
LOS ANGELES (UPI) - Police held a 51pound watermelon today as evidence in the unusual assault on O. C. Henry



In the first hours after the their truce Sunday night, six civilians died in Belfast, including a 14-year-old girl and a Roman Catholic priest shot as he administered last rites to another victim.

Earlier Sunday, while the cease-fire still was in effect, police found the bodies of four executed. The deaths raised the toll for Northern Ireland's three years of bloodshed to 416.

COMMENT The Stick Approach

Starting this week, parents on welfare across the United States will have to start registering for work or training under a law passed by Congress a year ago.

The new law will no doubt please many citizens who feel that no one should be on welfare who is able to work and for whom a suitable job can be found, and this, no doubt means that in its objective the new work rules should please most -

But the law poses problems

From the point of view of the Nixon administration, which has been carrying the ball on welfare reform, there is a better way to write a work-requirement program. Compared with the provisions of the administration's welfare-reform bill, the new welfare work rules don't assign responsibility clearly enough among those who must run it. And more importantly, the work rules program is only one aspect of comprehensive welfare overhaul. To act on the work requirement without acting on other areas such as equalization of standards among states, putting a floor under poor family earnings - is doing the job piccemeal.

Mr. 'Nixon's own vehicle for welfare reform - his Family Assistance Plan has been passed by the House but is still bottled up in the Senate Finance Committee. Committee chairman Russell Long has been dallying over reporting a bill out of committee. And even when it is reported, it is likely to be far removed from what the administration has proposed. Then will come a floor debate in the Senate. And although hopes are by no means ended that Congress will reach a decision on welfare reform eventually, the November election is evidently one more hurdle it must pass. The new work rules will

not help the prospects for comprehensive reform, especially if the public expects of them more than they can deliver.

The first-year results of the work or training requirement will be modest; an increase of only 30,000 beyond the 130,000 already enrolled under welfare work programs. The administrative job of ruling on the 2.5 million welfare reciplents for employability will take up much of the first year - if it can be done effectively then

Another problem is the shortage of jobs for welfare workers. Most of those eligible would be women, for whom jobs already are in short supply. It would take a broad economic pickup to make the work rules program a success. If too many public service jobs must be created, added to the program's administrative costs, it may cost the public more to wring employability out of its welfare wards than it would be pay them outright. Public service job training runs from \$1,300 to \$5,500 a person.

The welfare work rules are expected to generate 'controversy. One provision requires that pregnant women be put high on the priority list for jobs; the obvious intent is to discourage further pregnancies as an excuse for not working. Another requirement is to give priority to men family heads. Both are kinds of discrimination that will grate sensitivities.

The most constructive way to view the new work rules for welfare parents is as yet another phase of the costly experiment which the welfare era itself presents. It represents the stick approach. Whether it will work remains to be seen. Meanwhile, the larger problems of a barren jobs climate in the cities and outcountry where the poor live, of poor education, remain to be faced.



MINNEAPOLIS (UPI) People hypersensitive to ultra-violet rays may be able to walk

in the sun for the first time in their lives thanks to a team of researchers and a Russian folk Dr. Walter J. Runge, staff

member of the Department of Pathology at the University of Minnesota; suffered a severe sunburn during a trip to the Soviet Union some years ago. An elderly Russian told him to rub freshly ground walnut leaves on his skin to prevent sunburn the next time he went out in the sun.

The remedy worked, and Dr Runge decided to find out which component of the leaves brought about the cure. It turned out to be a substance called juglone.

Now, years later, Runge and two fellow researchers have worked out a two-step method to protect persons suffering from allergic sensitivity to ultraviolet light.

Before going to bed a person applies either a chemical sugar lotion or spray to his skin. Then, 15 minutes later, he loones lawsone, a enanne cousin to juglone, used because. it gives a better skin tone.

How It Works


The first chemical, with the tongue-twisting name of dihydroxyacetone, reacts with the skin and liberates certain chemical groups without detaching them from the skin. The second part of the sunscreen, lawsone, can now combine with these liberated groups and the combination becomes part of the skin. In essence a new top layer of skin is created which can absorb ultraviolet light.

The chemicals are applied nightly. Protection is accomplished after the first treatment and in the majority of cases persons who have had to shun the sun are free to swim, fish, ski. Neither water nor perspiration affect the sunscreen.

Persons may be sensitive either to the short, ultraviolet rays which cause sunburn, or to the long ultraviolet rays, which are given off by both fluorescent lights and sunlight.

Recent tests on 77 patients showed that more than 75 per cent were helped significantly by the application of the two chemicals. They could stay in the sun, or under fluorescent long as before the treatment normal life."
