TWIN Falls — Jim Latham, a lifelong resident of Twin Falls, has the leading role as Feyve in this year's Dilettante production, "Fiddler On The Roof."

Following tonight's family night performance, the production will open its run at 8:15 p.m. Thursday. Evening performances are also scheduled Friday, Saturday and Monday. A matinee will be presented Sunday at 2:15 p.m.

Administration right move

WASHINGTON - The grand jury returned its indictments in the Watergate affair about midday March 11 and within the hour the President asked the people to join in recognizing that those indicted are presumed innocent unless proof of guilt is established in the courts.

This is a wise and proper admonition in any criminal prosecution, and it is especially appropriate to this one. The seven defendants are not charged with federal crimes that are easily susceptible to proof such as those that distinguish the Watergate case.

The indictment runs to 50 pages. All seven defendants are named: John Mitchell, Haldeman, John Ehrlichman, Gordon Strachan, Charles Colson, Herbert Morrison, and Kenneth Parkinson. They are charged in Count One with conspiracy, conspiracy, conspiracy, and conspiracy.

These are the elements of perjury, that an accused while under oath willfully and knowingly gave false testimony to a material fact. The first perjury charge against Mitchell, in Count Four, demonstrates the difficult burden placed upon the prosecution. Mitchell was asked, before the grand jury, if he had any information, in any form, that would tend to reflect unfavorably on the President.

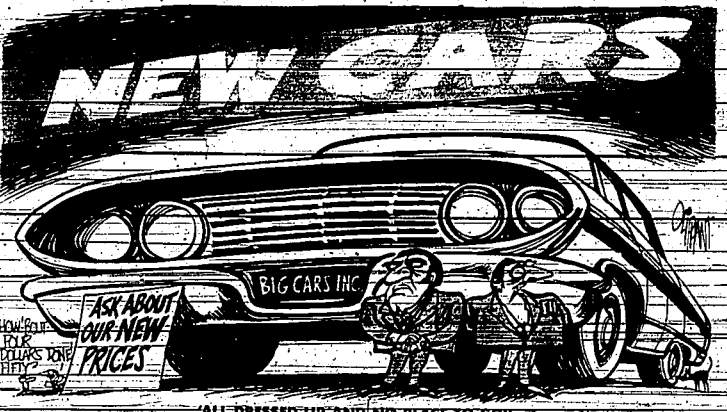

That particular allegation in Count Four is among the government's most solid charges. Other counts of perjury have Mitchell saying, "I don't know whether I was during that time or not." In the most publicized charge against Haldeman, he is charged with perjury in a meeting with the President.

That meeting was held on March 21, 1973. John Dean had testified that at that meeting the President asked him how much money might be involved in the permanent cover-up. Dean answered, a million dollars. In Dean's version, Nixon went on to say that there is no problem in raising a million dollars. We can do that.

It would be an authoritarian government, for a total while.

Some of the present leaders could protect themselves in power. They would need only to renounce Marxism. Permit people to say what they want to free their religion, to read what they want.

What have you to fear? Is the idea really so terrible? Are you really so unsure of yourselves? You will still have a great and unpreparable power, a separate, strong and exclusive party, the army, the police, force, the courts, the press, the television, universal wealth, a monopoly foreign trade, an artificial rate of exchange for the ruble, but let the people breathe, let them think and develop. If you belong to the people here and soul, there are no restrictions. Let me see you in a few months later. Solzhenitsyn was placed out of Russia and dumped to Germany.

