U.S. District Judge Dorsey Watkins ordered Simon to defend his gasoline allocation plan at a hearing scheduled Friday.

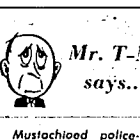

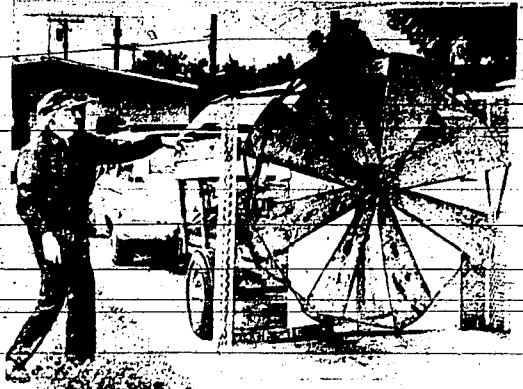

## Hairier fuzz hits TF

(Continued from p. 1) Some old-time staff members, on the other hand, continue to look on facial hair as symptomatic of mental illness, warped morality and a lack of patriotism. "Anyone who would grow one of those ...," one greyhaired officer was overheard to grumble. In relating prohibitions against the moustache, the Twin Falls department is playing catch-up with other local law enforcement agencies.

According to Sheriff Paul Corder, his department has never had a prohibition against moustaches "unless they don't look neat."

While Corder said he does not personally like moustaches, he does not discourage them. "I think an officer should look neat at all times," he said. "I wouldn't want them to go to an extreme on anything."

Corder said he does not allow his deputies to grow beards. "With characteristic efficiency the Idaho State Police long ago established precise regulations regarding the growing of hair — facial and otherwise."

According to Lt. Roy Thomas of the Twin Falls ISP office, state patrolmen may grow well-trimmed moustaches provided there is "a line showing between the upper lip and the moustache."

Sideburns, Thomas said, may come down to the "top of the lobe of the ear," while the hair of the head must not be longer than "an imaginary line from the bottom of the ear from ear to ear."

## Western governors discuss Canada gas

SEATTLE (UPI) — The governors of Washington, Oregon and Idaho said Wednesday they were looking into the possibility of setting up state agencies to buy Canadian gas and oil. The idea was suggested by Premier David Barrett of British Columbia. He met with Govs. Dan Evans of Washington, Tom McCall of Oregon and Cecil Andrus of Idaho to discuss energy problems in the Pacific northwest. Barrett said his government preferred to deal with the states on a "people to people" basis instead of going through private oil companies. The international oil cartels, in his opinion, manipulate the market all over the world," he said.

McCall said he was considering buying extra gasoline from British Columbia through a Los Angeles broker "who says he can deliver six million gallons every month for 40 cents a gallon, dockside at Portland."

He said similar offers "have been floating around" in other states. He added that he didn't know how legitimate such offers were, "but it's time they were tested."

McCall said the extra gasoline, if supplied only to school districts and other state agencies, would make it possible for the state to let its allocation flow to the general public.

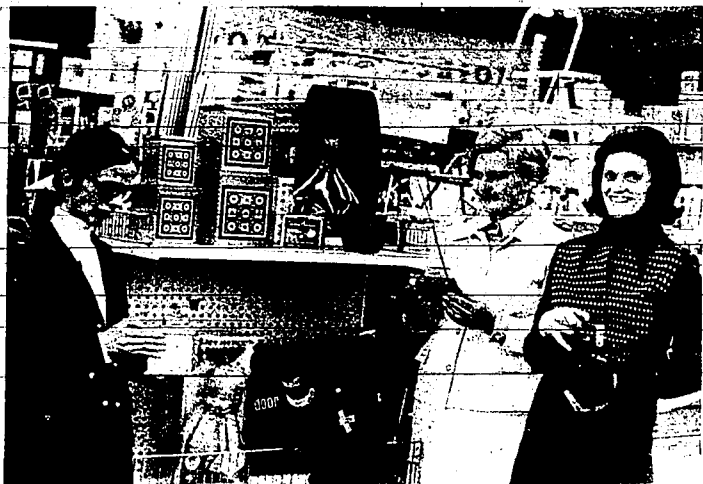

# Balloonist sails toward desert

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Adventurer Thomas L. Gatch, attempting the world's first manned transatlantic balloon flight, sailed toward an expected landing in the Sahara Desert today, about 1,000 miles north of earlier predictions.

Land trackers had previously expected Gatch to land in Dakar, Senegal, but later said unpredictable winds blew him toward the Spanish Sahara.

