## Texas murder toll climbs to 21

HOUSTON (UPI) — A chain-smoking teen-ager today led police to two more bodies buried in three-foot-deep graves in an East Texas pine forest, raising to 21 the number of murder victims—all believed to be young boys who were tortured, sexually abused and killed by a bachelor electrician and two young friends.

The two bodies, wrapped in plastic bags and coated with lime, were dug up near Broadus, Tex., near the shores of Lake Sam Rayburn 125 miles north of Houston.

Elmer Wayne Henley, 17, currently charged with four counts of murder in the mass slayings, led officers to the scene and pointed out the graves, which were about six weeks old, according to San Augustine County Sheriff John Hoyt.

Before the 130-pound youth confessed and revealed the forest graves, he called his mother on the telephone and said:

"Momma, I've told them everything. Momma, be happy for me because now, at last, I can live."

Henley, puffing on one cigarette after another and his brown hair hanging over his face all the way to his chin, told

police they will find about 30 bodies at three different burial sites. If that is true, it would be the worst mass murder in U.S. history.

Police unearthed 17 bodies under a boat shed in southwest Houston. Two more were found Thursday night near those found today.

Henley said there were only four bodies at the lake site. "They were all within about a 600-yard radius," Sheriff Hoyt said.

After the bodies were discovered at the lake site, Henley, wearing brown oxfords, drew a map in the sand with the toe of his right shoe that marked the spot where more bodies could be found at High Island near Galveston. Officers then took the youth by car south to search for more graves.

Another youth, David Brooks, 18, has confessed to police that he was involved in the slayings.

"Dean decided he wanted to have sex with them, kill them and then he brought them out here," Henley said of the lake victims. "Corpl's parents have a place out here. He said the boat shed was getting full (of bodies)."

## President sued by panel

WASHINGTON (UPI) — For the first time in history, the President of the United States has to answer a lawsuit filed by a committee of Congress. The Senate Watergate panel wants the constitutional battle over executive privilege to begin sooner than the usual procedure calls for.

The committee filed suit in U.S. District Court Thursday demanding that President Nixon turn over the recordings of Watergate-related conversations made in his office and documents concern-

ing the activities of 25 current or former aides.

It asked that Nixon respond within 20 days, the normal time limit for a private citizen, but one-third the time allowed for a government agency. The committee named Nixon as both President and as an individual.

The committee action followed by two days a White House response to a similar suit filed by Special Prosecutor Archibald Cox, contending that releasing the tapes and papers would irreparably damage

needed presidential secrecy and that neither Congress nor the courts have the power to force the President to release documents.

Committee lawyers followed Cox's lead and argued that whatever claim of privilege Nixon made for the tapes was invalidated by his having let

H. H. Huberman, his former chief of staff, listen to two of them after he no longer worked for the government.

The committee subpoenaed the tapes and documents July 27 after testimony by Huberman

White House aide Alexander P. Butterfield that Nixon's conversations in the Oval Office and the Executive Office Building were taped.

Nixon wrote committee chairman Sen. Sam J. Ervin, D-N.C., that he would not surrender the tapes but would consider "specific requests" for documents.

The suit said Nixon's refusal was "unlawful, unwarranted, and in breach of his legal duty to respond to and to comply with such subpoenas."

The suit also told the committee he heard two tapes of conversations between Nixon and his former counsel, John W. Dean III.

The committee asked the court for a declaratory judgment stating that Nixon had no right to refuse.

## Fire battled

TWIN FALLS — U.S. Bureau of Land Management and Forest Service personnel continued battling today an about 7,000 acre lightning caused fire which began Thursday afternoon at about 3:25 p.m. in the South Hills.

This morning, Harold Elg, BLM Burley District chief of operations, said "It looks better than it did yesterday, but we're a long way from coming out of the woods yet."

The fire, burning about one third on Forest Service land and the remainder on BLM land began in North Cottonwood Creek, about 12 miles south of Twin Falls, then headed eastward to McMillan Creek and extended west approximately two miles from Cottonwood Creek, Elg said. It was manned today by combined Forest Service and BLM teams.

According to Dee Hansen, Sawtooth National Forest dispatcher, the Payette National Forest Interregional fire crew, four Spanish American crews from Twin Falls, and three Snake River crews from the Boise area have been sent to the fire, and two crews from Utah were expected today.

### ITT finagling charged

NEW YORK (UPI) — The U.S. government withheld aid to Ecuador to pressure the country into giving International Telephone and Telegraph Co. \$25,000 which ITT claimed in a legal dispute, Business Week Magazine reported Thursday.

ITT denied the story, saying it was factually wrong and misleading.

Business Week reported the U.S. government withheld \$5.6 million from Ecuador in ITT's behalf. The magazine said an ITT subsidiary, All American Cables and Radio, was expropriated by Ecuador in 1971, and ITT demanded \$12 million in restitution.

### Bus mishap takes high toll

CAIRO (UPI) — Police said today between 70 and 80 persons were feared drowned Thursday when a bus swerved to avoid a horse drawn cart and skidded into an irrigation canal 70 miles southwest of Cairo.

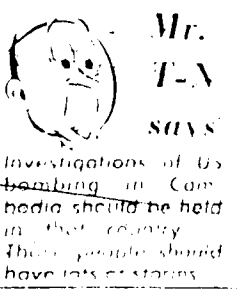
They said there were 12 survivors and that navy frogmen had recovered 25 bodies. Police said they were told at first 140 persons were jammed into the bus but later reports said 80 to 90 persons were aboard.

### Fallout detected

CANBERRA (UPI) — Acting Prime Minister Lance Barnard said today the first radioactive fallout from French nuclear tests over Papeete, Tahiti, had been detected near Melbourne by a monitoring station.

It was the first radioactive fallout detected since the French tests July 22.

## Andrus asks research

IDAHO FALLS — Gov. Cecil D. Andrus told a congressional subcommittee today the federal government should make a major effort in Idaho in research and development of geothermal energy resources.

Andrus was the leadoff witness at a hearing called by the Water and Power Resources Subcommittee of the Senate Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs to study geothermal energy. Testimony was taken at the Westbank Motel. The subcommittee is chaired by Sen. Frank Church, D-Ida.

Andrus told the subcommittee members Idaho is "uniquely situated to provide a location for the research needed to answer" questions about the potential for geothermal energy to help meet increased demands for energy across the country.

Noting that recent studies had turned up 400 thermal springs across the state and identified 25 areas that warrant further study, the governor called for the establishment of a geothermal test facility.

In addition, he said, "we also need federal technical and financial assistance to our state agencies and institutions."

Apparently pleased by recent proposals made by the Raft River Rural Electric Cooperative and Aerojet Nuclear Corporation for a test facility, Andrus urged other groups to come up with proposals.

Andrus also said he hoped consideration would be given to development of a National Geothermal Testing Station at the National Reactor Testing Station (NRTS) west of here.

"I'd like to be a little presumptuous and suggest that those companies with a geothermal scientific and engineering capability and interest prepare proposals that would establish a National Geothermal Testing Station at the NRTS."

## TF zone law hearing set

TWIN FALLS — The Twin Falls County Zoning Commission Thursday night authorized the new county zoning ordinance for public hearing Sept. 20.

The extensive 74-page ordinance provides, among other things, that public hearings be required before consideration of housing developments on residential-agricultural and residential-medium zones which are not within a mile of a municipality.

Presently, subdivisions are permitted in RA and RM zones and must be granted a permit upon request.

The ordinance also creates

several new zones in the county, including a "zone of influence" around communities in the county, according to James Koutnik, chairman of the zoning commission.

Koutnik said that these buffer zones would cover an area which a city would be likely to annex. If the county were to take action affecting a zone, it would work the city whose buffer was being affected.

