## To Serve As Aide Of Nixon

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Nixon removed Robert H. Finch as secretary of a demoralized, politics-ridden Department of Health, Education and Welfare Saturday and made him a White House counselor with cabinet rank.

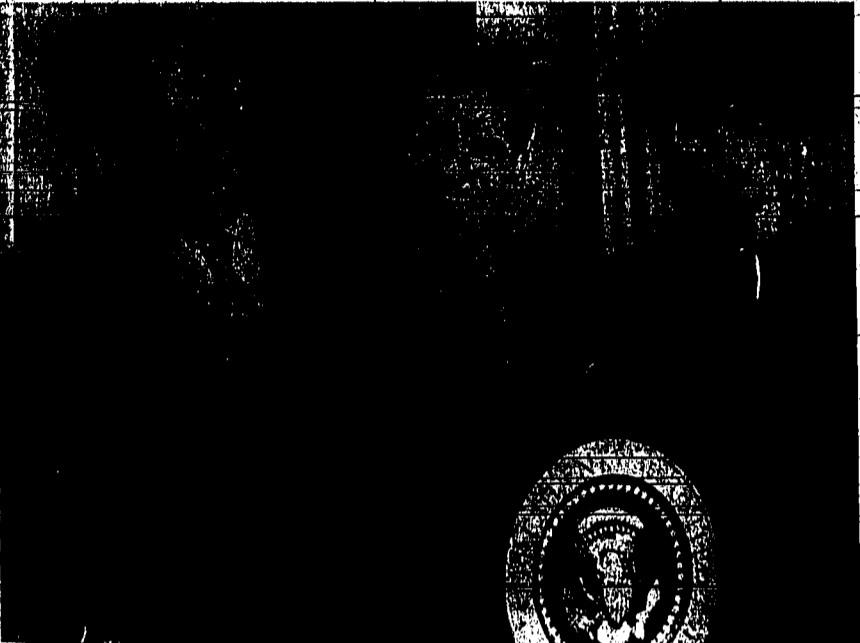
Finch will be succeeded at HEW by Undersecretary of State Elliot L. Richardson, 49, pending Senate confirmation. Richardson's reputation as a hard-nosed, innovative administrator will be put to a severe test in a department so big that many in Washington regard it as unmanageable.

"I believe this change is in the best interest of the whole administration," the President told newsmen at the White House with Finch and Richardson at his side. "It will bring to the White House a man I need. It will bring to HEW a man with great administrative experience."

Finch's ouster—an aide said he had not requested the transfer—ended a stormy tenure at HEW during which he found himself criticized from within and outside the department and repeatedly overruled by the White House.

"It's a high calling but a lower salary," Finch cracked about his new job. He received \$90,000 a year as HEW secretary; the top pay for a White House counselor is \$42,500.

## Israeli Guns Pound Arabian Positions Along Suez Canal

Israeli artillery barrages sent Egyptian positions on the Suez front line exploding in flames Saturday, a Tel Aviv military spokesman said. In the Upper Galilee, Soviet-made rockets fired from Lebanon hit the Israeli town of Kiryat Shmona.

In Moscow, the Soviet Union warned that "the United States is not the only state which

the balance of military forces in the Middle East depends."

A commentary by the official Soviet news agency Tass accused the United States of building up "aggravation" in the Middle East "to test different weapons in the Middle East shooting range."

An Israeli military spokesman said Israeli artillery battled Egyptian big guns in flight and day duels across the Suez Canal. They reported firing raging at Egyptian positions near El Quntara, about midway along the canal, and

Port Ibrahim, at its southern terminus.

The duels erupted several times when Egyptian gunners opened fire at Israel's positions, according to the spokesman. Israeli gunners struck back at the Egyptian artillery batteries and other military targets.

The spokesman said Israeli desert patrols killed at least two Arab guerrillas, one of them in an area near the southern port of Elia where saboteurs blew up power lines.

South of the Sea of Galilee Israel and Jordanian troops battled with machine guns in the East-Shuna area of the cease-fire line, a Jordanian military spokesman said.

## Task Force Probes In Cambodia

BY MARGARET KILGORE KOMPONG TRACH, Cambodia (UPI)—President Nixon's 13-man factfinding task force on the Indochina War made its own incursion from South Vietnam into Cambodia Saturday and drank coconut juice with a Cambodian province governor.

"We've learned a lot and we've seen a lot," said Herbert G. Klein, White House communications director and leader of the group of U.S. governors, senators and congressmen.

"It's been very helpful."

The group arrived in Saigon Thursday night. Members were flying back to Washington next week with a stopover in Hawaii to prepare a report on their findings for Nixon and Congress.

## Sihanouk Says Reds Offer Help

PARIS (UPI)—Prince Norodom Sihanouk said in an interview broadcast Saturday that Communist China was giving him a loan to finance his government-in-exile, and providing him with arms and transport for a bid to overthrow the new Cambodian regime that ousted him in a coup.

In the interview broadcast by Radio Luxembourg, Sihanouk did not disclose the amount of the loan but said it would be repayable "after victory." He said the offer of free weapons and transport came personally from Chinese Chairman Mao Tse-tung.

## Vatican Welcomes U.S. Envoy

VATICAN CITY (UPI)—The Vatican newspaper L'Osservatore Romano Saturday said new official contacts between the Holy See and Washington should help considerably in resolving problems of world peace and prosperity.

It was the first official reaction—beyond a brief statement welcoming the move—since the announcement Friday that President Richard M. Nixon was naming Henry Cabot Lodge as special envoy to the Holy See.

## Wholesale Prices Are Increasing

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Final government figures released Friday showed that wholesale prices increased two-tenths of 1 per cent in May despite a slight drop in the cost of farm products and food.

The figures released by the Labor Department's Bureau of Labor Statistics were little changed from its preliminary estimate made May 26.

## Cambodian Capital Hears Guns

SAIGON (UPI)—Gunfire broke out in the Cambodian capital of Phnom Penh Saturday night and scattered shooting continued for nearly an hour. To the northwest, Communist ground forces attacked the tourist city of Siem Reap at the gateway to the historic ruins of Angkor Wat.

The gunfire in the capital began shortly before midnight in the vicinity of the railway yards. There was no explanation for the shooting, the first such exchanges heard in the capital, but it followed two terrorist explosions earlier Saturday.

Flares lighted the sky over the capital as the firing came in occasional bursts, but mostly in single rounds.

## Peru Quake Worst In 35 Years

The number of deaths caused by the earthquake in Peru, currently estimated from 40,000 to 60,000, would make it the worst quake in exactly 35 years.

Records of various sources, including the U.S. Coast and Geodetic Survey, show that not since approximately 60,000 persons died in an earthquake in Quetta, India, on May 31, 1935, have more than 30,000 persons been killed in a quake.

The quake in Peru occurred last Sunday, the 35th anniversary of the one in India.

The most deadly earthquake ever recorded killed an estimated 850,000 persons in China's Szechwan province in January, 1936.

## Cosmonauts Clean House In Space

MOSCOW (UPI)—Soyuz 9 cosmonauts Andrian Nikolayev and Vitaly Sevastianov occupied themselves Saturday with spaceflight chores ranging from medical research to brewing hot coffee.

Soviet press reports of the flight, now in its fifth day, described a daily routine that sounded like life in a suburban apartment.

"While one cosmonaut runs a vacuum cleaner, the other brews coffee or shaves," the news agency Tass said, describing the start of their working day.

Tass also said Nikolayev and Sevastianov enjoyed radioed reports of world events, particularly the World Cup soccer in Mexico.

## U.S. Lets \$1-Billion Plane Pact

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Defense Department Friday awarded contracts worth an estimated \$1.7 billion to North American Rockwell and General Electric to develop a new supersonic bomber and the jet engines to propel it.

The cost of the project would climb to a total of nearly \$3 billion if the Pentagon orders a fleet of 200 of the superplanes to replace the aging B52 as the nation's No. 1 strategic bomber.

The initial contract for developing the plane itself, at a cost of \$1.35 billion, including a target profit of \$115 million, went to North American Rockwell Corp. of El Segundo, Calif.

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## Relics Stolen Continuing Demonstrations Mar Graduation Ceremonies

CORSTOPTUM, England (UPI)—Thieves broke into the museum of this Roman site and stole an undisclosed amount of relics, some nearly 2,000 years old, a museum spokesman said Saturday.

Museum officials said it was impossible to estimate the value of the missing items which included a bronze perfume bottle in the shape of a barbarian's head and shoulders, a trumpet-shaped brooch and a bronze plate.

The violence and tensions of the last school year were reflected Saturday at graduation ceremonies on campuses throughout the nation.

About 100 longshoremen from Cleveland and Toledo, Ohio, wearing hardhats with stickers reading, "I Love America" came by bus to Kenyon College to protest the appearance of Swedish Prime Minister Olof Palme, a longtime critic of American involvement in Indochina, who at the Gambler, Ohio School, to receive an honorary degree.

Graduating seniors at Virginia Tech took out a quarter-page advertisement in the Richmond Times-Dispatch to express their thanks for having the privilege of attending the university.

At Beaver County Day School in Brookline, Mass.; Rep. Margaret Heckler, R-Mass., had to be escorted off stage following a Friday night commencement day speech when 30 blacks entered and demanded that she discuss racism and repression.

"The world is out of joint in more respects today perhaps than at any time in the history of living persons," the former chief justice of the United States, Earl Warren told 2,742 University of Utah graduates. "And it has brought about a divisiveness between

nations, groups, and persons which defies comparison."

Edward N. Cole, president of General Motors, told the 17th June commencement audience at Eastern Michigan University that America should make more technological progress during the last 30 years of the 20th Century than it did in the first.

At Grove City College in Grove City, Pa., Willard F. Rockwell told graduating students that they will pay almost \$150,000 in income taxes the rest of their lives.

"This vast student majority had better speak up soon because they're going to be paying the bill for whatever emerges from the current unrest," Rockwell, chairman of the board at Norman Rockwell, said.

## Church Protest Bill Change

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Sen. Frank Church said Saturday that the modifications of the Cooper-Church Amendment by Sen. Robert Byrd could result in a second "Bay of Tonkin Resolution."

Church said the Byrd modification—if enacted—could be treated as an open-ended invitation to the President to do what he will in Cambodia without further approval of Congress.

The Cooper-Church Amendment, sponsored by Church and Sen. John Sherman Cooper, R-Ky., would prohibit American forces in Cambodia after July 15 without congressional approval.

The Byrd Amendment will allow the President to keep troops in the Southeast Asian country after that date without seeking consent of the Senate.

