## Constitution lectures at high school Monday

TWIN FALLS — Details of the proposed Idaho Constitution revision to be voted on Nov. 3 by Idaho voters will be presented high school students in a series of lectures Monday.

Arnold DePaul, school social studies instructor, said the students will be utilizing the new "pod" constructed this summer for the first time in the special program. In the "pod" one large center is provided by

removing portable class dividers so a large number of students can attend the same program.

DePaul said Lloyd Webb, former district judge and member of the Constitution Revision Commission, will speak during the first two one-hour periods Monday. John Wolfe, school board member, will address the third period and Douglas Kramer, also a

member of the revision commission will speak for the next two periods. Sixth period speaker will be Eugene Stacey, city council member.

DePaul said students will be voting the regular Twin Falls County ballot today and Friday.

Voting machines are now at the school, DePaul said, with all junior and senior class members of the social studies group to be voting Thursday and Friday with the new automatic voting machines. Tabulation will be made after the polls close Friday at 3:45 p. m. he said.

## Rupert residents asked not to burn

RUPERT — Rupert residents are asked not to burn leaves and trash in compliance with the new state anti-burning regulation, but to place them in containers and city crews will pick them up.

Mayor Wendell Johnson urges cooperation with the new regulation, even though there is no city ordinance against burning.

## 1,566 wed in ceremony

SEOUL (UPI) — Seven couples from the United States and 1,566 more men and women from Europe and Asia were married Wednesday in a mass wedding in a huge gymnasium in downtown Seoul while fireworks exploded outside.

It was the biggest mass wedding in South Korean history, and possibly in the world.

The 700 couples are members of the Holy Spirit Association for the Unification of World Christianity, also known as the International Christian Unification Church. Most were from South Korea and Japan, but others came from the United States, West Germany, France, Italy, the Netherlands and Nationalist China.

The wedding ceremony was performed by church Master Sun Myung Moon, who founded the church in 1951, and his wife, both wearing olden robes and crowns.

"Do you swear to love your spouses forever?" asked Master Moon. The answers "Yes!"

# Samuelson pockets state aide's voucher

BOISE (UPI) — Idaho's controversial director of administrative services tried to charge the taxpayers for Republican travel expenses this week but

alert auditors blew the whistle on him Wednesday.

When Edward W. Sawyer's \$61.40 travel voucher hit the pre-audit desk at the office of State Auditor Joe R. Williams, a Democrat, "something suspicious" was noted.

As the reason for a two-day, 544-mile round trip from his home at Caldwell to Blackfoot last Thursday and Friday, Sawyer stated: "To address the Bingham County Republican dinner."

Signed twice by Sawyer Monday — both as the claimant and the department head — the claim was made against the appropriation for the budget division of Sawyer's department.

It asked for payment of \$54.40 — transportation at 10 cents per mile in Sawyer's private car — plus meals of \$2.50 on Thursday and \$4.50 on Friday.

Chester Graham, chief accountant for Williams, felt the claim might be unusual and took it Wednesday to the Board of Examiners — dominated by the Republicans — for consideration.

"We questioned whether travel for such a purpose was justified at taxpayer's expense," Graham said, adding his office had "no precedent" for paying such a claim.

Gov. Don Samuelson, the man who hired Sawyer and to whom the official is responsible, shot it down the minute he saw it. Samuelson is chairman of the Board of Examiners.

"This shouldn't be going through — under no circumstances," the governor said to Graham. "Somebody ought to know better than to put that through."

Then, slipping it under his elbow while he perused other claims, Samuelson ignored the document until the end of the morning meeting. After thoughtfully glancing at it a couple of times he quietly folded the claim and took it with him from the meeting room.

At no time did he mention or show the claim to newsmen, except to make the remark to Graham who was sitting in for the absent auditor who doubles as non-voting board secretary. Graham simply asked him for the number of the claim — 173267 — when he saw the governor intended to keep the document.

Normally, business before the board is shown to newsmen who cover the meetings and at one point Samuelson even tossed one of the claims to a reporter to study. This one he kept to himself and newsmen had to

ask Graham what it concerned. Newsmen asked Sawyer about the claim when he addressed the Lions Club Wednesday noon in Pocatello and Sawyer said he gave it no serious thought.

"The only answer I could give to you is that I would not have been invited to Bingham County had I not been serving in my present position," Sawyer said.

Claiming he makes "about 50 speeches a year" in his post, he said "most of my invitations to speak...are occasioned by the

fact that I am serving in the capacity I am serving in."

"And I view that visit to Bingham County as a matter of obligation to my official position," he said.

Sawyer's speech last Thursday night was to a GOP dinner in Blackfoot. It was typed by a state secretary on state time and its text was distributed to the news media by the governor's office. Its eight and one-half pages were devoted to defense of his department and praise of the Republican ticket.

## Political trip said part of job

POCATELLO (UPI) — Edward W. Sawyer, state director of administrative services, said Wednesday he considered a political speech at Blackfoot last week part of his official job.

Sawyer Monday submitted a travel claim of \$61.40 for a round trip between his home at Caldwell and Blackfoot last Thursday and Friday. In Blackfoot he addressed a GOP dinner.

When his claim hit the state auditor's office it was referred to the Board of Examiners where Gov. Don Samuelson promptly killed it.

Reached during another speaking engagement — this one a noon luncheon of the Pocatello Lions Club — Sawyer told his audience, when asked about the claim:

"The only answer I could give to you is that I would not have been invited to Bingham County had I not been serving in my present position."

"In other words, most of my invitations to speak that I receive are occasioned by the fact that I am serving in the

capacity that I am serving in. "And I view that visit to Bingham County as a matter of obligation to my official position."

