## Dying Romanian thanks US press for reunion

CHICAGO (UPI) —Doina Vircol visited her father quietly Saturday, the second day of the reunion that fulfilled his dying wish. They thanked the free press that they were together.

Prof. Vasile Postecu, who fled Communist Romania in 1941 and took the oath of American citizenship on his deathbed Tuesday, was reunited with Mrs. Vircol and first met his 15-month-old grandson, Alexander, Friday night.

Mrs. Vircol fought international red tape for more than a month in order to visit him.

Postecu, a poet and professor at Mankato, Minn., State College, is dying of stomach cancer, his doctor says, and his only days to live. His fondest wish, to see Doina and her son before he died, seemed doomed to be unfulfilled when the Romanian government repeatedly refused to grant her a passport to visit the United States.

Officials at Columbus Hospi-

tal, where Postecu came to be under the care of a fellow Romanian refugee and lifelong friend, Dr. Alexander Ronnett, said they told newsmen of the poet's unfulfilled dying wish in hopes publicity would lead the Romanian government to grant Mrs. Vircol and her son travel papers.

"The dying poet knows that he would not have seen his daughter and grandson if it had not been for the news of his quest throughout the world," James Monahan, director of information at Columbus Hospital said.

At Postecu's request, Monahan said, newsmen and photographers crowded into his hospital room for his reunion with Mrs. Vircol Friday night after her 16-hour flight from Romania.

"It was his wish that the world would know what the power of the free press would do," Monahan quoted Postecu as saying. "He thanked the free press and U.S. government

TWIN FALLS — You and the fish can live with — and in — water from the Snake River aquifer with complete safety.

That's the latest word from the experts at the Atomic Energy spread at Arco. It comes from the Health Services Laboratory of the Idaho operations office as an answer to all the concern felt three years ago when a "bury the atomic waste" program gave weight to the theory the aquifer water would be contaminated.

Original protests came from officials of the

Snake River Trout Farm near Buhl. Then Gov. Don Samuelson joined in, together with Idaho's congressional contingent, other trout farm operators and also city officials in Twin Falls. Our concern came because local residents drink aquifer water coming through the Blue Lakes on country club property.

The rumpus caused a shift in the waste burial procedure and it also sparked an investigation of high order. The aquifer, which spread under the lava on the north side of Snake River canyon, emerges as springs all up and down the canyon wall in this area. It is the biggest underground water source in the world. The

interior flow is estimated at one billion gallons per day.

Until now the stipulations concerned with water safety have been somewhat guarded but the current report states outright that none of the offsite water samples collected contained concentrations of radio activity above the detection limits of the analysis. The water samples have been collected biannually at the offsite areas and every two weeks at the onsite points. Onsite sampling spots are in and around Arco. Other sites are scattered.

Two main sample sites are in this area, one in Minidoka County and the other in Lincoln

County. At spots near Minidoka and Dietrich the samplings were made — and are being continued — in the fields of underground water, dosimeter readings, milk samplings and wheat samplings.

Officials said Saturday the comprehensive monitoring program showed — in addition to the water results — that increases in air concentrations offsite due to NRTS releases were indistinguishable from the natural radioactivity of the air. None of the offsite well water or surface water samples contained any gross alpha, gross beta or tritium activities above the detection limits of the analysis.

## B52's blast Viet port

SAIGON (UPI) —U.S. B52 heavy bombers flew three missions over North Vietnam Saturday night, a sharp decrease from the 12-13 raids made by the Stratoforts daily for the past five days, the U.S. command reported Sunday.

A command spokesman said the three strikes were aimed at suspected supply caches south of the port city of Vinh, about 135 miles northwest of the Demilitarized Zone (DMZ). No reason was given by the command for the sudden drop in missions.

The command also reported a B52 was damaged by a surface-

to-air (SAM) missile while on a mission over North Vietnam Wednesday—the same night another B52 crashed in Thailand after being hit by a missile.

The crash was the first reported combat loss of a high-flying heavy bomber.

A command spokesman said the second B52 received only minor damage from the SAM and was able to return to its base at U-Tapao, Thailand. None of the six crew members was injured.

"The damage did not hinder the accomplishment of the bomber's mission," the spokesman said. He declined to say where over North Vietnam the missile hit. The B52 that crashed was hit near Vinh.

For three days after the Stratofort crashed, the Vinh area was hit by nine waves of B52s a day. A mission consists of at least three planes each carrying an average of 30 tons of explosives.

## Syrian guns hit Israelis

Syrian gunners pounded Israeli army positions on the occupied Golan Heights Saturday with intensive artillery and mortar fire that Damascus said was in retaliation for an Israeli machine gun and mortar attack. It was the third flareup of fighting in five days on the tense frontier.

A Damascus military spokesman said Syrian big guns scored direct hits on two Israeli positions on the heights which Israel captured from Syria during the 1967 Middle East War.

But Israel's military intelligence chief, Maj. Gen. Ellahu Zeira, termed the shelling "an intended provocation meant to intensify tension in Israeli-Syrian relations." He told the United Nations Truce Commission it was a "clear violation of the cease-fire."

In a move unprecedented since the Middle East cease-fire went into effect 27 months ago, Israel signaled Egypt through the Truce Commission that it should not misinterpret facts in the latest incident with Syria and be drawn into the conflict.

A command communique said Zeira denied statements by Damascus that the bombardment was a response to Israeli firing into Syrian positions.

The Israeli military command the Syrian bombardment lasted a half-hour along a 13-mile front on both sides of Quneitra in the central sector of the heights. A Tel Aviv military source said Israel did not fire back because of a desire not to heat up the conflict along the frontier.

The Tel Aviv command said the shelling scored neither damage nor casualties, but a Syrian communique said the shelling scored "direct hits" on Israeli military positions at Quneitra and Kafar Nafak.

## Vietnam session recessed

NEW YORK (UPI) —President Nixon interrupted a holiday weekend in New York Saturday for a meeting with his chief Vietnam negotiator, summoned back from the suspended Vietnam peace talks in Paris.

Dr. Henry A. Kissinger returned late Saturday night and immediately went into a meeting with the President on the 36th floor of the Waldorf Towers, where Nixon and his family were staying for a weekend of theatergoing and Christmas shopping.

White House spokesman Ronald L. Ziegler said the President-instructed his envoy to return to Paris next Sunday and resume the talks Dec. 4.

Ziegler said the United States was "proceeding with a constructive attitude" in the talks, prepared to extend the sessions as long as necessary to reach agreement. He indicated that the recess was needed in order to consult with the South Vietnamese.

Nixon called Kissinger back following a two-hour meeting between Kissinger and North Vietnamese Politburo member Le Duc Tho and Tho's chief deputy at the talks, Xuan Thuy.

Both sides announced simultaneously earlier Saturday a recess until Dec. 4 in the negotiations which the President had hoped would produce

a cease-fire in time to bring U.S. prisoners of war and most of the remaining 20,000 American troops home from Vietnam by Christmas.

Nixon and Kissinger met in the sitting room of the Waldorf's seven-room presidential suite. Kissinger had two briefcases on the couch beside him and talked in low tones with the President while photographers recorded the beginning of the session.

White House Press Secretary Ronald Ziegler announced earlier that Nixon would receive a special envoy from South Vietnamese president Nguyen Van Thieu early next week. This suggested that objections raised by Thieu to the proposed nine-point accord were at least part of the snag in the negotiations.

Nixon's decision to break off the talks temporarily by summoning Kissinger home followed reports from diplomatic sources in Paris that the South Vietnamese objections had raised serious problems.

The Washington Post, quoting a source close to the North Vietnamese, reported that at one point in Thursday's session, North Vietnamese diplomat Le Duc Tho, "usually a reserved negotiator, became so angry that he began shouting and pounding on the table."

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## Meteorite?

TWIN FALLS — Officials said Saturday the bright light which some persons took to be a plane going down west of the Twin Falls airport Friday night was probably a meteorite.

One Idaho State Police officer and a city policeman reported seeing the light about 7:30 p.m. Friday. Several residents in the area between Twin Falls and Buhl also reported it. While some thought it was an "unidentified flying object," most agreed it probably was a meteorite as it entered the atmosphere and sped toward the ground.

Federal Aviation Agency officials in Burley said there were no planes in the area according to their reports and there were no crashes reported.

## Wreck at Gooding injures 2 girls

WENDELL — A Wendell girl was reported unconscious but in fair condition Saturday evening after being injured in a one-car accident early in the day.

Hospitalized at Gooding Memorial Hospital, Gooding, was Daria Ruzicka, 15, a passenger. She was hit by a fence post which came through a window of the car.

The driver, Stephanie Hoekstra, 14, Wendell, was admitted to St. Benedict's Hospital, Jerome, for treatment of cuts, bruises and shock.

Gooding County Sheriff's officers said the accident occurred two miles west of Wendell about 3:35 a.m. Saturday. The driver lost control of the car, which skidded sideways 180 feet, went off the left side of the road and hit a rail fence, officers said.

One of the posts pierced the window of the car, striking Miss Ruzicka in the head. Officers said both girls were thrown out of the car.

Investigation of the accident is continuing.

## All lit up

# Viet snags assorted

PARIS (UPI) — The snags in the Vietnam peace talks range from the elaborate planning needed to set up an international peace-keeping force to objections by South Vietnam,

according to sources close to the talks.

The Washington Post, quoting a source close to the North Vietnamese, reported that at one point in Thursday's session,

North Vietnamese diplomat Le Duc Tho, "usually a reserved negotiator, became so angry that he began shouting and pounding on the table."

Diplomatic sources told UPI correspondent Aline Mosby that the problem of an international commission to police a cease-fire was delaying settlement.

The problems ranged from what uniforms the peace-keeping forces will wear, if any, to who will foot the bill.

The "unpries," the experts said, would not be a military force as were the U.N. forces that tried to keep the peace in Cyprus and along the Suez canal. They would be military officers or diplomats carrying only personal defensive weapons and would bring in no other equipment to Vietnam

except cars, the sources explained.

A Radio Hanoi broadcast Saturday indicated that South Vietnam President Nguyen Van Thieu's demand for a troop pullout had been presented anew by U.S. negotiator Henry A. Kissinger and was a source of extreme difficulty.

"If the Americans had kept their promise, the war would have ended, peace would be restored on the basis of national rights and self-determination for the Vietnamese people (and) the U.S. also would have found the only way out of their tunnel," the broadcast said.

But the Washington leaders used the excuse of... (Thieu's) disagreement to delay the signing."

# Henry confers with US chief

There were these developments that shed light on the closely guarded talks held in two villas outside Paris last week:

—Diplomatic sources close to the talks in Paris told UPI that arrangements for a peace-keeping force of international umpires to oversee a possible cease-fire had become complicated and might not be concluded on 1 January. The U.S. had wanted the international force on hand when the cease-fire began.

—The White House announced

that Nixon would meet with a personal representative of Thieu to hear the South Vietnamese position first-hand. Thieu had requested such an audience in order to avoid going through Kissinger as an intermediary. Thieu has objected strenuously to provisions of a treaty drafted by Kissinger last month which would not require the North Vietnamese to withdraw an estimated 140,000 troops from South Vietnam.

—Radio Hanoi, in a broadcast Saturday, accused the United States of stalling negotiations by supporting Thieu's demand for withdrawal of North Vietnamese troops.

—The Washington Post reported that sources on the Vietnamese side said the status of the talks was "very gloomy" because the United States had reintroduced most of Saigon's objections to the draft treaty. The North Vietnamese replied to the "revised" American demands by restating their earlier demand that Thieu resign immediately, the Post said.

—The Saigon newspaper Tin Song, financed by Hoang Duc Nha, nephew and close adviser to Thieu, quoted "highly placed sources" at the talks as saying "despite the intense atmosphere in the negotiations in Paris, one does not see yet any optimistic note emanating from it."

TWIN FALLS — A student candidate for the Dec. 19 College of Southern Idaho trustee election said today he favors replacement of two CSI staff members.

If elected, Stanley Wachtstetter said, he would work to eliminate Dr. Bruce Harrison, librarian, and H. L. Van Slyke, secretary of the board and business administrator.

Wachtstetter, a 27-year old CSI student, is seeking election to the five-man board of trustees of the college, opposing

incumbent John Hepworth, Buhl.

Wachtstetter said he feels Van Slyke has been over zealous in fighting to retain the old elector's oath even after it became apparent it is contrary to the state code.

As for Dr. Harrison, the candidate said he believes him to be a "very inefficient librarian" and has also been discourteous to other members of the staff and has caused disharmony on the campus.

"If any further such charges came up after I were elected, I would fight with all of my ability to see these two are replaced," he said.

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## Military Cutbacks

Many sections of the country may feel adversely affected by the Pentagon's planned cutbacks in bases and civilian employment but this is the time for acceptance of changes that in the long run will mean a stronger country.

There will be ample time for planning new employment opportunities for those who will be displaced because of the declining needs in the Vietnam war and the urgent necessity for trimming the budget to necessities.

No announcement of the reductions in manpower and facilities is expected before the new Congress takes up its task in January. This may cause repercussions in Congress because while every member says he wants to save money, when the cuts affect installations in his district, he feels bound to oppose them and points to other places where cuts could be made.

Reductions should be made solely on the basis of national requirements, not political considerations. Military needs indicate some bases should be closed, others consolidated, and civilian manpower reduced so that money can be made available for new and better weapons and an

overall reduction in military expenditures may be achieved.

Defense Secretary Melvin Laird has promised to reduce spending by one and a half billion dollars this year and such a reduction can only be made by cutting down on bases without regard to local demands for retention of marginal or unneeded facilities.

Cuts are expected to be made in army maintenance and logistics areas, with no major installation slated for a complete shutdown. Rather, many small depots are expected to be closed, consolidated or cut back.

The Navy would like to get rid of older shipyards, possibly one on each coast.

Laird is striving to maintain active duty forces at a level consistent with minimum defense needs and to avoid cuts that would impair the nation's defense capability.

President Nixon, in his determination to hold total federal spending within a \$250 billion limit, deserves the support of every taxpayer. That means going along without complaining when reductions in military installations occur in your area.

## Heartrending

Passage of a special law by the West German parliament has cleared the way for resolving, in its legal aspects, one of the most heartrending stories of our time.

This is the tragedy involving several thousand children who were born with serious physical deformities because during pregnancy their mothers had taken a tranquilizer known in Germany as Contergan and in America as Thalidomide.

After years of delay caused by legal and procedural difficulties, the legislation gives the green light to a special organization, acting as

trustee for 100 million deutsche marks collected from the drug firm and 50 million donated by the Bonn government (a total of about \$46.5 million), to begin the distribution of award payments to Thalidomide victims. The payments will be in the form of pensions.

The surviving "Thalidomide Babies" are now between the ages of 10 and 14. American parents of children in that age range can give renewed thanks that the alertness of a Food and Drug Administration employee, Dr. Frances Kelsey, prevented a tragedy on the same scale in this country.

# Nader: Crusader Against Everything

WASHINGTON — The suspicion here is that the reason so many so-called faceless citizens are fascinated by the activities of Ralph Nader, crusader against EVERYTHING, is that he is constantly doing such delightfully outrageous things.

Now a U.S. District Court here is contemplating a Nader suit which would force the Treasury Department to recover thousands of dollars paid to top White House officials while they were working to re-elect President Nixon.

Nader and his Public Citizen Inc. have asked the court to order Treasury Secretary George P. Shultz to "recapture" for the government (read taxpayers) salaries "unlawfully paid" to

Charles W. Colson, Robert H. Finch, Herbert G. Klein and other unspecified members of their staffs, the White House staff and Vice President Agnew's staff while they "devoted substantially all of the working time" to the Nixon campaign.

In an era when most people seem to look only down on politicians, Democrats and Republicans alike must get a giggle out of Nader's action. This has always been a country that enjoys watching its public officials squirm. Besides, few working guys get time off from their jobs, with pay, to hustle for their pet candidates in the recent unpopularity.

Nor, I expect, does it matter that a double standard is involved. Over the past few

decades most Presidents, a majority of them Democrats, have used their staffs to hold onto the office; the prerogative is one of the rewards of incumbency. No matter. The average taxpayer has to be pleased that Nader has carried the issue into the courtroom.

Compared with the some \$76-million scandalously spent by both parties during the campaign, the dough involved is peanuts. Special Counsel Colson, Counselor Finch and Communications Director Klein each earn, or make, \$42,500 a year. Based on an Aug. 28 memo from Colson to the White House staff which stated that "Every single one of those" 71 days to Election Day "is a campaign day," the Treasury would be reimbursed only about

\$24,000 for the campaigning done by Colson, Finch and Klein.

However, there are also the salaries paid to those unspecified staffers, plus the cost of running the President's office. Nader's suit notes that the Nixon aides had "unlawfully enjoyed use of the extensive facilities of the White House and the Executive Office Building, including free office space, transportation, telephones and office equipment, all of which were paid for by the plaintiffs and other taxpayers."

Nader has another point calculated to put a crinkle in the judicial brow. It is that while Colson, Finch, Klein and other Nixon staffers were out politicking they were depriving the taxpayers of the services they should have been rendering to the President. Beginning with Harry Truman, the Presidents I've known have all made it clear to their aides that getting out the right votes in an Election Year was the No. 1 priority in the services

rendered department. If it means anything in these dizzy times, the law seems to be on Nader's side. Title 31, Section 628 of the U.S. Code says that appropriations for "the public service shall be applied solely to the objects for which they are respectively made, and for no others." A good lawyer, of which there are several in the Republican Party, could argue that the aides' politicking was a selfless after-hours chore pursued by dedicated patriots when other less devout citizens were knocking off eight hours in the sack.

Nevertheless, the suit can do no harm and might even cause a future President to be more circumspect in the disbursement of public funds for political gain. In any case, Nader's legalistic Nasty Parkerism is at least the stuff of which fun and games are made, and we could all use a little jollity. Have at it, Ralphie Baby, but try to leave 'em laughing.

### Waste And Want

As Sidney Harris says: "There are three ways to look at any public career: The sentimentalist remembers only how many home runs Babe Ruth hit. The cynic will tell you how many times he struck out. The realist is the only one who knows how many runs he batted in."

In politics, probably Mayor Dick Daley of Chicago holds the record for runs batted in.

This is Chicago. This city, once characterized by gangster violence and stockyard stench, now offers more culture than does New York.

Nationally, the Chicago image is that of a well-oiled political machine.

If Chicagoans see 37 city workers patching one hole in the asphalt, they cynically conclude that political payola is the price we pay for progress.

But are we expecting government to be more honest, more ethical, more vigilant and hard working than we are? It almost never is.

Let me tell you about the Chicago Transit Authority (CTA):

Chicagoans agitated for a generation to remove the city's buses and elevated commuter trains from private hands and let the city run 'em.

In the years the city has run them, the fare has gone from a nickel to 50 cents — and the CTA is still going backward by \$2.5 million a year and is still threatened by bankruptcy.

But when Better Government Assn. investigators investigated, they found the fault was not with pilfering politicians; the most waste was traced to lazy, goofing-off employees.

These investigators followed CTA work crews throughout an entire eight-hour workday, found many worked no more than 15, 10 or 5 minutes! All day!

Even on what they considered "hard days" none worked more than four hours. And on rainy days they did not work at all.

Fire them? You can't. Their union contract contains an "Inclement weather clause"

which says they don't have to work when it's cold or rainy.

And even in fair weather, work crews may take interminable time off to go shopping, drink coffee or, in some observed instances, drink booze.

And for whatever they do or don't do, they get paid for a full day at \$5.64 to \$6.77 an hour.