Church said he isn't surprised that the President backs the proposal of Byrd. "Most presidents would favor such a proposal. All presidents like blank checks."

He said it was a similar "blank check" that President Johnson used to escalate the American involvement in Vietnam.

## Idaho Mine Said Vital By Chief

MCCALL, Idaho (UPI)—Gov. Don Samuelson said Friday development of mining properties in the White Clouds was a vital step in relieving property tax pressures on Idaho residents.

Samuelson told some 70 McCall Rotarians there were only two ways to move Idaho ahead: "One, by merely putting a greater tax load on you who already are carrying the load. Two, by creating a broader tax base."

The governor also complained of alleged "misinformation" being circulated concerning the mining venture and said the mining area is at the bottom of a canyon one-quarter of a mile from Castle Peak.

## Survivors Of 'Quake Seek Food

LIMA, Peru (UPI)—Survivors of Peru's killer earthquake scavenged for food in the ruins of Caraz today and there were reports of looting in nearby Huauraz.

There were grisly stories of starving dogs and pigs eating the bodies of earthquake victims.

Anthony Dalnaky, chief of the United Nations mission in Peru, called Secretary General Thant Friday that at least 50,000 were dead in the Callejon de Huaylas Valley high in the Andes, where 1.5 million persons lived.

"The problem of getting relief supplies to the valley, 800 miles northeast of Lima, was complicated by the fact that only helicopters have been able to negotiate the Andes corridor at 15,000 feet. The U.S. aircraft carrier Guam is due Wednesday with 12 Chinook helicopters and two Huey helicopters which can carry tons of supplies in and take out 24 litter patients at a time.

## Girl's Body Located In Idaho River

GRANGEVILLE (UPI)—The Idaho County sheriff's office continued Saturday its attempt to identify the body of a woman found in the Salmon River near Rigging, Thursday.

The body is thought to be that of Nadine Dulla, 17, Elba, Idaho, who drowned in the Salmon River upstream from Salmon a year ago Friday when a boat in which she and her sister, Carlis, 16, were riding broke up in some rapids. Carlis's body was recovered June 17, 1969, but no trace of Nadine was ever found.

## Lung Ailment Takes Life Of Actor At 58

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (UPI)—Sorty Tufts, who rejected his family tradition in the Boston banking business in favor of acting and singing, has died at the age of 58.

His ancestors for generations had attended Harvard. Tufts chose Yale. His family was listed in the Boston Social Register but Tufts left home to manage and play in bands. He played 15 instruments.

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## Idaho River Shoshone GI Killed In Cambodian Action

SHOSHONE—Mr. and Mrs. Otis Williams of Shoshone have received word of the death of their son, Bill Williams, 26, in Cambodia.

Mr. Williams is also survived by his widow, Betty Heck Williams, formerly of Twin Falls, now residing in Rupert where she has been teaching school the past year.

Information received by the survivors indicated Mr. Williams was critically wounded in Cambodia, flown to Vietnam in a military hospital and died either en route or at the Vietnam hospital.

He had two months to complete a two-year enlistment at the time of his death, members of the family said. Born March 14, 1944, in Gooding, he attended school there and in Shoshone. He also attended Lasean

## College; Susanville, Calif., and Sierra College, Sacramento, Calif., for one year each, finishing two years at Idaho State University, Eagle, Idaho.

In addition to his widow and parents, he is survived by two brothers, Dean and Jack Williams, both Shoshone, and his maternal grandmother, Mrs. Lela Evans, Long Beach, Calif.

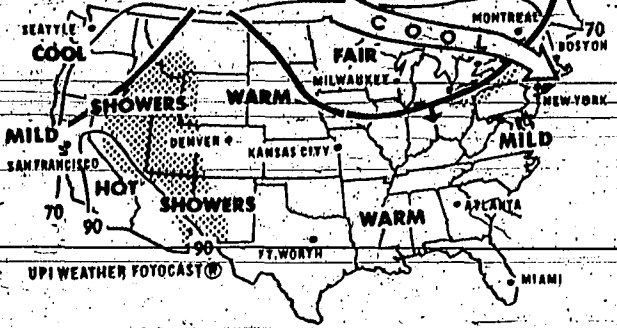

# Pesticide Contributing To Bald Eagle Decline

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A widely used pesticide is contributing to the decline in the population of the bald eagle, the national bird which already is considered an endangered species in 48 states.

Interior Department scientists say they have detected poisoning from dieldrin in growing numbers of bald eagles found dead in the United States, with the pesticide "the only apparent cause of death" in most of the birds that have been the national symbol since 1782.

They said perhaps more important dieldrin and other

environmental pollutants may have an even more insidious effect on the eagle population by reducing the bird's reproduction capability.

An Audubon Society survey conducted in 1968 found there were some 1,800 bald eagles in the 48 contiguous states, where they are considered in danger of becoming extinct. Most of those birds were found along the East Coast, in Florida and the Northern Midwest. In addition, the survey estimated there were about 3,500 of a slightly different northern variety in Alaska and Canada.

The Interior Department,

however, estimates there are about 7,000 bald eagles in Alaska.

Charles H. Mescham, commissioner of the Interior Department's Fish and Wildlife Service, said dieldrin is a persistent pesticide like DDT but considerably more toxic.

Dr. Lucille Sliokol, pesticide research coordinator at the department's Patuxent Wildlife Research Center in Laurel, Md., said dieldrin is widely used in all parts of the nation by farmers and in woolen mills to treat fabrics against moths. Residues from the pesticide apparently drain into streams

and lakes, where some of it accumulates in the bodies of fish, which make up the bulk of the eagles' diet, she said.

She explained that a smaller degree of propagation and hatching success is one of the two major reasons for the decline of the bald eagle. Pesticide residues in the birds may be making eggs infertile, killing unborn chicks in the eggs and resulting in thinner eggshells that break easier.

The other major reason for the decline is the killing of adult birds by hunters, even though bald eagles are protected

by law and there is \$500 fine for killing them.

An official for the Audubon Society explained, however, that bald eagles don't grow white feathers on their heads.

Scientists said Saturday 18 light earth tremors rippled through this city of rising and falling earth during the past 24 hours. The tremors were the latest in a series that began earlier this year. 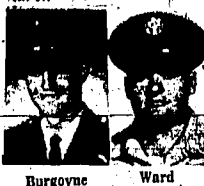

### White Clouds Water Quality Study Vetoed

BOISE (UPI) — A motion to authorize a special water quality study in the White Clouds area was defeated by the Idaho Water Pollution Advisory Council Thursday. State Reclamation Engineer Keith Higginson said he objected to the emotional approach to the problem. He said "any trouble area deserves special study." Will Burnham, Idaho geological survey director, said his agency would begin next week construction of a water-flow measuring station located at the mouth of Little Boulder Creek, downstream from proposed mining sites. Burnham asked the advisory council for help in starting a ground-water quality monitoring service and indicated that at the present time no measurement of underground water quality is being conducted.

### Television Cassette Is Latest In Entertainment

(This is the first of five articles about television cassettes, and the far-reaching effects they are expected to have on home entertainment and leisure time.)

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — Like the first talking movies, the development of long-playing records and the introduction of home television, there now comes another historic breakthrough in entertainment.

The television cassette. In effect, it is a combination of these three earlier developments. For video cassettes are long-playing films and or visual tapes that individuals will be able to buy or rent, and then play on their own television sets by means of a small attached unit. Eventually, cassette-playing units are bound to be built in to standard television sets.

The potential of cassette-programming is staggering, and is already shaking up show business, where traditional circles concede an enormous breakthrough on the consumer level is inevitable. It is estimated that cassettes will be, at minimum, a billion-dollar industry by the end of the decade.

And show business is only one phase of it. From publishing to education to self instruction to business techniques, cassettes will be a factor to be reckoned with.

Furthermore, the technical compatibility of cassette units with the burgeoning cable television (CATV) field — both operate on the simple principle of wire connected to antenna, with no outside picture interference — makes cassettes a huge, inexpensive, natural programming source for CATV systems. And programming is what CATV needs to become a video

# Hijackers Perplex Airlines

WASHINGTON (UPI)—For the airline industry, the hijacker has become a terrifying puzzle.

How can he be stopped? How can a potential hijacker be spotted in a line of waiting airline passengers? What should be done once he shows his hand?

At present the most obvious deterrent in use against hijackers is the threat of a long federal prison term.

But for spotting and handling trouble, authorities now are relying primarily on a weapons detection system and a psychological "behavioral profile" of the typical hijacker designed by the Federal Aviation Administration.

The results are mixed. So far this year six American airliners have been hijacked, compared with 33 in 1969 and 18 the year before.

Transportation Secretary John A. Volpe says the decline stems from a concentrated attack on the problem. He reports that "in recent months 24 persons" were kept off airliners when they either tripped a weapons detection device or were spotted by airline employees using the psychological profile.

Weapons, ranging from guns to knives, have been found in airport waiting rooms where they presumably were discarded by airline passengers who feared the detection system, Volpe said.

Only three airlines—Eastern, Trans-World, and Pan-American—are using detection devices. A fourth airline is expected to join the group shortly.

An FAA spokesman says the government also hopes soon to get airline agreement on a plan

to equip entire airports with the devices so that each airline gate would be covered.

If every gate were covered, authorities might be able to avert hijackings like last week's takeover of a TWA jetliner by a passenger who boarded the plane at Phoenix. The gate the hijacker used to board the plane was not equipped with a device and there was no detection of the gun he carried.

The personality of the hijacker is one of the biggest puzzles. Dr. John T. Dalley, chief FAA psychologist, says that commanding a plane is the hijacker's "one moment of power and glory in a life of failure."

The records show that most hijackers have been either criminals or emotionally disturbed persons bearing a grudge. Sprinkled in between are politically motivated individuals who use airplanes as a way to get to places like Cuba.

Except for possibly being emotionally disturbed and bearing a grudge, the hijacker of the TWA jet did not fit any of these patterns, "he had suicide on his mind," a psychologist said.

The Air Line Pilots Association (ALPA) believes the best solution is for all nations to support the Tokyo Convention, which requires signatories to return hijackers to the country of their origin. This should be coupled with quick and severe punishment by U.S. courts, says ALPA President Charles Ruby.

Other efforts to curb hijacking range from a \$25,000 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of a hijacker to the FAA proposal to bulletproof cockpit doors.

Some possible solutions have been ruled out. Pilots are unarmed because some airlines

do not want to risk a gunfight in the cabin when a passenger could be killed and there is no guarantee it would lead to the capture of a hijacker.

Armed guards were ruled out by many airlines for the same reasons.