He said he made about 50 speeches in the past year and added that his comments about the Democratic gubernatorial nominee when he spoke at Blackfoot were "incidental." Then he again criticized Cecil Andrus for his attacks on administrative services, accusing him of "misleading the voters."

## Wells flays Hansen

TWIN FALLS — Marden E. Wells, Democratic candidate for Congress from the Second District who doesn't always see eye-to-eye with members of his own party, was atumping this area Wednesday in his quest to unseat Cong. Orval Hansen.

Wells, who said his campaign was a little short on advertising "because we are short of campaign money," didn't take long to tee off on his Republican opponent by charging that the Idaho Environmental Council and Hansen are nothing more than "political bedfellows of the eastern establishment."

He charged that a small majority of "pseudo-intellectuals" who feel that they can get away with telling Idahoans what to do...are launching a smear campaign to discredit my candidacy as a representative of the people of Idaho.

"It is even more incredible that the council would claim that the bill sponsored by my opponent in Congress would actually preserve the hunting rights of Idahoans," he said. He had reference to the Sawtooth National Park bill — which Hansen has sponsored — along with other members of the Idaho delegation.

"Let no one be deceived," Wells said. "When an area becomes a national park then hunting rights go out the window. The council also neglected to mention that the church youth camps within the proposed national park would have to be burned to the ground if the Sawtooth National Park bill became law."

He said that his campaign has forced the political bedfellows "of the eastern establishment to come out from under the covers."

The candidate also termed the election a "fight for the survival of the Idaho farmer."

## Ohio senatorial contest toss-up

COLUMBUS, Ohio (UPI)—The lineage of Rep. Robert A. Taft Jr. includes a president of the United States and a senator who for decades was known as "Mr. Republican."

Howard M. Metzbaum came from humble beginnings—"I ate creamed peas on toast and had a \$15 Essex taken away so my father could pay his taxes"—and went on to build a \$50 million a year business out of airport parking lots.

Taft, leaving his House seat to run as the Republican candidate for the Senate, campaigned as a man who will back President Nixon.

Metzbaum, his Democratic opponent, has strongly criticized the President and is being called by the GOP a "radical," the term used by Vice President Spiro T. Agnew to describe radical liberals. Metzbaum does not deny it.

"If that's the way they want to charge me, I plead guilty," he says.

The two different candidates with two different political philosophies should make Ohio voters' choice next month an easy one.

But it isn't. The race is considered a toss-up with several other outside issues muddling the picture: —A continuing controversy over allegedly illegal loans of state funds arranged by businessmen who later made contributions to Republican campaigns.

—The strike against General Motors Corp., working at least 64,000 Ohio idlers.

—Incomplete investigations of the Kent State University shootings, coupled with general apprehension about campus activities this fall.

Primarily because of the loan scandal, Democrat John J. Gilligan, a former Cincinnati congressman, is generally conceded a lead over state auditor Roger Cloud in the gubernatorial race. Its effects on the Taft-Metzbaum contest were unpredictable. Taft has been polite, rather than warm, to the rest of the ticket.

Ohio's Senate seat, filled for 12 years by retiring Democratic Sen. Stephen M. Young, is one President Nixon needs to gain for Republican control of the Senate.

If Taft turns the trick for Nixon, it would be fitting, since the grandfather of the 53-year-old congressman was Republican President William Howard Taft, and his father was "Mr. Republican," the late U.S. Sen. Robert A. Taft.

Metzbaum, also 53, is a Cleveland publisher-attorney who has been critical of Nixon.

"Mr. Taft says he wants to go to the Senate to fight for President Nixon. I want to go to Washington to fight for the people of Ohio," he said.

### Smoking chief menace

LONDON (UPI)—Cigarette smoking is now the chief avoidable menace to health in Britain, the government's chief medical officer concluded in a report published Thursday.

In his annual report on the state of public health, Sir George Godber said research has ascertained smoking-induced illnesses account for nearly 100,000 premature deaths each year in the United Kingdom.

Godber also reported there were sharp increases in abortions and venereal disease among teen-age girls and said this signaled an urgent need for expansion of existing birth control services.

On smoking, Godber said the benefits of quitting the habit were "very large" and quickly noticeable.

"It is surely time that every effort was made to help the individual achieve them," he said.

Godber's report said lung cancer accounts for only about one third of all smoking deaths, with chronic heart disease and coronary thrombosis responsible for most of the rest. It said smoking causes "all told, perhaps 10 times as many deaths as do road accidents and nearly as many deaths as all cancers unrelated to smoking, put together."

# Polls show landslide victory for Gov. Reagan

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (UPI) — Gov. Ronald Reagan is coasting toward the biggest landslide victory by a California governor since Earl Warren, judging by the polls.

His major task now, in the few remaining days before the Nov. 3 election, is to extend his popularity to more vulnerable Republican candidates, such as Sen. George Murphy.

Murphy is running scared and slightly behind—according to the polls—in his bid for a second term against vigorous, New England-reared John V. Tunney, 36, son of the former heavyweight boxing champ.

"You need a fighter in your corner," Tunney tells voters through his television and billboard ads.

"Mr. Tunney isn't the guy who licked Jack Dempsey," Reagan notes.

In Murphy's corner are President Nixon, Tricia Nixon, David Eisenhower, Vice President Spiro T. Agnew and members of the Cabinet. All but Nixon have been in California campaigning for the 68-year-old senator, and the President is expected here, too, before the election.

But the strongest coalition Murphy can cling to may be Reagan's.

The latest California poll, the only major independent survey in the state, shows Reagan widening his lead over Democrat Jess Unruh and running 16 percentage points ahead, 52-36. Unruh—who has been wres-

ling the former entertainer, apparently unsuccessfully, for the middle income voters.

