He was concerned because of grapevine reports about inquiries being made by UPI and another news organization in Boise into the award of motion picture contracts by the state, UPI has looked into award of film contracts by some state agencies, asking state officials about their actions and requesting copies of

of any illegal actions by any state officials or private individuals. However, some of the actions taken and the lack of guidelines for filmmaking raised a number of questions.

Some contracts were awarded without bid and one was given to a high bidder. One contract was awarded by an official who used to be the roommate of the man with whom the contract was signed.

A former appointee of the Andrus administration solicited film business

sometimes obtaining it without bid - from agencies directly under the governor. One official said he later was warned by an Andrus' staffer about a possible "conflict of interest."

Another agency spent more than \$10,000 in federal funds for a film it ordered to "inform the legislature" about one of its programs and then never showed it to the legislature.

Still another official said he ordered a film since cancelled - because his agency had some federal funds left over from salaries for unfilled

Viet battle pace rises

Communist attacks soared to their highest level in five years Sunday, South Vietnamese military spokesmen said, as both sides intensified their struggle for control of population centers before a cease-fire could be The Saigon command said the

Communists initiated 138 shellings, ground attacks and terrorist incidents in the 24 hours ending at 6 a.m. Sunday Saigon. According to field -14 more than the previous record 124 staged day before yesterday and the highest recorded since the Tet offensive

Communist troops captured at least 12 hamlets within 40 miles of Saigon Saturday but South Vietnamese recaptured seven of them by Sunday morning. One of the hamlets still partly in Communist hands is only 10 miles northwest of the capital

Forty miles east of Saigon, South Vietnamese troops reported 46 Communists killed in

Ben Het is 300 miles north of reports, about 30 Rangers attacked shortly before noon Saturday but immediately came under heavy mortar and récoilless rifle fire. Two Rangers were reported wounded.

Vietnamese Air Force propeller-driven Al Skyraiders bombed the Communist guns. But 30 minutes after the attack began, the Rangers were taken out by helicopter.

In a delayed report, spokesman said a South Vietnamese infantry company, about 120 men, was driven off its base seven miles northwest of Kontum on Highway 14 Friday. The unit retreated to a base closer to Kontum.

He said the previously unannounced crackdown, which involved the killing of a top leader, has resulted in a dramatic shortage of heroin on the American eastern seaboard and a steep rise in the price of narcotics.

'The conspiracy accounted for almost a third of the annual U. S. consumption of heroin," Gross said.

Noise lid OK'd

(Continued from P. 1) These include aircraft, motor vehicles, food, drugs, cosmetics, pesticides and firearms.

The commission will be empowered to recall, seize or ban hazardous products, order refunds to consumers and seek stiff fines or prison terms for manufacturers or distributors who wilfully violate the law.

To combat the "invisible pollution" of noise, the other major bill signed Saturday would give the Environmental Protection Agency \$24 million over three years to set and enforce acceptable noise levels for a host of products, from jetliners to jackhammers and dishwashers to dump trucks.

The categories covered would

making product, except exemptions expected for competitive racing vehicles and church bells and carillons. Electric and Electronic household appliances would be labeled according to noise emission levets.

A controversy over aircraft was resolved by a congressional compromise giving the Federal Aviation Administration, which presently has full jurisdiction over plane noise, power to modify, accept or reject proposed EPA noise standards in that area.



"Gate Arrival" _

Getting there is definitely not half the fun, as any seasoned air traveler can attest.

As air transportation has grown and airports have expanded, the problem is not just getting to the airport but to the airplane itself. Any plane within a half-mile of the ticket counter is close.

-They've done somthing about it in Kansas City, where a new \$250 million airport goes into operation in November.

A design concept called "gate arrival" shortens to about 300 feet the distance from parked car to parked airplane. Instead of a main terminal building with long concourses extending fingerlike out to the plane, there is a cluster of onelevel, C-shaped buildings in a triangle formation. --

A passenger can drive into and park in the open center of whichever C his plane is departing from. Planes are positioned on the outer perimeter of each building. In 33 steps from the terminal entrance - the width, not the length, of the terminal - he's checked in and boarding the plane.

It's possible, airport officials say, that a passenger embarking on one of the huge jumbo jets may walk farther to his seat after he enters the plane than he did through the terminal.

Of Being Earnest

There is only so much that can be done to humanize the assembly line or enrich the simple but necessary jobs. Until everything is completely automated or robotized, someone is going to have to do the world's unchallenging and-or dirty work.