## Threat Of Protestants Voice Grudging 'Blacks' Approval Of Vatican Envoy Stirrs Vote

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (UPI)—"What kind of a deal would a man make for 250,000 votes?" The backers of George C. Wallace supplied both the question and the answer, contending that if elected governor, Albert P. Brewer, Wallace's opponent, would name 125 blacks to the state highway patrol.

Brewer took over the governor's chair two years ago when Laurien Wallace, who was elected as a stand-in for her husband, died of cancer. Wallace soundly whipped Brewer last Tuesday in a runoff primary in which Brewer was attempting to win a four-year term of his own.

Although Brewer hammered away on a variety of issues, including schools, law and order, and taxes, Wallace hit upon the one that jarred the voters into action.

He warned repeatedly of the "black bloc vote" and said if he suffered defeat, blacks would take over the reins of state government and hold them for "the next 50 years."

Protestant leaders expressed general—but not always enthusiastic—approval Friday of President Nixon's appointment of a special envoy to the Vatican as a possible contribution to world peace.

There was no immediate comment from national church organizations on the President's appointment of Henry Cabot Lodge, but a number of bishops, lesser churchmen and prominent laymen expressed individual opinions.

An Episcopal bishop praised

the appointment and an advocate of strict church-state separation denounced it. The usual reaction was one of cautious approval.

The Rev. Everett C. Parker, communications director of the National Council of Churches, said he sees no harm in the President having contact with the Pope "if it would help the cause of world peace."

Episcopal Bishop John P. Crane of Indianapolis halted the Lodge appointment as a sign that Nixon "has seen fit to recognize the moral authority of this great spokesman for Christianity in a day of frequent moral confusion."

The principal spokesman for the negative, associate director Stanley Lowell of Americans United for Separation of Church and State, assailed the appointment as "an egregious violation of our national tradition."

"This is a cynical appeal for Catholic votes by President Nixon," Lowell said.

"There will be a very sharp

reaction from Protestants across this country," Archbishop Luigi Raimondi of the U.S. Catholic Conference praised the assignment, calling it a reflection of a "universal desire" of all nations to work toward "peace, ... dignity and progress for all."

Dr. Harold Blake Walker, retired senior minister of the First Presbyterian Church of Evanston, Ill., saw the appointment as a possible violation of church-state separation, but added "I suppose it might be helpful in building bridges across some of the divisions of the world."

## Subsidy Lid For Farms Demanded

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Rep. Paul Findley, R-Ill., said Friday he would try again to get a \$20,000 ceiling on subsidy payments to farmers when the House considers the agriculture appropriation bill next week.

The House put the ceiling in the farm money bill last year but the Senate struck it out. The House later accepted the Senate deletion.

Findley said he would offer his ceiling amendment on the floor Tuesday when the House begins debate on the \$7.4 billion appropriation measure.

Although a Congressman from a farm district near Quincy, Ill., Findley said, "Scandalously big payments have been getting more numerous every year and the outlook is for more of the same in the future."

"Every survey shows overwhelming public support among farmers and city people alike for this provision," he said.

## 14,000 To Lose Jobs In Texas

FORT WORTH, Tex. (UPI)—General Dynamics, disappointed by the loss of a multi-billion dollar Defense Department contract to build a new supersonic bomber, Friday announced plans to lay off as many as 14,000 of the plant's workers by the end of 1971.

The layoff would represent more than half of the Fort Worth plant's total manpower.

Company spokesmen expressed "severe disappointment" over the loss of the B1 bomber contract to North American Rockwell of Los Angeles.

## Germans To Choose Tie With Nation

BONN (UPI)—A Karlsruhe architect named Reinhold Grund and other patriots of Baden are trying to turn back the clock almost to the days when their home was an independent duchy.

They have forced a referendum Sunday in which Baden's 2.4 million residents are eligible to vote on the question of whether it should be a separate state within West Germany or remain part of the state of Baden-Wuerttemberg as it has been since 1952.

In the unlikely event that Grund's idea wins, it may give hope to other small states to hold out against the trend toward consolidation.

Grund believes, all evidence to the contrary, that the tide is running with him. He thinks even the young people who never knew the old Baden state will support him on grounds Baden alone could manage its affairs better, particularly in the universities.

## Astronauts Protest Flag Abuse

NEW YORK (UPI)—Apollo 13 astronauts James A. Lovell and John L. Swigert, who christened their space ship Aquarius and listened to the soundtrack of "Hair" on their aborted moon mission don't like what's done with the American flag in the first act of the musical.

They reportedly walked out of the Billmore Theater Thursday night at the intermission.

"I don't appreciate what you're doing to the flag," Swigert was said to have told an unidentified woman associated with the play as he left the theater. "I don't like the way they wrapped the flag around that guy."

Lovell and his wife had left the theater about five minutes earlier.

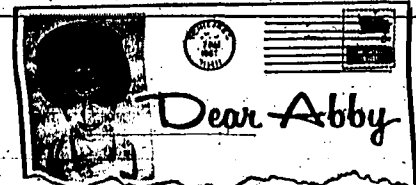

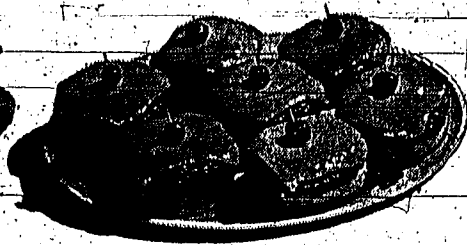

### Unsettling News Frets Investors

NEW YORK (UPI)—Some unsettling international news threw a scare into Wall Street at the weekend, and it was just enough to tip the market averages into the minus column for the week.

Profit taking was apparent throughout most of the five-day period, but many analysts viewed it as a healthy development coming on the heels of the sharpest advance in memory. During the last three sessions of the previous week, the Dow Jones Industrial average soared nearly 70 points (nobody on the New York Stock Exchange could remember three more productive sessions).

"The list was entitled to some rest after recent big gains," one analyst remarked. He added that if it can hold without falling too much further it could be a favorable sign for the market.

Monte Gordon, analyst for Bache & Co., said the state of euphoria couldn't be expected to last much longer. "The market still must come up against second quarter corporate profits which may turn out to be as disappointing as the first quarter," Gordon added.

On Friday concern was generated by a report—not by UPI—that an associate of Prince Sihanouk, former Premier of Cambodia, had said if U.S. forces go beyond a certain, unspecified line in Cambodia Chinese volunteers might be sent in.

In addition, North Korea claimed to have sunk an American spy ship off its coast. In Washington, however, an official statement said the United States Navy had no ships operating in that area. "It said the United States understood there had been an encounter between some North and South Korean vessels. We have no indication that there has been any U.S. involvement."

The South Korean Defense Ministry confirmed that North Korean gunboats captured a 120-ton South Korean Navy boat after a brief battle. In assessing Friday's sharp losses, Fred Anschel, analyst for Shearson, Hammill & Co., said the "market wants to go up," but its behavior demonstrates its "sensitiveness to anything on the international front."

Electronics, among the strongest performers in the recent surge, attracted most of the profit taking, although point-sized gainers also showed up in the group.

Oils swung widely in both directions, as did chemicals. Steels, rails, airlines and aircrafts were mostly lower, but motors followed an irregular path. Conglomerates were mostly higher.

The UPI marketwide indicator showed a gain of 0.31 as 915 of the 1,742 issues crossing the tape advanced, and 695 declined. However, there were 124 new lows set, and 24 new highs. More selective market indicators closed slightly lower.

The New York Stock Exchange index, reflecting the average common share price, fell 12 cents. Standard & Poor's index of 500 stocks slid 0.38 to 76.17.

### Nixon Asks Funds For Youth Jobs

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The White House announced Saturday that it would seek an additional \$50 million for summer youth jobs.

This would provide a total of \$571.8 million for the Nixon administration's job program for young people.

The increase was announced by Vice President Spiro T. Agnew after he, other administration officials and four mayors conferred with President Nixon.

In a memo to the President, Agnew said the expanded program would increase the number of 1970 government-sponsored job opportunities for youth to 883,000, an increase of 80,000.

The vice president said the \$50 million would go to the Labor Department's neighborhood Youth Corps, a program which would provide a total of 414,000 summer jobs for high school students, counting the additional money. They will be employed at a minimum rate of \$1.45 an hour.

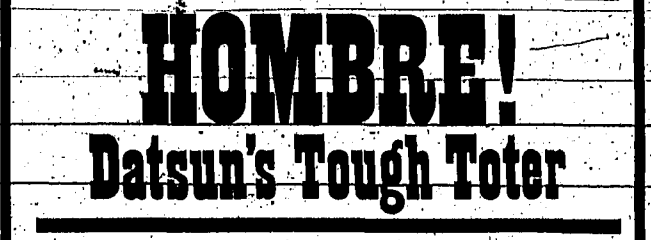

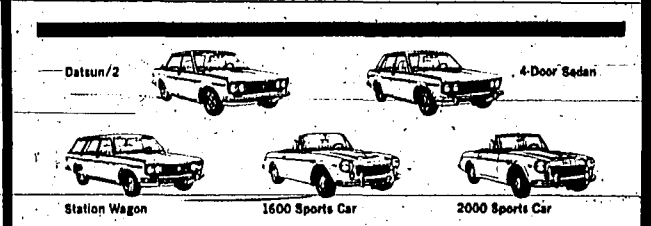

# Gift Of Cookies Spurned By Troops

Berkeley, Calif. (UPI) — Mrs. Rosalyn Pollycove thinks somebody should tell U.S. soldiers in Cambodia that Berkeley really is part of America. She complained Friday about some troops of the 101st Airborne Division who refused to accept a box of homemade chocolate chip cookies baked by her daughter. The soldiers said they were afraid the cookies were laced with LSD. The cookies were baked, packed and sent to Cambodia by Ricki Pollycove, 18, a pretty brunette sophomore at the University of California. She meant good will. Ricki says she only wanted to create good will. An Army man had praised her when she asked for the address of a combat unit. She carefully packed the cookies and enclosed a letter saying she hoped the boys would be home soon. But when the package was opened in the Southeast Asian jungles, the paratroopers had misgivings about a gift from Berkeley—even chocolate chip cookies. "Working With Hanoi?" "If those cookies are drugged, one of us or all 10 men in the squad, might do something foolish and get himself or all of us killed," a "Pfc. Shamrock" wrote back to Ricki. "That's what we think your leaders want, those leaders of the peace movement who are working hand in glove with Hanoi while we are fighting out here," the soldier wrote.