By and large it's going to be a good ordinance, a much more livable ordinance," Koutnik said. He added that if the zone boundaries are "reasonably" laid out allowing for growth

and development the ordinance would be a great "asset" to the county.

During the meeting, three citizens questioned whether Koutnik should stay on as chairman when issues involving his own company, Western Realty, were being considered.

An unidentified woman said that Western Realty was selling homes in a new subdivision northwest of town, and that Koutnik was involved in conflict of interest as chairman.

Koutnik admitted his company was selling homes in the subdivision, and two men rose in support of the woman's opinion.

## False reports told

## Secret bombings in Cambodia told

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Former Defense Secretary Melvin R. Laird ordered secret bombing raids in Cambodia in 1969 with simultaneous air strikes in South Vietnam to provide a cover story for the press, the Senate Armed Services Committee has learned.

The committee also has been given information that secret bombing raids were ordered in Laos by the Johnson administration in 1967 with simultaneous raids in South Vietnam as a press cover.

Laird's order, a copy of which was given to the committee Thursday by Deputy Defense Secretary William Clements, appeared—to a degree, at least—to contradict Laird's assertion July 18 that he never directed or authorized "fabrication of official records."

The order, signed by Laird when he was secretary of defense, dealt with secret strikes, code-named "Operation Menu," to be carried out in Cambodia during the week of Nov. 23, 1969.

"The concept of the operation," the order said, "is to employ 41 B52s against Menu targets on each of two nights during the week of 23

November. The remaining available aircraft will be employed to strike cover targets as well as targets elsewhere in the country (South Vietnam) and in Laos.

"Strikes on these latter targets will provide a resemblance to normal operations, thereby providing a creditable story for press inquiries."

The order was also signed by Gen. Earle G. Wheeler, then chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. It was classified "top secret — sensitive — inform no distribution to other governments — eyes only — absolutely for the eyes of the addressee only."

"This is the first solid evidence that I have had that there was an order to misrepresent targets," said Sen. Harold Hughes, D-Iowa, who has been the main force in the committee's probe of the Cambodia bombing.

Laird, now President Nixon's chief domestic counselor, said July 18 that he had ordered secret raids in Cambodia. But he added, "I did not, at any time direct or authorize falsification of official records. At no time in my four years as secretary of defense did I direct or authorize falsification of any Defense Department records."

# Army denies taps

HEIDELBERG, Germany (UPI) — The U.S. Army today dismantled a brand new intelligence operation designed to keep watch over GI dissidents, calling it "inappropriate."

At the same time, an official Army statement slapped back at critics who have been accusing it of illegally tapping civilian phones in West Germany and denied the Army was persecuting dissident soldiers.

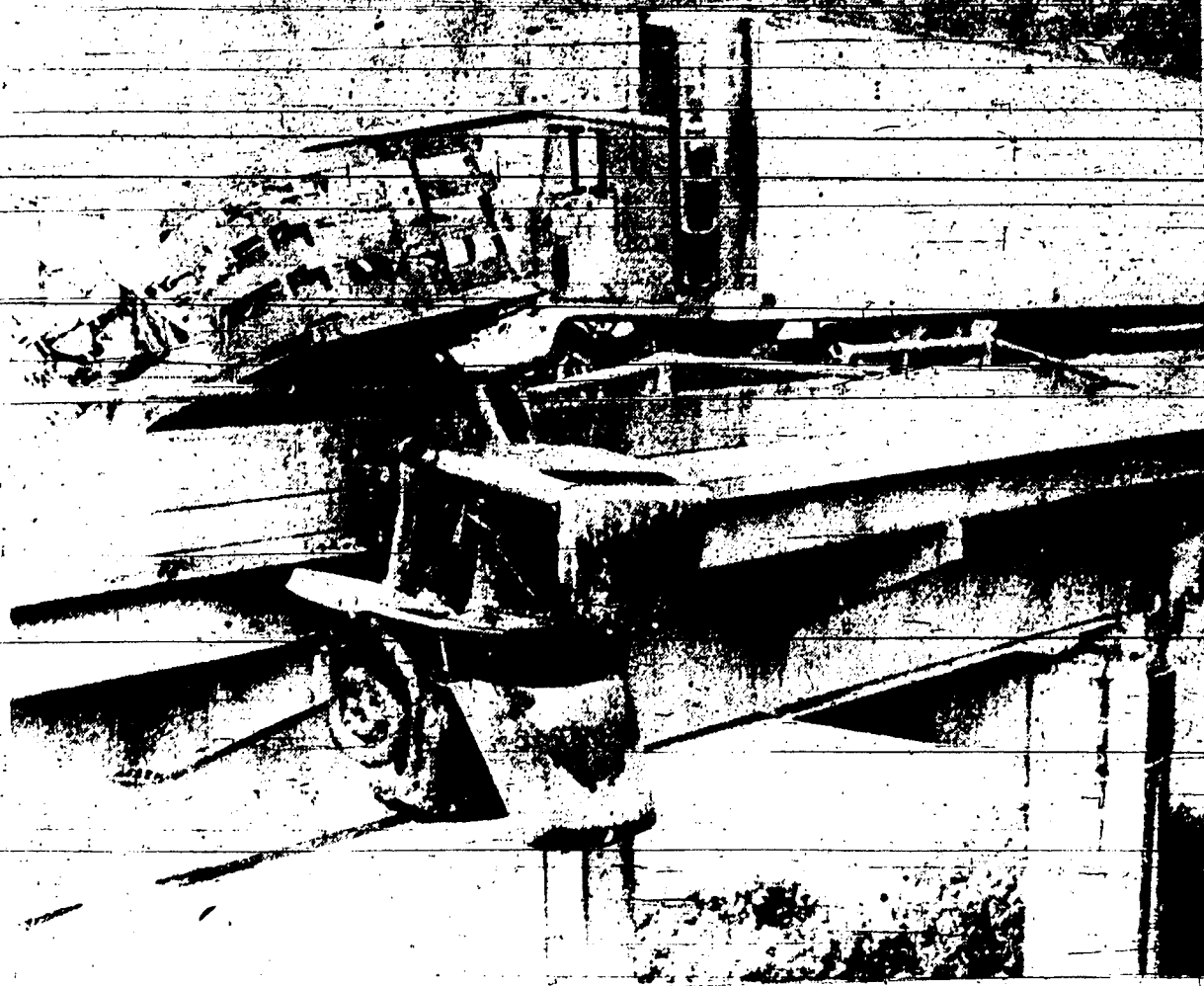
An 8th Infantry Division document entitled Military Intelligence Counter-Dissidence Program has been rescinded by the 8th Infantry Division, the Army said in a statement issued Thursday from its Heidelberg headquarters.

The document was determined to be inappropriate, as guidance on dissent contained in Army regulations is considered sufficient and soldier dissent within the command is presently at a very low level.

The cancellation came two days after the New York Times disclosed the existence of the 8th Infantry Division directive and quoted portions of it in a dispatch. The Times said a copy of the unclassified document had been leaked by a military clerk.

Defending its position in the matter of GI dissidents, the Army statement said, "This headquarters is not directing an intensified military counter-intelligence program against underground activities within the United States Army, Europe."

But the statement said the Army was obliged to protect its position as a combat-ready bulwark of North Atlantic Treaty (NATO) defenses.

# Nixon angry over Agnew's troubles

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Nixon "hit the ceiling" when he learned Vice President Spiro T. Agnew was under investigation in an alleged Maryland kickback scheme and tried to talk Agnew out of holding a news conference, White House sources said today.

An "angry" Nixon, the sources said, told Agnew at a meeting they held Tuesday that silence was a better posture than holding a news conference.

Agnew, however, told Nixon he felt he should go ahead with the news conference, the sources said. The vice president held the conference Wednesday, describing the allegations of bribery, extortion, conspiracy and tax evasion as "damned lies."

