

Cooper calls Shepard pick 'political'

LONDON (UPI)—Former astronaut Gordon Cooper, already outspoken during his space flying days, has questioned the selection of Alan B. Shepard as Apollo 14 skipper—a job some thought Cooper would get. Cooper, in London to assist the British Broadcasting Corp. (BBC) in its moon mission coverage, reacted sharply at a news conference Thursday to a reporter's suggestion that his departure from the space program last July was linked to the naming of Shepard as Apollo 14 commander. He also complained of "politics" in the U.S. space program.

Producer admits offspring

LONDON (UPI)—Film producer Otto Preminger broke a 20-year silence today and said he fathered the late Gypsy Rose Lee's son, Erik Kirkland, during an affair with the striptease queen in California in 1944. Preminger, reached at London's Dorchester Hotel, confirmed a statement released in the United States by the 20-year-old Kirkland that Preminger is his father. "Eric is my natural son," Preminger told newsmen. "I have discussed the legal side of the adoption with him."

Preminger, 64, one of the last great Hollywood film moguls, said "years ago I had an affair with a woman in California. On the 11th of December, 1944, I heard that she was in a hospital in New York. I flew there. She told me that she was having a child."

"Since I was the father I offered to help her," Preminger said. "But she said that the child should ever learn who his true father was. She concealed our relationship so naturally I had to do the same. "But now I can reveal a story I have not been able to tell for 26 years. The woman was Gypsy Rose Lee, and I have adopted her son."

Migrants disdain handouts

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Harvard nutritionist Jean Mayer said today migrant workers are "honorable fools" who choose honest work rather than welfare, but who receive little sympathy or help from their government, their employers or the consumers they subsidize. He called it a "national scandal."

This was one example Mayer gave of the problems to be solved if America is to win the war on hunger. He spoke at a one-day conference called to assess the progress made toward ending hunger in America since the December, 1969, "White House Conference on Food, Nutrition and Health."

Among the specific proposals to come out of the meeting was a suggestion by Mayer that three-tenths of 1 per cent of the nation's food bill be channeled to a nutrition research program, nutrition education, and to the Food and Drug Administration to be used to promote food safety. However, he offered no specifics for such a program. Mayer used migrant workers as an example of "people who somehow fall between the cracks of existing programs."

U.S. to audit states

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Enactment of President Nixon's \$5 billion-a-year revenue sharing bill would subject the entire budget of most states and cities to an audit by the federal government to guard against embezzlement of misuse. The measure also would give the federal government a new weapon to prevent the use of state or local tax money for programs which discriminate on the basis of race, creed or national origin.

Administration officials said the bill, scheduled to be submitted to Congress next week, will require recipient state and local governments to file financial statements showing the money is spent honestly. They also would be required to certify that there was no racial discrimination in programs financed "in whole or in part" by federal money.

Murray L. Weidenbaum, an assistant Treasury secretary who is the administration's chief architect of revenue sharing, told newsmen at the White House Thursday that if a state or city placed federal money into its general treasury—as most are expected to do—all programs would be subject to the audit and civil rights requirements.

Weidenbaum said the restrictions would apply to money raised by state and local taxes as well as the federal money if the funds are mixed together in the state or local treasury. In some areas, the bill would provide the first independent audit of local tax money.

Weidenbaum said states and cities would be required to file financial statements every three months. Detailed audits would be ordered when they appear necessary, he added, in much the same way individual income tax returns are checked. Nixon urged Congress to approve the plan Thursday in a special 10-page report. The message contained no new information although it sharpened some of the administration's arguments for the proposal. The two key lawmakers were not convinced. House Ways and Means Committee Chairman Wilbur D. Mills, D-Ark., and the committee's senior Republican, Rep. John W. Byrnes, Wis., said they still oppose the legislation. The bill must get through the Ways and Means Committee before it can reach the House floor.

Railroad strike threat remains despite pacts

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The threat of strikes by three rail unions by early March appeared undiminished today despite the reaching of a tentative contract agreement between the nation's railroads and two other unions. The tentative agreement on a 42-month contract was reached Thursday with the Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way (MOW), representing about 100,000 track workers, and the Hotel and Restaurant Employees Union, which represents about 3,000 dining car workers. Chief railroad negotiator John P. Hiltz Jr. said negotiations were continuing with the United Transportation Union (UTU) and the Brotherhood of Railway and Airline Clerks (BRAC). Together they represent about 300,000 workers.

