Wallace won't run this year

BIRMINGHAM, Als. (UPI) - Alabama Gov. George C. Wallace, partially paralized by an assassination attempt in May, announced Saturday he would not run for president on the American party ticket and could not accept a draft

The 52-year-old Wallace ran for president four years ago under the banner of the American Independent party. The party holds its convention in Louisville, Ky. next week.

Although expected, his withdrawal apparently proved a bitter moment of 'truth for Wallace, and he left distribution of his formal statement to an aide, rather than appearing in person at a news conference. "I have conferred with my doctors, and their,

Plagued By Plenty

While Russia has agreed to buy \$750 million dollars worth of feed grains from us over the next three years to take care of her massive needs, we have the greatest wheat surplus since 1964. And the national problem is Idaho's problem.

The suprlus was 900 million bushels on July 1, the Department of Agriculture reported, due to a record 1971 crop and a decline in exports, At the support level of \$1.25 a bushel, this represents \$1.125 billion dollars in what and Russia's scheduled purchases will hardly dent the mountainous surplus.

President Nixon has sent Secretary of Commerce Peter G. Peterson to Moscow as the head of a delegation assigned to negotiate a comprehensive trade agreement with Russia. Nixon and Party Chairman Brezhnev agreed during their summit meeting to establish a bilateral trade commission to meet alternately in Moscow and Washington to work out <u>an</u> agreement for expanded trade, Peterson said he expected tough

bargaining but expressed the hope for an agreement béfore the yearend, covering settlement of Russia's lendlease debt, opening of some ports of each country to ships of the other, credit arrangements for expanded trade and other issues.

We have given first priority to the debt settlement. Russia acknowledges only \$300 million dollars; we claim \$800 million. There are reports that both have agreed to settle for \$500 million and end the long controversy.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Is there any danger in eating "too much" spinach? My parents tell me it may cause kidney stones. Is this true or is it merely a rumor? If it is a fact, I'd be interested in the reason. I vaguely remember reading

that spinach is the best vegetable a person can eat for all-around health. I'm 17 and a senior in high school, + K.R.S. I'm going to take a firm position somewhere in the middle.

Spinach as well as other greens contains oxalic acid. Some kidney stones consist of oxalates (salts of oxalic acid). So if a person happened to be a stone-former of the oxalate type (there are other kinds of kidney stones, too, you see),

are a couple of others.) But if somebody doesn't show any tendency toward forming oxalate stones, why worry about it? Anyway, food isn't the sole factor in kidney stones. Ample fluid intake keeps the urine dilute, inhibiting stones. And healthy kidneys, without infection, are much less likely are other factors, but the

But it doesn't contain any magic properties. I enjoy a mess of spinach now and then, but I can take it or leave it alone. Eat it if you like it, but don't expect it to make you super-healthy. And don't be afraid of it unless you turn out to be an oxalate stone-former.

Which you probably won't.

DR. DAVIS: I believe that Senator McGovern would have preferred to have known these facts and to have taken them into consideration at the time he made his selection. I believe Senator Eagleton should have informed Senator McGovern of his past medical record. -MR: HANSEN: I'm a little

amazed because I would think this sort of thing would have been the subject of confidential conversations prior to the time any decision was made. I would think that Senator Eagleton not disclosing this, knowing that it could become a matter of public concern. certainly was amiss in not telling Senator McGovern the whole story when the selection was being made. QUESTION THREE:

Mayors of various large cities have endorsed revenue sharing. Do you favor this? MR. HANSEN: I'm very

concerned about revenue sharing because I think this is another method of bypassing the city and state governments, and it weakens local government. I really think it would be just as feasible for the federal government to back off from taxing under certain conditions and allow the state and local governments to do this. I think there has to be a new concept

developed where local governments not only handle their own business but raise and handle their own money. DR. DAVIS: I strongly favor the revenue sharing concept. I believe federal funds can be

more efficiently and effectively administered as near as possible to the local level. This holds whether it is the city, county or state

QUESTION FOUR: Do you favor withdrawal from Vietnam before the POW's are actually released?