The payroll for these metal, electrical and Teamster union employees comes to \$14 million a year.

The CTA, by the way, is expected to fall \$19 million short in fiscal '72.

While this study zeroed in on transit workers, extravagant waste of manpower and money is observable in others of the city's several departments.

In this case, however, governments may be more honorable than the governed. Mayor Daley has been good for Chicago — and vice versa. Personally he lives modestly. The pocket-picking public extravagance of his gigantic monopoly derives less from crooked politicians than from goldbricking, featherbedding, parasitic workers who do not work.

WASHINGTON — Behind that anvil chorus of public bickering and intense whirl of backstage maneuvering and manipulating, the following is what is going to happen on the hotly embattled chairmanship of the Democratic National Committee:

(1) Mrs. Jean Westwood will either depart voluntarily, or be voted out by the National Committee when it meets in Washington Dec. 9.

(2) Robert Strauss, Dallas attorney and former Democratic national treasurer, will replace her.

Despite Mrs. Westwood's resolute talk about standing pat and holding onto the McGovern-bestowed chairmanship, she's had it — and privately knows that. As far as being a national leader, the Utahian is through. The inside fact is she has no consequential political support to back her fervent desire to continue as chairman.

That includes even McGovern and his landslide-battered leftist partisans.

Although they handpicked her as national chairman only four months ago, they have really washed their hands of her. Tip-off on that was McGovern's statement seemingly urging

Mrs. Westwood's retention.

But when closely examined, it turns out that what the South Dakota radical, in effect, actually said was, "Don't fire here now; do it later when things cool off."

State and national party leaders and others busily running for Mrs. Westwood are fully aware of this real import of McGovern's declaration. They are skilled at reading between the lines.

They are also just as thoroughly convinced that his influence in party councils is now virtually nil. In fact, anything McGovern strongly favors or advocates is certain to encounter widespread suspicion and vigorous opposition.

McGovern still may not know it, but like Mrs. Westwood he too has had it as a party mogul. The South Dakota leftist had his brief day in the limelight, and he's through now.

Former national treasurer Strauss has the inside track by a wide margin to replace Mrs. Westwood.

Various others are being mentioned, but none have the numerical and varied support definitely lined up for the Dallas attorney. He is far out in front in that regard.

### Second Cousins

Dear Dr. Thosteson: I know you shouldn't (and sometimes by law cannot) marry your first cousin because similarity of genes would cause damage to children.

But does this hold true for second and third cousins? My cousin and I plan to marry but are hesitating until we've heard the facts. Could you help us out? — S.A.D.

Marriage of cousins — first or otherwise — doesn't necessarily mean that children will be defective, but the risk is much higher.

Why? Because there are genes known as "recessive genes" which indicate a trait or characteristic of one sort or another that is minor and tends to be blotted out. Doubtless we all have them, but being "recessive" these traits tend to take a back seat and eventually disappear.

Tend to die out, that is, EXCEPT if the same recessive gene is carried by BOTH parents rather than just one, then the recessive genes reinforce each other.

If a potentially dangerous trait is involved, the baby, instead of having the trait in mild form, is likely to have it very strongly. As an example, cousins having a relatively mild eye disorder might have a baby with a severe eye disorder. I have seen children going blind from that particular circumstance.

Of course the problem isn't limited to eye defects. That's just one example.

You may ask, "But can't people have similar recessive genes even if they AREN'T cousins?" Yes, it can happen by chance, but it happens much more frequently with cousins, because they have such similar ancestry. The closer the relationship, the greater the danger.

But can't GOOD traits be reinforced? Yes, that can

happen, too, but the danger is that weak traits (recessive genes) are not likely to be recognized ahead of time. Not recognized by the average person, that is. Experience shows it happens, and that is why so many states forbid marriage of first cousins.

As the relationship becomes more remote (second or third cousins, or other blood relatives) so does the risk of defective children become less likely. But since there is some common ancestry, some risk remains.

So what are you going to do about it? My suggestion is that you get some counseling from a clinic or center that specializes in genetics. The number of such genetic counseling centers has grown considerably in recent years, principally in university or other large medical centers.

The question is so important to you that I suggest you consult such a center. Your regular doctor either can tell you where the nearest one is or can find out for you.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: I am concerned about an article that said when a female is X-rayed in the vicinity of the ovaries, the ovaries should be shielded as the rays could damage the chromosomes.

I am 27 and had my bowel X-rayed once and gallbladder and stomach X-rayed twice in the last six years, and my ovaries were not shielded. My husband and I would like to start our family now, but I am leery and afraid the baby might not be normal. Do you think the X-rays could cause damage to our offspring or am I worrying needlessly? M.W.

It is true that heavy doses of X-ray can cause changes — but these are the heavy doses used for treatment purposes. You didn't have any such doses for diagnostic purposes.

# After 3,274 Years Dead, King Tut Still Lives

Remember King Tut?  
He was 10 years old when he died. He was 3,200 years old when he was found by people of "our" world. Little is known about his life, his reign or his times. But today more people know about him than any other King. True, about all they know is his name — and usually the short version only — but they do know him.

And for the past six months the most precious pieces of funeral art from his tomb in Egypt have attracted a total of more than one million visitors to the British Museum in London.

Standing in line to see the display took more than three hours before it was possible to get inside. But it was well worth it. It was like seeing an old friend never seen before.

It was in 1902 when his practically undisturbed tomb was found by archaeologist Howard Carter. It was about 10 years later before the pieces in the tomb were removed and identified. And it was in the 1920's when King Tut really became widely known. It was not because he was something apart but because several persons involved in the finding and removal of the objects of art had died mysterious deaths. So King Tut was credited with putting a "curse" on those who had disturbed him.

That's another story, of course, and you can believe it or discount it. Our story deals with King Tut as such and starts when we first really heard a lot about him in the 1920's — some 20 or more years after his final resting place was discovered.

King Tut was not unique because he was a Pharaoh. He was unique because his tomb — of all the tombs in Egypt's famed Valley of the Kings — was practically undisturbed when first opened. Thieves had entered — but had left so much that the find was termed out of this world.

He died in January, 1343 B.C. His remains were uncovered 3,274 years later. His interment made him the most renowned Pharaoh in all the history of Egypt. The King, in mummified form, lies in Thebes within a massive rosy sarcophagus in a gigantic burial chamber. His personal and fabulous items were those on display in London.

His coffin was of gold. It weighs 2,228 pounds and at today's prices would bring a market price of more than \$1,750,000.

There are many articles at the London exhibit. Standing out among them are the gilded figure of the King as a harpooner (see

illustration); nine pieces of golden jewelry taken from his mummified body; three rare pieces of funeral furniture; four priceless statues; his golden dagger and the 21-inch long, solid gold portrait mask (see illustration) which was actually lifted from his mummified face.

So far as is known, the King was born with the name Tutankhten, was crowned as Nebkheprure, yet spent his youth as Tutankhamen. He was small in stature, standing 5 foot six inches. On his left cheek he had a small scar. The cause was

unknown. Apparently he was married to a cousin two years older than himself. She was the daughter of Nefertiti. At the age of nine he was on the throne of Egypt. At the age of 19 he was dead. How he died — accident, illness or executed — we will

never know. We do know that his funeral was magnificent.

Three modern jets transported the treasure from Egypt to London for the exhibit. More than 100 policemen were assigned to guard them and the great highway entering London was closed to all traffic when the items were taken from the airport to the museum.

We know that his tomb was looted at least twice. Fingerprints of the thieves were in many of the chambers when Carter first chipped a hole in the wall and looked inside.

Even traces of their footprints were found. Apparently the thieves were priests or people who knew the King well because they went right to the richest rooms in the tomb and took the most valuable items of that day — unguents and oils. The thieves even brought wine skins with them into which they poured the greasy liquids. Several were left behind and found by modern man. On the floor in one room was a bag of gold rings — either thrown away in haste or dropped. Back in the 20's and 30's the story of King Tut was known over the world. He still lives today — 3,274 years after he took his last breath and his remains were given to the gods of his day.

The door to his tomb was uncovered under 200,000 cubic feet of rubble. It was then that Carter stood on the first of 16 steps that led to the still sealed door.

Carter had come to Egypt as a draftsman and started digging in 1892. Later a wealthy individual — Lord Carnarvon — joined him and with his money and Carter's digging, the tomb was found and opened some 10 years later.

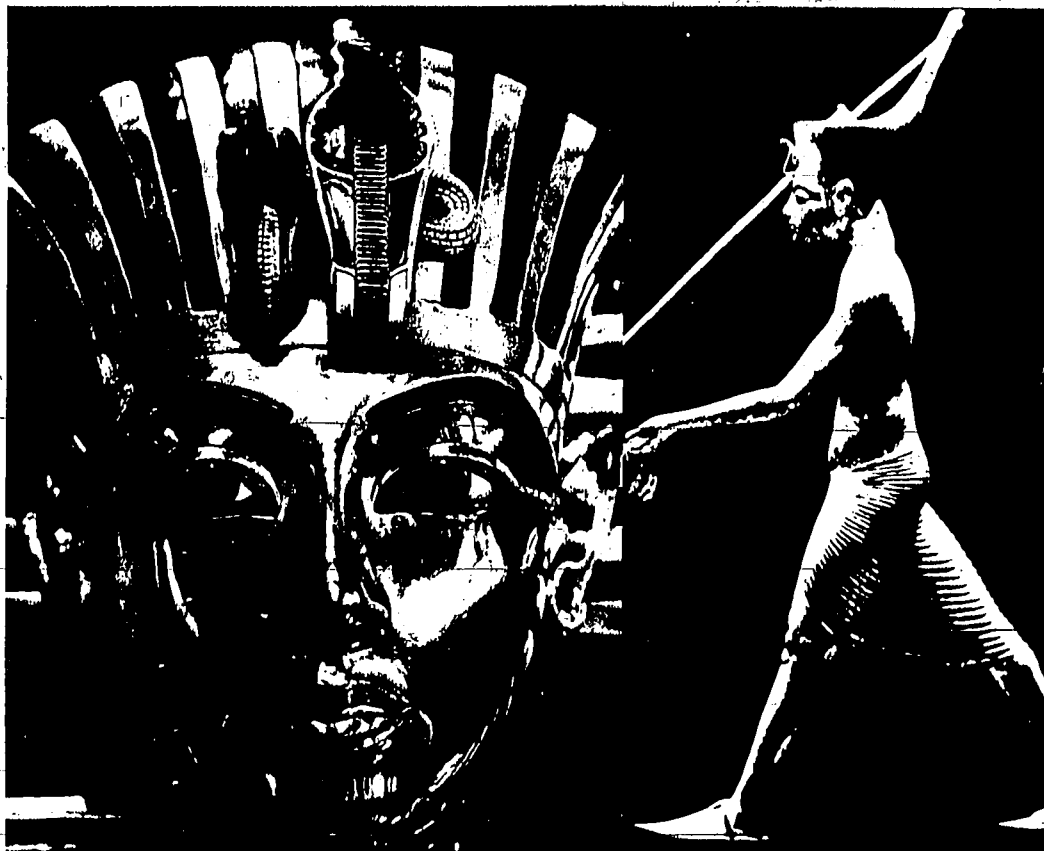
Both men were there when the hole was punched in the wall of the tomb. Carter was the first to look inside. History records he said:

"With trembling hands I made a tiny breach. Presently, as my eyes grew accustomed to the light, details of the room emerged slowly from the mist — strange animals. Statues and gold — everywhere the glint of gold."

The find could not be kept secret. It was an event heard round the world and occupied the headlines for more than 30 years.

And today? King Tut is just as alive as he ever was.

To those of us who remember the first widespread stories of this boy king, he will probably always live. And more than a million Britons feel the same way, after having a look at objects of art which shared the tomb in Egypt for all those long years.

The policemen talked about the MEN as if they were animals or only statistics. They never showed any sign of remorse over the loss of a human life, a brother in mankind. Nor gave any thought to the victim that was listening to every heart-breaking word.

When the ambulance arrived it had to park several yards from the accident due to cars blocking the road. The victim was loaded and sent alone in the back of the ambulance with the driver his only help. What would have happened if he had choked, stopped breathing or started bleeding? — just another statistic.

When I left the scene seven policemen were laughing, joking and still ignoring the public posing a traffic hazard on a curvy hill.

Respect your policemen and teach respect? How can we if we are only unfeeling statistics? PLEASE, can't someone help?

WASHINGTON — Concealed in the forests of Camp David, President Nixon is quietly but stubbornly designing a radically new Federal bureaucracy which will centralize power inside the White House to a degree never before attempted.

Many details await final presidential determination, but the intent of the drastic reorganization has now become inescapably clear: to devise lines of power and authority which will centralize all decision-making in the White House to about the same extent that Henry Kissinger now controls every aspect of foreign policy.

In blueprint form is a proposal to create four or five new Kissinger-type master bureaucrats working directly under the President. They would exercise fully as much control over their old-line departments as Kissinger now exercises over the State Department through the National Security Council (NSC).

What this means is that Mr. Nixon intends to take direct control of the sprawling and often immovable bureaucracy into his own hands, operating through his new master bureaucrats.

The categories of departments, agencies and programs that will be under the supervision of each of the new master bureaucrats has not been decided. Likewise, the enormously complex problem of staffing these NSC-type operations is wide open.

What is not wide open is Mr. Nixon's intention to use Kissinger's extraordinarily effective NSC operation as the prototype for gaining real White House control over the huge domestic agencies and make them more responsive to his own personal command. One predictable result of this: a further decline in the Cabinet, a process started under President Kennedy and accelerated under Mr. Nixon.

The President complains to intimates that he does not have the time or inclination to deal directly with the 11 members of his Cabinet. His first term made that insultingly clear to

Walter Hickel, fired as Secretary of the Interior, and George Romney, now resigning after four unhappy years as Secretary of the Housing and Urban Development Department.

Thus, the new blueprint fits Mr. Nixon's well-known distaste for dealing directly with officials outside the White House, making the White House Oval Office off-limits to mere Cabinet members. Dealings with the Cabinet — at least until Congress approves the basic reorganization plan it has refused to consider thus far — will be held to a minimum.

That March 1971 reorganization plan would have taken seven of the present 11 Cabinet-level departments and regrouped them into four conglomerate departments dealing with human resources, natural resources, economic affairs and community development. Only the State, Defense, Justice and Treasury departments would have survived, reducing Cabinet-level departments to eight.

Some such functional regrouping is still a key part of the President's second-term reorganization plans. With or without congressional consent, say White House aides, Mr. Nixon feels he can accomplish the purpose of his March 1971 plan.

Accordingly, the new Kissinger-type master bureaucrats would be given jurisdictions inside the White House roughly paralleling the 1971 reorganization, with responsibilities cutting across existing departments and agencies just as Kissinger's own responsibilities routinely cut into the State, Defense, and Treasury departments.

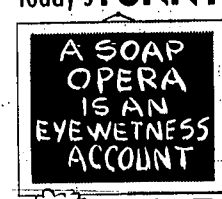
That would abolish the Domestic Council, created with high hopes in 1970 under John Ehrlichman, Mr. Nixon's top domestic policy adviser. Ehrlichman himself concedes to intimates that the council has been an abysmal failure for one reason — the reach of its jurisdiction across the whole range of domestic affairs, from poverty to peanuts, was far beyond its grasp.

The new plan being worked over at Camp David would split

the council into manageable units, each of them under one Kissinger-type master bureaucrat.

With these White House super-aides no more answerable to Congress than Kissinger himself, the President's drastic reorganization is certain to collide with the Democrats who control Capitol Hill. But Mr. Nixon seems more than willing to risk that encounter in trying to achieve his real goal: a Federal bureaucracy responsive to Mr. Nixon.

There is considerable concern at higher levels of the administration that the new relationship with China could go sour in the years just ahead.

Things are going well now. No great developments are in the works — nothing sensational, on the order of disarmament, trade, investment and credit deals, such as have been made with the Soviets. Nothing is expected in the foreseeable future.

But relations in general are moving along smoothly. Our contacts with Peking seem quite well based and unlikely to go bad.

The problem is that our relationships depend on the group in power in China now. That group may not last long. For one thing, the purges have been so thorough there are but a handful of powerful men at the top. All are very old. Some are sickly.

Even more importantly, there are signs of a deep power struggle. The reports are frequent and convincing.

What worries the administration is simple. They do not know who the men are who would succeed Mao Tse-tung and Chou En-lai. They

don't know what their policies would be or their objectives, whether they would favor rapprochement with the United States or a resumption of the cold war.

It is known that there are powerful forces within the Communist party in China who urge breaking off contact with the United States. It is known there are others who strongly favor the contacts with Washington. But information is so scanty on the second and third levels of Chinese leadership, how much power and how much of a following the younger leaders have, that

Washington has no inkling whatever as to how the dice will roll when Mao and Chou no longer rule.

Evidence suggests a balance of power in China is now so even and a struggle so intense that it has been impossible for Mao and Chou to fill major vacancies at the highest policy and administrative levels of government.

The infighting that preceded the death of Lin Biao continues unabated. There is a question of how much control the central government exerts outside the major cities and the central core areas. There are reports which suggest that leaders in some major provinces run their domains with little concern for orders from Peking.

Mao is sick and there is serious question as to how much he enters into the day-to-day affairs of state. Chou is undoubtedly the man on top today in the central government. In essence, it is believed, he rules in Mao's name, making Chou No. 2 in theory and No. 1 in practice.

In recent Chinese history, the man openly in line after Mao has inevitably gone down to oblivion — under the concerted attacks of rivals who might differ on everything else — but not in their common desire to bring down the chosen successor. Of late, both Liu Shao-chi and Lin Biao have been deposed.

It is uncertain how long Chou can last under the pressure despite the success he has had over the years in placing his followers in seats of influence and in disposing of his enemies.

## Navy riot probe ends

SAN DIEGO (UPI) — The final witnesses called Saturday by congressmen investigating racial trouble on the carrier Constellation included the skipper of the ship and the commander of the local naval Air Station.

Capt. J. D. Ward, the skipper, and Capt. Robert P. Mackenzie, commander of North Island Naval Air Station, were summoned along with two former Constellation crewmen, Firemen Apprentice J. L. Baker and Electrician's Mate L. K. Templeton.

The congressmen planned to leave immediately for Washington, D.C., after talking to Templeton, the last of the four witnesses.

Ward was called when the closed sessions started at North Island Tuesday, and he returned Saturday.

The officers declined to discuss their testimony to the House Armed Services subcommittee, headed by Rep. Floyd V. Hicks, D-Wash., and the congressmen did not reveal their lines of questioning.

Hicks said the panel would return to North Island Dec. 5 to open its inquiry into the racial disturbance on the carrier Kitty

Hawk, due here from Pearl Harbor at 9 a.m. Tuesday.

The Navy has announced that courts-martial for 21 sailors from the Kitty Hawk will begin Dec. 5. They are accused of rioting aboard the carrier as it cruised off Vietnam. They were flown here.

In view of the imminent arrival of the Kitty Hawk, the subcommittee was expected to extend its hearing to include officers and men from that carrier, too.

Lawyers from the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People called a news conference for late Saturday afternoon to discuss the Kitty Hawk rioting. They will defend the sailors accused of taking part in the 15-hour riot during which 46 men were injured.

The Constellation trouble came to a head early in November when 123 crewmen, mostly black, refused to return to their ship when it was docked at North Island. They accused their superior officers of racial discrimination.

One of the crewmen who testified before the subcommittee accused the congressmen of ignoring the issue of discrimination.