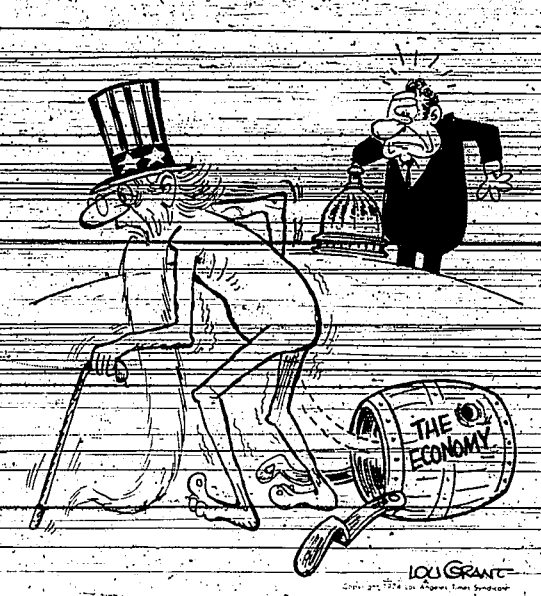

Time has come to amend 1952 immigration act

PARIS (The New York Times Service) - The young French revolutionary, Hector Berlioz, has been invited as a visitor's visit under the 1952 Immigration and Nationality Act passed by Congress during the peak of McCarthyism's Red-baiting.

This minks little sense for a country which prides itself on liberal intelligence. The Soviet Union is expelling dissident intellectuals, headed by Solzhenitsyn, simply because it disagrees with their views.

I personally hope the decision is reversed and also the McCarthyist act of 1952 is amended. It is necessary for the United States to uphold its concept of liberty - including the right to disagree. If - thank heavens - a man's vigorous ideas are not censored, why is it logical to try and censor the man himself? Keeping Debay from his wife and publisher is more consonant with Soviet ideology than our own.

White House, EPA clash over air act changes

WASHINGTON — The White House and the Environmental Protection Agency have collided over administration proposals for a drastic revision of the 1970 Clean Air Act.

According to informed sources, White House plans called for a final decision on the proposed amendments coming next week and then quick dispatch of a bill to congress. But in meetings last week, these sources said, Russell E. Train, E.P.A. administrator, stood his ground firmly against several amendments desired by the Office of Management and Budget. The Federal Energy Office and the White House Domestic Council, as it is called, have been set back while the White House decides whether to yield or to force the issue, one possibility is Train's proposal.

Train, these sources were careful to point out, did not throw down any gauntlet in the way of threatening his resignation. Rather, he simply said the White House representatives that he could not support several of the amendments. But he would continue to send them to the White House, and that if the White House persisted it might be

limitations placed on plants by many states to achieve the standard. According to informed officials, industry arguments against the act have been sympathetically received by

White House objectives. He said last week: "I want it known that I am strongly opposed to any of these proposals, and I'm going to fight against them to the last wisp of light."

By saying that he thought the proposed amendments unnecessary, Train was referring to the language expected to be offered by the White House in any message accompanying the bill, namely, that they are necessary because of the energy crisis.

This argument is not likely to be persuasive to environmental organizations because of the President's well-known opposition to important segments of the Clean Air Act when it was passed.

Further, major environmental groups are presenting to congress Train and his deputy, John H. Quarles, Jr., will have to persuade the House and the Senate Subcommittee on Environmental Pollution, and several of his colleagues who are principal targets of the amendments.

These are the principal amendments sought by the White House and especially those required by the Clean Air Act. It has set emission limitations for power plants to be achieved by 1976.

House now proposes extending the exemption to 1984. The agency believes this additional delay is unwarranted and fears it would be the opening wedge for further amendments.

The power industry has been urging that the difficult problem of reducing poisonous sulphur oxide emissions be solved by dispersing them through taller stacks rather than by eliminating them through installation of expensive scrubbers which, the agency says, are unfeasible. The dispersion method is called an "intermittent control strategy" because it would require a shutdown of the plant under certain atmospheric conditions.

The White House amendment would authorize dispersion as a permanent control measure in lieu of emission limitations. The agency does not object to dispersion as an interim measure pending installation of scrubbers, which it insists do not. However, it opposes dispersion as a permanent solution because, Train says, it is "pollution dilution."

The Clean Air Act enjoins the agency to set primary standards of pollution with "margin of safety" as the sole criterion. It also insists that, in account, The White House

amendment would require the agency to consider economic and social impact in setting standards.