It was the second major change in predictions where Gatch, riding at about 35,000 feet inside a sealed-spherical vehicle hanging below nine helium-filled balloons, is expected to land. When he lifted off from Harrisburg, Pa. Monday, he hoped to land in Europe but high altitude winds of up to 160 miles an hour blew him instead toward Africa.

Bill Armstrong, a Federal Energy Office employe who assisted Gatch in the preparation of his pressurized craft "Light Heart," said the last reported communication with the 48-year old bachelor Army

reserve colonel came about 7 p.m. EDT Wednesday when the Santa Maria Oceanic Radio Network station on the Azores picked up a signal.

All commercial airline traffic on the east coast of Africa has been keeping an eye open for Tom, Armstrong said. He said that because of Gatch's rather erratic southerly route across the ocean, visual sighting by an airliner had become difficult. He said most trans-Atlantic flights follow a more northerly pattern.

Gatch adjusted his altitude Monday evening, when just 76 minutes into the flight, one of his ten balloons burst. He was able to drop the sagging balloon over his 190-pound gondola, and continue the trip. The plastic and fiber glass gondola is equipped with flotation equipment to keep it seaworthy if Gatch has to ditch into the ocean.

Gatch, of Alexandria, Va., was spotted by two airlines Tuesday morning and plotted on radar later Tuesday about

1,500 miles east of San Juan, P.R. Still earlier he gave off some signal to the radio station on the Azores, about 1,000 miles west of Lisbon, Portugal.

Armstrong said Gatch would not attempt a nighttime landing in Africa, but would wait until after daybreak today.

Gatch is a Korean War veteran and a graduate of West Point who began ballooning three years ago.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Lt. (j.g.) Barbara Allen, 25, of Long Beach, Calif., will become the U.S. military's first woman flyer Friday.

The Pentagon said Wednesday Lt. Allen completed training Tuesday and will officially become an aviator during ceremonies at the Corpus Christi, Tex., Naval Air

Station. The Navy opened its flying program to women for the first time last year and eight candidates were accepted into the program. One flunked out because she became air sick and a second resigned after marrying her recruiter. The remaining five are still in training.

# Anxiety mounts in Hearst case

**HILLSBOROUGH, C a 117.** (UPI) — Hope for an imminent breakthrough in the Patricia Hearst kidnap case mounted today as her parents anxiously waited for word of their missing daughter.

It was learned early today that FBI special agent Charles Bates, head of the San Francisco bureau, would be in Los Angeles to join a scheduled news conference there involving U.S. Attorney General William French Smith and FBI director Matthew Kelley.

The conference was scheduled for 9:30 a.m. (10:30 a.m. MDT) in the Beverly Hilton hotel in Beverly Hills, Calif.

Adding to the rumors of a possible new development were reports of a heavy influx of FBI agents into the San Francisco Bay Area in recent hours.

In Washington, Justice Department newsmen were alerted that Saxe was ready to make a "major announcement, but there was no indication that it was connected with the Hearst case.

The FBI had absolutely no

comment whatsoever on the case.

As the kidnaping of the 20-year-old daughter of newspaper publisher Randolph A. Hearst moved into its 16th day, word came from Atlanta of a possible second kidnaping with political overtones.

Editor Reg Murphy of the Atlanta Constitution was reported to be "misleading and apparently kidnaped." His wife said that Murphy left home about 7:30 p.m. EDT Wednesday "with a man and hasn't returned."

An Atlanta radio station then said it received a call from a man who identified himself as a "colonel" in either the American Revolutionary Army or the American Liberation Army — the station wasn't sure which — claiming credit for abducting Murphy.

In the plush San Francisco suburb of Hillsborough, there was no word from the grandiose "Symphonies Liberation Army" as to whether the \$2 million fee food program created by Randolph Hearst met their demands for release of the girl.

## Golda plans new coalition

**JERUSALEM — (UPI)** — Prime Minister Golda Meir set out today to pick cabinet members in Israel's first minority government, calling on a hailing Defense Minister Moshe Dayan to join the shaky coalition.

Dayan said Mrs. Meir lacked the necessary parliamentary strength to set up a coalition "with a political direction." He called instead for new elections and vowed to boycott a minority government.

Mrs. Meir announced plans Wednesday night for the minority coalition just 45 minutes short of the expiration of a six-week deadline following Israel's Dec. 31 national elections.

Political sources said the new coalition, although three votes short of a majority in the Knesset parliament, appeared strong enough to negotiate a Middle East peace settlement with the support of fringe parties.

The coalition, made up of Mrs. Meir's Labor group, affiliated Arab legislators and

the Independent Liberal party, will have 58 votes in the 120-seat Knesset. The rightist Likud, the largest opposition bloc, has 39 seats.