## Jordan voting record tops

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Len B. Jordan led the rest of Idaho's Congressional delegation in voting participation this year, according to Congressional Quarterly.

Jordan voted yes or no on 90 per cent of the 532 Senate roll calls. Sen. Frank Church voted on 83 per cent.

In the house, Rep. Orval Hansen voted on 84 per cent and Rep. James McClure on 59 per cent.

For 1971, Jordan's voting participation was 93 per cent and Church's 85; Hansen had 90 and McClure, 58.

## Probe set on reform

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sens. Charles McC. Mathias, R-Md., and Adlai E. Stevenson III, D-Ill., said Saturday they would open three days of informal hearings on congressional reform next month.

The senators said they would hold the hearings starting Dec. 4 to build a record on which an agenda for political reform can be based.

"We need to find ways to make the Congress more representative of the popular will, more accountable to the public, and more efficient and effective in the discharge of its constitutional responsibilities," Mathias and Stevenson said in a statement.

# Nixon strolls through crowd of New York holiday shoppers

NEW YORK (UPI) — President Nixon strolled among thousands of warm and friendly Christmas shoppers and downtown visitors at Rockefeller Center Saturday and expressed delight that the country's "spirit is really very good."

He joined hands with an Israeli and an Arab student; gave some sound academic advice to a 10-year-old admirer; chatted about football;

pressed bills into the hands of a Salvation Army worker and expressed delight with America's direction.

Nixon, Moshe Harel, 21, an Israeli, and Ismail El Sharnawany of Cairo, both students studying in New York, all joined hands in a gesture the President called symbolic.

"We all want peace in the Middle East," Nixon said. "And we all know the difference that

exists there but here in New York we're all friends. That's really the Christmas message."

He met a Salvation Army worker and donated several bills. "That's for your pot," he said, grinning broadly.

His visit to the busy midtown plaza with his close friend C.G. "BeBe" Rebozo was unannounced but it was not long before his presence was known. Other members of the First Family were shopping in midtown stores.

Several thousand persons followed his path in the crisp, sunny weather. At one point a small boy seemed in danger of being crushed between the crowd and the security men surrounding the chief executive.

Nixon reached out to the frightened boy, brought him

near and asked "Are you okay? You don't want to get squashed."

He soothed the youngster with small talk. "That's a pretty jacket," he said of the boy's green school coat.

The schoolboy, Alfred Brunner, 10, of Pittsburgh, Pa., broke into a smile and told Nixon he enjoyed studying mathematics but disliked English.

Nixon replied that he recently saw a movie on the life of Winston Churchill who also disliked English as a youngster but who later became a master of the language.

Then to the boy's mother, Mrs. Joseph Brunner, he said: "Make him do the things he doesn't like too well. Without that it's difficult to communicate."

## Pat eludes press

NEW YORK (UPI) — First Lady Pat Nixon, here for a holiday weekend with her husband, had some difficulty Saturday buying Christmas presents for her family and keeping it a secret.

Mrs. Nixon and her daughter, Julie Eisenhower, left the presidential suite in the Waldorf Astoria at midmorning on private shopping trip. But newsmen caught up with them at Saks Fifth Avenue store.

The First Lady ducked out of a side door and went across the street to Bonwit Teller where newsmen again found her.

She browsed for a while and then ducked out again, managing to give newsmen the slip

for the rest of the afternoon. A White House spokesman said the First Lady was simply trying to buy her husband a Christmas present and keep it a secret until Christmas.

Later in the afternoon Julie and the Nixon's other daughter, Tricia Nixon Cox, and her husband, Edward, managed to slip away for private shopping trips also.

Efforts to learn what the First Lady bought were fruitless.

Saks Chairman Allan Johnson said the First Lady and Julie were in the store for a half hour, but refused to say what, if anything, they bought.

# Peron hints he hopes to rule in Argentina

BUENOS AIRES (UPI) — Former Argentine president Juan D. Peron said Saturday he "hoped" his presence here after 17 years in exile would spark street demonstrations like those which vaulted him into power 22 years ago.

At his first news conference since his return last week, Peron was asked whether he would be a candidate for president in elections next March. He said "It depends upon the circumstances." Peron ruled Argentina for 10 years as a virtual dictator.

## Irish leader jailed

DUBLIN (UPI) — A special criminal court Saturday found Irish Republican Army (IRA) leader Sean MacStiofain guilty of being a member of the IRA and sentenced him to six months' imprisonment.

MacStiofain, weakened by a seven-day hunger strike he threatened to continue until his release, was carried from the courtroom in a chair.

As he was taken from the courtroom, a shower of coins spilled from the public gallery and someone cried "British traitor!" in apparent reference to MacStiofain's English nationality.

"I will be dead in six days," MacStiofain shouted back to the gallery and judges. "I will see you dead in hell before I submit — just you live with that."

A doctor told newsmen MacStiofain would die in three days unless the authorities began force feeding him.

Before passing sentence on MacStiofain, chief of staff of the IRA's Provisional wing, the three-judge panel declared Irish radio newsmen Kevin O'Kelly in contempt for refusing to testify in the trial and ordered him imprisoned for three months.

Workers employed by the national television and radio network Radio Telefís Eireann (RTE) walked off their jobs to protest against O'Kelly's detention.

It was an interview with MacStiofain broadcast over RTE last Sunday that led to the arrest of the 45-year-old Chief of Staff of the IRA Provisional wing. He was charged with belonging to an illegal organization under the offenses against the state act.

The IRA seeks to take the mainly Protestant Northern Ireland from Britain and unite it with the mainly Roman Catholic Irish Republic.

Asked if his presence here could spark a massive demonstration similar to that of Oct. 17, 1945, when his "shirtless" followers converged on the national palace and forced the government to free him from prison and call the election which he won, Peron replied: "I hope so."

Argentine newsmen were barred from the conference with the 77-year-old Peron who

looked fit and hearty. He spoke in the abstract and did not declare his candidacy.

Seated before a huge Argentine flag, Peron said, "A situation with certain similarities is presented. Then, there was a prudent and wise president, Gen. (Eldemiro) Farrell. There was a provisional government of the armed forces. Gen. Farrell made a clear-cut decision."

"He staged pure and clean elections, without conditions or prohibitions. It would be best that the present government repeat that action. Only that way can permanence and stability be assured for the future constitutional government."

"If something different is done, a new frustration will be prepared for the Argentine Republic. They must give our people the government that they want, or a new failure is born."

Argentina is currently ruled by a military junta headed by Gen. Alejandro Lanusse, who has called for elections in March. But Peron is banned from running for failure to meet the junta-imposed Aug. 25 residence requirement.

He returned from 17 years of exile, Nov. 17, and has pieced together a multi-party "Executive Commission for National Unity" which is attempting to persuade the junta to modify electoral ground rules, including a revocation of the residency requirement.

Asked if he would renounce the candidacy of his powerful Justicialista party, almost certainly the nation's largest, Peron said:

"How can I renounce what I do not have?"


## Laborites score win

AUCKLAND, New Zealand (UPI) — The Labor Party, after 14 years in the opposition, decisively defeated New Zealand's governing National (conservative) Party in parliamentary elections Saturday.

A provisional count showed that Labor won 56 seats National's 31 in the 87-seat parliament. The final count next week may switch one of Labor's seats into the National column.

In the previous 84-seat parliament, the National Party held 44 seats to Labor's 40.

Overall, Norman Kirk's Labor party took 48 per cent of the votes compared with 43.2 per cent in 1969 and National won 42 per cent, compared with 46 per cent.



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## Allive?

MARTIN BORMANN, deputy to Adolf Hitler in Nazi Germany in the 1930s and 1940s, is alive and living in South America, London Daily Express reported Saturday, "having bought Latin American presidents and governments like the rest of us buy cars."

"Nuremberg war crimes tribunal condemned him to death in absentia. Bormann reportedly died in Hitler's bunker as Berlin fell to Russian forces in May, 1945."

## Agents nab drug haul on border

WASHINGTON (UPI) — In what the government said was believed to be the largest catch of illegal drugs on the Canadian border in several years, customs agents seized 32.25 pounds of cocaine, the Bureau of Customs said Saturday.

The cocaine, valued at \$250,000 on the wholesale U.S. market, was found in a 1972 Chevrolet after it had been driven across Rainbow Bridge at Niagara Falls, N.Y., U.S. Commissioner of Customs Vernon D. Acres said.

## Back up benefit claim, pet food makers told

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Twelve big makers of cat and dog food, who account for 80 per cent of the nation's pet food business, have been given 60 days to substantiate advertising claims that their products are nutritious, meaty, balanced or otherwise good for pets.

Included in the companies named in the Federal Trade Commission order were Liggett & Myers, Inc., which claims Alpo dog food constitutes a complete and balanced diet, and Carnation Co., which alleges that Friskies Puppy Food is a new formula puppy food with "total everything."

The FTC said it was asking for the information as part of a continuing program to determine if major advertising claims are real. It emphasized it was not suggesting that the firms involved were guilty of any violations.

Among the pet food claims for which substantiation was demanded:

—Allied Meals Inc., Chicago, that Wayne Dog Food has nearly 9 per cent more protein than other leading brands, is completely nutritious, and is good for a dog's stamina, growth and digestive system.

—Campbell Soup Co., that Champion Valley Farms Recipe Dog Food is completely balanced.

—That Friskies Puppy Food, made by Carnation Co., is a new formula puppy food with "total everything."

—That Gainsburgers, made by General Foods Co., are meaty. The FTC requested identification of the meat content in each one.

—That Hart's Once-A-Month Wormer, made by Hart's Mountain Products Co., effectively aids in getting rid of

roundworms in cats and dogs by being added to the animal's dinner once every 30 days.

—That Nine Lives, a cat food product of H.J. Hines Co., is nutritious.

—That Tobby Canned Cat Food, a product of Thomas J. Lipton Inc., meets 100 per cent of a cat's daily nutritional needs.



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# Hijacker slain after 22 hours

FRANKFURT, Germany (UPI) — A 22-hour standoff ended Saturday when German police shot and killed a mental patient who had held a lone stewardess hostage in a parked Canadian airliner and threatened to dynamite the aircraft unless authorities freed a number of prisoners from German jails.

Police said 58-year-old Victor Widera was shot in the chest by a sharpshooter from a distance of approximately 70 yards. A spokesman said he was dead when police stormed the Air Canada DC8 seconds later in an attempt to rescue his hostage, Stewardess Margit Sommer, 31.

The German-Canadian stewardess had been in the plane since Widera took it over. She was unharmed and in "good condition," police said.

"He was a real muddle-head," a police spokesman said. He said Widera was known to criminal police; that he was born Nov. 11, 1914 in the town of Duisburg in Silesia, now Poland, and that he had a long record of various offenses.

The hijacker, who identified himself only as "Mr. X" in a series of ransom notes, tossed out of the plane during the overnight ordeal, had threatened to blow up the aircraft with dynamite Saturday afternoon if his demands were not met.

Widera boarded the plane at 3:35 p.m. Friday dressed in mechanics' coveralls when security officials ordered the 21 passengers off for a check after

Mary Jane Martin is the third child born to Mrs. Martin since her 52nd birthday, and came just two days short of a world record.

"Everybody said I wouldn't make it, but I fooled them," she said.

The attending physician reported the delivery successful and the child's health "perfect, just perfect."

Mrs. Martin was 57 years, 127 days old when the 9 pound, 13 ounce baby was born Friday. Guinness Book of World Records lists the oldest mother as Ruth Alice Kistler, who gave birth to a daughter, Susan, Oct. 18, 1956, in Glendale, Calif., at the age of 57 years 129 days.

Mrs. Martin said her husband Raymond, 54, is unable to work. "He digs ditches, but can't work," she said. "Doctors won't let him work, and there's no use operating or trying to get a job."

She said he "hurt his back real bad" and has hip trouble. The family lives on welfare and Martin's disability check and an extended stay in the hospital "is going to be pretty expensive," she said. "I think welfare pays half and I pay half."

The child was delivered by cesarean section at 2:51 a.m. Friday.

"I think she's a little angel," boasted the proud mother. "She feels like a bunch of cotton and she's healthy. That's what I'm glad about. I just wanted a healthy baby."

Mrs. Martin's oldest son, Louis, is 25. The other children range to a two-year-old son, Donnie Ray, and a five-year-old girl, Irene. Only the two youngest live at home.

Hospital officials couldn't believe the woman's age.

"Let me check on it," said administrator L. C. Baxter of Oklahoma Osteopathic Hospital, who looked up the record and then added, "It's true, but I still don't believe it."

Mrs. Martin was born at Carecook in northeastern Oklahoma.

# Searchers find Idaho hunter, 20

MOSCOW (UPI) — The Latah County sheriff's department reported Saturday afternoon searchers had found Lyle Heath, 20, Lewiston.

He had been reported missing in the rugged Latah and Clearwater county border area of northern Idaho since Friday.

Officers said Heath was found near Little Bear Creek, about 40 miles due east of Moscow and just inside Clearwater County in good condition.

Heath had first been reported missing early Friday after becoming separated from his father while hunting. He was last seen about noon Thanksgiving Day.

About 45 men were involved in the search through the rugged timber country, with men on horseback, on motorcycles and on foot. Three planes were also used in the search when weather allowed.

# Fleet in, sub hunt proceeds

OSLO (UPI) —The North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) permanent naval fleet in the North Atlantic steamed into the Norwegian harbor of Bergen Saturday, as Norwegian naval vessels and aircraft searched for a possible foreign submarine in the Sogne fjord only 47 miles north of the city.

The NATO fleet, consisting of six attack vessels plus several support ships carrying almost 2,000 sailors, arrived for "an official visit," defense officials said, adding that the visit was planned "well before" the submarine chase began Nov. 12.

The visit of the fleet, which returns from submarine-hunt training in the North Sea, has no connection to the submarine chase in the Sognefjord, British NATO commander John Fieldhouse told a news conference.

The fleet is led by the cruiser Norfolk.

As the Nato vessels arrived, about 30 Norwegian naval ships, including submarines, and aircraft combed the Sogne fjord for the mystery submarine.

The military command said the search party has had contacts, indicating that a submarine is operating in the outer reaches of the fjord.

It was the first time since the chase began that military officials referred to the unknown object in the fjord as a submarine.

Defense Minister Johan Kleppe said Saturday night in a radio interview that "various (sonar) contacts made during the past 24 hours confirm further that earlier observations must be taken seriously."

# Ruchell Magee's trial Monday

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Ruchell Magee, the "other defendant" in the Angela Davis case, goes on trial Monday for his role in the 1970, shootout that left a judge and three others dead.

"Miss Davis, a black Communist, was acquitted in June of murder-kidnaping-conspiracy charges stemming from the shootout in the Marin County Civic Center on San Francisco Bay's north shore.

Magee was in the court that day as a witness in the trial of a fellow convict in San Quentin where he had been imprisoned since 1963 on a robbery and kidnapping conviction.

Jonathan Jackson walked into the court, passed out weapons to Magee and two other convicts. The four marched out, holding the judge, an assistant district attorney and three women jurors at gunpoint.

Witnesses to the shootout said Magee emerged from the building holding a sawed-off shotgun taped to the neck of Superior Judge Harold Haley. After an exchange of gunfire between the escapees and law officers, Magee was found—the top of the judge's head was wounded and Haley was dead—blown off.

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## Directors charged by FTC

WASHINGTON-(UPI)—The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) said Friday it would challenge alleged interlocking directorates—illegal under federal law—involving three major producers of aluminum, copper and steel.

The FTC said it would issue separate complaints against the three firms and against two officials who allegedly serve on the boards of directors of two of them.

The targets of the action were Alcoa, the nation's largest aluminum company, along with Kennecott Copper Corp. and Armco Steel Corp. The FTC said it would also cite Russell DeYoung, identified as a director of both Alcoa and Kennecott, and John A. Mayer, identified as a director of Alcoa and Armco.

Federal law prohibits any person from holding directorships in two competing companies where either one has capital, surplus and undivided profits aggregating more than \$1 million.

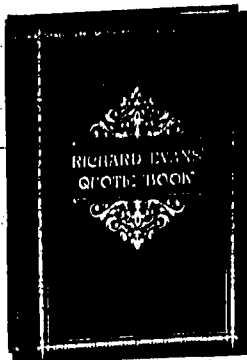

report four of the cranes—big seven-foot wing span—were white birds with black feet and—soon—flying over the Texas black-marked heads that have a Parthian.

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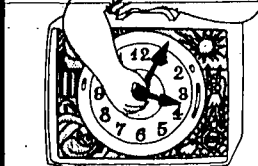
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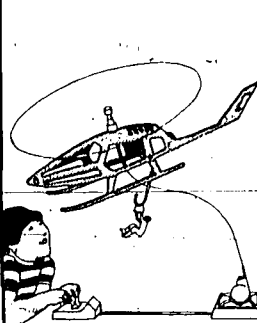

## Kissinger blocks Connally

BOSTON (UPI) — Presidential advisor Henry Kissinger has "effectively blocked" appointment of John Connally as secretary of state because of a feud between the two men, it was reported Friday.

In an interview appearing in the Boston Herald Traveler Record American, author-professor Charles Ashman said the feud began when Connally became treasury secretary and "invaded Kissinger's sphere" as advisor to President Nixon.

Prof. Ashman is preparing a book on Connally. He said his information is based on sources in Washington and the "Connally people."

Ashman, founding director of the Public Affairs Institute of University of Pacific at Stockton, Calif., said the relationship was strained socially as well as at the government level.

"It's reached the point now where it's a social game in Washington," he said, "to see which one comes to what parties. You're watched to see if you have Kissinger or Connally."

The feud was kept quiet so it would not inhibit Connally's efforts to influence Democrats to vote for Nixon, "because Kissinger has been insulated from domestic political involvement until the end of the negotiations with Hanoi."

Connally was reported the No. 1 Nixon choice for secretary of state, Ashman said.

"Kissinger and Connally are poles apart personally and politically," said Ashman.

Peter, who prefers to remain anonymous to protect him from "public stigma and humiliation," said his education has limited him to the "most demeaning, unskilled, low-paid manual labor."

Convinced of his inadequate schooling, Peter went to an attorney and a \$1 million suit has been filed against the San Francisco School District and California education officials.

Peter said he had an I.Q. of 100, which is considered average, when he graduated from Galileo High School.

His mother said she was repeatedly assured that Peter needed no remedial or special training, but when he graduated his reading was at the fifth grade level.

Peter said he'd like to go into photography if given the chance. His latest job pays less than \$50 a week as an equipment handler for a rock group.

Attorney Suzanne Martinez of the federally financed Youth Law Center said she filed the "landmark" suit and one of her goals is to get San Francisco Schools "oriented toward the end product."

She said children were entitled to reach certain "standards of proficiency" before being turned loose in the world.

The school district has already said it will seek to terminate the action, which asks \$500,000 general damages, \$500,000 punitive damages, and the cost already incurred by the teen-ager's tutoring.

# Wallace to nominate 25

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Gov. George C. Wallace will have a list of nominees for the 25 "wild-card" members of the Democratic National Committee to be chosen before its Dec. 9 meeting, his special representative said Friday.

Michael Griffin, an aide to the Alabama governor, said the list, which would bring the national committee up to its full membership of 303, will be submitted to chairman Jean Westwood next week.

Griffin said in a telephone interview that he had conferred with Mrs. Westwood and other party leaders since setting up a temporary office here in

preparation for the Dec. 9 meeting of the national committee. The aide to the Alabama governor said his mission was to seek representation in the party's national councils for Wallace Democrats, and that the governor was avoiding, at this time, the sizzling controversy over replacement of Mrs. Westwood.

