

Several antiwar groups already have announced plans to use Ky's visit as an occasion to Rogers, in which he urged demand more money for Rogers to tell Ky in the domestic programs and less money for South Vietnam. Some protest leaders, including-Rennie Davis of the "Chicago Seven," plan_to attempt = citizens arrest on Ky at the rally.

Broomfield's letter said, "In a capsule, Vice President Ky will stand there as a symbol of everything wrong in South Vietnam whether he personally deserves any blame or not. I know that we would not wish to be such a symbol, but the fact is that he will be so regardedeven by many of the so-called 'silent majority' who want to support our country-right or wrong-in whatever it does."

Broomfield said Ky will not stand at the monument as a symbol of a small country fighting communism but as a symbol of the "agony of our people" on the war issue.

ATLANTA (UPI) - Jimmy Carter, a wealthy peanut farmer who called himself one of Georgia's "little people," won a smashing victory over former Gov. Carl E. Sanders Wednesday night in a Democratic primary runoff for governor.

'The voters' decision probably will go down as one of the greatest victories that has ever been seen in this state," said the 45-year-old former state



The Constitution

On November 3 the voters of Idaho will have the opportunity to vote for or against, adoption of a revised Constitution for the state.

The proposal to change Idaho's Constitution has been studied in depth. The most brilliant minds in the state have been engaged in this task for months—in fact for years and the top-flight Constitutional Revision Commission has come up with a Constitution which would replace the bigoted, outdated one under which the state now operates.

After a close study of the proposed Constitution, we recommend that the voters of Idaho mark their ballot "for" the new instrument. Action in forming the suggested Constitution has not been hasty. The revision commission was commissioned by the Legislature in 1965. Such persons as Rep. Orval Hansen, Rep. James McClure, Doug Kramer, Carl Burke, Rep. Darrell Manning, Lloyd Webb and Senator Don Fredericksen composed the original commission. Five members were appointed by the Legislative Branch; five by the Governor and five by the Supreme Court. Many meetings were held, all open to the public. During the summer and fall of 1969 the Legislature held 28 public hearings over the state in every Legislative

The Commission made further revisions based on these hearingsover six of them were in Magic Valley—and met with the Legislature in January of this year with a final report. The Legislature-105 persons representative of our State—then held a miniature Constitutional Convention for two days. They heard all the arguments.

The Senate approved the proposed Constitution 28-6 and the House approved it 52-16. We would list five things that are not changed and as many that are changed by the new document.

(1) All presently elected public officials will continue to be elected excepting the Governor and Lieutenant Governor will run as a team.

(2) No county can be divided, annexed or consolidated without vote of the people.

(3) The State debt limit of \$2 million will be retained.

(4) If general obligation bonds are issued and vote is restricted to landowners, no more than twothirds or no less than a majority is required to carry. (Editor's Note: there is now the question as to constitutionality of this provision in view of the U.S. Supreme Court ruling).

(5) There is no change in taxation provision. There must be an equal assessment ratio for all classes of property.

Some changes:

anti-Mormon (1)Eliminates features. Electors presently cannot vote or hold office if they believe in celestial marriage which has been disregarded for 70 years.

(2) Inserts right of privacy (such as not having a telephone bugged) as part of the Bill of Rights.

(3) Gives the Legislature equal powers with the Governor in that the Legislature could request by majority vote of both houses for the Governor to call a public session.

(4) Classifies establishment of penal and other institutions of corrections so that the Legislature could have half-way houses or take over Job Centers for rehabilitation of some of our younger prisoners. The five "same" and five

"change" features of the propesed Constitution were selected at random to give some idea of the scope. To correctly understand it it should be fully read.

There will be no good reason for any voter not being thoroughly familiar with the proposed Constitution by the time November 3 comes around. Thousands of copies of it will be available. It will be published in newspapersincluding the Times-News-many

After the voters are familiar with the entire document we are certain they will support the adoption of it and vote "yes" for that adoption at the general election.

It is one of the most important decisions Idaho citizens have been called upon to make since the original-and now outdated-Constitution was adopted when Idaho was first formed

The point is that those willing to risk their necks in this sorry business of terror are few in number. They are like the repeaters in crime. They can be identified. They have few friends. Their organizations can be infiltrated.

