TWIN FALLS — Business continued on an almost-normal basis at the offices of Mountain Bell today as a nationwide strike of the Communications Workers of America entered its second day.

Ken Mann, manager of the Twin Falls office of the telephone company, said he and other supervisory personnel are still filling operators' positions vacated by striking CWA members.

Telephone installations and repairs are continuing with relative little delay, Mann said.

Perhaps the greatest delay experienced by telephone patrons will be found on the directory-assistance desk, formerly known as "information." Persons asking numbers in outlying communities may have to wait a moment as supervisors manning the desk who may be unfamiliar with the Magic Valley have to locate the community before finding the number, Mann said.

Solon support panel chosen

IDAHO FALLS (UPI) — Two Idaho Falls attorneys, Eugene Bush and Timothy Hopkins, have been named co-chairman of a non-partisan committee formed to support two state legislators involved in a recall election Aug. 1.

Sen. Fisher Ellsworth, R-Idaho Falls, and Rep. Aden Hyde, R-Idaho Falls, are up for the recall because of their affirmative votes on a legislative compensation measure during the 1971 legislature.

Bush, a former legislator himself, said the key question was whether the men should be recalled for a single vote cast in conjunction with the majority of all state legislators.

He said recall elections usually are called only when elected officials have displayed extremely poor personal behavior or have not paid attention to the jobs for which they were elected.

"If a citizen disagrees with an elected official on one single issue the best place to express it is in the next election," he said.

Hopkins said a number of legislative district residents had contacted him to express opposition to the recall and support for Ellsworth and Hyde.

He said the recall movement was not a partisan issue and said the committee supporting the legislators would be made of Democrats, Independents and Republicans.

TWIN FALLS — A "grass roots" meeting to determine the best scheduled airline operations of benefit to all sections of Magic Valley will be conducted in Twin Falls on Aug. 17 by Hughes Air West, Don E. Cooper, Boise, district sales manager for the airline, said today.

Cooper said the session will be at the Rogerson Hotel Roundup room starting at 10 a.m. "The new schedule for Air West will be in operation on Oct. 24," Cooper said. "Before that time we want to ascertain the best schedules into and out of the Twin Falls City-County Airport for benefit of the entire Valley."

"City and county officials, business and professional people, airport officials, travel people and shippers will be invited to attend," Cooper said. "We want to get a real cross section of the thinking of all individuals so when the schedule is finalized it will benefit everyone concerned."

The airline official also said starting about Aug. 1, the DC-9 jets will not land at Twin Falls until sometime between Sept. 15 and Oct. 1, when completion of the new jet runway project is set. Between that date and the new full schedule date of Oct. 24, Cooper said an interim schedule will be maintained.

"The first jets will return to Twin Falls as soon as the runway work is finished," he said. "At the same time Paul E. Shoaff, station manager at Twin Falls, said Boise will be the closest airport for Hughes Air West operations during the shutdown here. He said daily office hours will be continued at the terminal at Twin Falls to assist the general public."

Meanwhile, work on the runway replacement — a project calling for expenditure of more than \$500,000 in federal, state, city and county money — is in progress. The first work is at the west end of the main runway, permitting the big jets to land and take off until about Aug. 1 at which time work is shifted to the balance of the runway. When completed, the full-jet runway will be 7,200 feet long and will be capable of handling four-engine piston planes and also three-engine jets capable of carrying more than 125 passengers.

Trans Magic Airline and other light airplanes will be able to operate all during the construction by using a small crosswind runway, officials said.

Petitions sent off to board

TWIN FALLS — W. L. (Bill) Chaney said today petitions with 1,309 signatures have been certified from Twin Falls County, and sent to the Idaho Aeronautics Board with the recommendation a special election be held Oct. 12 establishing a Regional Airport Authority.

Petitions were presented to the commissioners Monday by Harry LeMoyné, member of the Interim Airport Commission after having been checked against voter registration records and found to be adequate.

