

# Panel's demands stir new fuss

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Two members of the House Judiciary Committee contended today that the panel had requested only as much information from the White House as was necessary to rapidly complete its impeachment investigation.

"The information we have asked for has been specifically described," Rep. Don Edwards, D-Calif., said. "There isn't the slightest intention of any body on the Judiciary Committee coming over to the White House on a fishing expedition or pawing through documents."

The 16-member committee is seeking from the White House six files, various documents and an index of White House files. The information is in addition to what President Nixon's lawyers have offered to turn over to the panel.

The President's chief Watergate attorney, James D. Stoen, wrote the committee that his request for information amounted to virtually identical to the one for presidential documents and would completely destroy the presidency as an equitable branch of our government.

Appearing on the ABC's "Today Show" after Edwards, Rep. Robert McClure, R-Ill., said St. Claire's letter indicated that there is a "misunderstanding that is most unfortunate" on what the committee is seeking.

Both McClure and Edwards said that if the panel and not only the White House requested to use its subpoena power to try to force the President to relinquish the material.

"Without question if we don't get what we're looking for," the committee will undoubtedly

authorize the issuance of a subpoena," McClure said.

"It is in the best interest of the country, and of the President to get this over expeditiously," he said. "The only way for that to occur is to get good cooperation from the White House."

A House ethics panel published today showed that at least 70 percent of persons questioned felt the committee should recommend impeachment if Nixon did not provide the information it seeks. Thirty-two percent opposed such action.

McClure said a question whether they felt the President had been "frank and honest" on Watergate matters or had "withheld important information." 18 percent said they believed he had been honest while 31 percent thought he had

withheld information. The committee chairman, Edward Brooke, R-Mass., said that if the White House refused to provide the information requested and that refusal to assist again became "all of the information."

In addition to the White House material, the committee is also planning to examine the records of the Attorney General, J. Edgar Hoover, to determine if materials were sent to a grand jury in Miami and widely revealed to the press with the President's handling of the Watergate matter.

McClure said Rep. Robert Kastenbaum, D-Wis., another Judiciary panel member, discussed Sunday the alleged lack of White House cooperation and the possibility of subpoenas.

### Gold, S weaker in trading

LONDON (UPI) — The price of gold fell in European trading today and the U.S. dollar was somewhat weaker.

Auto, Pacific and United Aircraft each fell a point to lead the sliding transportation group. Motors also dropped in fractions, while steels, electronics and computers were mixed.



# Ransom effort said not sufficient

 SAN FRANCISCO — Patricia Hearst said in a tape-recorded message to her parents Saturday that enough was being done to bring about her release from "those who kidnapped her more than a month ago."

"I don't believe you're doing everything you can to get me out of your power," she said in a barely audible voice. "I don't believe you're doing anything at all. You said it was out of your hands; what you should have said was that you wanted your hands off it."

The 20-year-old daughter of the newspaper executive, Randolph A. Hearst, spoke for the first time on the tape, which was left in the woman's restroom at a restaurant near downtown San Francisco.

In addition to the message to her parents, Hearst also was heard to speak from the self-proclaimed kidnappers, the group that calls itself the

Symbionese Liberation Army. It was the fifth taped communique from the group since Feb. 4 when Miss Hearst, a student at the University of Berkeley, was abducted from her apartment.

Hearst said Sunday that she would have no comment until after she had had time to study the message. However, in reference to the communique, she said: "I know I shall have to mutter all the words dictated by the kidnappers."

In the message a woman who said that she was a general in the organization accused Hearst of "showing contempt for the people" with the quality of food he was providing in a detention center. She was ordered to establish "a good-will posture" Hearst had raised \$2 million and set up the free food program. In a television appeal last week he asked the kidnappers to allow his daughter to communicate with her family.

## Store manager ransoms wife

ATLANTA (UPI) — The manager of a K-Mart discount department store reported a \$20,000 ransom Sunday after three masked men kidnaped his wife and threatened her life.