One source said of Nixon's reaction when he learned of Agnew's troubles that he "hit the ceiling."

The White House sources said Nixon plans to let Agnew "stand alone" in his defense against the allegations. Agnew indicated at the news conference he is prepared to do this.

"I think the vice president of the United States should stand on his own feet," Agnew said.

"So I am not spending my time looking around to see who is supporting me. I am defending myself."

Agnew said he met with Nixon for an hour and 45 minutes Tuesday evening. He described their discussion as "far reaching" but declined to amplify the remark.

Agnew flew Thursday to California for what staff members said were "a couple of days off."

The vice president was expected to stay at Palm Springs, Calif., until Sunday. He frequently spends his free time at the resort, where singer Frank Sinatra and some other close friends have homes.

Earlier Thursday, the Washington Star-News reported that Agnew's attorneys in New York and Washington were exploring the possibility

of a claim of constitutional immunity for Agnew. Should Agnew make such a claim and should federal prosecutors go ahead with their case, the courts probably would have to resolve any conflicts.

Since the news broke, White House statements with regard to Agnew have been decidedly cool, with the President's spokesman shying away from expressing Nixon's full confidence in Agnew.

Some observers felt that Agnew's performance in his news conference had added to his stature, in the eyes of the public and the press.

Nixon today was at his Camp David, Md., retreat with his closest advisers preparing his public response to Watergate charges that have damaged his second administration.

Some of his aides believe that Nixon will take a "tough" stance in a televised address to the nation which may be delivered on prime time Tuesday or Wednesday evening. They noted that Nixon hopes to focus on the broad picture, pointing up his past accomplishments, and branding Watergate preoccupation as "mean, petty, vicious and unimportant," as he said in his toast recently to Japanese Prime Minister Kakuei Tanaka.

With Nixon at Camp David were Gen. Alexander M. Haig Jr., White House chief of staff; speechwriter Ray Price; press secretary Ronald L. Ziegler and confidential secretary Rose Mary Woods.

He was away from the White House when lawyers for the Senate investigating committee served a civil suit to the President's attorneys demanding access to tapes of Watergate-related presidential conversations.

Ronald Rotunda, James K. Hamilton and William Mayton spent about 20 minutes in the offices of White House lawyers, J. Fred Buzhardt, Leonard Garment and Douglas M. Parker.

# AEC stores radioactive waste at IF

The Atomic Energy Commission said Thursday it will receive 1,400, 50-pound drums of uranium 233 waste at its site near Idaho Falls for storage from another AEC facility near Pittsburgh, Pa.

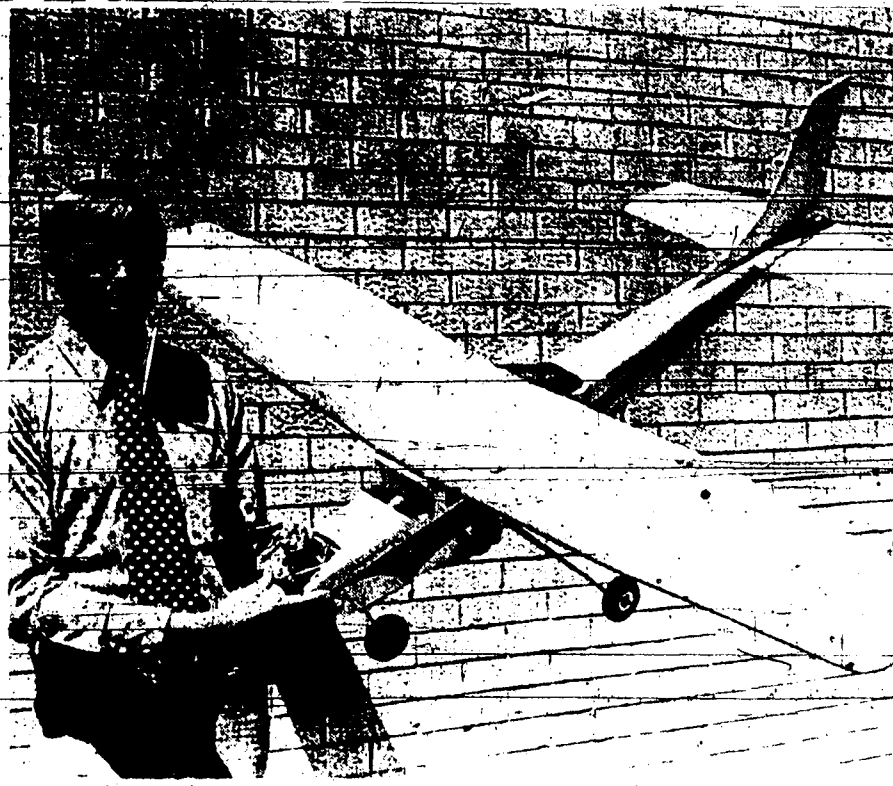
The announcement came on the heels of an accident Tuesday in Blackfoot which derailed a Union Pacific Railroad car carrying 140 steel drums containing radioactive waste.

A spokesman at the AEC in Idaho Falls said the shipment will be made by truck over the next 80 weeks. It will come from the AEC facility in West Mifflin, Pa.

The low-level radioactive waste will be stored on asphalt sections and covered with dirt. The steel drums have a 20-year protective capacity.

The AEC said the shipment is scheduled to begin this summer and the trucks hauling the waste meet all the requirements of the Department of Transportation, which regulates such shipments.

A spokesman at the Department of Environmental and Community Services in Boise said the containers included in the shipment would be similar to containers involved in the train derailment in Blackfoot.

BOISE (UPI) — The State of Idaho may have bought a fleet of lemons when it purchased 89 cars for the State Police and the Alcohol Safety Action Project, the Lewiston Morning Tribune said Thursday.

In a story prepared for Friday's edition, the Tribune said the manifolds of nearly half of the cars were cracked. It said the engines on many tend to overheat and numerous problems have cropped up with the braking and with the alternator support bracket.

However, it pointed out that purchasing agent Dan Pilkington and two officials of the State Police disagreed about the severity of the problem.

While Pilkington took note of

the manifold, and other problems, Police Superintendent T. Clark Hand and Capt. Ralph Snyder, ASAP coordinator, denied there were widespread problems with the cars.

Pilkington identified the make of car as 1972 Dodges. He said the state has received assurances from the factory it will pick up the tab on correction of the problems even though the warranty ran out long ago.

Possibly, the Tribune said,

the reason — Pilkington sees more of a problem with the cars than the State Police do is that State Police figures reflect only problems which cost the state money while Pilkington has figures showing factory-corrected problems.

## 3 Idaho firms question EPA

POCATELLO, Idaho (UPI) — Three southern Idaho companies Thursday charged the Environmental Protection Agency with arbitrarily setting dates on waste water discharge permits.

Spokesmen for the J. R. Simplot Co., the Monsanto Co. and the FMC Corp. at a public hearing at Idaho State University questioned the decision to grant permits that expire in 1975.

The companies asked that their final permits be granted for a period to expire in 1977.

noting that a 1972 amendment to the Federal Water Pollution Control Act of 1969 provided for permits to be granted for five years.

In each case, the permit compliance date is six months before the expiration date of the permit.

Jack Smith, representing the Simplot firm, said his company feels the proposed effluent restrictions were geared to huge companies and placed a hardship on companies the size of Simplot.

The Simplot Company, under proposed effluent levels, would have to reduce discharge levels in phosphorus, ammonia, nitrogen, nitrates and fluorides.

Tom Waite, EPA counsel, told the three companies penalties for noncompliance of permit restrictions could mean federal fines of \$2,500 to \$25,000 per day and civil penalty fines of \$10,000 per day if imposed by local governments.

The FMC Corporation would have to eliminate storm water runoff and provide secondary treatment for sanitary wastes. It already is in compliance with effluent levels.