"I'm willing to stipulate that he's a better actor than I am. But on the issues he's a total failure. In every situation that Reagan said was bad in '68—welfare, taxes, campus unrest—it's twice or three times as bad now."

Reagan blames many of the state's problems on the fact Democrats controlled the legislature for the first half of his four-year term.

Now he is spending as much time stumpng for GOP legislative candidates as he is for himself.

Reagan only a month earlier had reduced a legislative-approved pay raise for the patrolmen from five to three per cent. Assemblyman Unruh led a losing legislative fight to restore the full amount. But it was Reagan who received two standing ovations, loud applause and a gift toy pig from the officers. Unruh received only a polite reception—and no gift.

## Mitchell's army trial postponed

FT. HOOD, Tex. (UPI) — The opening of defense testimony in the My Lai court-martial of S. Sgt. David Mitchell Wednesday was postponed for at least 24 hours to give defense attorneys more time to bring witnesses to Texas.

The defense was caught by surprise Tuesday when the government abruptly rested its case against Mitchell after calling only three witnesses, all of them former members of Mitchell's Vietnam platoon.

Mitchell, the first American soldier to be court-martialed for the alleged massacre, is charged with assault with intent to murder 30 Vietnamese civilians.

If convicted, Mitchell, 30, of St. Francisville, La., could be sentenced to 20 years at hard labor.

Chief Defense Attorney Ossie Brown said he plans to ask the military judge either to dismiss the charges against Mitchell or grant an instructed verdict of innocent when court reconvenes.

Brown said he feels the prosecution has failed to prove that Mitchell is guilty of the assault.

## Samuelson endorsed by Nixon

BOISE (UPI) — Gov. Don Samuelson released to newsmen Wednesday copies of a letter in which he received endorsement for re-election from President Richard Nixon.

In the letter from the White House, dated Oct. 15 and addressed "Dear Don," the President said one of his great concerns "is that we must reverse the flow of power from the states and localities to Washington and instead bolster the power and authority of state and local governments themselves."

"This will require a spirit of goodwill and cooperation among governments at all levels—federal, state and local," Nixon wrote.

"In particular, it will require that the states be led by able, dedicated governors who can and will make the most of the opportunities this new era presents."

"I know that you fully share this determination to make state government more effective, and your record of accomplishment amply shows that under your leadership Idaho can look forward to great progress in the years ahead," he said.

"Your understanding, insight and initiative have been of great value to me and my administration, and I look forward to continuing to work with you as, together, we seek the best for Idaho and for the nation."

The letter closed "With warm personal regards."

## 3-day weekend reality

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (UPI) — For a small number of workers the dream of the working man—a three-day weekend—is already a reality.

And for many of the firms which have adopted the policy of fitting the 40 hour week into four days, the outcome has been beneficial.

At least 38 firms have converted to the four day-40 hour week, many of them in the last year, and the Bursk and Poor Publishing Co., of Cambridge, Mass., is publishing a study of such firms.

The book, entitled, "4 Days, 40 Hours. Reporting a Revolution in Work and Leisure," traces the experiences of 27 firms that have converted to 4-0. They include five that switched back to the present standard of five days-40 hours.

In his foreword, economist Paul A. Samuelson of Massachusetts Institute of Technology, a former advisor to President John F. Kennedy, called the 4-0 a "momentous social invention." He said it is "merely one facet of the steady sweep toward greater leisure and less lifetime toil."

The advantages of the four-day week to the firm are varied, according to Mrs. Riva Poor, editor and co-publisher of the book, but for the labor, it is the

three-day weekend.

Mrs. Poor said the most frequent benefit cited by the firms studied is—incentive, morale and better living conditions for employees. The 4-0 has been a strong recruiting point in a competitive job market for skilled workers.

One aspect common to all the four-day firms is that it provides advantages simultaneously to the firm and to the workers. A result is that the firms generally obtained more improvements such as increased output and lower production costs than they planned on, she said.

By working 40 hours in four days, workers experience no loss in pay. One worker said it was like getting full-time wages for working a part-time job.

One disadvantage noted a spokesman for Merrill Engineering Laboratories in Denver, Colo., which has been on 4-0 for more than five years, is that some wives make their husband work at home on that extra day off.

## Athens, Sparta new 7th grade course

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Are Sparta and Athens relevant in today's classroom? For seventh graders?

A generation dutifully honed on a classroom diet of names and dates will shake its heads in disbelief that today's children should be subjected to such rote (or rot).

And students of the classroom relevance scene may wonder if today's breed will quietly accept what their forefathers so patiently suffered.

In spite of such odds, the National Endowment for the Humanities is financing development of a 12-week course on Athens and Sparta for seventh-graders and betting that the kids will lap it up.

"It is as relevant as any SDSer (member of Students for a Democratic Society) could wish—not because it twists history into the shape of 1970 headlines, but because the history of Athens and Sparta in the 5th century B.C. bears a genuine resemblance to our times," the independent federal agency said

The agency is shelling out \$138,074 over a two-year period to develop the course, which should be ready for publication next February. It was produced by Dr. Erich Gruen, a University of California historian, and the Education Development Center in Cambridge, Mass.

One of its hopes for success is that it is not really a history course.

"A typical history course would try simply to convey what happened in the Peloponnesian War," said the development center's Peter Dow. "This course is really about social change and the place of warfare in changing social values."

The course has been tested in nine Massachusetts and New York classrooms, and the tentative conclusion is that seventh-graders should be able to handle it. Not by books alone will this course breathe, but through Grecian art, slides and filmstrips, and even drama and debate.

"Ideally, a unit of this kind is

primarily a course in human behavior, and only secondarily a case study of Sparta and Athens," said Dow.

