Texas murder toll climbs to 21

HOUSTON (UPI) - A chainsmoking teen-ager today led police to two more bodies buried in three-foot-deep graves in an-East Texas pine forest, raising to 21 the number of murdervictims -- all believed to be young boys who were tortured, sexually abused and killed by a bachelor electrician and two young friends.

The two bodies, wrapped in plastic bags and coated walk lime, were dug up near Broaddus, Tex., near the shores of Lake Sam Rayburn 125 miles north of Houston...

Elmer Wayne-Henley, 17, currently charged with four counts of murder in the mass slayings, led officers to the scene and pointed out the graves, which were about six weeks old, according to San Augustine County Sheriff John Hoyt.

(See related stories, p. 6) Before the 130-pound youth confessed and revealed the forest graves, he called his mother on the telephone and said:

'Momma, I've told them everything. Momma, be happy for me because now, at last, I can live."

Henley, puffing on one cigarette after another and his brown hair hanging over his face all the way to his chin, told

police they will find about 30 bodies at three different burial sites: If that is true, it would be the worst mass murder in U.S.

Police unearthed 17 bodies under a boat shed in southwest Houston. Two more were found Thursday night near those found

Henley said there were only four bodies at the lake site. "They, were all within about a 600-yard radius," Sheriff Hoyt said.

After the bodies were discovered at the lake site, Henley. wearing brown oxfords, drew a map in the sand with the toe of his right shoe that marked the spot where more bodies could be found at High Island near Galveston. Officers then took the youth by car south to search for more graves

Another youth, David Brooks, 18, has confessed to police that he was involved in the slayings.

Fire battled

TWIN FALLS -- U.S. Bureau of Lan Management and Forest Service personnel continued battling today an about 7,000 acre lightning caused fire which began Thursday afternoon at about 3:25 p.m. in the South Hills.

This morning, Harold Elg, BLM Burley District chief of operations, said "It looks better than it did yesterday, but we're a long way from coming out of the woods yet.'

The fire, burning about one third on Forest Service land and the remainder on BLM land began in North Cottonwood Creek, about 12 miles south of Twin Falls, then headed eastward to McMillan Creek and extended west approximately two miles from Cottonwood Creek, Elg said. It was manned today by comgined Forst Service and BLM teams.

According to Dee Hansen, Sawtooth National Forest dispatcher, the Payette National Forest Interregional fire crew, four Spanish American crews from Twin Falls, and three Snake River crews from th Bolse area have been sent to the fire, and two crews from Utah-were expected

CAIRO (UPT) - Police said today between 70 and 80 persons were feared drowned Thursday when a bus swerved to avoid a horse drawn eart and skidded into an irrigation canal 70 miles southwest of Cairo.*

They said there were 12 survivors and that navy frogmen had recovered 25 bodies. Police said they were told at first 140 persons were jammed into the bus but later reports said 80 to 90 persons were aboard

Andrus asks research

IDAHO FALLS - Gov. Cecil D. Andrus told a congressional subcommittee today the federal government should make a major effort in Idaho in research and development of geothermal energy resources."

Andrus was the leadoff witness at a hearing called by the Water and Power Resources Subcommittee of the Senate Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs to study geothermal energy. Testimony was taken at the Westbank Motel. The Sub-Committee is chaired by Sen. Frank (hurch, I)-Ida, Andrus told the subcommittee members Idaho is "uniquely situated to

provide a location for the research needed to answer" questions about the potential for geothermal energy to help meet increased demands for energy across the country. Noting that recent studies had turned up 400 thermal springs across the state

and Identified 25 areas that warrant further study, the governor called for the establishment of a geothermal test facility In addition, he said, "we also need federal technical and financial assistance

to our state agencies and institutions." Apparently pleased by recent proposals made by the Raft River Rural Electric Cooperative and Aerojet Nuclear Corporation for a test facility, Andrus proped other groups to come up with proposals.

Andrus also said he hoped consideration would be given to development of a National Geothermal Testing Station at the National Reactor Testing Station (NRTS) west of here

"I'd like to be a little presumptuous and suggest that those companies with a geothermal scientific and engineering capability and interest prepare proposals that would establish a National Geothermal Testing Station at the

HEIDELBERG, Germany (UPI) - The U.S. Army today dismantled a brand new intelligence operation designed to keep watch over GL dissidents; calling it "inappropriate!"