DR. DAVIS: Any withdrawal from Vietnam must be with the firm understanding that we will have the immediate release of the prisoners of war and an accounting of those missing in action.

MR. HANSEN: The POW circumstance should be tied directly to any end of the war in Vietnam. I do not advocate leaving those men there without any kind of negotiating ability against the North Viets who hold them. QUESTION FIVE:

Are you in sympathy with the House foreign affairs committee in voting for the withdrawal of all forces not later than October 1? MR. HANSEN: This action

ties the President's hands and gives the Communists a decided adwantage....It...is...a...grave disservice to the President. It puts him on the defensive. I believe the course of action in

the Senate and the House as regards this war has been nothing but a tragedy for the United States of America.

DR. DAVIS: Yes, I favor the committee action. I think this is conditioned on a POW release and states negotiable terms. This puts responsibility for the action back in the Congress which has shared so little in the decision making of the conduct of this war over the years.

QUESTION SIX: Should there bey any difference in treatment of a deserter than the treatment given someone who left this country to escape the draft?

DR. DAVIS: Absolutely. I am against granting blanket amnesty and I feel that people who violated the law did so knowing there would be consequences. As long as the present draft law is in effect and there is a shooting war we cannot even legislate in this regard. MR. HANSEN: They are both

evading their responsibility. However, I think there is a special seriousness to a person who deserts the armed forces after joining. In a sense, those who left to evade the draft should not be treated any less seriously because if an act of war had been declared their action would have been treason. Under the circumstances they made their choice of living in another country or accepting

believe we should let them live with that choice. QUESTION SEVEN:

~Do you favor a national park or recreation area in the Sawtooth-White Cloud area of Idaho?

MR. HANSEN: I feel that the recreation area, multiple use concept is by far the best. I do not believe there is any need, any use, or any real desire for a national park in that area, either now or in the foreseeable future

DR. DAVIS: I prefer a national park for legislation which would prohibit mining in the White Clouds. In other areas I favor the multiple use concept so long as recreation is considered in connection with the timber, grazing and other uses. **QUESTION EIGHT:**

Do you favor closing all loopholes which now permit people rich or poor to invest in tax free bonds and securities? DR. DAVIS: 1 favor a thorough study of the existing tax program and favor starting from scratch to give consideration to each of the loopholes. This should all be studied but I do not have a final answer at this time.

MR. HANSEN: The tax free bonds are public bonds and pay only a small amount of interest. I am not too concerned about that. But I believe that in the overall we should have a real evaluation of the whole taxing

structure of the United States. This is needed because it allows too many people of means to pay no tax, or not their fair load. The problem of loopholes wouldnot exist if we could get into a new and clean-type tax. QUESTION NINE:

Do you anticipate a recession if the Vietnam war is drawn to a sudden close and war contracts cancelled? MR. HANSEN: Not really, I

think proper management of government and the needs of national defense would allow us to shift these contracts to updating our armament and equipment so that we could continue to be a strong nation. Right now our military store house has been depleted. The time it takes to change this situation would give us ample time to phase back and change

our economy from wartime to peace time. DR. DAVIS: I think intelligent planning in terms of the nation's economy will permit a shift from a war oriented program to a peace

economy. This will take foresight and planning and this will be one of the important roles of government in the next few months. It is the obligation of government to provide such planning. QUESTION TEN:

Are you satisfied with your campaign results and do you anticipate your efforts will end in victory in the primary?

DR. DAVIS: I'm never satisfied with my own efforts but I feel confident. I feel that I will win the primary and also the general election in November.

MR. HANSEN: I feel good about the acceptance we have had in the Second Congressional district, which I represented in Congress, I believe we have had an excellent reception in the Boise area and a better than expected reception in North Idaho. We have fine support, fine workers and things are working out well. Putting it all together I feel we will win the primary and go on to win the general in November.

US firms build hatred selling 'outlaw' goods

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (UPI) - American corporations are creating hatred and animosity toward the United States by selling undeveloped nations products outlawed in this country.

