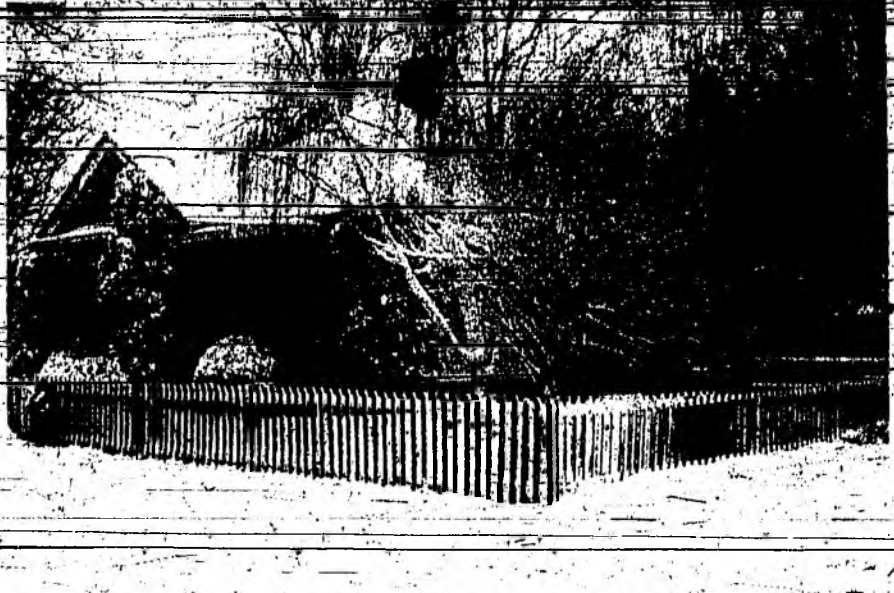

## City charts annex

TWIN FALLS — Several areas south of Twin Falls along Idaho Highway 74 which are eligible for annexation to the city will be prepared for review by Twin Falls Planning and Zoning Commission and city council for further action.

George Michaels, city engineer, told city officials in an informal meeting Monday afternoon his department has inspected various properties and prepared a map showing those to the south of the city and some to the southwest and east which could be annexed.

Council members suggested the city proceed slowly on the matter, taking the south area along Highway 74 first, with the others to be considered later in 1971.

Michaels said he was instructed to prepare a study of property descriptions which could be used in an ordinance. Planning and zoning board members will also be asked to consider the zone the areas would be given if they are to be annexed.

If the annexation is to be presented to the council for approval, it must first go to the planning and zoning group for discussion and public hearings, then return to the city council for public hearing.

Michaels said the first area to be considered includes property south of Highland Avenue, including the Clinton-Earl Subdivision, the part of the Farmstead Subdivision which fronts on Highway 74 and part of the Park Subdivision. All of these areas are beyond the present city boundaries and in the vicinity of Kellwood Corp., which has been annexed.

City officials also discussed the request for water from Wills Inc. for a mobile home park and subdivision to be built south of the city in the vicinity of the city reservoir.

Six alternatives were proposed by City Manager Jean Milar and after reviewing these council members suggested he negotiate further with Robert Wills and report at the Dec. 7 meeting.

## T.F. GI survives

TWIN FALLS — Airmen 1C David Balsch, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Balsch, Twin Falls, was among survivors in the charter jet crash in Anchorage, Alaska Friday. He is reported in satisfactory condition in an Anchorage hospital.

Balsch said he and his wife were able to talk to their son Saturday and he told them he had a back injury but believed he would be released from the hospital soon.

AIC Balsch entered the U. S. Air Force about two years ago and has been stationed at Hill Air Force Base, Utah. His wife resides in Ogden, Utah, which is listed as the serviceman's home.

Balsch said his son was on route to Vietnam when the plane crashed.

## SST's havoc charted

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Interior Department, in a report filed before Walter J. Hickel and his key staffers were ousted by President Nixon, said the proposed supersonic transport (SST) might trigger land slides, damage the environment of fragile sea birds and affect the world's weather.

An environmental report on the SST project — which is nearing a key vote in the Senate — was filed by the department Oct. 27 but has not emerged from the Transportation Department, Sen. Gaylord Nelson, D-Wis., an SST opponent, obtained a copy of the report and released it today.