Monsanto would have to adjust its discharge of phosphorus suspended solids and fluorides at the Soda Springs plant.

The law, an amendment to an appropriations act, allows for the charging of fees only at campgrounds with flush toilets, showers, sanitary disposal facilities, security patrols, trailer parks and other modern conveniences.

Iverson said only six parks in the nation had campgrounds meeting the requirements and none of those are in Utah.

The U.S. Forest Service announced Wednesday it would also discontinue fee-charging in the intermountain area because of the same law.

SALT LAKE CITY (UPI) — Vacationers can now camp free in Utah's five national parks.

National Park director for Utah, Phillip Iverson, said Thursday a law signed by President Nixon on Aug. 1, prohibits the Park Service from charging user fees and also changes the regulations concerning entrance fees.

Colson and his deputy in behalf of two Nixon supporters, one under federal indictment and the other threatened with possible federal prosecution.

## JAMES J. KILPATRICK Pity The Policeman's Lot

WASHINGTON — The mail brings from the FBI its annual report, bound in policeman blue and gray, dealing with crime in the United States. It is the saddest reading of the year. This is true even though serious crime in 1972 showed its first drop in 17 years.

Think of these statistics, if you will, not in terms of numbers, but in terms of human passion, terror, and anguish; see these events in tears and bloodshed: In 1962, police agencies reported 8,460 murders. Last year the figure was 18,520. There were 17,400 reported rapes in 1962. Last year saw 46,400. Robberies have more than tripled in this decade, from 110,300 to 374,600.

robberies. By the time they reach 18, thousands of these warped and violent youths have records of three or four convictions. Blacks continue to be involved in crime in numbers far out of proportion to their 12 percent of the population. The records of 6,114 reporting agencies show that blacks were arrested in 60 percent of the murder cases, 67 percent of the robberies, and 40 percent of the rapes.

in crime. In 1962, only 230 girls under 18 were arrested for narcotics violations. Last year the figure was 10,700. In this same period, the total number of arrests of young women has more than tripled, from 66,000 to 224,700. The picture that emerges from all this is deeply disquieting. It is tempting to explain away some of the evidence in terms of the statistics themselves; the reporting of crime is considerably more comprehensive than it was even 10 or 15 years ago. It is reasonable to assume that in an affluent society, with more property to steal, more

property will be stolen. A criminal's easy access to a handgun doubtless is a factor in soaring rates of robbery and murder. None of this gets to the real causes. Somewhere along the line, the great teaching influences of our society — the home, the school, the church — have failed in their teaching of moral values.

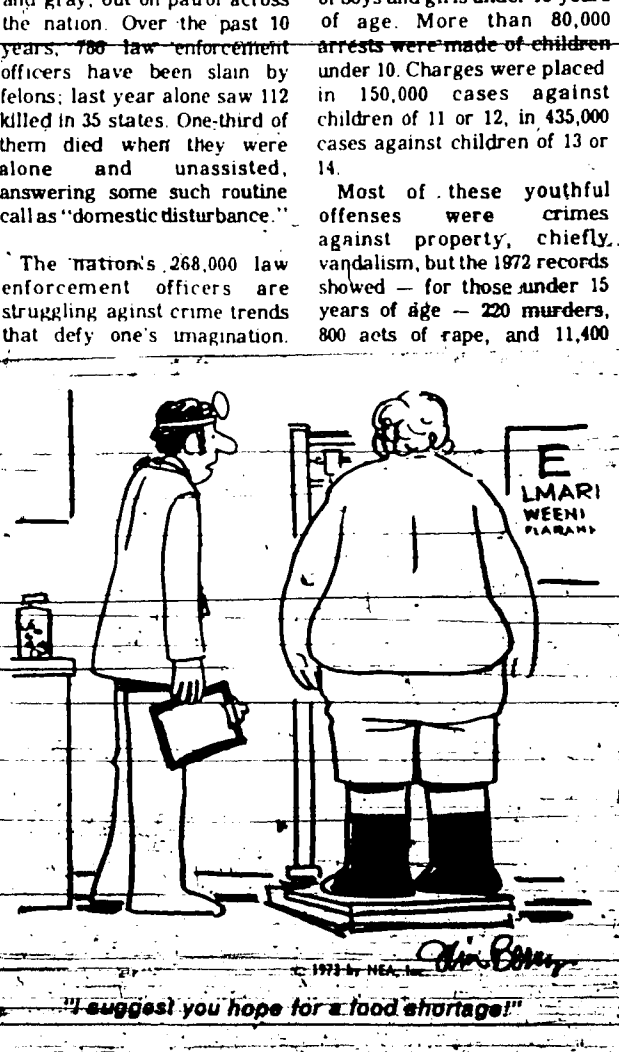

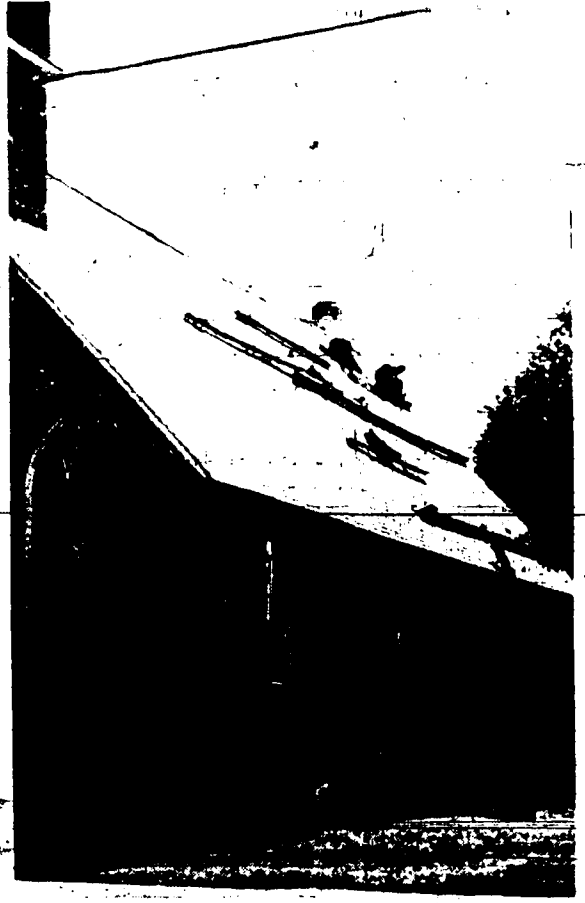

# Legless veteran

## honored

PROVO, Utah (UPI) — Five years ago Michael Johnson lost both legs to a Vietnamese land mine.

This year Johnson shot a four-point buck during hunting season and has been averaging almost 30 points a game for his basketball team.

And next week he will be in Miami, Fla., to officially receive an award as Disabled Veteran of the Year at the Aug. 12-18 national convention of the Disabled American Veterans.

Johnson, 25, his wife, Denise, and their 15-month-old son, Casey, live in a house half-way up the side of a mountain overlooking Provo.

"We had it built with wider hallways and with ramps instead of stairs," the ex-Marine said. "It's the little things that count when you are in a wheelchair all the time."

In addition to his job as an engineering draftsman for the Federal Bureau of Reclamation, his hunting, fishing and basketball games, he manages to find time to work with a local Boy Scout troop.

On Jan. 30, 1968, the day Johnson stepped on the land mine in South Vietnam, not many would have given him a chance to ever be active again.

His wounds cost him his right leg above the knee and his left leg at the hip. He lost two fingers and the thumb on his left hand, and the middle finger of his right hand. He has a steel plate in his forehead. A chunk of metal sliced off a chunk of his right arm. He spent a year and a half in military hospitals before he was well enough to be sent home.

How did he overcome all this? "I wasn't born to be a spectator," he says. "I burn to compete. I've always been that way. I won't retire from sports until I've been on the cover of Sports Illustrated magazine."