The American Trial Lawyers' Association Convention was told Friday by Irwin Birnbaum, a New York trial lawyer and professor of law at Syracuse University college of law, that "While we trial lawyers are using our resources to bring safe products and working conditions to Americans, the same American corporations, who are being forced to respect consumer and workers safety in this country, continue to kill, maim and injure workers in other countries with products that have been proven unsafe and even lethal in the United States."

"American corporations'are dumping unsafe and dangerous products in every under-

developed country in the world and creating hatred and animosity toward the U.S. and in flicting injury and death in these countries," Birnbaum said.

As examples, the lawyers said, "Drugs banned from the market by the FDA as unsafe and ineffective are being sold in England by their American manufacturers."

'American cigarette manufacturers are selling American-made cigarettes in Africa without the warning labels on the package," he said



Warning given against ticks

TWIN FALLS - The director of the South Central Idaho Health District appealed to area residents today to guard themselves against paralysiscausing ticks.

The warning came after Dr. Wayne Carte confirmed one half hour. reported case of paralysis in the Magic Valley area earlier this summer.

Carte said area residents should inspect their bodies for the small ticks after being outdoors. The parasites attach of the head and can cause develop the symptoms. paralysis if not detected and removed.

A girl, nearly 3 years old, had developed symptoms of paralysis of her right arm. She was taken to a doctor, who discovered the tick and removed it, causing the symptoms to disappear within one-

Book Keview

By COLLEN ARRINGTON Twin Falls Public Library **TWIN FALLS** — Classics are often last resort literature for adults and students, when in reality classical selections can be guides to good literature, not lists of thick books to be avoided.

'Jude the Obscure,'' by Victorian author Thomas Hardy is the subject of this review. Jude was an impoverished

stonemason who English aspired to the ministry but was This rejection rejected. stemmed from the rigid divisions of the era between common laborers and wealthy, influential families. Jude's lonely childhood

parallels Hardy's own early life in sensitivity and early pessimism. Jude himself is not truly pessimistic but Hardy's tone colors the character and shapes a life too tragic for the man to bear. Jude fails repeatedly in his

aspirations to be formally educated, and to conquer loneiiness. Although rejected by the universities, Jude did become a self-tutored Greek scholar and devoted all energies and spare moments attempting to appease his desire for

As a young man he had apprenticed himself as onemason with the purpose of attaining a trade to support himself for educational pur-poses. Following an unsuccessful marriage, Jude-went to Christminister, England, to enter a university. His request was denied for biased reasons. Jude realized then that he could not rise above the laborer's

His vocation entailed repairing the old cathedrals and universities, which constantly reminded him of his rejection from those institutions. Throughout the book, Hardy imprints his negative personal attitude upon a character who struggles in vain, When labeled pessimistic by a critic, Hardy replied that he was an emeliorist: an improver.

Thus the character Jude emerges in the end not warped and bitter at his seeming defeats, but a man who has been tempered by realistic aspects of life that can't be altered.

I recommend this book to your reading because it demonstrates well that one does ng have to succeed in originalgoals to be measured as a successful person.

Food waste disposers help use to dispose of any food solve kitchen clean-up particles which may be left. problems, the chore of taking out the garbage, eliminating messy garbage cans and their resultant odors, germs, insects, rodents and other pests. They come in several brands and models, and are of two basic types --- the continuous feed and the batch feed.

Continuous feed allows- the user to add food waste while the disposer is operating. The batch feed is first loaded, then the cover (acting as the on-off. switch) must be locked in place before the disposer will operate. It is wise to give consideration

before purchase to: the amount and type of sound insulation, a. design which prevents jam-self-cleaning and should need no ming, the size of the hopper that special care. If odors are the rate of disposing of food waste. To make the best use of a

waste disposer grind all waste immediately. Foods decay rapidly, (particularly in warm weather) and acids that develop can corrode metal disposer parts and cause odors.

Use cold water for grinding wastes and use a large enough moving down the drain line. It is important that the disposer and cold water be left running a few minutes after the grinding is completed to flush and drain. Most disposers are designed to handle all food wastes including bones, fruit rinds and seeds. Fibrous matter like corn husks, pea pods and arthichokes should be ground with other food wastes and fed slowly with

fattened for market. All manure from the feedlot is returned to the land and no commercial fertilizer is used except phosphate and a little nitrogen for the alfalfa each spring.