"But we use them as a kind of metaphor for looking at our own times."

If Athens and Sparta catch on in the classroom, Henry VIII and Sir Thomas More, Lorenzo and Savonarola will not be far behind.

# Nixon uses incident in talks

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Four days before the 1960 presidential election, a noisy crowd jostled Lyndon and Lady Bird Johnson at a Dallas hotel. The incident helped Democrats carry Texas in a very close contest and Republicans haven't forgotten it.

Now, 10 years later, the administration is trying to get maximum political mileage out of a few rocks thrown in President Nixon's direction last weekend as he walked through an airport at Burlington, Vt.

None of the rocks came close to Nixon, and he did not seem to notice them. Some reporters traveling with the presidential party said they did not see them, but the incident later was called to their attention by White House aides. Vice President Spiro T. Agnew criticized the news media's handling of the incident in a speech Monday night.

The incident is being used as a symbol of what has become perhaps the most potent campaign issue of the year—the "social issue" encompassing law and order, campus and racial violence, bombings and campaign heckling.

Nixon repeatedly has alluded to the rock-throwing incident during campaign appearances in which he urged voters to repudiate the rock-throwers of Nov. 3 by voting Republican.

There is no hint, of course, that Democrats threw the rocks or that Democrats have been behind any of the heckling

evident during the campaign—just as there was no hint in 1960 that Republicans were responsible for the abuse of the Johnsons in Texas or for the frequent heckling which Democratic presidential candidate Hubert H. Humphrey endured two years ago.

"Two days ago the President of the United States ... was the target of a shower of rocks thrown by young radical thugs. Any one of those rocks could have seriously injured the President ... That physical attack on the President, howev-

er, was buried in some news columns and went unmentioned in others ...

"... Any public man, of any party, who has helped to create the atmosphere of permissiveness—where this kind of obscene outrageous conduct has become so commonplace that it's no longer news—that public man should go down to humiliating political defeat in the election on Nov. 3."

Democrats have tried to keep the economic problem uppermost in voters' minds, but there is reason to suspect they

are falling and have adopted a strategy of trying to answer the "permissiveness" charges thrown at them.

One leading Democrat, in a private memo, told party leaders the 1968 election was lost because voters felt the party was on the wrong side of the law and order issue. The same thing will happen this year and in 1972, he said, unless Democrats can show that they stand for law and order, as well as a liberal approach to the solution of social problems.

## Bernadette out

LONDONDERRY, Northern Ireland (UPI) — Bernadette Devlin, Britain's youngest member of Parliament, was released from prison today after serving four months of a six-month sentence for helping incite the 1969 riots in Londonderry.

Officials said the 23-year-old civil rights campaigner had earned two months remission of sentence for good behavior.

Miss Devlin left Armagh Prison, about 50 miles southeast of Londonderry, in a police van shortly after 8 a.m.

The first indication she was gone came when a prison official strolled up to a group of newsmen and advised them they were wasting their time. "She's gone already."

The British Broadcasting Corp. (BBC) said Miss Devlin was going to a "secret hideaway" where she would rest for several days. She then planned to hold a news conference to discuss her time behind bars, BBC said.

Miss Devlin was convicted last December on four out of 13 counts of incitement to riot.

## Timothy Leary now in Algiers

ALGIERS (UPI) — Timothy Leary, one-time high priest of American LSD culture who escaped from a California prison Sept. 12, has been granted political asylum by the Algerian government.

Friends said Leary would work with Eldridge Cleaver in the U.S. Black Panther exile headquarters in Algiers.

In London, the Youth International Party (Yippies) said Leary and Cleaver would hold a news conference Thursday in Algiers.

Leary, 50, had been sought by U.S. police since he fled the California state prison system's minimum security Chino institution where he was serving one-to-10 years for marijuana possession.

Leary's wife, Rosemary, 34, who had finished a six-month sentence for possession of marijuana at the time of Leary's escape, arrived in Algiers with him. Both have been granted asylum in Algeria.

# All-European meet becoming unlikely

LONDON (UPI) — Russia's hardening policy has increased U.S. and British hesitation to yield to Moscow's insistence on an early all European security conference, diplomatic sources report.

The Soviet Union has lately increased its pressure for such a conference at which the Kremlin, supported by its East European allies, hopes to get broader endorsement of the postwar frontiers in Europe, with their divisions and partitions.

The United States and Britain have hesitated in the past to commit themselves to such a parley at which Moscow wants to see all East, West and neutral European countries represented at high level. Reluctantly, the Soviet Union agreed that the United States and Canada also should participate.

The Red bloc has been touting this meeting for some time and has proposed it be held in Helsinki, Finland, as soon as possible. Latest proposals were for a meeting early next year.

In the course of these efforts some of the smaller West European member nations of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO), such as Denmark and Belgium, have gradually been showing interest in the Communists' plan. Some have, in effect, been giving it cautious support recently.

More recently, even France has shifted its position from initial coolness to partial backing. This occurred during last week's visit to Moscow by French President Georges Pompidou who was reported to have agreed in principle to "preparations" for the all-European conference.

The Kremlin's hardening line in recent weeks—over the Middle East and Berlin most notably—has made the United States and Britain even less inclined to embark on a conference of giant proportions, for fear it would serve Communist propaganda purposes rather than concrete peace achievements.

Their conditions are that the conference must be very well prepared, that a firm agenda be approved in advance, that it contains concrete issues such as balanced military withdrawals of East and West from Europe and not merely, as suggested by the Communist bloc, debate a general declaration condemning the use of force in international disputes and pledge more East-West trade and technological exchanges.

The Russo-German nonaggression agreement last month seemed to improve conditions for a conference. But the accord has yet to be ratified, and ratification by Bonn depends on progress on a Berlin settlement, a subject on which Russia has been tough lately, sources said.

