had been wired out of position with baling wire,
according to Porest Service officials.
When the wired-up brake failed to engage on
New Yoar's Pay, at legst 21 persons were injured when the lift carened backward.

said Wednesday the brake had been found wired
out of position during the Forest Service's Oct. 5
inspection of the Pomerelle lift. The brake was

The brake in question is supposed to be automatically applied at any time the lift begins to run backward.

When the main service brake and the emergency brake were worn out after they accidentally engaged while the lift drive was still operating on Jan. 1, then only the wired-up backup brake remained to prevent the chairs from plummeting backward.

According to Sawtooth Forest Chief Engineer Thomas Pestotnik, the backup brake consisted. Of two cogs which would drop between the spoke stiffeners on the large bullwheel to stop the lift's movement.

Quake rocks area

MEXICO-CITY-(UPI) earthquake rocked central Mexico from coast to coast Tuesday, heavily damaging mountain towns and villages in mountain towns and villages in at least three states. Authorities reported at least 10 persons dead and nearly 150 injured.

"It shook like hell," said a municipal official in Collma, in the heart of the stricken area—"Considering how strong it was, we were lucky."

President Luis Echeverria ordered medical crews, food and emergency relief teams into the damnged areas.

The earthquake was felt from the Pacific seaport of Manzanillo to Veracruz on the Gulf of

one Pacific scaport of Manzandi-lo to Veracruz on the Gulf of Mexico; but most of the damage was on the Pacific side. The quake registered 7.5 on the Richter scale, stronger than the quake—that destroyed the Nicaraguan capital of Managua Dec. 23.

Dec. 23.
It sent workers in downtown
Mexico City and Guadalajara
scurrying for cover and destroyed large sections of
mountain villages in the Pacific coast states of Colima, Jalisco and Michoacan. The penter of the disturbance was reportedly about 300 miles northwest of

Mexico City.

State and federal authorities

State and federal authorities said nearly 40per cent of Gomez Farias, in the mountains of Julisco State, was destroyed. Four persons were killed when a wall collapsed. In Tecoman, in the state of Colima, six persons were killed, including a Roman Catholic priest. Widespread damage was reported but broken communication lines made details scarce.

The crater of Colima voicano, The crater of Collina volcano, towering above several of the worst-hit areas, expelled clouds of smoke as the earth shook. "The volcano threw up smoke like it suddenly came unplugged," said Arnoldo Vagel, Collina nunicipal inspector.

inspection of Oct. 5, before the ski-season began, the backup brake had been wired in such a position that it could not be engaged as designed.

The wired brake has a sinisterconnotation. It would appear someone went out of his way to bypass a safety system. If so, it suggests ignorance or willingness to gamble with lives.

If so, the gamble was a bad one.

On New Year's Day, after the
primary braking systems failed,
the rollback brake was the only

the rollback, brake was the only thing between the skiers and serious injury. The wired-up brake could not operate and 21 persons were injured as a direct result— 2.—Why—did-Pomerelle—officials— ignore—the Forest Service— instructions to either fix the wired-up brake or replace it. 5. Why did the lift attendants fail 5. Why did the lift attendants fail to follow the resort's 1972-73 "Safety Plan." Did they even know the resort had a safety plan. If so, why did they fail to make the required daily inspections of the rollback brake. Just one such inspection would have found it unworkable. Is the "Safety Plan" just so much paper?

6. And of less importance, why did Pomerelle's President Jones insist repeatedly on the day following the mishap that the Forest Service's Octobermspection showed the lift met all Forest Service requirements. His

Forest Service requirements. His statement would appear to create a Pomerelle credibility gap.

Pomerelle credibility gap.
It is a sorry affair all around. The resort management was clearly dangerously negligent. The Forest Service did well to detect the danger early, but failed to follow-through to ensure the applied service.
