Italy OK's divorce

ROME (UPI) — Parliament swept aside appeals by Pope Paul VI and a down-to-the-wire battle by Roman Catholic politicians to pass a bill early today making divorce legal in Italy for the first time in modern history.

The decisive vote in the chamber of deputies, which climaxed an eight-day marathon debate and 18 hours of balloting on 12 separate articles in the measure, was 310 to 280 for passage of divorce bill. Since the senate already has given its approval, all that remains is for President Giuseppe Saragat to sign the measure — a foregone conclusion.

As soon as the bill is published in the official gazette — probably in 10 or 15 days — it becomes law.

Seamless divorce advocates cheered, tossed firecrackers, danced around ancient monuments and raced cars through empty streets when the passage was announced just before dawn. Divorce will be legal for the first time in Italy since Napoleon surrendered rule of the peninsula in 1815. Roman Catholic opposition blocked 12 other divorce bills in the past 5 years.

Passage also inflicted the most stinging defeat by the Italian government on the Vatican since the fall of papal

rule of Rome one century ago. of thousands of Italians living together out of wedlock because for rejection of divorce, most recently in a farewell speech a spouse.

It was estimated one million men and women will seek divorces as soon as possible. The procedure is simple — they must buy an official form of long imprisonment, set costing about 80 cents and list crimes against spouses of such "pertinent" facts as the children, separations for periods of seven years or more, and in cases where an Italian marries a foreigner who obtains a divorce or annulment abroad or remarries.

Sociologists say one of every 10 Italians are the wives, husbands or children of failed marriages. There are hundreds.

GOODING — Taxes in Gooding County rose more than in any other Magic Valley county — 22.4 per cent over last year.

Treasurer Dolis O. Robertson said today that taxes for \$10,000 house in Gooding would total \$176.41 this year, compared to \$144.09 last year.

The total increase from all taxing units in the county passed out Cassia County's increase of 21.5 per cent as the highest percentage increase in the eight Magic Valley counties.

The Gooding increase had been reported erroneously as 35 per cent above last year. The Times-News regrets the error.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Federal Reserve Board has cut its key discount rate for the second time in three weeks in another attempt to revive the sagging economy.

The independent board announced the latest cut late Monday, lowering its discount rate from 8 and 1/4 to 8 and 1/2 per cent. The discount rate is the interest the regional Federal Reserve banks charge on loans they make to commercial banks.

The discount rate traditionally has been regarded as the gauge of overall government money policy, and Monday's cut was expected to stimulate business activity by reducing the cost of credit. The reduction followed by the announcement of a new tax cut and the recent

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Pope blasts

Australian race policy

SYDNEY, Australia (UPI) — Pope Paul VI, standing frail but resolute against 40 miles an hour, which bluffed his outdoor altar, tonight condemned the "white Australia" policy which excludes all but handful of non-white people from this vast and scarcely tapped land.

He did so in appealing to Australians "do not close your limited circle for the sake of a selfish satisfaction." And he called on all who bear responsibility in Australia "to take advantage of this occasion for an examination of conscience."

The pontiff spoke after attending a morning meeting of bishops of Oceania, who gave him specific condemnations of Australia's race exclusion policy. One, Bishop John H. M. Rodgers of Tonga, said that because of land and work shortages many Pacific islands were facing a grim future.

"The only permanent solution would seek to lie in mass migration to other countries well able to receive new citizens," Rodgers said. It is suggested that the hierarchs of Australia, New Zealand and Canada, and other affluent countries protest with a united voice against the racial discrimination now being practiced.

Tate trial

hits snag

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — The Tate-LaBianca murder trial, now in its fifth month, faced a new and unexpected delay today because of the absence of one of the defense attorneys, Ronald Hughes.

Hughes, who represents Leslie Van-Houten, 20, failed to show up in court Monday and sent word that he was stranded at a mountain resort in the Los Padres-National Forest where roads were blocked because of mudslides following a weekend rain storm.

This was the fourth time the 35-year-old Hughes was late for a trial session. On one occasion he was located in jail. He had been arrested for nonpayment of several traffic fines.

In Hughes' absence, the other defense attorneys and prosecutors conferred informally with Superior Court Judge Charles H. Older in his chambers. Subject of their discussions was the instructions the judge will give the jury.

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



Although the former interior secretary legally assumed office at midnight Monday night, inaugural ceremonies were scheduled to get underway at 3 p.m. EST.






Computer contract questioned

BOISE (UPI) — Idaho's Board of Examiners referred to the attorney general Monday the question of whether a lease-purchase agreement with Uniqa Corp. for computers is legal.

Attorney General William R. Williams held up payments to Uniqa Corp. for computers in Boundary County for \$40,000. The amount involved includes a 20-acre lake.