# Jury Orders 7 Jailed In Protest

CHICAGO (UPI) — On May 25, 1969, 15 persons entered and ransacked a Chicago Selective Service office. Today, seven of them are in jail awaiting sentencing, seven others are fugitives and the 15th is in a mental institution by court order. A U.S. District Court jury deliberated less than three hours—Friday—before convicting 10 of the antiwar protesters. Judge Edwin A. Robson revoked bonds posted by seven of the 10 on the ground they "were crying for the overthrow of our government." Three convicted defendants were absent from the trial. Robson ordered federal agents to look for them. Four persons originally indicted are still at large. The 10 convicted face possible prison sentences of 23 years and fines of \$32,000. An eleventh defendant, Edward Hoffmann, 32, of Iowa City, Iowa, was severed from the four-week trial Thursday after Robson declared him incapable of aiding in his own defense. Four of the defendants pleaded innocent because of "cultural insanity." They said they felt burning draft records to halt war was normal behavior and argued that if society did not agree, they must be insane.

# OEO Orders CAA To Aid Needy

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Office of Economic Opportunity (OEO) Friday ordered its 900-plus local community action agencies to avoid confrontation tactics—dramatizing the demands of the poor and deal with the "unpleasant realities" of poverty. OEO Director Donald Rumsfeld circulated a draft policy statement on the purposes and objectives of community action programs, the federal government's principal link with the poor in cities and rural areas across the country. The agencies receive their operative funds from OEO. The proposed policy statement then bluntly advised against the use of confrontation tactics dramatizing the demands of the poor.

Although no tabulations have been made since early in the program, initial figures show about \$30,000 in food values sold and about \$6,500 paid by the food stamp users. Mr. Humphrey said the program has been well accepted by the banks, the grocery stores and by the eligible low income families in the seven-county area of Magic Valley. He said registration for the program continues at the DPA office in the old hospital maternity building, on Addison Avenue West.

Wyman noted "people seemingly do react to this symbol. In that sense, this is a violation. I do so hold."

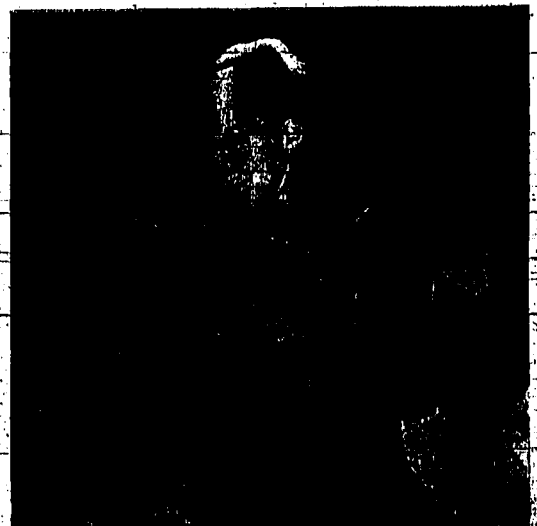

### Manipulating Diet Can Be Dangerous

**MONTGOMERY, Ala. (UPI)** — Manipulating the traditional American diet as a means of avoiding heart disease could deteriorate the body's resistance to other deadly ailments, warns Dr. David Kritchevsky of Philadelphia's Wistar Institute of Anatomy and Biology.

If you come from a coronary prone family it's only prudent to take precautions in diet and otherwise, he said, but noted that no causal relationship between diet, cholesterol and heart disease has been established.

Kritchevsky said that if cholesterol were a foreign substance positively known to contribute to heart disease, the solution would be simple: eliminate the foreign substance, but, he stressed, cholesterol is an essential part of the body.

Referring to the many low-cholesterol diets that are popular today, Kritchevsky said, "If you follow everything they say, you'll die of malnutrition with perfect arteries."

### Negro Woman Rated First

By PATRICIA MC CORMACK NEW YORK (UPI)—This nation has 1.4 million women married to men in the service. More than 1,400 of them were nominated for "Military wife of the year" title. Gussie Sanford, who won, is the first black woman to do so. She hopes that she was selected more on her merits than on the color of her skin. The judges, selected by the National General Federation of Women's Clubs, made it plain that no tokenism was involved. Mrs. Sanford, they said, "has a tremendous capacity for giving."

Before marriage, she had hoot-strapped herself to the position of science teacher in Chicago schools. Her husband started as an enlisted man. Recalling her youth, Mrs. Sanford said: "I grew up in a black community and didn't know I was supposed to be unhappy until I read that's supposed to be the case. I thought I was happy." Mrs. Sanford has not felt discriminated against while living on Army posts but it was a different situation when she and her family lived in other places. "In these communities I was nothing," she said. "When I go out into a community again (when her husband retires) we shall see how things are."

Mrs. Sanford was asked how she feels about Americans protesting this nation's involvement in Vietnam. "I stand behind my husband," she said. "He is a soldier. He is working in defense of his country. We're proud of this country. It's the best thing we've going for us." About persons who protest anything military, she said: "I don't think they've gained enough maturity to know what they have going for them in the United States." In Germany, Mrs. Sanford is active in German-American affairs and has fostered an informal person-to-person diplomacy among her German neighbors. Through clubs, the PTA and girls scouts she does this. Her children, despite her many activities, have first priority on her time. To parents, she had these words: "Talk to your children, listen to them. Keep the lines of communication open. Dance with them. Listen to their records. Make evenings and after school family time."

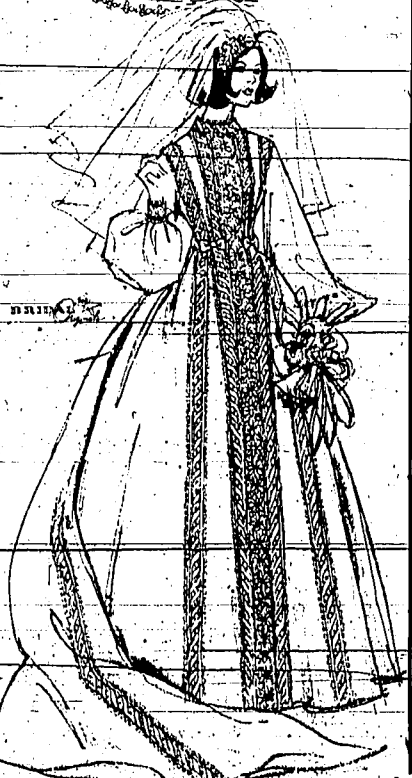
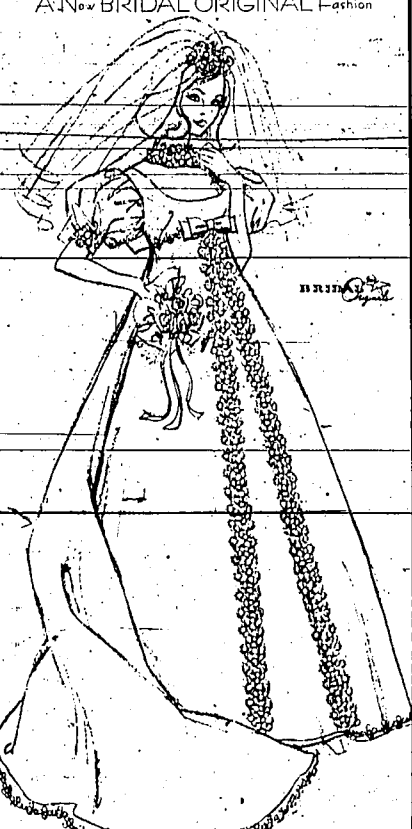

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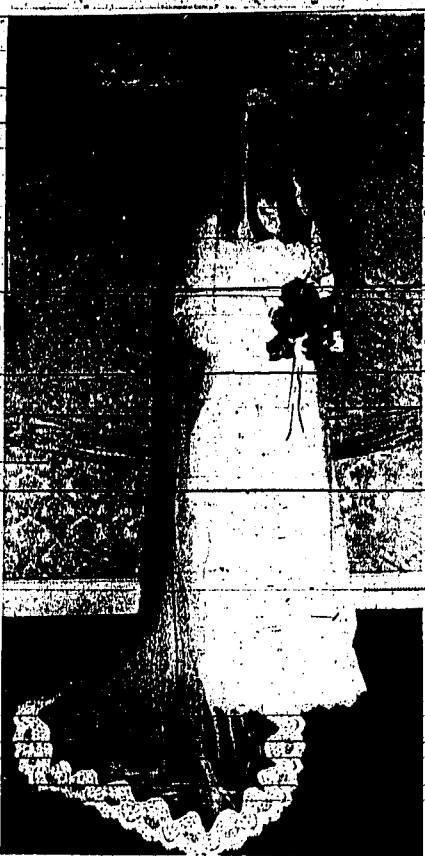

Route 1, Hagorman

**LADYFINGERS**  
3 eggs, separated  
1/4 cup granulated sugar  
1/4 cup sifted cake flour  
1/2 teaspoon vanilla  
2 tablespoons powdered sugar  
1 tablespoon granulated sugar  
Beat egg yolks and one-half cup granulated sugar in small bowl until light in color. Gently fold in the flour and vanilla until smooth. Batter will be thick. Beat egg whites in small bowl until stiff peaks form. Gently fold in the yolk-flour mixture. Drop two tablespoons batter, side by side, on lightly greased and floured baking sheet. Shape into an oval finger about three inches by one inch, using spatula. Repeat until all batter is used.

Mix powdered sugar with the one tablespoon granulated sugar and sprinkle over the ladyfingers. Let stand five minutes before baking.

Bake in 350 degree oven for about eight minutes. Remove and cool. Makes about five dozen. These freeze very well.

# New Zealand Studies, Tour Offer Rare Opportunity

Special studies for a Twin Falls student at the University of Canterbury, New Zealand during the 1969 academic year expanded into a number of unique fields.

Bob Sevy, son of Mrs. J. L. Sevy, 824 Sunrise Blvd. N., who graduated Saturday from the College of Idaho, Caldwell, had an opportunity to observe first hand the appalling poverty of Java, the happy atmosphere of the Indonesian island of Bali, and eat the exotic foods of Singapore.

He skied the vast snowfields of the "Southern Alps" in New Zealand and hitchhiked through rubber tree and pineapple plantation in Malaya.

Young Sevy while studying at the University of Canterbury in Christchurch, in southern New Zealand, worked on two major ecological studies. One was on the kelp fly larva and the other on big game and climatic impacts on the high alpine watershed basin of that region.

When not studying, he skied on the University team and managed to emerge as New Zealand National University ski champion in competition with skiers from the country's seven universities.

After completing college work, he spent some two and one half months on tour, frequently hitchhiking through

Indonesia, Malaya and Thailand. This necessitated adjusting to a rice and fruit diet and traveling with all of his possessions in a back pack.

