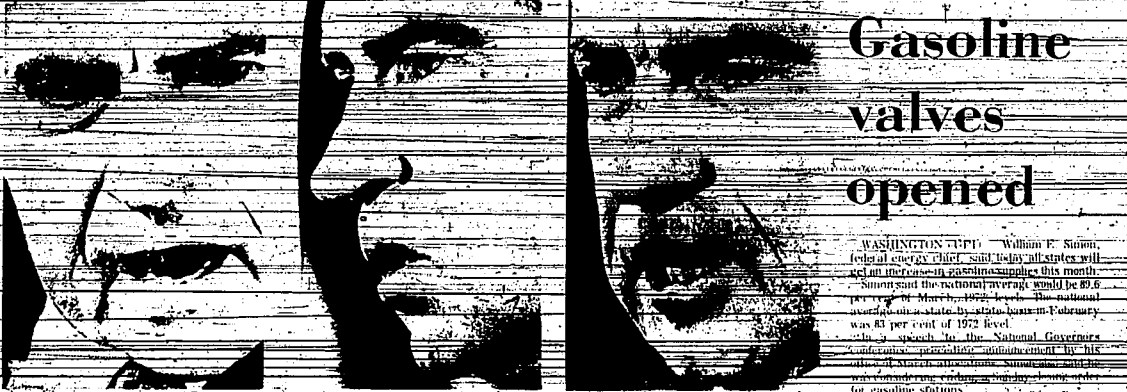

Onassis refinery rejected

DURHAM, N.H. (UPI)—The citizens of this seacoast town voted 154 to 144 Wednesday night to join record against a proposal by Aristotle Onassis to build a massive oil refinery here.

For just a tiny "yes" or "no" question any longer that they can buy this town," said State Rep. Dudley Dudley, a Democrat. "It is clear that it is not for sale and I think they have every reason now to pack up and go home."

Although the town selection board have the final say, they were expected to follow the decision of the town meeting.

Olympic Refineries Inc., one of the Greek multimillionaire's firms, had proposed that Durham be the site of the world's largest oil refinery to date. The proposal had the backing of Gov. Meldrum, Thomson but environmental and local citizens said they should be allowed to decide for themselves, without outside interference, what was best for the community.

The outcome of the meeting was apparent from the moment moderator Joseph Michaels called it to order in the Oyster River High School gymnasium. Opponents of the refinery received 154 votes.

Police estimated 2,000 voters jammed into the combination gymnasium-auditorium, with hundreds more "listening on computers in another room," town officials said there had never been such a turnout.

Nancy Sandberg, chairman of a major opposition group, Save Our Shores—505—opened discussion with a charge that Olympic Refineries was pushing the New Hampshire legislature at Concord "to take away our right of home rule."

"We as selection will insist on the right of our community to make its own decision," said Lawrence O'Connell.

"Olympic is working in Concord to remove from us the right to determine land uses," Thomas Jordan said, "the means Olympic used to reach the stage where it could propose its current plan 'were less than honest.' Adding 'There is no way anyone can possibly check their facts.'"

A proponent, Sally Bowley, argued that the refinery would be an economic benefit to a financially depressed state. She said Durham residents should think of other people in the immediate area. "Their lives will be changed for the good. They'll have jobs again," she said.

Not another California

Most Idahoans received a blow last week when the State Senate voted down and then shelved land-use legislation.

The public clearly wanted enactment of reasonable land-use laws in the 1970s. Most people supported land use planning, provided minimum interference from state and maximum control by local municipalities.

Some legislators argued against the bill, saying land use planning is an encroachment by the federal and state governments. That objection loses its force when most of the people support such planning.

Other lawmakers argued that federal land use legislation has been sidetracked for the moment and that Idahoans should concentrate on their own business and development.

Again, the question instead should be whether land-use planning serves a purpose, not federal pressure. The land use bill escaped death when supporters maneuvered it back into committee for a possible second run.

Sen. David Bivens, R-Payette, chief sponsor, said Tuesday he would try to get it back on the floor for amendment.

The bill should get another chance. In our view there is a great need for land-use planning in Idaho to control increasing development that often hurts rather than helps communities.