Mrs. Meir made her announcement after meeting with President Ephraim Katzir at his Jerusalem residence. As head of a caretaker

government, since the elections, she had until Wednesday to form a new government.

Katzir gave Mrs. Meir another week, however, to choose members of her cabinet and present the new government to parliament for formal approval.

## Headache cause told

**WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. (UPI)** — Persistent headaches which sent Mrs. Rose Kennedy, mother of the late President John F. Kennedy, to a hospital for tests were caused by a ruptured blood vessel in her head, a hospital spokesman said.

Don Hogue, spokesman for St. Mary's hospital, said Mrs. Kennedy, 83, was "resting comfortably" and would remain at the hospital for another day or two of tests.

The spokesman said the ruptured blood vessel was discovered during initial tests

and was considered "as nothing serious."

Although no surgery is planned, the spokesman said, her physician, Dr. Saul Rotter, has prescribed two or three weeks of "absolute rest" for Mrs. Kennedy.

# Consumer cost hike foreseen

**(E. N. Y. Times Service NEW YORK)** — The nation received its loudest signal to date today that consumer prices are going to soar much higher in coming weeks and months.

It came as commodity traders and speculators bid up the prices of most raw materials to record or near-record levels once again.

Bids on the commodity exchanges here and in Chicago sent prices of potatoes, copper, sugar and silver to historic highs and raised most other basic raw materials closer to record levels.

"It's frightening," one broker said in a telephone interview from Chicago. "I've never seen anything like it in 20 years that I've been in the business."

"The prices are not only undermining the value of paper money, but in the case of the grains, they are destroying the cattle and hog industries."

Indeed, prices of beef, hogs and pork bellies (raw bacon) were about the only commodities to decline today.

He explained the soaring grain prices, consumer resistance to current prices and the recent truck strike in the Midwest have caused uncommonly high rates of cattle and hog slaughter, adding:

**SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)** — The director of Randolph A. Hearst's food distribution plan reported that as of Wednesday night, some 2,800 persons have volunteered to help in the distribution program.

A Ludlow Kramer, secretary of state from Washington State, said telephone calls were pouring in to the "People in Need" headquarters here.

Kramer also said he was "a little worried" about what his appointment by Hearst would do to his political future.

# Israel evacuates Suez Canal area

United Press International Israel ended its 129-day occupation of the Suez Canal's east bank today to the fluttering of doves in a carnival-like atmosphere.

The last of the Israeli troops who stormed across the Suez Canal in the October war rolled back across the waterway in tanks and trucks, smiling and waving peace signs.

A senior Israeli paratroop commander whose unit was one of the first to cross the waterway on Oct. 15 formally turned over the evacuated area to United Nations forces at noon.

"This division paid for this land with the blood of its finest warriors in hard and cruel battles," said the commander.

"Today we lower the flag from this bank of the Suez Canal in a yearning and a hope for peace."

Then red-bereted 2nd Lt. Eli

Cohen, 24, of Tel Aviv, the first Israeli to storm the waterway in the war, pulled down the blue and white Star of David flag.

Three cages of doves flapped into the sky as the last 14-60 tanks, armored personnel carriers and half-tracks rumbled over to the east bank.

Other members of the paratroop unit stripped to their underwear and swam across the waterway. They spurted water from their mouths and laughed.

The U.N. peace-keeping team took over the region abandoned today—the final one third of a 560-square-mile bulge — to Egyptian forces at 6 p.m.

Egypt, in returning to the area, will also take over a rock and earth causeway built by Israel across the canal following the 17-day war. Israel previously took down four portable pontoon bridges.

# Bax termed most amazing

BOISE (UPI) — James A. Bax just has to be one of the most amazing public administrators in Idaho history.

Bax, as everybody by now probably knows, heads up the sprawling Department of Environmental and Community Services (DECS).

## Analysis

which July 1 takes on the more practical name of Health and Welfare.

This young administrator — he's still in his 30s — came up for confirmation soon by the Senate on his \$32,541 per year job. And all reports indicate that — except for a problem over budget figures — he's in close.

And that's what is amazing. If Bax can pacify chairman Richard High, R-Twin Falls, of the Senate Finance Committee it seems he is home free on confirmation by the Senate.

Some of the Senators even get misty-eyed when they talk of all the good things DECS has done in its regionalization program — all those real services now available to folks in the hinterlands.

And when they detail these nifty things that DECS is doing, none of them mentions some other occurrences in the gigantic DECS operation during the past year — possibly not quite so nifty. That's why Bax is amazing.

