Reds laud 'peace' meeting

PARIS (UPI) — Soviet Com-
munist leader Leonid I. Brezhnev sent a message of support to the Communist-sponsored World Peace Congress on peace talks by refusing to torpedo the Paris IndoChina today, pledging all possible help and support to the peoples of IndoChina in their "heroic struggle" against the United States.

At the same time, the official Soviet news agency Tass accused the United States of trying to torpedo the Paris IndoChina peace talks by refusing to attend next Thursday's session in protest against the congress.

Delegates from 75 countries, including actress Jane Fonda and Ronald L. Riddenour, one of

those who disclosed the My Lai massacre, were on hand for the talks on the grounds that congress, along with delegations from the Viet Cong, the held-in-suburban-Versailles Cambodian Khmer Rouge violated the atmosphere of to replace the ways of movement, the Pathet Lao in neutrality needed for the talks.

Tass said the North Vietnamese delegation leader William J. Porter, U.S. ambassador to the Vietnam pointed to the absolutely

"By our action we hope to isolate the Nixon administration and to give the assembly a clear understanding of the new aspects of the air war and the economic implications that emerge from it for the United States," he said.

Nixon vows no surrender

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Nixon "vowed to abandon all support of the Thieu government."

Nixon said he did not question the patriotism of Democrats who have criticized his peace efforts. But he said he believed candidates for president should review their statements in the light that their words might encourage Hanoi (the Vietnamese Communists) to continue the war.

Nixon also said that Democratic candidates who have criticized his peace efforts may encourage Hanoi and the Viet Cong to delay any response until after the November elections.

The President made his remarks at a 45-minute news conference in his Oval Office, the first he has held in three months. He sought to reassure President Nguyen Van Thieu that the administration would make no agreements with the Communists behind the South Vietnamese leader's back. Nixon also announced that he would leave on his trip to China Feb. 17.

Nixon disclosed the details on Jan. 25 of an eight-point peace plan he had put before negotiators in Paris. He has offered to withdraw all American troops from South Vietnam, but has balked at Hanoi's demands that the United States

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Congress that cut taxes by \$22 billion since 1969 is now talking about increasing taxes.

President Nixon said at his news conference Thursday that he would ask for no tax increase this year. His economic advisers, though, when congressmen even discuss the matter,

It pins its hopes for an economic recovery this year on a free-spending public that will create demand for goods and services, cutting into unemployment while wage-price controls curb inflation.

Rep. Martha W. Griffiths, D-Mich., told Treasury Secretary John B. Connally Jr. that no candidate for the presidency can run an honest campaign this fall without telling the American people that they're due for a large increase in taxes.

Utility boosts frozen

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Responding to widespread public complaints, the Price Commission Thursday suspended for 30 days all rate increases by privately owned public utilities.

Chairman C. Jackson Grayson said about 40 per cent of the complaints received by his group concerned utility rate hikes, against .55 per cent charging illegal rent increases, the most frequent cause for complaint.

The ruling affects several hundred communications, electric, gas and pipeline companies which have rate increases pending before the commission. But the suspension does not apply to publicly owned utility companies or rate increases that already were in effect Thursday.

TEHRAN (UPI) — An avalanche buried an Iranian mountain village beneath 24 feet of snow, the government reported Thursday. The communique said as many as 4,000 persons may be missing.

TWIN FALLS — Partial Hughes Airwest jet service will be resumed Feb. 22 in Twin Falls. The announcement was made late Thursday night by Don Cooper, Idaho sales manager.

Cooper said a schedule is being worked out at the present time for the partial service. He said it will be "increased as soon as possible."

Practically all Airwest flights — including all flights to Idaho — have been grounded since mid-December after mechanics went on strike. In connection with resumption of partial service, it is anticipated that local station employees at the Twin Falls City-County Airport will report to work some days prior to Feb. 22.

On Thursday, Lee Pitt, Airwest official at San Francisco, denied a rumor that a "hitch" in union decisions would mean the flights would not resume.

Stimulant quota cut

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Attorney General John N. Mitchell announced Thursday the 1972 production quota for the widely abused stimulant drugs amphetamine and methamphetamine will be cut by about 80 per cent.

Manufacturers of the drugs had produced 9,356 kilograms of amphetamine and 4,928 kilograms of methamphetamine in 1971. Producers wanted 1972 quotas to produce 19,956 kilograms of amphetamine and 8,941 kilograms of methamphetamine.