The Clean Air Act permits states to set air quality standards more rigorous than the federal standards. Some states have done so, and industry has argued that the federal standards should be "pre-emptive." A White House amendment would make federal standards pre-emptive.

The White House would amend the National Environmental Policy Act, which requires federal agencies to prepare statements on the environmental impact of proposed federal actions.

Train, a former chairman of the Council of Environmental Quality, which expresses the impact statements, bitterly opposes the amendment as an act designed to enmesh the

Physician's advice suggested

Dear Dr. Thompson: My ground is recovering from a coronary occlusion suffered about three months ago. I would like to see your comments on the likely effect of the following items:

1. Coffee (three to five cups a day)
2. Beer or wine in small amounts
3. Yard work. Same answer
4. Beer or wine in small amounts

First of all, his physician should advise him on all these questions. Not all coronaries heart attacks are of the same type. Some are of the "heart reserve, which should improve with time, but can vary greatly soon after an attack. But assuming your brother's case to be more or less "average," here are my answers:

1. Coffee: Not over three cups, and use decaffeinated coffee.
2. Beer or wine: Okay in small amounts, but I trust that you and he have a reasonable view of what "small amounts" means.
3. Walking: A mile in one time. Go short distances at first and work up to a mile or two as tolerance improves.

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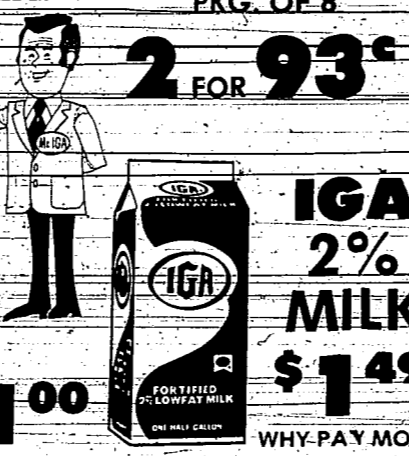

Revenue maneuvering may bring tax relief

BOISE (UPI) — House conservatives have learned who is running the show in the 24th Idaho Legislature, but if they want tax relief desperately enough there yet may be a way for them to get it.

Larsen says money gone

BOISE (UPI) — Idaho's chief taxwriter accused the legislative budget committee Tuesday of pre-empting his job when it took the House's budget committee and said he might go south to look for the rest of his session.

Chairman Alan F. Larsen, R-Blackfoot, of the House Revenue and Taxation Committee said he fears the Joint Finance Appropriations Committee has gone too far.

"They spent all the money," Larsen said. "The \$3 million we thought we had for tax relief is gone."

"You've got to have money to have anything meaningful in writing tax laws."

"Now they have gone into areas by dealing a tax bill — a two per cent surcharge on liquor to fund the ASAP (Alcohol Safety Action Program). I think that's about the last straw."

"We have no business putting any more surcharge on liquor," Larsen said. "We're just encouraging bootlegging."

Larsen noted that the legislature voted out on a 2 1/2 per cent surcharge to fund construction at the new state prison. In fact, he said, he has some questions about that action.

Sen. Richard Hubbard, R-Twin Falls, co-chairman of the joint budget committee, disagreed with Larsen. He said his committee had drafted a tax bill.

"Oh, well," he said. "I don't know if it was a tax bill. It was an appropriation of funds that accrue to the liquor fund which will be a continuing appropriation."

"I don't know if this sort of thing is a tax bill. I know appropriations, we like to take an annual look. We may take it back to committee in look at it."

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North Carolina gets NIT favorites' nod

NEW YORK (UPI) — North Carolina is under the onus of being the No. 1 seed in the National Invitation Tournament, which begins Saturday, but without the benefits of the eighth-ranked Tar Heels were the unanimous choice of the other coaches competing in the NIT as the team to beat, but the draw hardly reflects North Carolina's top seed status.

The more I'm coaching, the less I know how we're going to react," Smith said. "You don't know what sort of emotional scars are left from the ACC tournament."

More important, though, to the Tar Heels is the physical strain of the guard Darrell Griffith, who has been bothered by a groin injury.