Valuable farm lands are lost to sprawling and inefficient subdivisions, recreational areas are wiped out with highways, industry and home building. Potential hazards.

Planning is a tool that can preserve the best of Idaho and make "progress" work for the benefit not the detriment of the state's people. We don't want another California.

More dodgers

WASHINGTON—The number of indigent individuals who pay no federal income tax is growing again, according to Sen. Walter Mondale, D-Minn. Information from 1972 tax returns which has just been compiled by the Treasury Department shows that there were 200,000 individuals with incomes in excess of \$100,000 in 1972 who paid no federal income tax.

Mondale's report did not attempt any explanation of why this is known as the "zero taxpayers' list" was growing. He merely made public the preliminary figures compiled by the Treasury.

Most of the conversations were recorded when Truman was 77. It is a twilight time for most old warriors, things that once were seen in star practice are now in the past.

That is what Truman did for himself in this twilight self-portrait. It is not that Miller made a portrait of Truman. Miller tried to do it. Miller emerges as one of the chairman bookkeepers of all time; the Ted Turner of the Truman era.

We get the picture, warts and all. Truman had some warts. He was a fighter, a doer, a man who did not let anyone else do it for him.

The Bill Jaffe Graham is one of almost a dozen authors who have written Truman biographies. Jaffe's Truman is a very good fellow, but there are some things he has never got through his head. Justice Tom Clark was "dumb." As for Hoover, every Truman official knew he was a crook.

Dutch predict bright future

ROTTERDAM—The city most sensitive to the Arab embargo was this, the world's largest port, which not only Holland but all Northwest Europe and Scandinavia depend.

Yet, to everyone's surprise, Rotterdam has arranged for the crisis production of oil. The Netherlands supplies, bypassed the Netherlands for what they called a "pre-arranged policy."

Most Europeans have been surprised to see how successfully the Dutch could strike by a policy of friendship in Israel and full, total support of the government of the left.

The big questions now to be faced are those of politics and prices. And the Dutch, arguing that energy problems cannot be separated from the general economic picture, are especially pessimistic about the present French oil situation.

They reason that France is perhaps the weakest community member of the national energy resources. Its electricity power, based on iron ore, the former's steel works, and the latter's price.

Further, the Dutch say France knows it simply isn't strong enough to influence the situation, as it learned when Saudi Arabia rejected a French proposal to buy 800 million tons of oil over 20 years in an oilfield before.

The Dutch's interest in energy is especially stressed by the fact that Libya and Algeria—on whom France especially depends—have taken the lead in bowing oil prices. Added together, these factors sound like a recipe for disaster.

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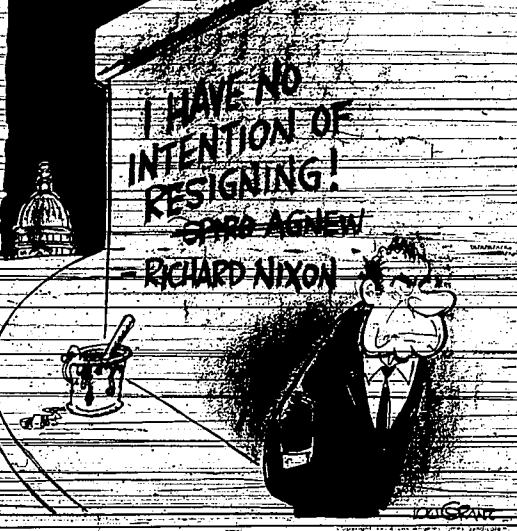

His effort failed, however. It received the support of only the 11 Democrats and two Ada County Republicans. Dean Summers and Vernon K. Brasley.

- The Canadian authorities have closed the plant until the problem of contamination is solved.
- Recent products being recalled in this country include chocolate Easter bunnies, eggs, ducks, bells, Christmas balls and Santas and other holiday candy.