The document, written on the stationery of the secretary's office and signed by John R.

Quarles Jr., assistant to the secretary for policy planning and research — said there were "several questions that should be answered before a decision is made to proceed into commercial production of the U.S. SST or permit flights of foreign SSTs over U.S. territory." It and the questions should be answered before a prototype aircraft for the SST are completed.

Quarles was not one of the six men drummed out with Hickel. The Senate was expected to vote, perhaps late this week, on a \$280 million appropriation for construction of two SST prototypes. The measure has been hotly opposed by environmental groups.

## Italy OK's divorcee

ROME (UPI) — Parliament swept aside appeals by Pope Paul VI and a down-to-the-wire battle by Roman Catholic politicians to pass a bill early today making divorce legal in Italy for the first time in modern history.

As soon as the bill is published in the official gazette — probably in 10 or 15 days — it becomes law.

Scandalous divorce advocates cheered, tossed firecrackers, danced around ancient monuments and raced cars through empty streets when the passage was announced just before dawn. Divorce will be legal for the first time in Italy since Napoleon surrendered rule of the peninsula in 1815. Roman Catholic opposition blocked 12 other divorce bills in the past 50 years.

Passage also inflicted the most stinging defeat by the Italian government on the Vatican since the fall of papal rule of Rome one century ago. Pope Paul several times called for rejection of divorce, most recently in a farsworn speech six days ago as he set off for a tour of Asia and the Pacific.

The divorce bill is not liberal by American standards. It provides for divorces in cases of long imprisonment, sex crimes against spouses or children, separations for periods of seven years or more, and in cases where an Italian marries a foreigner who obtains a divorce or annulment abroad or remarries.

Sociologists say one of every 10 Italians are the wives, husbands or children of failed marriages. There are hundreds of thousands of Italians living together out of wedlock because one or the other cannot divorce a spouse.

It was estimated one million men and women will seek divorces as soon as possible. The procedure is simple — they must buy an official form costing about 80 cents and list such pertinent facts as the reason for wanting a divorce, the number and age of children, and financial status. A special magistrate must make one effort to save the marriage and if he fails, court action begins. Lawyers estimated the process could take up to a year to complete.

## Gooding Cone fails

taxes up 22.4%

GOODING — Taxes in Gooding County rose more than in any other Magic Valley county — 22.4 per cent over last year.

Treasurer Della O. Robertson said today the taxes for a \$10,000 house in Gooding would total \$176.41 this year, compared to \$144.09 last year.

The total increase from all taxing units in the county nosed out Cassia County's increase of 21.5 per cent as the highest percentage increase in the eight Magic Valley counties.

The Gooding increase had been reported erroneously as 35 per cent above last year. The Times-News regrets the error.

## Skywatcher falls

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI) — The 190-million-dollar America's most ambitious space astronomy mission today was blamed on a nose cone that dragged its stargazing satellite to a fiery death in earth's atmosphere.

The 190-million-dollar astronomical observatory (OAO) and its record-size space telescope Monday night dealt a severe blow to scientists trying to solve some of the mysteries of the universe.

The failure also hit the U.S. space agency and its hard-pressed finances. It was the agency's most important and costly unmanned scientific mission of 1970. The year's only manned flight, the Apollo 13 moon expedition, failed in April.

There is only one spacecraft left in the four-and-a-half-billion observatory program and it will not be ready for flight until next fall. The first OAO failed in 1966, but OAO 2 still is operating after two years in space and has been an outstanding success.

Reports from the space machine showed that the two-piece fiberglass nose cone protected the observatory through the atmosphere did not spring free as it was supposed to four minutes 16 seconds after launch. It hung on inexplicably for at least eight more minutes and overloaded the Centaur upper stage rocket.

The extra weight, estimated at about a ton, kept the Centaur from accelerating the 4,600-pound satellite.

## Murder hearing begins

SHOSHONE — A closed hearing began this morning in Lincoln County Probate Court for Danny Howard Williams, 18, charged with the Nov. 13 murder of Mrs. Melba Gray, 33, Shoshone.