Griffith was the star player of the tournament, but he was overshadowed last year by George Karl. Elston took over this season as traffic director for the Carolina offense and developed into an outstanding outside shot.

"He's just come along beautifully," Smith said. "He's a real pro prospect."

However, Elston is still positive about this year's tournament. Griffith's outstanding play, a forward, Bobby Jones, a tremendous defensive performer, and a guard, center, Tommy Smith, are the stars of the team.

Smith said, "Every top defensive assignment in our games, whether a guard, center or forward, he's had. He's the only one who's really defended North Carolina State 57 Davin Thompson all this year."

Smith's offense, however, is just as famous for their subtleties, particularly the "Cunningham" play. "This is a play that we've used since Head Coach Phelps' coaching period during the first half of every game."

The play is called Cunningham because it was first used in a game against Georgia Tech in 1971. "It was used as the first legitimate pull-out all out and the others did so well, it came out as a life. It helps the team's morale."

Smith is leaving unaided the psychologically devastating effect it can have on Tar Heels' opponents.

But Smith knows all about people who are who he would prefer not to have his Tar Heels play in the NIT.

ROME (UPI) — Mankind faces for the second straight year the threat of a worldwide food shortage despite bumper crops in 1973, according to the director general of the U.N. Food and Agriculture Organization.

"More than ever since the Second World War, the world will be dependent on this year's production for its basic food supplies, bearing in mind the fact that a continuation of recent trends would mean that reserve stocks of grain will be

gradually approaching the vanishing point," Director General Adolfo R. Figueroa said.

Despite a record 1973 harvest of rice, mankind's other chief staple food, consumption is rising along with population and incomes and prices remain high, Boerma said.

"It is to meet world population growth, the Secretary General would have to increase this year by 15 million tons of five per cent, Boerma said.

Mormon Church leader reaffirms policy

SALT LAKE CITY (UPI)—The president of the Mormon Church said Tuesday he does not anticipate any change in the faith's policy of barring blacks from its priesthood.

Spencer W. Kimball, who became church president and patriarch of the 3.3 million members of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints last December, said he has prayed for the church's future since then.

Kimball, in an interview by newsman Tom Pettit, televised Tuesday on NBC's "Today Show," was asked whether he anticipated a change in the racial policy — which prevents blacks from holding any posts in the lay leadership of the church.

"We do not anticipate," the 78-year-old Mormon leader replied. "It should be done, and the Lord will reveal it, and we believe in revelation and we believe that the leadership of the church is entitled to have information that would come to it as necessary and if it is proper."

Kimball said the church was concerned about the fact that outsiders consider the Mormon position to be purely bigotry, but

added that "men's ways are not God's ways and there are many things which cannot be explained" which by "just normal arguing and thinking processes."

On other topics, the Mormon president said the church is encouraging its members to support the President because of a doctrine urging obedience to government leaders and laws, and is opposing women's

liberation because "the mother's place is in the home." Kimball was asked whether he and the church were against President Nixon's approach.

"We feel to sustain the laws of the land, sustain the leaders in all their righteous endeavors."

And if they turn out to not be righteous, then that would have to be

corrected, I suppose," Kimball responded.

He said the church felt "many fathers have abdicated their position as head of the household."

"And the mother's place is in the home, and so many mothers have left their families and that it would be wonderful if they would remain and teach their children," Kimball said.

Gooding man resigns

BLISS — Aldrich Bowler Bliss, has resigned from the Gooding County Planning Commission because of what he says will become a "conflict of interest."

Bowler said he has worked, while a member of the county planning agency, to suggest land use considerations for Solar Farms in Gooding County. He said he has recently helped to form a new firm, Solar Corporation, in Boise. While the firm are not related, he feels there could be a conflict if he continued to serve the planning board.

Jones said the young skiers will run the dual slalom course in a time, side by side with boys racing against boys and girls against girls.