At the same time, an official Army statement slapped back at critics who have been accusing it of illegally tapping civilian phones in West Germany and denied the army was persecuting dissident soldiers. "An 8th Infantry Division

document entitled Military Intelligence Counter-Dissidence Program has been rescinded by The 8th Infantry Division," the Army said in a statement issued Thursday from its Heidelberg headquarters.

"The document was determined to be inappropriate, as guidance on dissent contained in Army regulations is considered sufficient and soldier dissent within the command is presently at a very low level."

The cancellation came two days after The New York Times disclosed the existence of the 8th Infantry Division directive and quoted portions of it in a dispatch. The Times said a copy of the unclassified document had been teaked by a military clerk.

Defending its position in the matter of GI dissents, the Army statement said, "This headquarters is not directing an intensified military counterintelligence program ägainst underground activities within the United States Army, Euro-

But the statement said the Army was obliged to protect its position as a combat-ready bulwark of North Atlantic Treaty (NATO) defenses.



Nixon angry over gnew's troubles

WASHINGTON (UPI) - President Nixon thit the ceiling" when he learned Vice President Spiro T. Agnew was under investigation in an alleged Maryland kickback scheme and tried to talk Agnew out of holding a news conference, White House sources said today.

An "angry" Nixon, the sources said, told Agnew at a meeting they held Tuesday that silence was a better posture than holding a news

Agnew, however, told Nixon he felt he should go ahead with the news conference, the sources said. The vice president held the conference Wednesday, describing the allegations of bribery, extortion, conspiracy and tax evasion as "damned lies."

One source said of Nixon's reaction when he learned of Agnew's troubles that he "hit the ceiling."

The White House sources said Nixon plans to let Agnew "stand alone" in his defense against the allegations. Agnew indicated at the news conference he is prepared to do this.

"I think the vice president of the United States should stand on his own feet," Agnew said. "So I am not spending my time looking

around to see who is supporting me. am defending myself." Agnew said he met with Nixon for an hour and 45 minutes Tuesday evening. He described their

discussion as "far reaching" but declined to amplify the remark. Agnew flew Thursday to Californía for what staff members said were "a couple of days off."

The vice president was expected to stay at Palm Springs, Calif., until Sunday. He frequently spends his free time at the resort, where singer Frank Sinatra and some other close friends trive homes.

Earlier Thursday, the Washington Star-News reported that Agnew's attorneys in New York and Washington were exploring the possibility of a claim of constitutional immunity for Agnew. Should Agnew make such a claim and should federal prosecutors go ahead with their case, the courts probably would have to resolve any conflicts.

Since the news broke, White House statements with regard to Agnew have been decidedly cool, with the President's spokesman shying away from expressing Nixon's full confi-

dence in Agnew. Some observers felt that Agnew's performance in his news conference had added to his stature, in the eyes of the public and the

Nixon today was at his Camp David, Md., retreat with his closest advisers preparing his public response to Watergate charges that have damaged his second administration.

Some of his aides believe that Nixon will take a "tough" stance in a televised address to the nation which may be delivered on prime time Tuesday or Wednesday evening. They noted that Nixon hopes to focus on the broad picture, pointing up his past accomplishments, and branding Watergate preoccupation as "mean, petty, vicious and unimportant," as he said in his toast recently to Japanese Prime Minister Kakuei Tanaka.

With Nixon at Camp David were Gen. Alexander M. Haig Jr., White House chief of staff; speechwriter Ray Price; press secretary Ronald L. Ziegler and confidential secretary Rose Mary Woods.

He was away from the White House when lawyers for the Serrate Investigating committee served a civil suit to the President's attorneys demanding access to tapes of Watergate-related presidential conversations.

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AEC stores radioactive

waste at IF

By United Press International Atomic Energy Commission said Thursday it

will receive 1,400, 50-pound drums of uranium 233 waste at its site near Idaho Falls for storage from another AEC facility near Pittsburgh, Pa.,

The announcement came on the heels of an accident Tuesday in Blackfoot which derailed a Union Pacific Railroad car carrying 140 steel drums containing radioactive

A spokesman at the AEC in Idaho Falls said the shipment will be made by truck over the next 80 weeks. It will come from the AEC facility in West Mifflin, Pa.