Stubble that is left from the green chopping is plowed into the ground. Beaver tries to get all grain ground plowed in the fail and corn ground plowed in the spring. When land is taken out of alfalfa he plants it to corn for two years, then grain for a year, using the grain as a cover crop for the new alfalfa seeding. After green chopping the grain and watering, Beaver has found that a small second cutting of the alfalfa is available making about a ton per acre.

After lunch the group visited the Hunsaker operation 431 South 100 East of Rupert. Hunsaker owns 210 acres and rents 80 acres and has a dairy operation with his two sons Glenn and Lynn.

The family milks 100 head of grade Holsteins. Presently they have 278 young calves. Some are dairy calves and about 100 are herefords. They purchase yearlings and keep them to feeder size and then they are sold.

He has about 90 acres in pasture seeded with the University Nix. The pasture is cross fenced and the cows are moved from pasture to pasture.

There is 78 acres of corn. 80 acres of alfalfa and 24 acres of grain. All the corn and grain and about half of the alfalfa is green chopped for cattle feed. The remainder of the alfalfa is baled and fed also. In addition he purchases about 30 tons of rolled grain per week for the COWS.



CRACKED CHERRIES: Many have asked us what causes the skins of cherries to crack open. This is due to rains followed by sunny weather.

Too much moisture causes the skins to crack, especially with sweet cherries. Tomatoes have the same "cracking" problem. Some varieties such as Glamour are "crackresistant" and will refuse to crack, regardless of the soil conditions or weather.

By the way, did you ever make pickled sour cherries? Here's a 100 - year - old recipe sent-to us by an "over 80" gardener. Pit about three quarts of sour cherries. Put glass jar). Cover with cider vinegar and let stand over night.

In the morning drain off the vinegar (save it to use in other pickles) Measure the cherries cup for cup with granulated sugar and stir well, cover cherries, then stir every morning for ten mornings.

The sugar will all be dissolved by that time. Put a cover over the jar and tie a clean cloth over the cover. They are ready to eat as a relish with meat dishes. and everyone seems to like one? Please send it along. them very-much. They are so easy to make with no heating or cooking.

BIRCH TROUBLES: Birches are graceful and beautiful, but they are also fussy about soil and have plenty of problems. The three main pests are birch leaf miner, borer and die-back disease.

Gray, canoe and cut-leaf birches are susceptible to attacks by the leaf miner, a small flat worm which causes the leaves to turn brown. If you hold an affected leaf up in the light, you can see the worm now.

CONTROL: Spray in early spring (about May 1) using either diazinon, malathion or Sevin. Give two extra sprays at 10-day intervals, and spray again around July 1 and July 10 to kill the second brood of leaf miners.

A simpler method of control consists of using a systemic such as dimethoate (Cygon) as a soil drench around the base of the tree. This is absorbed into the sap stream. Apply in spring as the trees can take it up easier then.

Bronze birch borer is a flatheaded grub one-half inch or so long, and it makes irregular. winding galleries just beneath the bark of the main trunk. These cause the tops of the birches to die back.

CONTROL: Spray trunk and branches (and leaves) in early summer, and twice more at two-week intervals using malathion.

CONTROL: It's tough. Pulling the weeds won't help much unless you do it regularly to starve it out. Mowing it over and over will help starve it out. How about weedkillers? White vinegar sprayed on leaves helps check it, according to some gardeners. Paraquat weedkiller kills the tops back, but the pest springs back. I wish we had a good control for bindweed. Does any reader know of

QUESTION OF THE WEEK: E.D. of Twin Falls: "I have a black oxheart sweet cherry tree planted seven years ago. It has never had any cherries on. There are two other oxheart trees planted at the same time and they have been loaded with fruit for the past three years. What's wrong with the one that

never bears? Sweet cherries are more temperamental to grow than apples. One tree can bear heavily and just 15 feet away another tree will refuse. Local soil site (poor drainage, type, etc.) can affect growth. Sweet cherries are slower to come into bearing than most apple varieties

Although the trees have been planted for seven years, one tree simply may not have come into bearing yet. It's very common for sweet cherries to take seven or eight years to bear their first measurable

crop When a nurseryman removes 'suckers'' from budded sweet cherry trees in spring, it is often difficult for him to distinguish between the shoots which develop from the desired or inserted bud and the suckers' arising from the Mazzard rootstock. If he mistakenly permits the mazzard sucker to grow and the inserted bud dies. then the rootstock sucker will develop into a tree and he could mistakenly sell the tree as a budded black oxheart.