Like Lamont Cranston of "Shadow" fame in the days of radio yesterday, Bax apparently has that mysterious

oriental power to cloud men's minds and become invisible. For instance, nobody has brought up the child abuse case — one DECS waged about in its new awareness program — that the governor's wife virtually had to force DECS to look into.

Not one person has mentioned the escape of a dangerous mental patient from unguarded DECS facilities at Boise — a man still on the loose and accused of raping a Boise State coed after his escape.

Or, more recently, the \$10,000 ripoff in welfare checks stolen because of a lack of security.

Although the legislature now is trying to correct the situation, not one lawmaker in the Senate has been heard to mention the fact that DECS-gave out illegal birth control information to unmarried teenagers.

Apparently overlooked, too, is the suggestion by a staffer at Coeur d'Alene that the state use area prostitutes as mental health counselors — an idea that made it all the way to a central office staff conference in Boise.

Then there is the so-called "36-hour bills" in which Bax overnight wiped out 12 major staff-jobs in Boise to get his regionalization program going. He denies it occurred that fast although some reports have challenged the amount of preplanning that went into it.

No one has mentioned, either, lately, the color television or the stereo that wound up in his office — a TV purchased for a state videotaping program and the stereo just "taken upon approval."

Bax has moved to clean up the Idaho State School and Hospital at Nampa, even changing administrators. But months after DECS was formed some employees still qualified for food stamps given out by the agency.

There's hardly a whisper around the Senate about Bax's way of getting around personnel commission rules by hiring professional staffers on a contract basis.

Not a word is to be heard about the allegations of Garry Klein, a former DECS information specialist who quit — charging that Bax was running a public relations campaign to re-elect Cecil D. Andrus governor. Klein contended that Andrus announced DECS "good news" and that somebody else announced the "bad."

No, there has been very little talk of this in the Senate. And that's got to be quite a tribute to Bax. While some of the actions were taken by persons not directly under him, Bax still is the man who, in the final analysis, must answer for them.



# Budgeting bill gets backing

BOISE (UPI) — A do-pass recommendation was given by the Senate State Affairs committee today to a bill which would return Idaho to biennial budgeting.

Sponsor of the bill, Sen. James Stoicheff, D-Sandpoint, explained that this was possibly one way to shorten legislative sessions.

Senate Minority Leader John V. Evans, D-Malad, suggested that it might be "meritorious" to pattern Idaho's legislative sessions after Utah, where one year only budgetary matters are considered.

He asked that the bill be held up until alternatives could be looked at.

# Publisher named to game post

BOISE (UPI) — Gov. Cecil D. Andrus today announced the appointment of E. G. "Pete" Thompson, 44, publisher of the Sandpoint Daily Bee, to the Idaho Fish and Game Commission.

"Pete Thompson is an avid sportsman as well as a stalwart member of the Sandpoint Community," said Andrus.

"He will bring to the board a dedication to success that has characterized all his endeavors. He is a fair and an objective man who knows the fish and game of Idaho from first-hand experience and knows how they should be managed," he said.

The governor also said that Thompson's background in communications will be a strong asset to the commission.

"Within that commission, Idaho has commissioners who have the expertise to make the right decisions in the best interests of all their responsibilities, but too often there has been a failure to convey to the public the rationale for their decisions.

"In short, I feel the commission needs someone with a background in communicating to the public through the media," Andrus said.

# Senate OK's S. Idaho exemption from DST

BOISE (UPI) — Exemption of southern Idaho from Daylight Saving Time was approved 22-12 by the state Senate Wednesday.

The bill had originally passed the Senate Feb. 14 by a vote of 32-1 but was held for consideration because of the numerous time proposals already before the legislature.

Carrying the bill on the floor, Sen. Robert C. Kinghorn, D-Pocatello, said "all in all this fits the desires of most people in southern Idaho."

But Sen. Dick Smith, R-Rexburg, said he didn't feel this was a wise move to pass the time bill.

He said there were "a good many people in Idaho whose interests are served by being

on time with Salt Lake City and Denver."

"By passing this bill we very well might end up on a different time with those two

cities," said Smith. Smith said if this legislation was passed "we may have to come back and correct the mistake."

Sen. Richard A. Egbert, D-Tetonia, said he was reluctant to "see southern Idaho divided

south Idaho in one time zone," Egbert said. "It would be a mistake to divide southern Idaho into two separate time zones."

# Officer paid more than Gov. Andrus

BOISE (UPI) — Maj. Ben. George Bennett admitted Wednesday that with pay from extra duty on weekends and flight pay tacked on to his regular salaries he makes more money than Gov. Cecil D. Andrus.