The U.S. move was also an indirect slap at France whose government authorized the Versailles "Assembly for Independence and Peace of IndoChina," over U.S. and South Vietnamese protests. The French government said its legislation did not allow it to ban an indoor meeting not threatening to disrupt public order.

The allies told the French the assembly was in contradiction with France's role as a host nation to the peace talks.

Ex-Hughes aide sues taped voice

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Robert Maheu, former top Howard Hughes aide now embroiled in a bitter feud with him, sued Hughes' disembodied voice Thursday for \$17.5 million, alleging the voice slandered him during a telephone news conference.

The suit quoted a statement made by the man who, by telephone, identified himself as Howard R. Hughes' as saying Hughes fired Maheu "because he's a good, dishonest son of a bitch and he stole my blind."

The voice made the accusation knowing it was false, or "with reckless disregard of whether it was true or false," the suit maintained.

Lawyers filed suit in federal district court against the voice on the telephone, and Hughes' intermediaries the outside world — the Hughes Tool Co., the public relations agency of Carl Bovis and Associates and one of the agency's executives, Richard Hannan.

Maheu, 54, a former World War II spy and once the best shot in the FBI, was the head of the multi-million-dollar Hughes empire of land, hotels, gambling casinos and other property in Nevada.

IDAHO FALLS (UPI) — A complaint that turned up in the run of court business has led to disclosure of a plot to kidnap Karen Hard, 1971 runnerup in the Miss America pageant.

A suspect has been arrested and sent to a state hospital.

He said he was going to come up on stage with a gun at my head and if you didn't do it, I would have tried anything he'd blow my brains out," Miss Hard told UPI today in a telephone interview from Weber State College at Ogden, Utah, where she was to address a luncheon.

Market talks**wanted**

BRUSSELS (UPI) — The United States and the European Common Market called today for international talks in 1973 aimed at liberalizing world trade and improving trading rules.

Announced simultaneously in Brussels and Washington, it followed closely the joint declaration made Wednesday by the United States and Japan.

Market officials said the declaration called for a new "Kennedy Round" similar to the talks in 1967 that led to 35 per barriers.

The joint U.S.-Common Market declaration was drawn up in talks between William D. Eberle, trade negotiator, and the market's executive committee last week.

"The United States and the community undertake to initiate and actively support multilateral and comprehensive negotiations in the framework of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade" (GATT) beginning in 1973," the announcement said.

It said the aim was "the expansion and ever greater liberalization of world trade and improvement in the standard of living of the people of the world."

The joint declaration was accompanied by a community statement detailing the short-term trade concessions it offers the United States in return for devaluation of the U.S. dollar. The community agreed

To increase its by 1.5 million tons over the 2.4 million tons originally planned for 1972-73.

To consult with the United States on the community's plans for tax harmonization on tobacco.

It is difficult to believe that a \$9-million suit has really been filed against the Cleveland Indians baseball team, alleging, among a whole list of things, that the team's symbol, dubbed "Chief Wahoo," degrades the Indian race.

Incidentally, \$9-million is "umpetty" dollars in anybody's vocabulary, including that of the original Chief Wahoo, the comic strip character who coined the word.

But this suit is real enough, and it reads like something that might have been brought against a defendant at the Nuremberg trials.

"Wahoo" says the plaintiff, the Cleveland American Indian Center, is not an Indian word but "is a slander upon all Indian languages and subjects them (sic) to public ridicule . . .

"No other nationality, group or race would be expected to tolerate such a caricature of themselves. Only the American Indian, whom this country has raped, robbed, ruined and murdered, can be so depicted as a big-toothed, pointed-head, grinning half-wit while we Indians are expected to endure such a racial slur."

Furthermore, the center claims, the symbol ridicules the political

and social system of the Indian nations as well as promoting tribalization and denying the Indians their right to self-determination. It also mocks the heroism, courage, wisdom and statesmanship of many Indians.

Such a heavy burden for such a little guy to carry.

The "racism" behind Chief Wahoo will be news to millions of people who have followed the baseball Indians over the years and who no more associate their symbol with real Indians than they believe that Englishmen are short, pot-bellied, run around in knee breeches and wear a Union Jack for a vest.

It's even possible that just the opposite is true — that Chief Wahoo inspires affection for real Indians.

Nevertheless, the suit is genuine and is part of a national campaign to change the stereotype of the American Indian. Similar actions are said to be under consideration against the Atlanta Braves, Washington Redskins and California Warriors.

It's true that real Indians were not literally redskinned; nor were they "Wahoos." But are their descendants suggesting that they weren't brave warriors?