The young defendant, court officials and others directly involved in the first-degree murder hearing were the only ones admitted to the court room.

A list of witnesses to be called was not available, but at least two Twin Falls Police officers, Capt. Tim Qualls and Lt. Garry Corder, who assisted Lincoln authorities in preliminary investigation of the slaying, were subpoenaed to testify.

Workers at the courthouse said there was no large gathering of spectators. They said it was "pretty well understood" in this rural farming community of just over 1,200 that the preliminary hearing "would be closed."

Howard Adams is prosecuting the case and Phillip Becker, Gooding, has been appointed to represent Williams.

## Defector return probed

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Nixon has ordered the Coast Guard to explain, within 48 hours, why a Libyian sailor was handed back to the Soviets after he tried to defect last week. The White House said it appeared the affair was "poorly handled."

Nixon directed a full investigation Monday amid new criticism of the incident in Congress, and an added note of explanation from the Coast Guard.

Commander of the Coast Guard, Adm. Chester Bender, issued a 350-word statement saying it was alleged that the man who tried to defect had stolen money from his ship. Bender added it was "felt that it was reasonable and proper that we not permit our ship to be used as a means of defection."

# Pope blasts Australian race policy

**SYDNEY, Australia (UPI)**—Pope Paul VI, standing frail but resolute against 45 miles an hour winds buffeting his outdoor altar, tonight condemned the "white Australia" policy which excludes all but a handful of non-Australians from this vast and scarcely tapped land.

He did so in appealing to Australians "do not close your limited circle for the sake of a selfish satisfaction." And he called on all who bear responsibility in Australia "to take advantage of this occasion for an examination of conscience."

The pontiff spoke after attending a morning meeting of bishops of Oceania, who gave him specific condemnations of Australia's race exclusion policy. One, Bishop John H. M. Rodgers of Tonga, said that because of land and work shortages many Pacific Islands were facing a grim future.

"The only permanent solution would seek to lie in mass migration to other countries will able to receive new citizens," Rodgers said. "It is suggested that the hierarchies of Australia, New Zealand and Canada and other affluent countries prodact with a united voice against the racial discrimination now being practiced

by their governments."

Bishop Pierre Guicist of Tarawa also called on rich countries "to change their immigration policies and extend a friendly hand to their fellow human beings who are less fortunate."

The pontiff spoke out against materialism and selfishness during the Mass and called on Australians to "behave like free men and never use your freedom as an excuse for wickedness."

## Tate trial hits snag

**LOS ANGELES (UPI)**—The Tate-LaBlanca murder trial, now in its fifth month, faced a new and unexpected delay today because of the absence of one of the defense attorneys, Ronald Hughes.

Hughes, who represents Leslie Van Houten, 20, failed to show up in court Monday and sent word that he was stranded at a mountain resort in the Los Padres National Forest where roads were blocked because of mudslides following a weekend rain storm.

This was the fourth time for the 35-year-old Hughes was late for a trial session. On one occasion he was located in jail. He had been arrested for nonpayment of several traffic fines.

In Hughes' absence, the other defense attorneys and prosecutors conferred informally with Superior Court Judge Charles H. Older in his chambers.

Subject of their discussions was the instructions the judge will give the jury.

# Panel kills shoe import restrictions

**WASHINGTON (UPI)**—The Senate Finance Committee has voted tentatively to kill restrictions on shoe imports as part of a controversial House-passed trade bill which also would limit textile imports.

Three committee members who missed Monday's vote were to cast their ballots today and their decision will either nullify or reverse the committee's action, which came on an 8 to 6 vote.

The absentees were Democrats Albert Gore, Tennessee, generally a free trader; and Harry Byrd Jr., Virginia and Vance Hartke, Indiana, who have supported restrictive trade legislation in the past.

Even though the committee also softened the bill's potential restrictions on other imports, the Senate free trade bloc was expected to oppose the rest of the House bill when the measure reaches the floor in about 10 days.

The decision to drop the shoe quotas came as a bitter disappointment to most New Englanders in Congress. The shoe industry, heavily hurt by cheap imports from Japan and Mexico and stylish imports from Italy, had lobbied for the

The tentative action, however, was a victory for the Nixon administration, which opposed shoe import quotas but favored textile limitations in fulfillment of a firm pledge by President Nixon when he was a candidate in 1968.