Johnson's drive and competitiveness aid him in helping other amputees at the Salt Lake Veterans Administration Hospital. Even though he says he "hates" hospitals after spending 18 months in them after stepping on the booby trap, he occasionally goes back to counsel servicemen with similar injuries.

# Mother says son good boy

HOUSTON (UPI) — Mary Henley said her 17-year-old son Wayne loved Dean Allen Corll like a father. Wayne told police he pumped six shots from a .22-caliber pistol into Corll to stop the bachelor electrician's string of perverted murders.

"He's a good boy," Mrs. Henley said of her son. "He loves people—all people. He was a happy boy."

Police believe Henley, Corll and another suspect, David Brooks, may be involved in as many as 30 murders and their bodies could be buried in three different areas.

When Henley left home Tuesday he told his mother he would be spending the night with a friend.

"And the next thing I hear from him, he's calling me from a boat storage yard in southwest Houston saying, 'Mama, I killed Dean,'" Mrs. Henley said.

Wayne dropped out of junior high school shortly before he turned 15 and took a job in a service station to earn money for the family. His mother said he never objected to working to help support the family.

"He enjoyed working," she said.

Wayne earned his high school equivalency and told his mother he planned to enter a Houston community college in September.

# US history tells of mass murders

The discovery of a mass grave site in a Texas boat shed ranks as the second worst mass murder in U.S. history—and police believe there are more victims to come.

By late Thursday, the bodies of 19 young men who police said were sexually molested, murdered and buried during the past two years had been discovered in the boat shed near Houston and a lake north of the city.

The worst mass murder on record is 25 farm hands whose bodies were found buried in California along the Feather River in 1971. Juan Corona was convicted of the killings earlier this year and sentenced to life in prison.

Other mass murders: —Charles Whitman killed 16 persons and wounded 32 others Aug. 1, 1966, including 14 of them from the observation deck of the University of Texas

lower in Austin, Tex., before police killed him.

—Howard B. Unruh, 28, a World War II veteran, killed 13 Camden, N.J., residents, in September, 1949. He was captured and is in Trenton State Hospital.

—Herbert W. Mullin, 25, was charged with killing 10 persons in California last January—but during his trial, which is now in progress, his attorneys said he is insane and actually killed 13 persons.

—Edmund Emil Kemper III, 24, is charged with killing eight women—six coeds, his mother and a friend of his mother's—in 1972 and 1973 in the Santa Cruz area of northern California. Kemper was previously convicted of killing two of his grandparents when he was 14 and spent several years in a mental hospital before being released.

# Geiberger, Iverson take opening PGA tourney lead

CLEVELAND (UPI) — Former winner AJ Geiberger and little-known Don Iverson shot early-morning 67s Thursday and then watched them stand up for the first round lead in the 55th PGA Championship, but U.S. Open winner Johnny Miller had a message for them.

"You watch," Miller said after struggling home late in the day with a 72. "The guys who shot under par this morning will be over par tomorrow."

Miller complained that uneven watering of the greens made the course play "two or three shots harder" for the afternoon starters than the morning players, and said things would change when the starting times are exchanged for Friday's second round.

The 67s by Geiberger, the 1966 PGA champ, and Iverson were four-under-par over Canterbury's 6,852 yards of hills and valleys and tied the competitive course record held by Sam Snead, Chandler Harper and Chick Harbert.

Bob Dickson, one of only three men to win the U.S. and British Amateur championships in the same year, and Mike Hill, best known only as tempestuous Dave's younger brother, shared third place with two-under-par 69's.

Hot Tom Weiskopf made a 30-foot birdie putt on the final green for a 70, putting him in a group that also included 1969 winner Ray Floyd, former U.S. and British Open champion

Tony Jacklin of England and longshots Don Bies and Gibby Gilbert.

Weiskopf was the only one of the big name players to break par on a sweltering, although windy, day that baked the greens and made the course, according to Miller, "as hard or harder than Oakmont" — where he won the Open in June.

The mild controversy over the condition of the greens reminded people of the second day of the Open when officials mistakenly watered the greens too much and the result was an easy course and 19 sub-par rounds, a record for any day in U.S. Open history.

But Miller said what was done at Canterbury was "unfair."

"Hitting on the greens is like hitting on a table," he said. "They watered just in front of the greens and just on the front edge of the greens, and I think that's unfair. That's tricking the course up."

"I wish they'd leave it all hard or all soft but at least the same way."

The course superintendent, however, insisted Miller was all wet.

"The wind dried out the higher portions of the greens in the back," insisted Superintendent Bill Burdek. "The watering was uniform."

Bruce Crampton shot a par 71 and said he played "quite pleasantly," although he three-putted twice and missed a total of four putts from within five feet.

Miller and Jack Nicklaus, who played in successive afternoon groups, both had 72s after promising starts. Miller bogeyed the 14th, 15th and 16th holes in succession and Nicklaus made bogeys at 12 and 14.

Defending champion Gary Player and Masters winner Tommy Aaron, who was five over par on the last four holes including a triple-bogey seven at 18, had 73s. Lee Trevino and a discouraged Arnold Palmer were at 76.

Palmer, still trying to win the PGA and complete a slam of the four major titles, bogeyed five of the last eight holes and was "discouraged" by his lousy putting.

"I've had the same thing happen so many times lately. I just got disgusted," said the 43-year-old Palmer.

Both Geiberger, wholess since his '66 PGA triumph at Firestone Country Club in nearby Akron, and Iverson, whose only tour victory was in a satellite tournament last year, putted better than they ever expected to but when they came in, no one had any idea the conditions of the greens might have had something to do with it.

"I have to get used to making putts again," said Geiberger, who finished third at Atlanta last spring. "When you've had trouble putting for so long, you just don't feel you can make them. It's a little frustrating."

The 35-year-old Geiberger, who once earned a reputation for gobbling peanut butter

sandwiches on the course, now has switched to cracker-birdied three of the last seven holes.

Iverson joined him at the top when he holed a 40-footer for a birdie at 15 and a 50-footer for another birdie at the 605-yard 16th.

"It was the best putting round I've had all year," said Iverson. "Not just the two long putts, but I made every putt I had to."

## U.S. women teams head for Russia

BOSTON (UPI) — The U.S. women's basketball and gymnastics teams were to leave for Moscow today to compete in the World University Games and both squads were hopeful of bolstering the American image in international competition.

The Russians again appear to have the strongest teams in both sports but both gymnastics Coach Mimi Murray and basketball Coach Jill Upton say their U.S. teams could win "with perfect execution."

"We've heard the Russians are throwing in the same girls that competed on the Olympic gymnastic team," said Miss Murray, who has coached Springfield College to five straight undefeated seasons and three national titles in five years on the job.

The Americans always have taken a back seat in international gymnastic competition, however.

"The East Germans, Hungarians and Czechoslovaks — all the Soviet bloc teams — are fantastic. If we can do our tricks well, we should be right up there," she said, "but we can't afford any breaks or misses."

## Pineda probably ends Ramos' career on 5th-round knockout

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — A swarming Fury "The Fury" Pineda of Mexico, Mexico, scored a sensational fifth round knockout of former two-time world lightweight champion Mando Ramos of Long Beach, Calif., in a scheduled 10-round fight Thursday night.

Referee Dick Young called an end to the bout at 1:45 of the fifth after Pineda, 21, knocked Ramos to the canvas with a series of left hooks and right hands.

For Ramos, the youngest

man ever to win the 135-pound title, it probably was the end of the line. He was making his first start since Sept. 15, 1972, when he took a severe beating and lost his World Boxing Council crown to Mexico's Chango Carmona in an eighth round knockout.

The 24-year-old ex-champion was no match for the wild-swinging Pineda, who gave away three inches in height and four and one-half inches in reach to the 5-foot-10 Ramos.