Senate to get first Gem kindergarten bill

BOISE (UPI) — The Senate Health, Education and Welfare Committee voted today to introduce the first public school kindergarten legislation, although Chairman John Barker, R-Boise, hinted other proposals would be forthcoming.

But, he said, "I think this is the governor's bill. And I have some question whether we have the option not to introduce this bill."

Barker said once the bill is introduced he will call hearings on the proposal.

The proposal approved by the committee would create a special fund for the pre-school program, which would require a

separate appropriation.

The kindergartens would be on a voluntary basis both for the school districts and for parents. Monies remaining in the fund would revert to the public school income fund and would be distributed by a formula to all school districts.

Barker said the proposal would allow school districts which begin a kindergarten program to also take advantage of any surplus monies remaining in the kindergarten fund.

Barker said Gov. Cecil D. Andrus gave a \$2.8 million figure for the pre-school program, but said the State

Department of Education figured it would cost \$3.15 million if every school district and every child took advantage of the offering.

Sen. Reed Budge, R-Soda Springs, said he questioned whether such a program would be in direct conflict with the constitution which says each child will have an equal opportunity.

But Sen. Lyle Cobbs, R-Boise, said there is already an equality in schools, adding, "certain school districts have things other schools aren't able to offer."

"It's up to trustees to take advantage of this equal opportunity," he said.

Budge, however, said some schools could offer as many as 86 courses in three years, while others had only 40 courses in four years.

"Yet you're taking a broadbased fund which will add to this discrepancy."

As the first regular session of the 41st legislature entered its 25 day, there were signs tempo both on the floor and in committees is increasing.

One of Andrus' budget-balancing proposals — a decrease in the sales tax refund from \$250,000 to \$50,000 — received Senate approval Wednesday. Earlier, the House passed the bill.

Hearing officer backs meat inspector ouster

BOISE (UPI)—The dismissal of Dr. C.H. Kennedy as Idaho's chief of mobile unit inspection was upheld Thursday by the hearing officer for the Idaho Personnel Commission.

Richard E. Weston said in a memorandum decision he found Kennedy's actions constituted "inefficiency, insubordination, conduct detrimental to good order and discipline, absences without leave and conduct unbecoming a state employee."

Kennedy was fired from the job by Stanley I. Trenhalle, then commissioner of agriculture, for absences Aug. 4, Aug. 17 and Aug. 20, 1970, but Kennedy appealed the dismissal to the Personnel Commission.

It was the second time Kennedy had been dismissed by Trenhalle. In April 1967, Trenhalle relieved Kennedy of his duties as chief state meat inspector but Kennedy won reinstatement through the Personnel Commission and the courts.

On April 1, 1970, Kennedy was named chief of mobile unit meat inspection and was told by Trenhalle his work would be coordinated through Dr. W.S. Horn, state director of the Wholesale Meat Act.

But Kennedy also was suspended for seven days in July, 1969, for absence from the office without permission after he attended the state veterinarians convention in Coeur d'Alene and again in July, 1970, was sus-

pending for five days after he was absent from the office.

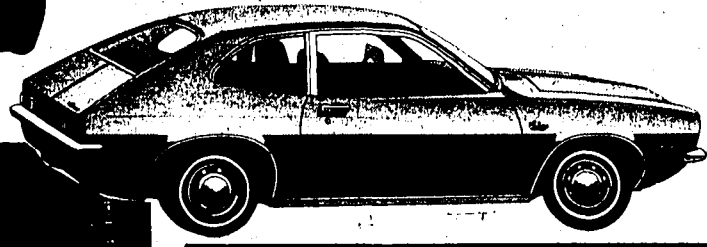
The memorandum decision said Kennedy "openly advised slaughter unit operators that the Department of Agriculture had no authority" to promulgate regulations concerning mobile slaughter units. Weston said the record showed Horn told Kennedy further incidents would lead to dismissal or suspension.

On June 4, 1970, Trenhalle placed Kennedy under the direct supervision of Dr. Horn and the decision said "it would appear that from that period until June 25, 1970, there were several other incidents of unexcused absences" leading to the suspension in July.