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# Ada board buys structure twice

BOISE (UPI) — Ada County Commissioners have sold and then repurchased a controversial building across the street from the courthouse for \$600,000 after getting no appraisal.

Commissioner Jack M. Barney confirmed reports that the county had decided the property back to Arts and Commerce Building Inc. last Friday after considerable public discussion about the initial purchase of the building.

At the time the sale and appraisals were made public, Chairman Milton Swensen said

to consider the value of the property because of its proximity to the courthouse.

"There was so much furor about the first appraisals, coupled with the fact the attorney for the corporation made out the papers and the attorney asked his secretary to file them and she filed them in Boise County, which is illegal. We sold the first contract and drew up another for the same amount on the same terms," Barney said.

He said the county employed three "independent" appraisers — Francis Boyd, Joe Adape and Russell Schultz — to come up with a new appraisal of the property. He said they put the work at \$600,000.

"We asked if it was worth that and they said 'yes' and put that amount on it," he said.

He said the appraisal was accomplished within the past few days and was ordered because "this thing seemed to cause such a furor."

While the county decided the property back to Arts and Commerce Building Inc., and then wrote a new contract, Barney said it was not necessary to advertise for bids on the property.

# Tax plan proposed

BOISE (UPI) — Dale Rockwood, Iowa, president of the Idaho Farm Bureau Association, outlined a plan Monday which would allow counties to tax an individual's income or property, whichever is the greatest.

Rock, speaking at the 90th convention of the Idaho Association of Commissioners and clerks, said under the plan backed by the Idaho Farm Bureau, incomes would be taxed by the county where the individual lives.

Presently counties are allowed to tax property only.

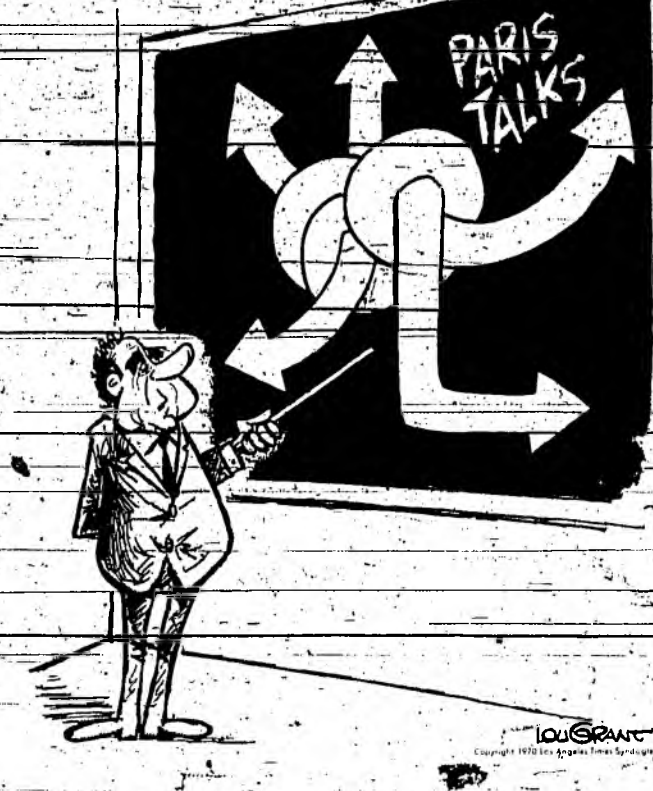

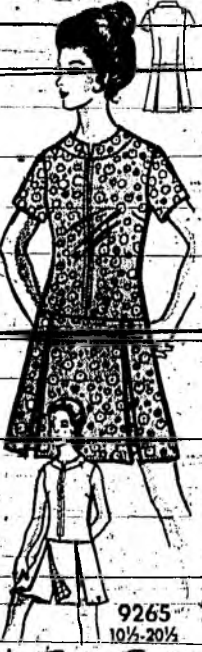

## Pending measure could cut some food supplies

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A pending bill designed to protect consumers against pesticides residues in imported foods already are actually could result in slashing supplies of such staples as coffee, sugar cane, bananas and citrus crops for sale to the United States use a "whole host" of chemicals including chlordane, aldrin, potassium cyanide, parathion, malathion and others.