NATO is currently considering the conference problem and is to come up with proposals at its ministerial meeting in December, sources said. But they said that these proposals will be influenced by Russia's policy developments and good-will.

# Population may double in 36 years

UNITED NATIONS (UPI)—The world's population of more than 3.5 billion will double in 36 years if the current growth rate is maintained, according to a U.N. statistical survey released Thursday.

The U.N.'s 1969 Demographic Yearbook with data from 250 geographic entities said the population increase remained static at 1.9 per cent over the past three years. Its mid-1969 figures represented a rise of 60

million persons over the previous year.

Lincoln H. Day, chief of the U.N.'s Demographic and Social Statistics Branch, said the population safety margin was exceeded when the number of persons passed the two billion mark.

He said if the population continues to grow at about 70 million a year "it certainly would make it very difficult for the various countries of the world to raise their living standards. Even in the rich countries there will be difficulties in providing housing and social services."

Day said the "chances are rather good" the rate of growth would increase and said birth

control was the only method to halt the exploding numbers of people. "There's no other way," he said.

Worldwide population climbed to 3.552 billion in July, 1969, including 1,988 billion in Asia, 460 million in Europe, 345 million in Africa, 276 million in Latin America and the Caribbean, 240 million in the Soviet Union, 224 million in North America and 18.9 million in Oceania, the yearbook said.

Mainland China with 740 million persons was the most populous nation and Tokyo was listed at the world's largest city with slightly more than 9 million inhabitants.

The 21st annual statistical report said the world's popula-

tion will double to more than seven billion by the year 2006 if the current growth rate continues.

Despite the increasing numbers of persons, the birth rate dropped to 33 live births per 1,000 from a rate of between 34 and 35 in 1965 and between 35 and 36 in 1960. But the yearbook said the decrease did not necessarily indicate a decline in fertility in all nations.

The highest birth rates were in the undeveloped countries, with Pakistan producing the most newborn with 49 births per 1,000 in 1965.

Accounting for the constancy in population despite the drop in the birth rate was a decrease in the death rate from 16 per 1,000 in 1965 to 14 per 1,000 in 1969, that survey said.

## Fire hits Boise bar

BOISE (UPI)—Fire of undetermined origin gutted the Backward Door, a bar on Orchard Street Boise, early Wednesday.

Wes Zimmerman, battalion chief for the fire department, said the cause of the blaze still was under investigation by the city fire and police departments. He said it appeared to have started in the center of the building near the bar.

A passerby noticed smoke and flames and reported to a cruising policeman who turned in the alarm at 1:39 a.m. Three trucks and nine men responded and spent 1½ hours bringing the fire under control.

Low-lying smoke impeded efforts at first and firemen had to use face masks in battling the flames.

No dollar estimate of damages was available immediately.

## Admitted cannibal gets life sentence

LIVINGSTON, Mont. (UPI)—Stanley Dean Baker, 23, who admitted he ate the heart of his victim, was given a life sentence Tuesday for first-degree murder.

Dist. Judge Jack Shanstrom accepted Baker's guilty plea and passed sentence. He could also have sentenced him to death by hanging.

Baker and Harry A. Stroup, 20, both of Sheridan, Wyo. were accused in the July 9 didmember and cannibal slaying of James M. Schlosser, 22, of Great Falls, Mont.

Schlosser was a welfare worker in the community of Roundup, Mont., at the time of his death. His remains, without head or heart, were found in the Yellowstone River near Gardiner, Mont., July 10.

Baker and Stroup were arrested in the Big Sur region of California a few days later while involved in a traffic violation in the victim's automobile.

Stroup has pleaded innocent and is scheduled to go on trial Nov. 16.

# Ketchum hearing Monday

KETCHUM — City property owners may appear to voice approval or objection to the city's assessment rolls for Local Improvement District 1-A Monday night and city council members have issued a statement to explain some of the misconceptions concerning the assessments. The meeting is slated for 7 p.m. in the city hall.

The LID involves the installation of the city's sewer line and construction of the plant. Federal grants of \$410,300, Sun Valley Water and Sewer District contribution of \$150,500, and Ketchum General Obligation bonds for \$105,000 will furnish all but \$565,000 of the total cost of \$1,441,800. That amount, the council's statement read, must be paid by assessing the property benefited by the sewer system.

All property in Ketchum which borders upon a sewer line, either a street lateral or a trunk, is being assessed according to the benefits received by property. Separate assessments have been computed for each individual lot in platted area, even though adjacent lots may now be in the same ownership, except where institutional or commercial type occupancy would normally preclude separation into individual lots. A partial lot adjoining a full or another partial lot in the same record ownership shall also comprise one assessment.

The statement said in unplatted area, separate assessments will be computed for each ownership of record.

The unit square foot assessment rate is uniform throughout the district for benefited property ownerships up to 150 feet in depth, whether platted or unplatted, the councilman said.

Mayor Richey said the Idaho Local Improvement District law provides that assessments levied against the property are due and payable to the city treasurer 20 days from the date of confirmation of the assessment roll and if not paid within 30 days thereafter, will become delinquent and will be collected in the same manner as other delinquent assessments, plus a two per cent penalty. The date for confirmation of the assessment roll is Oct. 29, so cash payments will be accepted by the city treasurer as of Nov. 18 and cannot be accepted after Dec. 18.

At the property owner's option, the assessment may be paid in ten equal annual installments plus interest.

Mayor Richey added that the amount of cash payments deducted from the \$565,000 due determines the amount of local improvement district bonds to be sold in January, 1971.