CONTROL: Cut out affected branches back to sound wood. CARE OF BIRCHES: Keep the trees fed and watered in dry spells. Just as soon as you see a weak or dying branch, cut it back to live tissue and burn it! In some areas dead birch trees are allowed to stand. These are reservoirs for infection and should be cut down. Do not use wood for fireplace as it can harbor the beetle.

If possible, burn the affected wood or dispose of it so the wood won't be allowed to incubate more borers and pepper your community

RAW ONIONS KILL GERMS: Onions are one of the best vegetables you can grow. You probably didn't know it but those onions in your garden contain one of the most powerful germ killers in the world.

Russian medical experts tested the bacteria-killing power of 150 plants and herbs and found the onion to be the most effective. Scientists in the U.S. have proved that chewing raw onion sterilizes the mouth and throat, backing up the claim of grandma that it could cure a cold.

Herbalists claim that onion juice mixed with water and glycerine is an effective gargle. Engineers are still wondering how men built the pyramids of Gaza, Egypt. They know they got their strength by consuming

Government officials said the matter could be rectified with a doctor's certificate. Frost said: "My wife just roared with laughter."

Charters suspended

MADRID(UPI)-The Spanish Government Friday suspended the academic charters of Madrid's two universities and decreed a set of, emergency measures aimed at ending student unrest. The decree, signed by Generalissimo Francisco Franco and published in the official state bulletin, gave university authorities powers to suspend or expel students who interfere with the "normal functioning of academic institutions and university life".

It also ordered all professors to obey and carry out policies laid down by academic authorities or risk suspension.

The decree was published as the campuses were closed down for the summer vacation. The measures were the result of recurrent student unrest. demonstrations, strikes and clashes with police which started last November and flared up time and again until

the start of the vacations. Student groups have demanded a bigger say in university affairs and an end to police presence on the campuses. In some protest actions, they were joined by faculty members.

unit was set up July 1 to serve the Swatooth Recreation Area, a consolidation of parts of four ranger districts which has the same boundaries as the NRA.

If NRA legislation is passed, the unit will become the management and visitor's information headquarters for the recreation area, until permanent offices are established at North Fork, Reynolds said

However, Reynolds said, without the pending legislation, creation of a Sawtooth Recreation Area "has been in the hopper for a number of

In addition to reducing administration costs, the larger management area could provide specialized services, such as those of land use and minerals assistants, which are not present on ranger district staffs, he said.

The superintendent said he was "pleased" with the NRA legislation as it currently stands. The legislation has passed conferee committees and is scheduled to go before the House and Senate.

Key advantages of the legislation are that it provides direction for mineral management and gives authorization to coordinate development on private land within the NRA, Reynolds said.

The bill also will provide compensation to private land owners "for any activities not in harmony with the legislative direction" and gives stronger management authority in the Sawtooth Wilderness area, Reynolds said.

Because the NRA emphasizes "recreation potential and values," the superintentient said that the history and character of the area is better suited for such a classification, rather than a national park

Reynolds said activities, including hunting and livestock grazing, which he said "enhanced the recreational value" would be curtailed under a national park.

The superintendent will be aided by four immediate management assistants. Tom Kovalicky will be in charge on-going resource management, including the areas of recreation, wilderness, fire control, range land and trails. Lynn Sprague's jurisdiction will be project design and planning.

Land adjustment and land use management assistant will be Ken Dittmer. Dittmer will determine future use of-private lands and be in charge of obtaining scenic easements.

Management assistant for the entire minerals program will be Harry Young. Young will check patented mining claims for validity, enforce mining regulations and conduct an inventory of all mining activities within the NRA.