WASHINGTON (NEA) — If President Nixon gets the U.S. "Vietnam forces down to 50,000 by this July 1, the added defense spending directly attributable to the war will then be running at a pace of around \$3.5 billion a year.

Today it is in the range of \$3.5 billion annually. By May 1, the date by which the President has promised to reduce our Viet Nam troop total to 80,000, the annual cost should be averaging out at roughly \$4 billion.

Mr. Nixon has not, of course, made any specific pullout date beyond May. But he has indicated further withdrawals would follow. The figure of \$50,000 is a reasonable July target, since that level is widely considered the highest at which

a "resident force" might be maintained in Vietnam.

Conceivably the President may decide to shave the total figure of \$50,000 to 40,000 men by late summer "or" fall. That would still leave a force of

40,000, but would cut the yearly cost of strictly Vietnam war tomorrow. In other words, the calculations do not label as "Vietnam war spending" any

basis of the added costs — what pristinely, the present direct basis they call incremental costs — of the cost of the war is a far, far cry from the peak levels of 1968 and 1969. It then ranged from \$21 billion to \$23 billion yearly. To

get the commonly heard top figure of \$3 billion annually, you must add to these totals some "baseline" military expenditures — in instances where they were allocated to Vietnam activities.

What's the point-of-laying-out these war figures right now? Fundamentally, to put our Vietnam endeavors in an up-to-date cost perspective at a time when the intensifying presidential campaign of 1972 will be putting a bright spotlight on the war again.

In 1971, most prominent Democratic presidential prospects were saying reluctantly, that Vietnam had

dropped way off as an issue. Generally, they don't think that it still is a big concern and they're going to talk about it endlessly.

Unhappily, for the quality of the campaign debate, however, some partial argument substantially overstates the present cost of the war (exaggeration has been fairly common at earlier stages, too).

In recent Times I have heard today's annual Vietnam war outlays set at levels from \$12 billion to \$20 billion. With our forces there dropping steadily toward a mere tenth of what it was in mid-1969, such calculations are patently absurd.

Such overstatement is particularly indefensible when it comes, as it sometimes does, from critics who make much of the need for "truth in government."

There are critics, of course, who believe that "if the cause is good, anything goes." Hey, isn't that the way the guys in the administration argue?

Blood Pressure

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Why do slimmer people mostly have low blood pressure? What will bring the pressure up? And what does 144-94 mean? Is this normal? What is normal? — R. I.

I don't think it's true that slimmer people "mostly have low blood pressure." Rather, these people are more likely to have high blood pressure. It takes more pressure to force circulation through their bigger bodies. The overweight can have other effects, too.

If a person keeps high blood pressure in the lower ranges, by glad of it! Seldom is there any point in trying to raise it. These numbers — 144-94 or 144 over 94 — indicate the range of pressure. Your blood pressure isn't constant. It fluctuates between pressure at the moment the heart is pumping and a lower pressure that exists between heart beats.

SEATTLE (UPI) — The Erklen said a program to monitor radio and television advertising in Washington state will be started in the spring, probably in May.

I talked with the police department, and was told you



DACCA (UPI) — Bangladesh authorities seeking to disarm the Bihar enclave in Dacca's suburban Mirpur are trying to force the 200,000 non-Bengali Moslems into submission, reliable sources said Thursday.

The enclave was the scene of heavy fighting about two weeks ago and police and troops have been carrying out searches for weapons and "criminal elements" since.

Thus far, the sources said, the switch in strategy has produced little results. The

enter Mirpur Thursday for the first time since the army cordoned off the area and threw a curfew over it 12 days ago. But the Red Cross brought in only 20 tons of rice and high-protein biscuits, scarcely enough to ease the hunger of the 200,000 Bihar men, women and children.





SAPPORO, Japan (UPI) — Barbara Cochran became the first American woman in 21 years to win a gold medal in Olympic Alpine skiing Friday, when she ousted a trio of French stars to capture first place in the women's special slalom ski race.

The victory by the 21-year-old Richmond, Vt., girl was the third U.S. gold medal of the current Games—and that was the highest U.S. total in 12

years. Not since Andrea Meade won both the special slalom and the giant slalom in 1952 in Oslo, Norway, had an American girl shown the way to Europe's traditionally powerful contingent of girl skiers.

Debernard and Florence Steuer, the U.S. suffered a "sore and aching" Anne Henning was forced to settle for third place in the women's 1,000 meter speed skating won Germany's Monika Pflug in an Olympic record of 1:31.4. However, Miss Henning was the first U.S. entrant to win two medals in the Sapporo games.