"We would paralyze their exports to us if we insisted that they adopt restrictions at least equal to our own with respect to each such chemical," Lyng's letter said.

At present, Dutch authorities permit imports of American crops raised with the "banned" chemicals or grounds that residues actually found in the crops are higher than the Netherlands standards.

Present regulations, in other words, ignore the use of nonapproved pesticides in growing an imported food. But once the food itself reaches the United States, it must conform to American standards of freedom from harmful residues.

Lyng's letter warned that U.S. Agriculture Secretary Richard E. Lyng, circulated privately to a number of House members, said the administration "strongly opposes" the bill by Chairman Walter Poage, of the house Agriculture Committee.

The bill would ban imports of any foods produced with pesticides which were not approved for use by American farmers. Lyng said such action runs directly contrary to current government policy which holds that the need for using specific pesticides varies from country to country depending on climate, local insect pests and other conditions.

### Successful Investing

Q. Many years ago, I invested quite heavily in the Investors Diversified Services Mutual Funds to apply my money in a comfortable retirement income. Now, after I have retired, the funds are depressed and produce less income than I had anticipated. Should I hold the six funds or sell now and retrieve what is left? I am too old to lose my life savings. — A.M.

A. Your situation is not nearly as dismal as you seem to think. Although you have violated one of the most important rules of investing by not diversifying—all six funds are under one management—your funds have, in general, produced better than average results.

Five turned in above average records for all of 1969; one fell below—Investors Variable Payment. For the first nine months of 1970, three of the funds, Investors Stock, Investors Mutual and Investors Selective, outperformed the average. IDS Progressive and IDS New Dimensions, the newer, performance funds in the group, rank among the top 25 in percentage gains made since the market bottomed out in May.

Despite the funds' good performance records, it is true that some losses have been incurred. However, with patience you should see gradual recovery as general market conditions improve.

Q. I am 60, single and working. I have no pension so it is important that I have a secure investment for the purpose. I have a modest savings account and \$1000 in stock. Now I am putting \$50 monthly into an annuity. What

do you think of my planing? — S.W.

A. You have handled your finances admirably. An annuity is an ideal choice for a person in your situation, offering guaranteed income for life at retirement. Although you did not disclose what stock you hold, if it is a company with a good outlook, it will provide capital growth to help balance your other fixed capital investments. Periodic additions to your still limited savings account would be desirable for your future security. (Mr. Spear cannot answer all



BOISE (UPI) — Gov. Don Samuelson asked the Spanish chief of state, Francisco Franco, to guarantee that 16 Basque prisoners in Spain be tried in open court by civil authorities. Samuelson referred to 10 Basques accused of murder and conspiracy charges in the death of a Spanish police chief. They face a possible six death sentences and 760 years in prison and are to be tried by a military court. In a cablegram to Franco, Samuelson said he was not asking clemency for the prisoners but only that they have the right to due process of law in a free and open court that their guilt can be removed or established. "Reports of alleged conduct have produced strong reaction in our state among those citizens are relatives of some of the prisoners and therefore I associate myself with the plea addressed to you from many quarters," Samuelson said. Samuelson sent a copy of his cablegram to G. S. Secretary of State William P. Rogers and asked that a representative of the U. S. embassy at Madrid be present at the trial when it takes place and report to Rogers the circumstances and disposal of the case. "I would appreciate being informed of steps taken to implement my request," Samuelson said.

## Project financing eyed by water aide

BOISE (UPI) — The director of the Idaho Water Resource Board said Monday two alternative financial arrangements are open to the board for implementation of the Southwest Idaho Joint Venture Project. Dr. Robert Lee explained the alternatives on the project for developing the Grandview