They are a different breed from the "nut" hijacker who takes a plane to Cuba with no attempt to destroy the plane or the passengers — and no apparent political "mission." These nuts are impossible to identify or predict.

Curious Cause

Dear Dr. Thosteson: What causes endometriosis? Please explain treatments or cure. Would it be fatal if it went untreated? - Mrs. B.

To understand endometriosis, a disease of women in the childbearing age, you have to keep in mind the way the menstrual cycle works.

With each menstrual period, the endometrium, or lining of the uterus, sloughs off. Then a new lining grows, to be ready in case of pregnancy.

Sometimes some of the cells of the endometrium go wandering off to other areas. One generally accepted theory is that bits and particles of this tissue somehow work their way up through the Fallopian tubes and are deposited in the abdominal cavity.

Then such cells become embedded in the peritoneum, ovary, over the bladder, or in the bowel wall. Even though displaced, these cells react just as they would if they had remained in the uterus.

Keep in mind that it is the rise and fall of hormone levels which signal the proper time for the cells in the lining of the uterus to slough off, or to grow again. endometriosis, the displaced cells try to do the

The principal consequence of this is increasingly painful menstrual periods.

What to do about it? Since the stamped envelope. trouble subsides between menstrual periods, or when there are no periods (as in pregnancy), we have a clue to treatment. Pregnancy, for one thing, halts the discomfort for as long as the pregnancy

However, endometriosis also can bring on infertility. And anyway, especially with our concern for over-population, a continuing series of pregnancies is hardly a practical treatment for the ailment.

However, hormones (as in birth control pills) can produce a pregnancy-like condition. Therefore they have become an effective treatment for this type of problem. (Fertility often is restored after six months or so of such treatment.)

Another way to stop menstrual periods is to remove the ovaries — in a word, surgical menopause. This is not a preferred method, of course, for young women who still hope to have children. In older women, however, especially if the discomfort has progressed considerably, such surgery would be considered.

Endometriosis is not fatal, and it is not cancerous, but if not treated it can become mighty uncomfortable.

Arthritis sufferers can be helped. Dr. Thosteson's booklet discusses many types of arthritis and related joint diseases as well as outlining effective treatments and medications. Hatfield's close alliance with Fulbright on his anti-Israel stand was graphically shown when the latter sought to water down a proposal by Sen. Henry Jackson, D-Wash, to "provide on favorable credit terms the aircraft and other equipment... necessary for the defense of Israel and the stability of the Middle East."

Jackson's provision was overwhelmingly-approved 87 to 7. Two of the 7 voting against suggestion so simple that when

Robins, who died here Sunday at the age of 85, served as governor from 1947-50.

There was no sermon o eulogy during the services officiated by Rev. Charles May, pas-tor of the Episcopal Church of the nativity, and attended by a crowd of about 200 including Gov. and Mrs. Don Samuelson and former Goy, Charles Gos-

Burial at the Lewis and Clark Memorial Gardens immediately followed the services.

Robins, a native of Defiance, Iowa, had been hospitalized almost continually for the past several months and had suffered a series of heart attacks in the

-past two years.
The longtime Idaho political figure was graduated from William Jewell college in Liberty, Mo., in 1970 and, after teaching school for several years, entered Rush Medical College at the University of Illinois in 1913. During his years in medical school he worked for the Chicago Daily

Following completion of medical school, Robins entered the army as a lieutenant in the medical corps in 1918.

After his discharge from the Army, he moved to St. Maries and went into private medical practice. Robins served as a general practitioner at St. Maries until he moved into the governor's mansion in Boise in

Robins also served in the state senate from Benewah County from 1939-46 and was majority floor leader in 1943.

In 1950 he sought the Republican nomination for the U.S. Senate but was defeated in the primary by the late Herman Welker.

Robins' survivors include his widow, Patricia, and three daughters.