Bennett, at the Idaho Press club headliner luncheon, said he receives \$19,956 from the National Guard and \$9,500 as part time director of Selective Service.

The extra boost pushing his salary beyond the \$30,000 Idaho's governor receives, comes from the extra duty pay he earns for weekend work and flight pay given for his flight status.

Bennett said the extra duty pay is given to all military personnel in his position because they are required to attend the weekend sessions.

Earlier Wednesday, Sen. Cy. Chase, D-St. Maries, raised the question on Bennett's salary during a meeting of the Senate State Affairs Committee.

The subject came up as the committee gave a do-pass recommendation to a bill which would provide that no state employee receive a salary bigger than that received by the governor.

In assessing the status of the Idaho guard units, Bennett said they are operating at 97.7 percent of their authorized strength but he expects recruitment will be a problem during the next five years.

He said the resent strength "isn't too bad nationally." The source of manpower recently has come from Vietnam veterans and Bennett predicted there would be trouble filling the guard ranks when that supply has dwindled.

At that point, Bennett said, the recruiters will have to look for men and women without previous military experience.

He said reliance on recruiting young, unskilled volunteers has resulted in the guard "not getting the quality

# Highway bill considered 'blackmail'

BOISE (UPI) — Gaggling on the federal highway funds the state might lose if it fails, the House reluctantly set speed limits at 55 miles per hour. Many members indicated in debate they would approve the bill because the state cannot afford to lose the money. But they said they felt it was out and out "blackmail" by Uncle Sam.

"I'm becoming very, very weary of the heavy hand of government resting on our shoulders every time we do something," Rep. Herb Fitts, R-New Meadows, said. "I'm going to vote for this bill."

"But if it comes to the point we have to have a rose-tinted all along the highway from here to Pocatello I don't think I'll go for it."

Floor sponsor John O. Sessons, R-Driggs, told the House to keep in mind when it considers the federal aid as blackmail that Idaho is a "gainer state" when it comes to such federal funds.

"For every dollar we pay into the highway trust funds we get back \$1.43," Sessons told the House.

He said the law is needed because the Highway Board cannot adopt an enforceable regulation to accomplish the task of rolling back the speed limits on the roads and streets. He said there has been a sharp drop in fatal accidents since the nation went to slower speeds on the freeways.

Rep. Allan F. Larsen, R-Blackfoot, said the 55-miles-per-hour speed on the highways could save 250,000 barrels of fuel per day if the entire nation went to that speed. He said if the emission controls were removed from automobiles, that savings could be tripled.

Minutes later, the House approved 60-0 a bill to permit removal of emission control systems from new automobiles.

Rep. Patricia Mc Dermott, D-Pocatello, said in coping with the energy crisis "Congress has shown about as much imagination as a dead rat."

She said slower speeds are fine for the eastern seaboard where mass transit systems exist. She reminded the House that in Idaho about the only way to get from one place to another is by automobile, and that the distances are great.

Rep. Larry Jackson, R-Boise, said he wished Idaho would go to 55 m.p.h. from now on and not just for the energy crisis. He said the bill is a real life saver.

Countering that, Rep. E. Don Coppel, R-Boise, said even more lives could be saved at 30 miles per hour. He said the bill is a complete departure from speed laws in Idaho.

Rep. Paul Warden, R-Boise, called the bill blackmail and said the federal government does this in all fields "and not just in highway building."

"This is out and out extortion," Rep. Lee Barron, R-Corral, said. "This State Legislature is more important than any damn bureaucracy agency. This speed limit is primarily for those little bureaucrats in Washington, D.C."

"They don't even know where Idaho is," Barron said. "They say, 'yeah, I know where Idaho is. I have a cousin in Des Moines.'"

## Permit denied

BOISE (UPI) — The Idaho Public Utilities Commission has refused to grant an application from Richard J. Bergkamp, doing business as Rick's Bus Line, Sun Valley, for a motor-carrier permit.

The company sought a permit to transport passengers and baggage over regular routes between points within a 30-mile radius of Ketchikan.

In dismissing the application, the IPUC said that the applicant can reapply at some future date.

## Support debate

BOISE — Four Magic Valley senators supported a move Wednesday to revive debate on a referendum on the question of state ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment to the US Constitution.

Two senators, however, opposed the move led by Sen. Leon Swenson, R-Nampa, to lift the bill off the table. Swenson's action was parliamentary move that would have permitted further debate on the bill to put the question of state ratification of ERA on the 1974 statewide ballot.

It takes two-thirds approval of the Senate to lift a bill from the table. Swenson's motion failed, 17-18.