A crowd of 8,196 turned out at

the Olympic Auditorium and paid a gross gate of \$56,000.

Scoring his 21st victory and 18th knockout in his 23rd start, Pineda, 135 1/2, put himself in line for a crack at unbeaten Jimmy Hear of Los Angeles.

A 44 underdog, Pineda was ahead on all three officials' cards when the knockout came. Ramos weighed 137 1/2.

Ramos, now 33-6, was unable to keep his onrushing opponent at bay as Pineda continually outjabbed and outmaneuvered the ex-titleholder.

## Washington-Denver exhibition ushers in 11-game NFL slate

Coming off a defeat with a questionable quarterback, a running back with a troublesome reputation and the loss of the first string safety, a pro football team could hardly be described as set.

But that is in fact the case with the Washington Redskins, whose only misery seems to be getting a punter who can average more than 38 yards a kick.

The new punter, David Beverly, will get his big chance at Robert F. Kennedy Stadium before an expected sellout crowd of 53,000 tonight when the Redskins take on the Denver Broncos in a National Football League exhibition game.

The Redskins-Broncos contest kicks off the second big weekend of NFL pre-season activity with 10 more games slated for Saturday night and one each on Sunday and Monday nights.

On Saturday, Dallas is at Oakland, Pittsburgh at Minnesota, Philadelphia at Cincinnati,

New Orleans at Miami, Chicago at Detroit, Cleveland at Los Angeles, Buffalo at Green Bay, Baltimore at Atlanta, St. Louis at San Diego and San Francisco meets the New York Jets at Tampa, Fla.

The New England Patriots play host to the New York Giants Sunday night and Kansas City entertains Detroit Monday night.

Beverly, who boomed the football ball and high for Auburn University, has a chance to be the only rookie that Coach George Allen may keep on the Redskins' squad, which is deep in veterans and former all pros.

When Rosey Taylor, the safety on last season's NFC championship team, fractured his elbow in last week's 17-14 loss to the Detroit Lions, it could have been tragic.

But Allen had traded over the winter for Ken Houston, all-pro safety last season for the Houston Oilers. Houston had been playing on the second team but will move into the lineup tonight.

And Duane Thomas, who had refused to play in 1972 for Dallas, New England and San Diego, is slated to start at

running back for Washington. A chance has come over Thomas, who is shaking his leg, stage by clapping and encouragement, to his teammates of three weeks and is even beginning to chatter a bit.

Finally quarterback Sonny Jurgensen, one of the NFL's all-time passing leaders, is recovering from an Achilles-heel injury that sidelined him for most of the previous season. Jurgensen will quarterback the Redskins in the second half after Billy Kilmer runs the club in the first half.

The Broncos, in their first start of the exhibition season, will rely on the running of Floyd Little, two-time rushing leader of the AFC, and the passing of Charley Johnson, who set a Denver completion record last year.

# NM search persists for pleading boy

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (UPI) — Bouncing radio beams and baseless rumors hampered the search for a boy desperately pleading for help over citizens band radio since Tuesday.

Search coordinator Richard Damerow said there are no plans to curtail today's search for the boy, believed to be trapped alongside his father in an overturned truck.

Though the boy in three days has never been able to identify himself beyond saying his first name is Larry, Damerow and other authorities agreed the search must continue on the assumption no hoax is involved.

State Police reported 200 volunteers on motorcycles, horses and four-wheel drive

vehicles combed mountains and plains and the Civil Air Patrol said six planes were in the air. The number of citizens band buffs (CBERS) on the airways attempting to track the child was limitless.

Damerow said there would be "a meeting with as many people in authority as possible to try to filter the many stories we have" and coordinate efforts more effectively.

The main focus of the search is in the area of the Sandia and Manzano Mountains in central New Mexico. However, according to state police Sgt. A. B. Whitehouse, "we're searching Alamogordo, Las Cruces and all over the state because we aren't really sure he's in the Sandias or Manzanos."

"It's my understanding that a skip of a radio signal is possible several hundred miles. We're really in no better shape then we were when we heard the boy's predicament Tuesday evening," he said.

The bouncing of radio transmitting waves off the rolling hills, canyons and mountain tops in this area is making the search impossible.

The state police man said officers are "having a heck of a time checking down all these rumors coming from California to Ontario, Canada, concerning the boy and his father." He said all rumors had been "proved false to date."

# NY murder suspect captured

WITHERBEE, N.Y. (UPI) — An experienced woodsman wanted for questioning in two murders was "shot" and captured Thursday, ending a 12-day cat and mouse search over a wide area of the Adirondack Mountains.

The suspect, Robert F. Garrow Sr., a convicted rapist, was under police guard at Champlain Valley Physicians Hospital Medical Center in Plattsburgh.

Maj. Donald Ambler of the state police said men were dispatched along a narrow roadway cutting through the hillside. State troopers using bloodhounds began probing the area to force Garrow onto the roadway.

Garrow, 37, a Syracuse mechanic, worked his way to the road, but began to flee back into the woods, Ambler said.

Hillary LaBlanc, a conservation officer, fired at the suspect and hit him four times, but Garrow managed to stumble through the thick vegetation for about 75 yards before collapsing, Ambler said.

"It's too bad Garrow couldn't be taken without injury, but there is no question in my mind that LaBlanc saved the lives of several of my men by firing," Ambler said.

Troopers charged Mandy with hindering prosecution.

For the first eight days of the search, Garrow used his skills as a woodsman to slip past search parties stalking the marshes and mountains around Speculator, about 60 miles southwest of here.

Earlier this week, Garrow stole a car, slipped past police surveillance and visited the Mandy house, police said.

Up to 200 state police and conservation officers were rushed into the area. Roadblocks were set up as far away as the Canadian border, 65 miles north.

Garrow, described by state police as having an "extensive record for rape and various sex crimes," served a seven-year term in prison on a rape conviction and has told members of his family that he would never return to a prison cell.

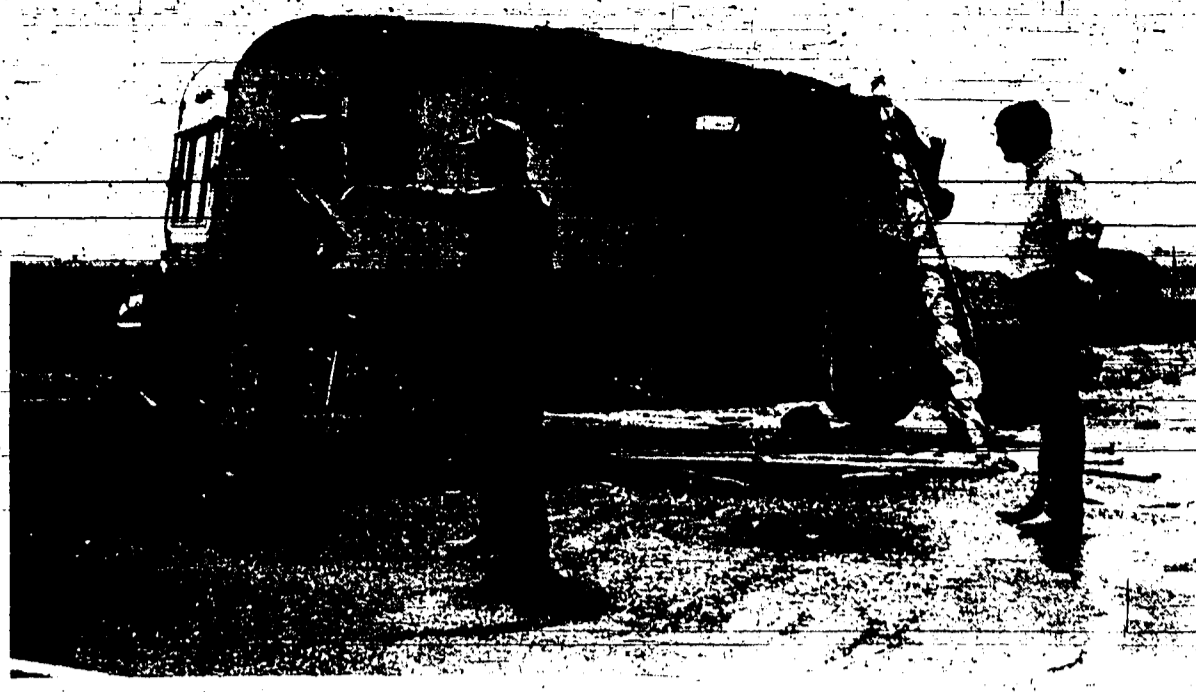

There will be no hot lunch that day. Hot lunches are scheduled to begin Aug. 23. Filer schools will be dismissed for the entire week of the Twin Falls County Fair, Sept. 3-7.