The law, an amendment to an appropriations act, allows for the charging of fees only at campgrounds with flush toilets, showers, sanitary disposal facilities, security patrols, trailer parks and other modern conveniences.

Iverson said only six parks in the nation had campgrounds meeting the requirements and none of those are in Utah.

The U.S. Forest Service announced Wednesday it would also discontinue fee-charging in the intermountain area because of the same law.





Documented: "Eyes-Only" White House Memo

WASHINGTON - Senate investigators have obtained "eyes-only" White House emoranda documenting two attempted interventions both apparently aborted - by presidential ligutenant Charles W. Colson and his deputy in behalf of two Nixon supporters, one under federal indictment and the other threatened with possible federal prosecution.

A memo from Colson, who left the White House staff March 10, urged that a federal indictment against Nixonite Pittsburgh labor leader F.G. Gualtieri be "worked out" and 'disposed of."

Another from Colson's deputy Richard Howard, still on the White House staff, proposed that the Justice Department clear Maryland Nixon contributor Harry W. Rodgers III in regard to possible violations of federal election aws.

Charges against Gualtieri were later dismissed. No charges were ever brought against Rodgers. Still, there is absolutely no evidence this was caused by White House interference. To the contrary, the two requests from Colson's office probably were never relayed beyond the White -House counsel's office."

Nevertheless, the memoranda buttress contentions by present White

process represented a recurrent pattern by Colson, President Nixon's top political troubleshooter. Mr. Nixon's senior advisers now call such solicitude for White House "friends" — as well as punitive. action against "enemies" inexcusable and unacceptable. Japanese: Those Nixon Snubs

WASHINGTON (NEA) - It is sadly instructive to watch Prime Minister Kakuei Tanaka of Japan execute verbal end runs to avoid acknowledging the humiliation this top ally and trading partner has suffered several times at President Nixon's hands

Talking at length to a small group of newsmen, the prime minister began with the expected comment that his visit here was part of a series of continuing talks with the President, the first meeting having occurred 11 months ago in Hawaii.

The purpose, of course, is better understanding. So far so good.

But right at the outset, Tanaka was asked why, if this method high-level

communication was deemed fruitful, difficulties arose between Japan and the United

His answer was that, by and large, the relationship between the two countries was satisfactory but that "there are me frictions, naturally."

On the surface, that made the differences sound trivial. So Tanaka was asked if it were not a fact that they developed in the areas of highest importance to Japan.

Here the prime minister did not give a direct, responsive. reply. To have done so would have been to concede, in a difficult setting, that Mr. Nixon has deeply angered the Japanese on at least three occasions by shocking them with major policy moves on

which they were given no prior notice.

Two of the shocks are now an old story — the 1971 announcements of the President's intent to visit China and his severe economic turnabout involving trade and urrency moves which strongly affected Japan.

The third, the stiff U.S. export curb on its soybean output, is only weeks old. For the Japanese, soybeans are not animal feed but vital human sustenance, and they fill 90 per cent of their needs in this

Just recently, presidential aide Henry Kissinger gamely took the blame for the 1971 failure to advise Japan in advance of its revolutionary overtures toward China.

But the matter of what to tell an ally and when is in truth a presidential decision, and the Japanese know it. The anger which Tanaka, for many reasons, must publicly conceal on a vist here has often been candidly expressed to merby lesser officials, both here and.

in Japan.

If our silence with Japan on the 1971 China move can now be perceived as a mistake. what was learned from it? We have just finished kicking our friends in the teeth on soybeans.

Pity The Policeman's Lot

WASHINGTON - The mail brings from the FBI its annual report, bound in policeman blue and gray, dealing with crime in the United States. It is the saddest reading of the year.

This is true even though serious crime in 1972 showed its first drop in 17 years. The picture is by no means entirely dark. Except for shoplifting, most crimes against property showed significant declines in 1972. The number of law enforcement officers killed in action dropped perceptibly... Nearly a hundred cities reported decreases in major decreases were substantial; Albany, 20 percent decline in their index of serious crime.