Those supporting the action were Sen. John Peavley, R-F Rupert; Robert Suvik, D-Burley; J. Wilson Steen, R-Idaho Falls; and James Yost, R-Wendell.

Those voting against Swenson's motion were Sen. John Barker, R-Buhl and Richard High, R-Twin Falls.

## Feud continues

BOISE (UPI) — Sen. Cy Chase, D-St. Maries, continued his feud today with the Idaho adjutant general.

The subject came up as the Senate state affairs committee considered and gave a do-pass recommendation which would provide that no state employee receive a salary bigger than that received by the governor.

Chase questioned how much Maj. Gen. George B. Bennett received. He said he had been

asking the question but had not been able to receive an answer.

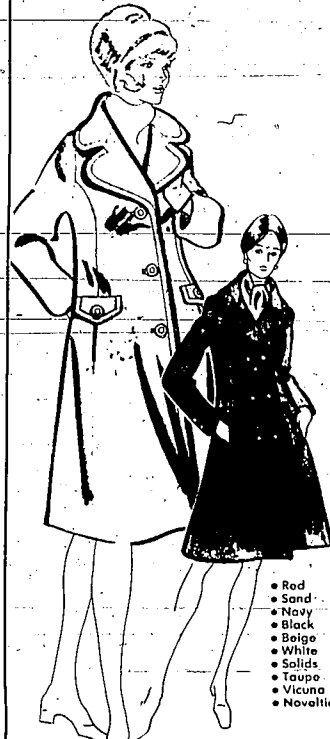

# Farm support program extension receives nod

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Agriculture Secretary Earl L. Butz has endorsed extension of the government's sugar marketing control program, but asked Congress for major changes including abolition of domestic planting restrictions, subsidy payments to U.S. growers, and a sugar processing tax.

The agriculture secretary, appearing before the House Agriculture Committee Tuesday after under questioning he has abandoned an earlier trial-bolton proposal to wipe out all marketing controls.

Instead, Butz said, the government would continue the present system of keeping a floor under sugar prices by regulating the total amount of sugar which can be sold in the U.S. annually. A fixed share of the market, as at present, would be assigned in marketing quotas to foreign countries, he said.

Domestically, however, Butz said his proposal would eliminate present authority for acreage restrictions in order to allow a free shift of sugar planting between areas which want to grow more and those where other crops like corn, cotton and soybeans may prove more

profitable to sugarcane or sugarcane growers.

Julius L. Katz, deputy assistant secretary of state, appearing with Butz as the House committee opened hearings on extension of the 40-year-old sugar program, said the administration is not currently recommending any specific change in the quotas assigned by law to some 30 foreign countries which supply about 45 per cent of the U.S. sugar supply.

Katz also urged no change in a provision of existing law which reserves 800,000 tons of foreign marketing quotas for return to Cuba if normal relations are restored with the Caribbean island which was once the major foreign supplier to the U.S. market. He added, however, there is no change in U.S. policy on returning trade with Cuba and "do not wish to speculate on prospects for when it might resume."

The present version of the sugar law is due to expire Dec. 31; Butz strongly urged that the extension now being considered should be limited to three years so Congress would take up the next extension at the same time it considers renewal of other farm commodity legislation in 1977.

# Farm Union takes cautiously optimistic view of next year

PAUL — Farm Union representatives look to the coming year with "cautious optimism" at a meeting here at a meeting here this week.

Aldo Dattolilo, Paul, Utah-Idaho Farmers' Union board member, said, "It looks good now but any little thing can change it."

Union President Roy L. Holman, Ogden, said, "If ever a farmer needed to sharpen his pencil it is now. We're in trouble if we have even a small slump in prices."

The Farm Union is lobbying in Washington for higher floor prices on products to prevent disastrous effects on farmers if prices should fall while operating costs are high, according to Holman.

Union members from North Dakota and South Dakota — visiting in the Magic Valley — said they were experiencing the same shortages of farm

equipment and supplies as are Idaho farmers.

Casimir Jochim, Selfridge, N. D., said that baling twine and wire will be double the old prices if they are available. At the present he can not get them. Fencing supplies are also unavailable. Equipment dealers in the Dakotas are not receiving new tractors and implements, according to Jochim.

Jochim said some farmers in his area are planning to plant less acreage and try to concentrate more effort on the ground they do plant this year to minimize the effects of shortages of equipment and fertilizer.