## Heyburn council okays remodeling

HEYBURN — City and postal officials will begin negotiations to enlarge Heyburn's present post office, the Heyburn City Council decided at a meeting Wednesday evening. Growth in the Heyburn area has caused both the post office and city offices to outgrow present space. The post office will be asked to take over most of the present city office space and the city will build an addition to the present office building to allow city offices to move and expand. Postal officials hope to complete negotiations within 90 days. The city will call for bids for the addition soon after completion of the negotiations. PMP Inc., Twin Falls, will construct storm sewers along 18th Street. PMP bid \$23,872.93 on the project. Bills for irrigation water were mailed to users Aug. 1 this year. The bills are for 1973 irrigation water. Formerly the billing was included with city tax notices. The bills are to be paid by Dec. 31.

# Soaring event under way

HAILEY — "It's a challenging sport, to harness nature's powers, to follow cloud and terrain features. Here, we fly with eagles." That's how Dave Stevenson described soaring, a fast growing sport nationally as well as locally. Stevenson was one of about 20 participants — primarily from Idaho, California and Utah — in the annual Sun Valley Soaring Regatta which winds up this weekend. He also operates a commercial soaring business, Sawtooth Soaring, out of the Friedman Memorial Airport, Hailey. The week-long regatta mainly featured non-competitive, fun flying. The event was based at the Hailey airport, with Thursday spent soaring in the Obsidian area. Regatta chairman was Louis Stur, Sun Valley. Stevenson said the area was particularly suited for soaring and offers an average of about seven hours soaring time each day. He said that the hot, dry weather creates the thermals — heat updrafts — needed for soaring and that the adjacent peaks provide "ridge lift" as the wind currents about the ridges and travel upward. Average sailplanes, Stevenson said, weigh from 400 to 900 pounds and are constructed from various materials, including

wood and fabric, fiberglass or metal. The crafts have an average wing span of about 50 feet. Glide ratios, the amount of horizontal feet traveled for every foot of drop, will vary according to the type of air foil the sailplane incorporates. Stevenson said his craft will travel about 28 feet horizontally for every one-foot of drop or 28 miles for every one mile of drop. The sailplanes contain the same controls as their motor-driven sister, the airplane, including an elevator, rudder and wing ailerons. However, the sailplane utilizes a "blance wheel" on the belly of the craft, a small tail wheel and wing tip skids. Stevenson said the sailplane is carried aloft on an about 200 foot-long rope towed by usually a single-engine airplane. Both crafts contain two-rope release hooks, but usually the sailplane pilot determines the point of release, when he feels a good up-draft, he said. The release usually occurs at an average elevation of 2,000 feet. Depending on the type of craft and weather conditions, sailplanes may travel from 40 to 100 miles per hour and cover about 300 miles. Stevenson said the world's distance for a single-seat craft is about 900 miles. The world's altitude is 46,000 feet, he said, however the average maximum altitude is about 16,500 feet.

# Gooding hospital lowers daily room rate by \$2

GOODING — Gooding County Memorial Hospital has temporarily reduced its room rate to pay back overcharge violations under the federal Phase II stabilization program. Since Aug. 3, the hospital has been reducing room charges to all private pay patients by \$2 per day. The reduced charges will remain in effect until a total of \$2,700 has been paid back. In addition, the hospital will reduce its medicare reimbursement for 1972 by about \$12,000, also to compensate for overcharges. According to Jerald Peterson, assistant director for stabilization in Idaho for the Internal Revenue Service, the

payback, which has been voluntarily agreed to by the hospital, was necessitated after the hospital "increased some room rates" during fiscal 1972 which violated Phase II regulations. Under Phase II, Peterson said, hospitals are prohibited from making price increases "which would increase annual aggregate revenue by more than 6 per cent" over the previous fiscal year.

He said the investigation was initiated under IRS regulations when the hospital requested reimbursement for medicare above 109 per cent of its 1971 reimbursements.

Peterson said neither Magic Valley Memorial Hospital in Twin Falls nor Cassia Memorial Hospital in Burley had been investigated by the IRS. He said there could be more investigations of Magic Valley hospitals, however, and that further information would be released after the investigations were completed.

Peterson said the repayment procedure agreed to by the hospital followed an "intensive investigation" of the hospital's pricing practices by the IRS.

Gooding Memorial board chairman Lee Wagner said Thursday the reduced room rate might remain in effect for two or more months, depending on the occupancy rate at the hospital.

The \$12,007 payback to medicare would take the form of medicare simply not paying that amount in 1972 reimbursements, Wagner said.

Wagner said the overcharges on the part of the hospital were "the result of the rather complicated Phase II formulas used in determining hospital charges."

The reduced room rates, Wagner said, would affect all patients other than those on medicare, including patients with insurance coverage.

He said the hospital did not anticipate any cutback in services and would operate "normally" for the balance of 1973.

The paybacks would have to be compensated for in the hospital's budgeting, he said, but this would not affect patient care. He said no decision had been made on how to compensate for the lost revenue.

Noting that "all hospital costs have gone up appreciably," Wagner said, "It's rather difficult to operate under these conditions, but we're all right."

## Crews fight S. Hills fire

About 25 men are on each crew, Hansen said. A U. S. Forest Service Region IV fire overhead team is running fire operations, with a communications team from Elko, Nev. In addition, an air tanker from Salt Lake City, a lead plane from the Boise Interregional Fire Control Center, and a portable fire weather station have been added to the Sawtooth fire fighting unit, Hansen said. He estimated forest service personnel manning the fire at about 250 men.

Four caterpillars and five tankers with a "mother" tanker and approximately 80 men were working today on the BLM sector of the fire, Elg said.

"If we get through today's burning period — to about 6 p.m. we'll consider the fire controlled," Elg said. "That's if we don't have too strong winds or high temperatures, and if we can hold our present lines. This is extremely rough and steep country," he said.

In addition, five lightning-caused fires were reported in the Shoshone BLM District yesterday between five and 8 p.m.

Two of the five were still burning this morning, but were expected to be contained by noon today.

District information officer Michael Green said the two largest fires burned about 1,800 acres each; one of these was five miles northeast of the Kimama Lookout station 18 miles northeast of Paul. Fifteen men manned the fire with three tankers, and it was reported contained at 9 a.m. this morning.

The second fire, seven miles northeast of Richfield, was manned with 32 men, three tankers and a caterpillar. It was expected to be controlled by noon today, Green said.

A third fire, seven miles southeast of Gooding, burned about 70 acres and was extinguished with the help of rain, Green said. Fourteen men and one tanker controlled that blaze at 8 p.m. last night.

The fourth fire, 14 miles west of American Falls, burned 800 acres. It was contained by 8 a.m. this morning by 26 men, one tanker from Burley and two from Idaho Falls, in addition to a refill tanker from the Shoshone district.

Five men with one caterpillar manned an about 200 acre fire eight miles northwest of Bliss this morning. Containment time was estimated at noon today, Green said.