Yet when full account has been given to these encouraging aspects, an appalling situation remains. One thinks of these men in blue and gray, out on patrol across the nation. Over the past 10 years. 786 law enforcement officers have been slain by felons; last year alone saw 112 killed in 35 states. One-third of them died when they were and unassisted, alone answering some such routine call as "domestic disturbance."

The nation's 268,000 law enforcement officers are struggling aginst crime trends that defy one's imagination.

Think of these statistics, if you will, not in terms of numbers, but in terms of human passion, terror, and anguish; see these events in tears and bloodshed:

In 1962, police agencies reported 8,460 murders. Last year the figure was 18,520. There were 17,400 reported rapes in 1962. Last year saw 46,400. Robberies have more than tripled in this decade, from 110,300 to 374,600. Aggravated assaults have doubled, from 163,000 to 389,000. The raw figures are

sufficiently sobering, but they barely hint at underlying trends of profound concern. Police must cope daily with crime that is young, black, and increasigly female. Consider some figures that touch the

Nearly 10 percent of all arrests last year were arrests of boys and girls under 15 years of age. More than 80,000 rrests were made of children under 10. Charges were placed in 150,000 cases against children of 11 or 12, in 435,000 cases against children of 13 or

offenses were against property, chiefly, vandalism, but the 1972 records showed — for those under 15 years of age - 220 murders, 800 acts of rape, and 11,400

Most of these youthful

robberies. By the time they in crime. In 1962, only 230 girls reach 18, thousands of these warped and violent youths have records of three or four convictions.

Blacks continue to be involved in crime in numbers far out of proportion to their 12 percent of the population. The records of 6.114 reporting agencies show that blacks were arrested in 60 percent of the murder cases, 67 percent of the robberies, and 40 percent of the rapes. The picture is especially serious among blacks under

Perhaps the most shocking to do with the increasing involvement of young women

under 18 were arrested for narcotics violations. Last year the figure was 10,700. In this same period, the total number of arrests of young women has more than tripled, from 66,000

to 224,700. The picture that emerges from all this is deeply disquieting. It is tempting to explain away some of the evidence in terms of the statistics themselves; the reporting of crime considerably more comprehensive than it was even 10 or 15 years ago. It is terrible social sickness - a reasonable to assume that in an affluent society, with more of medication it is not getting property to steal, more now

property will be stolen. A criminal's easy access to a handgun doubtless is a factor in soaring rates of robbery and murder

None of this gets to the real causes. Somewhere along the line, the great teaching influences of our society - the home, the school, the church have failed in Weir teaching of moral values. Adult institutions of government. politics and industry evidently have failed to provide high examples of right conduct. The FBI's report is a diagnosis of sickness that demands forms

The Other Side

TWIN FALLS - The debate over a regional airport for southern Idaho is a heartening example of petty political and civic pride factors blunting the normally overriding motive of economic self interest.

It should be obvious to everyone in the Magic Valley, from Twin Falls, Burley, Sun Valley and Gooding, that a regional airport facility would help consumers who fly in and out of the area and merchants. who fly merchandise in and out

What is less obvious, of course, is where this regional airport should be built. That question has plagued the discussion every point of the way. From a viewpoint of economics, it is an incomprehensible argument. Millions of dollars are being lost because of a discussion of where to put the new airport. (It would make more sense if someone were to argue that the airport should not be built. because that would commit the area to an expansion and exploitation that no one would benefit by. But no one has even thought to argue that point).

Darrell Manning the Idaho-Director of Aeronautics, addressed the Twin Falls Rotary Club last week to say a regional airport was needed in needed;

southern Idaho. Being a politician and for the purposes of this discussion a very cautious man, Manning refused to say where he thought the airport whould be built. That, he said, was a local issue, and he wouldn't comment.

But he made a point that couldn't help but impress the Rotarians. For every ten people who board an airplane in Twin Falls to leave the Valley, six more have to board a plane somewhere else. From that, Manning extrapolates a "fantastic" growth potential for the Magic Valley area. And that doesn't even include population expansion. Taken at face value, his figures say only 62 per cent of the air traffic demand is being satisfied by local connections. . No wonder Manning says a

new airport is needed. It's the only logical conclusion to draw, from the viewpoint of the passengers, the airlines and the merchants who would service the passengers.