Prior to his retirement in 1967, Robins served as medical director here of the North Idaho Medical Service Bureau. He also served as a physician for the state legislature

Constitution Vote To Be Separate

BOISE (UPI) — An attorney general's opinion said Wednesday the proposed constitutional revision should be placed on a ballot separate from two pro-posed amendments to the 1890 constitution.

Chief Deputy Attorney General Thomas C. Frost said the decision of the Supreme Court in Smith vs Cenarrusa - which held constitutional submission of the revision without a constitutional convention - "very clearly establishes that a revised constitution is distinct and different from an amendment to the existing constitution and constitutional or statutory provisions relating to one do not necessarily cover the other.'

Highway Work To Cause Some Delays SHOSHONE - Controlled north and toward Gooding west,

traffic and some minor delays can be expected on state Highway 50, Heyburn, Burley and Salt Lake City interchanges, reports state highway depart-ment district engineer, Howard Johnson, Shoshone.

This project involves safety improvement work, flattening slopes and completing guard-rail installations, and on US Highway 30, Burley west, work is progressing with crushing plantmix aggregate.

In the Shoshone-Jerome areas, the roadway is essentially complete on the state Highway 68 project from Corral to Fairfield. This was for a distance of 7.785 miles at a cost of \$651,563.50 with Western Construction company, Boise contractors. The work included construction of roadway, drainage structures aggregate base and bituminous surface treatment

In Gooding county the rest area, port of entry, illumination and landscaping project on Interstate Highway 80N is complete with the exception of planting shrubbery and seeding. This will be completed during September, however. The rest area will be opened to the public with the opening of the roadway. The contract price of \$358,717.95 was granted to

D. Jones, Burley Other projects in the Jerome-Shoshone area include one on state Highway 68 from the junction of US 93 and stockpile. The plantmix is about 50 per cent complete and should be completed this year if weather conditions are favorable Controlled traffic will be held with minor delays. This is in Elmore, Camas and Blaine counties, at a cost of \$361,079 on a 21.104 mile stretch, with Bannock Paving Company,

Pocatello, contractor: The project that involves Highway 93 north and west of Shoshone, toward the Ice Caves

is progressing with seal coating done on 10.3 miles on US 20-26 and 9.8 miles on US 93 north.

The contractor has started the plantmix overlay on 12.5 miles of US 93 and this will be completed in October. Ice Caves, north and south in this section of road. The contract for the roads out of Shoshone was for \$427,686 and contractor is Holmes Construction Co., Heyburn.

The area south of Shoshone, US 93 to Newman's corner, is complete now with exception of minor cleanup and sealing. The distance was 7 miles at a contract price of \$106,168 with Holmes Construction Co. doing the work.

A detour of about one mile can be expected within the week on the Interstate 80N, Wendell-Jerome road project. Excavating for interchange ramps and installing of pipes is being done. There are temporary traffic signals at the crossing at the Junction of SH 25 and SH 46.

faithful to six o'clock prayers heavy stuff. drifts in the second story By midm window of a white-washed stone from the firing completely house built on a steep hill envelopes the city. of the guerrilla groups are headquartered.

It is Wednesday, Sept. 16. A handsome young man sits behind a battered wooden desk, an empty soft drink bottle containing a cigarette butt on top of it. From a window, he motions UPI correspondent David Zenian and me past armed guards who tell us that there is no news conference that day and to go home.

He is smiling and relaxed. exuding confidence—unlike the brisk young revolutionary who had dealt with hordes of newsmen during the previous days of anxiety about three jet hijackings which netted the guerrillas 300 hostages.

Thursday, Sept. 17: The war begins at 5 a.m. with the sharp reports of fire throughout the city. Dawn is breaking and red and white tracers streak across the pale blue sky like Roman Candles.

Within half an hour the fighting spreads around the seven hills of Amman in the general direction of the guerrilla camps.

The heavy thud of artillery is heard around the city followed by the boom of 75mm fire. Desert camouflaged armored cars crawl along the streets from the outskirts and the intensity of fire was frighten-

. The hotel is hit by occasional fire and one 50mm shell slams through the bathroom wall of a room of the fourth

floor tearing a gaping hole in it. We spent most of the day crawling along the floors on our stomachs to try to see what is going on, then hastily crawling back to the corridor when a bullet chips some concrete off a balcony ledge.