Wildlife Review

"Deer Are Still Dying at Dworshak Dam!" This is the title of a recent article I just finished reading and it makes me sad for the big game since I helped with some of the original wildlife studies on this project in 1959-61. The Fish and Game Department and U.S. Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife opposed this project when it was proposed by the U.S. Corps of Engineers to congress in the late 1960's because of the adverse effects on big game, steelhead, and the resident trout. Now the project is built, the reservoir is being flooded, and the problems the Fish and Game Department predicted are coming true. The same problems for big game and resident trout can be expected at the Teton Dam Project, which I also spent two years studying in 1961-62.

I think it might be enlightening to look at a brief history of Dworshak Dam, to show what a government boondoggle this. It was originally proposed in 1953 to protect the city of Portland from flooding. No irrigation was proposed and it involved only a small amount of power production at that time. The Corps of Engineers "Water Resource Development—Columbia River Basin" report of June 1958 shows only 5 percent of the water flowing by Portland came from the North Fork of the Clearwater River, certainly a questionable amount of flood problems to request the proposed \$158 million of the taxpayer's money for construction of the project at that time (Dworshak actually ended up costing the public about \$250 million plus \$4.5 million for Dworshak Steelhead Hatchery).

Joint studies by the Idaho Fish and Game Department and U.S. Bureau of Sport Fisheries showed the people of the U.S. would lose 717,000 square yards of spawning gravel for anadromous and resident fish, completely block the North Fork, hundreds of miles of tributary streams would lose their juvenile steelhead population (the main fish present for summer trout fishermen), 15,000 acres of big game winter range would be inundated, resulting in an anticipated loss of about half an estimated herd of 3,000 whitetail deer, and a sixth of one of the largest elk herds in Idaho. In addition, it would disrupt traditional migration routes of both these big game animals.

What has been done to soften these blows to the wildlife environment? Dworshak steelhead hatchery was built to raise the fish which normally spawned in the North Fork. Since the first release of downstream smolts occurred last spring, it is too early to know whether this has been successful. Certainly, the trout

It may have a brief period of fertility but other reservoirs of this type have shown they rapidly lose this.

The Fish and Game Department asked that 50,000 acres surrounding the upper limits of the reservoir be managed for big game to provide additional food for the displaced deer and elk. This consisted of 38,000 acres of state endowment lands and 12,000 acres of private lands which the Corps of Engineers said they would purchase and turn over to the Department for management. So little has been done for big game management on these areas and the Corps of Engineers has not purchased the agreed upon lands. Now we have hundreds of deer falling through the ice or being attacked by coyotes which have found the deer vulnerable on the ice. Next year it will be the elk's turn, in addition to the deer, when water levels reach the main wintering areas of these animals.

The low elevation lost in the reservoir site is irreplaceable because it had the reduced snow depths which allowed the animals to get around in severe winters. Even if we were able to develop better food supplies in adjacent areas, if there is 4-5 feet of snow on them it will not do the big game any good, particularly deer with their shorter legs than elk.

What can we expect at Teton Dam? Even though the numbers of wildlife are smaller, an actual count showed 1,100 acres in the canyon and there were probably more, the effect on big game will certainly be more drastic.



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

Heavy north Gem runoff seen

SPOKANE (UPI) — The most northern Idaho above the 15-year average appears in prospect, the National Weather Service said Thursday spring runoff for Inland Empire streams in eastern Washington and

Bob Small, Soil Conservation Service snow measurement around the first of this month indicated snow depths of 100-180 per cent of average in the mountain areas of the Inland Empire.

Small said total runoff for the Kootenai, Clark Fork, Flathead, Spokane and Columbia Rivers is estimated at 115-120 per cent of the 15-year average. He said this estimate assumes near normal temperatures and precipitation conditions for the months of February, March, April and May.

Small said although the situation doesn't sound promising,

it doesn't necessarily imply there will be flooding.


He said there is adequate space in the major reservoirs and the major streams can handle the flow if the rate of melt is not erratic.







avert possible death of the bill during the summer while an interim committee studied the bill and came up with recommendations to improve it. The bill at that time was given life for only one year.


The interim committee met but once last May and did not meet again. Its chairman has said he did not call a further meeting because there seemed to be no need to do so.



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Too much vitamin A causes cancer in chickens

NEW YORK (UPI)—A cancer virus of fowls was injected into both wing webs of 20 chickens. Daily, for three weeks thereafter, a 20-per cent solution of vitamin A was applied to the right wing webs.