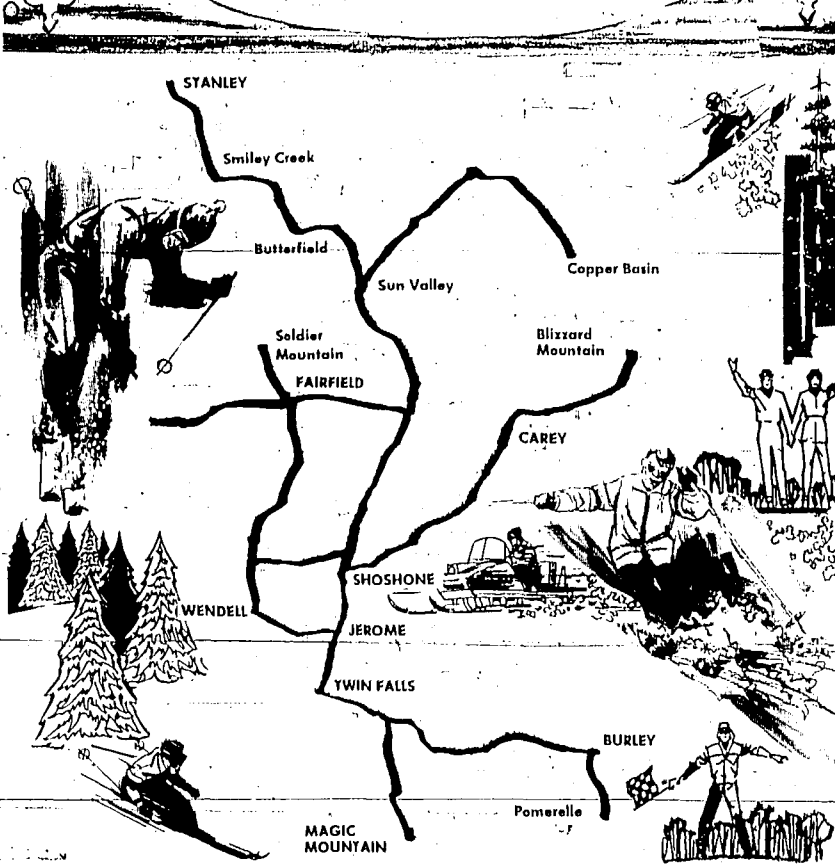

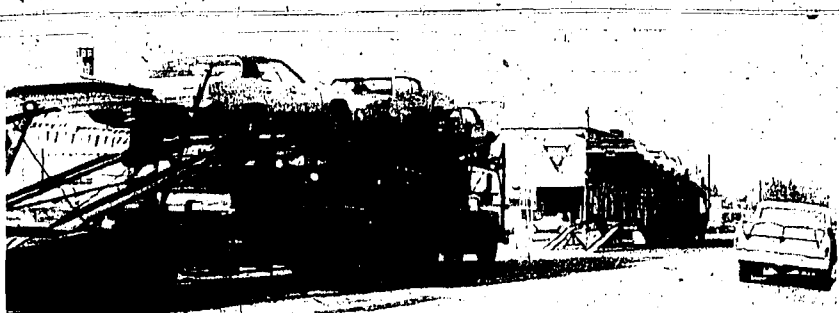

Troubles seen for water bill

BOISE (UPI) — Rep. Vernon Riffe, D-Tuttle, says his bill to appropriate water from several springs in the Hagerman Valley's Thousand Springs area may have a constitutional problem.

Riffe and Rep. Earl Greenaway, R-Jerome, introduced the bill to appropriate water for recreational use under the state parks department.

But Riffe said he told the House Resources and Conservation Committee Wednesday the attorney general's office has questioned the constitutionality of the move.

The problem, according to Director Keith Higginson of the

state Department of Water Administration, is an Idaho supreme court decision that state agencies cannot appropriate water removing it from the public's right to use it.

Higginson said he does not believe the Riffe-Greenaway bill violates the constitution.

However, the attorney general's office has recommended an alternate bill which would not allow diversion of water from the springs that would disrupt the scenic area's value, Riffe said.

A public hearing is planned on the bill at 7:30 p.m. next Tuesday.

Highway threads war ruins

LANG Vei, South Vietnam (UPI) — The drive up what used to be French colonial Highway 9 to this Laotian border outpost is a firestorm 30 miles of smoke and dust and bouncing over the ruins of tank trucks between lush and dead hills.