Fortunately, there's a type of person who can do it.

Based on their observations, two social researchers theorize that if a man is successfully performing work that is common and lowly valued, then his ideas about himself and his self-esteem are divorced from the kind of work he

As a consequence, he will invest little of his drive, imagination and initiative in work itself but reserve this self-investment for other areas of his life, such as his family, his community, his recreation or his hobbies, say Professors Robert Dubin and William A. Faunce of the Universities of California and Michigan, respectively...

One of the important conclusions of their study is that much routine labor can be done, and done effectively, by people who are very low in their self-investment in their work. People can be productive in a mechanical sense without investing themselves emotionally and intellectually in the job.

When you think about it, this ability is really a kind of skill and one that undoubtedly will

command better and better pay as time goes on.

THERE GO DE JUDGE

Even if the U.S. Justice Department eventually goes to trial with its antitrust suit against giant IBM Corporation, it may have trouble finding a judge to hear the case.

The reason is that with a half a million Americans holding IBM shares, some of them are bound to be judges.

In a couple of recent legal proceedings involving IBM, judges have disqualified themselves because of IBM stock in their portfolios. Three U.S. Supreme Court justices have indicated they will not participate in a patent involving IBM.

But IBM is apparently only the tip of the iceberg. Lawyers are said to be worrying that too rigid observance of conflict of interest policies not only make it difficult to assign judges to cases involving corporations but also restricts the judges' freedom to invest their money.

We should all have such a problem.

Really? They Actually Locked The Ballot Box

Editor, Times-News Who locked the ballot boxes before the count was made?

There was much indecision of what to do on election day in November 1906 in Cassia County. You will remember, of course, that the two-year-old community of Twin Falls was in Cassia at that time and Twin Falls county was yet to be born.

But getting back to that 1906 election the editor of the Twin Falls News was certain it had been a Republican landslide but he couldn't give the results. Well, there was one case where the results were available and that was from the Kimberly precinct. It seems that the votes were counted there, a copy made and then the ballot box was locked. In all the other precincts the result copy was not made and the locks went on before the newspaper - or anyone else - was informed of the official

As the News editor put it in a page one article:

"Cassia county gave the candidates on the Republican state and county tickets majorities varying from 350 to 500. Governor Gooding carried the county by approximately 400.

"Unfortunately complete returns are

lacking from every precinct in the county with solitary exception of Kimberly. For some unaccountable reason the ballot boxes were sealed in all other precincts without a memorandum of the returns, consequently the majorities of the various candidates can only be conjectured.

"So soon as it was apparent that a certain ticket had carried a precinct all interest lapsed and no attempt was made to ascertain the exact vote. This will not be known until the vote is canvassed by the county commissioners next month.'

But the supposition of the editor that the victory was, indeed, Republican was backed up when the official count was made. The commissioners reported the entire slate of Republican candidates were successful and that the majorities ranged from 693 for H. H. Thornton, county superintendent, and 662 for Congressman Burton L. French, down to 123 for B. P. Howells, county attorney, and 287 for J. Y. Haight, county clerk.

So it was a Republican year back in 1906.

WANT A JOB? Said an editorial in the Twin Falls News of November 16, 1906:

"The fact that a body of representative businessmen should be obliged to take steps to induce labor to come into Idaho indicates the remarkable prosperity of the state.

"Several delegates to the convention of commercial clubs spoke of the difficulty experienced in securing labor for their sections of the state and the trouble encountered in retaining workmen.

"Elect a Democrat President, was the remedy suggested by a facetious delegate.

'The labor question was the most serious to come before the convention and upon its satisfactory solution will depend in a large measure the progress in Idaho. Railroad construction has been hampered, important projects have been hampered and material damage has been wrought by the inability of contractors to engage workmen. Skilled labor is in demand in all sections of southern, Idaho. If the work outlined by the League of Southern Idaho Commercial Clubs is carried out there will always be a demand for labor here."

Clear Cutting

Editor, Times-News:

I cannot understand the recent trend in favor of clear cutting on our remaining forest areas in view of all the costly lessons we have learned over the past century. I believe that our qualified foresters and experienced loggers, whatever their affiliation, know better than this.

Senator Church deserves great credit for his efforts on behalf of Idaho in this respect. Anyone who has observed at first hand, or reviewed the history of-our early loggin operations in the Great Lakes states and the deep south, is aware of the havoc wrought wherein very little remained but cordwood and underbrush.