The next step, Chaney said, will be for the aeronautics board to approve the petitions and call the election in this county.

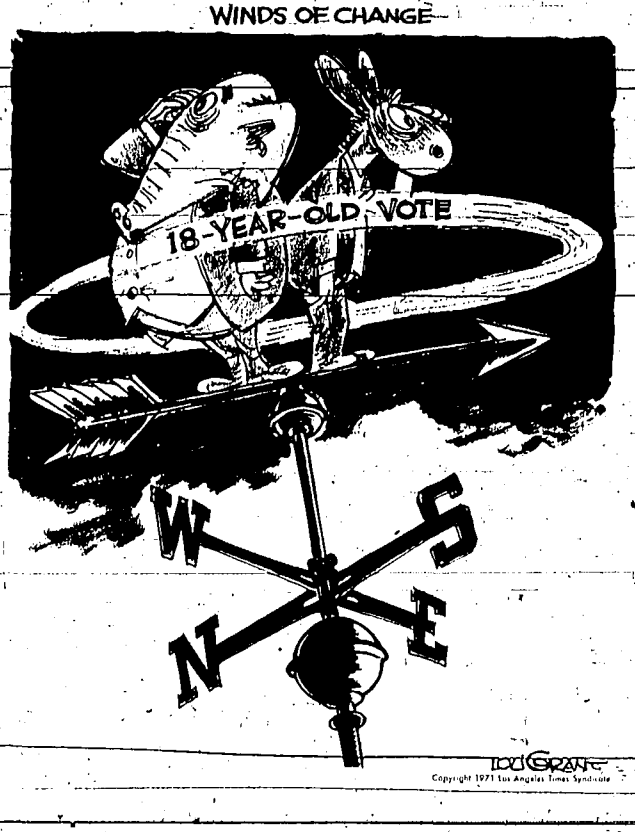
Deception

NASA says no A-15 pollution

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI)—In its first such pre-launch statement, the space agency said Wednesday the launch of Apollo 15 later this month will not significantly pollute earth's environment—no matter what happens.

"Studies of NASA space mission operations have concluded that Apollo does not significantly affect the human environment in the areas of air, water, noise or nuclear radiation," the agency said.

During a normal launch, NASA said the exhaust products from the first stage of the Saturn 5 rocket, which burns kerosene and oxygen, "are two or more orders of magnitude below the recognized

levels for concern." The second and third stages of the Saturn burn hydrogen and oxygen and their products are water and a little hydrogen. NASA said the exhaust of the rocket's solid propellant retrorockets are released and rapidly dispersed in the upper atmosphere. "This material will effectively never reach sea level and, consequently, poses no toxicity hazard."

If the rocket were to fall after launch, the agency said some kerosene fuel could be dumped into the Atlantic Ocean. However, kerosene is only slightly toxic "and impact on marine life and waterfowl are considered negligible due to its dispersive characteristics."

NASA said calculations showed that any kerosene dumped into the sea from an exploding rocket would spread and evaporate in one to four hours.

As far as noise pollution is concerned, the agency said there are only two times when a platonium fuel capsule for a above normal sound pressure nuclear generator on the moon levels are encountered—during launch and the sonic boom hazard. However, NASA said generated by the spacecraft the fuel tank is designed so that when it re-enters earth's atmosphere over the mid Pacific, as a result of the maximum uncontrolled areas around the Kennedy space center "are well below those which cause damage or discomfort."

Apollo 15 astronauts David R. Scott, Alfred M. Worden and James B. Irwin are scheduled for launch to the moon July 25.

They are Chief Petty Officer Harold Smith, 37, who is in charge of the Twin Falls branch station, and Petty Officer 1C Ben Stark, 26, who is assistant. Smith is beginning his second tour of duty here. He was stationed in Twin Falls four years ago, and returns from a tour of duty with the fleet in Puerto Rico. He has served two duty tours in the Far East, three

in the Caribbean, and one in the Mediterranean.