The Twin Falls student said he found other students in those countries most anxious to learn about the United States and to provide information he needed about their own countries.

As the plane on which he traveled approached Djakarta in the volcanic Javan mountain region, young Sevy recalls a beautiful sunset over the town and the complementing colors of the volcanic mountain walls.

Once he left the plane, he stepped into garbage strewn streets of Djakarta, somewhat of a shock. People were starving, many had disease and some were deformed beyond reality.

Throughout Java, he was impressed largely with the appalling conditions including hordes of beggars and even some who ate refuse from the floor of the train stations. Outside of the train stations, peasant children fought over tossed out food scraps.

The countryside was a jungle of tropical vegetation and terraced rice paddies and there are other enhancing compensations, Mr. Sevy found.

"It was a rewarding experience to awaken early in a Javan city and hear the Moslem call of worship echo across the town. A torchlit night market was another rare sight, he said.

The Indonesian island of Bali, east of Java, he described as a

tropical paradise. "A happy atmosphere flows through the small island and the Hindu religion is a basis for island culture including many religious festivals. Here we ate fried pigs' blood and rice, a combination that caused stomach rumblings for days," he recalls.

In Malaya the road passed through extensive rubber and pineapple plantations.

"While waiting to hitch a ride, I often found myself surrounded

by curious youngsters eager to practice the English language," he commented.

Bangkok, a two-day journey by train from the Malayan border was sprinkled with Buddhist temples where shaven headed monks in orange robes directed the congregation in chanting religious verses.

As a final stop in his tour, young Sevy visited Tokyo returning to a city shrouded in industrial smog and a sudden reminder of the more "ad-

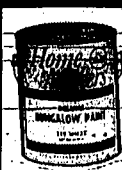

# Tourists To The South Pole? It's A Possibility

For the true conservationist there is still a place (without flying to the moon) where there is no pollution, no sound of heavy traffic, no litter and certainly no over population. Undoubtedly it will remain this way for some time because travel to Antarctica is still pretty well reserved for the hardy.

This was one of the views expressed by Betsy Douglas, Ketchum, one of the first women "tourists" to visit that far south region.

Mrs. Douglas, wife of Sun Valley artist and anthropologist Luther Douglas, has been busy in recent weeks presenting slide shows and programs on the first tourist cruise to the Antarctic which she made in January and February.

Purpose of the trip, open to members of the Explorers' Club, was to test the tourist potential of the Antarctica region and it was proclaimed highly successful having since led to plans for possible air tours out of New Zealand in the next two years.

Aboard the pilot cruise with Mrs. Douglas was well known part time Ketchum resident, Mary Hemingway, widow of the late novelist, Ernest Hemingway.

"In fact it was Mary who talked me into undertaking the trip," comments the exuberant Ketchum mother and businesswoman.

The invitation to join the tour was sent Mr. Douglas who holds a membership in the Explorer's Club as a result of his contribution to Indian lore and preservation of Indian art through his famed sand paintings, and his anthropology interests. Because it was a busy season for the artist, Betsy decided to undertake the once-in-a-lifetime challenge. She turned duties at the America House, a shop the couple operates in Sun Valley Lodge, over to capable employees and boarded a plane for New York.

There were 143 persons aboard the cruise ship, the Lindblad Explorer. When Betsy left Ketchum with butterflies in her stomach, she knew only Mrs. Hemingway, but before the cruise had been underway long she and other members of the tour had established friendships with many "world knowns." Most of these people served as lecturers during the five week tour providing scientific information on many phases of the Antarctic.

Among those on the cruise were Capt. Edwin A. MacDonald, USN, (ret.) a foremost icebreaker captain and one-time manager of Polar Operations at Alpine Geophysical Associates. Capt. MacDonald also served as cold weather operations officer at the Pentagon and has been awarded many international honors from several countries. He has also authored a number of books on the Arctic and Antarctic.

Another friend was Keith Shackleton of the famed Shackleton mountain climbing family and another, James Ramsay-Ullman, author of "Americans On Everest" and other mountain climbing books including "The White Tower" later made into a movie starring Glenn Ford.

A Wyoming ranch woman, Dr. Elizabeth Anderson, Jackson, and Gratia R. Waters, a noted ecologist and oceanographer, also were on the tour. Mrs. Waters, a granddaughter of writer, Mary Roberts Rinehart, is also a writer and is a niece of Arthur A. Houghton Jr., chairman of the board of the New York Metropolitan Museum of Art.

Through this broad background she has managed to maintain an interest in both arts and sciences. She has, since the tour, visited Mrs. Douglas in Sun Valley and says she hopes to return to Idaho for future winter holidays.

On the tour to Antarctica, Mrs. Waters made oceanographic studies in connection with the Smithsonian Institute and she plans to revisit the area on a second tour planned in 1971.

As for Mrs. Douglas she probably won't make another trip to the region — at least not right away, but she said she wouldn't have missed the first for anything.

In her own opinion, and one shared by others on the cruise, Antarctica may remain a final unspoiled region for years to come.

While there is no Antarctica wildlife, in fact very little life at all except for the stations established by several countries including the United States and Russia, unique wildlife delighted the tourists at the Falkland Islands.

Located about 400 miles from Cape Horn, the islands are also greatly unspoiled and playful penguins splash in the cold blue water by the hundreds and the giant sea elephants, largest of the southern species of seal, frequent the beaches.

Residents of the islands generally live in true pioneer style. One resident who was befriended by Mrs. Douglas presented her a gift of a unique wool rug. It is in various shades of brown and was made by shearing the sheep, combing and tying the wool and then weaving it into a rug.

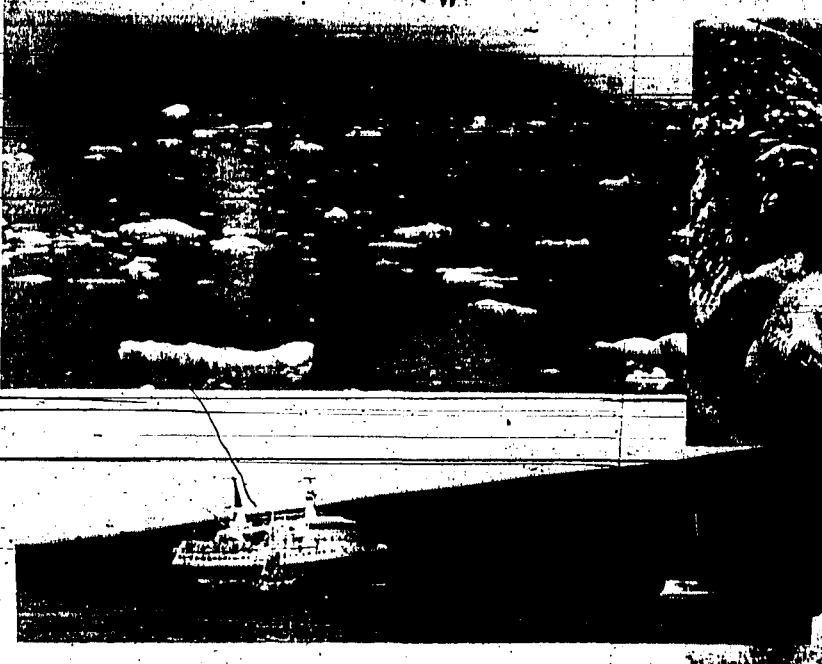
The woman declined many large offers from other tour members who wished to buy the unique rug and presented it to Mrs. Douglas as a gift.

To be a tourist in the Antarctica requires a considerable amount of money, time and a sturdy healthful individual with a pioneering and adventurous spirit.

While their ship was "cozy" and comfortable, it was not luxurious. There are no tourist accommodations on the frozen shores of Antarctica and those visiting must be content to adapt to housing on their ship

with an occasional helicopter trip further inland.

In addition, there is the time element and a tourist to Antarctica must not be limited by a two-weeks vacation schedule. Tourism would also be confined to a brief two to three months "summer" and even then reaching the area often involves following an "icebreaker" through the frozen seas. In the case of the pilot tour, ice conditions make some areas inaccessible at times.

But aside from these negative factors, there is a silent and yes, cold, beauty there which Mrs. Douglas found beyond explanation.

"I think I know how the astronauts felt when they tried to describe their first close views of the moon," she said. "All of those words such as 'spectacular,' 'fabulous' and 'fantastic' sound so inadequate but what else can you say?"

The Ketchum traveler flew from New York City, to Argentina and there aboard the ship to the Falkland Islands, the southernmost settlement in the world, and separated by 600 miles of rough and often ice-filled seas from Antarctica.

Betsy Douglas, who said she

had never been on a ship before, "unless you can count once in 'McCall when I climbed into a canoe," said she was never sea

sick and with the entire 143 persons on the ship there were no serious illnesses or accidents.

# Money Box

From A. D. M., Twin Falls, Idaho: "I understand silver dollars are worth more than face value. Will you please list the silver dollars which are valuable and tell me where I can sell some?"

Answer: Sorry — the column isn't big enough to list all the silver dollars with the premiums they command. At the present time, the common silver dollars will bring you about \$2.00 each, if circulated. Uncirculated they are worth a little more. The scarce dates bring all kinds of prices, depending upon how scarce they are. All of the Carson City mint (CC) are worth considerably more than face value, as are some of the San Francisco and Denver mintages. If you will get a copy of a good coin paper, they are generally listed by dates and prices.

From L. R., Twin Falls: I have a coin as follows: On one side is an Indian standing with a

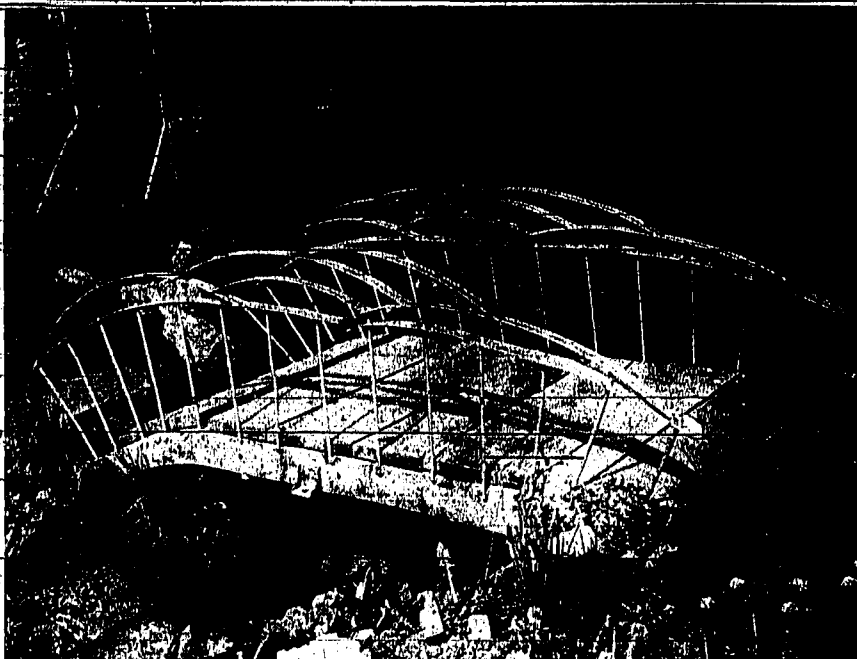
bow across his body and holding out his left hand. Behind him is a map of the United States and underneath the words "Half Dollar." On the other side, "In God We Trust" and a covered wagon with the sun behind it. Underneath the wagon, the words "Oregon-Tyall Memorial" and the date 1936 with an "S" mintmark. Is this a real coin? What can you tell me about it? What is its value?