He said under the proper conditions Mrs. Westwood, who was the personal choice of defeated presidential nominee George S. McGovern, would be acceptable to the Wallace faction, as would Robert Strauss, the former party

treasurer, who is regarded as the candidate of the party's conservative wing, to succeed Mrs. Westwood.

The 25 at-large national committee members will be elected by the 278 members already chosen and are supposed to provide a voice for Democrats who were left out in the reshuffling of the committee last summer. Griffin said he would submit a list of nominees for each category — elderly persons, ethnic representatives, labor, spokesmen and others — to be given priority in choosing the 25 new members. Griffin said there already

was a small bloc of Wallace votes on the national committee, but emphasized that the Alabama governor did not expect to engage in any kind of floor fight in his effort to broaden the party's appeal. Instead, he said, the effort would be to persuade the dominant McGovernites as well as other factions that the party will be unable to survive without giving the Democrats who back Wallace a proper voice in party affairs.

Griffin said the Alabama governor also was interested in the makeup of the still-unformed Commission to consider revision of the party's basic charter.

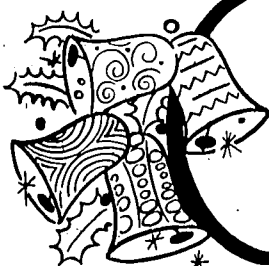

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## **GOP said weakened by vote**

The liberal Republican filson Society said Friday that despite President Nixon's landslide reelection, the GOP was weakened because it lost strength in the Senate and because of the lingering effects of the Watergate affair.

In an editorial in its monthly "Forum" magazine, the society said the "Watergate affair and what scandal" are probably criminal, the political sabotage is inexcusable and the failure to disclose campaign financing sleazy.

"Moreover," it added, "Mr. Nixon's failure to debate issues directly was based on a tactic of presidential invisibility that is hard to square with the ideals of American democracy."

The party is weakened, it said, "not merely because it lost seats in the Senate, but because it will have trouble dispelling the shady image of Watergate without a presidential house-cleaning."

The Republicans lost two Senate seats, but gained about a dozen in the House.

The President has been reshuffling his administration ever since the election, but there has been no outward evidence thus far that the break-in and attempted bugging of Democratic headquarters at the Watergate has played a direct role in his action.

The editorial also called on Nixon to develop a "coherent domestic policy to match his foreign policy" by using the Republican Party as an instrument of change.

## **Hospital ready for prisoners**

QUINCY, Mass. (UPI) — Preparations are under way to receive and treat American prisoners of war from Vietnam at the Chelsea Naval Hospital before Christmas, the Quincy Patriot Ledger reported Friday.

Capt. James M. Sanders, chief Naval officer at the Chelsea facility, told the newspaper that the preparations were being made as part of the overall "Egress-Recap program."

He said the hospital was constructing new facilities to adequately handle prisoners of war, the paper said.

He and other officers declined to give any specific details but would not deny the pre-Christmas deadline, according to the paper.

A federal official said the Department of Labor, in conjunction with the state Division of Employment Security, was involved in hiring personnel for the Chelsea facility.

The paper quoted him as saying the program had been given a top secret classification and he was unable to give any specific details "pending resolution of the international situation."

The new construction at the Chelsea hospital is part of an overall refurbishing program. Included is an intensive care unit and a new surgical section, the paper said.

## **American vet arrested in Philippine conspiracy**

MANILA (UPI) — The Philippine government Saturday revealed the arrest of an American Vietnam war veteran in connection with a "rightist conspiracy" involving top Filipino politicians to assassinate President Ferdinand E. Marcos and stage a coup d'etat.

Information Secretary Francisco S. Tatad identified the American as Edward Lehman whom he described as a Vietnam war veteran and a sharpshooter. Tatad said Lehman was one of several Americans involved in the attempt to kill Marcos before martial law was proclaimed last Sept. 23.

Tatad said discovery of the

conspiracy was one of the immediate reasons that prompted the President to declare a state of emergency.

Earlier, Tatad identified the first American implicated in the assassination plot as Lawrence Tractman, alias Larry Tractman, of California. He said Tractman had been traced by Filipino intelligence authorities to Hong Kong.

The other suspects in custody of Philippine authorities included one Filipino and a "non Asian foreigner" who were captured while trying to flee the country.

The "daring" assassination plot, the fifth since last December, was uncovered in

September when strict security measures were clamped on the Malacanang presidential palace, Tatad said. It allegedly involved the use of a sniper who was to cut down the president while he played golf in the Malacanang course across the Pasig River, as well as a scuba diver who was to plant electronically guided explosives to blow up a launch carrying the president.

"Evidence in the possession of the state indicates that the plot against the president's life was part of a rightist conspiracy ultimately leading to a coup d'etat before martial law was proclaimed," Tatad said.

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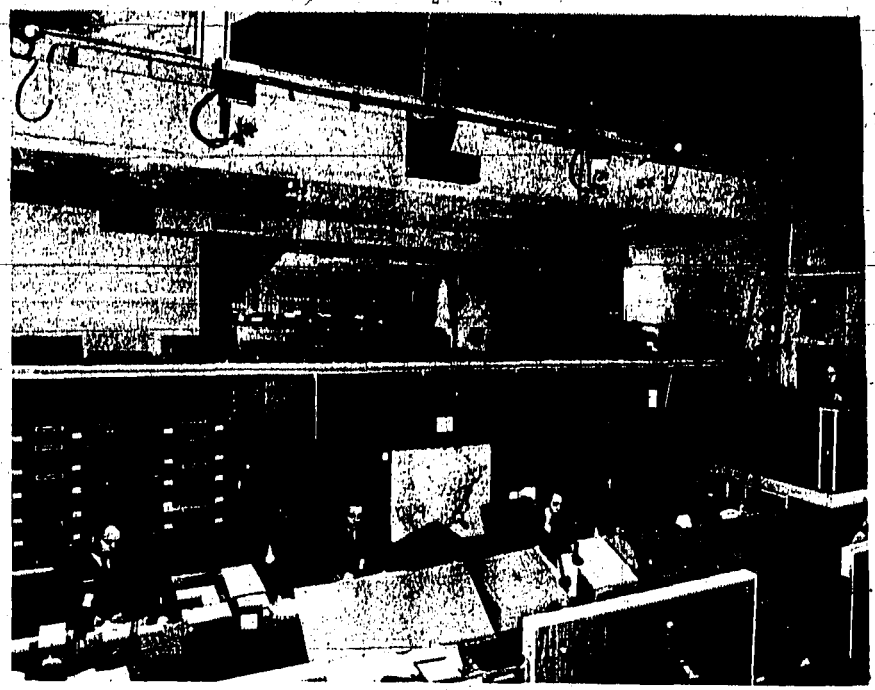

# Cheyenne Mountain 'peak' of DACOWITS winter meet

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. — Survival for North America's 220 million citizens is linked to a hollowed-out mountain in the Colorado Rockies.

Modern, electronic marvels, encased in buildings of steel, have been placed inside an ancient mountain to provide warning of attack by an aerial invader and the means to direct a defensive air battle.

Along the eastern range of the Continental Divide, south of Colorado Springs and Pikes Peak, is 9,565-foot-high Cheyenne Mountain. It shields a community — a steel city of 11 structures requiring a population of more than 1,800 to keep it functioning 24 hours a day, every day of the year.

This is the North American Air Defense Command's Combat Operations Center, one of the key points of interest for members of the Defense Advisory Committee on Women in the Services (DACOWITS) during their semi-annual meeting this past week.

Mrs. Norma Herzinger, Twin Falls, is Idaho's committee member now serving her second year of a three-year term. She met with 49 other DACOWITS members and the directors of the women's military components, Brig. Gen. Mildred Bailey, Army; Capt. Robin Quigley, Navy; Maj. Barbara Roy, Marines, and Brig. Gen. Jeanne Holm, Air Force, the host group.

During their tour of the North American Air Defense Command's Combat Operations Center, they were told the control of an air battle would be directed from right there.

First warning of air attack on Canada and the

United States would come from this underground fortress, and from it the defensive air battle for survival of the two nations would be directed.

At the hub of the combat operations center, a small, select audience sits in a capsulized amphitheater, the NORAD Command Post. They are top air defense experts of Canada and the U.S. — not just spectators, but those who play featured roles in the plots that unfold on the screens before them.

Sharing the bastion inside a mountain with the crew of the NORAD Command Post are technicians of NORAD's Space Defense Center, an Intelligence Data Handling System, a Current Intelligence and Indications Center, the U.S. Civil Defense National Warning Center, as well as elements of the Defense Communications Agency and the U.S. Air Force's Air Weather Service, 460th Support Squadron, and 47th Communications Group.

The crews are all new breeds of mountain men — these men at Cheyenne Mountain. They don't carry rifles or seek beaver pelts, as did the buckskin-clad fur trappers who roamed the Rocky Mountains more than a century ago.

These mountain men work inside the mountain, as mentioned, 24 hours a day, and they are there because an enemy CAN put missiles and bombs over North America.

Their job is to give warning of attack by aerial invader and direct the defensive battle.

Members of the DACOWITS committee all agreed it was an impressive sight — one that you wouldn't believe if you didn't see it.

TWIN FALLS — The new 19th Amendment was finally Equal Rights Amendment passed and ratified in 1920, pleases some and yet turns giving women the right to vote. others off.

This controversial amendment only gave the right to vote and did not grant women any other recent Defense Advisory type of equality under the law. Committee on Women in the Services (DACOWITS) by Mrs. Carole L. Frings, office of the general counsel, office of the secretary of defense.

I would like to pass on some of the information she gave, and perhaps in the next few weeks, bring you up to date on current state status, etc.

First a little history. The attempt to obtain equal rights for women dates far back, and yet, it is only in recent times that women have begun to achieve their objectives of equality in the areas of civil rights, employment opportunities and legal rights in general.

For example, although this country is nearly 200 years old, women have had the right to vote for only 52 years.

It wasn't until 1848 that women first actually organized to try to achieve equality under the law. This was known as the Seneca Falls Convention.

In the 1860s and 1870s, when the 14th and 15th Amendments were being proposed to the Constitution, to give blacks the right to vote and equal protection under the law, thousands of women sent petitions to Congress asking to be included.

They were told, "No. This is the Negro's hour, you must wait..." and it was a long wait indeed. It was 50 years before the

"Acupuncture" by Marc Duke. The author says "I saw more of acupuncture than I know how to believe." As you stand there watching the procedures, your scientific brain says, "My God, this can't be true."

"The Japanese" by Jack Seward. A unique and greatly needed book, written by an American who has lived in Japan over 25 years.

## Current Cues

By HELEN WALKER  
TWIN FALLS — With the last morsel of Thanksgiving turkey packed away until your family can face it again, Christmas cooking begins in earnest.

Christmas is too busy a season for hours of cooking, yet the highlight of so many holiday get-togethers is traditional gourmet food. There is nothing as gracious or warm as entertaining in your own home. Entertaining should be fun for the hostess as well as her guests — and the key is planning. The wise homemaker is cooking now for next month and storing pre-made festive goodies in her freezer.

Those prepared now and properly stored will be home-made delicious and save time and money next month when the schedule is more hectic.

Share these wonderful goodies with the people on your gift list. The work of your own hands adds doubly to holiday pleasures.

Most foods are freezable and will keep several months. Not only baked goods, but candies, yeast breads as well as hors d'oeuvres, casseroles and meat dishes can be prepared now, for use later when time is at a premium.

When pre-cooking, keep three things in mind:

- (1) Sanitary preparation. Do not overcook. Reheating will complete the cooking process.
- (2) Rapid cooling. This can be

dope by placing the hot pan of food into a larger pan of ice water or in cold running water.

(3) Immediate freezing. Space packages or containers at least one inch apart in freezer to allow air to circulate. Once frozen solidly, pack closely to save space.

The cardinal rule in packing is to use only clean containers, papers, foils, plastic wraps and bags and to eliminate all possible air spaces, except needed head space.

Every package should be labeled and dated. An inventory is helpful for meal planning.

Like everything else, a home freezer maintains peak performance when it is properly used and cared for. When frost builds up to one-half inch thickness in the freezer it is time to defrost.

Too much frost accumulation may overwork the machine and/or raise the inside temperature to where food keeping quality may be impaired.

To defrost, first unplug the freezer or turn the control to "off." Remove food and protect it from defrosting.

This can be done by packing in cartons or wrapping in newspapers. Try for a fast, dry job. Use newspaper and shallow pans to catch frost as it loosens and drops.

An electric fan or hair dryer directed at frosted surfaces helps speed defrosting, as do pans of slightly warm water.

Never use pans of hot water as this may damage the refrigerant system.

Only special wooden or plastic scrapers should be used to coax frost loose — never a knife.

After the frost is removed, the freezer is ready to be cleaned. And if you are one of the lucky homemakers with a frost-free freezer remember that it too needs to be washed periodically. Wash all interior surfaces with a solution of two tablespoons of baking soda in each quart of water.

Rinse with clear water and dry. Clean the door gasket with warm sudsy water, rinse thoroughly. Wash and dry the exterior with a sudsy sparging and rinsing. A coat of wax may be applied from time to time.

Use the vacuum cleaner attachments to clean the condenser coils from time to time. Cleaning the inside and outside of the freezer will eliminate odor problems as well as increase the efficiency of the appliance.

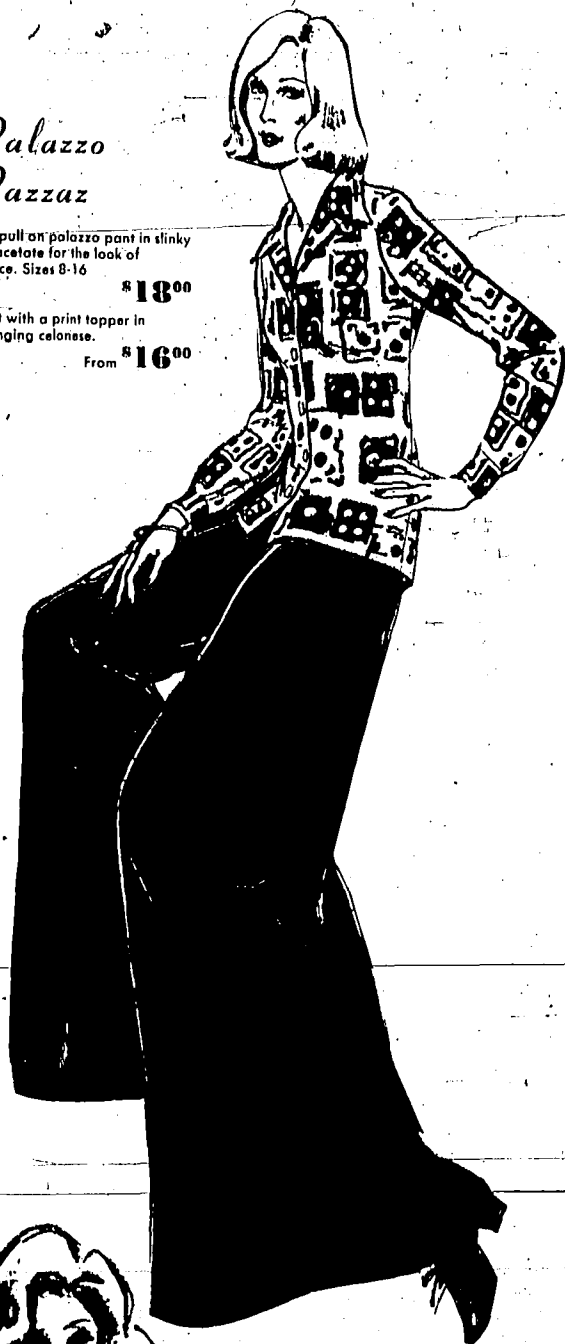

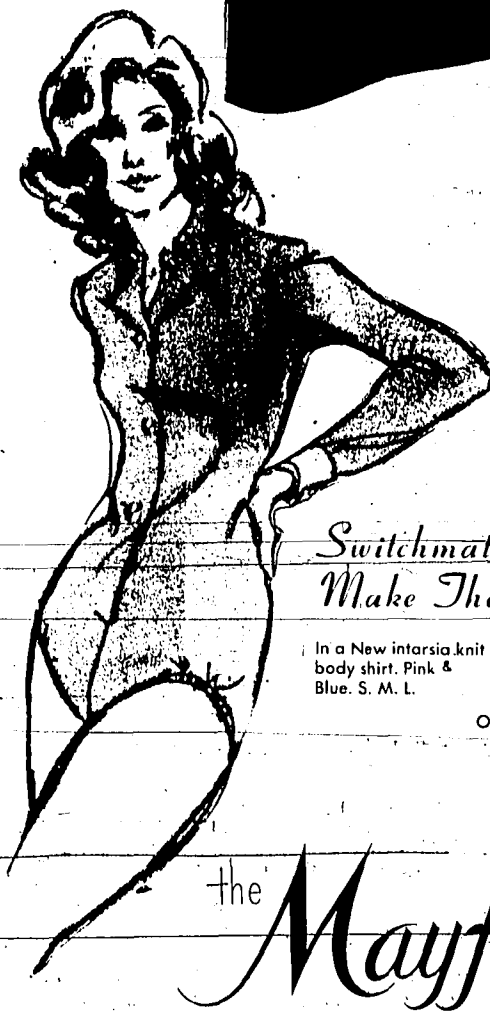

## 'Vow of silence' most complicating

**TWIN FALLS** — When a housewife takes a "vow of silence," there are complications aplenty. That's what happened at our home the past several days.

When our wife becomes worn down or catches cold, the result is a sore throat or — if the condition persists — laryngitis and loss of voice.

The most recent episode began on Wednesday evening when her voice began turning husky. By bedtime it was down to a whisper. Thursday morning it was only a whisper of a whisper.

First noticeable reaction was the tendency of the rest of the family to reply in whispers, even when talking with one another. When three lively youngsters turn down the volume that much, the silence is almost unbreaching.

Second noticeable reaction came at a church reception. There, several friends kidded both of us about her loss of voice and not being able to nag at her husband.

Some of the kidding ceased on the following Sunday when she passed up singing with the church choir because she couldn't make herself heard more than a few feet away.

But she hadn't started writing notes yet. That came the following morning when she rose from bed, found her voice wasn't improving, and imposed a vow of silence. She maintained it, too.

Said vow was upheld later in the day by a doctor, who also prescribed medication to combat inflammation and ice packs to reduce internal swelling.

In the meantime, some of the novelty of the situation was wearing off. The kids resumed screeching at each other, and also began trying to stretch their usual limits of behavior. Such tactics brought a reminder that their father was still able to speak loudly enough for both parents if necessary.

Then the telephone offered certain tribulations.

There was a call from a grade school room mother about Thanksgiving refreshments. This led to a procedure involving taking a message, relaying it to the voiceless one, getting a nod or note in return, and then replying to the caller.

The same technique was used a couple of other times with success. But then came another time when the phone rang. She of no voice picked up the receiver but said nothing. The silence on the other end of the line lasted for about two minutes, then the line clicked dead.

"I answered because I thought maybe someone was calling who knew I wasn't talking," she wrote later in the day.

Another, phone call was answered by the youngest member of the family.

"My mother can't talk," he told the caller. "Good-by."

There was no return call — to our knowledge — so the identity of the caller was never known. After three days of silence came the time for a return visit to the doctor. He advised his patient there was some improvement, she should keep on taking the medicine prescribed, and then said a bit of vocal communication would be permissible.