The Dakota farmers said one of the most significant differences in farming between Idaho and their home states is the lack of strong farmers cooperatives in Idaho. Jochim said the co-op tends to hold

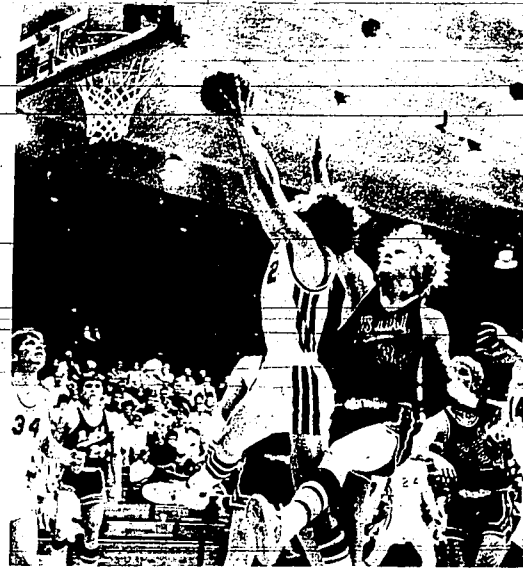

## Salary said second to player freedom

MILWAUKEE, Wis. (UPI) — The executive director of the National Football League Players Association said Wednesday economic issues will be a back seat to players' freedom when negotiations start next month with the NFL owners.

Ed Garvey, speaking at the Milwaukee Press and Mike Club, said overall freedom for the athlete would be the prime objective of the association.

"This means no curfews, no training camps, no fines and when a player's contract is terminated, he's free to contract with any other club," he said.

"We have to cut out these fines, curfews and silly rules. We have to treat the athletes like people," he said.

Negotiations will open March 15 and Garvey said that overall, the players will be asking for less money than last time out.

"A main economic objective, he said, will be in pay for preseason games.

"At present rookies get virtually nothing for preseason games and the pay for veterans is far below that of the regular

season, he said.

Garvey said the association would try to get a pay scale for rookies and try to make sure that veterans get "almost as much as they do for the regular season."

"He said the association would not try to eliminate the common draft in the negotiations, but would seek to have players declared free agents at the end of a contract period.

He said the players union would prefer not to strike, but "we're prepared for one if we have to have it." He said the association is proposing arbitration as an alternative to a strike if the negotiations become deadlocked.

Garvey also said the association wanted the negotiations to be open with members of the news media permitted to attend sessions.

"He said economic questions in the negotiations would be limited to "the obvious ones."

"We're not saying the owners shouldn't make a profit," he said. "We're just saying they shouldn't take freedom away from an individual to make a profit."

## Chicago outbids NFL for 3 men

CHICAGO (UPI) — The Chicago Fire has signed up at least three players for this year's maiden World Football League season by topping offers from National Football League teams.

Leo Hayden of the St. Louis Cardinals, Glenn Robinson a third round draft choice of the Baltimore Colts, and Mike Keller, national collegiate rushing champion from Northern Illinois University, said Fire owner Tom Orger made them offers they couldn't refuse.

They were among 18 players signed by the WFL Chicago franchise Wednesday. Ten of the 18 had either been signed or selected as draftees by NFL clubs.

Hayden, a former Ohio State star tailback who was the Minnesota Vikings' first choice in the 1970 draft and who played two years with St. Louis, said his contract calls for "better pay" than he ever got with the Cardinals, including bonuses or playoff shares.

Robinson, the Colts' third NFL draft pick, said Orger's offer was "much better than Baltimore's."

Keller, picked sixth by Minnesota, said the Vikings "turned me off" on two counts.

"First, they told me they picked me because all the better running backs had been taken," he said, "and then their offer didn't even approach what I got from the Chicago Fire," he said.

## Cook predicts NFL move into Memphis

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (UPI) — Millionaire Edward W. Cook, who sold a lot of grain to the Russians back in 1972, says he thinks the National Football League will buy Memphis this weekend.

"I personally believe expansion will be made next week and that Memphis will be chosen," Cook said Wednesday of returning home from talks

with influential NFL team owners Lamar Hunt and George Halas.

"Both of them are strongly in favor of expansion," he told a luncheon of business and civic leaders here led by Memphis Sports, Inc., a group pumping Memphis for the NFL.

The 26 team owners will meet with NFL executives at Miami this weekend to decide, among other things, whether or not to expand by possibly two or four teams in the near future. But a decision could be postponed until summer.

Hunt, owner of the Kansas City Chiefs, is president of the American Conference. Halas owns the Chicago Bears and is president of the National Conference of the NFL.

Cook is president of Cook Industries, Inc., and almost personally negotiated the multimillion-dollar private grain deal with Russia two years ago. He and potato chip maker Herman Lay of Dallas have both expressed interest in obtaining a Memphis franchise.

