicken plucker, laundry worker, cotton picker, store clerk and housewife.

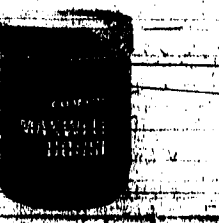

## Survey Completed On Use Of Drugs By Students In Idaho

The Department of Education has completed a statewide survey of junior and senior high school students on use of drugs, according to D. F. Engelking, state superintendent.

The one-day survey was conducted by the department in cooperation with the State Law Enforcement Planning Commission, with some 80,000 students involved.

"We believe educators have a unique responsibility in this challenge because of our daily contact with young people, Mr. Engelking said. "Consequently, educational programs designed to provide valid information about drug abuse and illegal drugs are vital."

He said the study will provide data needed by educators at both public school and teacher preparation levels for the

"planning and development of drug education programs for the junior and senior high schools in Idaho."

Gov. Don Samuelson has endorsed the survey by saying "actual knowledge of the problem is almost non-existent and it is time we obtain some valid data on which to proceed."

The three main objectives of the survey, according to Mr. Engelking are to determine the extent of drug abuse by Idaho's student population; to provide a valid data base on which to give direction to teacher training programs and curriculum guides; and to serve as a springboard to invite community involvement in preventative programs for drug abuse.

Participation in the survey

was on a voluntary basis and responses were scored on a computerized sheet and immediately sealed in envelopes so individual students could not be identified.

No data on individual communities or school districts will be released, the state superintendent said.

He said he is working with both the U. S. Office of Education and the federal government under the Omnibus Crime Act for grants totaling \$100,000 for drug education programs in the state. The funds would be used to train teachers and specialists.

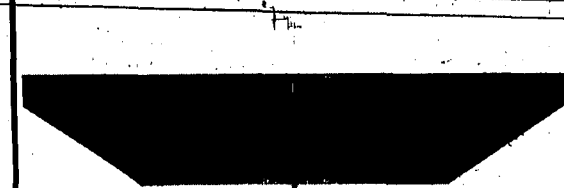

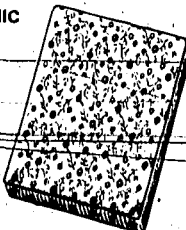
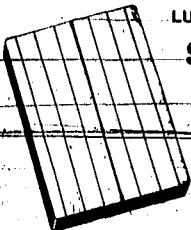

# Tanzia's "Big Mama" Due To Be Put On Trial For Treason Next Month

By DAVID CREFFIELD  
**DAR ES SALAAM, Tanzania (UPI)**—Mama Mkuu—"Big Mama"—is due to go on trial for treason early in June and the fall from grace of this once powerful woman grips the attention of the entire nation.  
 Mama Mkuu—her given name is **BTU**—Mohamed—is one of eight persons accused of plotting to overthrow the government of President Julius Nyerere last October. They will be the first treason trial in Tanzania's six-year history.  
 Prior to her arrest seven months ago, Mama Mkuu was a close friend of Nyerere. She was a founding member of the ruling Tanganyika African National party, and headed the party's influential women's section.

Some of her codefendants were equally highly placed including Michael Kamaliza, former minister of labor and head of Tanzania's only trade union movement. Another, now in self-exile in Britain and facing possible extradition, is Oscar Kambona, former foreign minister, confidante of Nyerere and secretary-general of the alleged traitors.  
 Three of the alleged traitors are army officers: Col. William Chacha, 46, former Tanzanian military attaché in Peking; Elyah Chipaka, 32, a former captain, and Alfred Milingo, 27, a former lieutenant.  
 Rounding out the defendants are Gray Matitaka, 34, former news editor of the official party newspaper "The Nationalist," and John Chipaka, 38, former

official of the Workers' Development Corporation and brother of Elyah Chipaka.  
 The eight, who have been in prison since last October, are accused of planning to overthrow the Nyerere government with the help of African and guerrilla freedom fighters.  
 It is alleged that, with Kambona financing and masterminding the scheme from London, the plot was to have been put into effect between Oct. 10 and 15 last year. The idea, the government charges, was to act while Nyerere was to greet other top government officials, including Maj. Gen. Sam Sarakyika, chief of Tanzania's defense forces, were out of the country on an overseas tour.  
 Details of how the plot was to

be carried out, and the motivation for it, have not been disclosed.

## Built-In Drunk Driver Tester Has Some Bugs

**WASHINGTON (UPI)**—My compliments to General Motors for nitting on the idea of a car with a built-in drunk driver tester. But I fear the device GM has in mind is inadequate.  
 GM's tester, still in the development stage, flashes a series of numbers on the dashboard when the ignition is turned on. After two seconds, the numbers disappear and the driver has six seconds to push the same numbers on a series of buttons.  
 If he is unable to pass the test in three tries, he is presumed to be too drunk to drive and the car won't start.  
 The trouble with this type of test is that it fails to take into account the fact that there are more than one kind of drunk.