Agriculture use fully took over much of the wast land and conditions that are neither practical nor possible exist in the rugged mountain terrain of the Northwest and most of the rest of the Northwest.

Certainly no one objects to the clear cutting of local diseased and beetle infested tracts. This is also true of the hot burns which destroy the ground cover. Otherwise there is no justifiable excuse for clear cutting.

We are now extensively

seeding and transplanting where we have indiscriminately logged, and the more of it the better. However, the trees that we hope to raise to barely merchantable size in 40 or 50 years, will not, like wheat and corn, begin to compare with the harvest we have already reaped or will ever reap again.

In the meantime we have to contend with increased soil erosion. A watershed is not necessarily a mountain divide or a high ridge. It is every little denuded promonotory whereupon the water courses down the sides. I have no idea if a deep carpet of ground cover may ever be successfully replaced. In any event, it will require many generations more than the life of a mature tree. We are not, as some have

said, trying to kill the logging industry by demands based on ignorance and emotion." Had we not curbed the appetities of the logging companies in the first place and held tight rein on them (not nearly tight enough) they would long since have cut themselves out of business.

A Rare Book

Just the other day Mrs. John E. (Anna) Hayes of Twin Falls received a rare book — a souvenir album in connection with the U.S. commemorative postage stamp honoring the Parent-Teacher Association on its 75th anniversary.

There were only 15 of the souvenir albums printed, which makes it really unique. Mrs. Hayes received it from Mrs. Elizabeth Mallory, president of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers.

The Twin Falls resident was national president from 1949 through 1952 and is the only woman in Idaho ever elected to that high post. In fact, she is one of only four women who have received that honor and who are from the western states.

The album is of black leather with gold printing. On the front. jacket, in addition to Mrs. Hayes' name, is the explanatory background of the commemorative. Inside is a block of the stamps, 50 in number, the stamps are in the eight cent category for first class postage.

Oil slick trapped on river

PIUTE FARMS, Utah (UPI) Workmen have surrounded a massive debris-filled oil slick on made of telephone poles; but shifting winds are making the

clean-up difficult The oil is caught between the booms about 134 miles from Copper Canyon, where the San Juan River flows into the huge man-made lake in southeastern Utah.

The goo washed down the river and into the lake from Texas-New Mexico Co. pipeline in northwestern New Mexico which ruptured Oct. 10.

Richard Jones, who is supervising the clean-up for the Environmental Protection Agency. said shifting winds, which accompanied stormy weather this week, blew the oil back and forth, making it difficult for oil company crews to set up their dredging equipment.

He said the huge slick, filled with logs, tree stumps and other debris, is snagged against the boom farther from the river mouth and stretches out for about 34 of a mile along the sides of the narrow sandstone canyon.

Jones said workmen will attempt to set up a clam shell crane near the main body of sludge and lift it from the water. The oily material will then be trucked above the lake's high water mark and buried...

He said only a small amount of oil was removed this week because of the bad weather and shifting currents.

"The priority now is to stabilize it," he said. "Right now when the clam shell digs in, it

doesn't get hold of very much.' Jones said if the weather says nice the oil company plans to have crews work around the clock. Texas-New Mexico Co., is paying for the clean-up.

End-asked for syphilis study

citizens' panel recommended Friday -and the government promptly agreed to end immediately a Public Health Service study of the effects of untreated syphilis among Alabama black men which resulted in at least 28 deaths.

In its first report to the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, the ninemember group headed by Dr. Vernal G. Cave, director of the New York City Bureau of Venereal Disease Control, also urged that the estimated 125 survivors of the 40-year-old study be treated for syphilis if required.

"The study of untreated syphilis in black males in Macon County, Ala, now known as the Tuskegee Syphilis Study: should be terminated immediately," the panel said in a preliminary report two months after it was appointed by HEW.

Dr. Merlin K. Duval, assistant HEW secretary for health and science, issued a statement promising that "we will do everything within our power to implement this first recommendation as rapidly as possible.'

Autopsies to determine the effects of untreated syphilis were discontinued several months ago, effectively ending the controversial study

When it began in 1932 in rural Alabama, the study involved more than 400 black men with syphilis and another 200 who did not have the disease and were used for comparisons. An estimated 50 of the survivors were in the noninfected group. During the experiment at

Signs 18 bills

WASHINGTON (UPI) -- President Nixon signed 18 bills Friday, including three major measures covering defense appropriations and a military spending authorization.

He also signed the appropriations bill for the State Department, Commerce and the Judiciary and the American Bicentennial Commission appropriation bill plus a measure to provide expanded protection for foreign officials.