By midmorning the electricity is out and by noon the water

is off. In the afternoon the dawn telephone lines in the city are dead and we are cut off from the wall of ambulances and fire all direct communication.

By midmorning the smoke

For the third time in two days a major fight develops across the street from the hotel for an unfinished apartment house and several buildings nearby. A 100mm recoilless rifle rolls up on a jeep directly in front of the hotel and pounds away down the street.

The first shot shakes the

hotel with its mighty force and everyone hits the floor. With each successive firing, glass flies from hotel windows and the front lobby plate glass windows are almost completely

As the fighting rages through the afternoon it becomes increasingly frustrating not to be able to get any news out. We all admit it is impossible for anyone here to know who is winning, or even if there is fighting in the city center itself.

Perhaps the army and the guerrillas know as little as we

Saturday, Sept. 19: Throughout the night the army has moved columns of armor and men past the hotel toward the direction of town. Dawn finds two armored cars parked in the driveway.

Today is more of the same, running from this room to that to get a better vantage of the next place a firefight develops.

At the back of the hotel, on the north side, the garden drops to a deep valley and the upward slope of the other side is dotted with small stone houses, stairstep fashion. It is an area where many snipers

We spot two men walking from one of the houses into the open. One carries an automatic

Sunday, Sept. 20: The day begins as all the others. Heavy fire rumbles across the hills shortly after

For the first time we hear wagons. Across the valley we watch two stretcher bearers carry one victim toward an ambulance.

Suddenly they are caught in a crossfire. They drop the stretcher and dive behind a small stone wall. It is maybe five minutes before the shooting dies. The two men rush back grab the stretcher, fairly toss it

n the ambulance and speed off Around noon, heavy guns and machinegun fire slams away in one district on the northern Webdeh Hill, Guerrilla leader Yasser Arafat's headquarters is in that neighborhood and it is obvious the army is attacking

In the afternoon the army lifts the 24-hour curfew for three hours on the southern hills and some of us walk into the streets which are almost paved with spent machinegun shells of various calibers.

After the curfew the fighting resumes on the same savage scale. From the radio we hear the fighting has mostly stopped in Amman. They should be

Monday, Sept. 21:



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

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
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Kills 4, Himself

ALBANY, N.Y. (UPI)state worker returning from a month's sick leave went berserk with a rifle Wednesday, kill ing four fellow employes, all women, in the Labor Department building on the state's office building campus.

The gunman then killed

himself with a bullet in the

The shootings occurred on the fourth and fifth floors of the building, housing the adminis-trative offices of the Division of Employment.

Authorities indentified the gunman as Joseph W. White, 25, of Albany, a senior administrative analyst in the Division of Employment in the state Labor Department. The shootings occurred in the department's administrative offices, a five-story building.
Police said White brought the

gun to work in a box wrapped with Christmas paper and tied with a big red bow.

The four women victims were secretaries. They were identified as Sandra L. Peterson, 24, of Amsterdam; Linda D. Willis, 21, of Waterford, and Patricia Chromik, 22, and Mary Ann Reinisch, 27, both of Albany

Police were dispatched to the scene by a male caller who reported, "There's been a shooting in the Labor Department—and he's still shooting.'

Employes in the building, about 3,000 in all, were sent home for the day after the shooting, according to capital

Arnold Proskin, Albany county district attorney, said White had been on medical leave and was reporting back to work for the first time in a month.

"It was apparently the man's first day back to work, he had come in this morning after a month of sick leave," Proskin said. "It was some kind of stomach ailment.

"He brought in a box with him, it was all wrapped up," Proskin said. "He opened the box, took out the rifle and began shooting. Why did he do it? The man is dead; it's impossible to say.

The weapon was described as a 30.06 Remington rifle.

Proskin said the man shot three young secretaries who worked in the same office with him on the fifth floor, then went down to the fourth floor where he shot the fourth victim and then shot himself to death in a stairwell on the second

Proskin said White was not related to any of the victims.