 I'm sure that when the dance is over Billy will have no trouble pushing the right buttons on the drunk tester. But, believe me, you wouldn't want him driving you home.  
 The only way you can tell when Billy has had too much to drink is by the way he sibilates. What GM should develop for people like him is a dashboard tape recorder that is connected to the ignition system.  
 When the driver turns on the ignition, he is given three chances to say "She sells sea shells down by the sea shore." If he is unable to do so within six seconds, the car won't start.  
 Others Affected Differently  
 Other people show their liquor still other ways. Some get hiccups. Some giggle. Some reel. "The Wrath of the Hesperus." Some sing "On the Road to Mandalay."  
 Yet they may be perfectly capable of comprehending intricate number patterns.  
 On the other hand, I know people who never touch a drop but who get three wrong numbers every time they use a push-button telephone.  
 Obviously, that GM drunk tester will need extensive modifications. Otherwise, the roads may be filled with drunken "tango" dancers while scores of innocent teetotalers are stalled in traffic.

# Interstate Highways 70 Pct. Complete

Motorists now have access to 29,640 miles of multilane roads—70 per cent of the 42,500-mile Interstate Highway System completed by the end of 1969. Another 4,782 miles are under construction; engineering and right-of-way in progress totals 6,299 miles—and 1,781 miles of road are just in the preliminary status.

Cost to 1970, since the system was started in 1956, totals \$38 billion. Construction involving 236,256 miles of primary and secondary highways and their urban extensions have been completed since 1956 at a cost of \$20.95 billion.

States now having the most miles open to traffic are: Texas, 2,241; California, 1,604; Pennsylvania, 1,255; Illinois, 1,151. It is interesting to note that of the 42,500 total mileage, only 2,300 miles of toll facilities have been integrated into the system.

The highway program is wholly financed by highway users on a pay-as-you-build basis with these principal sources of revenue: Motor fuel; 4 cents a gallon; new trucks and buses, trailers; 10 per cent of wholesale price; tires and tubes; 10 cents a pound; heavy vehicle use; \$3 per 1,000 pounds annually on gross weight of those rated at more than 26,000 pounds; truck and bus parts, and accessories; 8 per cent of maker's wholesale price; lubricating oil; 6 cents a gallon.

### Summer Jobs Available For High School Students In T.F.

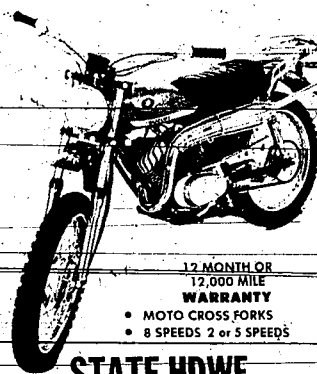

### Exploiting Of Children By Television Blasted

By JOAN HANAUER NEW YORK (UPI)—Jim Henson believes it is criminal to subject children to the hard sell of television commercials—unless what you are selling them is reading, writing and arithmetic.

Jim very upset about television's exploitation of children," Henson said. He speaks as an authority—he is the creator of the Muppet puppets—such as Kermit, the frog, and the Cookie Monster seen regularly on Sesame Street on National Educational Television (NET).

"There are millions of dollars aimed at the 12 or younger group," he said. "It's almost criminal—no, it is criminal, getting kids to buy products. That's not where the networks should be making money. These kids are our country, our future, and they shouldn't be exploited."

"I have four kids of my own, ages five through nine. The two oldest already know that no product advertised on television for them is any good. They're convinced anything aimed at them is garbage—and then network officials wonder why the teen-agers turn off television."

Concerning sponsorship by the R. J. Reynolds Foods for one of his recent network shows, Henson says: "That's different—and not just because it's me. The commercials weren't aimed at children. I have no objection to commercials aimed at getting grown-ups to buy products."

Henson, 33, tall, lanky and lightly bearded, is a product of Greenville, Miss., and Hyattsville, Md., a suburb of Washington, D.C. He got into the puppet business to help earn his way through the University of Maryland, and did a puppet show for a Washington television station.

"It wasn't until I went to Europe and met some of the puppeteers there that I began to be really interested in puppets as something a man could spend his life doing," Henson said.

He and his puppets have

since appeared on a wide variety of shows, from "Today" to "Tonight," from Ed Sullivan to Dick Cavett, and he also has done commercials and industrial films.

"Sesame Street is my first time with educational television," Henson said. "It's been a lot of fun and the reception has been fantastic—five to six million kids watch it."

"It's a fascinating and challenging thing to teach kids. It's so exciting and we've only been doing it a year now—with a year before that for research—and we've hardly scratched the surface of what can be done with teaching children."

"On Sesame Street we use the kind of visuals used in commercials. The commercial sponsors spend millions of dollars researching what works and we're stealing all their techniques to teach the letter 'a' and the letter 'B.'"

He predicted that educational television will be used increasingly for everything from teaching children how to read to adult courses, "applying production techniques with entertainment value."

"We have to make education as interesting and exciting as really is," he said. "Learning is fun. It is a matter of making it seem that way, instead of making it drag that it too often is turned into."

"I don't mean we should use television instead of schools and teachers. But educational television—expensive as it is overall—is still very cheap per individual child per day. And it just isn't possible to get all the wonderful people you can put on television into every classroom of 30 kids."