Guffey Reach of the Snake River to a meeting of the Southwestern Idaho Development Association. Alternatives, according to Lee, are: — A joint venture between the Idaho Water Resource Board and Idaho Power Company with the Idaho board owning the power facilities. — Or complete project ownership by the Idaho Water Resource Board. Lee said either arrangement would require the sale of revenue bonds for total or partial financing of the project. Lee also told the group there are three feasible alternatives for the project, designed to enhance irrigation — exchange pumping for the Mountain Home Irrigation Project. One proposal, he said, was a two-dam scheme with a high dam at Swan Falls and a low dam at Guffey with power facilities at both dams. Pumping for the irrigation exchange water for development of the Mountain Home Irrigation Project would be from the Low Guffey Reservoir. A second plan outlined by Lee would be for a one-dam scheme with a high dam at the Guffey site and a low dam for regulation at Bernard Ferry. Pumping for the irrigation exchange water would be from the High Guffey Reservoir. The third alternative, Lee said, is for a two-dam scheme with a high dam at the Guffey site and a low dam for regulation at Bernard Ferry. 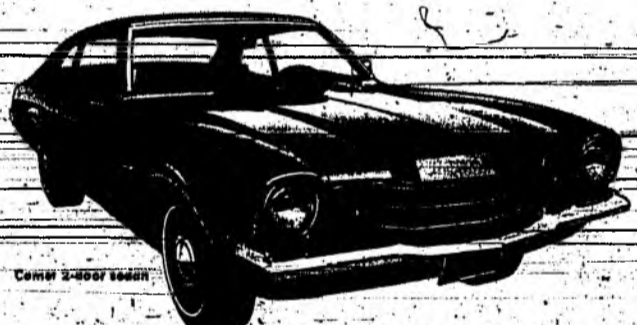
## Mexican chief assumes reins

MEXICO CITY (UPI) — Luis Echeverria officially took over today as Mexico's 21st president since the 1910 revolution with a pledge to waste no time tackling the nation's economic realities of the moment. Although the former interior secretary legally assumed office at midnight Monday night, inaugural ceremonies were scheduled to get under way at 3 p.m. EST. Echeverria, 45, succeeds Gustavo Diaz Ordaz for a six-year term won by a 12-1 margin in July's presidential election. He was the candidate of the Party of Revolutionary Institutions (PRI) which has ruled Mexico for 41 years. "I'm going to skip the usual romanticism and the usual allusions to history and talk about the economic problems we face," Echeverria told foreign newsmen. He said his inaugural speech dealt mostly with Mexico's economic problems and said it was an indication of the course he wanted to follow in his administration. "We must attract foreign capital to Mexico by providing adequate guarantees and sufficient return on capital," he said. "But at the same time, we must protect Mexico's interests against excessive foreign domination." Echeverria is the second president to have been born in Mexico's federal district.

Mexico City. The only other native of the capital district was Pedro Lascurain, who had the shortest term in office. He served two days, Feb. 18-19, 1913, and was ousted by feuding revolutionary factions. Inauguration day was also moving day for the nation's two first families. Echeverria, his wife, Martha and their eight children took possession of "Los Pinos," the cream-colored official residence of Mexico's presidents near Chapultepec Park. They moved from their rambling, colonial style house in the upper middle class San Jeronimo section of the capital. Outgoing President Diaz Ordaz and his wife, Guadalupe, returned to the brick-walled mansion in the exclusive San Angel section they left in 1964. They have two married children. He was prohibited by the constitution from seeking a second term. Diaz Ordaz called in group after group of his associates to his office in the presidential palace Monday to thank them and said farewell with the traditional "abrazo" (embrace).

## Monthly billing sought

**NEW YORK (UPI)**—An eye-opening lesson in how recession can hit business collections turned up recently in petition by Consolidated Edison Co. of New York to the State Public Service Commission.

Con Ed asked permission to change its billing system for residential and business electricity and gas customers to monthly from bi-monthly.

Since the company had converted from monthly to bi-monthly some years back to save money on billing costs, the announcement raised some eyebrows. Indeed, Con Ed's petition shows the company estimates the annual cost of going back to monthly billing at \$3.467 million.

So why does it want to do it? Because the 1969-70 recession has slowed down collections so badly that Con Ed feels "it no longer maintains the exposure of two full months of credit to the average customer. The company told the commission it had experienced losses from "deteriorating habits of payments by customers and alarming increases in losses from uncollectible accounts."

## No change for Idaho

**WASHINGTON (UPI)**—Final census figures showed today there will be no change in congressional representation from Idaho, Montana and Utah.