Answer: You have an example of a commemorative fifty cent piece, issued by the United States MINT to commemorate the Oregon Trail. The first of these fifty cent pieces was issued in 1926, and was minted in 1926, 1933, 1934, 1936, 1937, 1938, and 1939. It was not minted at all the mints in all those years. Denver only issued the coins in 1933, 1934, 1937, 1938 and 1939. San Francisco issued the coins in 1926, 1936, 1938 and 1939. The coins from Philadelphia are dated 1926, 1928, 1935, 1938, and 1939. The mintage on the coin was low in every year and it is a very desirable collector's item, selling in uncirculated condition from \$4.00 on up, depending upon the year of issue. It is a legal tender coin and still perfectly spendable. However, the collector value is much greater than the face value.

From H. T., Burley, Idaho: Will you explain what the SVDB on a Lincoln penny is? I hear these initials mentioned and know the coins are valuable but do not know what they mean.

Answer: The initials V. D. B. are those of the designer of the Lincoln cent — Victor D. Brenner. The "S" is the designation for the San Francisco Mint. When the first Lincoln Cents were struck in 1909, San Francisco minted only a few with the initials of the designer on the reverse side. The general public objected to the initials on the coin, so the mint removed them. Thus, the 1909-S, VDB classification. This is the most valuable of the Lincoln cent series. Incidentally, the initials were replaced on the cent after 1918, on the front (obverse) side, under the bust, and are still there.

If you take a brand new coin and hold it up at eye level, in a flat position, you will see the "V. D. B." in this location. (Questions on coins and currency should be sent to The Money Box, c/o The Times-News, Twin Falls, Idaho 83301.)

made it impossible for South to shut out West's 10 of hearts.

We suggested that a better play would have been to lead the fourth spade from dummy and discard a club. Curtis points out that West could discard his 10 of hearts at that point whereupon East could lead ace and another club. South would ruff and lead his king of trumps whereupon a third club lead by East would set up the 10 of hearts as the setting trick in the same manner.

Curtis points out that South should make the hard, against any defense by discarding a club on the third spade, and his last club on the fourth spade. West could discard a diamond or a club on his partner's 10 of spades but there would be no way for East to get around to leading a suit that West could ruff. South would simply ruff low each time he got a chance and eventually pick up the 10 of hearts to make his contract.

Potential "Landmarks" are chosen through studies prepared by the National Survey of Historic Sites and Buildings and evaluated by the Secretary's Advisory Board on National Parks, Historic Sites, Buildings, and Monuments. Although Landmark designation is publicized initially through Interior Department press releases, additional news coverage is usually dependent upon the nature of the dedication ceremony.

# Make Your Extra Dollars Work for You

Bank savings accounts are one of simplest ways of investing for profit.

**YOU ARE** extraordinary if you have extra dollars these days. It is proof that you are a super money manager. The big question now: how great is your investment wisdom to enable you to put those extra dollars to work?

Be aware of these very important considerations:

• There is risk in any form of investment. How much risk you can assume depends upon how many dollars you can afford to lose—financially and psychologically. There are wealthy people for whom the loss of several hundred dollars would not spell ruin. Yet, they might be crushed psychologically. Others would feel a severe pinch at losing \$500 and, ironically, they would be the very people who could continue to take risks and who sometimes might win.

• Decide whether you want your extra dollars to earn you added income now or to provide more dollars for your future.

• Watch interest rates keenly and evaluate their meaning to you.

The "price-of-money" is an important factor in helping to choose between stashing your extra dollars away in savings institutions, Government issues and bonds, or venturing into common stocks, mutual funds, or real estate.

When interest rates are high, there is much to be said in favor of keeping your money in fixed-income media such as savings accounts, short-term Government securities like bills and notes, or in bonds—either those issued by Federal agencies or by corporations, rails, or utilities. As interest rates decline, stock prices generally start upward and, along with real-estate ventures, gain lustre.

• Investing in real estate, other than your home, is for the sophisticated and becoming more so as those who once concentrated their activities in the securities markets move in. Within days, you can retrieve

money from banks, stocks and funds. It could take years to pull your dollars out of real estate.

Nobody can really tell what is the best way at any given time to put extra dollars to work. But it helps if your hunches have some knowledge behind them.

If you have \$1,000 or less to invest, those dollars belong in the highest earning device you can unearth. Until recently, this was a six-month U.S.

Treasury bill. U.S. Treasury bills are Government "IOUs" that mature in anywhere from 91 days to one year. To buy one of these now, you must invest a minimum of \$10,000. Treasury notes are similar to bills but you can buy one for \$1,000.

**Maturity** for notes taken from one to five years and, like bills, at this writing offer up to an 8-percent return. Treasury bonds mature in five or more years. Since these trade daily, meaning their purchase price fluctuates, you'll have to ask a banker to check the interest rate. He will be glad to recommend the best Treasury bond purchase for your particular purpose—higher interest or the hope of capital growth.

These Treasury issues should not be confused with U.S. savings bonds that people often buy via payroll savings plans. Current U.S. savings bonds pay 5 percent interest when held to their maturity.

All Government issues can be bought through your local bank, but except for U.S. savings bonds, there is a service charge. It is up to you to check this charge to see that it does not eat up the interest you earn. Also watch commission charges when you buy stock because the minimum charge per order has recently increased to \$15; likewise for mutual-fund fees, which could siphon off as much as 9 percent of the money you invest. Life is getting ever more difficult for the smaller investor.

The thrift institutions, meaning the savings and loan associations and the mutual savings banks, are offering higher returns, too. Check with

local institutions. The story looks pretty much like this:

With a minimum of \$500 you can buy two-year savings certificates that pay 6 percent; one year certificates that pay 5½ percent and 90-day certificates that yield 5½ percent. You are promised 5 percent on regular savings accounts. It could be that in your area the "savings & loans" pay slightly more. Learn to shop in matters of money, too!

Possibly you are hesitant to tie your money up for a year or two, which is what these institutions want. Is there a solution? Some thrift institutions will allow immediate withdrawal if you can prove a true emergency; others may require 90-days notice; others won't let you out. If this is the case, you might inquire about making a "pass-book loan," which would cost around 7 percent. To get that loan, you might be asked to accept a slightly lower rate of interest on your savings. If this should happen, realize that probably this is the cheapest type of loan that you could make anywhere right now.

If you already have in a savings account \$500 or more above what you consider a safe reserve fund, inquire about switching those extra dollars to savings certificates.

And commercial banks are competing with the traditional thrift institutions with numerous plans. Study each carefully to see which is best for you. In some of these banks, with \$500 you can open a savings account that will earn you 5½ percent interest if left untouched for a minimum of two years. You can make additional deposits of \$50 or more into these accounts. You can elect to have the interest mailed to you quarterly or have it transferred to your checking or other savings account, or you can allow it to remain, thus earning the higher interest rate.

Some banks offer deferred interest payment plans, meaning that you will not be taxed on interest until your savings plan matures; that is, you don't have to pay taxes on the interest until you receive it. This could mean a considerable advantage if you expect your income will be lower by the time your savings plan matures.

On regular savings accounts in most areas, commercial banks now pay 4½ percent. But your money can earn an additional ½ percent or so if you place it in a "time" deposit and agree not to withdraw it for a stated period.

At first blush, some of these interest payments look great. Watch it! Dollars invested in such fixed-income issues only earn interest. These dollars don't grow. They are somewhat safer from economic ups and downs and from the whims of consumer psychology than are other investments, but at the cost of living rises, you will find your buying power weakening.

As this is being written, many a financial expert is hunching that one of those steadfast rules of investment is being challenged. It appears as though right now you can reap current income plus the expectation for future growth if you put your extra dollars in good quality stocks and bonds. They are available at comparatively low prices now, and may well rise appreciably in value in the future, when market conditions improve.

The way to select any security, be it bond, stock, or mutual fund, is to select a company that has demonstrated an above-average ability to earn. Wise investments are bought on a logical anticipation of future profits. Remember though, even the wisest investors sometimes lose money on some financial ventures. ♦

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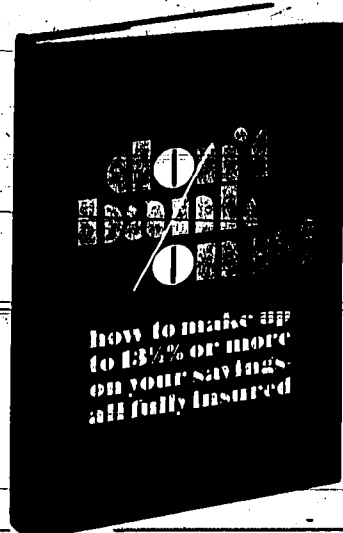

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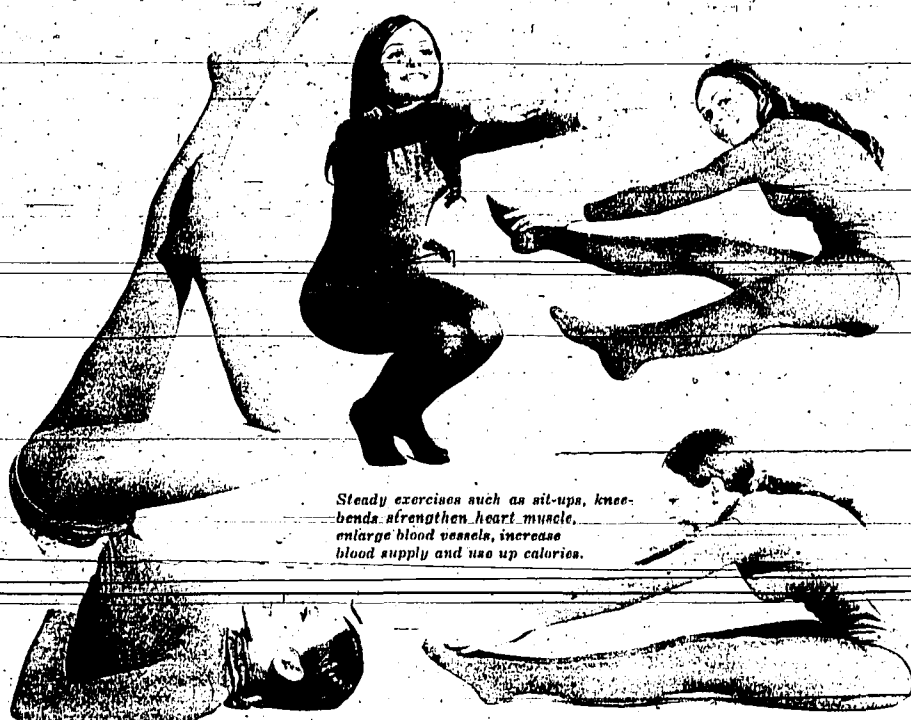

# Protect

Here is simple



Steady exercises such as sit-ups, knee-bends strengthen heart muscle, enlarge blood vessels, increase blood supply and use up calories.