The abduction marked the fifth time a K-Mart manager's family in less than three months. Similar incidents have taken place in Detroit and Nashville, Tenn.

Daniel, who was found locked in the trunk of her own car, was taken to the home of William, manager of a K-Mart in suburban Decatur, who took \$20,000 from the store safe and

handed it over to a masked gunman at a drop-point in a local country club.

Police said gunmen forced their way into the Daniel home about 11 p.m. Saturday night. The masked men blindfolded, gagged and tied Mrs. Daniels for three young children who were watching.

When Daniel came home from work a short time later, he was urged to take his children and go back to the store, which was closed.

After he went to the store, he received instructions by telephone on where to take the money.

Police said Daniel followed the kidnappers' orders, and when he turned over the \$20,000 ransom, the kidnappers could find his wife's car.

She was still blindfolded and gagged and was curled up in the trunk of her compact car, which was not injured.

Harvey Kreske of Kreske Co., which owns K-Mart, said the company had no way to counteract the abduction.

"I can just tell our manager, too, if you get confronted with a situation like this, give me everything you've got," Kreske said.

## Eagleton opens budget battles

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Thomas Eagleton, D-Mo., opened his budget battle in Congress by attacking Air Force plans for a \$2.5 billion fleet of airborne command posts.

Attired with information from the General Accounting Office (GAO), Eagleton says the proposed \$2.5 billion Air Force fleet of command posts is a "wasteful expenditure of money" and that the Air Force is "not getting its money down the drain because the plans are unworkable, unachievable and unwise."

In a letter to Sen. John C. Stennis, D-Miss., chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee, and a separate statement released Sunday, Eagleton said the project should be canceled. He has asked GAO analysts to brief the committee Tuesday.

Armed Services doesn't kill the project, said Eagleton will fight it in his own right. He says the Air Force is appropriating subcommittee and, on the Senate floor if necessary, four years ago in a similar battle he killed a \$1.5 billion dollar anti-aircraft program.

Senate sources say Eagleton is likely to get into a heated confrontation with Sen. Henry Clay, R-Kent., who is the chairman of the subcommittee. The Air Force wants to violate its own "buy before you build" policy and purchase the program immediately.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Congress is headed for another battle over how to control those envelopes full of \$100 bills that have become a mainstay of political campaigning.

The debate is expected to revolve around the use of tax money for individual campaigns.

One solution, accepted last month by the Senate Rules Committee, would pay for election campaigns out of the federal treasury. This plan, expected to be reported this month, would sharply limit the amount of money that can be spent.

It was introduced by Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., and Sen. Carl Albert, R-Scal., in a House bill.

# Widow wins lawsuit

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (UPI) — The widow fired by the University of California for being stingy with mayonnaise and to sleep with Sloppy Joe last year has her job back along with \$7,500.

"That's great," said Doris Judd, 59, when she learned of the Superior Court decision from a newspaper. "I don't know you rights, you're going to win."

Visiting Judge Anthony Brazil ordered the UC Davis campus to give Mrs. Judd her job back and provide her with back pay for 12 months, about \$7,500.

Mrs. Judd, the mother of five married children, was employed as a food services job cafeteria worker for seven years before she lost her job in what she described as an injustice.

The charges against her included eating too much mayonnaise all the way to the edge of the bread, taking an average of 13 minutes each to put a sandwich on 50 hot-ops and wrap them and making too many Sloppy Joe sandwiches on one occasion. She also allegedly forgot for three days in a row to make two submarine sandwiches for members of the private union.

Mrs. Judd's attorney, Loren McArthur, of the California State Employees' declared Justice prevailed.

He said the judge described Mrs. Judd's firing Feb. 9, 1973, as "absurd and ridiculous."

McArthur said the wage against the widow was built after she offended some "big cheeses" when their breakfast was not prepared fast enough.

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
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

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
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