Each of the three states has two representatives in the U.S. House of Representatives.

The final figures listed a population for Idaho of 719,921, Montana 701,873 and Utah 1,067,017.

## Rail net plan outlined

**WASHINGTON (UPI)**—The Transportation Department unveiled a new nationwide rail network plan Monday that would serve all passenger routes by 1975.

The new system, operated by the National Railroad Passenger Corp., would have 16 different rail passenger routes serving 85 per cent of the areas served by the present system.

Transportation Secretary James Stewart said the primary objective of the plan was to establish a viable rail passenger system which can be modernized and expanded in accordance with the need.

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## Studies set for basins

**WASHINGTON (UPI)**—Studies of five western water basins, including Utah's Wasatch Mountain-Bear River area, will be completed in May by the Interior Department.

The studies are designed to estimate the potential yield from cloud-seeding and to determine what other specific data on the basins may be needed.

A \$40,000 contract has been signed with North American Weather Consultants, Inc., Golden, Calif., to study the Utah area and parts of Wyoming, Colorado, New Mexico, Montana and Idaho.

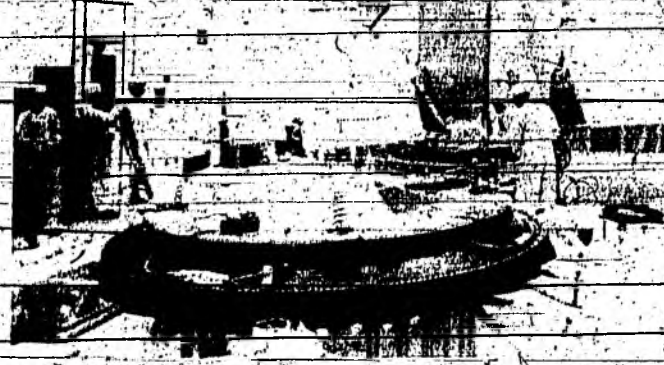

## Aid boost looming

**JAKARTA (UPI)**—President Nixon's request for \$13 million in military aid to Indonesia comes in direct response to a "shopping list" presented to him by President Suharto during his visit to Washington last spring.

Informed sources said the request, which would bring American military aid to Indonesia to \$18 million during fiscal 1970, includes funds for naval patrol boats, a squadron of obsolete T28 aircraft and some small arms and ammunition.

The sources told UPI the biggest part of Suharto's shopping list concerned training programs and equipment for Indonesia's civic action program.

Under this program, the United States supplies bulldozers, trucks and trailers and engineering equipment for use by Indonesia's 400,000-man military in building roads, bridges and construction and repairing irrigation projects.

Although the \$13 million will not go far in equipping such a large military force, it does reflect a major increase in American assistance.

During 1967, U.S. military aid totaled \$600,000. In 1968 it reached \$3 million and \$3.8 million in 1969.

The original budget for 1970 was \$5 million which will be raised to \$13 million if Congress approves Nixon's request.

The request and promise of small arms and trainer-fighter aircraft marks a departure by Nixon from his assurances during his August, 1969, visit to Indonesia that the United States would not provide any arms aid in this nation.

## Atom threat spreads

**NEW YORK (UPI)**—The Atomic Energy Commission may continue to deny there is a clear radiation threat to the nation but evidence is irrefutable that fires, explosions, plutonium spills and contamination incidents in atom plants have spread the threat across the country, *Look* magazine said Monday.

In an article by Senior Editor Jack Shepherd, the magazine says there is a high incidence of cancer among atom-plant workers and a radiation threat to communities near atom plants.

The article says that "there have been contaminated by radiation since 1953, of which 56 got cancer and 34 died."

"A 1965 fire exposed 400 Rocky Flat, Colo., workers to high concentration of plutonium in the air; 25 workers got up to 17 times the permissible level (of radiation)," Shepherd wrote. "In one 18-month period, there were 24 ... contamination incidents."

The article said radiation threat to communities near the plant was evident when the fact that half of Colorado's population lives within 25 miles of rocky flats is taken into consideration. It said a search biophysicist found that in a suburban community of Broomfield Heights, the highest concentrations of plutonium " fallout " were found.