**Y**ou or the man next to you will die of a heart attack or some other disease of the blood vessels. You probably already have disease in your arteries.

These are not scare statements, just simple facts. More than half the deaths in the United States today are caused by cardiovascular ailments, and the numbers are growing. Worse, these ailments are reaching younger and younger people. For this reason, contrary to the popular misconception, our life expectancy has not improved appreciably in the last two decades despite advances elsewhere in the field of health.

This is the richest nation on earth, where funds for medical research have grown from \$1 billion annually 20 years ago to \$1 billion today, and where great strides have been made in producing new knowledge in the prevention and cure of heart disease. Should you be the victim of a heart attack, as a physician I can tell you that the help your doctor can give you is limited. You have about one chance in four of never even getting into a hospital heart unit alive after

a heart attack, and less than one chance in two of surviving the episode to return home. A similar situation applies to strokes. These being the odds, the best approach is certainly prevention.

**The tragedy is that your doctor can't do it for you.** Despite all the new knowledge now available on the care of the heart and the prevention of its diseases, most of it is ignored by the individual.

What can you do to reverse the trend?

You can begin applying some of the knowledge that has come out of research laboratories and elsewhere in the fields of exercise, diet, and way of life. It is never too early or too late to start.

As long ago as World War II, it was discovered that even men under 30 were having fatal heart attacks, many of them in apparent good health

right up to the time of their deaths. Autopsies on men killed in combat in Korea showed that 77 percent of them at an average age of 22 (including some in their teens) had definite signs of coronary atherosclerosis, —fatty deposits in the major arteries serving the heart itself. This is a disease, not a product of old age. In my own work at the School of Aerospace Medicine, I saw many pilots, the best of American men, with heart conditions.

**All of these** were young men and presumably in good health because they had passed rigid physical examinations. With this as a standard, what can the physical condition of the great bulk of our civilian population be like?

The beginnings of heart conditions are gradual and insidious. They may not even affect the heart's action. The first indication may be sudden death.

Many doctors, including myself, believe there are many "silent heart attacks," attacks that actually damage the heart without the victim himself knowing anything is wrong.

Heart attacks are not rare among men under 35. The number increases sharply for men over 35 and reaches a peak in men between 50 and 60. Women fare better, but their rate is growing. For reasons we don't entirely understand, women before menopause suffer 13 times fewer heart attacks than men. After menopause, the ratio decreases to two-to-one, men over women. After 65, the ratio is about the same.

**To find out** whether you're a candidate to become one of these statistics, there are a few simple tests you can make involving your weight and your heart rate.

Most people reach full growth in their early 20s. After that, unless you are involved in specialized activities like weight-lifting, almost all the weight you put on is pure fat. If you're in good condition, the skin over most of your body should be as thin as it is on the back of your hand when you pinch it. Get a good grip with your thumb and forefinger on a layer of skin in the area of your navel. If it's more than a half inch thick, you're carrying a good amount of excess fat. This is a better index of your health than the reading on the bathroom scales.

**A second test** checks the heart rate. Your resting heart rate should not be more than 70 beats per minute (for men) or 75 (for women). It should not increase over 15 beats a minute when you stand up. After mild exercise (like running in place for one minute), when you lie down it should be less than 100 beats. If this isn't the case, then you may have cause for concern.

You are in greater control of your future health than the best doctor on earth. You can control the three most important areas—your physical activity, your diet, and your living habits. In short, you can do more by way of prevention of heart attacks, than any heart specialist can do by way of cures.

In the field of exercise, I doubt whether there is any one program that could be used by everyone everywhere, but I can make a few general

sound advice which might keep you from being a coronary victim

statements. If you are not in good condition now, then I would strongly suggest moderation. Regardless of what some authorities say, exercise can kill you. Crash programs are ineffective, even dangerous, and the sporadic peak-load exercises like suddenly getting out and shoveling the snow, are the most dangerous of all. Anything that significantly exceeds your daily activity should be avoided.

Fad exercise programs may slim your waist or tone up the muscles of your body. These may do little or nothing for your heart. The heart is a muscle, and its strength is built up by working the heart muscle, not the arm muscle or belly muscles. The work of the heart muscle is increased when it pumps more blood as in running, jogging, and cycling.

Steady state, endurance-type exercises are the best.

I usually recommend starting with a moderate walking program. After you have gradually built up to walking one hour a day and have done so daily for at least two weeks without difficulty, then you can start a jogging program or a running-in-place program. If you use an exercise, it should be a gradual, daily program.

Exercise strengthens the heart muscle, enlarges the blood vessels, and increases the blood supply. It also burns up calories. This is great for preventive therapy. You can't lose much weight by exercising one day—but 30 minutes of steady walking every day can cause you to lose 10 pounds in a year's time.

Heart disease can't be prevented by exercise alone, nor can any real program of weight control be achieved by exercise alone. Both problems depend a great deal on proper diet. In the case of atherosclerosis, diet alone may be the major culprit. Exercise can build up large healthy blood vessels, but improper diet can clog them with fatty deposits, virtually negating the gains from exercise.

The problem the average person has in finding a proper diet is wading through the welter of confusion that surrounds it. The most important point is to prevent accumulation of excess fat. If you are accumulating fat, you are eating too much or exercising too little.

Calories are considered a major

villain, and indeed they are, but the body needs energy to produce work, and it needs calories to produce energy. Without some calories, it could not function. If you exercise to build up your cardiovascular system, you will need the energy. Excess calories, however, can lead to dangerous fat deposits.

The body produces calories by digesting foodstuffs, specifically carbohydrates, proteins, and fats. Carbohydrates do not always get as much favorable publicity as they should, but they are the staple diet of many nations with a low incidence of atherosclerosis. Fruits, vegetables, and cereals are high in carbohydrates. These are recommended foods in a proper diet.

Sugar is also high in carbohydrates, but is not recommended as highly. Why? Sugar is concentrated and does not contain other essential vitamins and minerals. It is one of the most easily absorbed foods (one reason it is recommended for quick energy for athletes). Fruits and vegetables contain a lot of roughage and other essential foodstuffs besides carbohydrates. It is not so much the amount of food you eat, as the type.

Proteins are recommended in most diets, especially in this, a meat-eating country. Proteins are found chiefly in meat, fish, fowl, milk, eggs, and beans. Not all of these can be recommended indiscriminately in a proper diet. For instance, chicken and turkey can be recommended, duck and goose cannot; lean veal and fish, not bacon or shellfish; egg whites, not egg yolks.

Fats cause the most confusion, probably because they are getting the most publicity, none of it good. One gram of digested fat produces nine calories, more than twice as much as carbohydrates or proteins. Logically, a low-fat diet should be ideal. This is a good idea, but it's not that simple. If you cut down on meat to cut down on fat, you're also cutting down on needed protein. But we do need to limit our intake of fat.

Cholesterol is often associated with fat, although it is not a fat itself. It is probably the major villain in atherosclerosis because if enough of it is allowed to flow through the blood stream for long enough periods of time, it can be deposited in the walls of the arteries and lead to a whole series of complications. Among them are limiting the flow of blood or breaking off and blocking the flow of blood altogether.

Yet cholesterol is essential to life. It is found in the brain, the adrenal glands, and in almost every cell in your body, and the body itself actually manufactures cholesterol. How did such a villain get to be a villain? Again, it's not the substance itself but the amount. The body needs some cholesterol, but the amount you eat should be controlled. Some foods are notably high in cholesterol and should be rationed, like dairy foods, especially egg yolks, and organ meats such as liver, kidneys, and brains. Shell fish should be used only in moderation.

In addition to sensible exercise and proper dietary habits, you need to govern your living habits—the other

factors that can affect your health and longevity, notably smoking and drinking.

One survey shows that man who smoke a pack of cigarettes or more a day die an average of 16 years sooner than others. It is well established that nicotine increases the heart rate, increases the amount of blood pumped by the heart, and may cause a rise in blood pressure.

In our studies, even young and otherwise healthy pilots who smoked often had resting heart rates of 90 beats a minute or more. When they stopped smoking, the heart rate dropped to about 60. Those who resumed the habit found their heart rates going up again. The evidence is too direct to be ignored. Nicotine itself is a poison, and like any poison it can kill tissue. Even small amounts used on a long-term basis are not good for the body. Large amounts can be fatal.

Excessive drinking includes more than alcoholic beverages. Chronic drinking of large amounts of coffee, tea, or cola drinks can do as much to elevate the heart rate as smoking. They all include caffeine—a drug. Caffeine is a powerful stimulant. Excessive intake can cause irregularities of the heart beat, including palpitation or skipped beats.

In general, five cups of coffee or tea a day is excessive. Two cups are usually enough for most people, and one is too much for highly sensitive individuals with evidence of a high heart rate or general nervousness. If you are hooked on these drinks, you are hooked on drugs and have a drug habit.

Alcohol is a loser on two counts. It has no place in a weight-control diet, and it has a poisonous effect on the heart muscles.

Recent studies show clearly that large amounts of alcohol can damage the heart-muscle fibers. Eventually the damaged heart is no longer able to function efficiently, and heart failure may result.