In addition to the assessment, a monthly sewer user charge has also been established for the city. The average single family resident will pay \$2 per month, while users with larger demands upon the sewer system pay more, depending upon the amount of use. This charge, Mayor Richey said, is for maintenance and operation of the sewer system and treatment plant, and may be raised or lowered by the city council, depending upon the amount of money found necessary to operate the sewage system.





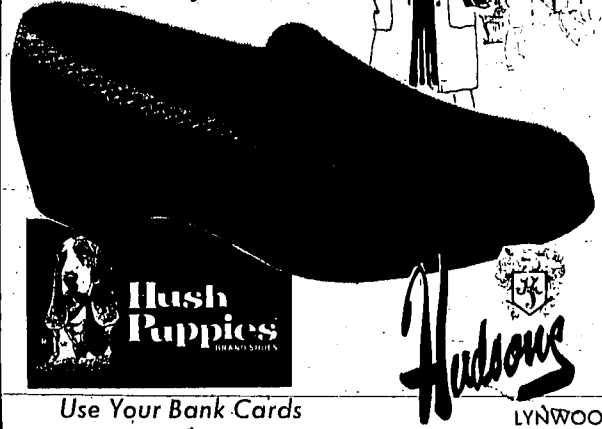

## Skin doctors answer beauty questions

Keeping up with the newest medical findings in areas that affect your looks could drive you to a life of solitary confinement in the medical library. To side step that poor prospect, Glamour's beauty editors have stacked up some of the most often asked questions about recent developments in the treatment of skin problems.

Here are a few of the most often asked questions — along with the answers from a number of specialists in the field — from the November issue:

**Question:** Do birth control pills have any effect on the skin?

**Answer:** A lot of girls have heard that their complexions will improve when they start taking the pill. This isn't necessarily true. For still unexplained reasons, some girls do notice an improvement, but others say their skin got worse when they first started on the pill. Dr. Richard C. Gibbs thinks the real change is more likely to take place when girls go off the pill — a change for the worse, though. Once the body becomes accustomed to a certain level of estrogen, the backwards adjustment can throw the skin off balance.

**Question:** What about IOD's? Do they have any effect on the skin?

**Answer:** As far as it known now, no.

**Question:** Can sleeping pills

do anything to my skin?

**Answer:** Sleeping pills are among a list of drugs including laxatives, headache mixers, tranquilizers, diuretics and blood pressure pills that can sometimes cause drug rashes.

**Question:** What can emotions do to the skin?

**Answer:** Lots. Just about anything from making you blush to making your skin break out in patches of hives or aggravating a tendency to pimples and blackheads. For example, in stress situations skin conditions like psoriasis, eczema, or hives can appear from apparently nowhere as physical outlets for emotions. Dr. Binford says this is probably caused by an imbalance in the autonomic nervous system. And although emotions don't cause pimples, they make them worse. The more you worry, the weaker your resistance, the more open to infection you are.

**Question:** Can conditions resulting from stress situations be controlled?

**Answer:** If the tension situation is predictable — like taking a big exam or giving a speech — some doctors recommend a mild tranquilizer. And even in cases where the situation can't be anticipated and symptoms do show up, many doctors prescribe a tranquilizer along with more specific treatment for the symptoms.

**Question:** Does 'pot' have any effect on the skin?

**Answer:** So far as doctors know now, no. Smokers may notice that their sense of touch is heightened — but that's not because of any skin change. It's more likely a mental change. Reports show that under the influence of marijuana, past and future memories are decreased and concentration on present stimuli is increased. This centered concentration probably accounts for heightened sensory perception.

**Question:** Is drinking bad for the skin? What does it do?

**Answer:** Alcohol may dehydrate the skin for a short time, but that effect isn't lasting and won't cause any permanent problems. It can make an itching skin condition worse since it causes an increased flow of blood to the skin. Also, in extreme cases, very heavy drinking can cause loss of appetite — to the point that poor nutrition could produce symptoms ranging from poor skin tone to cracks in the skin at the sides of the mouth and scaly oily patches around the nose.

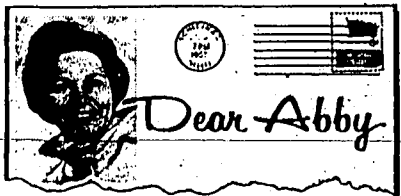

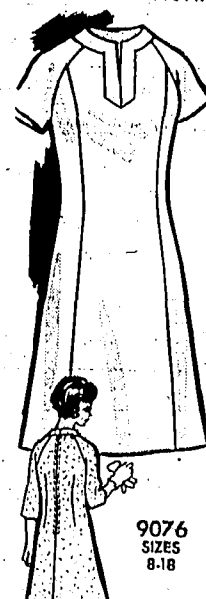

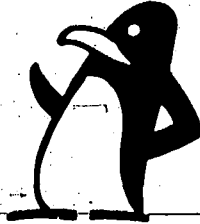

**NEW YORK (UPI)**—Stocks were broadly lower in quiet trading at the halfway mark Thursday.

Weakness reflected general disappointment with third-quarter corporate earnings and a government report indicating that inflation is still hanging on. On Wednesday, the government noted that the cost of living rose one-half of one percent in September, more than double the rate in August when the Nixon administration said a 0.2 percent rise was evidence its anti-inflation drive was succeeding.

But one analyst observed that the latest report showed that "the administration's game plan on inflation is behind schedule."

Shortly before 1:15 p.m., the Dow Jones industrial average was off more than 2 points at 757.26, and declines were leading advances by more than a two-to-one ratio, 600 to 330.

A three-hour turnover of 5,570,000 shares compared with 7,000,000 shares traded at a comparable period Wednesday.

Among the stocks on the most active list were American Crystal Sugar up 1 1/2 to 144.200 shares, Telex Corp. 3/4 higher on 92,600 shares, and Philip Morris down 1/4 to 73.000 shares.