Best of all was when our wife was able to say — although in a barely audible whisper — that lunch was ready.

And from then on the household began the return to normal.

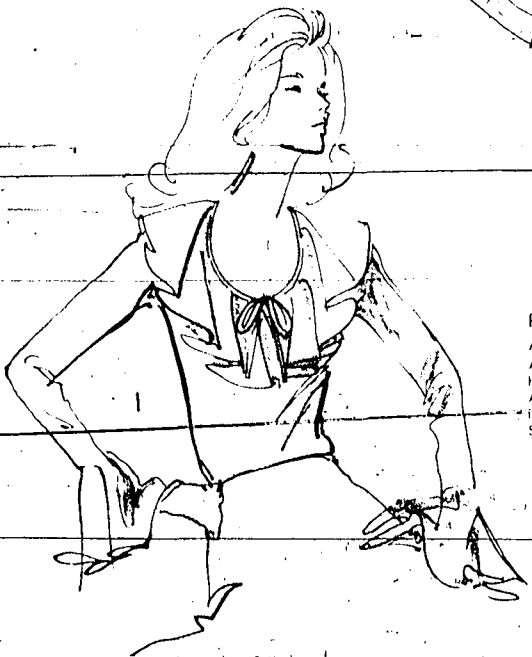

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# Idaho nips BSC 22-21 in last 3 minutes

BOISE — The University of Idaho Vandals, after weathering a Kamikaze third quarter by Boise State, saw frosh quarterback Dave Comstock run over a decisive two-point conversion with 3:14 left to collect a 22-21 victory Saturday afternoon.

Comstock's two-point run on a rollout came just seconds after he had run in from the 10. Idaho called timeout to ponder the situation, then went for the winning two-point. Still the Vandals had to weather a late bid by Boise State to pull it out,

the victory being cemented when Joe Larkin missed a 34-yard field goal attempt with 1:04 remaining.

Smarting from last year's 42-14 shellacking by Boise State and trying to salvage the finale in a 4-7 year, Idaho, helped by three BSC turnovers managed a 7-0 halftime lead. But as the second half opened, BSC, which has a reputation of being fearsome, almost maniacal at home, unleashed a shattered 21-point explosion in the first eight minutes. It's defensive unit held the Vandals to minus 24

years in their first three possessions and the Broncos went point-hunting after each.

The turn-about in this game came when Boise was poised at Idaho's 33 for the fourth straight time in the third period. Idaho

cornerback Randy Hall then picked off a Ron Autele pass and returned it 75 yards for the second Vandal touchdown.

That deflated the Kamikaze kids and steadied the beleaguered Vandals.

The result gave Idaho college no football champion for the second straight year as BSC, Idaho and ISU took turns beating each other.

Boise State lost two drives in the first half on fumbles and a pass interception with Idaho losing a couple possessions on interceptions — their bane all

day as BSC intercepted six.

Idaho used up half of the second quarter (8:42) in scoring, but a couple of pass interference calls — one after an interception — kept the drive alive.

The last penalty put the ball on the six-yard line and Bernie Rembert swept in from there. Jim Welch converted.

Idaho received the second half kickoff and lost 11 yards on three tries before kicking.

Boise moved 52 yards in six plays, the score coming on a 10-yard pass from Autele to Al Marshall. Joe Larkin added the

first of three conversions.

In a replay, Idaho punted out again and this time BSC moved 43 yards in two plays, the first a bomb to Marshall and the second an 11-yard scoring pass to Don Huff. After another punt BSC turned to a throw-back type pass from Autele to Billy Stephens for 19 yards and it appeared the rout was on when BSC intercepted the Vandals shortly after the next kickoff.

Then came Hall's big interception and things settled down.

Neither team muster much

consistency over the next several minutes. Idaho started its scoring march with about seven minutes left in the game.

Comstock, getting good runs from Awtry and Remebert, got off a big fourth down stick by hitting Darrell Burchfield, for five yards and the first down at the BSC 45. Awtry and Remebert then boomed the ball to the 10. Two plays later Idaho was facing third and long yardage. Comstock, who had run well at Pocatello high

school but hadn't tried it Saturday, faded to pass, saw an opening and scotched 10 yards to score. He got the two-point after fading back, looking for a receiver, to the 15-yard line.

Immediately after the kickoff, Autele rallied Boise State. The Broncos picked up big yardage on consecutive passes, twice to Huff and once to Marshall. But Idaho's defense arose after a first-down at the 10-yard line, the series eventually leading to Larkin's field goal that strayed wide.

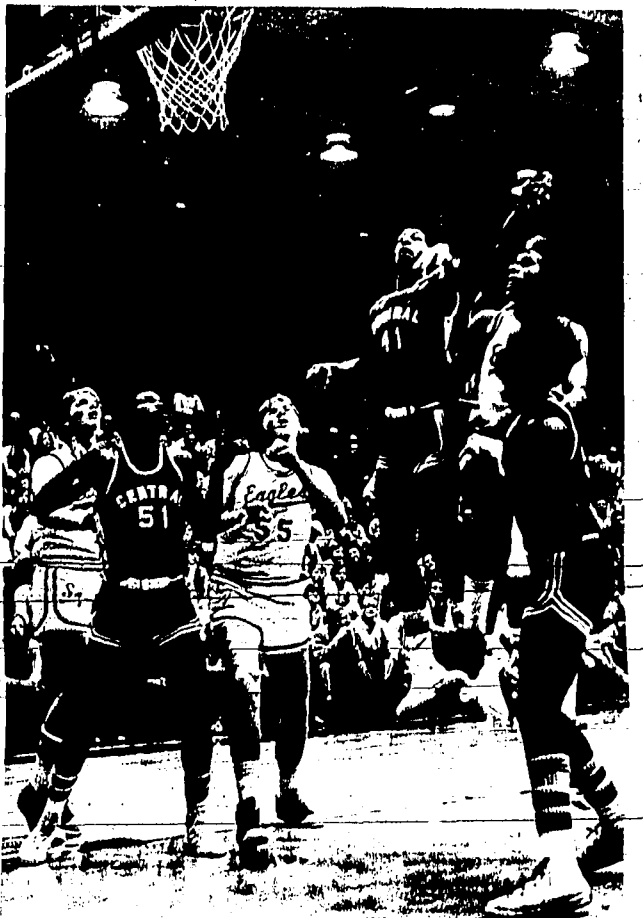

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa. (UPI) — John Hufnagel passed for 260 yards and three touchdowns Saturday to boost his bid for the Heisman Trophy in leading seventh-ranked Penn State to a 49-27 victory over Pitt, winner of only one game this season.

Hufnagel broke five Penn

State offensive records to bring his total to 10, highest number ever for a Nittany Lion player. The victory gave Penn State its second consecutive 10-1 regular season finish and primed the Lions for their Dec. 31 Sugar Bowl date with fourth-ranked Oklahoma.

The game dropped Pitt to 1-

10, its worst season in history and gave Carl DePasqua a 13-29 record in four seasons as Pitt's head coach. DePasqua was expected to be dismissed, although one year remains on his contract.

After being blanked in his first five attempts, Hufnagel connected with Jimmy Scott for a 31-yard touchdown pass, the first of four second-quarter touchdowns which turned the contest into a rout.

On the ensuing kickoff, Pitt's Stan Ostrowski fumbled at his 17 and reserve linebacker Tom Williams recovered to set up Bob Nangle's 11-yard scoring dash two plays later.

On Penn State's next possession, Hufnagel directed the Lions on a 61-yard scoring drive in six plays, hitting flanker Dave Bland with a 21-yard pass. Gary Hayman gave the Lions their fourth score of the period on a 60-yard return of Tim Hornish's punt.

A pass interception by Buddy Ellis in the opening series of the second half set up Hufnagel's third scoring pass, a 41-yarder to Chuck Herd.

Reserve quarterback Tom Shuman passed 13 yards to tight end Bob Richebach for the Lions' sixth touchdown, after Hufnagel set up the score on a 43-yard pass to fullback Ken Anderson.

Working against Penn State's reserves, quarterback John Hogan passed for four fourth-quarter touchdowns. He hit Bill Englert with scoring passes of 12 and one yard, Tod Toepfer with a 33-yarder and Ostrowski with a 13-yard toss.

Hayman scored his second touchdown on a 13-yard dash over right end late in the game to end Penn State's scoring.

## From all angles

Our records are a little spotty, due to some tournaments that have been played here over the years, but if they are close to accurate, the College of Southern Idaho Golden Eagles won their 100th straight game at home this weekend.

CSI last lost when Twin Falls high school gymnasium was the home court and then Boise Junior College nipped the Eagles by one point.

Based on the crowds at Friday and Saturday night's games it might be better if CSI would lose a game once in a while — just to put a little suspense in the minds of local fans. But so far Coach Jerry Hale isn't ready to go along with that theory.

Following up on the basketball rule changes we discussed last week, there's one more that should probably be mentioned. The five-second rule on in-bounding the ball now continues until it touches a player in-bounds. Previously, the five second rule ended when the ball left the hands of the man throwing it in — but the clock didn't start until it was touched by a player in-bounds. This brought on the matter of rolling the ball in-bounds toward the 10-second line and the receiver trotting a long beside it, picking it up only when he felt possession may be in jeopardy.

Word received from University of Southern California indicates that Victor Kelly, 5-6 dynamo guard from CSI, will start for the Trojans this weekend. Mention this due to the quiet controversy that has raged around the area, one side saying Kelly was too small to start in the Pac-8, especially at USC, and the other saying baloney. The balloons have it.

Another reason — the anonymous caller of about a month ago who called to ask about accepting a three-to-one bet (his way) that Kelly would start. It takes us off the hook, since we urged taking the wager — and begging for half the action.

For a while there was a little on the touch and go side. Kelly jammed all four fingers on his left hand severely during a practice session and it took him out of practice for a couple-three weeks. Coach Hale reports even Victor was a

little down when he finally became healthy and found out he'd fallen behind the others. Best bet would be that Vic worked twice as hard as the rest from that moment on — and he had never loafed.

Southern Idaho Conference statistics indicate that Ron Jones, Minico wide receiver, caught four touchdowns passes this year. Well, almost. Jones came off, the field after being awarded a catch of a 40-yard pass in the end zone against Skyline and mentioned he didn't have it until he found it, in a pike up humanity, on the ground. Against Twin Falls, he cradled an over-the-head pass to within about 18 inches of the ground before the ball slipped off, then bounced off its nose and nicely back into Jones' arms. The Vandals felt three of his calls had a direct bearing on the outcome of the contest. But it wasn't for the calls that he won the game ball. It was on the occasion of his retirement from college officiating.

Sam Henry tied his own school record with a 47-yard field goal to round out the Hurricane's scoring.

North Texas scored on a three-yard run by Joe Bishop but an attempt at two points failed. Quarterback Tony Ford kept for one yard and a touchdown in the final quarter and hit flanker David Yeage on a 35-yard touchdown pass.

IOWA CITY, Iowa (UPI) — Freshman quarterback Butch Caldwell ran for a gutsy two-point conversion with 4:10 left in the game Saturday to pull underdog Iowa to a 15-14 Big Ten upset over Illinois.

The Hawkeyes' hopes seemed flattened late in the fourth quarter when Illinois marched 80 yards in 13 plays to take a 14-7 lead on Lonnie Perrin's two-yard run and Mike Wells' two-point conversion pass to Garvin Roberson.

But the Hawks came back, going 67 yards in 16 plays. And when Frank Holmes scored from a yard out, Illinois led by just one point and it was up to the Hawkeyes to go for the tie or a victory.

After a short sideline conference, Caldwell calmly carried the ball in for two points and the Iowa defense held on to preserve the win.

Caldwell completed only one pass in the game, but he led a 280-yard Iowa ground attack and engineered both scoring

drives. Iowa took an early 7-0 lead when rookie Royce Mix, a freshman tailback, ran 92 yards for a touchdown in the second quarter—the second longest run from scrimmage in Hawkeye history.

Illinois pulled to 7-6 when freshman Steve Greene plunged in from the 4 and Wells missed the conversion kick.

The Illini moved to their second touchdown on Perrin's 40-yard pass to Roberson, who fell out of bounds on the Iowa 4.

Iowa closed the season at 2-6 in the Big Ten and 3-7-1 overall, while Illinois is 3-5-0 in the conference and 3-8-0 over all.

Missouri suffered seven turnovers, four pass interceptions and three fumbles, and closed out the regular season with a 6-5 record. Kansas, which had lost five of its last six games, finished at 4-7.

Missouri came from behind to take the lead in only three

plays when the second half began. John Cherry ran 26 yards and Mike Fink passed 15 yards to Jack Bastable for the touchdown. Greg Hill's kick gave Missouri a 17-16 lead only 54 seconds deep into the second half.

The Jayhawks elevated the lead to 28-17 on a 54-yard drive late in the third quarter.

But Jaynes was equal to the task. From the Kansas 45, he passed 32 yards to Foster at the Missouri 23. From the 20, Jaynes nailed Adams at the goal line for the go-ahead touchdown with 9:44 left in the third quarter.

Ferguson's heroics, however, were about the only dolace for the Badgers. Fumbles blunted a number of their drives.

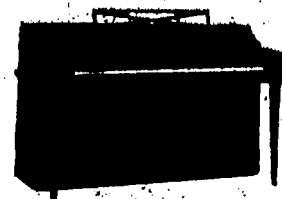

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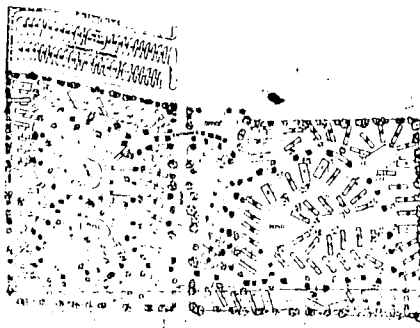
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# Cellar-scared Arkansas tops Texas Tech 24-14

Fullback Marsh White blasted the final yard of an 81-yard, 10-play go-ahead drive with 13:55 left in the game. Tailback Jon Richardson scored the opening Arkansas touchdown in the first period on a 3-yard run. Mike Kirland, who added all three extra points, kicked a 37-yard field goal with 80 seconds left.

Texas Tech tied the game following Richardson's touchdown on a 30-yard scamper by tailback George Smith then added a fourth-period two-yard

run by alternate quarterback Jimmy Carmichael who subbed for regular quarterback Joe Barnes who was injured on a 10-yard end sweep which moved the ball to the Arkansas 22.

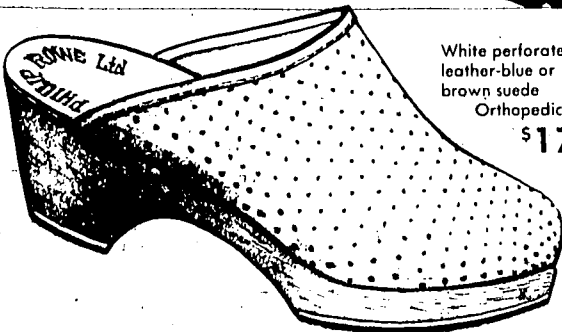
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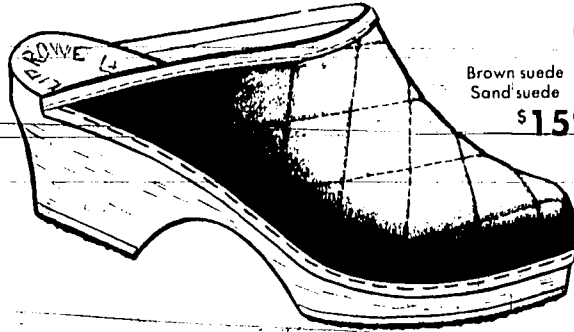
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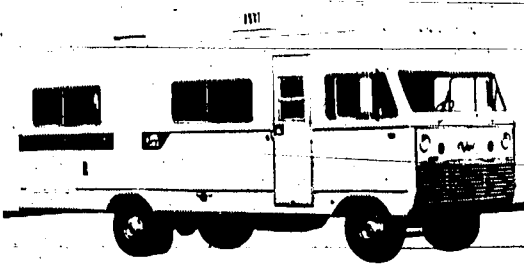


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# Mississippi trounces cross-state foes 51-14

OXFORD, Miss. (UPI)—Tailback Greg Alinsworth ran for four touchdowns Saturday as the Mississippi Rebels routed archrival Mississippi State, 51-14, in the season's finale for both teams.

Alinsworth, a 198-pound senior, scored twice on runs of two yards and twice more on one-yard carries, ending his collegiate career. Fullback Gene Allen also got two touchdowns for the fired-up Rebels, grabbing an 11-yard scoring pass from quarterback Norris Weese in the first quarter and driving over from one-yard in the second period.

The Rebels' final touchdown came on a 15-yard run by quarterback Bill Malouf in the fourth quarter.

Wingback Bill Buckley, ace receiver for the frustrated Bulldogs, caught two touchdown passes for Mississippi State—the first coming on a 27-yard throw by quarterback Melvin Barkum in the second quarter.

State's other touchdown was a 15-yard pass to Buckley from quarterback Rocky Felker.

Freshman Steve Lazinghouse connected on a 42-yard field goal for Ole Miss and kicked six extra points.

The victory left Ole Miss with a 5-5 record for the season, their worst showing since 1950. Mississippi State finished 4-7.

The Bulldogs, plagued by costly turnovers, lost three fumbles and had five passes intercepted. Rebel safety Harry Harrison, leading the Southeastern Conference in interceptions prior to the game, stole two passes in the first half, including one which he returned 32 yards to State's one-yard line to set up Alinsworth's third touchdown.

## Tampa uses errors to rip Vanderbilt

TAMPA, Fla. (UPI)—Defensive back Eddie Caldwell went 55 yards with an intercepted pass and Buddy Raburn returned one 45 yards to set up another touchdown as Tampa took advantage of Vanderbilt misplays to down the Commodores, 30-7, before 11,331 rain-soaked fans Saturday night.

Tampa intercepted four passes and recovered three Vanderbilt fumbles as the Tangerine Bowl-bound Spartans swarmed all over the Vanderbilt offense.

Caldwell got Tampa untracked in the first period as he

picked off a Steve Lanhart pass and went 55 yards untouched with just 34 seconds left in the period.

Tampa's depth in backs was shown as Ernie Dubose, Buddy Carter and Frank Pitta all scored on runs. Bob Cooper, who had a third period 23 yard field goal, kicked three extra points.

Vanderbilt's lone score came when Tommy Tompkins intercepted a Freddie Solomon pass and went 44 yards. Hawkins Golden kicked the extra point.

Raburn's pass interception carried the ball to the Vanderbilt five-yard line and two plays later Pitta scored. It was his second key defensive play. Earlier he had recovered a Watson Brown fumble on the Tampa 17, choking off a Commodore drive.

Dubose scored on a one-yard plunge climaxing a drive that was sparked by a 64 yard run by Norris LaGrand, and aided by a pass interference call.

Carter's scoring run was a one-yard plunge on a fourth down play in the final period.

## Knicks edge Celts 97-94

NEW YORK (UPI)—Captain Willis Reed, having his most productive night of the season, scored 13 points in the final period and 21 in the game Saturday night as the New York Knicks edged Boston, 97-94, and prevented the Celtics from gaining a back-to-back sweep of a weekend double-header.

Reed and Walt Frazier, who scored a game high of 31 points, tallied all but one of the New York's 21 points in the last quarter as the Knicks twice overcame three point deficits.