Stark has served in the Navy since he was 17, and considers himself a "Navy brat" since he was reared on stations in Hawaii and California. He has served two duty tours in the Aleutian Islands and one in Guam. He said he asked for duty in Twin Falls after becoming familiar with the intermountain area during high school years in the Salt Lake City area.

McKinney announced the company's plans to open a retail outlet for small gas appliances in Boise. He said plans for future stores in Twin Falls and Pocatello will be carried out if

the Boise venture is a success. He said gas appliances will be available for Magic Valley residents through the Boise store. Appliances may be ordered by all offices of the utility when the new store opens.

Gas appliances that will be available will include lights, ranges, barbecues, air conditioners, fireplaces and fire logs.

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Quake jars Italy

PARMA, Italy (UPI)—An earthquake rolled through much of northern Italy early today, shaking towns and cities for as long as 30 seconds. Thousands of persons fled in panic.

One woman was reported dead in the town of Guastalla, police said. "Many" others were treated for injuries suffered in a wild scramble to escape Parma.

The earthquake, which apparently did not reach the tourist-jammed Adriatic coastal resorts, rolled through Parma, Genova, Milan, Bologna, Ferrara, Modena, Reggio Emilia, Cremona and dozens of smaller towns in the north-central region.

Within minutes after the quake was recorded at 3:40 a.m., authorities said, thousands were fleeing into open country. Many ran to the banks of the River Po, hundreds without closing the doors of their homes.

Several buildings partially collapsed, television antennae fell, furniture rattled inside buildings and electricity failed in some places.

Most of the population of Modena, a noted center for the production and planning of racing cars, including Ferraris, spent the night outside. Authorities said there were signs of panic in Salsomaggiore and other nearby towns.

Police said Mrs. Edmea Mazzali, 47, died of a heart attack in Guastalla while running from her home.

Churches in two other towns were reported cracked and several old buildings were partially collapsed in Parma, Poggio and Reggio Emilia.

It was the most severe earthquake since early February when a series of tremors shattered the ancient Etruscan capital of Tuscania, killing 22 persons.

Blacked out

SAN CLEMENTE, Calif. (UPI)—President Nixon maintained a virtual news blackout on his Vietnam policy reassessment today as American negotiators attempted to smoke out points of flexibility in the Communist peace proposal.

Reagan, McCall end political quarrel

JACKSON HOLE, Wyo. (UPI)—California Gov. Ronald Reagan patched up his quarrel with fellow Republican Gov. Tom McCall of Oregon Wednesday and won McCall's acclaim as "a gung-ho Nixon man."

Reagan also softened his year-long criticism of President Nixon's welfare reform plan and won guarded praise from others at the Western Governors Conference for his own welfare proposal, now stymied in the California legislature.

What had been billed as a heated debate over Nixon's family assistance plan and Reagan's political support of the President turned into a love feast with the California governor turning on the charm.

McCall said Sunday Reagan was endangering Nixon's 1972 re-election chances by offering only "lukewarm" political support and sniping at the President's welfare reform plan.

Reagan flew to the governors conference Tuesday night and McCall engaged him in an uninvited face-to-face confrontation Wednesday morning at the Californian's cabin beneath the Grand Tetons.

"I was mightily reassured," McCall told newsmen later. "He's a gung-ho Nixon man." But McCall also defended his raising of the issue, saying the position of "the most powerful governor in the United States is now assured."

"I think that Reagan is the single most important person in the United States for the President's re-election," he said. "He would have more impact certifying the President to conservatives than any other man."

Landon praised the foreign policy of President Nixon, a fellow Republican, and criticized Democratic Presidents Lyndon B. Johnson and Franklin D. Roosevelt, the man who defeated Landon 35 years ago.

