
Pro-Communist öfficers seize Sudan



BEIRUT (UPI) —Pro-Communist army officers who selzed power in the Sudan Monday, in an apparently bloodless coup set up a seven-man ruling council today and banned a number of political parties and most newspapers, Arab radio broadcasts said. Three of the seven had been fired from the provioles milliary government of Maj. Gen. Gaffar al Numeiry nine months ago for their Communist sympathies and two of the others resigned when al Numeiry-opened an anti-Communist drive three months later. Iray's Baghdad radio said Numeiry was under arrest at mintary neadquarters in Knar-

dence.

One of these emissaries was Donald Bergus, the top American representative in Egypt, and Michael Sterner, the State Department's director of the Office of Egyptian Affairs.

Bergus and Sterner reported back to Rogers and Sisco that the statement published in Al Ahram did not represent Sedat's vlows—at—least that was what the Egyptian Pres-ident assured them.

Sadat said he was anxious for the United States to continue to play its role of middleman.

U.S. officials were g. atified by his cordial attitude and expressions of confidence, but they assumed Sadat's principal motive was to keep the United States involved because it had a better chance than any other country to bring pressure on Israel.

Hesitant Viets return to live along highway

HUE, Vietnam (UPI)—Highway 555 loops out of Quang Tril City through the sand hills and coastal flats southward into Thua Thien Province, then turns west and ends at its junction with coastal Highway 1, the main route from Pimom Penh in Cambodia through Salgon to Hanol.

Highway SSS and the area around it became known to the Freneirsoldlers defending France's winting colonial impire as "the street without joy."

The salami-shaped area along the South China seacoast was a battleground throughout the final-foir years of France's fruitless battle with the Viet Midh for Indochina.

For the luckless inhabitants, scraping a subsistence living from the poor farm land or braving the typhoons of the South China Sea in fishing sampans, It was a time of danger and despair.

In 1954, a precarlous peace returned with the Geneva agreement, partitioning Indochina into four countries.

For 10 years, despite the return of warfare, the seonle of

ina into four countries.
For 10 years, despite the return of warfare, the people of the "street" fished and farmed, largely undisturbed.
Titen, in 1964, the Viet Cong. came_to_the_"street," to_be followed a year or so later by the North Vietnamese army.
The "street" was a battle-ground once more.

Some of the people fled. Other's who rofused to flee were forcibly removed. At the time of the Communists' 1968 Tet offensive, the "street" became in norman's land, a sparsely vegetated refuge for the Communists, a free fire zone for rading allied planes and helicopters. Abandoned homes were bombed, shelled or burned into-rubble.

Late in 1960, with the encouragement of the government, the first residents returned to the Huong Dien district, in Thun Thien Province. The Hal Linh district of Quang Tri Province was not procecupied until the spring of 1970.

At first the former residents of the "street" were reductant to return, fearing that their homes would again be battle-grounds.