With the Knicks trailing 87-84, Reed and Frazier combined for 11 straight points to give New York a 95-87 lead which they never lost. A basket by Don Nelson with 37 seconds left cut New York's lead to 96-94 and the Celtics had the ball with eight seconds remaining but Reed grabbed a rebound of a John Havlicek shot and was fouled on the play. His free throw with one second to go led the Knicks triumph that moved them into a virtual first place tie with Boston in the Atlantic Division of the NBA.

## Bucks maintain Bullet mastery

BALTIMORE (UPI)—Kareem Abdul Jabbar scored 28 points, and his supporting cast of Bob Dandridge, Lucius Allen and Oscar Robertson picked the Bucks apart for a 101-91 Milwaukee victory Saturday night, the 13th straight for the Bucks over Baltimore in a two-year span.

The Bucks rallied to within 99-91 with 1:30 left after trailing since midway in the first period, but Milwaukee easily broke the Baltimore full-court press to hold on to the win.

Baltimore, playing without Wes Unseld, who tore back muscles, got 31 points from Elvin Hayes and 22 more from Phil Chenier. However, Jabbar got more help from Dandridge, who scored 22, Allen with 18 and Robertson with 17.

Irvine outscored Minnesota in the second half, as Gopher Coach Bill Musselman substituted frequently despite the absence of starting guard Keith Young, out with a thigh injury. Clyde Turner finished with 14 points for Minnesota, followed by Greg Olson with 12 and Dave Windfield with 10. Harlan Peet led Irvine with 21.

ATLANTA (UPI)—Chet Walker scored four straight baskets in the final two minutes as the Chicago Bulls held off the Atlanta Hawks 100-99 in an NBA basketball game Saturday night.

Walker and Lou Hudson of Atlanta were deadlocked in a shooting duel in the second half of the game between the division leaders. They finished with identical figures, 25 points each with 10 after intermission.

Bob Love broke the game open for Chicago with an eight-point streak of his own early in the fourth quarter. He gave the Bulls the lead for good at 77-76 with 9:36 to play. Love finished with 18 points and Clifford Ray had 16 points and 19 rebounds.

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—UCLA, sparked by center Bill Walton's 26 points and 20 rebounds, opened its quest for a seventh straight NCAA basketball championship Saturday night with an easy 94-53 win over Wisconsin.

Walton, who only played half of the second half, hit 13 of 20 shots from the floor and picked up 12 of his rebounds in the first half.

The victory was the 46th in a row for UCLA, one short of its school record set by the Bruins of 1967-68, who were led by a guy who then called himself Lew Alcindor. That string was snapped by Houston and Elvin Hayes in the Astrodome in January of 1969 when Alcindor (now Kareem Abdul Jabbar) was suffering from an eye injury.

The Bruins, who lost only guard Henry Bibby from last year's starting five, turned a 14-12 lead into a 41-19 bulge in less than eight minutes and then coasted to a 51-23 halftime margin.

Keith Wilkes, who was 8 for 12 in field goal attempts, had 19 points for UCLA and his front court teammate Larry Farmer added 14.

Carlester Crumpler, East Carolina's workhorse running back, ran in from the 13 early in the second period and broke

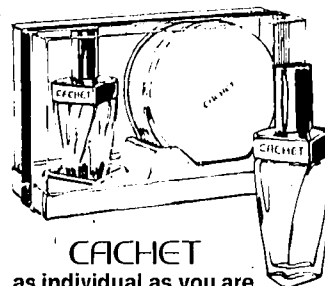

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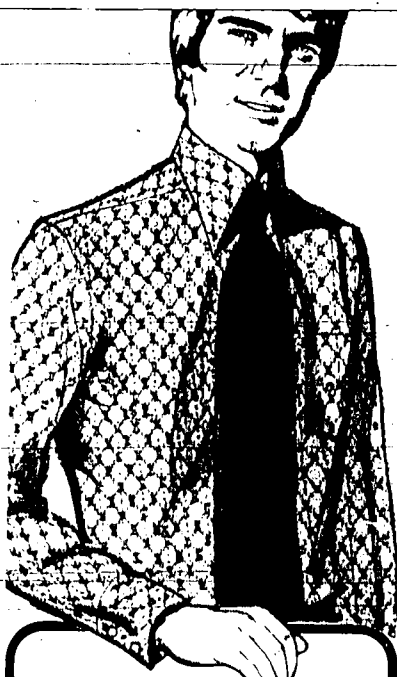
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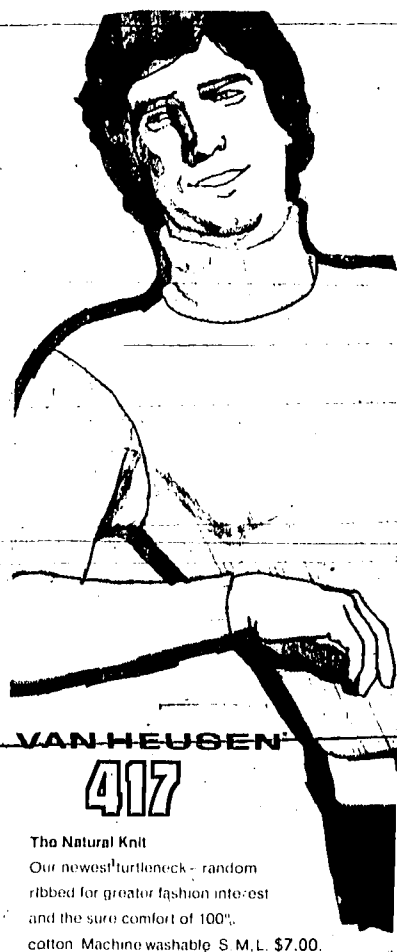
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# Money Box

From T.A., Twin Falls: I have what looks like a silver coin. It is about like our 50 cent piece. On one side is a building like a church and under the building the dates 1157-1957.

The other side says "Republik Österreich" around the coin. In the center is a large "25" and under that—the word "Schilling."

The number is surrounded by little shields and has a wreath under it. Can you tell me anything at all about this piece? Does it have any value?

Answer: You have a 25-schilling coin of Austria, minted in 1957 to commemorate the Maria-Zell Cathedral. The coin has a United States exchange value of about \$1. Collector value for a new specimen is about \$2.50. The coin is made of silver.

From D.L.A., Burley: I have collected Canadian money for a long time. Does it have any value as a collector's item?

I have a large group of the old big pennies and a few of the small ones, with George the Fifth on them. Most of these coins are not new, but are readable. The oldest one I have is 1876 and it has a picture of Victoria on it. Please put the answer in the paper.

Answer: Canadian money has a much lower mintage than United States coins. For a good many years it was not collected extensively but for the past ten years a good many collectors have turned to it because prices are much lower than our own coins.

Still, the demand is not as great, and prices have not risen as rapidly as those of the United States. There are a great many worn Canadian large cents on the market, and their value is not great.

The large cents of Victoria would range in the 80-cent to \$2 class, mostly, in the circulated qualities. Later large cents are even more plentiful and most of them would bring around 35 cents in worn condition.

A few of the early George Fifth cents are very scarce and command a high premium, even in worn conditions. The 1922, 1923, 1924, 1925 and 1926

are all premium coins. Prices for the '22, '23, and '25 range from about \$5 on up, depending upon condition.

All of these coins are scarce in uncirculated condition, and command good prices. I would have to have a list of your dates and look at the coins for condition before I could quote prices on them.

It must be remembered that the coinage is small—as the demand increases prices will probably rise.

From R.S., Twin Falls: I have a square copper coin, or token, I would like to find out about. There is a man wearing a crown on one side. Around the head it says "George VI King Emperor."

The other side has a circle with the words "Commissioners of Currency Malaya" and the date 1939. Also, in the center of the circle "1 Cent." Can you find out about this? What is its value?

Answer: The coins standard coinage of Malaya, under England. I do not know the reason for the square design. The denomination of one-cent equals 100 to the dollar, Malayan.

Collector value of your coin, brand new, is about 25 cents.

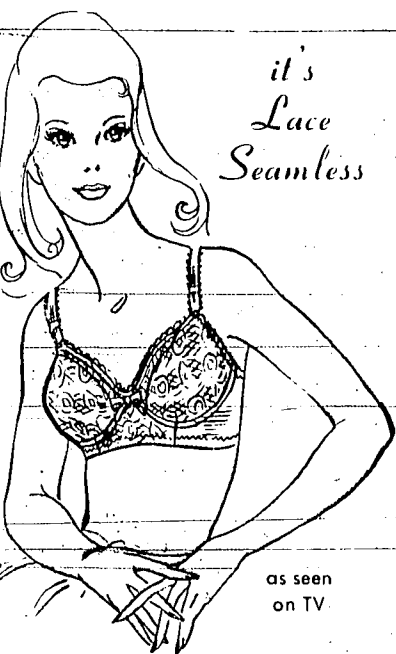

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# Accomplishments must come in next two years

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Backstairs at the White House: President Nixon has told aides that whatever he is to accomplish in his second term must be done in the first two years. After that he realizes he will be a lame duck in the true sense and the political scramble will begin again for his White House job.

That is why he has moved so swiftly to use the transition period to put all of his ducks in a row.

The public call for the formal resignations of all his top-level governmental appointees the morning after the election was highly unusual and rocked official Washington. The men and women who had served in his first administration, particularly those who helped in Nixon's re-election campaign, hardly expected such a blunt

message, with barely a "thank you." But there was also general understanding that the President wanted to begin with a clean slate, and to match his power moves with his new mandate.

Some officials who were planning to leave have indicated now that they would like to defer their departure for a while, at least long enough so that it would not look like they were fired. Many feel that they will be leaving under a cloud and that their performance in the first Nixon administration was under par if their resignations are accepted.

Those officials without Civil Service status also are being asked for descriptions of their posts and how the government could be better served, along with the resignations.

"How can I say that I could do this job better without White House meddling," bemoaned one official.

There were some indications last week that the President was trying to reassure some officials that they were not all on the dock. He had Press Secretary Ronald L. Ziegler stress to reporters how much he was consulting with his Cabinet officials and soliciting their recommendations.

Nixon is not the first President who has tried to fire top officials through the press. Former President Lyndon B. Johnson did the same thing, only more sub rosa when he was trying to get holdovers from the Kennedy administration to turn in their resignations.

The only official fired out-

right so far — and the White House made no bones about it — was the Rev. Theodore Hesburgh, president of the University of Notre Dame, who had been serving as chairman of the Civil Rights Commission. Hesburgh has been critical of the President's positions on busing and civil rights, and his statements irritated Nixon.

But it was not always thus. During the campus violence in 1970 when Hesburgh took a strong stand against student disrupters, the President wrote Hesburgh a widely-published letter commending him for keeping order at Notre Dame.

"They've had their four years," Nixon said in one of his most widely quoted statements in a recent interview with Garnett Horner of the Washington Star-News.

But there are indications that many will have four more years along with the President, particularly the close nucleus surrounding him in the White House — R. H. Haldeman, his chief of staff John D. Ehrlichman, head of the domestic counsel, and Ziegler. The trio are often referred to as the Berlin Wall.

There is some speculation that National Security Adviser Henry A. Kissinger might decide to move on if John B. Connally, former secretary of treasury, joins the new Cabinet as secretary of state.

Kissinger has not been favorably disposed to Connally's brand of diplomacy. But then Kissinger is a one-man show and if Connally headed the State Department, it might be mainly in the role of an administrator.

There is also talk of Connally as a domestic "Czar" in the White House, which would probably interest him for a year or two but hardly more.

The White House doors will be closed to public visitors Dec. 8-10 while the Christmas decorations are set up inside. The decorating will be supervised by J. Lidden Pennock, the First Lady's favorite floral designer.

As usual since Nixon took

office, the White House will be open for candlelight tours during the week from Christmas to New Year's.

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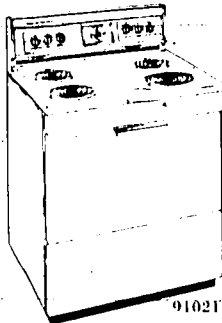
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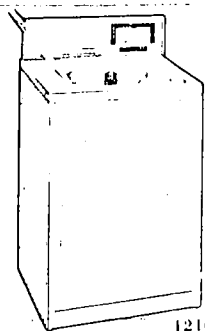

# Chilean farming output declines

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Chile's farm output has declined since President Salvador Allende was elected, the Agriculture Department said today.

The department's Economic Research Service said, "for the 1972 crop — the first one for which all production decisions were made during the Allende administration — productivity may be down sharply, based on preliminary data on area planted and forecasts of output."

"However, the causes of the decline cannot be clearly identified with changes introduced by the Allende government. Some crops have not recovered to productivity levels attained before the severe drought of 1969," it added.

Allende's reforms included expropriating large privately owned farms and turning them into large farm cooperatives, the report said. Allende's predecessor, Christian Democrat Eduardo Frei, emphasized parceling expropriated land out to the workers in small plots.

Taking the years 1964-1965 as the base, index of 100, the

report said estimated crop productivity for 1972 is 107, down from 119 in 1971 and 120 in 1970. The year 1969 had a severe drought and the index dropped then to 102.

The report said cattle numbers "have decreased precipitously since late 1970. The sharp drop has been attributed to clandestine slaughter and to the smuggling of about 200,000 head into Argentina shortly after the election victory of President Allende."

It added that the United States is not likely to be taking up much of the export market created by the crop declines.

"The U.S. share of the growing Chilean market for foreign agricultural commodities has decreased, as has the value of U.S. agricultural exports to Chile," it said. "The political sympathies of the Allende government, coupled with its policy of trade diversification, make it unlikely that the United States will increase or even maintain its historical share of this expanding market for agricultural commodities."

# Beef data form ready

MOSCOW — Idaho cattlemen and Idaho 4-H Club members who enroll in market beef projects have available to them a new production tool — a beef carcass data service.

The program is now offered nationwide following a four-state U. S. Department of Agriculture pilot study.

John Miller, University of Idaho extension meat specialist stationed at the Caldwell Branch Experiment Station, hails the new service as a real opportunity for producers to "get an inside picture, so to speak, of their cattle."

According to Miller, the first step of the service is to attach an official Beef Carcass Data ear tag to a live animal. When the animal is slaughtered in a plant serviced by USDA personnel, quality and yield grade factors from the carcass are evaluated and reported on an official beef carcass data form. The form is returned to the ear tag purchaser.

Information on the form will include conformation grade, maturity, degree of marbling, quality grade, fat thickness, ribeye area size, hot carcass weight, yield grade, and kidney,

pelvic, and heart-fat.

"That's the kind of information," says Miller, "those in the cattle business need to help establish the genetic potential of their animals, select superior breeding stock, and to plan their cattle merchandising and sales programs through a sound performance reputation."

He adds that such information will also help improve feeding programs and point the way to better management practices in order to earn a fair profit while continuing to offer consumers quality beef at reasonable prices.

Four-H Club members who wish to take advantage of the Beef Carcass Data Service will receive official ear tags for beef animals without cost. Other participants will be charged 50 cents per ear tag.

Remaining costs are 75 cents for a tool used to attach ear tags and \$150 for each completed carcass data report.

Additional information about the service is available at extension centers throughout the state. Tags and attaching tools can also be obtained through centers.

## Farm

### Idaho farm labor force off slightly

BOISE — Idaho farms were manned by 47,000 workers the week of Oct. 22-28 according to the Idaho Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The number of workers was 2,000 fewer than for the same week in 1971. Of the total, there were 40,000 family workers, up 2 per cent, and 7,000 hired workers, compared with 11,000 the same week in 1971.

Nationally, during the same period the nation's farm labor force included an estimated 4.78 million workers, 2 per cent fewer than for the same period in 1971. Included were 3.57

million working farm operators and unpaid family members plus 1.2 million hired workers.

Farm workers averaged 38.3 hours during the October survey week, compared with 38.0 hours a year earlier. Farm operators averaged 43 hours and other unpaid family members worked 32 hours. Hired workers averaged 35.1 hours.

Across the nation during that week, harvesting was slowed by poor weather conditions or was in the final stages for various fruit and grain crops.

The scholarships are sponsored by the Jerome County 4-H Leader's Council and are limited to two per club member and must not be given on successive years, Priest explained.

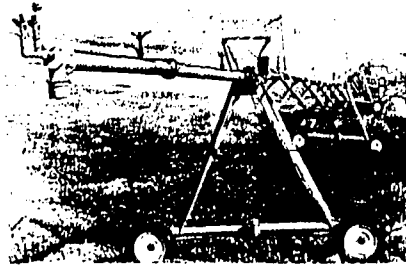
"Awards are figured on 60 per cent project work 20 per cent leadership and community activities and 20 per cent

## Lodge ruling has no effect for Idaho

TWIN FALLS — An Oregon court ruling that Elks Lodges are not entitled to tax exemptions has not yet had any implications on Idaho lodges. This was reported Friday by John Leinen, Twin Falls, former exalted ruler of the Twin Falls lodge and now an Idaho district officer.

Leinen said all lodges are governed by the national Grand Lodge and the policies of the lodge state membership is open to males who are at least 21 years of age and white.

The Oregon ruling stated because of the restriction of membership to whites only, lodges are not eligible for tax exemptions.

Leinen said this has never come up in Idaho and the lodges are operated on a non-profit basis and therefore not required to pay taxes on their property. Most lodges in Idaho own their own buildings and the land on which they are located, he said. The Twin Falls Elks Building at Shoshone Street North and Second Avenue North is owned by the organization, he said.

A panel of three federal judges in Oregon ruled the Elks could not be granted tax exemptions because their membership restrictions violate the United States Constitution.

The decision was written by Senior Judge Gus J. Solomon following suit brought by Michael Falkenstein, a white juvenile court worker in Oregon City, and Clifford V. McGlotten,

a black Oregon resident studying for a doctorate in Berkeley, Calif., who was turned down in a bid for membership in the Elks Lodge in Portland.

The plaintiffs named the Oregon Department of Revenue as defendant in the case, charging the state had no right to grant the exemptions because of the violation.

The panel of federal judges upheld this contention, saying the Elks Lodge, in accepting the state's tax exemptions, is obligated to comply with the equal protection clause of the 14th Amendment.

The judges further ruled the state is obligated to see the lodge meets this requirement.

Judge Solomon wrote the Oregon case is unlike one in Pennsylvania in which a court ruled a liquor license granted a Moose Lodge did not constitute a state action within the means of the 14th Amendment.

The panel ordered the state to cease granting the tax exemptions to the Elks Lodge.

Since the tax exemptions granted the Elks lodges in Idaho have not been challenged the lodges are continuing to pay no taxes, Leinen said.

All Elks Lodge profits are used for scholarships, welfare and needy family assistance at Christmas time, youth programs and operation of the Elks Rehabilitation Center in Boise.

## Motorists warned

HANSEN — Idaho State Police Saturday warned motorists to be careful in crossing bridges and overpasses on foggy cold mornings or at night because of ice.

Although highways are clear, the bridges and overpasses can be ice covered and hazardous if there is fog or moisture.

One person was injured and five vehicles damaged in two such accidents Friday on the Hansen Bridge.

State police said they were called at about 9:30 a.m. Friday after a vehicle crashed into the bridge railing and blocked one full lane of traffic on the bridge. Officers said they did not have the name of the woman driver involved.

Her vehicle went out of control on the icy bridge following early morning fog. It hit the west side of the structure, bounced across and hit the east side where it remained.

The second accident occurred while officers were investigating and attempting to clear the scene of the first accident.