Most of the other bills dealt with historic landmarks and certain conservation projects.

The President's chief domestic adviser, John D. Ehrlichman, said Nixon was working on a backlog of 132 bills Congress sent to the White House just before it adjourned. He said actions on more bills will be announced.

the leaves of your orange or other citrus plants shedding? This often happens after the plants are brought indoors. Usually the air is too hot and dry and the plants do not adjust themselves to the new environment:

All citrus plants like cool temperaures from 40 to 50 degrees at night during the winter months. They also need full sun and an air location. Dropping of buds, flowers and small fruits can also be due to a lack of light, improper watering (too much or too little).

Seedlings of all citrus are capricious as to time of blooming, some taking 10 years or less. Grafted types bear and flower indoors, where as those started from seed will flower but do not bear heavily. If fruit is borne on plants started from seed its very sour.

Grow the ponderosa lemon (Citrus limonia ponderosa), a fine house plant with large edible fruit weighing over a half-pound.

WEATHER KILL BUGS? Does a drought or unusually cold winter weather kill off insects? Unfortunately, weather is not a reliable means of insect control.

Hot dry sun might kill off some tender newly hatched insects, but usually they can weather it out. And cold weather has no effect.

Tests show that cold weather ·as low as 25 degrees below zero little or no harm to insects in plant debris near or in contact with the soil, nor to third each sand, peat and those overwintering in the soil.

It should be mentioned that weather might play a role in insect control locally. For example, if the weather turns cold, windy and rainy during or immediately after the hatching period, some pests might not survive

A. E. of Declo: 'We have a prayer plant which is different from the one our neighbor has Please tell us how to care for

There are two plants often called 'prayer plants." One is called Calathea, with leaves rather broad and pointed at the tip. They have a rhyzome-like root system with leaves arising from the crown.

The other prayer plant is Maranta, a close relative of Calathea. At night the leaves fold up, hence the common name of prayer plant. One Maranta has rows of brownish to dark green blotches in a row, hence the common name of "rabbit-track plant."

Culture for both is same. They like a light, humusy soil (oneloam), warm temperature both day and night (about 70 degrees). Keep soil uniformly moistened, never soggy. Also avoid temperature drop below 50 degrees since these plants are tropical. Start new plants by dividing the tuberous roots in spring.







Students give opinions on favorite candidates

TWIN FALLS — It won't be until the 1980 presidential election that 27 sixth grade students at Lincoln Elementary School in Twin Falls can vote

But the youngsters, mostly 11 years of age, have been studying the presidential election process and, except for one middle of the roader who thinks "they're both good," the kids have definite opinions about who should be the next president the United States.

president the United States.
Out of the class of 27 instructed by Mrs. Joy
Wright, 19 are for President Richard M. Nixon's
re-election, while seven favor George
McGovern's candidacy and one is undecided.

Mrs. wright has included study of elections and presidents of the United States as a diversion from regular classroom studies this year and she said the children are "very interested" in it.

They all have made posters boosting their favorite candidate or urging people to get out and vote

Each of the students was asked to cast a mock vote for his favorite candidate and then tell why he would vote in that manner if he were presently 18 years of age.

Many of the youngsters who favor McGovern seem to feel the Democratic candidate will have most, if not all, U. S. servicemen serving in Vietnam home within 90 days.

Another candid young woman just simply doesn't like much at all about President Nixon. "Nixon has a big nose and I don't like people with big noses. He hasn't done the world any good." wrote Elsa Rodriguez.

Becky Massie feels McGovern is a "real goodman and he said he would have all the troops out of Vietnam in 90 days and I think he's going to promise us that."

Richard Bullock feels McGovern should "have a chance because he said he would have all men out of the war and I think he will do it because I believe him . . . because he wouldn't lie to the people of the United States."

Kelly Tankersley is in favor of Sen. McGovern because he has said he would get everybody who was capable of working a job. "Welfare costs a lot of money," Kelly said.

Steven Williamson also believes McGoverncan do "wonders for welfare." He believes it
costs \$3,000 to run welfare. McGovern would run

Mike LeClair is one of the 19 children which weighed the class' ballot count in favor of President Nixon. He would vote "for Nixon because McGovern wants us to go to school all the time."

Angie Holland would vote for Nixon for president because "I think he will do his job. He went to China—to talk and went to other countries. He got some of the men home from war. This is what we want . . . and to be free for evermore . . . and to have a chance to vote."