This acreage is to be used for a public fishery and winter range for whitetail deer, the Fish and Game department said.

Taking cognizance of inflation, the board authorized an increase in the Highway Department's rotary fund to \$15,000 from \$10,000.

Deputy State Highway Engineer E. Dean Tiddale wrote the board that for the past year expenditures from this fund have averaged \$16,711 per month.

"The increased use of the fund is occurring due to the added costs of lodging, meals and postage used by this department," Tiddale wrote the board.

"The fund is not used for any other purpose."

Board members also:

— Authorized the Highway Department to sell 57.17 shares of capital stock acquired in the North Side Canal Company, Ltd., along with land for right of way. The stock is valued at \$100 per share, the department said.

— Approved a request by Aeronautics Director Chet Moulton to spend \$6,400 in matching funds to help the city of McCall upgrade its airport.

Okayed a contract between the military department and Bonded Police of Boise for security services at Gowen Field for fiscal 1971 at a rate of \$2.65 per man-hour, plus nine cents per mile.

Authorized payment to Eugene A. Hagler for 15 days leave time accrued while he was in an exempt position with the state insurance fund. Hagler since has transferred back to a classified position in the Department of Law Enforcement, his exempt job having been abolished. Samuelson would not sign the order but the other two board members did.



BOISE (UPI) — The U. S. director of Selective Service told newsmen today the nation cannot turn to an all-volunteer Army as long as it is in a combat situation in Southeast Asia.

Dr. Curtis W. Tarr, who visited Idaho Selective Service headquarters as part of a nationwide tour, said draftees at present fill most ground combat jobs.

He said that once the United States has withdrawn the bulk of its forces from Vietnam he believes it may be easier to attract young men to volunteer their services.

A number of reforms may be necessary, he indicated, before the nation can attempt to recruit an all-volunteer Army. Among these, he said, certainly would be higher pay.

Tarr said that since the first lottery a year ago he believes young people are coming to accept random selection as a fair means of being called up for military service.

Hagler the President later this year is going to use Congress again for authority to control student deferments.

He said it is impossible at this time to predict what the draft cut-off number will be next year because the Selective Service system has no control over the calls. These, he said, are dependent on the needs of the service, which in turn are dependent on appropriations.

Tarr said an average of 10,000 men per month have been drafted the past four months but that the nation can expect Selective Service quotas to be higher during the six months beginning in January. He explained the Army wants higher calls at that time so it may utilize better weather for training purposes.

He said a number of minor changes will be suggested in the Selective Service system, most of them relating to deferments relating to education.

Among the changes also to be sought will be a national rather than state-by-state draft quota.

Aid boost looming

JAKARTA (UPI) — President Nixon's request for \$13 million in military aid to Indonesia comes in direct response to a "shopping list" presented to him by President Suharto during his visit to Washington last spring.

Informed sources said the request, which would bring American military aid to Indonesia to \$18 million during fiscal 1970, includes funds for

naval patrol boats, a squadron of obsolete T-28 aircraft and some small arms and ammunition.

The sources told UPI the biggest part of Suharto's shopping list concerned training programs and equipment for Indonesia's civic action program.

Under this program, the United States supplies bulldozers, trucks and trailers and

engineering equipment for use

by Indonesia's 400,000-man military in building roads, bridges and construction and repairing irrigation projects.

Although the \$13 million will not go far in equipping such a large military force, it does reflect a major increase in American assistance.

During 1967, U.S.-military aid totalled \$600,000. In 1968, it reached \$3 million and \$3.8 million in 1969.


The original budget for 1970 was \$5 million which will be raised to \$13 million if Congress approves Nixon's request.

The request and promise of small arms and trainer-fighter aircraft marks a departure by Nixon from his assurances during his August, 1969, visit to Indonesia that the United States would not provide any arms bid this fall.

Rail net plan outlined**Monthly billing sought for Idaho**

WASHINGTON (UPI) — An early opening lesson in how recession can hit business collections turned up recently in legislation by Consolidated Edison Co. of New York to the State Public Service Commission.

Con Ed asked permission to change its billing system for household and business electric, city and gas customers to monthly from bi-monthly.

Since the company had converted from monthly to bi-monthly some years back to save money on billing costs, the announcement raised some eyebrows. Indeed, Con Ed's petition shows the company estimates the annual cost of going back to monthly billing at \$3,467 million.

So, why does it want to do it? Because the 1969-70 recession has slowed down collections so badly that Con Ed feels it no longer can sustain the expense of two full months of credit to the average customer. The company told the commission it had experienced losses from "deteriorating habits of payments by customers and alarming increases in losses from uncollectible accounts."

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Transportation Department unveiled a new nationwide rail network plan Monday that would cover all passenger traffic in the country.