State police said vehicles driven by Verl Lawrence, 46, and John Ernest Van Buren, 37, both Twin Falls, and Janet Ann Pewa, 22, Paul, were all stopped at the scene of the accident on the bridge when a vehicle driven by Gene Robert Hartwig, 23, Filer, collided with the rear of the Pewa car, forcing it into the rear of the Van Buren car, and then crashing into the bridge railing, glancing off and hitting the third parked vehicle driven by Lawrence.

Officers said Hartwig was taken to Magic Valley Memorial Hospital by ambulance. He was treated and released. Damage was estimated at \$2,000 to the four vehicles in the second accident and officers said a citation is pending.

## Appointment for TF post expected

TWIN FALLS — The vacancy left on the Twin Falls County Commission by the death Thursday of Heber Loughmiller is expected to be filled soon, probably by a Democrat.

Gov. Cecil D. Andrus is expected to make the appointment within the next one to two weeks, pending recommendations from the county central committees.

Gov. Andrus Saturday extended his deepest sympathy to the Loughmiller family and said he does not feel it would be proper to discuss an appointment so soon after the death of Mr. Loughmiller.

He said he would not take any action until receiving recommendations from the central committees of Twin Falls County.

In previous practices, the governor has named Democratic replacements in such cases. In Blaine County a commissioner was killed in an accident earlier this year and was replaced by a Democratic appointee.

Mr. Loughmiller, a veteran of eight years on the county's three man commission, was a Republican.

Vincent Smazal, chairman of the Twin Falls County Democratic Central Committee, said he is confident the appointment will be a Democrat, noting Mr. Loughmiller himself

began his first term as county commissioner under appointment to fill the vacancy left by the death of Warren W. Lowery, a Democrat.

Smazal, who said he counted Loughmiller among his friends and is saddened by his death, added he deploras the poor taste of many who are already clamoring for the appointment.

He said he is interested in two matters. First, the appointment must go to a highly qualified individual who will be able to fill the office to the satisfaction of the people.

Second, he said, it must be someone who can be re-elected to the post. Smazal said he will leave the decision as to the individual to be recommended to the governor to members of the central committee.

"I do not even have a vote," he said, "only in the event of a tie which is up to the chairman to break."

An aide in the office of Gov. Andrus said the governor campaigned for and promoted legislation requiring state legislators who die in office or resign to be replaced by a member of their own party.

This has now been signed into law but it does not affect county level appointments.

Smazal said he will call a meeting of the Twin Falls County Democratic Central Committee, probably this week, to discuss a recommendation.

## Salmon residents take river ride in stride

SALMON — Amarillo Slim's Middle Fork escapade got local residents to wondering just how dangerous an adventure the Texas gambler really undertook.

Many of them had been down the same stretch of river without incident or fanfare.

Newspapers across the nation picked up the story of Amarillo Slim and spoke of the 20-mile trip as a "65-mile" trip down the "River of No Return," and as a "death-defying" undertaking. The Middle Fork of the Salmon River runs through the Idaho Primitive Area and Slim floated the lower canyon to come out into the main Salmon, which is the river called the "River of No Return."

Slim, or T.A. Preston, of Amarillo, Tex., was offered the challenge by a group of fellow gamblers "who got together and raised the money and bet me that I couldn't go down the rapids in the winter time."

Slim ran the 20-mile lower section with a professional guide, Jere Chapman of Boise, during a five-day trip which ended Nov. 22.

Slim apparently won a \$31,000 bet. Had such a bet been offered here there would have been a host of ready takers.

Local boatmen who have run the river noted that Slim might have undertaken a great gamble if he had run the river alone without the services of an experienced guide in the boat with him, and during high or low water.

Don Smith, a veteran river runner, commented that "any

12-year-old can do it."

"My kids were over there

running the river when they

were that age."

He noted the water this year

is higher than usual at this time

and the river can be run with less danger than low water in August or during high water in June.

Smith, who made his first trip on the Middle Fork back in 1934-35, towing boats with ropes up from the mouth to Big Creek on a mining venture, said: "If they are going to write about this they should write the truth."

"You could sit on an inner

went down the river the first time in 1955 rowing a baggage raft. That was from Indian Creek to the Flying B Ranch.

"In January a few years ago large sections of the river were frozen over between those points," he said.

"Even with slush ice you can run it in a rubber raft and stay dry without any trouble. And you don't need wet suits."

"If he had gone in mid-December when there is subzero weather and the chance of the river freezing solid it would have been a terrific feat."

L. L. (Andy) Anderson, Challis, who took the first paying customers down the Middle Fork in 1946, said the latest he has floated the river was Nov. 22, and he had never had trouble with ice.

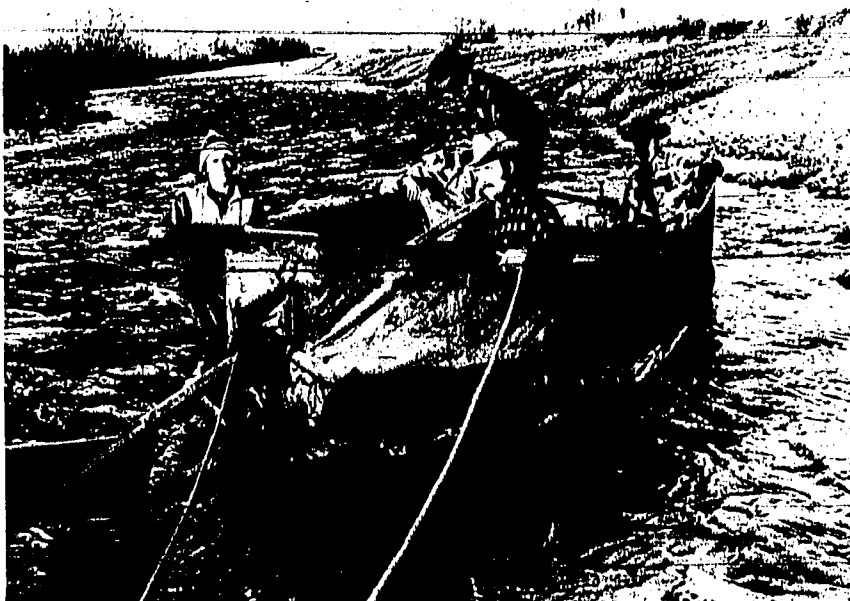
"The slush ice doesn't present any problem. If it gets cold enough around the rocks the ice could get thick enough to cut a rubber boat. I've never seen the river freeze over completely while I was on the river 27 years."

He said he had seen rim ice five feet thick, but there was always a channel to go through out in the middle.

"If Slim had done this without an outfitter in the boat with him it would have been an adventure."

Anderson said the river is more treacherous in low water in August.

"You only have certain channels in those rapids in low water and you have to hit them about right," he said.

## Coal gas plant sought

HOUSTON — El Paso Natural Gas Co. today filed an application with the Federal Power Commission for approval to construct the world's first commercial complex for conversion of coal into a synthetic gas with high heating value.

The plant and the accompanying coal mine will cost an estimated \$420 million. Howard Boyd, chairman of the board, said the complex will be located in northwest New Mexico where a 40,000-acre coal lease is estimated to contain more than 700 million tons of recoverable coal.

The El Paso complex is designed to produce 250 million cubic feet of gas per day and will make a significant contribution in enabling El Paso to maintain its present level of deliveries to southwestern U.S. states, including California.

Hollis M. Dole, assistant secretary-mineral resources of the Department of the Interior, said today "the possibility of using the vast coal reserves of the U.S. to produce relatively pollution-free synthetic gas would not only provide vitally needed clean energy but would also create thousands of new jobs and opportunities for investment in this country. The conversion of coal to clean fuels was given strong endorsement by President Nixon in his Clean Energy Message of June 4, 1971."

El Paso Natural Gas said that about two and one-half years will be needed for construction of the complex. Assuming prompt governmental approval, initial gas production is scheduled for 1978 with full production slated for early 1977.

Because the gas from this basic process is of low heating value, El Paso is contributing to the development of a methanation process which will increase the heat content to that comparable to natural gas presently moved through El Paso's lines.

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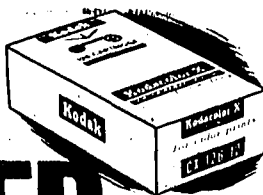
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## "My Toughest Foe"-

FAMILY WEEKLY asked five of the greatest stars in the National Basketball Association to select their toughest opponents—the men they most dread facing in grueling one-on-one confrontations. Making choices among giants isn't easy. But here, after lots of consideration, are the "Stars' own Stars"

**JERRY WEST**  
Los Angeles Guard  
*Selects:*  
**OSCAR ROBERTSON**  
Milwaukee Guard

Jerry West, in his 13th season of pro basketball with the Lakers, has shown no signs of slowing down despite the fact that he is carrying 34 years on his frail-looking back. The native of Cheylen, W. Va., led the Lakers to the NBA championship last season with 25.8 points per game and 9.7 assists, and received more votes for the official NBA all-star team than any other player.

"Since he was traded from the Cincinnati Royals to the Milwaukee Bucks three seasons ago," says Jerry, "Oscar has not concentrated on offense nearly as much as he used to. His scoring averages have gone down—he hit his career low of 17.4 points per year last season—but still runs a team as well as anyone in basketball. I rate him my toughest opponent, and have rated him this way ever since we entered the NBA together for the 1960-61 season.

"Oscar is the strongest guard I've ever faced. He's 6-5, weighs 215 pounds, and uses his shoulders and legs to excellent advantage. He has all the moves and all the shots, and he does everything so efficiently and smoothly. Another player said once that he would be willing to pay to watch Oscar Robertson play basketball. That is the kind of player 'The Big O' is.

"When you're defending Oscar you just can't anticipate him or break up his rhythm. If you commit yourself too quickly, he'll go inside of you for an easy layup. And, if you play him loosely, he'll go up for an unimpeded jump shot. Oscar never takes a shot he doesn't want to take."

**WALT FRAZIER**  
New York Guard  
*Selects:*  
**DICK VAN ARSDALE**  
Phoenix Guard

Even if he never scored a point, Walt Frazier would be one of the most valuable

Knicks players. He is an outstanding ballhandler and playmaker. For the last four years Frazier has been named to the NBA all-defensive team. Walt also is an outstanding shooter. He averaged 23.2 points per game last season, making better than 51 percent of his shots from the field.

"When he plays in the backcourt," says Walter, "Dick Van Arsdale of the Phoenix Suns plays me tougher than any other guard in the NBA. Dick is big enough to play both the forward and guard positions: 6-4 and 210. But since we have big guards, he usually plays in the back against us. He's learned how to play guard very well. Dick was a forward for New York when I joined the Knicks in 1967. He's big and strong—and you can't go over him. What's more, he doesn't commit himself, but waits for you to make a move first. Then he reacts quickly and is often able to tie you up effectively.

"I think Dick and his twin brother Tom [of the Kansas City-Omaha Kings] are two of the most underrated players in the NBA. Both play that tough defense that's become such a necessity in pro ball, and both are solid all-round players in all respects."

**KAREEM ABDUL-JABBAR**  
Milwaukee Center  
*Selects:*  
**NATE THURMOND**  
Californian Center

Kareem Abdul-Jabbar (formerly Lew Alcindor) is the most potent offensive force in pro basketball today. In each of the past two seasons, Kareem has been the leading scorer in the NBA.

"Though there are several centers who play me well," says Jabbar, "nobody gives me a tougher time, game in and game out, than Thurmond of the Golden State Warriors. Besides being big and strong, at 6-11 and 230 pounds, Nate has taught me things about playing defensive. He plays the middle effectively, which hurts our inside game, and consequently forces us to shoot from the outside even when we don't want to.

"I guess one way of describing the way Nate plays the pivot is to call him 'spi-

dery—all arms and legs. When we have the ball I really have to work hard for all my shots. He's so agile and leaps so well, he's more liable to block my field goal attempts than any other center I face.

"Thurmond poses big problems for me defensively, too, because he's an effective outside shooter. Our rebounding suffers when he's hitting his shots from outside, because I have to give up my position under the basket to go out and cover him. Not only does this prevent me from being in good position for the rebound, but Nate also follows up his shots so well that it sometimes seems I have to be in two places at once."

**DAVE DeBUSSCHERE**

New York Forward

Selects:

**SPENCER HAYWOOD**  
Seattle Forward

Many feel that the Knicks never would have achieved championship caliber had they not acquired Dave DeBusschere. He is not the best shooting forward in the league, nor the best rebounder, but he may be the best defender of all forwards. Last year he was the only unanimous choice to the NBA All-Defensive team.

"I hate to single out this opponent or that opponent as being any tougher than anybody else," demurs Dave. "After all, basketball is a tough enough game without suggesting that some guys might not be as tough as they think they are!" But, okay, I'm supposed to talk about who's the toughest forward. So here's my choice of choices... The one man I'm happy I won't have to face too many more years is the young forward of the Seattle SuperSonics, Spencer Haywood. He's only 23 years old, but he's already great and going to get better as the years go by. I'm lucky I'll be retired in another couple years. Spence is very



aggressive on the boards, and he's strong, weighing about 230 pounds and standing 6-8. I have trouble with him every time we play Seattle. I just try to stop his best moves—and he's got a lot of them. I think someday he'll be recognized as the best forward in the game... and that day might be soon."

**JOHN HAVLICEK**

Boston Forward

Selects:

**BILL BRADLEY**  
New York Forward

John Havlicek is probably the hardest-working player in the NBA. He's in constant motion every minute he's on the court. Last year Havlicek was the third leading scorer in the league with a 27.5 average.

"When he first came into the league," recalls John, "Bill Bradley—of the New York Knicks was a shooter, period. Now he's become a fine defensive player. He's the toughest forward in the league for me to play. Bill had a fine series against me in last season's Eastern championship series in the NBA when New York beat us four out of five.

"Against me, opponents try to fill the lanes to keep me from getting the ball. My game is movement. I may be the worst one-on-one player in the league. I don't like to handle the ball a lot, and the defense knows that when I do get it, I intend to shoot it or pass it. I'll rarely drive in for a layup.

"Most of the forwards who give me trouble are of the same 'in-between' size as myself and Bradley, able to play both up-front and in the back-court in certain situations. There's Dick and Tom Van Arsdale, and Mike Riordan of the Baltimore Bullets, all hard-working, very quick.

"When he was with Phoenix, Paul Silas caused a lot of trouble for me with his aggressiveness and hustle. He always was looking to crash the boards, or to follow up his shots. Now that he's on our side, I can leave the problem of trying to contend with him to the other forwards in the NBA."

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# Why Can't We Learn to Treat Animals Sanely?

**"Could we perhaps take stock of our cruel and silly selves and begin to treat pets with respect for the wonderful animals they are? Not surrogate pampered children, nor inanimate objects on which to vent our hostilities, but sensitive, intelligent creatures who give us so much and ask so little?"**

One dark night, in a small town in Missouri, a group of boys untied a four-year-old friendly German shepherd that had never known anything but affection from his family, tied the rope to the back of a pickup truck, and then proceeded to torture the animal by dragging him around town. When the dog was finally found, his fur was covered with dirt and blood, and much of his skin had been ripped off in some places down to the bone. He recovered, but only barely.

In another state, a woman came to pick up her cat at the veterinarian's where it had been left to be spayed. Taking the cat in her arms to leave, she suddenly burst into tears at the joy of reunion. They had been separated one night.

These two extremes of pet owner behavior—the sadist and the "nut"—have probably been with us ever since animals came to live with man. They are certainly familiar to SPCAs and other humane organizations. Many of us have witnessed them first hand. Oddly enough, although the behavior patterns represent opposite ends of a spectrum, they have a good deal in common. Both reflect the mistaken premise that pets are people and can be treated with as much hostility or adulation as feelings permit. Furthermore, adulation is often cruelty in disguise.

Take the recent case of the lady who kept 107 cats in one house in the mistaken idea she was doing them a favor. Not only did she succeed in creating a neighborhood nuisance, but the cats, when rescued, were in deplorable states of health. Another equally well-meaning but eccentric woman kept 13 dogs in a small house, allowing them to roam during the day without tags or license. Several of the dogs had bitten children, and all of them had kept the neighbors awake with their around-the-clock barking. When she was convicted and sent to jail, "humanitarians" complained that she, not the dogs, had been mistreated.

Dr. Dennis Leigh, a British psychiatrist, recently told a convention of veterinarians that pet-owner relationships can frequently get out of hand. He cited three categories: *The Exhibitionist*, who chooses an exotic pet, such as an ocelot or toucan, to call attention to himself; *The Insecure*—e.g. the meek little man who needs a big Irish Wolfhound or Great Dane

to ease his fears; and the *Eccentric*, sincere people who often neglect themselves and their families to collect animals they believe they are rescuing from hunger or ill treatment. This can lead the animals as well as their would-be owners to living in filth and squalor."

On the other end of the spectrum is the sadist. Children are often cruel

to pets sometimes inadvertently, through ignorance—but sometimes, I am sad to say, deliberately. My mail is sprinkled with stories of children turning parakeets loose, tying cans to dogs' tails, or setting fires to cats. One such letter from a woman in Alabama described how boys riding by her home every afternoon teased and tormented her leashed-in Dalmatian by

peppering him with air rifles or hitting him with well-aimed stones. Police seemed unable to stop them. And what, one might ask, had happened to their parents?

A story of cruelty by children—but instigated by parents—made the papers not long ago. Three boys in their early teens were found near Plainfield, New Jersey trying to drown five puppies in a brook. Upset and in tears, they said their mother had sent them to do the grisly job because she couldn't keep the pups.

Dog and cat poisoners—those cowardly killers who periodically strike communities—are in a class by themselves. There are no epithets strong enough to condemn the person who will set out strychnine disguised in food for unwary pets to eat and die painful, lingering deaths. Less spectacular but even more prevalent are the people who deprive their animals of food and water for long periods of time, or who abandon them entirely. In a small town in Michigan, three puppies about 12 weeks old were found recently in a trash container behind a store. They were almost dead from starvation and neglect. A caretaker at a summer resort in New Hampshire heard a dog crying in an empty house. He unlocked the door to find a full grown part-Labrador, half-starved, left behind by summer residents who preferred to let him die rather than take him back to the city. My files are full of similar cases of summer abandonment by vacationers who adopt roaming pets for the season, only to leave them behind when it is time to go home.

The case histories go on and on. While at the other side of the pet world, owners are putting up their idolized Bowers at kennels with piped in music and menus in French; dressing them in mink jackets or blue velvet after-five outfits; bedding them down in baby cribs tied with pink ribbon. In England, they are conducting marriage ceremonies for cats.

Could we, perhaps, take stock of our cruel and silly selves and begin to treat pets with respect for the wonderful animals they are? Not surrogate pampered children, nor inanimate objects on which to vent our hostilities, but sensitive, intelligent creatures who give us so much and ask so little, food, shelter and love. By the way, what ever happened to plain old love?