Johnson had us in the Vietnam War before he ever had the Tonkin resolution to stretch into the fantastic interpretation of a declaration of war," Landon said.

He said Roosevelt "had us committing belligerent acts long before asking Congress for a declaration of war."



Eyes assets

CHAIRMAN Wright Patman, D-Tex., of House Banking Committee, said Lockheed Aircraft has \$320 million in unpledged assets which could be used as collateral for private bank loans, although company has claimed it will go broke without government help.

Lockheed officials claim, however, book value of assets has dropped to \$161 million. (UPI)

Morocco roundup complete

RABAT (UPI)—King Hassan II said Wednesday night all the conspirators in Saturday's attempt to overthrow him have been rounded up in a country-wide manhunt by police and soldiers.

Moroccan sources said more than 1,000 civilians have been arrested, besides the mutinous soldiers that tried to assassinate the king and seize control of the government.

They said 260 rebel and loyalist troops and civilians died in the fighting that broke out when rebel soldiers invaded Hassan's summer palace during his 42nd birthday celebration firing machineguns and rockets.

Four high-ranking officers, among them four generals, were executed by firing squad Tuesday, and more executions appeared likely.

The Libyan ambassador, Col. Yousef el-Shibani, was under house arrest because of Libya's declaration of support for the rebels, and severance of relations with Morocco. Diplomatic sources in Rabat said, however, Hassan did not plan to mirror Tripoli's move.

Aid lack charges assailed

JACKSON HOLE, Wyo. (UPI)—The White House reacted sharply today to Republican Gov. Dan Evans' charge that President Nixon has offered only "band-aids" to heal the nation's ailing economy.

"We understand Governor Evans' serious unemployment problem," the White House said in a statement telephoned to newsmen at the Western Governors Conference. "But the President has refused to take the kind of steps which would fuel the fires of inflation."

Evans criticized the Nixon Administration for freezing highway construction funds, including \$150 million for his state of Washington which has been hard hit by aerospace unemployment.

Meanwhile, Gov. Ronald Reagan of California said he still is "very much concerned" about President Nixon's welfare reform plan, which would provide a minimum \$2,400 annually to a welfare family of four.

But Reagan and fellow Republican Gov. Tom McCall of Oregon patched up their quarrel over the Californian's support for Nixon.



Hits lack

NEW YORK Sen. James L. Buckley told National Press Club luncheon Wednesday that Nixon has been on "anti-military barge" which has seriously weakened U.S. defenses. Conservative Republican-said nuclear and conventional forces have deteriorated to point where President's ability to "assure the defense of vital national interests may be in jeopardy." (UPI)

Chemical molecule found in far galaxy

By JOSEPH L. MYLER WASHINGTON (UPI)—The National Science Foundation (NSF) announced Wednesday discovery of the first chemical molecule ever detected in space outside our Milky Way galaxy. The announcement was exciting to scientists because it implies that chemical evolution, a prelude to the evolution of living creatures, is going on throughout the great universe.

The molecule is OH, or hydroxyl, which is a component of many chemicals on earth which in turn are linked together in living organisms. Interstellar hydroxyl was first discovered eight years ago in the extremely rarefied dust clouds of our own galaxy of 100 billion stars. Since then more than a dozen complex pre-life chemicals have been detected in the Milky Way.

The first evidence that chemical evolution may also be going on elsewhere in the universe was discovered by a 34-year-old radioastronomer, Dr. Louis N. Wellachew from the Maudslayi Observatory in France who is a visiting research fellow at the California Institute of Technology.

He trained Caltech's big dish radiotelescopes on an exploding galaxy, M82, and another star

from earth. Both are powerful radio emitters.
The OH molecule in these "nearby" galaxies gave its presence away to Wellachew because of the tell-tale manner in which it absorbs radio waves.

Last LM arrives at cape

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI)—The last of the 12 moon landing spacecraft built for Project Apollo has been delivered to the launch site for the final Apollo flight to the moon in December, 1972.