Manning brought-with him: two documents when he spoke on the airport question before the Rotary Club. One was a statewide needs study for air transportation. It showed why a southern regional airport was

The other document, hastily prepared in response to questions asked by some Twin Falls officials, is a cost resource analysis for regional airports that have been proposed.

It is heavy reading at points, consisting of tax tables, levy calculations and other assorted columns and figures. It attempts to lay out in reasonable estimates, the costs of regional airport proposals to the taxpayers of the county. Hopefully, it will assist the local debaters in coming to grips with the problem of where to build this airport.

Not only is the prolonged debate messing up Manning's statewide air transportation system, it is also going to begin to hamper seriously the efforts at land use planning now under way in Jerome County, with particular concern for the area north of the Perrine Bridge. It is also going to make life all but impossible for the planner who is hired to coordinate growth for Twin Falls City and County.

PROVO. Utah (UPI) - Five years ago Michael Johnson lost both legs to a Vietnamese land

This year Johnson shot a four-point buck during hunting season and has been averaging almost 30 points a game for his basketball team.

And next week he will be in Miami, Fla., to officially receive an award as Disabled Veteran of the Year at the Aug. 12-18 national convention of the Disabled American Veterans.

Johnson, 25, his wife, Denise, and their 15-month-old son, Casey, live in a house half-way up the side of a mountain overlooking Provo.

'We had it built with wider hallways and with ramps instead of stairs," the ex-Marine said. "It's the little things that count when you are in a wheelchair all the time.'

In addition to his job as an engineering draftsman for the Federal Bureau of Reclamation, his hunting, fishing and basketball games, he manages to find time to work with a local Boy Scout troop.

On Jan. 30, 1968, the day Johnson stepped on the land mine in South Vietnam, not many would have given him a chance to ever be active again.

His wounds cost him his right leg above the knee and his left leg at the hip. He lost two fingers and the thumb on his left hand, and the middle finger of his right hand. He has a steel plate in his forehead. A chunk of metal sliced off a chunk of his right arm. He spent a year and a half in military hospitals before he was well enough to be sent home.

How did he overcome all

"I wasn't born to be a spectator," he says. "I burn to compete. I've always been that way. I won't retire from sports until I've been on the cover of Sports Illustrated magazine."

Johnson's drive and competitiveness aid him in helping other amputees at the Salt Lake Veterans Administration Hospital. Even though he says he "hates" hospitals after spending 18 months in them after stepping on the booby trap, he occasionally goes back to counsel servicemen with

Wayne dropped out of junior high school shortly before he turned 15 and took a job in a service station to earn money for the family. His mother said he never objected to working to help support the family.

'He enjoyed working,' said.

Wayne earned his high school equivalency and told his mother he planned to enter a Houston community college in Septem-

Without a doubt the Idaho Fish and Game Department is going to rue the day it hooked electronics and big game drawings together. The results have been disastrous and there aren't many hunters happy about it - even some of the ones that fell into a bonanza.

The department, which has been going with the giant roller and the one-man application puller type situation, found the process long, involved and costly. So, of course, in this day and age, everyone goes to electronics - the almighty computer.

In a random situation, the department turned the thing over to the professional mathematicians and the whole thing blew sky high. Three numbers were used, as we understand it. Your social security number, your license number and the application

Of all the numbers in each, the most changeable is the last digit. So that was the priority number. However, the computer also had to be given the numbers in preference order and, as one can easily see in scanning the computer feed-out results, No. 9 is it. What it boils down to, it appears, is this. If you have an Idaho license number ending in nine and you didn't draw somewhere along the line, your application was lost in the mail.

For instance, for elk hunt No. 0211, there are 47 winners listed on the first page of the readout. Three of them have license numbers ending in something other than nine.

The department and or mathematicians apparently really blew it when they didn't change the preference number as the species changed. So that meant the preference was evidently set for the more desirable trophies, like mountain sheep and moose. Because the computer-had been told to prefer the thing, it appears that anyone drawing for sheep and moose would automatically draw any other species he'd applied for.