"I would vote for Nixon because I think he is trying hard to impress the world and I think he is doing a good job of it," said Robert Lancaster. "If I were 18 I would think that Nixon would be

more better than McGovern. Since I am 11," said Shelley Doty, "I think that Nixon is more better."

Shauna Stephans said she would vote for Nixon because she is a Republican and "I think he would be a good president."

Susan Sweet also is in favor of re-electing the President. "I believe he can bring back our prisoners of war and can find for us world peace."

Many of the pro-Nixon contingent in Room 11-N of Lincoln school ranked their favorite's honesty as a key point. "I think he is a very honest man and will really change things now"

TWIN FALLS - The novel August 1914" by Alexander Solzhenitsyn is most likely his greatest work to date.

And, we are told, it is merely the first installment in a 20 year, multi-volume work which is to review the development of Soviet Russia.

Solzhenitsyn was awarded the 1970 Nobel Prize for Literature. His earlier major novels have all been realtively recent views of post World War II Soviet

"One Day in the Life of Ivan Denisovich;" "Cancer Ward," and "First Circle."

Here, in his first real departure from that pattern, he limits attention to a two-week period in August of 1914...

. The novel vividly portrays the panorama of a nation being thrust toward change as Tsarist Russia becomes embroiled in World War I

She brazenly affronts the mechanized German army with traditional horse and man powered army of 19th century vintage.

Though numerically superior, it is apparent from the beginning that the Russian war effort must fail.

wounded-captured in the battle- of Adele Stoddard. for Tannenburg alone) result as entreaties to God and Mother Russia prove to be too little for an outmoded system of warfare and government.

The bungling of an inept, overrated command structure serves to speed the carnage

Solzhenitsyn's omnipresent (though fictional) character, Colonel Vorotyntsev, provides us with firsthand and historically accurate, views of the rotten core of an entire army's hierarchy.

He flits from command post to battlefield, to general headquarters.

His audience finds itself highly sympathetic to his plight as he attempts, individually, to correct and reverse the mounting folly of his several principle officers.

One suspects that we will hear considerably considerably more of Vorotyntsev and of several other potentially fascinating characters briefly introduced but not disposed of in this novel.

If Solzhenitsyn does live long enough (and is allowed to continue) to add to this "first fascicle" of 600 pages, the total work will rival Tolstoy's "War and Peace" as the pre-eminent Russian historical novel.

Widespread predictions are already being voiced that Solzhenitsyn may prove to be the most important writer of the

The quality of this work and the long-range intent of the author cause this reviewer to look anxiously for further installments.

Gem Demo rates high with votes

WASHINGTON (UPI) Only eight Senators, Frank E. Moss, D-Utah, among them, got perfect scores on a senatorial rating sheet prepared here by the National Farmers Union (NFU) for the recent session of Congress. Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, came close.

No members of the Senate got zero scores in the ratings, which were based on how closely lawmakers follow NFU recommendations on 10 bills or amendments. Sen. Wallace R. Bennett, R-Utah, ranked lowest by taking eight "wrong" stands against only two "right" votes.

The eight Democrats who voted or "paired" in line with NFV recommendations on all 10 test votes selected for analysis by the farm group were: Mike Gravel, Alaska; Adlai E. Stevenson, Ill.; Harold E. Hughes, Iowa; Hubert H Humphrey, Minn.; Walter F. Mondale, Minn.; Quentin N. Burdick, N.D.; Moss; and Warren G. Magnuson, Wash.

The NFU, a frequent critic of Administration policy, listed only three "farm issue" votes among the 10 it used for rating senar tors. It recommended "aye" votes on approving agricultural appropriations and repealing hifr repoty vonytold, snf iy hsf uthrf s "no" vote on an amendment to kell a proposed rural development bank.

The complete a perfect score on following NFU recommendations, senators also had to vote or "pair" as follows: --

Against tabling a national voter registration bill; against an amendment allowing federally aided railroads to use dividends for non-rail purposes; for a cutoff of funds to keep U.S. forces in Vietnam after Oct. 1; against shelving a no-fault auto insurance bill; for an amendment liberalizing lunchroom equipment aid to needy schools; for a \$5.2 billion health care bill; and for an amendment boosting the amount of money old people can earn without loss of full Social; Security benefits.

Time proves McGovern right, Sen. Church says

.BOISE (UPI) - Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, said Friday a Vietnam compromise settlement identical to the one presently being negotiated could have been reached "at least" four years

"When George McGovern and I were speaking out against the war in 1965, it was considered the rankest form of heresy," Church told a news conference in his Boise office. "But time has proved us right.'