"It marks the end of an era," said an official at the Grumman Corp., Bethpage, N.Y., where the four-legged lunar module (LM) was built.

Grumman's Apollo work force has dropped from a peak of 8,000 in 1967 to 2,500 now with nearly half of those workers stationed at the cape and in Houston where engineer-

ing support services will continue through the end of the project.

Seven lunar modules have flown in space and three have landed men on the moon. One orbited earth—one manned and one unmanned. Another saved the lives of the Apollo 13 astronaut last year when an explosion ripped their command ship oxygen system.

Lunar module No. 10 is now mounted on a Saturn 5 rocket being prepared for the launch of Apollo 15 to the moon July 25. Apollo 16's lander is

undergoing checkout for flight next March and the final craft arrived here June 18 for the Apollo 17 final.

Two of the \$40 million landers will never fly because their missions were cancelled to save money.

One of those surplus lunar modules originally was assigned to the Apollo 15 mission. It was replaced by a modified lander with improved capabilities when the space agency eliminated the flight of Apollo 18. The extra LM is now in storage here.

The second idled lander will be on permanent display at the

Smithsonian Institution in Washington. It has been rigged to duplicate the ship that landed the Apollo 11 astronauts on the moon two years ago and will be formally presented to the institution Thursday.

"It is rare that a museum has the opportunity to exhibit historical items such as the lunar module while they are still making history," said Frederick C. Durant III, assistant director of astronautics at the Smithsonian. "The lunar module now takes its place among the other great artefacts of our aerospace heritage."

Panhandle funds OK'd

MCCALL (UPI)—The Idaho Advisory Council for Hospital Construction voted today to award \$120,000 of federal Hill-Burton funds for a proposed \$800,000 Panhandle health center in Coeur d'Alene.

The money will pay for district health offices and for a regional laboratory in the health center, which will also provide mental health and child development facilities.

The complex, which will be built on land east of Kootenai Memorial Hospital, will provide services for the five north Idaho counties.

Athens accents affluence

ATHENS (UPI)—Visitors to Greece often are surprised at the air of affluence in the country. They usually are unprepared for the number of cars in the streets, the well-dressed women, the popular nightclubs and restaurants, and the shops displaying merchandise comparable to any western capital.

In the last two or three years, in fact, a phenomenal number of "chic" shops have opened, offering the latest fashions, furniture, bright household accessories, trinkets and the like.

Adding to the air of affluence is a booming economy in part a vast building program. Apart-

ments office buildings and public works projects are going up everywhere.

Four years ago, when the military-backed government took over, foreign and local prophets predicted the total collapse of the economy within months. What they did not take into account was the firm foundation for economic development laid by preceding administrations. It began to pay off when the colonels came along in 1967.

In trying to score quickly and gain support from consumers, the colonels created a balance of payments deficit. According to Bank of Greece, figures for the first four months of 1971 the

gap was \$208 million, 44 per cent higher than last year. The gap was covered by \$212.7 million worth of capital inflow, most in the form of risky short term credits.

The bank statement also showed that the government today pays \$200 million a year in interest on suppliers' credits and loan repayments, the entire sum it earned from last year's tourists.

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Private optimism lacking

SAN CLEMENTE, Calif. (UPI) — While House officials are optimistic privately that publicly about the recent Vietnam peace proposal. For the record, they have termed as "positive" some elements of the seven-point peace plan put forward in Paris July 1 by Madame Nguyen Thi Binh, chief Viet Cong delegate. But privately they see little difference between it and the plan advanced by Hanoi's delegates last September which the Nixon administration found unacceptable. The thrust of the Communist

proposal and the fact that Hanoi so far has refused to hold private talks on it have fueled suspicion among some officials that it is more of a propaganda ploy aimed at Senate doves and undermining the Saigon government at a very vulnerable time — just before an election — than a move toward meaningful negotiations. The chief change in the Communist proposal is an indication of willingness to exchange the more than 450 U.S. prisoners of war for a total American troop withdrawal this year.