Hijack **Defense OK Seen**

WASHINGTON (UPI)-President Nixon's plan to put 2,500 air marshals in the sky to thwart hijackers appears headed for certain congressional approval before Congress adjourns. Equally sure of enactment is the tax on airline passengers to pay for it.

The House Ways and Means Committee approved the measure Tuesday. The House could pass it next week and the Senate soon after.
The House Foreign Affairs

Committee, however, still was congressional resolutions aimed at other measures to foil the growing number of hijackings. Witnesses from the Departments of Transportation and State were called to appear today.


The committee took testimony Tuesday from air transport and union officials, all of whom lobbied against imposing any new tax on users to pay for federal protection against hijackers.

When it came to concrete proposals for coping with air piracy, however, they were not

quite so united. Matthias E. Lukens, president of the Airport Operators Council International and deputy executive director of the Port of New York Authority, said his group supported armed guards "but only as interim measures until adequate international agreements have been

reached. Gen. Clifton E. Lukens, vice president of operations and engineering for the Air Transport Association, said, "What we can expect out of multination agreements is not too great. To be quite realistic, we will probably have to do what is done using our own unilaterial power."

We aren't sure if we approve of the North-South bidding. Somehow or other, six clubs is a safer contract than six spades but the game was match point duplicate and North put his partner in the major-suit slam.

They did well to avoid six no-trump where only 11 tricks are available.

South won the diamond lead with dummy's ace and looked around for a way to make 12 tricks. A simple play would be to draw trumps right away, discard his losing diamonds and two of his hearts on dummy's clubs and concede a trick to the ace of hearts. That was a simple way but it would have turned out to be a losing one. With trumps break-4.2 South would have play out all his West would discard

down to the ace of hearts and a diamond and take the last two tricks.

South had another losing play at his disposal. Should he lead a heart to the king. West would take his ace and lead a second diamond, South would ruff in dummy and have no way to get to his hand to pull all West's trumps.

Then how did South make the slam?

Alan Truscott points out that he made it by means of an unusual play. At trick two, he played dummy's queen of hearts. This play left West with no winning defense. If West took the trick and led a diamond, South would ruff in dummy. cash dummy's king and queen of trumps, come to his hand with the king of hearts, draw the last trumps and run the clubs for 12 tricks.

If West ducked, South would simply run off trumps and clubs and let West win the last trick. Either way, the 12 tricks were home.





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Wyoming Plane Crash To Keep **BYU Ties**

LARAMIE, Wyo. (UPI) -The Wyoming Associated-Student Senate has voted down a motion to sever all relations with Brigham Young Univer-

The vote was 17-1. The motion. was brought up for consideration at the Senate meeting late Tuesday.

The bill was introduced last April and received a second reading the week before and had been tabled until the Tuesday night meeting.

The motion was drawn up because of the philosophy of the Mormon Church toward Negroes. The Mormon Church

operates BYU.
And J.R. Jeraud, vice president for student affairs at the University of Wyoming, said Wednesday that students who voluntarily enrolled in any organization or activity assumed a responsibility for meeting the requirements in-volved if they wish to continue participating.

Jeraud made his comments after receiving a recommendation from the student Senate that no disciplinary actions be taken against any students who find participation in intercollegiate activities with BYU a conflict of their moral principles.

The resolution was passed by the Associated Student Senate last week. It had been drafted at a meeting of all Western Athletic Conference student body presidents last June.

The athletic committee of the University of Wyoming met last Friday but did not duscuss the

Jeraud' wrote to Bob Archuleta, ASUW president, that 'the university supports the position that students should not make voluntary commitments in conflict with their moral principles. We follow a general principle which views the voluntary enrollment by a university student in any organization or activity as the choice of the student who assumes the responsibility for meeting the requirements involved for continued participation."

Noting that the resolution had also called for BYU and other WAC schools to try to provide better racial association by actively recruiting and helping minority students, Jeraud said the university has initiated a program to assist disadvantaged students.

Last fall, 14 black athletes were removed from the UW squad by Coach Lloyd Eaton after they appeared in his office wearing black armbands. They were protesting the policies of the Mormon Church and BYU.

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