"Public memory is short," the Idaho Democrat added. "It is George McGovern, not President Nixon, who has been right all along about the outcome and settlement of the Indochina War.'

Asked if he thought the present negotiation developments were politically timed, Church answered there "is always that possibility," but said he hoped Rresident Nixon was "more dear

He called the Nixon administration's "wind down the war policy" an "obvious failure" and said the U.S. offensive begun six months ago proved Vietnamization was a failure.

Church told newsmen there is a possibility a Nixon landslide victory may take place Nov. 7

especially with the latest peace developments, but said such overwhelming support would prove dangerous to the national interest.

"In view of the tremendous concentration of power to the President, the people must think twice before maintaining the unfettered use of executive power," he said.

Commenting on recent charges of political sabotage and espionage leveled against the Nixon administration by the Washington Post, Church said the White House reaction to the charges was "typical of the fact that the administration has accounted for its actions."

"The people haven't demanded any accountability from the President to answer to situations that have been developing all summer, from the Watergate to now," he said.

"The President of the United States has the most powerful office on earth, that he feels he doesn't have to answer anything is subversiion of the worst kind," he added, saying the present administration has "the makings of a monar-

Answer: There are some POSSIBLE ways dog hair could distress children. How likely they are is something you'll have to arbitrate with the licensing board.

Hair from a healthy dog can raise havoc with an allergic child. Hair on a not-so-healthy dog could transmit ringworm, mange, lice or fleas, plus a few miscellaneous bacterial and fungal maladies. Perhaps we should point out that hair from a not-so-healthy child can be equally damaging to the dog and other children



Man and Society.

Church hits presidential 'monarchy' in Burley

By DAVID HORSMAN Times-News Writer

BURLEY - A "scandal-ridden" Washington and the presidential monarchy" were prime targets of Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, here

But the Senator, displaying the rhetorical form that earned him the Tag of "classic orator" in a recent Ralph Nader congressional study, saved his condemnation of national Republican politics for an emphatic conclusion at a Democratic rally.

He opened with a blanet endorsement of all the Democratic candidates in attendance at the

Church made clear his wish that Democratic . Senate candidate William E. (Bud) Daivs join him in Washington. Stressing the compatibility that Sen. Len

Jordan, R-Idaho, and he had achieved in protecting and promoting Idaho's interests, he said he could not anticipate such a relationship if Davis' opponents, Rep. James McClure, R-Idaho, is elected.

Davis' legislative future as a freshman senator was suggested when Church hinted that he might get a seat on the important Agriculture Committee.

The committee assignment was probably discussed when Davis met whith Senate Majority Leader Mike Mansfield, D-Mont., at a Democratic rally in Idaho Falls Friday mor-

Noting several co-appearances with Gov. Cecil Andrus, Church said the governor had facetiously remarked that, of all the candidates, Bud Davis is my choice for governor." Church had said earlier that "happiness is having Cecil Andrus as governor of Idaho.'

Willis Ludlow, Second Congressional District 'candidate, received Church's praise as a spirited campaigner who started with few resources and limited support and has become a serious contender.

"And he's done it with the most innovative methods that I know of," Church said, citing Poor Willie's Almanack, a weekly pamphlet that Ludlow uses as a political forum.

Ludlow's Almanack frequently attacks the incumbent congressmen, Rep. Orval Hansen, R-Idaho, for his refusal to engage in public debate, and Church echoed this charge when he said, "Hansen has been as hard for Willie to find as Dick Nixon has been for George McGovern to

Stumping for local Democrats, Church asked that voters "make an extra effort for Cecil Andrus to give him a legislature that he can work with.

State Senate candidate W. F. (Bill) Whittom and house hopeful Robert Guffey in district 21 and Sen. Robert Saxvik and representative candidates Clarence Parr and William McKean in district 26 were said by Church to be essential to a progressive legislature.

Church then assailed President Nixon and his administration.

He noted that a cease fire in Vietnam is reportedly close to settlement and said a comparable agreement could have been reached four years ago "without the loss of 20,000 American lives and the maining of 100,000 more" and without \$75 billion in defense spending "blown to smithereens.

He said, "Sen. McGovern and I spoke out on the same day (Feb. 4) in 1965 for a negotiated settlement in Vietnam while Nixon was a cheerleader for the war."

But Church said he supported the present negotiations because he holds peace more dear than politics."

