Slump

Production falls most in 11 years

Nixon administration's confident predictions of recovery for the slumping economy have been jolted by a government report that factory output fell 2.3 per cent in October —the largest monthly decline in more than 11 years.

The Federal Reserve Board Prices reported Tuesday the Industrial Production Index, considered one of the most accurate barometers of economic activity, declined last month for the seventh time this year.

The drop, about one half caused by the General Motors strike and the other half by overall business sluggishness, was the sharpest monthly dip since August, 1959 -a month when production was slowed by a nationwide steel strike. The October index was 162.3 per cent of the 1957-59 base period.

A Federal Reserve spokesman said even if the effect of the GM strike was eliminated from the figures, the dip still would be the most severe for any month since December, 1960,





The Congress

The first lame-duck session of Congress in many years got underway Monday with little prospect for constructive legislation.

There are eight appropriation measures which should have been passed before this fiscal year began July 1 and which must be enacted. Beyond that, it's /anybody's guess what the 91st will do before it quits for good sometime before Christmas.

Important pending measures include a trade bill, fixing quotas on imports of some textiles and shoes. Action on it would provide a weathervane on whether the nation is about to embark upon a protectionist and isolationist trend.

The President's family assistance plan is unlikely to receive approval but an increase in Social Security benefits would appear to be probable, although it, too, could be left for the new Congress which opens in January.

Whether funds will be voted for construction of the controversial supersonic transport plane is doubtful despite the fact tha tproponents have predicted approval. Difficulties that have plagued the big 747's have provided

opponents of the SST with ammunition for debate. The economic and other problems of the 747 should be resolved before we embark upon even larger and faster planes.

Absenteeism and lack of interest characterizes lame-duck sessions if history is a guide. All members of Congress are weary from the election campaign and the losers have no more than temporary interest in further actions of the 91st Congress.

However, we should point out that all of Idaho's Congressional delegation are in Washington and are at work.

Politicking, which played so large a role in this year's actions and inactions, will continue to be a predominant concern, particularly to the half-dozen senators who are "available" should the Democrats wish to nominate one of them for the Presidency.

On the whole, it would appear only sensible for the 91st Congress to quickly wind up its "must" duties and retire from the scene. The country would welcome a breather and, out here in Idaho, we could get ready for Christmas.

Food Prices

A report by the Agriculture Department on 1970 food costs reveals poignantly how stubborn inflation is and how misleading early indications of its end have been. Food prices for the year, the department says, will increase about 5.5 per cent over last year.

In 1969 the rate of increase was 5.2 per cent, and the department predicted early this year food price inflation would show a marked improvement — probably to a level between 3.5 and 4.0 per cent. The department's prognosticators obviously were using a faulty crystal ball.

Inflation has not been tamed, not by a long shot. What has developed instead is a high-price recession. One of the main causes of inflation -- deficit spending -- has not been

curtailed. Not only is this year's federal

budget a new record, but the deficit built in to that budget once again is reaching sizable proportions.

Higher food prices are but one manifestation of inflation. What is more, next year at this time the pfeture will be no less somber unless the cause is attacked more diligently



KIMBERLY Magic Valley got another light covering of snow Wednesday morning, a day later than the first snowfall

Wednesday's flurry, however, was the fifth of 1970, but the first this month. The first snowfall of 1970 was a trace on Oct. 7, 40 days earlier than in 1969, the U. S. Weather Bureau at Kimberly reports.

A spokesman there said snow probably would turn to rain by Wednesday afternoon and then diminish, with changes of precipitation only about 10 per cent on Thursday.

He said the only spot in Magic Valley which did not report snowfall Wednesday morning was Hailey, one of the valley's high snowfall areas. The Camas Prairie region, also snow country, reported only a trace of snow during the night and at 8 p.m. while most of Magic Valley was covered by storm clouds,

the sun was shining there.
At 8 a.m. today at Kimberly the temperature was 33, and the Weather Bureau reports temperatures throughout the region probably will drop to the low 40's or a high, and the mid and low 20's for a low tonight and through tomorrow night.

NEW YORK (UPI) -A mass inferiority complex is at work in the typical female, says a management consultant who runs seminars on "managing the working woman.'

Ann Howard, Director of research for Cleaver and McManus Inc., of Princeton, N.J., of Worcester, Mass., and of Beltville, Md., told the annual session of the National Association of Bank Women, sex stereotyping is the reason for "the inferiority trap.

The female devaluation, as Miss Howard called it, begins in childhood. Little girls are given dolls and toy kitchens. They are scolded for soiling their pretty dresses.

Boys, meanwhile, are plied with mechanical toys and doctor's kits. Their dirty, rough



Representing the People Athletic Committee at the meeting were Con O'Leary, a graduate student from the University of Kansass Jack Scott, a former Cal student who has written a book on the problems posed by athletics, and Jim Smith, a former member of the Cal Track team.