Reynolds said the staff presently includes 25 permanent employes and 35 summer or parttime employes. Future staffing will depend on financing by Congress, he said.

The NRA will work jointly with a myriad of federal, state and county governments, Reynolds said. These will include the Idaho Department of Health, Highway Department, U.S. Department of Geological Survey, Federal Bureau of Mines, Bureau of Land Management, State Departments of Natural Resources and Eands, state and county law enforcement agencies, county zoning boards and county commissioners.

Current projects include a recreation minimap for the entire area, which will be issued in August, Reynolds said. The map will (contain points of interest for the traveler as well as designation of stops, commercial facilities, streams and mountains.

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
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
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Few fields of endeavor have more influence on our lives than education, medicine and science. Here are reports on three new proposals, or discoveries, in these fields that may seem radical and extreme today, but could prove instrumental in shaping your life in the months and years ahead.

1. All students should be kicked out of school after they finish high school and be prohibited from resuming any formal education for at least four years.

This system, says the noted educator Mortimer J. Adler, author of the book, "The 'Common Sense of Politics," would help young people mature more



quickly, broaden their learning, focus their career plans, and, if engineered properly, could help the nation solve many of its mounting social problems. Under Adler's

Mortimer J. Adler proposal, young-

sters would start school at age two or three, the years that now, he says, are "ridiculously wasted." From then until they finished high school at 16, all would be taught the same prescribed course of study, concentrating on reading, writing and mathematics. No vocational instruction would be allowed.

At the end of high school, Adler would award all students Bachelor of Arts degrees and "throw them out of school-absolutely-for a minimum of four years." During this time, they would either work in private industry or perform public-service work. "For instance," says Adler, "some might work in the Peace Corps, others in VISTA, still others in a new Environment Corps, or in mental hospitals or as police cadets."

This work would serve a double purpose. First, it would throw needed manpower into the tasks of improving the environment, law enforcement, health, foreign relations and poverty. And equally important, it would expose teenagers firsthand to many of our most complex social problems.

Says Adler: "Schools, no matter how good, cannot by themselves turn out educated and mature men and women. The quickest maturity and the best preparation for genuine learning come from real-life experiences."

At age 20, students would have a

choice. Those who felt they had had enough formal schooling could seek jobs, with the security of having a broad liberal education and "real world" experience behind them. Those who wanted to study for a profession or vocation would first undergo examinations to determine whether they were, in fact, talented in their chosen area and whether their desire for more formal education was genuine. After this screening, the students would attend specialized "advanced schools." There, free of charge, each would pursue only studies related to his particular interest.

Because of this concentration. Adler says, students could be trained in even the most complicated professions in a maximum of six years. By age 26, at the most, everyone would be ready to put his formal training to use.

"The student who comes to his advanced education after four years outside the cloistered precincts of a school has important advantages over today's average college student," Adler contends. "He is more-likely to have escaped the great mental disorder known as adolescence because his outside experiences will have forced upon him a kind of 'instant manhood.' Also, he's much more likely to know what he wants and how to work to get it. Today, too many campuses are jammed with kids who are just drifting without goals or who are there only because of family pressures. By narrowing advanced schooling down to those able and anxious to handle it, we could make professional training not only more effective, but cheaper as well."

2. People should be psychologically screened to determine if they are cancer-prone.

search discovery called "the cancerprone personality," and your chances of contracting some form of malignancy may be significantly higher than those of the average American.

Doctors have speculated for some time that there is a link between human emotions and cancer. Now, reports of two researchers to the American Cancer Society support this hypothesis.

In one study, psychologist Claus Bahnson, senior research scientist at the Eastern Pennsylvania Psychiatric Institute, used psychological tests to compare the personalities of hundreds of cancer victims with those of other people. From these studies, he is able to determine the personality type that appears most likely to contract cancer.

The odds that a person will get cancer seem to be heightened. Bahnson says, if he "operates with high levels of internal conflict or stress" that he tends to mask by repressing his true feelings. The mask may fool others, but inside he's churning with "closed up" emotions, is defensively self-centered and often experiences depression because of difficulties in his intimate personal velationships.