The chief objection is the same insistence that the United States abandon the government of President Nguyen Van Thieu. And the chief hope is a general feeling that if Hanoi and the Viet Cong Liberation Front ever want to engage in serious negotiations they must do it soon. American troops are coming home at a rate of about one division per month and by Dec. 1 the U.S. troop level will be 184,000 men. If this rate continues — and it would be difficult for the President to slow it down — virtually all U.S.

troops will be out of Vietnam in less than a year. So if Hanoi hopes to negotiate a settlement damaging to the Saigon government it must act soon. And the diminishing U.S. presence in Vietnam gives Nixon less leverage in obtaining the release of the POWs, adding to his incentive to negotiate. Nixon began detailed analysis with the arrival here this week of Dr. Henry A. Kissinger, his chief national security adviser, just back from talks both in Saigon and Paris. The administration view of

the latest proposal can best be described as one of cautious interest. But the overriding reality is that neither side has changed its basic position. Hanoi wants a Communist take-over in the South and the United States wants to prevent it. Although no automobiles are manufactured in Hungary, private ownership of cars there has jumped from 20,000 to 230,000 in the past five years. The nation plans another 350,000 imports by 1975.

Thermal energy booming

WASHINGTON (UPI) — For centuries man has been using water warmed by mother earth to ease his aches and relax his tensions. Only in this century has it occurred to him to do much more with this natural resource than build Roman baths and health spas. Now there promises to be a boom in "geothermal energy" development thanks to abruptly rising demand not merely for more and more electric power but for power that does as little as possible to pollute our already deteriorating environment.

Since demand for electricity has been more than doubling in this country every 10 years, it will be necessary to exploit all reasonably handy power sources for decades until the promise of nuclear energy is fulfilled. In many places around the world water trickling from above on to molten subter-

anean rock has generated great pools of hot water or steam.

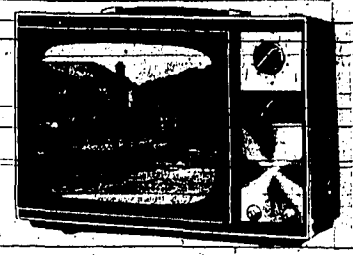

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Defensive tackle Phil Olsen, who signed a three-year contract Wednesday with the Los Angeles Rams, said he had been contacted by 20 teams but decided to go along with the Southern California football team.

Olsen's previous contract with the New England Patriots was held recently by National Football League Commissioner Pete Rozelle because of a law and he was made a free agent.

Olsen, an All-American from Utah State, injured his right knee before the College All-Star game in 1970 and never played for the Patriots.

Four strong front-runners—the Baltimore Orioles, Oakland Athletics, Pittsburgh Pirates and San Francisco Giants—lead the respective divisions by 1-2 games or more and seem to be in stronger positions for the second half of the season than they were for the first half.

At the All-Star break, the Orioles led the Boston Red Sox by 5 1-2 games in the American League East, the Athletics had an 11 1-2-game lead over the Kansas City Royals in the AL West, the Pirates had opened up a 10-game margin over both the New York Mets and Chicago Cubs in the National League East and the Giants had a six-game advantage over the Los Angeles Dodgers in the NL West.

Divisional play was instituted in both leagues in 1969 with the hope that it would prevent runaway races in expanded 12-team leagues. The arrangement worked out pretty well in both 1969 and 1970 but 1971 seems to be an exception.

Most baseball men at the All-Star game thought that only the Red Sox and Dodgers had chances to create serious pennant races.

The Orioles were expected to have the AL East race wrapped up by now and their 5 1-2-game lead is not impressive. But Carl Yastrzemski and Billy Conigliaro leading the opposing factions, and do not appear equipped to mount a big challenge.