'The evidence of scandal in Washington is 'rrefutable," Church said. He cited claims that International Telephone and Telegraph contributed \$400,000 to the Republican campaign in return for special treatment in anti-trust investigation.

He attacked the recent U. S. wheat sale to Russia because some exporters capitalized on advance information concerning the deal. "The Russians got the wheat and the farmers got the chaff," he said.

The Watergate affair (linking attempts to bug Democratic headquarters with the Committee to Re-elect the President) was also subjected to

Church's ire. "The Justice Department investigated and found itself innocent," he chided.

The Senator lamented the "embellishments" that have been added to the presidency. "It (the Presidency) now has all the trappings of a monarchy,) he said....

Church typified the undue presidential prestige by citing a recent White House dinner which he attended. A new routine had been added to ceremonies marking the entrance of the President, according to Church.

Heralding the chief executive's appearance were trumpeters adorned with black velvet flags that identified them as "the President's own." Church said, "When 'his worship' arrived, you didn't know whether to genuflect or

kiss his ring." "The presidency is now a unanswerable and unaccountable monarchy," he said, and warned the voters not to be psyched out" by big money

and flambovant advertising. McGovern will adopt the Truman credo of 'The buck stops here," according to Church. But he urged that, if McGovern is not elected, a Democraticle delating be maintained to provide a check-and-balance government.

"Then the patient goes home and goes about his business for five to six weeks while a tube of the patient's own tissue grows," Sparks said. "Then he comes back to the hospital and we remove the silicone tube and hook up the ends of the tissue tube where we want it."

Nixon to veto ban on taxes

WASHINGTON (UPI) -- President Nixon said Friday he would veto legislation that would have outlawed local head taxes on airline passengers.

The head tax ban was part of legislation that would have pledged nearly \$1 billion' more in federal funds for airport development. In vetoing the bill, Nixon said it was too costly and too narrow in scope.

Only five airports in New Hampshire and one in Florida would have been exempted from the head tax ban, and then only temporarily.

A growing number of communities have levied the perpassenger tax to boost airport revenues and many others are planning it. But congressional critics of the practice said there was no uniformity in the taxes or in the method of collecting them.

The biggest city spared by the veto was Philadelphia, which slapped a \$2 head tax on both arriving and leaving passenger's -which many have refused to pay.

The proposed ban was included in a bill boosting minimum, authorization levels for federal grants-in-aid for airports across the country to expand or modernize in the next two fiscal years

Under it, the minimum grant levels for air carrier and subsidiary airports' would have million; for general aviation airports from \$30 million to \$37.5 million and for airport development grants from \$840 million to \$1.68 billion

Distilled water is sometimes recommended. Since this pesky disease is caused by a virus, it can reoccur. 11/2 cupe butter or margarine, softened

- 1 cup sugar 1 cup light or dark molasses
- 1/2 cup boiling water
- 1 teaspoon shit
- 1 tablespoon ground cinnamon
- 2 teaspoons ground ginger
- 6 cups unsifted all-purpose flour or enriched unbleached flour
- 1 can (16½ ozs.) prepared vanilla
- frosting 1 can (161/2 ozs.) prepared chocolate
- frosting Red and Yellow food coloring
- Candy corn, licorice strings, multicolored chocolate candy
- 1. In large bowl with electric mixer at medium speed, beat butter until smooth; gradually add sugar, beating until light. 2. At low speed add molasses and boiling
- water, Beat until smooth, scraping side of bowl with rubber scraper.
- 3. At low speed add salt, cinnamon and ginger. Add flour, 2 cups at a time, stir-
- ring with spoon until blended. 4. Turn dough onto sheet of heavy-duty
- foil. Wrap securely and refrigerate for at least 2 hours. (Or you can make dough I day and bake cookies a few days later.)
- 5. Make cardboard patterns for cookies. Draw jack-o'-lantern, owl, ghost, witch's hat and cat, each about 5 inches tall by
- 3-4 inches wide.*

cool completely.

- 6. Roll out 1/3 of dough at a time, 1/4-inch. thick, on a lightly floured board. A pastry cloth for the board and a stockinette cover for the rotting pin make rolling very easy.
- 7. Preheat oven to 375°F. Lay patterns on dough and cut out cookies. Reroll any remaining dough. If dough gets too soft, refrigerate. Place cookies on ungreased cookie sheets. Bake 10-12 minutes, or until done. Cool 1 minute, then remove from cookie sheets with spatula to wire rack;
- 8. Decorate cookies with frosting. Color vanilla frosting orange with a few drops of red and yellow food coloring if desired for jack-o'-lantern. Make faces with candy corn, licorice and chocolate candy.