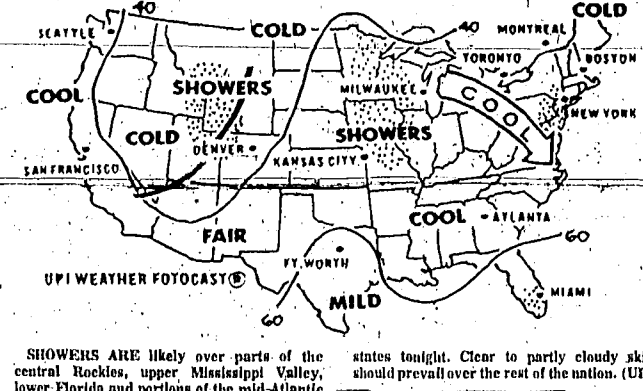

PROPOSING A REVISED CONSTITUTION FOR THE STATE OF IDAHO; STATING THE QUESTION TO BE SUBMITTED TO THE ELECTORATE AND DIRECTING THE SECRETARY OF STATE TO GIVE LEGAL NOTICE THEREOF. Do It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

SECTION 1. The Legislature of the State of Idaho, do hereby propose to call a Constitutional Convention for the purpose of submitting a revised Constitution to the electors of the State of Idaho.

SECTION 2. The Legislature of the State of Idaho, do hereby propose to call a Constitutional Convention for the purpose of submitting a revised Constitution to the electors of the State of Idaho.

SECTION 3. COMPOSITION OF THE LEGISLATURE.— The legislature shall be composed of senators and representatives. The number of members of each chamber shall be prescribed by law.

SECTION 4. DEFINITION OF ELECTIVE DISTRICTS.— The legislature shall define the districts from which the members of the legislature are elected. Such districts shall be compact and contiguous, and shall be apportioned on a population basis to provide equal representation.

SECTION 5. QUALIFICATION OF LEGISLATORS.— Members of the legislature shall be qualified electors. SECTION 6. TERMS OF OFFICE OF LEGISLATORS.— Representatives shall be elected for a term of two years and senators for a term of four years.

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF IDAHO. PREAMBLE We, the people of the state of Idaho, grateful to almighty God for our freedom, to secure its blessings and promote our common welfare do establish this constitution...

SECTION 1. INALIENABLE RIGHTS OF MAN.— All men are by nature free and equal and have certain inalienable rights among them to enjoy life and defend life, liberty and property, to acquire, possess, and protect property, and enjoy the right of privacy; to have the quality of their lives improved, comfort enhanced; to pursue happiness and secure safety.

SECTION 2. INHERENT POLITICAL POWER OF THE PEOPLE.— All political power is inherent in the people. The government is established for their equal protection and benefit, and they have the right to alter, reform, or abolish it whenever they shall deem it necessary; and no special privileges or immunities shall ever be granted that may not be altered, revoked, or repealed by the legislature.

SECTION 3. INSEPARABILITY OF THE STATE FROM THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA.— The state of Idaho is an inseparable part of the United States of America, and the Constitution of the United States is the supreme law of the land.

SECTION 4. RIGHT OF TRIAL BY JURY IN CIVIL AND CRIMINAL CASES.— The right of trial by jury shall remain inviolate, except that: (a) In civil cases, a jury trial may be waived by consent of the parties in writing...

SECTION 5. GUARANTEE AGAINST PROSECUTION EXCEPT BY INDICTMENT OR INFORMATION.— No person shall be held to answer for any criminal offense without indictment by a grand jury or on information of the public prosecutor, except in cases of misdemeanor. No information shall be filed by the public prosecutor after a charge has been ignored by a grand jury, nor until after a commitment by a magistrate, except that such commitments shall not be required in cases of impeachment, in cases arising in the militia during its actual service in time of war or public emergency, or in cases of misdemeanor punishable by a prison sentence of six months or less, or by a fine of one thousand dollars or less, or by both such prison sentence and fine.

SECTION 17. GUARANTEE OF RIGHT OF ASSEMBLY.— The people shall have the right to assemble in a peaceable manner, to consult for their common good, to instruct their representatives, and to petition the legislature for the redress of grievances.

SECTION 20. GUARANTEE OF RIGHT OF FREEDOM OF CONSCIENCE.— The privilege of the writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended, unless in case of rebellion or invasion the public safety requires it, and in the manner prescribed by law.

SECTION 21. GUARANTEE OF RIGHT OF DUE PROCESS AND EQUAL PROTECTION.— No person shall be deprived of life, liberty, or property without due process of law nor denied the equal protection of the laws.

SECTION 22. SUBORDINATION OF MILITARY TO CIVIL POWER.— The military shall be subordinate to the civil power and no soldier in time of peace shall be quartered in any house without the consent of the owner, nor in time of war except in the manner prescribed by law.

SECTION 23. GUARANTEE OF REMEDY FOR ANY INJURY.— Courts of justice shall be erected in every county, and a remedy shall be afforded for every injury of person, property, or character, and right and justice shall be administered with speed, denial, delay, or prejudice.

SECTION 27. PROHIBITION OF SECRET SESSIONS OF THE LEGISLATURE.— The business of each house of the legislature shall be conducted in public, and the whole shall be transacted openly and not in secret session.

SECTION 28. ORIGIN AND AMENDMENT OF BILLS.— Each chamber of the legislature shall have the right to originate and amend bills, and no member shall be elected and is otherwise qualified. Each chamber shall determine its organization and rules of procedure.

SECTION 29. CONTINUITY OF OPERATIONS OF THE STATE.— In order to insure continuity of state and local governmental operations in majority of members voting in periods of emergency resulting such house.