The Dodgers have cut into early San Francisco leads a half dozen times in the first half of the season but have fallen short in key games. The Giants are always suspect off their history of finishing second so many times in the last decade but their lead is substantial and they have star pitchers like Juan Marichal and Gaylord Perry to help protect it.

The Athletics, with Vida Blue turning the pre-season "dope" inside out, won't worry until the Minnesota Twins move into position for a challenge. That, however, seems unlikely inasmuch as the Twins are 15 games behind the Athletics and are scrambling for pitching on a day-to-day basis.

The rat-tat-tat attack of the Pirates is unlikely to diminish and poses an almost-impossible problem for the Mets and Cubs to overcome. The Mets problem is offensive and the Cubs is pitching. Both the Mets and Cubs also appear to have internal difficulties involving the direction of the teams by Manager Gil Hodges and Leo Durocher, respectively.

The history of expansion baseball warns the fans to expect the unexpected but there is no valid reason, as the teams begin the second half of the season, to feel that the Orioles, Athletics, Pirates and Giants will fall to make it into the playoffs.

Dr. Regan's report, based on examinations of June 5, 1970 and on Tuesday, indicated that Conigliaro's latest loss of vision came after he was traded by the Red Sox to the Angels as part of a six-player deal last October.

Tony, who had repeatedly insisted his sight was failing, said he "didn't know" what bearing the report would have on his status with the Angels and officials of the California ball club were unavailable for comment.

Conigliaro, who averaged 27 home runs a year during his first six seasons in the majors, was nearly killed on Aug. 18, 1967 when hit in the face by a pitch thrown by Jack Hamilton, then of the same California Angels.

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Accord hopes rising

As the United States and the Soviet Union enter the fifth round of the Strategic Arms Limitation Talks (SALT) in Helsinki, hopes for agreement appear to be higher than at any time since their start nearly two years ago.
Both are pledged to work for concrete results, possibly this year.
A top level compromise reached between President Nixon and the Kremlin leadership has set the framework within which the talks are to be conducted.
In coming months emphasis is to be placed on seeking terms for agreement on limitation of anti-missile systems (ABMs) with secondary attention going to curbs on offensive strategic weapons.
Aside from technical aspects which could prevent agreement there is in the talks an especially important missing ingredient.
That is the question of mutual trust.
Nonetheless, there appear between the superpowers first, and their arming all members of the nuclear club, has become increasingly urgent.
Without taking human lives into consideration, obvious reasons are both the cost and the growing size of the opposing arsenals.
In the six years ending in 1970, for example, the world spent more than a trillion dollars on military supplies.
These colossal figures alone are reason enough to call a halt or to reverse the arms race.
For agreement on some of these mutual trust is not subject to check and even armies and navies and huge silos which house the big missiles.

Chinese 'willing' to meet

HONG-KONG (UPI)—Premier Chou En-lai said Communist China is willing to participate in a new Geneva conference on Indochina, an Australian political leader just back from Peking said today.
Gough Whitlam, leader of Australia's opposition Labor party, told a press conference held shortly after his return from a 13-day visit to China that Chou told him he would participate under "a more Asian framework" than the 14-nation 1964 Geneva conference, which included the Big Four and China.
Whitlam said Chou told him China fully endorsed the latest Communist proposals put forth at the Paris Vietnam talks.
Noting China's endorsement of the Communist proposals in Paris, Whitlam said "this is a real initiative by the other side for American disengagement. I hope there would be a response from the United States."

Gem auto premiums said less

BOISE (UPI)—A study released by the Idaho Insurance Department Tuesday indicates automobile liability insurance rates in Idaho are equal to or somewhat lower than those in neighboring states.
John R. Blaine, insurance commissioner, said a similar study is underway on comprehensive and collision insurance rates, but said preliminary figures indicate rates in Idaho may be somewhat higher than surrounding states.