FW: Talking about morality, what do you think of permissiveness in films?

He found that truly self-actualizing people—those who have developed their abilities and capacities and are expressing them—"have a feeling of belongingness and rootedness, they are satisfied with their love needs, they have status and place in life and respect from other people, and they have a reasonable feeling of self respect." To the extent you have achieved this, you are realizing your full potential.
- 2. True according to the findings of psychologists James F. T. Bugental and Seymour I. Zelen, which form the basis for an established technique in exploring human personality Briefly, in simplified form, this is how it works. Just ask yourself this question: "Who am 1?", and write down the first thing that occurs to you - anything you wish. If your ... answer to the question is "Why, I'm me," or "Myself," or "John Jones," this indicates that you do have a strong sense of personal identity However, if you answer "I'm a lawyer," or "A banker," or "A housewife," this strong-It suggests that your personality is being submerged by your occupation-that you think of vourself as what you do, not who you are. If you answer with a nonpersonal description of vourself, such as "I'm a man," or "I'm a girl," or "I'm just a human being," etc., this indicates that you are lacking in a strong sense of identity.
- 3. Irue The introvert has the edge here. He is more self-aware—because his thoughts tend to focus inward, on himself—than the extrovert, who is more interested in other people and in things outside himself. However, the introvert does not always make constructive lise of his self-knowledge, for he lacks the extrovert's capacity for translating his thoughts into action. And thought without action is likely to be unproductive and lead nowhere.



ack in 1931-I was only a small child at the time my family rented a summer cottage at Conneaut Lake, Pa. We frequently ate at the Conneaut Lake Park Hotel because, according to my parents, the food was excellent, and they enjoyed the dinnerhour dance music of Freddy Carlone's orchestra.

One of the band's chief attractions was a young singer who specialized in "crooning." Bing Crosby, was then the top crooner, and I can still remember many of the lake people listening to the youngster sing (he couldn't have been more than 18) and commenting, "This fellow will give Bing a run for his money-if he has the gumption to stick with it." The reason they might have had doubts was that the boy had a likable, easygoing poise that made him seem a bit, well, lethargic.

Often the young man would visit our table and talk with my parents. After dinner, he usually invited me to the edge of-the bandstand, where I sat on his ice-cream-parlor chair (it was sort of a trademark of his act) while he sang.

As the summer wore on, I developed a regular "crush" on the young singer. Was I the envy of the sandbox set on those days he'd join us at the beach and romp with me!

The years passed, and I soon forgot all about that summer at Conneaut Lake. Then, one day in the early 1940's, I turned our radio up to "teenage" volume to hear a new smash hit called "Prisoner of Love." It was being sung by a bobby-sox sensation named Perry Como. I had never seen his picture, but just the sound of his voice made me swoon all over.

My mother came in, turned the loudness down, and said, "Norma, just because he used to be your boyfriend, you needn't bring down the walls!"

Boyfriend? Me? Perry Como? And then it all came back. The young man who sang to me on the ice-creamparlor chair . . . those days we spent on the beach . . . that relaxed, boy-next-door manner.

Although the sand castles we built together quickly dissolved into the lake, and many of the songs have faded, my childhood memories of that likable young man, who the adults said seemed to lack "gumption," will remain till the day I die.

LEN DAWSON, Quarterback: The Scandal That Almost Wrecked His Life

Len Dawson, the 37-year-old field general of the Kansas City Chiefs, is proving that pro quarterbacks, like old wine, improve with age. He had one of his best seasons last year, his 15th as a pro, when he led the Chiefs to the championship of the western division of the American Football Conference and completed passes for gains of 2,504 yards, second highest total in the AFC. He's hoping to bring Kansas City another Super Bowl championship this year as he did in 1970, when he directed his team to a startling upset of the Minnesota Vikings, ... Toawson, known as the "Iceman" for his coolness, was troubled by tendonitis early last season, and some said his arm was dead. It wasn't -he threw one crucial touchdown pass after another. His most severe ordeal came during the Chiefs' Super Bowl year. He injured his knee early in the season. Surgery was advised. But he gambled that he could just rest the knee for several games and come back for the homestretch drive. The gamble paid off, But then, five days before the Super Bowl game, big headlines linked him to a gambling investigation. "I felt like a criminal," he recalls, "even though I was entirely innocent. 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