Cordoba governor appointed

New York Times Service BUENOS AIRES — President Juan Domingo Peron Tuesday appointed one of his conservative followers to replace the deposed outgoing Buenos governor of the northern industrial city of Cordoba.

The appointment of "Dillo" Emilio Beaulieu, a ranking member of the Ministry of Social Welfare, ended a two-week-old institutional crisis in Argentina's largest city that began when police rebels and rioting trade unionists ousted the locally elected governor, Ricardo Obregon Cano.

The right-wing coup has brought a wave of bombings and strikes in Buenos Aires and has resulted in the deaths of at least eight people.

Monday, the federal government announced that it would not change its position on Obregon Cano for allegedly slandering two close aides of President Peron.

Interior Minister Hector Luna and Labor Minister Ricardo Obregon were among the top officials who had supported the ouster of the overthrown man.

The same day, however, two cabinet officials by other ministries, some of whom had themselves backed the recent

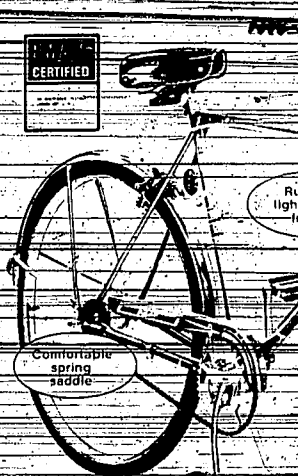

The secret of Mama's mattress

My mother used to keep money hidden under her mattress.

It wasn't until I discovered one morning the usual mattress money, seated against an emergency. Mother gave this money away.

"I don't understand," I remember saying as I watched her tuck seven dollar bills into an envelope for safekeeping under the mattress. Why do you put your life money under the mattress?"

"Oh, this isn't our title, mother said, patting the envelope. I've saved this from my husband's money, and it goes to very special people. I ask God to give me a burden for a missionary and the best I know what mother meant by giving a burden for a missionary was the process of working around the kitchen when suddenly she seemed to get uncomfortable. Her face would cloud.

"I have the strangest feeling that the Robertsons are in need," she might say, naming some missionary she knew about. "Lord, You've given me this money, the Robertsons. Thank You, I'll send them a note."

Then mother would go to her mattress, and before the day was over, out would go another few bills tucked inside. This and again mother would receive a letter in the return mail from "her" missionary, saying that encouragement had come at a very important moment.

Mother's face would light up. "If only everyone knew the secret of burden money," she'd say.

Well, as the years passed, I forgot my mother's principle and handled our family's giving as I suppose most of us do, through the church or through charities. Yet something mechanical and dead set in, so our giving lost its glow.

Then one day several years ago as I was writing out a bill check for a check, a little memory-vision popped into mind: I saw mother lifting the edge of her mattress and taking out her burden money.

"Lord," I said, "do you want me to send some extra money to a missionary?"

As soon as I made this prayer I realized that I knew very few missionaries. I did "have" our church's listing of missions. I opened the book at random and started glancing down the page.

Suddenly, one name seemed to stand out as though a light were shining on it. I can't even recall what it was now; I only recall that the man was working among American Indians.

Then—and there I re-examined our family budget for a moment, found a place where I could cut back and wrote a check and a note.

"We do not know each other, but the Lord has told me to send you the enclosed check as coming from Him. Please accept it as a sign that He cares for you; and is watching over you."

I do remember the letter as if I got back through. "You will never know," the missionary wrote, "how much your letter and the check meant to us! For we have been praying for your specific amount as 'down payment' against a much needed pickup truck. We thank you for the money, of course. But we thank the Lord especially for telling us 'right now' that He loves us!"

Years have passed now since I began this little fund for missions. The remarkable thing is how much of a blessing it has been to my wife and to me as we learn what God's workers are doing.

I have a dream now of a hundred thousand men and women committing themselves to give above and beyond their tithes to the outreach work of Christ. Every single person who has tried the "burden money" principle has reported the same thing, including them, back to personal touch with what God is doing through His Word and second when they give where the Lord instructs, the blessings always flow both ways.