Also, Bahnson claims, the cancerprone personality is highly committed to upholding social norms, tends to be

authoritarian and has "great difficulty dealing with and expressing anger."

On the basis of separate studies, Dr. George F. Solomon, associate professor of clinical psychiatry at Stanford University's medical school, seconds Bahnson's findings and adds some conclusions of his own, "Ouite consistently," Solomon reports, cancer patients display evidence of sexual problems and "unresolved tension concerning a parent figure." Also, he says, cancer victims commonly have suffered the loss of an important relationship-say, through the death of a spouse-prior to the development of a malignant tumor.

"The exact mechanism by which personality traits, and emotional experiences enhance disease susceptibility is not yet understood. But doctors may be able to perfect mass psychological screening techniques to detect persons with greater-than-average cancer risk.

3. Within the next ten years, it may be possible to grow exact carbon copies of any living person. When this technology is available, America should consider establishing a "genius bank," where genetically identical reproductions of society's great men could be grown.

This is the idea of Dr. Robert I.

Sinsheimer, a biologist with the California Institute of Technology. The key is a new biological process called "eloning." This technique is based on the scientific fact that each individual cell in any living thing contains all the genetic components necessary to make an identical reproduction of that thing. If a biologist wants to reproduce a series of identical frogs, for example, he can take" the nucleus, or "control center," of any cell from a live frog and implant it into an unfertilized frog egg whose own nucleus has been destroyed. The egg will then develop just as if it had been fertilized normally, and because the implanted nucleus contains the chromosomes and genes of the living frog, the new frog that results will be identical to it in every genetic respect. By repeating this dioning process, the scientist can "manufacture" as many of the same frog as be wants.

Cloning has already been used successfully in laboratories to make scores of "twin" frogs, plants and salamanders. "Only technical problems stand in the way of applying the technique to mammals," says Sinsheimer. "When these problems are solved, it will be possible to replicate prize cattle or horses-or humans,"

3. The "Bank of

Once the necessary technology is perfected, he believes that a bank where the cells of outstanding men and women can be collected and used for cloning should be established.

This is of vital importance, Sinsheimer argues, because man's triumph over his environment has caused the evolutionary process to grow stagnani. The world is no longer producing the number of great individuals that it should. "I believe there should be six or seven times as many men like Newton, Rembrandt and Mozart as there are," he says.

Such prospects, of course, give rise to the most profound ethical questions. Who is to choose, for example, which "geniuses" are to be duplicated, and in what number? Having copied a person genetically, how can we recreate the environment in which he grew up and which may have influenced the way he turned out? What can be done about a Hitler who might produce exact replicas of himself in mass supply?

Cloning "will not bring instant Utopia," Sinsheimer concedes. "There will be some tragic mistakes. But ultimately I think we can hope to improve and to find new paths truly different from those we have trod in /11 the past."

In a Crisis, **He Won Me Anew**

eing married to an actor would have been a lot more difficult if I hadn't been in show business before I married Bob. Fortunately, I understood the emotional highs as well as the lows. The tensions. The impossible hours. The lack of privacy.

I had worked with quite a few actors before I met Bob, and had always told myself that I would never, never marry one. hill hey were too narcissistic. Too self-centered. Too egotistical.

What worried me most when we got married was that Bob might be spoiled and too set in his ways. After all, he had not only been a bachelor for a long time, but was frequently referred to as "Hollywood's mosteligible bachelor." His father died when Bob was barely eight, so he naturally received more attention from his mother than he would have had under ordinary circumstances. Yet he also came from solid, down-to-earth stock. His father was a selfmade man who became prominent in advertising. In fact, he was the man who coined the phrase, "The beer that made Milwaukee famous."