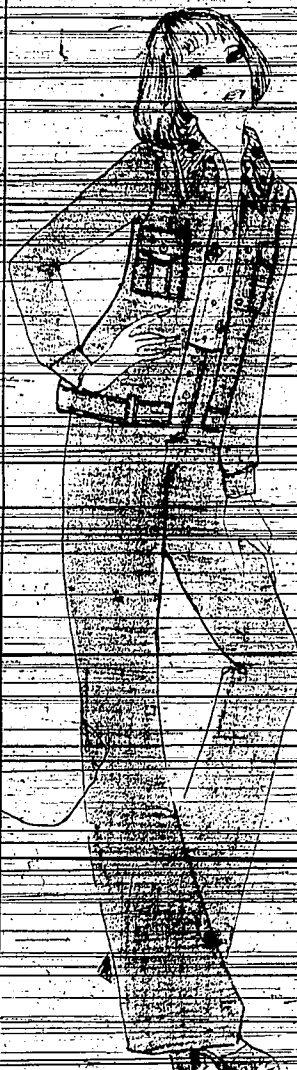

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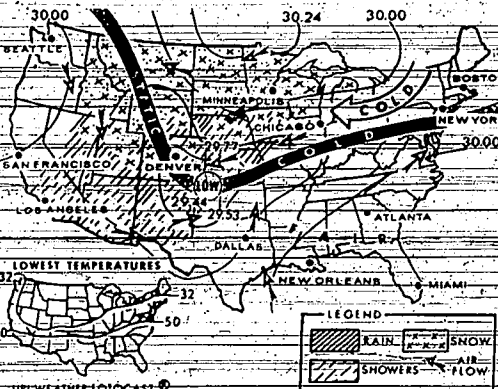

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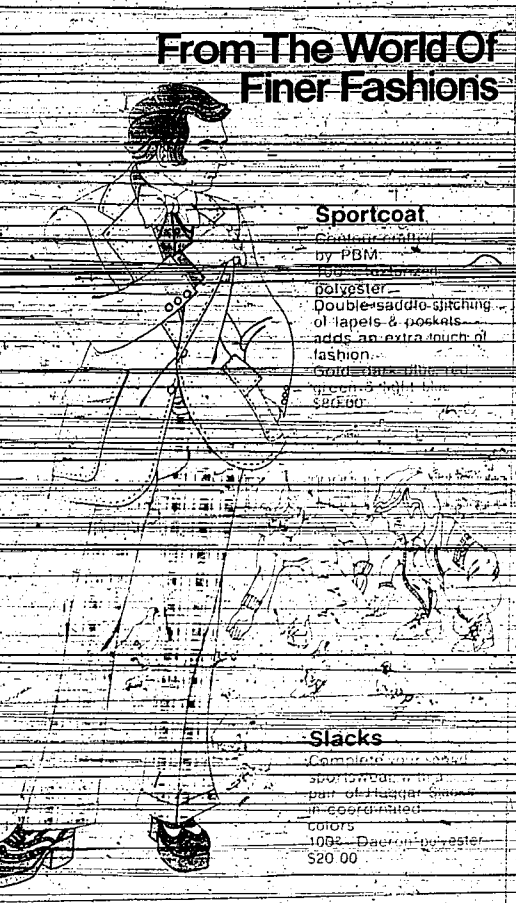

FOUNTAIN, Idaho (UPI) — When the NCAA Western Regional quarterfinal round returns to Idaho State's Mini-Dome Saturday, it won't be like old home week for the four schools.

Only 14th-ranked New Mexico has ever been in the NCAA West Playoffs before, and that just in 1968 during a game with the Idaho foot-

Miller's counterpart at Idaho State is the only coach who appears overjoyed.

"Our starting center has been injured for the first two rounds," he said. "Don Spindler lost most of his effectiveness, and we've had to turn to freshman Gene Hayes, that kid has been really doing the job in the conference race."

"We're pretty confident about the pressure of the national tournament."

Fish-game director discusses problems

BOISE (UPI) — Idaho's Fish and Game Director plans to work for passage of a legislative proposal to coordinate agencies on fish and wildlife management; but adds now is not the time to do so.

department's management of the big game populations and law game hunting seasons was responsible for the vote against confirming Robert Thomas of Coeur d'Alene to the commission.

The director also said that the department has prepared a report to determine why big game herds have declined in recent years.

Greenley said herds in the 1950s and 1960s were at high levels and supported a population during the 1950s. The drop in populations during 1971 and 1972 is justification for concern, he said. Because it coincided with a cutback in season lengths.

"We don't have answers and we must find them or commission be legislating seasons for us," he said.