The ruins of a decade of war, especially the massive sieges at nearby Khe Sanh three years ago, are everywhere, and so are the sounds and smells and sights of the military machine that punched back into this area six days ago.

Blasted buildings and blown ridges, ghostly tree stumps,

huge shell craters, and the rusting remains of abandoned war machines are everywhere.

As the road climbs into the hills from Dong Ha near the coast on Highway 1, the vegetation gets thicker and so does the dust. Gradually a thin ochre veneer covers the tree leaves and the fine red laterite particles tossed into the air by the treads and wheels of vehicles sift into your nostrils and your mouth.

The sound of artillery echoes through the canyon walls, and there is a constant clatter not only of tanks and trucks but of

helicopters and gunships flying cover overhead.

A dirt track cuts off into the wilderness in the wake of an infantry battalion that is logging its way across country to Khe Sanh, building a pioneer road to shorten the trip and get tanks off Highway 9's fragile surface.

At Khe Sanh more clouds of dust are rising from construction abandoned by the Marines

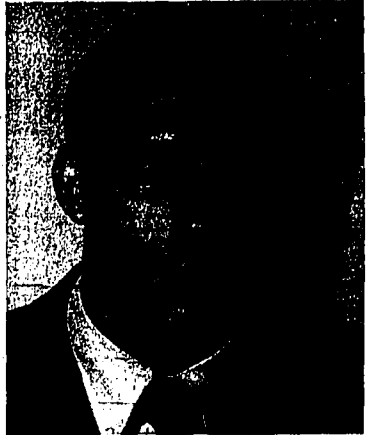

Environmental laws due study

BOISE — Idaho Attorney General W. Anthony Park and Phillip W. Schneider, northwestern field representative for the National Wildlife Federation, Portland, will attend the Pollution Solution Forum on Saturday in Boise.

The day-long public workshop on environmental legislation to be considered by the Idaho Legislature will begin at 9:30 a.m. in the Boise YMCA auditorium, 10th and State Streets.

Billed as a "free day of thinking," the forum is sponsored by the Idaho Wildlife Federation, the Idaho Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association, the Boise League of Women Voters, and the Boise branch of the American Association of University Women.

Four major topics of pollution control will be discussed by their sponsors, including stream-channel protection, flood plain management, state department of ecology, and surface mining regulations. Each topic will be followed by

discussion periods.

Schneider will present the keynote address at 10 a.m., followed by showing of "Vanishing Stream," a wildlife film prepared by the Idaho Fish and Game Department on stream-channel alteration.

Stacy Gobburds, fishery management supervisor for the department, and Keith Higginson, director of the Idaho Department of Water Administration, will outline their bill which is now in a committee of the legislature.

Attorney General Park will speak on his proposal for a separate Department of Ecology at 1:30 p.m. Park has described his proposal as the best long-range approach "to provide unified, economical and efficient administration of pollution-control laws in the state."

Regulation of surface mining will be considered at 3:30 p.m.

Franklin Jones of Boise, president of the wildlife federation, will moderate the program and direct the question-and-answer periods.

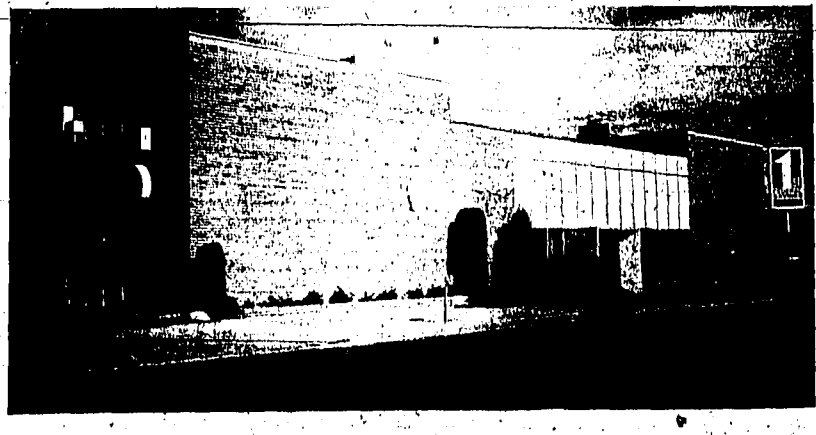