When Bob was a year old, his parents were divorced. His mother took Bob to France with



- 1/2 teaspoon instant minced
- garlie
- 14 teaspoon pepper

1. Wipe meat with damp paper towel. Place meat in heavy-duty plastic bag.

2. Combine remaining ingredients. Pour over meat in bag. Seal securely with twister. Refrigerate about 24 hours, turning meat 2 or 3 times to marinate evenly. 3. When ready to grill, drain marinade from meat. Reserve marinade.

show that men are much more satisfied with the way they look; that women, regardless of age, tend to be much more dissatisfied with their faces as well as their figures. When a man looks into a mirror, he's likely to give what stares back at him a casual but reassuring nod of approval, adjust his tie, perhaps flick a bit of smudge from his nose. Not so with the average woman. Her eyes rove critically over every feature, wincing, at each real or fancied imperfection, the expression on her face saying: "If I only had the receipt, I'd like to exchange it for something else. . . .?

2. True. A team of university psychologists tested men and women graduate students on their ability to perform mechanical and mental tasks under noisy conditions (clanging of high-pitched electric bells). Results: The men's performance deteriorated, but with the women it was found that "the noise did not cause, any deterioration in performance, and actually had a facilitating effect on mechanical tasks."

3. True-according to driver-reaction studies conducted at Purdue Univer-

sity. In the tests, 123 drivers, selected at random, pulled up behind experimental cars that purposely caused a slight traffic delay. Findings: The sex of the frustrating driver was the big factor in determining the other driver's reaction. "Only 52 percent of all drivers honked at the experimental cars when they were driven by a man, while 71 percent honked at a femaledriven car."


4. False. In tests at Kansas State University, Institute for Environmental Research, students were exposed to temperatures ranging from 60 to 98 degrees, and humidities ranging from 15 to 85 percent. Men, it was found, were more sensitive to weather changes than women. They felt uncomfortably warm at temperatures the women still found agreeable. And it was found that "humidity plays a significantly more important role in how men feel than in how women feel."

5. True. Psychological studies show that when a woman commits an indiscretion, she is more likely to be concerned over what people will think than the way she herself may actually feel about it. Whereas with a man, it's apt to be the other way around.

The Doctor Lets You In

Why is So Much Hepatitis Goling Around?

Chances are, in the last few years you've known somebody who's contracted hepatitis ("inflammation of the liver"). Hepatitis, alas, is becoming a sign of the times. There · are two types: Serum hepatitis is caused by direct blood-to-blood transfer of the virus. Heroin addicts and others who share needles have a high rate of serum hepatitis and often give it to innocent victims in cities where they have sold blood for transfusions. infectious hepatitis, the less serious type, has risen in incidence because of sewagepolluted streams, rivers and ocean shailows. You can get it from raw oysters and crustacea, and from any kind of fecal-oral transmission. . Symptoms begin with a sledge-hammer "flu." Unbelievable weakness, fever, body aches, nausea and vomiting are followed by orange urine and clear stool. Go to a doctor at once. You must have hospitalization or total bed rest at home, with a private toilet and someone to take care of all your needs. People exposed to new cases of hepatitis should be given




an injection of gamma globulin as a preventive measure. . . . Hepatitis hits rundown people worst. To avoid it, practice scrupulous hygiene; don't eat raw seafood; and contribute your own healthy blood to the Red Oross, to build up the national supply.—By John J. Secondi, M.D.

AL KALINE: The Modest Tiger Who Turned Down \$100,000

When AI Kaline became a Detroit Tiger at 19, he displayed so much energy that one cynic commented, "That kid'll burn himself out in a

couple of years." Kaline is now in his 20th year with the Tigers-and is as indestructible as Old Man River. He had one of his best seasons last year at the age of 37, showing as good an eye at the plate as he did in 1954, when he became the youngest player over to win the AL batting title. Kaline has played in 15 All-Star Games, has won ten Golden Glove Awards, and led the Tigers to the world championship in 1968.... The only player ever to turn down a \$100,000 contract because he felt he wasn't worth it, Kaline says, "I didn't have too good a season in 1970, so when I was offered the six-figure salary for **1971, I refused,"** But he did accept the 100 G's this year—becoming the first Detroit player in history to reach that level. ... Kaline is a native of Baltimore, married, and the father of two sons. A year-afteryear home-run hitter, he is also one

of baseball's best-fielding outfielders; **last season he didn't make a single error**... Late in the 1968 season, he was sidelined by an injury for six weeks and modestly told his manager that his replacement should have the honor of playing in the World Series because he had been doing so well. 