Your own doctor can be a big help in preparing a preventive program, and I strongly advise you to contact him before embarking on any drastic changes in your life style. But in the final analysis, you are your own doctor. It's your heart, and it's up to you to protect it. ♦

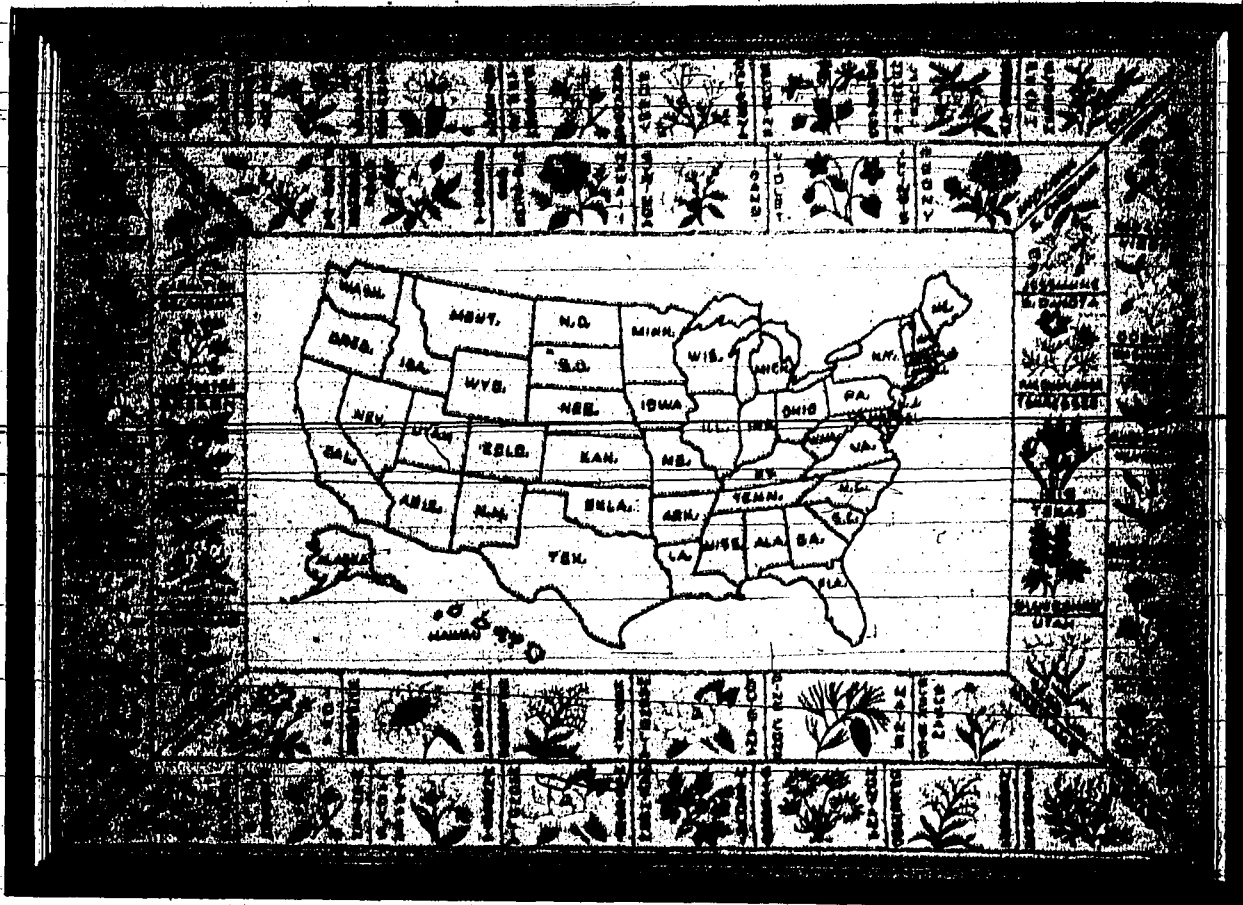

## Ambrosia Cream Cake

Angel food cake, prepared from your favorite mix.  
Frozen whipped dessert topping, thawed.  
Flaked coconut, about 1½ cups or 3 pkgs. (10 oz. each) quick-thaw frozen mixed fruits

1. Set baked cake onto a cake plate, covered with a large piece of waxed paper cut almost to center at 4 or 5 intervals. Spread topping over sides and top of cake.
2. Spoon coconut onto the waxed paper around the frosted cake. Using a spatula, gently toss coconut up onto sides until coated. Finally, evenly sprinkle the coconut over top. Carefully pull waxed paper away from under the decorated cake.
3. Before serving, thaw fruit as directed on package. Transfer to a crystal bowl and serve with the cake.

## Punch à la Champagne

- 2 cups orange juice
- 1½ cups lime juice
- 1 cup sugar
- 5 to 6 cups chilled white grape juice

1. Blend the citrus fruit juices and sugar; stir until sugar is completely dissolved. Chill thoroughly.
2. When ready to serve, pour orange

juice mixture into a chilled punch bowl; add the white grape juice and stir quickly to blend. Float a decorative ice ring or ice block in punch.

## Creamed Chicken and Avocado

- ¼ cup butter or margarine
- ¼ lb. mushrooms, sliced lengthwise through caps and stems
- ¼ cup finely chopped onion
- ¼ cup all-purpose flour
- ¼ teaspoon seasoned salt
- ¼ teaspoon white pepper
- ¼ teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 1½ cups light cream
- ¾ cups chicken broth, cooled (dissolve 2 chicken bouillon cubes in 1½ cups boiling water)

Cooked chicken or turkey, about 3 cups of 1-in. pieces  
2 medium-sized avocados  
Lemon juice  
Salted almonds, coarsely chopped  
Frozen patty shells, thoroughly heated

1. Heat butter or margarine in a skillet; add the mushrooms and onion. Cook, stirring frequently, until mushrooms are tender and lightly browned. With a slotted spoon remove mushrooms, allowing butter to drain back into skillet. Set mushrooms aside.
2. Stir flour and seasonings into but-

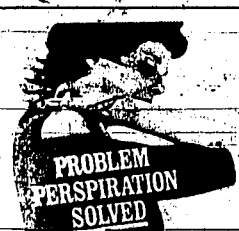
- ter in skillet heating until bubbly. Gradually add the light cream and chicken broth, stirring constantly. Bring to boiling; cook and stir 1 to 2 min. Mix in mushrooms and chicken or turkey; heat thoroughly.
3. Cut avocados into halves lengthwise and remove pits. Using a melon-ball cutter, shape avocados into balls. Drizzle and toss lightly with lemon juice to prevent discoloration if not adding immediately to creamed mixture.
4. If desired, serve in a chafing dish; top with the almonds. Or spoon into the patty shells, top with nuts, and sprinkle with paprika.
5. Accompany with a relish tray of cold celery curls and jumbo-size green olives.

It was one of her beauty-contest photos which appeared in a newspaper that caught the eye of a photographer. He offered her \$75 if she'd pose for him. He was so impressed that he introduced her to one of the top San Francisco modeling agencies. Before long, Karen was working steadily.

**There came a day, however,** when Karen felt she had just about reached the top of the modeling profession. There simply weren't that many challenges left. So she looked around for something else to tackle and decided she'd have to do something to get into the movies—a logical next step since she'd learned to sing to be a contestant in one of the beauty contests, could dance, and was now convinced she would look good on film. She also felt she could act, if just given the chance.

The Miss Universe Contest seemed her best bet. "I know there could well be a producer in the audience," she reasoned. "I wanted him to leap to his feet and shout, 'Get me that girl—I want to sign her up!'"

And that's just about the way it happened. A William Morris agent was in the audience, he was

impressed, and he did ask to see pictures of her. He liked what he saw, both in her portfolio and in person, and he started bugging Hollywood about the new sex goddess he'd discovered. Her break came when George Burns asked her to play an airline hostess in his tv series.

Warner Brothers spotted her and trained her for a full year. "Then Universal International saw some of the stuff I did and wanted me. Since Warner was going downhill at that point, I moved over to UI for two years. Nothing much happened there, either, and I decided to ask for a release from my contract. Eventually they did release me."

**The year** when she stepped out of the studio contract to free lance was a rough one.

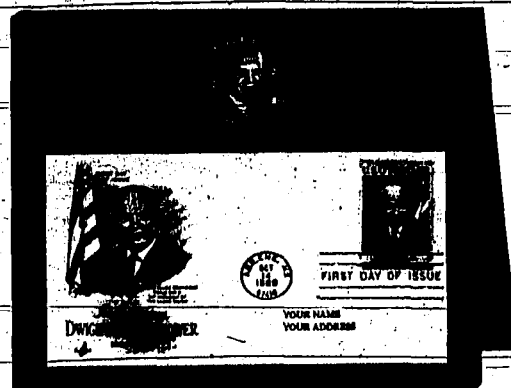
Karen feels she learned two very important things during that period of unemployment: she didn't need as much money to live on as she thought she did, and she could survive, no matter what!

**What if** the bubble bursts and her series is dropped, John doesn't find work as an actor, and they don't have the money to get married? "I learned: I can survive," she told me confidently. "I have faith in myself. (She has gained experience in tv dramas and the films "Out of Sight," and "The Ballad of Josie.") I also have faith in John. If I continue acting, I think I could combine being a wife and actress. If I don't stay in show business for any reason, there are other things I can do.—like modeling." ♦

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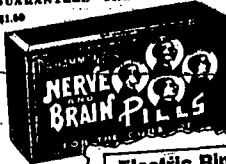
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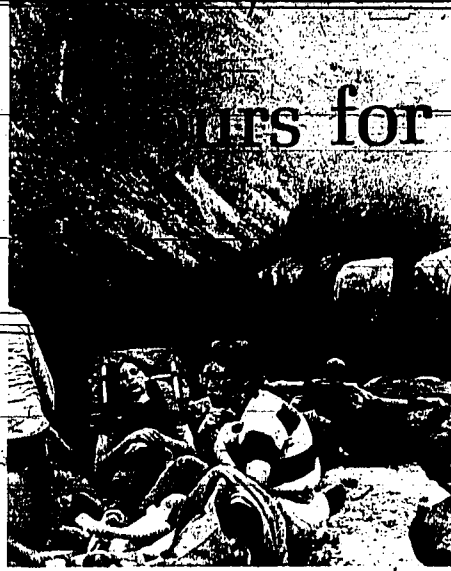

**WHETHER** it's to find their inner selves or just something interesting to do with summer-vacation time, teens will be trekking off to discover America.

With a myriad of teen tours to choose from, finding the right program can be an adventure in itself. Like teens, the tours come in a potpourri of sizes and shapes.