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


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Charges sparked decision

NEW YORK (UPI)—Daniel Ellsberg, one-time Pentagon hawk turned antiwar activist, decided to release the Defense Department study on the Vietnam War to the press shortly after the Army dropped murder charges against eight Green Berets in 1969.
"I was lying in bed reading the paper when I saw the headline: 'Green Beret Case Charges Dropped,'" Ellsberg said Tuesday. "... And very soon after that I made my decision."
Ellsberg, 40, a former Pentagon and State Department adviser, said "a great deal had contributed" to his decision to make public the 47-volume study commissioned by former Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara. But the final straw was the announcement that then-Secretary of the Army, Stanley Resor, was dropping the charges against the Green Berets allegedly because the trial would reveal too much information concerning the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA).
"I knew this was untrue," Ellsberg said in a television interview. "The White House had made the decision."
Ellsberg made his remarks on the "Dick Cavett Show" (ABC).
He said Resor had dropped the charges on behalf of the Johnson administration, over the protests of the commander of troops in Vietnam, Gen. Creighton Abrams.
The eight Green Berets never were court-martialed for allegedly executing a suspected Vietnamese double agent.
"Then I started thinking," Ellsberg said. "This is the system I spent 15 years serving... one that would conceal murder by lying. I decided I can't be part of that anymore. I was tired of the system when I should lie and how I should lie. And very soon after that I made my decision."
Ellsberg, indicted by a federal grand jury in Los Angeles for illegally releasing the secret documents, said he was not aware of breaking the law.
"If I have broken the law," he said, "I'll go to prison for it. But there's been a lot of law breaking over the past 25 years."

Berrigan bids due

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Rev. Philip Berrigan, central figure in an alleged bomb-kidnap plot involving presidential adviser Henry Kissinger, will be considered for parole July 28 along with his priest-brother Daniel.
Both are serving prison terms for destroying draft records.
U.S. Parole Board Chairman George J. Reed said Tuesday the hearing on the applications of the antiwar priests would be held routinely at the board's bi-monthly meeting because the brothers both become eligible for parole before the next regular meeting in September.
Philip Berrigan, 41, has served the required one-third of a six-year sentence and a three and one-half year concurrent sentence for Selective Service Act violations in Baltimore and Catonsville, Md.
Daniel Berrigan, 40, has served one year of a three-year sentence stemming from the Catonsville incident when he became eligible for parole Aug. 18. His mandatory release date is Nov. 28, 1970.
Reed said the Justice Department and the Federal Bureau of Investigation would be required to appear at a bond hearing before the federal grand jury indicted in the alleged kidnap plot.

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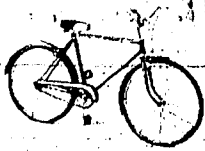
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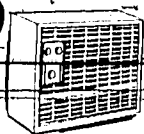


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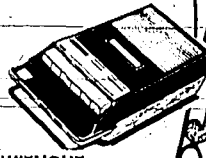
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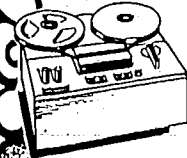
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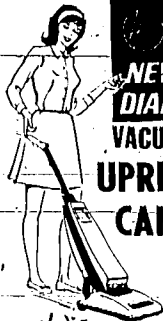
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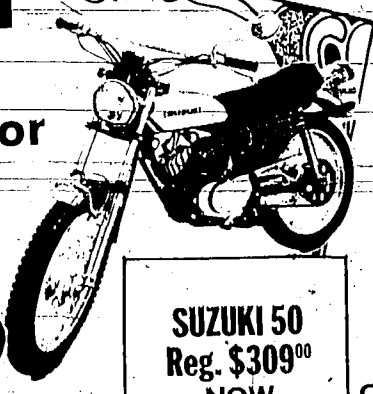
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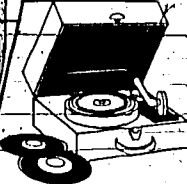
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