There are at least two area men who drew on all five applications, sheep, moose, elk, antelope and deer. Another put in for three and got all three, sheep, moose and elk.

The department is well aware of the horrible boo-boo and will, under pressure of questioning, admit that while the entire thing appears

But one of the five pullers, a man from Buhl, reports his preferred species, moose, sheep and elk, open on consecutive weekends. He will pass the deer and antelope, very probably, another bad factor since in this situation, the hunter will become selective and not pick up the tags for the lesser species.

Now the Buhlite figured if he could draw for either a moose or a sheep, he would spend his two-week vacation taking a look at every animal he could find until he got the trophy he wanted or just pass. But with the chances of getting either a moose or sheep permit in the rather near future rather slim, he wonders whether he shouldn't just bang off the first one of acceptable size he sees and go on to the next

His other problem is, since he has only a twoweek vacation, to get into just the major three drawing hunts he's entitled to will require that he take time at no money or try to spread it over three weeks — if the boss will let him — by ducking back into town for a day or two of work between trips to the wilds.

What it boils down to is this: no one is happy about the drawing procedure; some winners, all sers or department.

The department also discovered that not requiring a fee with a permit application allows a hunter to send in everyone's name he can think of from the maiden aunt in Boise to the guy down the street who doesn't hunt. Applications jumped from about 16,500 to 34,000 this year. Look for the fee portion to be back in next year's requirements.





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

Garrow, 37, a Syracuse mechanic, worked his way to the road, but began to flee back into the woods, Ambler said.

Hillary LaBlanc, a conservation officer, fired at the suspect and hit him four times, but Carrow managed to stumble." through the thick vegetation for about 75 yards before collapsing, Ambler said.

"Its too bad Garrow couldn't

be taken without injury, but there is no question in my mind that LeBlanc saved the lives of several of my men by firing, Ambler said.

Troopers charged Mandy

with hindering prosecution. For the first eight days of the search, Garrow used his skills as a woodsman to slip past search parties stalking the Champlain Valley Physicians, marshes and mountains around Speculator, about 60

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

Soaring event under way

HAILEY - "It's a challenging sport, to harness nature's powers, to follow cloud and terrain features. Here, we fly with

That's how Dave Stevenson described soaring, a fast growing sport nationally as well as locally.

Stevenson was one of about 20 participants - primarily from Idaho, California and Utah - in the annual Sun Valley Soaring Regatta which winds up this weekend. He also operates a commercial soaring business, Sawtooth Soaring, out of the Friedman Memorial Airport, Hailey.

.The week-long regatta mainly featured non-competitive, fun flying. The event was based at the Hailey airport, with Thursday spent soaring in the Obsidian area.

Regatta chairman was Louis Stur, Sun Valley.

Stevenson said the area was particularly suited for soaring and offers an average of about seven hours soaring time each day. He said that the hot, dry weather creates the thermals heat updrafts - needed for soaring and that the adjacent peaks provide "ridge lift" as the wind currents abut the ridges and

Average saliplanes, Stevenson said, weigh from 400 to 800 ounds and are constructed from various materials, including

wood and fabric, fiberglass-or-metal. The crafts have average wing span of about 50 feet.

Glide ratios, the amount of horizontal feet traveled for ever foot of drop, will vary according to the type of air foil the sailplane incorporates. Stevenson said his craft will travel about 28 feet horizontally for every one foot of drop or 28 miles for every one mile of drop.

The sailplanes contain the same controls as their motordriven sister, the airplane, including an elevator, rudder and wing

However, the sailplane utilizes a "blance wheel" on the belly of the craft, a small tail wheel and wing tip skids. Stevenson said the sailplane is carried aloft on an about 200 foot-long rope towed by usually a single-engine airplane.

Both crafts contain two-rope release hooks, but usually the sailplane pilot determines the point of release, when he feels a good up-draft, he said.

The release usually occurs at an average elevation of 2,000 Depending on the type of craft and weather conditions, sailplanes may travel from 40 to 100 miles-per hour and cover

about 300 miles. Stevenson said the world's distance for a single-seat craft is about 900 miles. The world's attitude is 46,000 feet, he said, however the average maximum altitude is about 16,500 feet.