**Arab cease-fire remains major Mid-East need**

In Beirut, Lebanon last August, a newspaper columnist proposed only half facetiously that "what is really needed now is a cease-fire among the Arabs."

If the columnist's remark had bearing then, it is doubly so today as reverberations of the Jordan civil war shake the governments of Syria and Iraq, the truce between Palestinian commandos and the troops of King Hussein shows signs of falling apart and the Arab world ponders life without Gamal Abdel Nasser.

In Baghdad it was disclosed that vice president and Air Marshal Hardan Takrit, a leading Iraqi hawk in the war against Israel, had been stripped of all power and placed in a purely ceremonial post.

In Syria, president and Prime Minister Dr. Nourreddin Atassi, quit his posts as result of a crisis within the ruling Baath party.

Takrit had been a foremost critic of Nasser's decision to accept the United States-proposed cease-fire in the Middle East, and his removal appeared to be the result of a split within ruling Iraqi circles over failure of the 12,000 Iraqi troops stationed in Jordan to fight on the side of the commandos.

Like Syria, Iraq is ruled by a faction of the Baathist party which, however, does not get along well with the Syrians.

Syria's crisis arose from the opposite reason.

Although officially denied, it generally is accepted that a Syrian brigade crossed the border into Jordan at the peak of the fighting between the commandos and Jordanian forces, presumably to help the commandos. The brigade was said to be loyal to former Syrian strongman and party leader Salah Jadid.

Syrian Defense Minister Lt. Gen. Hafiz Assad strongly opposed Syrian intervention, according to reports and touched off the current crisis deliberately.

The Iraqi regime led by President Ahmed Hassan al-Bakr seized power in mid-1968 and with only a narrow popular base has kept itself in power through a reign of terror which has included executions, many in public, of more than 90 Iraqis, including 14 Jews, on charges of spying and conspiracy.

Its foreign policy is based on implacable enmity toward Israel which it also has used in an attempt to gain popular support.

The Syrian squabble is made up of a cast of character which have been feuding for power for many months.

**ACA endorses 165 candidates**

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Americans for Constitutional Action (ACA), a conservative organization, announced its endorsement Wednesday of 15 candidates for the Senate and 150 for the House in the Nov. 3 elections.

Thirteen of those endorsed for the Senate were Republicans. The others endorsed were Sen. John C. Stennis, D-Miss., who has no Republican opponent, and Sen. Harry F. Byrd Jr., D-Va., who is seeking reelection as an independent against Democratic and Republican nominees.

Of the 150 backed for the House, 123 were Republicans, 26 were Democrats and one New Yorker was a candidate under the Conservative party label. Six others endorsed in New York were nominated by both the Republican and Conservative parties and one was just the GOP nominee.

All but two of the endorsed Democrats represent districts in the South. The two exceptions were Reps. Salter Baring, Nev., and John Jarman, Okla. The endorsed candidates included House Republican leader Gerald R. Ford, Mich., House GOP whip Lealle C. Arends, Ill., and Rep. Rogers C. B. Morton, Md., Republican national chairman, Senate GOP

leader Hugh Scott, who is seeking reelection this year, was not on the list.

Republican candidates endorsed for the Senate were Sen. Paul J. Fannin, Ariz., Sen. George Murphy, Calif., Rep. William C. Cramer, Fla., Sen. Ralph T. Smith, Ill., Rep. Richard L. Roudsbush, Ind., Roman L. Hruska, Neb., Anderson Carter, N.M., Rep. Tom Kleppe, N.D., Rep. Robert Taft Jr., Ohio, Rep. William E. Brock III, Tenn., Rep. George Bush, Tex., Rep. Laurence J. Burton, Utah, and Rep. John S. Wold, Wyo.

"The election of a conservative Congress will bring about the change the majority of Americans now demand," said ACA President Charles A. McManus.

McManus announced that other candidates for Congress would be endorsed before the election.

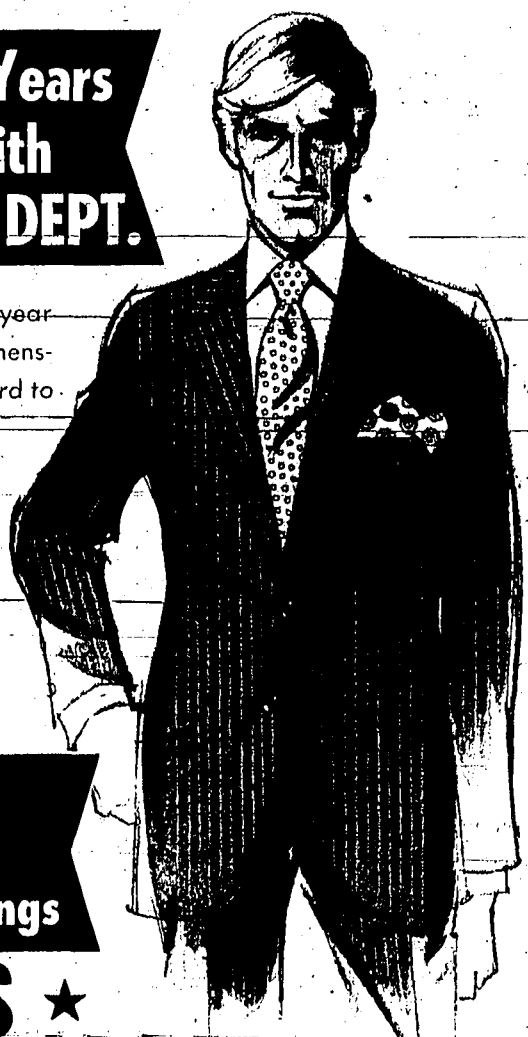