Their chickens were killed and dissected. Three of the 20 left wing webs, which had received no vitamin A from the outside, contained cancers.

Ten of the 20 right-wing webs, which had been liberally

dosed with the vitamin, contained cancers. Furthermore, the right wing cancers were two to three times larger and heavier and generally more highly developed than the left web cancers.

Drs. A. Pollack and Z. Ben-Sasson who made this experiment at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem, could only conclude that a superabundance of vitamin A had made the cells of chickens more susceptible to

the introduction of a fowl cancer virus.

Their findings bore directly on the common supposition that excessive amounts of vitamin A can be taken in the diet.

In previous experiments Pollack and his colleagues demonstrated that body eliminates any excess of vitamin A daily in the cheek-pouch of the hamster. Vitamin A can act as a "co-carcinogen," that is, it can cause cancers in the pouches in its presence, but don't when it is absent.

Pollack interpreted the accu-

mulating findings as indicating that excessive amounts of vitamin A increase the permeability of cells which would enable any cancer virus or other cancer-causing agent to get into cells more easily.

Like all vitamins, A is essential for health. A deficiency results in cellular atrophy and such symptoms as night blindness. It is adequately supplied in the diet by milk fat and many vegetables. It is abundant in fish livers.



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Beet growers hear top aide

TWIN FALLS — Sugar prices for 1972 seem good, but nothing spectacular can be expected, according to a Sugarbeet Grower Federation official.

Leland K. (Lee) Johnson told the Magic Valley Beet Growers Thursday that for the first time in several years the price of refined sugar is higher on the world market than in local markets. He said this is because of the price fluctuations on the speculative world market, making the market stable in the

United States.

Johnson said the Nixon Phase II program now controls the price of sugar in the U.S. He said the grower federation is working to get sugar prices exempt under Phase II and to be put under the regulation of the Sugar Act passed last year.

Johnson also discussed contracts in different beet growing areas, including various situations growers have been facing with sugar factories throughout the U.S.

Leon Pickett, Magic Valley growers president said many growers seem to be disappointed

with seed available to them in the area and the yields they have been getting.

He said there has been little yield increase in the past 20 years. He said seed improvements failed to help yields as they hoped.

A representative of Betased Co., Minneapolis, Minn., Duane Melling, discussed sugar beet seeds his company will be offering in the Magic Valley area in 1972 in limited supply.

Beet growers have reason to be concerned about sugar variation, according to Steve Lund, Amalgamated Sugar Co.

fieldman. He said last year the sugar in beets in his district had a variation of 12 to 18 per cent sugar. He said on a ton per acres crop, this variance means \$150 per acre to the grower. Lund said no real reasons have been found for the variations. He said, however, those who use a great amount of manure seem to have lower sugars. He said the greater amount of nitrogen left unused in the beet at harvest reduced the sugar's content.

"Climate is the biggest single factor in sugar content," he said. He said if it rains right before harvest the sugars are drastically reduced.

Bob Day, manager, Amalgamated Sugar Co., Twin Falls, discussed the two situations when beets are harvested and piled by the sugar company. Several growers expressed concern that the tote at Curry dump was consistently higher on beets from the same field than at any other dump.

Day said next year at harvest, they will try to remedy the

situation. He said last year the tote average was 6.4 at all stations going to the Twin Falls factory.

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Employees hide when solons gather

BOISE (UPI) — When the Idaho Legislature goes into session, state government goes into hiding.

Many state employees and elected officials keep a low profile during the legislative session that goes something like this: "Keep a low profile and don't rock the boat."

One department official put it this way: "Don't buy anything. Don't do any major projects and keep noise down." We've had another six-page questionnaire explaining our department's function and justify my job. We're given 24 hours to answer a 60-hour

Another department official put it this way: "There is no stronger body in the state of Idaho and when they are in session they are even stronger. They work on budgets, and budgets mean money and the survival of departments and programs."

Another official disagreed with the theory that state government comes to a grinding halt during legislative sessions.

"Maybe more gets done," he said. "One agency has its

employees take coffee breaks at their desks during the session. Instead of the traditional gathering in the coffee room, if a legislator wanders in, employees are instructed to bend over backwards to be helpful and look busy and impressed."

One elected state official summed it up after: "One bad impression could start a chain reaction among the legislature which could lead to unforeseen consequences if they don't give me any money."

"Another state official said the annual sessions were a waste of the taxpayers' money."

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
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
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