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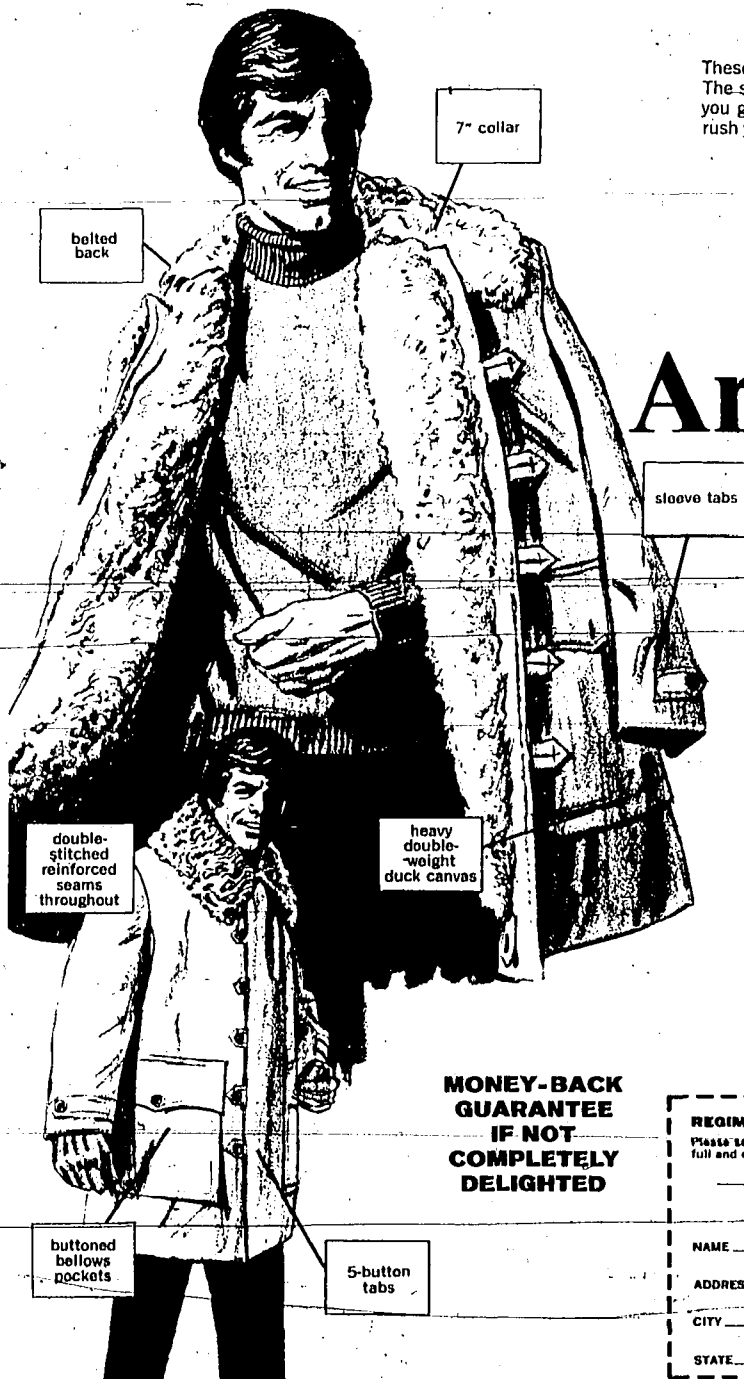
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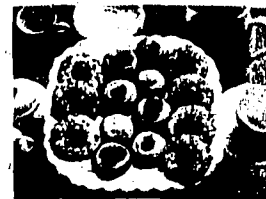
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# Christmas Pastries You Can Serve the Whole Year Round



Marmalade Tea Cakes and Chocolate Pecan Gems have a richness appropriate for Christmas—but can really be served at any tea of the year.

This week, Food Editor Marilyn Hanson makes tea cakes and cookies. "I was asked to bring cookies to serve at the School Christmas Concert. Problem: What kind of cookies could I make that would fit the season but wouldn't be too Christmasy? Here's the way I solved it!"

## MARMALADE TEA CAKES

- 1/2 cup butter, softened
- 1/2 cup confectioners' sugar
- 1 egg, separated
- 1/4 cup orange marmalade
- 1 cup unsifted all-purpose flour
- 1 cup finely chopped walnuts
- Orange marmalade, green mint jelly or red raspberry jelly

1. In medium bowl with electric mixer, beat butter with confectioners' sugar until light and fluffy.
  2. Beat in egg yolk and marmalade smoothly. Gradually add flour, beating at low speed until smooth. Cover and refrigerate until dough is firm (about 30 minutes).
  3. Beat egg white with fork in small bowl. With floured hands, shape dough into 3/4-inch balls. Dip balls into beaten egg white, then into chopped nuts.
  4. Preheat oven to 350° F. Place cookies 2 inches apart on ungreased baking sheets. Flatten balls into 3/4-inch thickness with bottom of glass. Make indentation in center with fingertip.
  5. Bake for 10-12 minutes, or until slightly browned on bottoms. Remove cookies to wire rack with spatula to cool.
  6. When cool, top each with 1/4 teaspoon marmalade, green mint jelly or red raspberry jelly.
- Makes 4-1/2 dozen, 1 1/2-inch cookies

## GOLDEN FRUIT BARS

- 1 cup butter (2 sticks), softened
  - 1 1/2 cups light brown sugar, packed
  - 2 eggs
  - 1 tablespoon grated orange rind
  - 2 teaspoons grated lemon rind
  - 1 teaspoon soda
  - 1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg
  - 2 1/2 cups unsifted all-purpose flour
  - 1 cup chopped golden raisins
  - 1/2 cup chopped walnuts
  - Browned Butter Frosting (recipe below)
1. Preheat oven to 350° F. Grease a 13x9x2 inch pan.
  2. In large bowl, with electric mixer at medium-high speed,

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cream butter and sugar together until light and fluffy.

3. Beat in eggs thoroughly, then add orange and lemon rind.
4. At low speed, gradually add soda, nutmeg and flour. With large cooking spoon stir in raisins and walnuts. Spread into prepared pan.

5. Bake for 25-30 minutes, or until golden brown. Cool completely, then spread with Browned Butter Frosting. Cut into bars.

## BROWNED BUTTER FROSTING

In medium saucepan slowly heat 1/2 cup (1 stick) butter,

over low heat until it has become a golden color; remove from heat. Gradually blend in 3 cups confectioners' sugar, dash salt and 1 teaspoon vanilla extract. Stir in 2-4 tablespoons hot water, until frosting is of spreading consistency. (Makes about 2 cups)

## CHOCOLATE PECAN GEMS

- 1/2 cup butter, softened
- 3 tablespoons confectioners' sugar
- 1/4 cup unsifted all-purpose flour
- 1/2 cup sweetened cocoa mix
- 1 cup finely chopped pecans
- Granulated or confectioners' sugar or Mocha Crème Icing (recipe below)

1. Preheat oven to 325° F. In small mixer bowl, at medium speed of electric mixer, cream butter and sugar together until fluffy. Clean beaters.
2. At low speed gradually beat in flour and cocoa mix; scrape sides of bowl and beaters. Beat again until thoroughly blended.
3. With a spatula stir in nuts. Shape dough into balls about 1/4 inch in diameter. Place 2 inches apart on ungreased baking sheet. Bake 20-25 minutes.
4. Let cookies cool on baking sheet about 2 minutes, until firm. While still warm, roll in granulated or confectioners' sugar. Or let cookies cool completely; frost with Mocha Crème Icing. Makes about 3 dozen

## MOCHA CREME ICING

- 2 tablespoons butter
- 1 tablespoon milk
- 1/2 teaspoon instant coffee
- 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
- Dash salt
- Confectioners' sugar
- Pecan halves
- Chocolate curls\*

1. In small saucepan melt butter.
2. In milk dissolve instant coffee, cinnamon and salt; add to butter.
3. Beat in enough confectioners' sugar, about 3/4 to 1 cup, to make an icing of spreading consistency. Use to frost tops of Chocolate Pecan Gems. Stud tops of frosted cookies with pecan halves or chocolate curls if desired.
- \*To make chocolate curls, warm semisweet chocolate square in low oven for 2 minutes, cool slightly. Shave off curls with vegetable peeler.

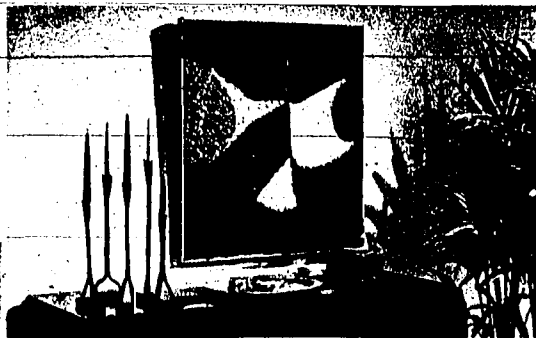

To make this handsome "painting" you will need: a sheet of brown paper, a piece of 1/4-inch-thick plywood in the size collage you are making, strips of 1/4x1-inch molding to fit around the plywood sheet, crayons, small nails, staple gun, a single-edge razor, a piece of yarn, Elmer's glue (or its equivalent), and bits and pieces of carpeting. Plan the montage first by drawing a variety of shapes and sizes on the brown paper. Color

with crayon to see how the shades and patterns fit together. Use the brown paper as a pattern and cut out the pieces of carpet on wrong side. Spread carpet pile apart and staple the carpet onto the plywood. Complete by nailing molding around plywood to frame your work. Want to add a signature? 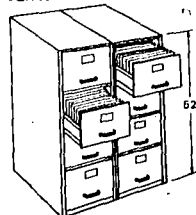
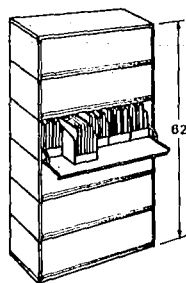


Drawing (right) shows how modular units easily replace the ponderous office filing cabinet. Greater filing capacity in 40% less floor space.

### You Can Make Tray, Coasters, Napkin Rings (Under \$5.00)

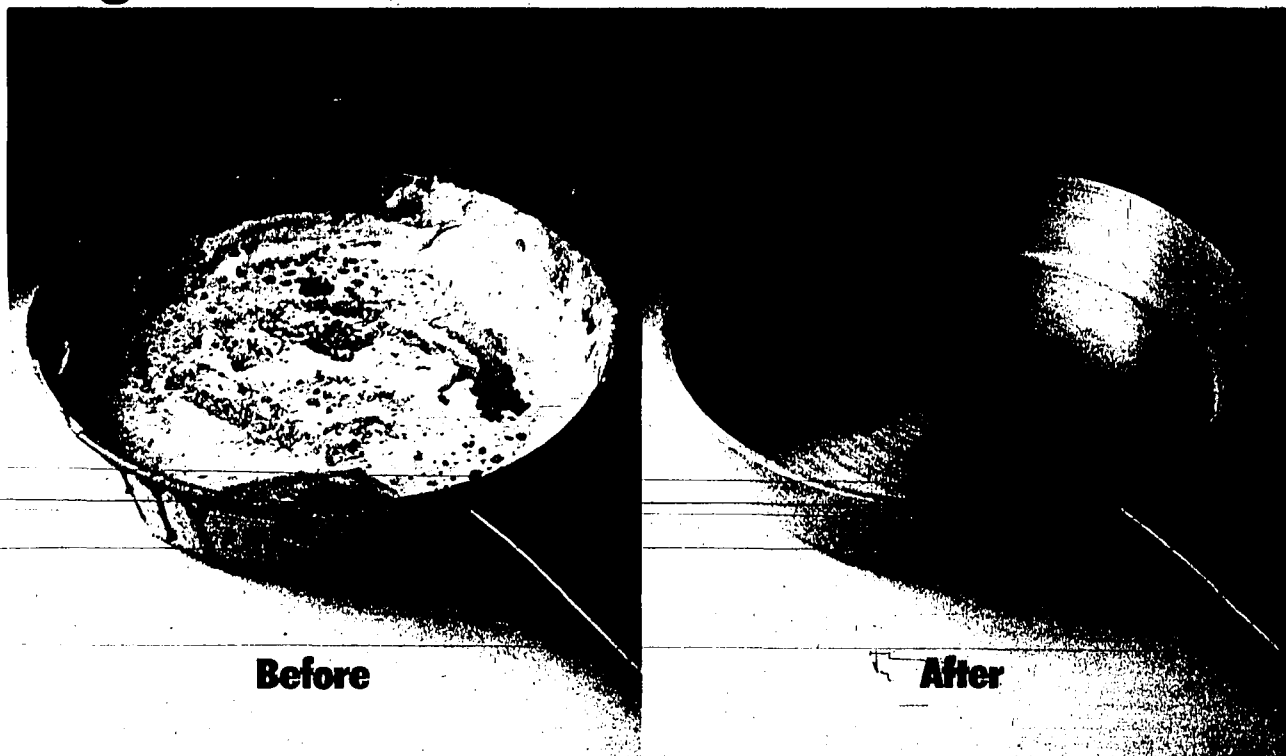

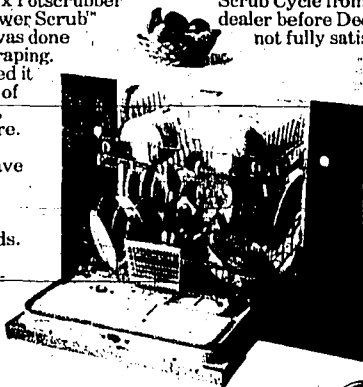

How does the man who recorded the all-time best-selling "White Christmas" spend his holiday? FAMILY WEEKLY asked Bing's wife, Kathryn, what she did to make their home lovelier and warmer at Christmas. This is her reply.

# How We Decorate Our Home at Christmas

Decorations are a very big part of our Christmas. Making ornaments and decorating the house have become a family tradition: a time of sharing, doing, and praising each other's efforts! It's our home, not "my" house. We work hard together at everything we do.

We love to combine old treasures with new things. Each year we proudly hang ornaments that the children have made. Sometimes the children like to alter their earlier efforts. I like to change decorations too. Each year we have more fun as the children are growing up, pitching in and sharing the joy of Christmas.

The Christmas tree is always placed in the stairwell in the hall. Christmas family photos of friends—Prince Raimier, Princess Grace and their children; Bob Hope and clan; Frank Sinatra; Dean Martin; and others—are housed on the sideboard in the library.

Beautifully wrapped gifts are always part of the decor in the hall. They seem to grow under the tree and spill all over. We never hide our gifts. The children have reached an age now where they like to see what everybody else is getting, too.

We use stained glass window frames in our living room at the large French doors. The frames had been used on our TV special one year. Actually there is no stained glass in them—colored lights came through them. We use light from behind, with scenes from little churches and trees to choir boys and angels. The frames are made from plywood with paper

cut-outs, then hung from the ceiling.

We love to use candles, especially tall tapers, in the hallway and dining room. We have a beautiful Venetian crystal chandelier in the dining room. It looks like a wedding cake with red, green and blue flowers. It's a happy chandelier when the tapers are lit inside it! We use altar candles to decorate greens in the library. The lights are white but set in red cups that glow red. The flames cast flickering shadows that dance on the walls. Tiny red velvet doves and fruit are so pretty nestled among the pine needles.

The most important thing is to share in the decorating. As we unpack the boxes, we make all these decisions together as a group. Each child makes a contribution.

Bing's role is that of admirer, cajoler and advisor. He says he's color blind, but that doesn't stop him from saying, "That's a marvelous char-treuse"—particularly if it's fuchsia. Then he goes and sits on the corsage pins, which is not too attractive! He always asks, "Is there ever going to be a place where a man can sit down? How can I put my feet up? There are wreaths all over!" But then he just smiles and gets us off to church.

Bing's not very artsy-crafty, but there's a lot of music around the house that has his voice. We create the Christmas atmosphere with music, putting on records and doing a lot of singing. Harry plays the piano and guitar "and does some composing. Mary Frances dances ballet, and this year dances as a bon-bon in the Nutcracker Suite.

Bing does most of the big things for Christmas, and those are usually surprises. He came home from England

after making a movie, with a couple of Adams chairs and Hepplewhite music stands and a music cabinet. He has exquisite taste, but leaves the reupholstering decisions to me. But I don't know if he'll do that again. I tried to get some Louis XV chairs recovered, and ended up taking the dirty old tapestries back to Paris to have them reproduced in their same faded colors. It took a year, but they are fantastic. The faded colors look beautiful with the faded wooden frames. If you are a seamstress, you can give a new look to chairs with crewel or needlepoint.

We're doing a new thing for gifts this year that also works well with centerpiece and decorations. We started last Easter. A lovely friend taught us how to paint sea shells. The scallop shells from the bay (in Baja) are deep orange. It's the same kind the Pilgrims used. We work with muriatic acid, clorox, dental picks and gloves, to clean the shells, paint the insides with tiny pictures and a quote. We're using lyrics from Bing's songs, giving credit to Jimmy Van Heusen, Johnny Mercer, and Irving Berlin. We're sending what we hope are appropriate quotes to very close friends.

Shells make wonderful centerpieces. I use chicken wire and newspaper to fill baskets before covering with spackle. You can bury the broken shells in the spackle before covering over the top with perfect shells. I made a decoration for the powder room. The powder room is all crystal and glass. I got a half shell, filled it with silvery sand and set a group of choir boys upright standing in the sand. It looks very attractive.

Trace desired motif into gold tape on four sides with kit stylus or sharp pencil. Then, to give a finished effect, trace each edge where gold and silver meet using straight-edge ruler. Apply vertical strips of outache or glue short lengths of string to can about one inch apart, then cover can completely with silver tape, pressing around outache for raised effect. Nail the can to top of block, then cover inside with four quarter circles of gold tape. Add a candle, and you're done! The Arno Foil Craft Tape kit used is available at hobby stores for \$5.95.

Make a solution of ½ glue and ½ water, generously painting the object to be covered. While surface is wet, add squares of tissue. Coat each piece of tissue before starting another layer. (The size of the tissue pieces will vary with

the size of the surface to be covered.) The number of layers of tissue used will determine the richness of the finished color. Allow several hours to completely dry. Then spray with a clear varnish.

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# Can You Teach Your Pre-School Child To Read?



By Virginia B. Warren

Any child can learn to read within a year after he has learned to talk, say the experts... if a parent uses these simple methods.

Teach a three-year-old how to read? Only an expert can do that, right? Wrong! Many educators, who formerly frowned on parents teaching their pre-schoolers to read, now encourage it. And you don't have to be a college or even a high school graduate to do it. "Early learning seems to have little to do with the depth of education of either parent," according to a parent handbook published by a group of Montgomery County (Md.) parents and teachers.

Some easy techniques: Write down words dictated by your child. Sound simple? It is. And it works. He will probably want you to write his name, mommy, daddy, chair, dog. Print each word large (2½ inches high) on a separate sheet of paper. (One reason children don't learn to read earlier: they're surrounded by small print, says Dr. Glenn Doman, author of "Teach Your Baby to Read.") Have your child repeat each word. Now mix the papers and show them to him, one by one. Do this several times. He'll soon be reading them.

I saw this done with a four-year-old. She immediately read each word—even a long one: "grandmother." It wasn't done by memorizing words in order, for the sheets were shuffled each time and she read them many times.

This is called the "language experience" technique. It works because it thrills a child to read his own words.

For example, you can: Have your child draw pictures and tell what they are. Print his exact words under

each drawing: "A funny man." "A rainy day." Staple the pictures together. He'll look at "his book" over and over again, and soon be reading.

Have him dictate "experience stories." This method was used with immense success with some Washington, D.C. kindergartners, who told their teachers about things they saw and did. The teachers wrote the stories, a few lines to a page, using photos or the children's own drawings for illustrations. They changed not a word of the slangy, often ungrammatical, statements. The children were soon reading and trading their stories.

Your child can tell about recent experiences—going to the store, helping daddy wash the car. To start him off, ask questions and write down his answers. Again, collect the sheets into a "book." He'll want to create—and read—more books of his own.

Hang a blackboard in his room. Ask what word he wants written on it. Print it big. Confronted with it every day, he can't help learning to read it.

Combine these activities with alphabet teaching—using alphabet books, blocks, the alphabet song—and chances are your child will enter school with one tremendous advantage: he'll be able to read!
