Simon says US will lift price ceilings

PORLTAND, Ore. (UPI) — Federal energy chief William Simon said Monday that eventually the United States will lift price ceilings on coal, gas and petroleum products to stimulate investments in new energy developments.

In a telephone interview with the Associated Press, Simon said the recent energy-related kidnappings may force the nation to rely more on imports to solve its long-range supply-demand imbalances.

"The means we're going to go up in many supplies," Simon said. "But he also said it would mean reaching self-sufficiency faster and not subjecting the economic blackmail from the Arab states."

If Arab nations lift their oil embargo to the U.S., he said it would shorten lines at service stations "but not solve the gasoline crisis itself."

He said the nation would continue to feel the effects of the energy crisis until American oil companies increase their output.

"Why and if the Arab embargo is lifted, we can expand domestic refinery production from 25 percent to 100 percent, which translates to 10 million barrels a day."

He means petrochemicals.

Police recover ransom, fourth person charged

BELLE GLADE, Fla. (UPI) — Another \$600 of the \$3000 ransom paid for the return of baker George R. Jackson of Sanford has been recovered and a fourth person faces charges in the case, police said.

Raymond Gaines, 16, of Sanford was turned over to Seminole County authorities and FBI agents by police Monday.

Gaines was arrested Sunday night by Belle Glade Police, who had stopped him from driving his car. He was charged with violation of federal extortion laws. They included Jesse James, James Earl Ray and Frank Weatherford Ernest Jerome Jackson.

Sanford police said they have been looking for Gaines for a week. They said he bought a new \$600 car last week and

paid for it with \$10 and \$20 bills.

J. Wallace Laprade, special agent in charge of the FBI's Newark office, identified the three as Robert Emilio Martino, 21, of New Haven, George Martinez, 21, and Jose Antonio Hernandez, also known as Anthony V. Deloach, 19, of Newark.

Laprade said the three brothers are related to a man he identified as the boy's victim's father, who paid a \$50,000 ransom to win the freedom of his son last week.

Laprade declined to comment on whether the family relations had any connection with the kidnapping, in which the boy was whisked away in a car last Wednesday.

The FBI originally said they were looking for two more suspects after the arrests of five youths late last week.

Parisian unreality reflected in politics

PARIS — There has always been an air of fantasy about Paris, but somehow the atmosphere seems more real now than ever, and is affecting everything from prices to politics.

At first, the arguments between Washington and Paris over oil, the NATO alliance and transatlantic relations seem serious and even ominous, but after while in this artificial atmosphere they seem inflated and unreal.

The negotiations over the supply and price of oil, big fuss about that big conference in Washington, but the delegations with their experts and their statistics didn't talk about oil but merely talked about how to talk about oil together, said Henry Kissinger, separately

said Michel Ichet. And the substance got lost in the procedure.

Still, officials on both sides have been fiddling with words ever since Henry launched his "new Europe" in New York last April.

Kissinger wanted a declaration symbolizing the unity of the Western powers, and ended with a debate-dramatizing the disunity and compromise language designed to cover up the disagreements. 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Senate OK's \$9 million housing bill

WASHINGTON - The Senate passed Monday a \$9 billion comprehensive housing bill that would re-write practically all of the nation's housing laws.

By a vote of 76 to 11, the Senate sent the Housing and Community Development Act

to the House, where supporters of the measure expect stiff opposition from the pro-business.

A statement released by the Department of Health and Urban Development indicated the displeasure of the Nixon administration and its hope that the House will pass a bill similar to the administration's bill.

The bill passed Monday

the Senate, seeking a compromise sharing concept of scaling funds to state and local governments with less federal strings. It also provided funds for further experimentation with housing allowances for the poor, and would continue

several major housing programs, including subsidized housing for low and moderate-income families that the administration opposed.

The legislation is divided into two sections, one dealing with houses and the other with income families. This provision is also expected to encounter opposition from the administration and in the House.

Under the community development part of the bill, all developments would have to abide by standards set by the federal government. In eliminating

many of the programs such as subsidized rental and homeownership for low-income families, would be removed. These programs are also opposed by many in the house.

The measure would also authorize up to \$400 million over six years for public experiments involving the poor cash allowances for housing a provision supported by the administration.

The bill would allow the Secretary of Housing and Urban Development to stipulate that between 20 and 70 per cent of federally funded private development of housing be set aside for low-

income families.

This is the largest, most comprehensive bill ever

Autonomous status sought

"Americans," Church said, "have a vital stake in assuring that the integrity of the Social Security system is maintained. In one form or another, it affects the lives of almost every American family."

The Church legislation would also make the agency non-political and impartial. He said the bill would prohibit the mailing of announcements with Social Security or supplemental security income checks which make any reference to public office holders.

Church said in October 1972, the Nixon administration sent an announcement with the first checks reflecting a per cent increase in benefits. The index, the same, clearly implied that the President was responsible for the increase.

Prisoners give survival secret

By CAPT. JAMES E. RAY

I struggled upright on the damp pallet in my solitary cell to hear better. It had sounded like a whisper.

"Sir, I must have been hallucinating. I slumped back, wondering how long it had been since my 103 Thunderchief had been shot down as we bombed a railroad bridge on the Hanoi-China supply line."

That was May 8, 1968. I tried to forget the weeks since the last time I'd interacted with another man.

Now I wish I had gone down with the plane. Anything could be better than the desolation, the awful sense of guilt, the darkness.

There I heard it again. Now it was unmistakable. "Hey, buddy." The whisper had come from the next cell.

I whispered back. He introduced himself as Bob Purcell, another Air Force pilot. We waved at the guard, passed on, then began to converse.

Soon all the prisoners on that flight were waving again.

We started by learning more about each other, where we were from, our families. One day he said, "I think church helped us."

"Gather ye, let us go," said Andy, his name, "and we'll sing hymns."

Bob was used to a church as if my mention of church was an odd request. Then he asked, "Do you know what happened?"

"We were taken to a camp as if we were cattle, then sent to a prison camp for two years."

"How about the twenty-third Psalm?"

"Only a little."

I began whispering. He'd repeat each line after me. A little later he whispered the important lesson on paper aren't one iota as important as the spirit of the lesson.

Other prisoners joined in, sharing verses they knew. Through these contacts a fellowship grew among us.

We would share and write down a draft of scripture.

By nightfall we became vital to our many tasks. Our ranks rocketed, with dysentery weakened by a thin diet, we spent 20 hours a day locked in our cells. And those lights became eyes of light, constant assurances of His love and care.

We made ink from brick dust and water. We'd write verses on bits of toilet paper, then fold them to fit in the drooping pen held in hand, break at the midsection.

This was dangerous. A man caught would be tortured.

But the urge to share developed inventiveness. Jimmie, halfway read dressed against the wall to hear thump-thump-thump-thump as somewhere on the wall, a fellow POW tapped me. In Morse code, "I will lift up my hands, the hills will move when you come to help us again."

The tapping got his message across. Jimmie and I exchanged signals and passed on the seven other verses in that psalm which I scratched on the wall, each piece of broken tile.

My idea—those of us were