"This cotton capital of 850,000 is among half-dozen cities, including Seattle, Tampa, and Phoenix, which are considered high on the NFL's possible expansion list.

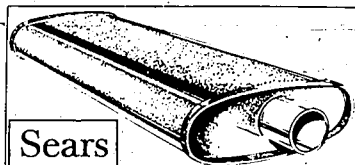

# Larger trucks proposed for interstate routes



Arrive for testing

FIRST Communist bloc vehicle destined for US markets, the four wheel drive AR 244 built in Romania, arrived in Detroit Wednesday for anti-pollution testing. If it can meet US standards, the importer plans to sell 8,000 vehicles between September and December.

## Romanian built vehicles undergo pollution tests

DETROIT (UPI)—The first Communist-bloc vehicle destined for the U.S. market, the four-wheel drive AR 244 built in Romania, arrived in Detroit today to undergo strict anti-pollution tests. If it can meet the U.S. standards, the importer plans to sell a modest 8,000 of the jeep-like vehicles between September and December. Robert Ross, vice president of New York-based East-Europe Import-Export Inc., said he doesn't expect the slowdown in car sales here to affect the reception of the Romanian vehicle.

"If we were talking about bringing in a new car to compete head-on, we might have a problem," he said. "But there isn't enough of this kind of vehicle on the market now." The AR 244 is an all-wheel vehicle designed from the bottom up to compete in the U.S. market with vehicles like the Jeep Wagoneer, Toyota Land Cruiser, Ford Bronco and two new utility vehicles introduced by Chrysler. It will have a price tag of about \$5,000, about \$1,300 cheaper than a similarly equipped Wagoneer, Ross said.

The AR 244 has a 200-cubic-inch straight-six engine built by Ford Motor Co. that can push the vehicle to about 85 miles an hour. Under normal conditions, it should deliver about 20 miles to the gallon. For the camper and outdoor enthusiast, it offers 18 reclining seats that convert to beds or fold in the other direction for additional cargo room. If the AR 244 catches on, Ross says sales of between 15,000 and 20,000 in 1975 should just tie up the total production from the Romanian auto factory.

## Shuffling practices charged

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Congressional investigators have accused the Small Business Administration (SBA) of fast shuffling practices to understate the agency's loss rate on loans. In a report circulated privately among members of the House Small Business Subcommittee staff, investigators said: "It's all too clear that the SBA is interested only in setting records for loan approval rather than making quality loans. SBA has been successful in keeping its loss rate at a fairly respectable level, but it is believed that this is being done in an artificial manner."

## Police question prisoners

BEAUFORT, I.U.P. — Northern Idaho's 4,000 policemen resumed escorting and interrogating prisoners today, ending a three-day-old protest that caused chaos in courts across the province. Police Federation Chairman Basil Stange announced the end of the job action, but did not say whether the officers would then demand pay before calling off the protest. The police began their ban to protest a government decision last week to try a fellow officer under the province's tough, anti-terrorist statute for allegedly beating a prisoner. The statute lets authorities try extremists without juries. The protesting policemen did not deny the charges against the officer, but insisted on assurances officers would be tried in the future by juries instead of special anti-terrorist courts. The police job action forced the army to use soldiers to escort prisoners. Even with the help of troops, however, five women held on arms charges had to be freed from Armaugh jail because of the protest.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Nixon administration, bucking opposition from the American Automobile Association and a majority of the National Transportation Safety Board, has proposed legislation to allow bigger trucks on interstate highways. The legislation would help truckers who are being hurt by the average car, said the administration said Wednesday. The AAA, leading a lobbying effort against big trucks, said greater truck weights and sizes would "jeopardize the safety and well-being of every motorist on the interstate system and would hasten the deterioration of our highways and destruction of our bridges." The conflicting views were given in testimony to a Senate public-hearing subcommittee holding hearings on the proposal. Federal Highway Administrator Norbert T. Tiemann acknowledged that increased-truck-weights would cost an additional \$50 million to \$100 million a year in extra highway maintenance costs, but he said it was justified because of the plight of the trucker. He said the legislation should expire on or before June 30, 1975. Tiemann said lower speed limits and scarce, expensive fuel may result in "either immobility or unprofitable operations for the trucking industry, to the grave economic detriment of the public they serve." The long-awaited administration recommendations would: — Force states to allow trucks up to 70 feet long, clearing the way for double-trailer rigs on all interstate highways. The double rigs are allowed in 33 states now, but many states hold truck length to 55 feet, particularly in the East. — Increase per-axle weights to 20,000 pounds from the current 18,000 pounds. Tandem axle limits would be increased from 32,000 pounds to 34,000 pounds.
