curbs drug WASHINGTON (UPI) -The

WASHINGTON (UPI) —The government announced Wednesday it will advise doctors to dreastically curb use of tolbutumide, the most widely prescribed drug for diabetics, because of indications it has little effect and may be connected with an increase in heart disease.

The drug is sold under the trade name Orinase. The manufacturer, the Upiohn Co., of Kalamazoo, Mich., estimates it is used by 800,000 diabetics in the United States.

The Food and Drug Allministration sald its forthcoming billetin to doctors was based on a \$7 million scientific study which concluded that tolbutamide coupled with a diabetic diet is no more effective than the-diet alone.

The same study concluded that patients taking tolbutamide had a greater incidence of fatal heart disease than those on a diet alone, or a diet coupled with risulin.

Upjohn issued a statement saying news reports of the FDA

with insulin.

Uplohn Issued a statement saying news reports of the FDA action "resulted in unnecessarily frightening" some of the tolbutamide users.

"We do not agree that there is an association between administration of tolbutamide, and the mortality found in the (study) group," Uplohn said. "There is no question of the effectiveness of tolbutamide in lowering the high blood sugar of selected patients with diabetes."

Officials and the pilot of the hijacked airliner reported it had been seized at gunpoint on a domestic flight that originated in San Jose.

HOUSTON (UPI) — Nobel Prize-winner Dr. William Shockley sald Wednesday Negroes in the North are more intelligent than those in the South and attributed it to the ratio of Caucasian genes.

Shockley said the intelligence—quotient (1Q) of Negroes may increase with the ratio of Caucasian genes to Negro genes at about a rate of one IQ point for every 1 per cent of Caucasian genes. In a paper delivered to the National Academy of Sciences, Shockley called for more study into the possibility this thesis may be correct.

The National Academy has refused to sanction Shockley's Generals theories or support his pleas for additional research.

Shockley said the gene which may increase the 1Q of Negross is a blood type which was missing from the original slave population but found in 43 per cent of all. Caucasians.

Inherent in Shockley's presention is the idea genetics, rather than environment, is the main factor' for determining intelligence.

Shockley, who won the Nobel Prize as co-inventor of the transistor, said a study of pre-induction mental tests for persons entering the armed services backs up his contention.

The person said the FLQ was "interested" in a government offer to fly the kidnapers to Cuba in exchange for the safe return of Cross, but subsequent checking led police to "doubt the authenticity of the calls." In addition, police checked out and found, to be bogus an alleged FLQ communique dropped in the community of Chateaguay, 15 miles west of Montreal, late Wednesday night.

The last authentic communication from Cross lind the FLQ arrived Sunday, the day after the body of slain Quebec Cabinet Minister Pierre La-

Cabinet Minister Pierre La-porte was found.

In two notes—one addressed to the authorities and one to his wife—Cross warned police his life would be endangered if they continued to search for him.

An accompanying communique from the FLQ threatened to execute Cross if the government diff not meet its demands to release 23 members of the terrorist organization held in Quebec Jails. It added, however, the terrorists "hoped to save the life of Cross."

Should the FLQ decide to accept the government offer, a helicopter is waiting for them, at the Canadian pavilion of the Expo '67 World's Fair. There they would have to turn Cross over to the Cuban consul.

Like Syria, Iraq is ruled by a faction of the Baathist party which, however, does not get along well with the Syrians. Syria's crisis arose from the opposite reason.

Although officially denied, it generally is accepted that a Syrian brigade crossed the border into Jordan at the peak of the fighting between the commandos and Jordanian forces, presumably to help the commandos. The brigade was said to be loyal to former Syrian strongman and party leader Salah Jadid.