## Pay hiked

RUPERT — By unanimous vote and with no discussion, the Rupert City Council approved a 3.5 per cent cost of living increase to all city employees Tuesday night.

The motion was made by Cwynn Morgan William Strasser and seconded by Commodore W. J. (Bill) Whittom, moment before the regular meeting was adjourned.

"I think we're one of the only cities in Idaho which has given a raise like this," Rupert Mayor Wendell Johnson said Thursday. "With costs rising every day, he said, it was becoming harder for everyone to make ends meet.

The last raise for city employees was approved in March, retroactive to January 1 of this year and averaged out to about 5 1/2 per cent.

The raise approved Tuesday is retroactive to Aug. 1 of this year.

## SIRPDA aide speaks at Rupert

RUPERT — "We need to no longer be bound by county lines and city lines," Paul Kelly, director of the Southern Idaho Resource Planning and Development Agency (SIRPDA), said Thursday.

Kelly told members of the Rupert Chamber of Commerce that SIRPDA is "an advisory group of people who serve on a voluntary basis and are answerable to local governments" in planning growth in Minidoka, Cassia, Twin Falls and Jerome counties.

"SIRPDA is not a threat to local governments," Kelly reiterated several times, but came about to help solve area problems because "local governments have not created any device to cover all the jurisdictions in the area."

"We may not work, live and play in the same area," Kelly said, "and previous boundaries are becoming less important."

SIRPDA was organized in 1971 as a result of action taken by Soil Conservation Districts in the area, Kelly said. The original 13-man board was expanded to 17 to comply with Housing and Urban Development stipulations requiring councils of government to be composed of two-thirds elected officials.

Members of the board include county commissioners, at large members appointed by the commissioners, elected officials from each municipality, and representatives of each Soil

Conservation District. SIRPDA is granted two-thirds of its funds from the federal government and one-third from the four counties, which receive it paid in cash or in kind.

"We're trying to develop a planning process for all four counties," Kelly said.

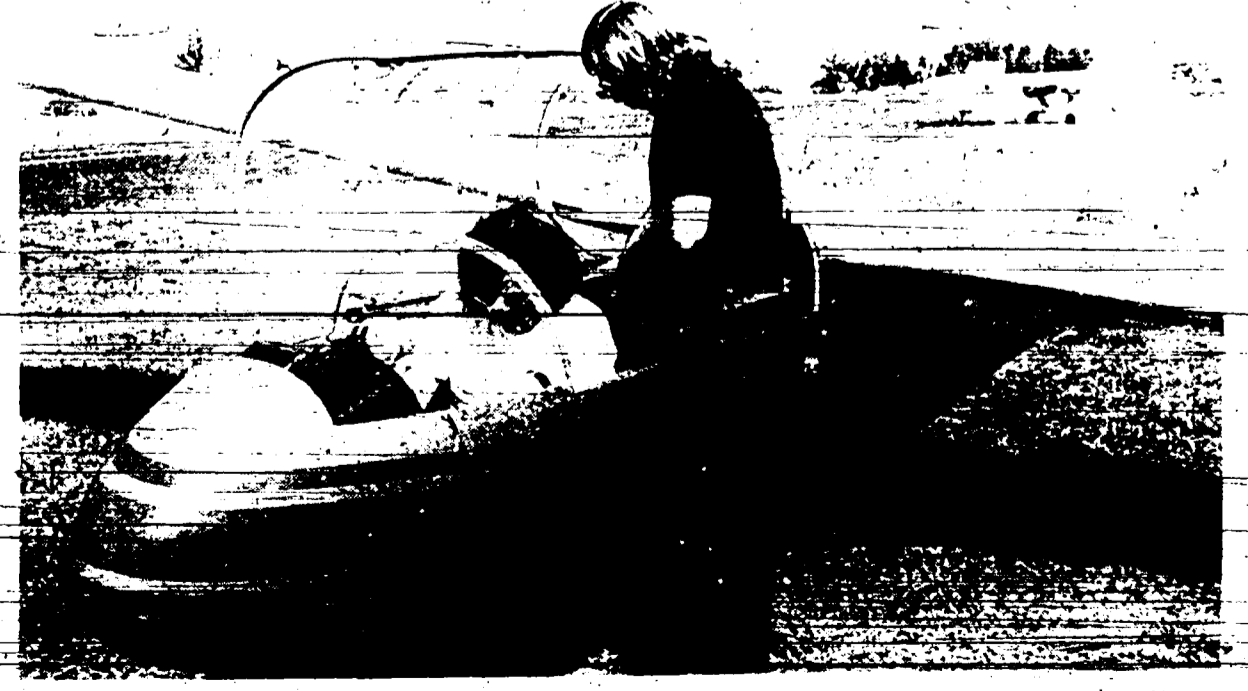
The greatest accomplishment of SIRPDA has been to get people from across county lines to sit down and talk across a table," Kelly told the group.

SIRPDA has changed the framework under which federal funds are available, Kelly said. Funds from the Environmental Protection Agency now have to go through the organization, which means that to get these funds, a regional planning organization must be set up in the area, he said.

The organization requested and was granted an extension to July 1, 1975 for Rupert in HUD's requirement that a comprehensive plan be drawn up before federal funds could be made available, he said.

If Rupert applies for a grant between now and that date, Kelly said, it will be eligible without the plan.

One of SIRPDA's purposes is to provide technical assistance to cities in their comprehensive planning, Kelly said. The organization recently created an advisory committee for planning which will be staffed with people from county planning agencies. The group will determine if they want to plan together or separately and work together on plans and procedures.

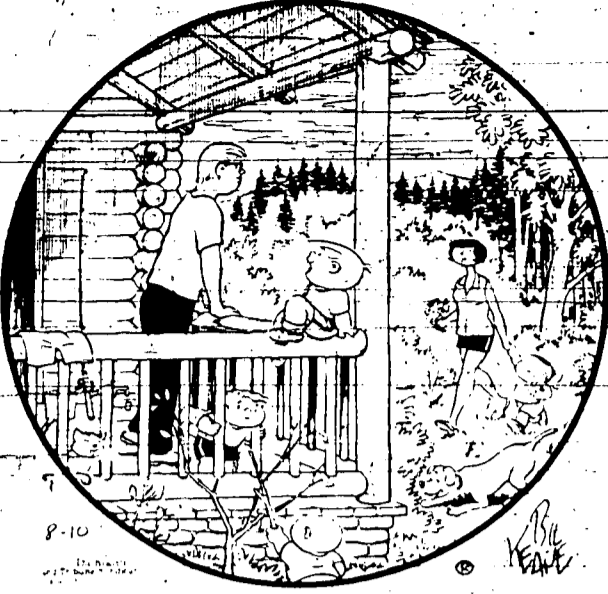

# Ski area for sale

**DRIGGS** — An Ohio company is negotiating to buy the Grand Targhee Ski Area, just across the Idaho border in Wyoming.

Manager Bob Blank of the area said the Buckeye Plastics and Molding Co. has agreed with the present owners on a purchase price. He said Buckeye would spend about half a million dollars to buy the resort and pay off existing obligations, and another \$1.5 million to put in new lodging and restaurant facilities, ski lifts, and additional

construction.

Blank said he expects the sale to be completed in about three weeks. He said both the sale and some construction currently under way at the resort were delayed by a lawsuit, but the ski area won't be sold until the lawsuit is resolved.

Blank said the suit and construction is now under way on lodging facilities, a maintenance shop, and a sewer system.

Blank said, "There have been rumors put out that Grand Targhee will not be open this year. That's wrong. Whether this sale goes through or not, Targhee will be open, and wide open, and going full bore."

Blank said he will probably decide not to remain with the resort as manager after it's sold, but he said he is not yet certain of that decision.
